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Mindemoya seniors likely 'dropping in' at local school

Central council, seniors' group, school board, working on a plan
for seniors' drop in centre

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The concept of a seniors' drop-in centre located at Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS) in Mindemoya is not new, but the Central Manitoulin municipal council was again approached by a local seniors' group for their support in principle along with a presentation to committee.

"This goes back a couple of months now," said Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens. "One of my councillors (Linda Farquhar) approached me with the idea. This all came out of a meeting in West Bay where Mr. (Norm) Blaseg (Rainbow District

director) was looking for ideas on how to utilize excess space in Island schools. Gore Bay took them up on it at the time.'

An RDSB program was seeking to optimize space in underutilized school buildings by leasing portions of the building out to compatible functions, such as senior drop-ins or doctor's or dentist's

"I said let me talk to the school board, we had a chat and confirmed that there was space, and reported back what the cost would be," said Mayor Stephens.

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Northeast Town, M'Chigeeng, Billings approve Garlon spray

Individual landowners can request 'no spray' adjacent to their property

MANITOULIN—Residents of the Howland part of the Northeast Town, Billings and M'Chigeeng should be aware that Hydro One is in the planning stages for its regular vegetation maintenance that includes the use of the herbicide Garlon RTU. The timing of the work will depend on crew availability and is expected to occur in the next few months. The timing is also coordinated with the MTO.

"Hydro One must ensure that its distribution lines and equipment are clear of trees and brush that could pose a safety risk to the public or employees or interfere with the reliability of the system," says Nancy Clark, communications officer for Hydro One. "Tree contacts account for more than 30 percent of power outages

in Ontario. This percentage can be higher in areas that are heavily forested. Hydro One's focus for maintaining vegetation near power lines is to reduce tree-related power outages and ensure safe access for our crews.'

Hydro One technicians can use a variety of tools to manage vegetation near power lines to improve the reliability of the power supply, Ms. Clark added. These tools include trimming or removing vegetation through mechanical or manual means and the selective application of herbicide (Garlon RTU), if approved by the property owner. Hydro One requires permission of the landowner to apply herbicide, including the municipality or

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Federal budget long on vision, short on doling

Goodbye Canada Savings Bonds

OTTAWA—Federal Liberal Finance Minister Bill Morneau delivered his second budget on Wednesday, March 22 through a lens focussed on spurring innovation and providing Canadians with better access to jobs training and skills—but darkened by a still burgeoning (if at a lessening rate) deficit and a much longer tunnel leading to the light of its fiscal promises.

"Budget 2017 is about jobs," said Minister Morneau in a government release on the budget. "It's about creating good middle class jobs today, while preparing Canadians for the jobs of tomorrow. The next step in our plan for Canada's economy is making the smart, responsible investments we need to be innovative and competitive, while improving the health of our communities, ensuring a better future for our kids and grandkids."

The budget revises the deficit for the year just ended to \$23 billion and forecasts a deficit for the coming year of \$28.5 billion. Returned as part of the new deficit numbers is a \$3 billion risk adjustment, some-

Highway 6 to become an integral part of the new Great Lakes Waterfront Trail

LITTLE CURRENT—Northeast Town council received a deputation from Mike Wozny of the Waterfront Cycling Route Initiative, encouraging the municipality to support the Highway 6 link that joins Northern Ontario to the provincial cycling trail system.

Mr. Wozny explained that a study was completed for Tourism Northern Ontario to facilitate the development of a tourism and recreational cycling route linking Sault Ste. Marie and the communities along the North Shore to Sudbury, using back-country roads and trails. The goal is to also encourage support from community stakeholders along the route, such as the Northeast Town, as well as identifying economic, tourism, and health benefits. The Sault Ste. Marie to Sudbury route, titled the Lake Huron-North Channel Cycling

Route, comes in at 370 kilometres and takes in 21 communities including three First Nations. It is a part of the larger Great Lakes Waterfront Trail. "An important feature of this initiative is the

partnership with Waterfront Regeneration Trust," Mr. Wozny explained to council. "They are a charitable non-profit group that has been around for over 20 years and coordinates on an ongoing basis over 1,600 km of cycling trails in southern Ontario going through over 70 communities. The expansion of their mandate to include the 370 km Lake Huron North Channel route and Manitoulin Island (via Highway 6) provides the North with a direct connection to the southern portion of the route (via the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun) and a guarantee for long-term success and ongoing coordination of the route."

Mr. Wozny noted to council that 'drive and ride' cycling is the fastest growing segment of cycling tourism. "There are those who will cycle from Saul Ste. Marie to South Baymouth, but most are 'drive and riders'," he added.

"The mapping and the signage are great, but we need champions to make sure the initiative doesn't die," Mr. Wozny added. This, he said, is where the Waterfront Regeneration Trust comes in. The trust coordinates and markets the trails in southern Ontario currently and is willing to become a partner in the North too.

"We need to connect the Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury trail to Tobermory and points south," he continued, noting that the Georgian Bay Cycling Route clocks in at 1,000 kilometres.

Thanks to the lobbying efforts of the Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA), Highway 6 shoulders are almost all paved (from the Highway 542 turnoff in Tehkummah to Ten Mile Point), which makes the perfect connecting link, Mr. Wozny added. Signage will be placed along Manitoulin's portion of Highway 6, denoting it as a cycling trail early this summer with the help of the Ministry of Transportation.

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North East LHIN funds support for seniors and palliative patients on Manitoulin Island

MANITOULIN—Like many seniors, Mary would prefer to stay in her own home. However, with diabetes and arthritis, she is finding it a lot harder to make meals and perform other activities of daily living. She could use some help but isn't sure where to find it.

The North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) is investing in programs and services to support seniors like Mary as well as palliative patients living at home in the Manitoulin Island area.

"We know people need extra care support at the end of their life and Northerners have told us they want to be at home among family and friends," said Louise Paquette, CEO of the NE LHIN. "With targeted investments in the Manitoulin area, providers are working together to find the best way to improve access to care and increase care coordination for seniors like Mary."

The NE LHIN is making the following investments aimed at increasing access to care and support in the home for Northerners in the Manitoulin area: The addition of a geriatric social worker at Noojmowin Teg Health

Centre, in Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation, will work as part of an interdiscipinary team to help older people (55+) and their families. The team will provide clinical interventions such as assessments, supportive counselling, and linking clients to other health and social programs. This geriatric social worker will support up to 75

clients. (\$102,000).

Assisted living to support 10 frail seniors in their homes with both scheduled and unscheduled visits: the funding will be shared between aboriginal health service providers on Manitoulin Island but flowed through Noojmowin Teg Health Centre (\$250,000)

A Hospice Volunteer Visiting Program to support people at the end of their life and their families. The Victorian Order of Nurses (VON) is working with the Manitoulin Collaborative—a group of health care providers who deliver services ranging from hospital to home and community, and mental health and addiction care—to create a visiting program that will address the unique needs and practices of the many communities in the Manitoulin

area. (\$20,000)

"These investments were in response to service gaps identified by the First Nation health authorities of Mnaamodzawin, Wikwemikong and M'Chigeeng, and other area partners," said Pam Williamson, executive director, Noojmowin Teg Health Centre. "The new services will contribute to the wholistic health and well-being of elders, and extend their ability to live within their own homes and communities."

As a health service provider that currently manages several home and community services in the Manitoulin area, VON is well connected to the community and can use this investment to supplement its existing range of services to extend to hospice visiting.

"It is a very exciting time for VON and we are ecstatic to be working with such great partners," said Jacqueline Dorval, executive director, VON for Canada – Ontario Branch

Northeast Town seeking legal counsel in battle for its share of Planning Board reserves

LITTLE CURRENT—Council for the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands (Northeast Town) have directed staff to seek legal advice to get its perceived \$29,040 share back from the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) reserves since leaving the board and launching out as its own planning authority this year.

At a Northeast Town council meeting last Tuesday night, council reviewed a Manitoulin West Recorder page 1 article 'Debate continues to surround NEMI call for Planning Board reserves' in which MPB members discussed the Northeast Town's request for 33 percent of the planning board's reserves, totalling about \$88,000.

Mayor Al MacNevin said the story's inclusion in the council package was meant to highlight to council that the board was still struggling to make a decision.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained that the accumulation of the MPB reserve is reflective of either one of two things: that the municipalities have been overcharged or that the funds were being put into reserves for a particular project. The CAO highlighted the fact that the planning board has no significant capital expenditures, so he is unsure why there is unwillingness to give the Northeast Town the funds.

"Do you have any suggestions

on how we can push harder?" the mayor asked.

"Perhaps it's time for me to contact legal counsel," Mr. Williamson responded.

Councillor Marcel Gauthier questioned a quote in the Recorder story that said the Northeast Town has hired at least one part-time employee for their own planning operations.

"That statement is absolutely false," Mr. Williamson responded. "We did not hire anyone."

"The money is ours—I don't

Debajehmujig Storytellers double up at Seed Swap 2017

MANITOWANING—Debajehmujig Storytellers intern Iain Mather has been involved in the Debaj eed Swap for a couple of now, first as a Woofer (World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms) volunteer and now as an intern. but he was pretty excited by the turnout this year.

"Things went pretty well," he said. "We had about 60 people come out this year. Last year we had about 20 to 30"

Mr. Mather, who along with fellow intern Samantha Brennan organized this year's Seed Swap, suggested the uptick in attendance may be in part due to the 10 vendors that were offering wares at the event this year.

The Seed Swap, for those as yet uninitiated into the concept, is an annual gathering to swap and share garden seeds at the Debajehmujig Creation in Manitowaning enjoying its 6th iteration. This year the event ran from 1 pm to 4 pm, three hours of jam-packed garden information and seed bartering topped off with a community potluck—and almost best of all, it's free.

Among the presentations at this year's Seed Swap were the annual garden update, worm composting and mushroom growing with Manitoulin Shiitake Mush-

Attendees were also encouraged to bring along their favourite

musical instrument to "help raise the energy for the planting season" at the Seed Swap coffee house.

While the Seed Swap focusses primarily on heritage seeds, there were plenty of grocery store display varieties available as well.

"We kept it wide open," said Mr. Mather, who noted the seeds will not go to waste in any event. "We have some experiments we are

Seed at the swap include a wide range of vegetables and other edibles, but also seeds for plants that can produce natural dyes, a popular feature for local weavers and textile artists

Vendors' wares at this year's event were eclectic, including gift baskets, micro-greens, herbs, premade salads, soaps and even weaving. But not a lot of baking. "We kind of discouraged baking this year," admitted Mr. Mather. "We didn't want to take away from the potluck experience."

If you missed this year's event, there is still an opportunity to try a taste of the Debaj-inspired wares at the Creation Centre. For a number of years, the Debaj crew has been producing their own brand of cider vinegar, made from local apples. This year's batch is just about ready for bottling, and there are a few bottles of previous vintages still available, but not all that much.

Yvonne Sellen

Yvonne Sellen has always been a very independent lady but she has never missed finding time to care for others, including friends and family. "I didn't find someone to share my life with, but that didn't stop me from enjoying many friendships along the way. Kathryn Laidley was one of those good friends. We travelled together extensively and shared many memories," Yvonne begins. "I also babysat most of my nieces and nephews when they were small, and grand nieces and nephews as well. Many of them learned to drive with my directions. My family has always reciprocated and been there for me too. I see my sister Georgia Robinson, who lives across the street, quite often.'

Distant relative George Abotossaway started the trading post in Little Current. He sold wood to the steamers and took in pelts, which he traded for food. He and the Anishinaabe people were later moved to Sucker Creek. Maternal grandmother was Lena Abotossaway. "I remember her but not my grandfather, Harry Abotossaway. He died when I was quite young."

Yvonne was born on November 15, 1944 to George and Jesse Sellen in a small home near the Red Mill boarding house in Little Current. George had moved to this community from Toronto, after he met Yvonne's mother. Their first baby, Jeannette, died at two weeks with hemophilia (a condition that causes people to bleed easily and, sometimes, with fatal results). There would be nine other children in the family: Georgia, Betty Ann, Yvonne, Ken, Doug, Leonard, Edward, Michael and Stanley.

"My dad was employed at the CPR coal docks for 25 years while my mother worked for Ellis Cleaners and also part-time for a museum near Barrie. She would visit Ontario reserves looking for artifacts for the museum. She was away a lot, looking for native beadwork, porcupine quill boxes, birch-bark canoes and needle work."

"One of my first memories was being fished out of the Little Current harbour by my dad at age three. We lived on top of a hill and I had run down with my sisters to the fishing boats below. I rolled into the water wearing my snow suit. My sisters had to run back up the hill to get dad. He raced down and fished me out. Looking back, I couldn't have been in over my head or I would have been pulled down by the wet snow suit."

The Sellen family would move to successively larger homes to accommodate new siblings. "I remember the house I was born in being cold and drafty. The next house, on Wilson St., wasn't much better. We finally stayed put when we got to 21 Draper Street, a home with three bedrooms upstairs and one downstairs. The mortgage was \$3,000 and we paid a 'sum' every two weeks until it was all paid off, years later. We heated our house with coal, obtained at a good price from dad's work. Another early memory, at four, was my uncle pulling two of my brothers and me, on a toboggan, up to our new house."

"We always had pets. Darkie was a smart Border Collie who was inseparable from brother Doug. He had been the McGillis' dog but Darkie adopted Doug and the McGillis' agreed to part with him. We always had a cat, a budgie and pet rabbits. Dad raised rabbits to eat, but thankfully, excluded our pets. The garden kept us busy and fed. Dad also hunted for partridge or went fishing. In the spring, we would start an assembly line to clean the tub of smelt we always caught. One person removed the head, another the entrails before another sibling washed them. When we had enough for a meal, they were packaged."

"I distinctly recall getting a fish bone stuck in my throat when I

was quite small, before we moved to Draper St. I was scared but the doctor got it out. Another time, I had the flu and Dr. Bailey came to the house and put me in the hospital. My ears were so infected, I couldn't hear. They gave me penicillin twice a day."

Christmas was lots of fun. "We all went to the Christmas Eve service on December 24 at Holy Trinity Church and then came home. Where there was plenty of good food and lots of visiting. A big table was set up in our living room. One year, dad's parents, Percy and Ellen Sellen came from England. Ellen made a plum pudding in a cheese cloth and she put silver coins in it. Percy had been a long-distance runner, competing with famous American First Nation racer Tommy Longboat in one race. Easter service included all the boys who regularly didn't attend services, except at Easter. I remember the church getting a new minister, Canon Dixon, who stayed for 25 years. Rev. Aiden Armstrong is our current minis-

"On school mornings, I would stand at the kitchen table and wistfully watch my older sisters go across the road to the public school. In 1950, at six, I finally started Grade 1. There was no Kindergarten. When the bell sounded, we ran to the Little Current Public School, all destined for different classes. At lunch, we would see each other again. Betty and Georgia were held back for one year and two years respectively, so all three of us wound up in Grade 8 at the same time."

"I loved to read adventure stories and science fiction so much that I needed glasses at age seven. We got on the train in Little Current and headed for Toronto so my eves could be tested at People's Credit Jewellers. Thank goodness my parents got a one-year warranty because I managed to break the glasses seven times and got seven replacements in that year. The train got us to Espanola for groceries too, taking us in the morning and returning us that evening. We didn't have a car and the train was free."

"At school, I liked English, spelling and art but hated arithmetic. The teachers were nice, but our principal, Mr. Smith, was very strict. One year, the teachers checked us for nits. They mistakenly sent Georgia home and because Betty Ann and I were her sisters, we were sent home too. It turned out that Georgia had no lice or nits, just dry skin. Nevertheless, our mother had to treat all three of us for nits before they would let us come back to school. Georgia was embarrassed and she never returned to school. Betty Ann finished Grade 8 and I went on to complete Grades 9 and 10 in high school, then dropped out of Grade 11 when I was faced with algebra, French and Latin.'

Summer vacations often found the family travelling. "Since dad worked for the CPR, we would get rail passes for the family." One year, Yvonne, then 20, Doug and Stan accompanied their parents

on a special train trip to Vancouver. "We got there on the morning of the fourth day, stayed two days in Vancouver in a motel, walked as much as we could and then returned home."

There was a lot of beautiful scenery along the way. "Heading

east from Banff, Alberta, we saw moose and deer near the tracks. I remember one spiral pass that had tracks coming out of a tunnel, curving down the mountain below us. The Fraser River looked like a moving ribbon below. The mountains were spectacular, especially Cathedral Mountain, which really looked like a fancy European church."

"We were still moving through the peaks when my brother and I found a half-door left open at the end of our car. We both leaned over and saw the ground outside as the train sped by. Suddenly, we were jerked back by our mother who was afraid of heights and felt this was not a safe option. When the train stopped, mother would get off so she could buy food for sandwiches; a less-expensive

alternative to the elegant dining offered on the train."

When my mother was away for work, I was responsible for my little brother Stanley, born late in my mother's life." Jesse was one of Dr. Bailey's first patients and the doctor knew Jesse only called for emergencies so staff would respond quickly. This time it was not an emergency. She was 45 but she suspected she was pregnant. Dr. Bailey felt that, at her age, it might be a tumor. Jesse insisted she was pregnant and she was right. After Stanley was born, he was jokingly referred to as a 'walking tumour' for a short while.

After high school, Yvonne worked at Okeechobee Lodge, washing dishes with her cousin Anita Dieter. "I liked the work but Anita didn't and when she quit I had to quit too, because the new girl they hired wanted to work with her own sister." Yvonne's next job was at the Anchor Inn owned at the time by Romeo and Rachel Charrette. She cleaned rooms until she was promoted to short-order cook. "Rachel was an artist and, after hours, I took art classes from Rachel at the public school. Landscapes were my favourite." Ivan Wheale taught some classes too.

Her interest in food preparation got her work at the Shaftsbury Inn, cooking for owner Linda Kelly and also at Garry Elliot's restaurant where she stayed for 15 years. From time to time she would fill in shifts for the VON, cleaning homes as well. "The VON offered a three-months training program for 15 people to become PSWs and I decided to take it. I started to work for them during the day and even at night, staying with people who just needed someone else to be in the house."

"I was in the home from eight at night to eight in the morning for eight years, with one older gentle-

man who was deaf, just making sure he got to bed and up again in the morning. There was an eldbed-ridden erly lady who needed the same service, later." For a while, Yvonne was working part time for the VON, part-time for Garry's Restaurant and she also stayed with a senior at night. It was a hectic schedule but Yvonne went even further. In her spare time, she researched a lot of the medical condi-

tions she was encountering at work, to better-understand them.

Later in her career, Yvonne was employed at the TLC in Little Current on weekends so the owner could take a break from Thursday night to Saturday night. They had six bedrooms upstairs and two downstairs for people who could cope with the stairs. "I helped take care of their eight clients." Linda, the owner, was sorry when Yvonne retired.

Her love for reading encouraged Yvonne to become a Lay Reader, one of four, at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church. "I am a 'cradle Anglican'" she offers, smiling. "My mum was in the choir before I was born and I joined her as soon as I was old enough. I love to do readings for the congregation and lead

prayers." Yvonne is also the president of the Altar Guild. "I make up schedules for all four Lay Readers and assist the minister by helping with the wine and the bread for Communion. I also help with preparation of the altar adding applicable colours, 'green' at present. The Pentecostal services are red, Advent, purple, and white for Christmas, weddings, baptisms and saints days."

"I spent 45 years of my life on Draper Street, first as a child and finally as a caretaker for my parents, my siblings, nephews and nieces. Being single, I had a flexible schedule and didn't have to worry that I was upsetting anyone. My father passed away in 1976 and my mother in 1981. Brother Stan moved out to be with his girlfriend soon after mother died. He has five children now and works at Parkland Crematorium in Sudbury where he has had to deal with the cremation of some of our relatives. Understandably, that was quite difficult."

Brother Ed has two children and lives in M'Chigeeng where he works for a roofing company. Betty Ann has three children and lives in Thunder Bay. She remarried, but sadly, her second husband died of a heart attack while fixing his car in their driveway. Georgia's husband worked for Hydro One. He died two years ago. Ken has one child. He is retired from INCO and lives in Kitchener where he still referees hockey games. Doug has three children but has had a stroke and lives in a long term care facility in Edmonton. Leonard has two children and lives in Picton. Before he retired. he worked for Blacksone, a company that makes car radiators, in

Michael has three children. He was in the army for a while. Afterwards, he laid tile for Red Bow and then he worked for the Sucker Creek fish farm. "Michael went through the ice in his snowmobile once. Luckily, he had on a flotation suit and someone saw him go in. They called the Sucker Creek Fire Department that pulled him out. Unfortunately, the hypothermia that resulted may have caused him a lot of health issues over the years."

Yvonne and her friend Kathryn Laidley like to visit the casinos occasionally where Yvonne limits herself to \$40. The two have taken a bus tour to Toronto to see plays like 'Dirty Dancing' and have visited the Thousand Islands, Newfoundland and Quebec City. "I took several cruises by myself to see San Juan, St. Thomas, St. Lucia, Puerto Rico, Costa Rica, Cuba and the Panama Canal. In the Panama Canal, three small tugs on each side of the big boat pulled us through the very narrow canal, showing us some spectacular scenery."

On a Regent Cruise, she met a

new friend, Delphia Clark. Regent had offered two single ladies a double room at the same price as a couple taking a double room. "We explored the eastern Caribbean, St. Thomas, and San Juan together. In the Barbados, we took a submarine excursion on the Atlantis, earning our 'submariner' badges. Delphia later moved to Florida and we stayed good friends. Two years ago, I went on a 10-day cruise on the Emerald Princess. It was a huge ship with a total of 4,077 passengers and crew."

About a year ago, Yvonne developed cancer of the bone marrow, called 'multiple myeloma.' "It started with a spell of headaches that lasted six weeks. Oncologist Dr. Gill did a bone biopsy which found a three-centimeter mass at the base of the brain. Radiation and chemotherapy were followed with steroids. "I could access some of the treatment in our local hospital in Mindemoya but more treatments were needed in Sudbury too."

Dr. Hurst, a stem-cell specialist in Sudbury, is doing some advanced treatment. "In Ottawa,

Hamilton man remains missing

Don't risk it all on the binary options scam

TORONTO-March is Fraud Prevention Month and the Canadian Bankers Association (CBA) has put out a press release aimed at providing Canadians with information to help better protect themselves from something called the binary options scam.

The pitch fraudsters use when selling binary options often goes something like this: "I made over \$2,000 with binary options this week. What are you waiting for?

'The promise of easy money can be alluring but if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is," said CBA president Terry Campbell. "Consumers should be skeptical of websites offering binary options bets and instead take the time to research investment opportunities thoroughly to avoid taking a gamble that never pays off.

Binary options are a bet on the performance of a stock or currency. If you're right, you win, if you're wrong, you lose, hence the term "binary." No individuals or firms are registered to sell binary options in Canada, which the CBA says is in itself a good reason to avoid them.

In the binary options scam, victims are solicited through social media, targeted online ads, chats, mass texts and cold calling and then directed to legitimate-looking websites where automated responders will ask them to place bets on short-term fluctuations in stocks or cur-

Very often, sign-up bonuses or credits are offered but the victim is always required to input personal banking or credit card information in order to activate an account.

If the "investor" is fortunate enough to "win" the bet, it becomes very difficult to obtain their winnings. The realistic-sounding trader will suddenly stop responding and ignore the investor's emails and calls.

These operations are based in overseas jurisdictions that are beyond the reach of Canadian authorities and regulators, leaving victims with little or no legal recourse for reimbursement.

Some scams go as far as using your financial information to steal additional funds from a victim's account or make fraudulent purchases with their credit card.

To avoid falling victim to online scams the CBA advises

Little Current will soon boast full circuit trail

LITTLE CURRENT—In its continued attempt to create a community filled with healthy options, the Northeast Town has been successful in accessing further funding in its quest. An additional \$24,000 will be used to lengthen the waterfront walking trail, making it a full circle route encompassing all of Little Current.

Council received notice that it had been granted \$24,500 through the federal government's 'Let's Take a Walk' program. The Northeast Town will use the funds to add an additional trail to the already established walking trail that begins at the Manitoulin Welcome Centre and follows the waterfront to and around Low Island Park

The municipality has received previous funding opportunities in its quest for senior-friendly exercise options for the establishment of the waterfront trail and the newly installed circuit workout equipment at Low Island.

The project description notes that the key activities of the project will be: the construction of a 12 kilometre age-friendly community trail with a width greater than six feet; minimal/gradual elevation changes; a compact surface and lighting to make it usable for all seniors; install benches and signage; develop a print map of the trail; and develop a walking program for seniors.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained that the trail will leave Low Island Park, joining the intersection of Robinson Street and Red Mill Road near Manitoulin Centennial Manor, will go south on Red Mill Road to the Boozeneck Road, cross Highway 540 and will utilize the snowmobile trail to the recreation centre, then head down Harbour View Road, to Shaftesbury Street where users can access Vankoughnet Street, eventually crossing Highway 6 and joining the waterfront trail at the Welcome Centre—making the trail come full circle.

A year-and-a-half ago, the Northeast Town contacted Manitoulin Island Cycling Advocates (MICA) president Maja Mielonen, asking for her assistance in coming up with a Little Current circle route. After an hour and a half with the Community Services Advisory Committee (CSAC), this new route was developed.

Councillor Bill Koehler suggested a different route—one

encompassing more scenery and using the municipality's road allowances, such as the one near Red Mill Road, which would expand the waterfront portion of trail.

Mr. Williamson said the route was not engraved in stone and that the route is the will of coun-


Mayor Al MacNevin suggested opening the route up to the public through a meeting.

"This is great for Little Current, but what about Sheguiandah?" asked Councillor Dawn Orr. Mr. Williamson responded that part of the Sheguiandah archaeo-

logical site development, funding does include maps which could be used for Sheguiandah's historic walking tour.

Ms. Mielonen said she applauds the municipality for seeing the recreational trail, which will also be bicycle friendly, through to this new stage

Council is set to have further discussion on the trail before the final configuration is announced.

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Wiikwemkoong explores theme of 'moving forward' at Justice Conference

by Robin Burridge LITTLE CURRENT—Wiik-wemkoong hosted the second annual Wiikwemkoong Justice Conference at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre with the theme 'moving forward.'

The two-day conference began with an opening smudge and prayer, folwelcoming by remarks from Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier.

Emcee Bea Shawanda introduced the conference keynote speaker, the Honourable George R. Strathy, Chief Justice of Ontario.

Justice Strathy said he has a strong interest in visiting indigenous northern communities and was honoured to be invited to speak at the conference.

"I have been asked to be the keynote speaker, but I would like to look at myself as more of a keynote listener," said Justice Strathy. "I am here to listen. I am especially looking forward to the grandmother (panel) session. My own grandmother played an important role in my life. Our justice system as a whole would be better if we listened to the advice of elders or grandparents.

Justice Strathy said he learned about the Seven Grandfather Teachings through the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) report. "I can't think of anything better to guide our justice system than the teachings," said Justice Strathy.

"The theme of this conference is 'moving forward' and with the release of the TRC report a year ago, we must move forward together," he added. "The commissioner said that the TRC report is only the ciliation.

Justice said that it is important that judges like himself learn about traditional justice systems and indigenous teachings.

"We need to realize that the values we were raised with are not exclusive or absolute," he continued. "As we move ahead with reconciliation, indigenous legal traditions will also benefit non-indigenous communities.'

'Indigenous communities have much to teach us,

and I am here to gather, to learn," said Justice Strathy.

Next up on the panel was an overview of the Wiikwemkoong Justice Program with Justice Coordinator Lora Mackie and elder Phyllis Williams.

Ms. Mackie spoke about the various elements that the Justice Program works on. She talked about 'diversion,' and how the sharing circles date back to the tra-ditional way that First Nations peoples resolved issues. "People listen to someone's story and work together to come up with a plan to help them," said Ms.

She said that they also do bail supervision, noting that many of the people they see don't need to be on bail.

As well, the Wiikwemkoong Justice Program works on Gladue reports, pre-sentencing reports that provide the court with a background of an aboriginal defendant.

"We also do a lot of public education, such as a recent role play we did at the high school which taught the students about the legal system allowed them to participate and ask ques-

to correct us, utilizing the Grandfather Teachings,' said Ms. Williams. "I have been taking part in the community justice circles because now that I am an elder I want to help correct the youth. We all need correction in our life—to know that someone cares about us and wants to be there for us when we are struggling.

Later in the morning there was a judges' panel, which included: Justice Patrick Boucher, regional senior justice, Ontario Court of Justice; and Justice Patricia C. Hennessy, Ontario Superior Court of

Justice.

After a networking lunch, there was a presentation about Akwesasne Court, followed by the Wiikwemkoong Justice Grandmothers³ Panel including Doreen Trudeau-Peltier, Dorothy Fox and Muriel Assinewai.

Day two included a traditional teaching on the eight point star with Harvey Bell Jr., a presentation on Wiik-

wemkoong Governance and Estates, a presentation from Bea Shawanda and Bradford 'Resilience' and a presentation on the Toronto Aborig-Youth Court and Toronto Gladue Court.

The conference concluded with a breakout session on 'moving forward in our work and areas.'

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

that consumers "be very suspicious of offers for 'easy' money at low-risk."


"Do your research before committing to a financial investment of any kind," continues the CBA, and "check if the company is registered with your securities regulator and remember that no individuals or firms are registered to sell binary options in Canada.'

Always check your bank account and credit statements for unauthorized charges and never give out personal information on the phone, through mail or over the Internet unless you have initiated the contact or know with whom you're dealing.

Check your credit report regularly to ensure your personal information hasn't been stolen and used to obtain fraudulent loans and if you suspect you might be a victim, report it immediately to your financial institution, the police and your securities regulator.

thing the Liberals had removed from their previous budget outing.

According to this latest plan, the deficit will gradually decline over the next five years, but will still ring in the till at \$18.8 billion in 2021-22. Placed against the measure of percentage of GDP, this number falls well within the "manageable" range for western economies.

As part of the spending plan, housing will see an already budgeted boost of \$7 billion over 11 years as part of the National Housing Strategy, child care will receive \$7 billion over 10 years for new spaces (also already budgeted for and to begin in 2018-19).

There will be \$3.4 billion in new money over five years for indigenous infrastructure, health and education. While this new funding has been welcomed, the slow pace of implementation of changes on the ground have left many First Nations leaders fum-

US President Donald Trump may be pushing hard for NATO members to up their contributions to the first line defence to the recommended two percent of GDP, but the \$8.4 billion increase this budget pushes forward to 2035 likely won't mollify the Don-

Caregivers will be getting a new benefit of up to 15 weeks, starting in 2018 and families will see an option to extend parental leave up to 18 months (albeit at a reduced rate). There will be a \$7 billion investment in infrastructure funding for child-care spaces. With provincial buy-in, the as many as 40,000 new subsidized child care spaces will be created and more child care workers will be trained. An unspecified portion of these funds is being set aside for First Nations on and off-reserve populations.

Innovation will get a kick of \$950 million over five years to support business-led "superclusters"—technology business hubs that are intended to attract anchor companies from around the world to locate operations in Canada. Startups will see some \$400 million over three years to act as a venture capital catalyst initiative.

Skills development is also a big winner in this budget, with a new agency to research and measure skills development slated to start in 2018-19. There will be \$50 million over two years for an initiative to teach coding to children and \$125 million will help launch a pan-Canadian artificial intelligence strategy.

But getting to work will cost a bit more for urban dwellers, as the 15 percent public transit tax credit will go the way of the dodo later this year.

This budget also aims toward the government's commitment to gender equality, with 60 measures in the budget self-identified as impacting men and women differently. Many of the measures are aimed at increasing female participation rate in the economy to a number more balanced to their numbers in the population. Currently female participation in the labour force is at 47 percent, while they make up 51 percent of the popu-

Algoma Manitoulin Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes wasn't totally negative on the budget. "Some things are

moving in a good direction," she said, pointing to items in infrastructure and child care the NDP has advocated for many years. But the slow rate of delivery, with many items pushed beyond the next election, was very troubling to her. While the extension of the caregiver provisions in EI were positive, she noted the reduced rate of 33 percent of earnings (down from 55 percent) would put the benefit out of the reach of many.

As to federal contributions to infrastructure, the MP noted that the federal share is dropping from 50 percent to 40 percent.

'We were hoping for a budget that would invest in the economy to lift people up," said Ms. Hughes. "This is not a budget that will do that. There is not a lot of job creation for a \$23 billion deficit.'

Northern Ontario Liberal MPs see things differently, of course. "I'm proud that our government is reversing the trend of over a decade of budget cuts to FedNor made by the previous Conservative government," said Nickel Belt MP Marc Serré. "This is good news for future economic development in Northern Ontario and a prime example of how we are stronger when we work together."

"I would like to thank all of the mayors, organizations and other stakeholders throughout Northern Ontario who met with and sent us letters highlighting FedNor as one of their top priorities for Budget 2017." remarked Mr. Serré. "Our caucus collected these priorities throughout the year, and over the past several months, we worked hard to meet with ministers, parliamentary secretaries and departmental staff to make sure that the priorities of Northern Ontario were heard and considered by decision-makers at the highest levels of government. The fact that Budget 2017 includes an increase to FedNor's funding demonstrates that the hard work of the Northern Ontario Liberal caucus is producing positive results for all of Northern Ontario.

Nearby Conservative MPs on the other hand see little good in this budget. "The Liberals have run up another deficit worth tens of millions of dollars in order to spend on infrastructure and rural Canada hasn't seen a dime of it," said Bruce-Grey-Owne Sound MP Larry Miller in a press release response to the budget. He went on to urge the Liberal government to "stop wasting money and start giving rural Canada our fair

On the green front, the David Suzuki Foundation said it "is encouraged to see the federal government following through on its commitments to invest in clean energy and transit in the 2017 budget," but adds the caveat 'the budget misses crucial protection for nature—the backbone for a healthy environment and thriving economy.

Not surprisingly, the educational sector was more upbeat. "Colleges and institutes are very pleased to see a new lederal budget locused on lifelong learning for all Canadians, signaling the government's commitment to skills, innovation and inclusive economic growth," notes a press release from Colleges and Institutes Canada.

"This budget addresses the very real needs of the learners and employers that colleges and institutes work with every day," said Canadian Colleges and Institutes president and CEO Denise Amyot. "Canadians count on colleges and institutes to make their communities more prosperous and provide the skills needed to adapt to the changing labour market. This budget's new funding and support will help our members provide lifelong learning to all Canadians.

Local First Nations leadership gave the budget a mixed review. "Sufficient, predictable and sustained funding is crucial for effective advocacy and participation in nation-to-nation relationships," said Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee. "The current system needs an overhaul from this perspective.'

Health was a key focus of the federal budget with \$282 million allocated over five years to address the immediate health priorities of First Nations and the mental health component goes a long way toward filling gaps that exist there.

"Mental health is beginning to be recognized as a key priority and I am pleased to see ground being broken in this direction," said Grand Chief Madahbee. "With \$118.2 million allocated to mental health programming and \$86 million to see NIHB (Noninsured Health Benefits (NIHB) Program) expanded to mental health care and traditional healers this represents a step in the right direction." The NIHB Program is a national program that provides coverage to registered First Nations and recognized Inuit for a specified range of medically necessary items and services that are not covered by other plans and

Grand Chief Madahbee added that some of the right investments have been committed to, but went on to point out that Anishinabek Nation communities are not seeing implementation on the ground. "The elimination of boil water advisories was placed front and center in the previous budget explicitly and with infrastructure improvement funds," said Grand Chief Madahbee. "With an ambitious timeline of 2021 set on this high priority issue, we anticipated swifter, more decisive action than what we have seen. The dramatic transformation that was intended to close these socio-economic gaps has not occurred.'

Budgets tend to be viewed through the lens of the observer, and the Liberal government's election campaign language certainly gave cause for many sectors to hope that "sunny ways" would heap largesse upon their very pressing causes, but with a deficit triple that envisioned on the election trail, the reality of governing was fated to run roughshod over many of those expectations. Whether the Liberals have found a balance between the progressive visions expressed in their campaign and that reality the electorate will accept remains to be seen.

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Northeast Town water rates to increase by four percent

LITTLE CURRENT—Residents of Little Current and Sheguiandah will see an increase to water rates of four percent on their next quarterly bill.

Northeast Town council passed a resolution at its March 21 meeting to raise the rates across the board. In Little Current, whose residents are charged for both water and sewer, this will mean an additional \$15.84 a year and in Sheguiandah, users will pay \$46.90 a year more for water only. Quarterly, this translates to \$103 for Little Current residents and \$305 for Sheguiandah residents.

Little Current residents will also see an additional charge for their sewer rates, bringing their yearly total increase for both water and sewer to just over \$60 a year.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained the reason behind the rise in rates are an increase in costs associated with operation (the Ontario Clean Water Agency, which oversees the operation of the two plants); hydro costs; and the fact that both the Little Current and Sheguiandah plants are in need of new infrastructure. The additional charge for sewer usage in Little Current is due to a much-needed lagoon expansion.

"We need to move forward with this project," the CAO advised council. "That means the money has to come from the users of the sewer system."

There is currently \$238,000 in the Little Current water treatment plant/sewer reserves, the CAO continued, not-

Beloved Manitoulin Chocolate Works to expand to Perth in eastern Ontario

PERTH—Kagawong's Manitoulin Chocolate Works will be opening its first off-Island location in historic Perth this spring.

"We have been looking for a second location, in eastern Ontario, for about five years now," explained chocolatier Heather McKeen who, along with her family, owns Manitoulin Chocolate Works in Kagawong. "I knew I would be moving to the Ottawa area, and wanted to find somewhere on the outskirts that had the same small town charm and feel of Kagawong."

Ms. McKeen said it was a long journey to find the right location which first started at Carlton Place. "We worked on that location for about a year, but because of municipal politics it fell through and we had to go back to the drawing board," she explained.

In the fall of October 2016, the McKeen family was contacted by John Stewart, the owner of Code's Mill on the Park, who told the family he had a space available and asked if they were interested.

"We were really busy on Manitoulin at the time with Thanksgiving and then I was away on my honeymoon, but while I was away my mom responded to John and set up a time for us to see the space."

When the McKeen family, including Heather's father Keith, mother Louise and sister Brenda, went to see the Perth building, it was love at first sight. "It was exactly what we were looking for," said Ms. McKeen. "It is across the park and had a sitting area inside and outside."

She explained the new space has two areas, which are currently being renovated with one area to be converted for production and the other for retail.

The location will also offer customers a look at the chocolate making process, as the space will feature a large viewing window where patrons will be able to see half of the kitchen.

Ms. McKeen said the community of Perth has been very welcoming and that she and her husband are currently looking for a home in the area.

"It (Perth) has been great," said Ms. McKeen. "Everyone has been really friendly and welcoming. There is a good business community and we have become part of the BIA and chamber of commerce."

Perth Chocolate Works will be carrying a similar product line as Manitoulin Chocolate Works to start. "That's what we know," Ms. McKeen said. "As we go, we will see what the needs of our customer base are."

Ms. McKeen has also been working with Algonquin College and is looking to hire four to five staff members.

Louise McKeen started Manitoulin Chocolate Works

Louise McKeen started Manitoulin Chocolate Works in 1998, an idea that came to her while organizing Christmas in the Park.

"It was a tiny store at first and we've since expanded two or three times," said Heather McKeen.

Ms. McKeen said there was never any pressure for her or her sister to get into the family business, but it was a passion for both of them. Ms. McKeen attended the University of Ottawa where she earned a degree in business management, but continued to take courses in chocolate making, providing her with a diverse knowledge base in both the business and creative side of running a specialty chocolate store.

"Chocolate is always changing—it's never the same," said Ms. McKeen of her love for the art. "It offers me a creative outlet—I'm always being accused of creating too many products (from her business partners/family), but coming up with new ideas is one of the things I love the most."

ing that the engineering alone will come in around \$200,000.

"We need to deal with this in a practical way," Mr. Williamson added.

Councillor Erskine asked about the life expectancy of the Little Current water treatment plant. Mr. Williamson responded by saying that within the next three to four years, the plant will be in need of a "substantial overhaul."

Councillor Dawn Orr asked the same question of the Sheguiandah water treatment plant. Mr. Williamson said it will also be looking at an overhaul within the same time frame, noting that the Sheguiandah plant, however, does use a different system than Little Current's plant and that the maintenance costs will be substantially less than Little Current's.

2017 capital projects for the plants will mean also mean an expense of \$43,775 for the Little Current plant and for Sheguiandah. \$62,800.

The resolution to raise the water and sewer rates to four percent was moved by Councillor Erskine and seconded by Councillor Marcel Gauthier. All were in favour with the exception of Councillor Melissa Peters, who said the numbers were too low.

"This should have been worked on a long time ago," she

township," she noted.

On the safety data sheet provided for Garlon RTU by its maker, Dow Chemical, it is noted that the compound is "highly toxic to aquatic organism on an acute basis." Despite this (and the accompanying map that shows many water sources near which the spraying could be conducted), the Northeast Town and Billings councils all approved its use in their

"I won't be supporting this, given how close it is to the water," Councillor Cook told her fellow members of council.

Northeast Town Councillor Bruce Wood countered her comment by likening Garlon RTU to shampoo, perfume or dish soap, noting that in his opinion, these items were just as dangerous to one's health.

"While suggestions by my fellow councillors that drinking soda pop and using dish soap are also not good for people, their use of these products is voluntary and the disposal of such does enter a treatment process," Councillor Erskine told The Expositor following the meeting. "Not so much with the spraying of questionable chemicals such as herbicides on

public property. I could not in good conscience vote in favour of allowing spraying."

Ms. Clark explained that when selectively applying herbicide, a technician ensures the herbicide does not enter the waterways by analyzing the terrain. The buffer zone varies depending on the soil condition, denseness of vegetation, slope, etc.

"We follow public notification guidelines set out by the Ministry of the Environment which includes newspaper notification and the use of signs in public areas and access points," she continued. "Hydro One

requires permission of the landowner to apply herbicide and will contact all affected landowners to ask permission."

In past debates over the spraying of Garlon, Assiginack and Tehkummah Townships completely opted out of the use of the product by Hydro One in their jurisdictions.

If rural citizens of the Northeast Town, Billings Township or M'Chigeeng First Nation do not want Garlon RTU sprayed adjacent to their properties, they should contact Hydro One at 1-888-664-9376.

...continued from page 1 for this year's project they explored a number of ideas before settling on the green wall concept. "It was (LUPES) vice president Shane Pennant who came up with the idea after I mentioned community gar-

dens," said Ms. Earle.

Utilizing their knowledge of science and engineering, the LUPES project team designed a project that would incorporate traditional plants and medicines in a sustainable nurturing project to incubate the plants during the colder months and brought that project to the youth centre to share with interested students.

As a means of introduction, each of the engineering students (who hail from different streams of their discipline) volunteered their favourite subjectsand surprisingly not all of those subjects were math and science (although quite a few were). Liam Klemm admitted to a love of home projects, Juac Aguer is fascinated with the building of prototypes. Shane Pennant's secret passion is comic books and science fiction while Patricia Winfield is engaged in "a lot of

seemed at first blush.

The third stage follows the identification of the problem and the collection of information. "You define the priorities in how you work," said Ms. Earle. "You have to work together with the people being affected by the problem. You can't fix it in spite of how it effects other people." In this phase, you determine what you can and can't do as you approach the problem.

The last two phases are execution and the closeout.

"Execution is what we are doing here today," said Ms. Earle. "We are building a green wall to house and nurture these plants."

When engineers complete a project, they sign off on it, appending their signatures to the final product. "When we are finished here today," she explained to the youth; "you will be signing off on the project along with us. That is one of the satisfying things, you sign off on what you have done. When we are finished here today, you will have completed your first engineering project."

With that, the youth and engineers rolled up their sleeves and dug into the project, literally, as they planted and transplanted

of the rationale behind where the plants would sit in the green wall. "Mint is very aggressive," explained Liam Klem, "so lots of people tend to plant it in pots." Tobacco, on the other hand, found itself somewhat isolated from the other plants as it tends to be toxic to its close neighbours.

The project was slated to be completed by noon, when the group broke for lunch, but the best laid plans of even engineers "gang aft agley" as the poet said. "The planting took a little longer than we planned," admitted Ms. Earle with a smile. Engineering lessons come with every execution phase. Undaunted, the team pushed on following lunch.

As lunchtime neared, a group of elders, many of them family members of Ms. Earle's came in to see how things were progressing. They were greeted with the sight of a small group of youth totally engrossed in the building of the green wall, so focussed on what they were doing they barely noticed the new arrivals.

Wasse Nabin Youth Centre director Lawrence Enosse was well pleased

artistic stuff."

"Even though we are all in engineering, you don't have to be perfect at everything to like engineering," said Ms. Earle. "I myself find math very challenging."

The key to the soul of most engineers, she shared, is a drive "to make life easier for people—creating things and making ideas a reality." The discipline helps its adherents to "do things in a different way, it doesn't have to necessarily be 'science'."

"That is the mindset of an engineer," she said. "Problem solving; if there is a problem in the world how do we fix it?"

Ms. Earle went on to outline the engineering process LUPES follows in approaching problem solving. "First, there is identification. What problem exists in the world (that) we can tackle? If something is not working, how can we make it better? We have to identify the problem."

Second is the initiation stage. "After you figure out what the problem is, you find out all you can about what the problem actually is," she said. By investigating the problem, you may find its root causes are different than they

the seeds and plants that would form the green wall. Engineering can be a dirty job, but judging by the focus of those engaged in this execution phase, it can be lots of fun too.

Strawberries, tobacco, sage, mint and rosemary were among the plants the youth planted in peat pods and as they worked, the engineers explained some

f course we all eventually learned to speak English after immigrating, some more than others. At home, our parents spoke to us in our Calabrese dialect, and eventually we learned a new language: italiese, a mix of Italian and 'Canadese', the Canadian language. Usually this consisted of adding a vowel, an o, a, or u to the end of an English word, or a u. So the word cake, which is "torta" in Italian, became "cake-a"; truck, which is camion in Italian, became troccu. Ginger ale became gingerella. You get the idea.

Now spelling food was a different matter. When Ma couldn't come grocery shopping for some reason, reading ma's grocery list always took some time. She spelled the words phonetically, so I eventually figured out that the word that she had written musci rumthat I first read as mushy rum—was really mushy room, which translated to mushroom. At first I couldn't understand why she'd want something mushy from the store. Then there was siroline. I'd pronounce it to myself in the way she would say it, seero-line, seero-line...then the lightbulb went on: sirloin!

Our mother could multitask before the word

She hecame popular. cooked, sewed, knit, and crocheted while the drama unfolded in Santa Barbara or Genoa City. Our mother learned these fine arts back in the old country. She could replicate a complicat-

ed sweater or dress pattern by looking at any picture. She never needed written instructions. With perfect stitching, she made dresses, pants, coats, and hats (with pompoms the size of meatballs. Big meatballs). While

watched Nikki and Victor get married for the seventh time, she managed to make stuffed

peppers, or bistecca alla pizzaiola, or a pot of tomato sauce and meatballs. Most of the time, the aroma as we got home from school made our mouth water and we'd run to the kitchen. On occasion, when she decided to make trippa (tripe) or baccalà (codfish), we wanted to run away.

Ma had this thing about salt. In 2007, after having two heart attacks, her cardiologist warned her to stay away from it. He didn't understand that telling that to an Italian was like saying: Never eat salami or pasta or tomato sauce. Ever...

Did ma salt her food? Of



course she did. She always claimed that she used hardly enough to taste. But I guess the amount she did put into her cooking made her what she was: salt of the earth.

Ma wanted the best for her family in Canada. For her children and grandchildren. And although it someto provide us with what she would have liked, she always provided. And she was happy to give her grandchildren what she couldn't give us at the time.

But Ma, you've given us more than enough. You've

taught us how to provide for our children, how to celebrate our Italian heritage, how to make a great tomato sauce.

You occasionally cursed Christopher Columbus for having discovered America—the 40 below winters might have been cause—but vours and Dad's sacrifice to leave Italy and immigrate to Canada was a gift to us. A gift of two cul-

tures. And two languages. We are all proud of our Italian heritage and we are certainly very proud of being Canadian. And for years, we noticed that you always placed the Canadian flag insert from the newspaper in your front window on Canada Day. We're all proud of you, Ma.

Tough enough to keep on going eight years after two major heart attacks.

And so, when I was deciding what to wear for today, I chose a black dress and a red shawl. Black to respect our Italian tradition, and red to symbolize love, of course. The love you had for your family and our love for you. Red to represent our Canadian flag, and the beautiful maple leaves in the fall. Red to represent the glorious tomato and the hundreds, maybe thousands of pots of tomato sauce you made over your lifetime. And red for the red peppers you fried and left on the counter for us a few hours before you joined Pina and Dad in heaven.

Thank you, Ma. They were delicious.



Municipal Sandfield dock bumpers get hammered by ice

SANDFIELD—Sandfield resident Brenda Edington was out for a walk past the "government" docks in Sandfield recently at the outlet of the Manitou River when she observed something out on the ice that set her blood boiling despite the chill of an early spring morning. The bumpers that line the dock to protect it from the ministrations of tethered boats each summer were still in the water and the now-mobile ice was wreaking havoc with them.

"Every fall, the municipality pulls out the bumpers that are attached to heavy stainless steel plates," said Ms. Edington, "usually by the second week of October."

This year that didn't hap-

"Now they are being damaged to the point of no return," said Ms. Edington. "The ice has grabbed them and is just tearing them apart. That's it."

Ms. Edington asserted that she had brought the matter to the attention of the municipality last year. "I questioned this last year, I talked to the public works manager, to Ms. (Ruth) Frawley (Central Mani-

toulin CAO). They were all 'yeah, yeah, we'll get to it'."

Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens noted that the municipality is aware of the issue and that he believed that the oversight occurred when the employee who normally handles removing the bumpers fell ill.

"This is not a cheap

proposition," noted Ms. Edington. "Who pays for this?" she asked. "The sign says its owned by Oceans and Fisheries Canada, but managed by the Township of Sandfield." She noted that the docks are actually owned by the Municipality of Central Manitoulin, having been divested by the fed-

eral government several years ago. "Nobody has ever bothered to change the sign," she said.

Ms. Edington compared the maintenance to the kind of work cottagers and resort lodge owners must complete each season to winterize their buildings. "You drain the water out of

your taps," she said. "You take the time to look after your property. I couldn't imagine if I managed my camp or lodge like that."

"I guess it kind of fell through the cracks," Mayor Stephens said, noting it was unfortunate. "But we will deal with it in the fullness of time."

...continued from page 1 they took my own stem cells. The blood removed from one arm. stem cells separated and the blood put back into my other arm. Then they cleansed the stem cells, froze them, and reintroduced them to my system to replace the white blood cells killed by the cancer. First, they had to reduce my immunity down to nothing, so the stem cells would not be destroyed. To achieve that, I was given a strong dose of chemotherapy and I had to spend three weeks in isolation so I couldn't pick up

any pathogens." "Unfortunately, this concoction chemical burned my esophagus and I had to live on pureed foods and Ensure for two months. I lost 54 pounds and went from size 16 to size 14. I weigh 146 pounds now," she weigh 140 pounds no., explained. This was a blessing. "The mixed blessing. weight loss was fine but the reason for it wasn't so good. I moved into this apartment beside the Manor a few years ago, when I realized I

too long ago, I passed out while taking a shower and woke up lying in the floor of my tub. Now, I get help with bathing and with cleaning my apartment. Next Monday I will have cataract surgery on my right eye.'

"I have never regretted being single. I maintain my independence and make all my own decisions. I play euchre Monday afternoon with Shirley Viney and Gail Leeson at the Sheguiandah Hall. Tuesdays, I play at AOK with Glenda Hodder. Wednesdays, I am playing at the Legion. I have also been to the Anishnaabe Spiritual Center a few times to enjoy story-sharing and circle dancing as part of a 'Seeds of Joy' Retreat.'

"My favourite time of the year is summer. I have always loved swimming in the park. Before I would return home, up the big hill, I would always dive deep into the colder water to cool down. These days, for a swim, I can visit my friend Patricia (Cian) Strickland at her Lake Kagawong cottage. It's

North Channel. I appreciate warmer water now.

"I have never drunk alcohol so I don't miss it. I started smoking at 14 and quit 30 years later using adverse therapy techniques of 'Success International.' That decision to quit came when I couldn't ride my bike uphill without losing my breath. I don't miss smoking either. What do I still want to do? I still would like to do more painting, if I get a chance.'

"I love Manitoulin. I wouldn't live anyplace else. I think Island folk might consider putting themselves into a tourist mindset and really see the beauty of this place with new eyes. Many of us don't seem to appreciate the magnificence of this place, the quiet, the delightful birds that can break the silence, the ever-changing landscape of boats, and the surrounding water."

"Friendly people make this place extra-special. People I have met over the

years through work, like Linda Risotto of TLC, Mary Buie and Pat Strickland in my cancer support group,

Rachel Charette and Ivan Wheale from painting classes. I am happy with my life. When I look out my window, I see the area I grew up in. I see the water, the boats and the wildlife. It's absolutely perfect for me."





Island for after the dance. The event was DJed Debassige, and as usual, he entertained the


students who were attending. Isaac Gosse was the dance photographer and sold printed pictures and momentos of the evening.

I enjoy baking (a good therapy) and I'm a firm believer in treating oneself. It is hard to say no to treats but there are smart ways to swap some goodness to the sweets. Of course the best way is to make it yourself which gives you, a better control, in adding the right ingredients. Adding seeds and nuts (chia seeds, sunflower seeds, almonds) brings extra power foods to the mixture. Swapping white sugar (nicknamed white death) with maple syrup, coconut sugar, or honey and then white flour with spelt, or buckwheat flour will help you make the most of your indulgence. Give it a try.

Orange and Chia Seed Cake

This cake is easy and quick to put together. Almond flour is pricey, so I did a little research and found you can use sunflower seeds instead. The only catch is, you will have to grind the sunflower seeds into a flour. A blender works the best.

- 1/4 cup chia seeds
- 1/2 cup milk or hemp, coconut, soy, or almond milk
- 125g unsalted butter, chopped
- 2 Tbsp finely grated orange rind 1 cup raw sugar or coconut sugar
- 2 cups almond meal (ground almonds)
- 1 cup Loon Song spelt flour
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder

ORANGE SYRUP

- 1/2 cup maple syrup
- 3 Tbsp orange zest 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1. Preheat oven to 325°F. Lightly grease a 9-inch spring-
- form pan, line with parchment paper on the bottom and
- 2. Place the chia seeds and milk in a bowl and set aside to soak for 10 minutes.
- 3. Place the butter, orange rind and sugar in a bowl and beat with an electric mixer until light and creamy. Add the eggs and beat until well combined. Add the chia mixture, almond meal, flour and baking powder and fold to com-
- 4. Spoon the mixture into the prepared pan and bake for 1 hour or until cooked when tested with a skewer.
- 5. To make the syrup place the maple syrup, orange rind and orange juice in a small saucepan over medium heat. Simmer for 10 minutes until the syrup has thickened.
- 6. Invert the cake onto a plate and while still hot, top
- with the syrup.
- 7. Serve with yogurt or whipped cream and maple
