A simple solution for government media rescue—advertise

It is a trope of the so-called information age that newspapers (and even all traditional media) are doomed. That all too common viewpoint is bolstered by a constant barrage of bad news stories about the closure and rationalizations of newspapers along with the commiserate image of legions of laid-off journalists infesting the nation's breadlines

First off, let's be clear, The Expositor isn't going anywhere soon. Sure we have our struggles in an increasingly digitized world, but our loyal subscribers and advertisers recognize something that a lot of our more urban neighbours seem to have missed. Community newspapers reach people. They reach people very well, and the secret to that isn't so very secret to anyone who picks up a copy of our publications. We are decidedly hyper-local and a trusted source of information about local news and events. That trust and local focus is reflected in most of Ontario's 379-odd local publications with a reach that extends to a circulation of over 8.3 million Ontarians. On a national level that reach extends through over 1,032 titles to reach 18,802,329 individuals. Those are individuals who actually seek out the information that is important to them—in fact many of them pay for it through subscriptions or by picking up individual copies of a paper at the newsstand. In fact, Canadians overwhelmingly (75 percent) say that newspapers are the most appropriate source for mediacoverage of government information.

When it comes to sources of local community information, community newspapers rock. Community newspapers are the key source for local information for 62 percent of the population—if you include all newspapers that figure jumps to 75 percent. Three quarter of Canadians rely on newspapers (community or daily) for their local community information that includes information on local government and advertising of local businesses and classified, employment and real estate.

So community newspapers reach people. Not only do we reach people, but in an important consideration for advertisers we reach people with money to spend looking for a place and things to spend it on. The

numbers are there, but for some unfathomable reason, government seems blind to the numbers they so often tout as the foundation of policy.

The 2018 budget has earmarked \$50 million for non-profit sources of local news in underserviced areas and are looking into ways to make newspapers non-profit and/or charitable organizations. Thank you very much, federal government, but we don't need a hand out, or a bailout. We don't need to be a charity case. If the government, or business for that matter, wants to support local news we have a simple solution—advertise.

It is clear that we reach Canadians, especially rural Canadians. You know, those people that you are constantly fretting about getting your message to. To borrow a phrase, newsflash, we reach those people and we do it well. If the federal government were to spend its advertising dollars with local news organizations rather than California-based digital platforms where it is mixed and mingled, buried even, within an avalanche of actual fake news and conspiracy theories that would make even a supermarket tabloid blush, it would go a long way toward their purported goal of supporting local media.

Instead they are part of the problem. A good part of the crisis hitting the community newspaper industry is the downward trend in government advertising. In 2013-2014 the federal government spent \$75,213,380 on advertising, but by 2015-2016 advertising in community newspapers has fallen to just \$867,153. That is, on average, an annual federal government spending of just \$1,021 in each of Canada's 849 local community newspapers.

If the federal and provincial governments want to help support the community and local news media in this country, and at the same time help protect one of the key pillars of our democracy, they don't need to resort to charity, handouts or bailouts. Governments can help support local media by helping themselves; by advertising in community newspapers they will reach their client base, the taxpayer.

It's really that simple.

International Women's Day highlights gender discrimination

A call for Anishinaabe-kwe to resist being forced from their homes

To the Expositor:

March 8 is International Women's Day. The United Nations' theme for 2018 is 'Time is Now: Rural and urban activists transforming women's lives.' The UN will bring attention to the rights and activism of rural women, who form a majority of the 43 percent of women in the agricultural labour force worldwide. Rural women also make up over a quarter of the world population, 1.9 billion in a world population of 7.6 billion people. There are 370 million indigenous people around the world.

Closer to home, Statistics Canada states that aboriginal females make up four percent of the total female population in Canada. In 2011, there were 718,500 aboriginal women and girls in Canada, of whom 61 percent were First Nations. By 2011, 36 percent or 158,240 First Nations women and girls were living on reserves. The aboriginal female population grew by 20 percent between 2006 and 2011, and could increase to between 987,000 and 1,316,000 by 2036.

The aboriginal female population is younger than the non-aboriginal female population, due to higher fertility rates and shorter life expectancies. In 2011, the median age of aboriginal females was 29.1 years, compared to 26.1 years for aboriginal men, and a median age of 41.5 years for non-aboriginal women.

Aboriginal women in Canada are at a higher risk of experiencing violence than non-aboriginal women, according to a 2014 RCMP report. In 2011, aboriginal women made up approximately 11.3 percent of the total number of missing women, while they represent only four percent of all women in Canada. Between 1980 and 2012, aboriginal women were over-represented in the number of female homicides, with 16 percent of all female homicides perpetrated against aboriginal women. A 2014 General Social Survey indicated that violent victimization rates were higher among aboriginal females. Aboriginal females experienced sexual assaults at a rate of 115 incidents per 1,000 population, much higher than the rate of 35 per 1,000 for non-aboriginal females. Aboriginal identity remained a significant factor for victimization among women even when controlling for other risk factors.

The United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women became effective in 1981. As of 2017, 188

states were parties to the Convention, including Canada, giving it the status of customary international law. General Recommendation No. 19 sets out clearly that all forms of violence against women are prohibited.

General Recommendation 19, speaks of "traditional attitudes by which women are regarded as subordinate to men or as having stereotyped roles perpetuate widespread practices involving violence or coercion, such as family violence and abuse. The effect of such violence on the physical and mental integrity of women is to deprive them the equal enjoyment, exercise and knowledge of human rights and fundamental freedoms."

The Convention on Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) recommends that states should adopt "appropriate and effective measures to overcome all forms of gender-based violence whether by private or public act." The object and purpose of the Convention contains this statement: "The position of women will not be improved as long as the underlying causes of discrimination against women, and of their inequality, are not effectively addressed." The obligations of states are also clearly described: "States parties have an obligation not to cause discrimination against women through acts or omission; they are further obliged to react actively against discrimination against women, regardless of whether such acts or omissions are perpetrated by the state or by private actors."

I have been discriminated against regarding my human right to home and land and have made a formal complaint to the United Nations, invoking the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW). Article 14 2. (g) provides for... "equal treatment in land and agrarian reform as well as in land resettlement schemes."

Anishinaabe-kwek, if you are being, or have been, forced from your home and homeland, resist. Find other Anishinaabe-kwek, form alliances and organize to retain your human rights to secure indigenous land tenure on indigenous homelands. Na haaw, mii sa iw.



Jacqui Gordon was a memorable teacher and colourful community supporter

A ffectionately nicknamed "the Flying Tiger" by her late brother Craege, Jacqueline Anne Gordon, known for her whirlwind energy, a love of bright colours, her maple fudge, her unusual driving skills and the ever-present dangling earrings, passed away peacefully on February 21 in her 87th year.

The first of six children born to Malcolm and Helen McQuarrie in Gore Bay in 1931, Ms. Gordon was shaped by world events: the Great Depression, World War II and decades of fast paced change. She firmly believed that she had lived through the peak of the modern era, and while

grateful for the experience she did have some concerns for her grandchildren and great-grandchildren in the future.

At the time of her passing there were 11 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren, born to five children she shared with her husband of 62 years, Stanley William Gordon, who predeceased her in 2015. She met Stan at Aird Island United Church Camp in 1952. "I didn't like him at all," she said once of their initial meeting. "The first thing I remember about him is that he yanked on my pigtails."

Her own wicked sense of humour proved a good match for Mr. Gordon. Ms. Gordon was a practical joker and loved to tease. Daughter Janyn Towns relates that "once she cut a hole in the bottom of a box of chocolates and ate them out of that hole while the rest of the box was still fully wrapped in order to deter and fool Stan."

Sister Molly McQuarrie explains, "She loved to tease. Taking yourself too seriously was impossible. Yet at the same time, she was compassionate and worked hard at giving us a second, third, umpteenth chance to right things, to reach our better selves."

"Mom was our rock, and to think in terms of geology, she was metamorphic for sure, changing her shape in response to our current needs and becoming the stronger for all of it. She most certainly did not grow any moss – she moved way too quickly for that!" son Todd Gordon says. "She just truly wanted us to succeed, in the way that made sense to each of us. And to strive to be good – not perfect – human beings. To be learners. To have compassion. To be real."

Ms. Gordon's passion was art, and even more so, teaching art. She began her teaching career in a one room rural school, and ended it 30 years later at Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS). She taught in five rural elementary oneroom schools between 1957 and 1969 and was art teacher at MSS from 1969 (when the school opened) until her retirement in 1987. She taught in Long Bay, at Pleasant Valley, on Barrie Island as well as in Brittainville. In autumn 1966 she became principal at Billings and stayed for three years before moving to the new high school.

Sister Molly remembers back to Grade 3 and going to a school where Ms. Gordon was teaching, and listening to Jacqui tell the story of The Little Match Girl by Hans Christian Anderson. "She had us do a watercolour afterward. It was my first time ever to paint – and my last, too, I think. I concentrated so hard on the painting and expressing the effect of the story on me. Then I picked it up to hold it at arms length and it ran. I was devastated and hugely embarrassed. Jacqui just laughed and said, "Just paint over the runny streaks!" So many things were fixable in her eves

"She was anything if not adaptable, and she learned those skills in the resource and support scarcity of the one room school under a very small, single municipality school board," says son Todd. "She saw herself as a better art teacher than practitioner. She was good at teaching the fundamentals of art and art history but more importantly she was an enabler of creativity and self-expression. She was broadly popular among students and a general positive overall influence within the school."

One time Ms. Gordon went along as a chaperone on one of the MSS canoe trips. Trip leaders Pat McGill and John Strickland were skeptical about the capabilities of this small, asthmatic woman. It didn't take them long to be impressed by her tenacity, ever-positive attitude, and her ability to handle students. That commitment and drive for teaching and learning stayed strong to the end, long after retirement. She continued to teach grandchildren, retirees at Elder Hostel events and tourists on tour buses. She was always eagerly passing on interesting info gleaned from pages of the thousands of novels, magazines, or television shows that she loved.

Cousin Blair Graham remembers having Ms. Gordon as a teacher. "She wasn't your usual book learning type," he said. What stands out in his memory is a field trip to measure the height and the width of Bridal Veil Falls. "There we were," he said, "standing at the brow of the falls with the tape measure dangling over to the not-so-foolhardy ones below." As a teacher, she was certainly memorable.

Ms. Gordon never stopped teaching. "Christie, Jacqui and I travelled together every fall for the last five years," says Molly. "On Mackinac Island she walked farther than we thought she could in spite of asthma, rain, cold and wind. We thoroughly enjoyed the buildings and the history of the island. She related it all to the Manitoulin history she told on the bus trips around Manitoulin and the classes she taught at school. Her connections made the Mackinac history so much more real."

She never stopped learning, either. It was important for her to keep up to date. She took courses, learned new things, all the time. "She did not think like an 86-year-old lady," says daughter Janyn. "We often said, you are moving like you are still 45-years-old but your body is older...slow down and pay attention, because she would be turning in her mind ahead of her body which often resulted in accidents, stumbles or car accidents."

Another passion was community: her community of Billings, of Manitoulin, and of Canada. Ms. Gordon was active in her church (St. Paul's United), sang in the choir, took on the role of lay minister and held many executive positions within the church. She led Explorers, Girl Guides, and Canadian Girls in Training. She spent 28 years working with developmentally challenged children at Community Living Manitoulin (initially the Flower of

Hope School in Gore Bay and then Hope Farm in Mindemoya), serving as board chair for some of that time. "I was at the helm when the Hope Farm was established as a permanent home for these kids," she told The Expositor previously. "The Hope Farm gave them a place to go when they graduated from the education system. John Lane, MPP, helped find the letter we had sent to make this happen and he made sure it got to the person who had to sign it. Mindemoya was so helpful in taking on this project when other communities were not so enthusiastic in taking it on."

In June 2017 she was recognized as Billings Township's Senior of the Year. Jacqui brought a number of useful skills, methods and experience to her community work, including creativity, drive, a sense of common purpose, a strong sense of advocacy, and her open mindedness.

"I think of her heart for her community," says Janyn. "She often rallied, argued, stormed and formed for causes in her community. Her love of Manitoulin and the character of this place was large."

Cousin Nancy Vaillancourt agrees. Though Ms. Vaillancourt left Kagawong more than 45 years ago, she still feels the strong sense of community when she visits. She attributes the feeling to her mother, Jessie Graham, and Ms. Gordon. "Whether it was picking up litter on Earth Day or helping prepare and serve dinner for a fundraising event, usually right in the middle of it all was Aunt Jacqui, my Mom and all their friends."

"Recipients of their efforts included the two community churches, special events and the Old Mill Heritage Museum," she continued. "For one project in particular, Aunt Jacqui organized the Gordon/McDougall descendant females to donate their wedding dresses for an exhibit at the museum that displayed for two summer seasons."

Ms. Vaillancourt also remembers Jacqui and Stan Gordon for acting as family historians. "The thing I will be forever grateful to Aunt Jacqui and Uncle Stan for was their love of family history," she said. "After the passing of my grandparents, they had become the keepers of the Gordon and McDougall family photos and special pieces. Before I arrived, Aunt Jacqui would have things all laid out on the dining room table, in piles by family branch. As we sorted through them, she and Uncle Stan would tell stories - yes, maybe a few of Uncle Stan's stories were a bit taller than the others."

With the exception of a few years spent at normal school (an early version of teachers college), the Ontario College of Art, and a teaching stint in St. Catharines, Ms. Gordon spent her entire life on Manitoulin. She realized that Manitoulin really was the best place to live, although it took her a while to come to that conclusion, she said. She travelled extensively but wouldn't think of moving away from this place where so many of her ancestors had chosen to live. That there was both history and future here had made the Island particularly special for her.

How do you sum up a life well lived? Ms. Gordon has certainly left her imprint on the lives of countless persons, groups and organizations that experienced the force of nature that was Jacqui Gordon. Throughout her lifetime, Ms. Gordon touched many other lives as an educator, artist, mentor, friend, mother and grandmother. She maintained a zest for life and never missed an opportunity to have fun or make someone laugh.

By all accounts, she was very accepting of almost everyone and was genuinely interested in who people were, where they came from and what their life was about. She always made newcomers feel they were a welcome part of the village. She donated to local charities and quietly supported individuals in the community who needed help, trying to carefully ensure they were not embarrassed by her support.

Manitoulin Island has indeed lost a rare gem.

Gender equality tops priorities in Liberal 2018 budget

OTTAWA—If there is one overarching theme to the 2018 federal budget introduced last week by Finance Minister Bill Morneau, it is gender equality (gender is mentioned a whopping 348 times in this year's budget), but this budget, which provides significant new spending initiatives for Indigenous peoples, families and workers also steps back from balancing the budget, leaving a projected \$17.8 billion deficit on the ledger.

'We've put gender equality at the centre of government decision-making because it will ensure we boost economic growth for all Canadians," said Minister Morneau during an online discussion of the budget on Monday.

Even though the government says that their budget is aimed at improving gender equality, the measures in the budget leave many questions about how this goal could be achieved with what is indicated in the budget," countered Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes. "Basically, the 2018 budget is not a budget that reads as it is written and it is very short on the details."

Ms. Hughes went on to say that although the government "refers to women between 600 to 700 times in the budget, it isn't investing one dollar in pay equity in the public service, but rather says that it will eventually put in place legislation to force employers, subject to federal regulation, to respect the principle of pay equity.

Ms. Hughes does say that the five-week leave for the second parent announced in the budget "is good news," adding that "the Quebec experience has shown that this measure is effective and it is something that the NDP had been pushing for. However, there seems to be a missed opportunity to expand access to parental leave benefits given that too many parents are not eligible. Many people in precarious jobs will not be able to benefit from the measures in the budget because they will be unable to meet the required threshold—at least one third of women still cannot access Employment Insurance (EI)

The government is proposing \$1.2\$ billion over five years to create a new five-week "use-it-or-lose-it" incentive for new fathers to take parental leave. The Employment Insurance Parental Sharing Benefit would increase EI parental leave to a maximum of 40 weeks in cases where the second parent agrees to take at least five weeks off. The benefit covers 55 percent of the second parent's income for as much as 12 months. In cases where families have opted for the extended parental leave of 18 months, the second parent would be able to take as much as eight weeks of additional parental leave, paid out at 33 per cent of their income. The benefit would also be offered to adoptive and same-sex couples and will be made available starting in June 2019.

Also on the EI front, the budget proposes \$90 million over three years to ensure that claimants "continue to receive timely and accurate benefit payments," plus another \$127.7 million over the same period to improve EI call centre accessibility.

The government is also looking to increase the takehome pay of low-income workers through a revamped tax credit through something called the Canada Workers Benefit, to take effect in 2019. It is presented by the government as a "more generous" and "more accessible" version of the Working Income Tax Benefit. Under the proposal, maximum benefits are to increase, as well at the same time as the income level at which the benefit is phased out is to rise. Under this proposal, for example, a single parent or couple earning \$25,000 a year could receive as much as \$717 more from the program in 2019 than in 2018.

Funding for Indigenous issues was also a big winner in this budget. The government is proposing to invest \$447 million over five years to create a new Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Program. The program will replace the Aboriginal Skills and Employment Training Strategy and aims to help close the employment and pay gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people by focusing on training for higher quality and better-paying jobs.

The budget also proposes more than \$1.4 billion over six years for First Nations child and family services to



Drug possession charge laid at RIDE check

On Sunday, February 25 at approximately 5:54 pm, officers from the Manitoulin-Espanola Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were conducting Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) checks on Highway 6 in the Town of Little Current.

Officers checked a vehicle and determined that there were suspected controlled drugs inside. Police seized a quantity of suspected marijuana.

As a result of the investigation, a 34-year-old male of Zhiibaahaasing First Nation has been charged with: possession of marijuana, under 30 grams, contrary to section 4(1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

The accused is scheduled to appear at the Provincial

Court of Justice in Gore Bay on May 8.

agencies and increase prevention resources in First Nations communities so families can stay together. Indigenous children under the age of 14 comprise 7.7 percent of all children in Canada but they represent more than half of all children currently in foster care.

The government also announced it will explore ways for news outlets to benefit from non-profit status and announced it would be providing \$50 million over five years to one or more non-governmental organizations supporting local journalism in underserved communities—but stopped short of defining the terms and the funding is far less than what some groups had wanted.

than 800 outlets across the country, has called for a journalism fund with \$350 million of annual funding.

In this matter that is near and dear to the heart of newspapers, Ms. Hughes had little good to say about the announced funding slated to shore up local news. "The 50 million dollars for local media is a step in the right direction, but it is not nearly enough to make a real difference," she said. "Ten million dollars per year for the whole country is unlikely to reverse current trends in the industry that employs thousands of Canadians. The government could have helped print media with the solution put forward by the Fédération Nationale des Communications, namely a 30 percent tax credit on salaries for Canadian businesses dedicated to written press.

The 2018 budget is notable for a significant amount of policy pilfering from the NDP, particularly on the issue of pharmacare, something that was anticipated to be a significant plank in the 2019 NDP election platform. But aside from absconding with the headlines, Ms. Hughes is sceptical about the Liberal approach.

Eric Hoskins, who recently resigned his position as Ontario's health minister, will chair an advisory council to perform an economic assessment and perform consultations on the feasibility of a national pharmacare program. National pharmacare could represent significant savings for both patients and the government. The 2016 Parliamentary Budget Office analysis estimated that of the \$28.5 billion spent on prescription drugs in 2015, \$24.6 billion would be eligible for coverage under the national pharmacare program and that a truly national prescription drug program could cost as much as \$20.2 billion.

Forty-four First Nations will be represented with teams while 88 communities, and counting, will have players as part of the Little NHL.


"I see that number continuing to climb," Mr. Biederman said. "I don't think anyone ever foresaw what this event has become.

...Judge denies Bearwalker plea before sentencing

UCCM Police assisted in the search of a male subject who fled from the scene.

Levi Mishibinijima, the perpetrator, was found, arrested and charged with attempted murder; assault with a weapon; aggravated assault; uttering threats to cause death and possession of weapons for dangerous purpose.

The victim was transported to Health Sciences North and treated for blood loss and a two-inch stab wound to his

According to court transcripts obtained by Sudbury.com, Mr. Mishibinijma claimed that he heard the voice of his dead father telling him that the victim had murdered him and that he should stab him in revenge.

Witnesses testified that they saw the accused run up behind the victim and stab him and say, "I know you killed

The accused told police that he was "getting a weird vibe" that was telling him to kill.

"I just thought it was like bear witch or bearwalker, bad vibes," he told police. "It was like kinda' taking control of

Mr. Mishibinijma pleaded not guilty due to a mental disorder. The defence called a mental health physician to the stand who said she had examined the suspect after he had been admitted to Waypoint (a mental health facility in Penetanguishene) and testified that the suspect had displayed erratic behaviour that led her to conclude that he was suffering from psychosis, likely schizophrenia.

He "winked and made kissing gestures towards female staff," she testified. "He was also seen laughing to himself, and making facial grimaces and grunting noises for no apparent reason. He was also seen licking his window.'

'The statements demonstrate paranoia toward the victim," she testified. "He was influenced by hearing voices, seeing his father's spirit, and believed his father was speaking to him at the time, telling him what to do. Thought insertions are features of psychotic illness that point to a disturbed state of mind.

However, she also concluded that, in his state of mind, he still knew that stabbing someone was wrong.

"When asked whether this mental disorder would have rendered him incapable of appreciating the nature and quality of the act, she replied 'no'," the court transcript says. "She said, 'I think he knew what he was doing ... I think he knew he was stabbing a human being ... but he was acting under the influence of his mental disorder'.

"He was not able to access rational choice... He was not able to consider the wrongfulness of his actions."

She also testified that she was unable to get information from his family and friends about whether there was a history of mental health issues, nor was she able to access any of his prior medical history.

In her ruling, Justice Vanessa Christie said the Criminal Code describes the test for mental competency this way: "No person who committed an offence while suffering from a mental disorder that rendered the person incapable of appreciating the nature and quality of the act or omission or of knowing that it was wrong may be convicted. The test is a legal test, not a medical test.'

That's a crucial element of this case, Justice Christie said, because for the mental disorder defence to succeed, the suspect in the case must not be aware that what they are doing is wrong, or be able to appreciate the effect of

"The crux of the inquiry is whether the accused lacks the capacity to rationally decide whether the act is right or wrong, and hence to make a rational choice about whether to do it or not," Justice Christie added.

In this case, there is evidence the suspect knew his actions were wrong, even if he believed he was receiving instructions from his dead father, the Sudbury.com report

While not questioning the conclusions of the physician, who examined the suspect after the stabbing, Justice Christie did question why the physician was not given access to his records, including information from previous arrests, nor was she given access by the defence to the video of the interview of the suspect by police, all of which would have given her more information for her mental health evaluation.

More important, the justice explains, for the mentalhealth disorder defence to succeed, it has to be demonstrated that the individual is operating under delusions to an extent that they don't know what they are doing is

In this case, the suspect voiced his belief that he was trying to kill the victim as revenge for the murder of his father. There was no evidence he was operating under the assumption that murder was not wrong, or that stabbing was not wrong. Instead, the evidence showed he believed that he was justified in his action because he was taking revenge.

"The point is that if the person has a mental makeup which is such that he lacks even the capacity for rationality, then responsibility is (reduced)," the judge said. "If he has the capacity but simply fails to use it, responsibility is not precluded.

In other words, even if he stabbed the victim as a result of hearing voices, it only helps Mr. Mishibinijima's defence if he was in a state where he no longer knew right

In this case, the suspect fled the scene of the crime, an indication he knew he had done something wrong. And when arrested, he openly talked about the attack as being revenge for his father's death. That meant the suspect was aware of what he had done, and the reasons for it, and that it was not legal

Under Canadian law, the defence has to show that the accused, because of mental disorder, did not know what they were doing was wrong.

"I am not convinced, on a balance of probabilities, that any disordered condition of his mind deprived him of the ability to know right from wrong," Justice Christie said. 'Responsibility is not excused in these circumstances.'

On Tuesday, February 13, the judge found Mr. Mishibinijima guilty of aggravated assault and dissolved of all other previous changes. On Tuesday, March 20, he will return to court to set a date for sentencing.

In 1997, Sheguiandah First Nation resident Leon Jacko also used the bearwalker defence to fight his manslaughter charge in the 1995 death of Ron Thompson, winning the case in a trial that became known as the "Bearwalker Trial" and which received national attention.

After a day of hard drinking, Mr. Jacko and Mr. Thompson, friends, were dropped off at a home on Indian Mountain Road. Later that evening, a nearby neighbour reported hearing sounds not unlike a bear, almost like animals fighting.

That same evening Mr. Thompson was found, face down, 'in a blood-spattered clearing" outside a truck camper behind the house where Mr. Jacko was living, the May 28, 1997 edition of The Manitoulin Expositor reported. Mr. Thompson had been bludgeoned to death with a walrus penis bone, an artifact brought back from Baffin Island by a family member. Mr. Jacko claimed that he had acted in self defence, seeing Mr. Thompson as a bearwalker.

Mr. Jacko was acquitted of Mr. Thompson's death in June of 1997 by the late Judge Richard Trainor.

It was noted by the Crown at the time, John Luczak, that the bearwalker case "applies what the law has already been doing. The tendency now is to look more at the subjective component." He added that the evidence produced by the accused about the nature of Native spirituality and the traditional belief in the bearwalker figure "helped convince the judge that the accused had a reasonable

...continued from page 3 later, he is now moving on to head up another tourismfocussed enterprise.

"But it was Waubetek that helped me get involved with the GSCT," he said. "I was fresh out of school and I was asked if I would be willing to help out on a volunteer basis." Soon he was working with the likes of Waubetek general manager Madahbee Matthew Owl to establish the GSCT on the global tourism stage.

Central to the success of the GSCT has been its focus on cultural authenticity and its deep roots in respecting, rather than exploiting, Indigenous culture.

"Back in the day we found there were a lot of non-Indigenous tour operators coming into our territories bringing tourists, but providing guides with questionable knowledge of our culture and traditions," he said. There was a healthy demand for the experience of Indigenous culture, particularly in Central Europe with its long-held fascination rooted in the fictional adventures of Old Shatterhand and his friend Winnetou, written in the pre-WWI years by German Karl May. Mr. May, as it happens, had never met an Indigenous person from North America, so there were plenty of myths and misconceptions ingrained in German popular culture. To understand the depth of those myths, consider that Mr. May's works are analogous to the Knights of the Round Table or Robin Hood to the British.

"It was a pretty exciting time for a young guy, basically fresh out of school," recalled Mr. Eshkawkogan. He found himself heading to travel conferences and conventions across Europe, and meeting with politicians and business leaders both at home and abroad.

Between 2003 and 2006 he found himself in roles with ever-increasing responsibilities with the GSCT, until finally taking on the role of full time manager.

Mr. Eshkawkogan equates the story of the GSCT with the rise of cultural tourism in the modern era. "The story of the Circle Trail is a case study for cultural tourism," he said. "It started out around 1997-1998 in response to a lot of non-Indigenous groups giving tours and offering incorrect information. We said to ourselves, 'we should be telling our own stories'," he recalled. The solution was clear. "To

do that we needed to become involved in the industry."

The approach of the Indigenous players was completely different. "It has always been a part of the GSCT to have cultural authenticity," he said. "We developed cultural integrity guidelines, and those guidelines have reviewed virtually every year since 1997."

The foundations of those guidelines were built through extensive consultation with elders and knowledge keepers in the communities. It was a case of not selling out the culture. "It all boils down to the way you do things," he said. The guidelines set the standard for cultural tourism that maintains an essential integrity. If something would exploit the culture in an inappropriate way, there was a simple solution. "You simply don't do it," said Mr. Eshkawkogan. "We follow the rules."

The GSCT's approach has set the standard for Indigenous tourism globally and he has found himself providing guidance to Indigenous groups around the world, from South America, to New Zealand and Australia and Asia.

The success of the GSCT subsequent the demands it has placed on his life provided some real challenges as he grew older,

"It was a great way to see the world," he said. "I would recommend it to any young person. I had an incredible experience for 20 years of my life, and I am grateful for that. But I am in my 40s now and I have a young family. My first priority is to be a good parent. If I am a good father, I measure that as success now."

In fact, Mr. Eshkawkogan traces a large part of his success during his years at the GSCT down to family. "I have family roots in communities all across the Island and the North Shore," he said. "I could go into any community and find someone with whom I have family connections. I was able to get them involved." His role was not that of an outsider to the community.

The role of the GSCT evolved quite quickly as it got rolling, sometimes in ways that unsettled its founders. "As we travelled around the world and explored our own communities to market product, we often found ourselves having to develop the product in order to have it to market," he said. "We found markets and needs, but we needed the product to meet those needs.'

With his backgrounds in marketing and political science, Mr. Eshkawkogan discovered that he had the talents knowledge to help make things happen.

The Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre was one of those products that filled a gaping niche in the product mix. "It has been quite a learning experience," he said of the hotel project. "But we learn with every mistake and we are building the expertise for

The GSCT quickly discovered that there were labour shortages in the market as well. Shortages of bodies and shortages of skills. "So we established guide training programs,' he said. But one of the great things that has come about with the growth of other sectors in the Indigenous economy is that new partners have arisen that can take over those roles. "We have institutions like Kenjgewin Teg (Educational Institute) that can take on that role and do it very well," he said.

Mr. Eshkawkogan said that he is confident in the future of the GSCT going forward. "The tour company has a substantial amount of business to handle now," he said. "The GSCT are leaders in the Indigenous tourism sector for our region. I think we have exceeded the original vision and that provides a perfect exit point for me. A new manager will bring with them new vision and put it into reality. There is a great staff there who will help them put that vision into reality. But it needs to be a new vision, it can't be Kevin Eshkawkogan's vision."

The danger, he notes, is that someone can take on a leadership role and lose track of the community's needs and perspective-it can become too much about them. "I have never been one to seek out the spotlight," he said. "I may have found myself in it now and then, but I have always preferred to work in the background and out of the limelight."

There is still plenty of work to do going forward, however, including capacibuilding, but Mr. Eshkawkogan said he is comfortable that the communities will pull together to make that happen.

"Sometimes you have to have patience, it takes a while, you have to invest a whole lot of time," he said. "Waubetek did that with the GSCT, are still doing it, but it is paying off." Mr. Eshkawkogan also operates KSK Business Solutions, opened Spirit Island Adventures in 2012, with his partner Melissa. He is an avid hunter, fisherman and a grass dancer on the powwow circuit who enjoys participating in traditional powwows throughout Manitoulin Island. He is one of a new generation of empowered Indigenous movers and shakers that believes fervently in the power of economic development to build a better world for First Nation communities. Today it is tourism, but in the future, who knows? One thing is for certain, despite his eschewing of the limelight, Mr. Eshkawkogan will likelv be somewhere near the front of the action.

"We talked to the different groups in Billings, asking them what that dream project could be," Ms. Edwards noted. And. from that conversation, the idea for the Billings Connections Trail was born.

"It was a really big project for us organizationally," she added. Ms. Edwards reflected on the slight roadbump encountered when dealing with the Anishinaabe translation of the plaques and what it took to overcome it and the hurdles First Nations people, groups and organizations must face to move significant changes forward. "It's pretty sobering," she said.

"It's not a reconciliation project," she

said about the Billings Connections Trail, "it's more about the truth." The history of the community is found in the plaques while the sculptures invite you to reflect on

"It's an award acknowledging the preservation of cultural landscapes and cultural heritage," Ms. Edwards said.

Ontario Heritage Trust sent a representative, unbeknownst to 4e, to the Elemental Festival where the trail and its installations were unveiled. They returned to Toronto mightily impressed and approached Ms. Edwards to apply for the award.

"There's no other project like this in the region, even the province," she added.

Newest Henley boat braves ice in shakedown launch

were launching at Boyle Marine on a Saturday morning in February, there isn't all that much mystery. "It's pretty much the only open water readily available at this time of year," said Mr. Ham when queried. "We need to get it tested and out to the customer so that they can put it to work."

The sturdy vessel weighs in at somewhere in the range of about 9,000 pounds and hurtles through the water propelled by 600hp of raw power supplied by twin 300hp Yamaha outboards. "We figured it out through hydrology (the

scientific study the movement, distribution and quality of water) calculations that she should be capable of making around 58 miles per hour," said Mr. Ham. As it turned out during the maiden voyage testing, she handily hits that range on the odometer.

Henley Boats designs a wide range of vessels for both recreational and work purposes. Usually those vessels have hulls featuring a distinctive lap strake design but this customdesigned workboat sports smooth sides at the request of the customer. "I believe it is so that it matches rest of their fleet," said Mr. Ham. Because, after all, "customer is king.

This particular customer is in Greenwich, Connecticut. "The boat is designed to

carry a 12 passengers and two crew," said Mr. Ham.

When the new workboat makes its way across the border into the US to its new home on the Atlantic coast it will be kept busy ferrying work crews to offshore construction sites.

A lot of considerations go into the design and building of vessels intended to spend their lives working upon the ocean, among them buoyancy as there is around 1.6 pounds more buoyancy for objects when placed in salt water than in fresh water. The workboat will accordingly ride somewhat higher in salt water than it does in fresh water.

Henley Boats has been making quite a name for itself since it was first purchased by the Manitowaning entrepreneur and that is reflected in their current waiting list. "We have about 21 boats on that list right now," said Mr. Ham. That's custom designed workboats. "We have shipped vessels all across the US, into southern California." Mr. Ham even pursues international markets beyond the western hemi-

So is expansion in the cards? "We have thought about that a lot," said Mr. Ham. "We could certainly use more floor space. It would be nice to have all 21 being built at once."

There are actually larger boats currently under construction than the one being tested on the North Channel waters.

Moving those vessels presents its own challenges, but Mr. Ham notes that trailer builder Jim Wright handles that end of the production cycle with a great deal of expertise. "He has taken our boats all across the States for us," he said. "He always does a great job."

The new vessel passed its shakedown cruise with flying colours. That cruise included bringing the vessel up to full speed, racing across the length of the channel's ice-free waters along the waterfront of the Port of Little Current and performing

curves with élan.

"You plan things out on the drawing board," said Mr. Ham, "but it is nice to see how they actually plane out in the water."

Mr. Ham said that his company is anticipating growing much larger than it is today. "We have about double the orders that we did at this time last year," he said. "We have some good salespeople working for us down in the States and there are quite a few orders just waiting for the ink to be applied to paper."

course, running waterborne tests in the winter are not without their own challenges. Getting the massive vessel into the water was a lot easier than

getting it out, thanks to an ice ridge formed at the ramp into the water. A little ingenuity, a little elbow grease (Mr. Ham may be the 'brains" of the operation, but he quickly proved he isn't at all afraid to get his hands wet when the situation called for it) and a bit of a power assist from Brian Boyle's backhoe (to overcome the slippery-slick traction conditions supplied by recent freezing rain) and the boat and its trailer were back on dry land ready to return to the shop for final outfitting.

apprehension of the deceased and helped the judge understand certain utterances made by the accused immediately after the

The first reported use of the bearwalker defence was in 1945 when James Nahwaikezhik, also of Sheguiandah First Nation, shot and killed his father, believing his parents had cursed him after a selfdescribed witch doctor, Lawrence Tolouse, had told him so.

According to an Expositor article published at the time of the 1997 trial, Mr. Nahwaikezhik's mother began giving her son "love potions" in the hopes of helping the 33-year-old find a wife. Mr. Nahwaikezhik soon began to suffer fierce headaches and thought he might have been 'bearwalked' by his mother, which was later confirmed by the blind witch doctor, Mr. Tolouse, who told Mr. Nahwaikezhik that he could see visions of his parents scheming to kill

The May 28, 1997 article states, "The headaches became worse, apparently, and on the night of August 16, 1945, James Nahwaikezhik, after continually grabbing his head in pain, suddenly declared, 'I'm going to kill those old people'!"

"Taking a rifle, he crossed his parents" home and began to scream, 'Why have you been bearwalking me?""


"It was 3 am, and when his father came to the door, the son shot him," the article continues. "He told the court that he shouted for his mother (who escaped out the back door and into the bush) and had thought he would kill her too, 'but then I decided I wouldn't'."

"My father was bearwalking me, so I killed him,' Mr. Nahwaikezhik told RCMP Corporal Fred Truscott. Apparently, his headache had ended after he killed his father.

Mr. Nahwaikezhik's lawyer entered a plea of insanity, but the chief psychologist of Ontario's Attorney General's Department argued that the plaintiff had been sane and had acted on a belief that had been in his mind since childhood. The jury agreed with the Crown's arguments, and only five hours after deliberation, found Mr. Nahwaikezhik guilty of murder. The trial ended on Hallowe'en, 1945.

He was sentenced to death by hanging but the capital punishment was committed to life imprisonment just 12 days before he was to have been hung at Sudbury District

Mr. Nahwaikezhik was transferred to the Kingston Penitentiary and was eventually parolled. He returned to the Sheguiandah First Nation and died in the late 1950s.

Central Manitoulin Council Notes

Mindemoya Old School

Central Manitoulin council accepted the Energy Efficiency Assessment of the Old School and the Planning Considerations Green Economy from North/rethink Green. There were several systems that would have to be brought up to snuff if the building is to be used again. These include changes to heating controls. further insulating of walls and the roof, insulating pipes from the one central furnace, an upgrading of windows, or, at least, the use of plastic sealing wrap to cover the interiors, perhaps switching to a new energy star furnace as the one now is working at less than 80 percent efficiency and the installation of a hot water tank. As well, the school building has holes in the basement walls that need to be properly sealed insulated, the basement floor, deformed from water damage, has to be removed for further study of the area and it is recommended that the lights be replaced with LED units to make a substantial difference in electrical bills.

The Planning Considerations Report summarized the findings by saying that there are financial incentives and funding programs existing to support work to reuse, retrofit or redevelop the Old School building site. The report drew upon documents relevant to the planning context in Central Manitoulin to identify planning tools and funding streams that may be supportive and appropriate for the site. Consultation with a Planner at the Ministry of Municipal Affairs or a Federation of Canadian Municipalities advisor to confirm eligibility in advance of preparing funding applications is recommended.

Council also accepted the minutes of the Mindemoya Old School Repurposing Committee (MOSRC) for January 30.

Old Fire Hall

Council will declare the Old Fire Hall building and land in Mindemoya located at 6287 Hwy 542 as surplus and will advertise 'For Sale, As Is.' CAO/Clerk Ruth Frawley stated that as it is fairly expensive to have a professional set an assessment on the building, she will do a study of comparables and come up with a sale price.

Mindemoya Arena

Council has recognized the safety issue caused by vehicles being parked directly in front of the arena. Permission was received from the ministry of Transportation (MTO) to temporarily use orange safety pylons to prohibit parking in this area and the Ministry has placed 'No Parking' signs in front of the arena at council's request.

Council now wanted to direct municipal staff to continue to use the pylons transitionally for the balance of the current Minor Hockey season and to inform the public of the new parking restrictions and to notify the local OPP detachment to begin enforcement of the no parking zone immediately as required.

There was discussion about this amendment with Councillor Dale Scott saying that the OPP cannot randomly ticket cars, they have to hand the ticket to the driver and council would have to pay for surveillance. It was also noted that the signs are not positioned properly and the MTO will have to be contacted about this.

Councillor Baran reminded council that they were talking about perhaps saving the life of a child and reinforced the contacting of the MTO to place the signs where people can see them. The motion was passed without the OPP reference.

...continued from page 6 pharmacare National could represent a savings of roughly \$4.2 billion annually as governments would have a stronger bargaining power when it comes to price negotiations.

"We welcome the fact that the budget refers to a universal pharmacare plan, which the NDP has been pushing for," she said. "(But) instead of immediately introducing a universal drug program and helpwho Canadians struggle with having to choose between buying food or their prescriptions, the Liberals choose instead to put in place an advisory council which is supposed to explore ways to establish a national drug program by consulting with Canadians."

Ms. Hughes said that "it should be noted that there is already a parliamentary committee which has already been working on this for the past two years and their findings have yet to be tabled and previous studies have also been done on this. We are left questioning why the government is pre-empting the work of the commit-

Missing from the budget was the government's aggressive stance on passive income sheltered within small business corporations, a trial balloon of which was floated earlier this year and immediately shot at by business and health professionals who make use of the lower tax rate on small businesses to grow their retirement and other investments at a faster rate than that normally available to the general public.

Under the revamped proposal, when companies earn between \$50,000 and \$150,000 in any given year from passive investments a reduced amount of their active business income will be eligible for the small business tax rate. That rate will be set at nine percent in 2019.

Research and innovation are also big winners in this budget, which commits \$3.8 billion more to support science over the next five years. A large proportion of these funds be in the physical and life sciences, social sciences and health, and geared toward fundamental research at universities and other institutions. At 25 percent, this represents the largest budget increase to fundamental science in recent history.

More than \$600 million of the new science funding go toward the government's own laboratories and will help build bridges between federal scientific activities across departments—a key aspect identified as important to leveraging modern research efforts.

But other groups were more upbeat on the budget, especially environmental organizations which saw a significant boost in focus and dollars in this budget.

"Yesterday was a historic day for nature conservation in Canada," said Bob Barnett, executive director of the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy. "The 2018 federal budget, with \$1.3 billion dedicated to nature conservation, is tremendous news for nature and the land trusts working hard to protect it. We are extremely pleased with the announcement.

So far land trusts in Canada have protected over 250,000 acres (101,000 hectares) of ecologically significant land and with the budget announcement EBC and other land trusts are will be in position to nearly double this amount within the next five years, protecting a potential 200,000 additional acres (81,000 hectares) of critical habitat. Details emerge, but we hope this with the help of our loyal supporters will allow EBC to complete a number of projects that have been tantalizing us with their importance." One of those projects highlighted by the Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is the acquisition of more land on Cockburn Island where the NCC has already purchased a significant por-

tion of the land base. On the pot front, Ottawa will spend an additional \$62.5 million on public education campaigns warning of the dangers of drug use and will put an additional \$10 million into research, including assessing the impact of legalization on mental health. The new funding for public education is in addition to a previously announced investment of \$46 million and will target communities at risk and Indigenous organizations.

The government will spend \$191 million over five years to help to defray the cost of NAFTA and World Trade Organization legal challenges related to the ongoing softwood lumber dispute—a number that may prove somewhat inadequate as the drumbeats of an impending trade war grow louder with each passing week.

With an election coming new spending and a significant deficit during economic "good times," irresponsible. But with the Liberal penchant for under-predicting economic

performance and projected revenues time will tell.

istration deadline in a historically short race—originally party members had to register to cast their votes by March 2, then extending it to March 5 before finally settling on noon today (Wednesday, March 7).

Four candidates remain in the race for the party leadership. They include former provincial legislator Christine Elliott (who has run for the leadership twice before), former Toronto city councillor Doug Ford, Toronto lawyer and businesswoman Caroline Mulroney and social advocate conservative Tanya Granic Allen. Patrick Brown had also registered as a candidate to regain the job he was forced to abruptly abdicate CTV published after anonymous accusations of impropriety sexual against him. Mr. Brown has vehemently denied the allegation and vowed to clear his name and ran again, but withdrew from the leadership race citing the pressure it was placing on his friends and family and saying he wanted to focus on refuting the anonymous allegations against him.

The election process has been criticized as being too complex, and there have been concerns raised about the potential for voter fraud, especially as paying for memberships can be done by prepaid credit cards. which cannot be traced.

During the election process, each party member will get one vote, which will then be converted into electoral votes. There are up to 100 electoral votes per riding, to be allocated to each candidate in proportion to the votes they received in the riding.

The voting itself will be by preferential ballot, the same system used by the Liberals, where the voter ranks each of the candidates in order of preference. If no candidate secures 50 percent of the vote plus one on the first round, the last place candidate (and those receiving less than 10 percent of the vote) will be dropped from the ballot and the second choice on their ballots will be allocated to the other candidates. In any event,

the winner will be announced on March 10 as originally planned.

Of all the candidates, Christine Elliott has been touted as Liberal Premier Kathleen Wynne's worst nightmare—as evidenced by pre-emptive Liberal attack ads aimed at Ms. Elliott. Ms. Elliott is an experienced politician with a sound track record as an MPP. She was appointed as the provincial Patient Ombudsman (chosen through a competition) by Premier Wynne herself. She has run a safe classic front runners campaign, but recent polls have suggested that Doug Ford may be pulling ahead among the rank and file.

All of the candidates have renounced the carbon tax plan contained in the platform document released by Mr. Brown before his untimely electoral demise, but Ms. Elliott's sole misstep (or perhaps calculated wink and nod to the environmentalists in the party) was to muse that it could be considered sometime in the future.

Doug Ford has certainly appeared as the guy to beat—in fact he is the only guy in the lists.

Mr. Ford is harnessing the same populist winds that propelled Donald Trump into office. Antielitist and a person with a strong sense of retail politics, he is the brother of the late Toronto Mayor Rob Ford and the heir the still nowerful Ford Nation political machine. Mr. Ford is harnessing the current wave of anti-government sentiment by citing the Liberal government's track record alleging broken promises, corruption allegations, mismanagement chaos. Mr. Ford narrowly lost the last Toronto mayoral race to fellow Tory John Tory and he would be a strong asset in the crucial seat rich region of Toronto and the Greater Toronto Area, a place any party must post well in if they are to form a govern-

As the daughter of former prime minister Brian Mulroney, Caroline Mulroney could be written off as a would-be scion of yet political dynasty-in-waiting, but she brings a number of assets to the table

dark horse in the two-way race between Ms. Elliott and Mr. Ford. She is a fresh face, untainted by association with defeated governments or close electoral losses. She holds a law degree (recently registered to practice law in New York) and a financier, in other words she has proven success outside of government and in business. She has built a strong reputation in a short time as a quick study and although she came out of the gate a bit shaky, her performances have consistently improved with remarkable speed and with it her visible confidence has grown. She has a great potential to connect with a younger demographic as well-particularly younger women who had proven to be problematic for the Tories under Mr. Brown. Finally, there is Tanya

Granic Allen, the social conservative who might easily be expected to be the first to fall from the ballot. But she does connect well with the significant number of party members who were lining up to support Mr. Brown's abortive reelection bid. Ms. Granic Allen cites fiscal restraint. a new (undefined as yet) hydro policy and parental consultation in education (particularly sex education, which she says is going too far too fast and that she would rewrite). She has also vowed to rid the province of wind turbines. She is a strong advocate of reforming the PC candidate selection process, a position that will play well with the executives and active riding association members. Ms. Granic Allen is a parents' rights activist, the owner of a consulting business and a, more recently, a hops farmer in Grey County.

There are almost 190,000 eligible voters in this week's race, but far fewer are expected to vote in the online leadership vote. Ballots with the PIN numbers necessary to register to vote have been mailed out and should all have been in electors' hands by yesterday (Tuesday).

The winner of the leadership contest will be announced at a convention in Toronto on Saturday.



A few years ago, I read the book 'The Blue Zones: Lessons for Living Longer' from the People Who've Lived the Longest by Dan Buettner. It was a great read and very informative. Dan travelled the world to find the longestlived people (100 years plus) to see what their secret was.

He has written two more books and the one I just finished reading is 'The Blue Zones Solution: Eating and Living Like the World's Healthiest People.' The main theme in the book is that the most powerful determinants of our health and well-being are the lifestyle choices we make each day. In a nutshell: eat well, stress less, move more, and love more. In the back of the book are recipes from Greece, Japan, Italy, California and Costa Rica, areas where the oldest and healthiest people live.

Miso Soup with Vegetables

Miso soup is usually considered an appetizer for lunch or dinner in American Japanese restaurants, Okinawan (Japan) centenarian Kamada ate it for breakfast. I changed the recipe a little by adding rice noodles to the soup and having it for dinner. You can find miso in health food stores or in larger grocery stores that carry a health food section. Make a large pot of soup and freeze the extra. The noodles are added to the soup bowl just before eating, not cooked in the soup.

- 3 Tbsp miso paste
- 1 1/2 Tbsp rice wine vinegar
- 2 large garlic cloves, peeled
- 1/2 pound firm tofu, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1/4 pound fresh shiitake mushrooms, stemmed and the caps thinly sliced
 - 2 cups pea shoots (about 3 ounces), roughly chopped
 - 4 mini bok choy, finely chopped
- 6 medium green onions, thinly chopped
- 2 tsp toasted sesame seed oil
- 1 tsp soy sauce

To firm up tofu so it doesn't fall apart in the soup I sliced the tofu into 1-inch slices and baked them in the oven at 350°F for 45 minutes. When cooled, I cut them up into

- 2. Put the miso, rice vinegar, garlic, ginger, and 1 cup water in food processor or a large blender. Cover and blend until smooth.
- 3. Stir the miso mixture into 4 cups of water in a medium saucepan. Add the mushrooms, tofu, mini bok choy, pea shoots, and green onions; bring to a simmer over medium heat, stirring often. Simmer for about 15 minutes.
- 4. In the meantime boil about 6 cups water. Take out the amount of rice noodles you need for 2 or 4 people and place them in a large bowl. Pour the hot water over the noodles and let sit until they are soft about 5 minutes. Drain and put noodles in each individual bowl.
- 5. Just before serving the soup add the sesame oil and soy sauce. Pour the soup into each bowl.
- *If you like more texture, finely mince the ginger and garlic but don't put them in the food processor or blender. Just add them with the tofu.
- **If fresh shiitake mushrooms are not available, soak four large dried shiitakes with warm water in a small bowl for 20 minutes. Drain, reserving the soaking liquid and add to the soup.
 - ***Substitute baby spinach for pea shoots.
