#### **Donald Trump** administration delays release of US Army Engineers' plan in battle against invading carp

Plan addresses Illinois 'choke point' to keep Asian carp out of Lake Michigan

LAKES HURON-MICHIGAN—It appears the Trump administration has caused a significant delay in the release of a plan by the US Army Corps of Engineers that was to list ways to stop the invasive Asian carp from moving north and into the Great Lakes.

The plan was to focus on the Brandon Road Lock and Dam, located near Joliet, Illinois on the Des Plaines River, an article from the Detroit Free Press reports. The newspaper also reports that the plan, which was to be released at the end of February, was ordered to withhold the information until the White House could review it, even though the plan had been underway for several years and still had a public comment period to go through following the announcement of the

The release of the Army Corps of Engineers' plan had also been panned by some shipping companies, Illinois state officials and Illinois Lieutenant Governor Evelyn Sanguinetti, who also requested a delay.

Not all politicians urged the delay, however, with a number of Great Lakes Congresspeople calling for measures to be carried out at the Brandon Road Lock and Dam, which has been described as ...continued on page 10

TORONTO—Facing a steady decline in popularity over the high cost of electricity and barely a year and a half from the next election, Premier Kathleen Wynne announced the largest reduction in hydro rates in the utility's history on Thursday, March 2. The plan will see many energy bills drop by 25 percent, with some suggestion that Northern Hydro One customers could see reduction of as much as 50

"We're here today to talk about the high cost of electricity in Ontario: how it got to this point, how it must be fixed and how exactly we're going to put that fix in place," said the premier in her announcement. "For too long, governments-my own included-have made mistakes in the way we've structured Ontario's electricity system. That has resulted in rates that are unfairly high. It's time to fix those mistakes, in ways that work for today and for the future."

been accomplished by spreading out the cost of infrastructure maintenance and repairs in the province to 30 years. The premier likened the approach to refinancing a home mortgage and said the plan will more fairly distribute the costs associated with refurbishing the province's grid and supply system among those who will benefit from the costs.

"Let me just pause and say on this point that we all bear respon-

vative and NDP governments,' said the premier during her announcement. "For the better part of 50 years we didn't pay our way. Until about a decade ago, when it came to a head. The system needed major rebuilding. Which meant a major price tag. A lot of that money came in the form of rates—higher bills. So, for the past few years, customers have been paying not only for the power they consume but for the

major new refurbishments and for the cost of renovating a system that went without proper repairs for far too long.

Ms. Wynne noted that it was not all grim news. "So the good news is that we've created an electricity grid that is second-to-none," she said. "In the past few years we've invested more than \$50 billion in electricity infrastructure—new dams in the south, new towers in

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#### 2016 drought means caution required for maple taps Agriculture ministry expert advises fewer taps per tree this year as forest rebounds

MANITOULIN—The sweetest time of the year is just around the corner as Islanders prepare to tap their trees in the coming weeks, but the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) warns that extra care is needed when tapping trees this year due to stress put on maples by last summer's drought.

"Last year's drought put stress on woodlots and forests," explained Todd Leuty with OMAFRA's orchard horticulture and forestry division. "Maple trees react to droughts by not producing as much starch and

Mr. Leuty added that because of the drought the trees will be storing less sugar for use in leafing out in the spring of 2017.

"Some producers choose not to tap trees after droughts, or just not to tap trees on higher ground in the sugar bush that would have been more affected," said Mr. Leuty. "Care should be taken when tapping the trees, such as limiting one tap per tree, thereby leaving more energy in the

He added that some producers in southern Ontario might not be tapping at all this year due to trees that were doubly stressed by both the

#### MHC unveils new LC Emergency Department

LITTLE CURRENT—Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) has officially opened the doors on to its newly designed and renovated Little Current Site Emergency Department (ED).

"The board extends our sincerest thanks and appreciation to everyone on the team for this wonderful outcome," said Terry Olmstead, chair of the MHC board. "It is truly gratifying to see the vision brought to completion."

The planning for this project began as far back as 2010, when the minor procedures operating room was moved from the back of the ED to the upper floor of the Little Current site, resulting in vacant

"For many years, the organization has investigated options for improving this space so as to better serve patients," explained MHC CEO Derek Graham. "Finding both the ways and means to bring this to fruition was indeed challenging. However, through a staged approach, coupled with a robust financial plan under the board's leadership, the pieces began to fall into place."

In 2013, the goal of improving physical space and flow was embedded within MHC's strategic plan. This came about as a result of feedback received from various internal and external stakeholders, including MHC's board of directors, physicians, staff, other Island health care providers, and the community at large. Two very important projects came under this strategic goal, being the completion of the Family Health Team addition at the Mindemoya Site, realized in September 2015, and launching the renovation and space expansion for the Little Current Site ED.

In January 2016, MHC's board of directors

motioned to proceed with the ED construction project in the form of a renovation within the existing footprint to include the previously vacated space as part of the new design. Shortly after the planning began, with the construction contract being awarded the following spring. VP Corporate Services and Chief Financial Officer (VP/CFO) Lynn Foster took on the leadership role for construction oversight. The actual renovations began later in the summer of 2016. It was expected to be challenging, as patients still needed to receive care while the space was under construction. "This construction project

# Infrastructure Ontario begins process for new Manitoulin Ont. Prov. Police detachment

LITTLE CURRENT—Infrastructure Ontario (IO) has started the process for building a new Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment on Manitoulin, along with eight other locations across Ontario.

"We have a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) out for the project (to build all nine detachments)," explained Cary Mignault, special advisor, legal services, business strategy and communications, with IO. "With an RFQ the project goes out to the open market and companies bid. It is pretty straightforward. The RFQ will close around late spring, and we will select a short-list of bidders. From there we will issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) from the short-list bidders."

As to when the winning bidder will be selected, Mr. Mignault said he couldn't comment. He also wouldn't comment as to where on Manitoulin the new detachment will be built, but did confirm that the only location IO had purchased land on Manitoulin recently was in the Northeast Town. As well, he noted that the exact locations of all nine detachments would be announced at the same time.

As The Expositor previously reported, the Northeast Town sold lots in the Little Current municipally-owned subdivision, between Boozeneck and Hayward Roads, to IO for \$125,000 earlier this year.

The Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services (MCSCS) announced last year that Manitoulin had been chosen as one of nine locations to receive a new OPP detachment.

Funding for the new detachment will come as part of phase two of the OPP modernization project. The other eight communities to receive new attachments are: Moosonee, Orillia, Fort Frances, Marathon, Hawkesbury, Port Credit, Huron County and West Parry Sound.

As for the amalgamation of the Espanola OPP detachment and the Manitoulin detachment, the day of the merger has been set for April 5.

The Espanola detachment, which is currently a satellite office of the Sudbury Detachment, will, as of April 5, be overseen by the Manitoulin Detachment. The OPP has stated that there will no job losses or service cuts due to the amalgamation.

# New Rainbow Rescue initiative aims at getting stray cats off the streets in the Northeast Town

NORTHEAST TOWN—A partnership pilot project between Little Current's Rainbow Rescue, the Northeast Town and Island Animal Hospital is hoping to get stray cats off the streets of the municipality, while helping protect homed felines.

"I've noticed that the last couple of years there has been a lot of stray cats in the municipality," said Rainbow Rescue owner and operator Bleu Fisher. "Seven out of 10 of these strays have FIV (feline immunod-eficiency virus—feline AIDS)."

Ms. Fisher explained that not only is this a problem for the strays, but also homed felines that get infected through fights with strays.

"I've got a lot of the strays in the town pulled out, but it is an ongoing problem," said Ms. Fisher. "Cats with FIV are also hard to home—there are a lot of stigmas around it."

Through working with rescue cats in the municipality, Ms. Fisher came up with the idea to develop a pilot project where the Northeast Town, Island Animal Hospital and her rescue organization would split the costs of getting stray cats spayed or neutered and tested for FIV.

The Northeast Town council reviewed Ms. Fisher's proposal last year, officially coming on board last month with an up to \$1,500 commitment, or one third of the costs of the project.

Ms. Fisher said that Rainbow Rescue has "pulled out of the area" 346 cats and dogs in the last couple years, getting medical treatments for the ones in need and finding homes for the animals.

"I think this pilot project is great," said Steve Fisher, clinic manager of the Island Animal Hospital. "It is great that people like Bleu are helping the Island's stray animals. She is doing amazing work."

If you know of a stray animal in need or you have an animal you need to surrender (surrender fees apply) you can contact Ms. Fisher at 705-806-1959.

Ms. Fisher also has cats in needs of home, so consider adopting a rescue and opening your doors to a new feline friend.

#### Mumps: what you need to know

MANITOULIN—Increased mumps activity has been reported in some parts of the province and across Canada. There are currently no reported cases of mumps in the Sudbury and Manitoulin districts, the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) reports.

Locally, mumps infection is rare, with the last confirmed cases seen in 2010. The following are some facts about the virus and steps you can take to protect you and your family from mumps infection.

Mumps is a virus that spreads from person-to-person through coughing, sneezing, and having contact with a person's saliva by sharing drinks or utensils, food or water bottles, or by kissing. Children as well as adults can get mumps.

Symptoms of mumps infection typically appear 16 to 18 days after being in contact with an infected person. Symptoms commonly include swelling of the salivary glands on either one or both sides of the cheeks and jaw, fever, headache, muscle aches and pains, fatigue, and loss of appetite. These symptoms can last up to 10 days.

Some people may have complications from the infection including swelling of other parts of the body (for example, painful swelling of the testicles), as well as hearing loss. Pregnant women who become infected with mumps during the first three months of pregnancy are at risk of miscarriage.

Mumps is a vaccine-preventable disease.

Mumps vaccine is publicly funded (free) for children and youth. It

# Energy bills: darned if you do, darned if you don't

It is not so surprising that the two parties that are most likely to form the next government in Ontario have at some point tried to offload hydro onto the private sector. When it comes to political albatrosses, the energy portfolio has been the gift that just keeps on giving (bad polls)

The conundrum of electricity bills began long before the Progressive Conservative governments of the Harris-Eves era—with massive cost overruns on nuclear power plants, but no partisan house has been free of taint from the electricity file since, with successive governments freezing rates (and piling on debt) in their turn.

At the risk of waving a red flag in a decidedly charged debate, it should be noted that the McGuinty Liberals do deserve some credit for finally taking the bull by the horns and upgrading the grid and supply infrastructure, but the cost of dealing with decades of neglect has been enormous and Premier Wynne, to her own credit, has not backed away from accepting responsibility for the mistakes made by her own government—although she has been quite willing to share

Perhaps it was to be anticipated that both opposition parties would quickly heap scorn upon the plan announced by the premier, whatever it might be. It seems to be de rigor these days for opposition parties to oppose any government's proposal or stance without providing any alternative or competing proposal.

The Progressive Conservatives, who have made critique of the energy file their cause celebre for the past couple of years, blithely chirp about the energy file using language that seems to suggest that the Liberal government, and Ms. Wynne herself, are profiting handsomely from Hydro One, even while knowing that this is anything but the case and ignoring their own party's role in creating the current

The NDP have put forward a claim that they would reduce hydro bills by 30 percent, issuing the proposed largesse for ratepayers with

suspiciously convenient timing and little detail on how such a wonder would be accomplished. In an even greater stretch of credulity, the NDP propose to accomplish the rate reduction even as they buy back that portion of Hydro One that has been sold—and the cherry on top is the suggestion that a fully public Hydro One would pour golden eggs into the provincial treasury even as electricity rates are slashed. Truly, the NDP have access to the Hogwart staff's entire inventory of magical wands.

Politics has ever been the realm of alternative facts, if not outright fiction—although the spin of yesteryear did seem to fly a bit closer to the wind than the current breezes emanating from partisan communication offices.

Both parties seem to be counting on the electorate remaining oblivious to their promises following their success in the next election. But history has proven, time and again, that the Gordian knot of Ontario's electricity system will require a very sharp knife indeed no matter who is in charge, and the temptation to put off for another day what needed to be done yesterday will remain irresistible to the party of the day.

In finding a way to reduce rates, Premier Wynne has made a credible case for her plan and communicated it in a manner that ordinary Ontarians can understand.

In the meantime, while Premier Wynne appears to have found a viable solution to escalating electricity bills the question remains, will she gain much in the way of political capital from keeping her promise to find a way forward for those struggling with high energy bills? If history is any guide the answer is probably not.

Despite the hurricane of approbation currently swirling around her, Premier Wynne deserves credit for her courage and innovation in dealing with a file that has confounded her predecessors stretching all the way back to the days of the Big Blue Machine. Bravo, Ms.

## Island supply management foe rebutts Expositor position in favour

EDITOR'S NOTE: Glenn Black is an artisanal chicken farmer and bed and breakfast owner based in Providence Bay. Mr. Black has been a long-time vocal opponent of the supply management system and has offered the following as a rebuttal to the March 1, 2017 editorial in support of supply management 'Don't throw the baby out with the milk quota." by Glenn Black

he March 1, 2017 editorial called for the continuation of Canada's supply management (SM) system for the production of dairy, eggs, chicken and turkey. ('Don't throw the baby out with the milk quota, March 1, Page 4.)

The editorial's logic and rhetoric were well written, likely persuading most readers to superficially accept this paper's editorial proposal. Unfortunately, no objective evidence was presented. This letter to the editor will present the objective evidence, and attempt to draw the necessary conclusions, likely opposite to those proposed by the edito-

From Confederation to the 1970s, Canadian farmers suffered under the unfair predatory business practices of large agri-food companies, both domestic and international, while opposing lobbyists fought for the hearts and minds of procrastinating politicians. After a growing number of unbearable crises, Bill C-176 was proposed as a solution, but it became the longest debated piece of legislation in the history of Canada. In the end, two all-night sessions of Parliament and a last minute amendment finally resulted in passing the bill at 6:40 am on December 31, 1971, creating supply management (SM). SM was designed to protect Canadian farmers from predatory business practices, and end boom and bust cycles.

This is where the unintended negative consequences of SM began. While SM was supposed to protect the small defenceless farmer, it has caused their destruction. At the start of SM in 1971, there were 113,008 Canadian dairy farms. Today, there are just 11,280 dairy farms that remain, so under SM's impotent or incompetent reign, just 9.98 percent of our Canadian dairy farms survived. The rest went bankrupt, or were bought up by larger and larger factory farm corporations. For chicken, more than 88 percent of Canada's chicken farms have disappeared under SM. The same sad tale can be told for farms producing eggs and

Canadians are consistently price gouged by SM when compared to prices on world markets: 38% more for milk, 50 percent to 300 percent more for chicken, cheese and butter.

In December 2015, the Food Institute at the University of Guelph announced that food inflation in Canada is the highest in the world, topping 4.1 percent in 2015. It will be more of the same for the near future. For someone earning Ontario Minimum Wage between 1995 and 2005, the affordability of chicken dropped 31.7 percent. Since chicken has historically been the cheapest meat available, if you can't afford chicken, you are forced to become a vegetarian.

SM was supposed to balance supply and demand, preventing boom and bust cycles. In spite of this, SM purposefully creates then destroys millions of litres of perfectly good skim milk rather than selling or donating it to food-

SM was supposed to provide safe, high quality food for Canadians. Quality of milk is usually measured by contamination of milk with bacteria, BTSCC (on-farm bulk tank somatic cell counts; ie. puss), and adulterants. Under the jaundiced eye of SM, when the Canadian milk quality standards were tightened in January 1992, the incidents of adulterated milk from improper antibiotic use significantly increased as Canadian dairy farmers tried to take the easy way out to meet the tougher quality standards. In 2011-2012, Canadian milk had 239,556 BTSCC, while US milk was 197,000 so US milk was 21 percent better than Canadian milk. For January to June 2015, the worst month for Canadian milk contamination was 13 times worse than the best month, contrary to SM's bravado and propaganda about quality for Canadian consumers. Thank goodness all those hidden problems get pasteurized, so we only have the bad taste, and avoid most of the food poisoning that would otherwise result.

For SM chicken grown and sold in Canada, the University of Guelph, Canadian Food Inspection Agency, and Public Health Canada all report that 30 percent to 80 percent of retail raw chicken is significantly contaminated with deadly bacteria such as E.coli, Salmonella, Heidelberg, lysteria, and others, and half of those bacteria are resistant to antibiotics (ie. Superbugs). The antibiotic resistance has been proven to be caused by illegal or inappropriate use of antibiotics by chicken hatcheries and huge factory farms operating under SM's protection.

As compared to SM's CAFO factory chicken sold in grocery stores, environmentally and animal welfare friendly grass pastured chicken contain 30 percent to 407 percent better vitamins, minerals, and healthier fats. SM's chicken is a bland, inferior product with 50 percent more of the bad fats that hurt our health.

SM kills jobs and business opportunities. For example:

SM farmers haven't kept pace with the more rapid improvements achieved by farmers in non-SM countries. Today, Canadian dairy farms are reported as having the 2nd worst efficiencies in the world. Canadian factory chicken farms are 25 percent worse than the world leaders for feed conversion efficiency. Sudden removal of the current SM life support system from our atrophied, uncompetitive SM farms would cause their immediate collapse. Canada's SM farmers grabbed hold of the tiger's tail in 1971, and have held on for dear life ever since, in spite of the dangers and wild ride towards their own destruction.

After New Zealand removed their dairy SM system in 2001, the NZ dairy system grew 17 times faster than the Canadian dairy system. This tells us that SM destroys Canada's opportunity for more jobs, GDP, prosperity, and tax revenue for Canada and Canadians.

SM is an unfair government subsidy under WTO trade rules, so Canada is restricted from exporting, or face dumping charges and trade sanctions. That's why for chicken, Canada has only 1.4 percent of the OECD chicken export market. If SM didn't exist, and Canada regained its former competitive position, Canada could eventually grow our chicken production to five times its current size. That would mean more jobs, more markets for Canadian grains, and more taxes to support Canadian health care, social programs, and infrastructure projects.

If SM rules were relaxed to allow the market share for Ontario's 16,000 small flock poultry farmers to climb from less than 1 percent to 10 percent, that could create up to 430,000 new jobs. Ontario currently has about 485,000 unemployed people.

SM holds us back and kills job creation so that a small special interest group can milk their monopoly for maximum profits through gouging of Canadian consumers.

Health Canada reports that 7.6 percent of Canadians can't afford the food they need to feed their families. In the North, rural areas, and on First Nation reserves, 30 percent to 75 percent of families have food insecurity. For example, in Rankin Inlet, Nunavut a whole chicken sells for \$80 to \$90, 4 to 5 times the price paid in Toronto, making SM chicken unaffordable by most families.

Unaffordable food causes the Foodbank in Mindemoya to struggle under the growing demand; up 70 percent in the last three years. The 832 Christmas food hampers gifted to struggling Manitoulin families in 2016 was up 49 percent from the previous year.

Two thirds of Canadian deaths are caused or contributed to by poor diets or poor nutrition. Getting rid of SM will help make better, more nutritious foods available for all Canadians. Now is the time to get rid of SM, before we have food riots, mass starvation, or rising epidemics of bad

For too long, SM's multi-millionaires and their talented. highly paid lobbyists have had a reserved place at the government's feed trough. Politicians have fallen over each other to continuously refill that SM feed trough with the very best quality and quantity that taxpayers' money could buy.

Canada's Supply Management System for chicken, turkey, eggs, and dairy is a dysfunctional, inefficient, ineffective, and mediocre tyranny imposed on 35 million Canadians by just 17,000 farmers, their paid lobbyists, and political friends

The 17,000 SM farmers who "own" the supply management system are all multi-millionaires. SM farms (dairy, chicken, turkey, eggs) are just 8 percent of all Canadian farms, but SM farmers are the best paid of all Canadian farmers, earning 21 percent more than non-SM farmers. They became multi-millionaires by stealing away the rights and freedoms of consumers and all other non-SM farmers.

I am a small flock poultry farmer (ie. I'm a non-quota, non-SM chicken farmer). The 60,000 or so small flock poultry farmers in Canada is one group that suffers under the despotic control of the SM system for chicken, so that 2,700 SM chicken farmers (just 4.3 percent of all chicken farmers in Canada) can rule the roost. I call it "chicken apartheid."

Similarly sad statistics exist for the other three tentacles of the SM beast (ie. dairy, eggs, and turkey).

The longer the dysfunctional SM system is left in place, the worse it will likely get. Canada urgently needs a dramatic overhaul of our dysfunctional SM system, or its dismantling with an orderly transition period so as to help SM farms regain their former strengths and competitive capa-

often notice when travelling in Canada how readily available coffee is. Whether at Tim Horton's, Starbucks, Country Style or a plethora of independently owned and operated coffee shops and cafes, Canadians love their morning coffee. The further south one travels into the southern states, coffee seems to be just another drink option and tea is always served cold. I didn't recognize my love of coffee (it may have been the cream and sugar I truly loved) until early January 1998. In those days Tim Horton's was the main coffee shop in Canada and had not yet made its way into the US. My husband, children and I were driving back from a holiday in Florida, two weeks of sun and sand, cold tea and scarce coffee. We encountered freezing rain in Fancy Gap, Virginia, a small community high in the Blue Ridge Mountains. Unknown to us, we were on the edge of what would later become known as the Great Ice Storm of 1998. That night almost every license plate in the parking lot of our motel was from Ontario.

The next day we drove with few breaks trying to beat the worsening weather. We stopped only for emergency pee breaks and grab-and-go meals. Coffee here and there, but not really good coffee, at least not along the main thoroughfares. As we came into the outskirts of Buffalo New York in late evening, the emergency warning lights on the side of the road were flashing telling to tune into a particular radio station. The message was that a "no-drive" order would be going into effect. All drivers had to be off Buffalo area roads within the next hour or risk having their vehicles impounded. Desperate for a coffee and pee break, our goal was to make the Peace Bridge and be in Canada within the hour. With a little luck and decent map reading skills (there wasn't any GPS back then) we managed to make it to the border with relative ease. When we got to the mid point of the bridge where both the American and Canadian flags fly indicating the actual physical border line, there was a sense of relief that we had made it home. The relief would have been more profound if not for the brutal winter wind rocking the car as we drove suspended across the black roiling waters of the Niagara River. In the distance, however, shining like a beacon in the night was a familiar sign and I excitedly blurted out, "Tim Hortons! I need a Timmy's and bathroom!" We arrived within minutes at the Canadian border crossing. The guard was young and very official in his demeanour. We felt comfortable though, because we were more or less back in Canada.

After the usual questions about citizenship, where we had been, where we were going and whether or not we had anything to declare, he waved us through.

"Right! Turn right here!" I was determined to get my coffee.

e any good husband, mine took the right lane up a walled ramp to the Tim Horton's I had spied on the bridge. After using the washroom and ordering double doubles my husband asked the young woman behind the counter what the easiest way to the QEW was.

"You can't get there from here," she said with that typical Fort Erie quasi New York accent. "You're in the duty free. You can only get to the bridge from here." We exchanged glances, my husband's miffed, mine apologetic, thanked her and left. We weren't exactly sure what she told us meant, but going back across the bridge into the US was the last thing we wanted to

We followed a similar walled ramp out of the duty free area to the base of the bridge. Now most likely my discomfort about crossing the border comes from my grandmother who was very nervous when she left Canada. In her case, she was born in Canada but lost her Canadian status when she married my Italian grandfather. She had to become a Naturalized British Citizen and then in later years apply for her Canadian citizenship. She always carried her "papers" with her and was fearful of

becoming person without a country. If we went back over the border so soon after coming into Canada, what kind of disciplinary action or "search" would we be opening ourselves up to. I was too nervous to drink my coffee.

Fortunately, the way back through the Canadian border crossing was accessible from the duty free so we got back in line. As luck would have it, we drove into the stall of the same young border guard we had seen minutes before.

"Country of citizenship?"

"Canada," my husband responded. "Actually, we just came through here a few minutes ago. My wife wanted coffee from Tim Horton's and we accidently drove into the duty free." The young guard's shoulders dropped and he sighed. Clearly he had heard this before.

"Do you have anything to declare," he asked with great patience. I gingerly held up the two double doubles toward him and gave him my best fellow Canadian smile.

"Welcome back," he said as he waved us

Almost 20 years later my taste in coffee has changed. I drink it with low fat cream or milk and sweetener now days. If truth be told Tim's is no longer my favourite, preferring the dark roast yumminess of the ompetitor. But when I think of Canada, coffee and winter, Tim Horton's is still the symbol of all that and more.

#### Manitoulin deer population healthy, according to MNRF check station data

**by Robin Burridge**MANITOULIN—The analysis of the biennial Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) deer check station data has been completed and shows a healthy and balanced population of Manitoulin deer.

"Fawn and yearling weights were better than normal for the Island," said MNRF area biologist Wayne Selinger of the find-

ings. "The fawns were in especially good condition despite the drought we experienced this past summer. Approximately one quarter of the fawns sampled exceeded 80lbs dressed, which is excellent for Manitoulin. The lactation rate for the yearling does was also up as was mean antler beam diameter for yearling bucks. All three of these condition factors

suggest that the population is in reasonable balance with available summer habitat.

The MNRF once again partnered with the staff and students from College Boreal's Fish and Wildlife program operating the volunteering deer check station at the Espanola Mall parking lot from the Wednesday of deer rifle season until the Saturday. The MNRF has been operating the deer check station in Espanola every second year since 2006.

"Four hundred and eighty deer were sampled this past fall which is an increase from the 328 sampled in 2014, but still low compared to previous years," said Mr. Selinger. "We are uncertain as to whether this reflects harvest trends or decreasing

#### Thirteen fatal snowmobile incidents in past six weeks more than double toll from last season

With fatal snowmobile incidents now more than double the number this time last season, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs (OFSC) are dismayed to see the same behaviours drive the numbers up at an alarming rate.

Fatal snowmobile incidents and resulting deaths now sit at 20 for the season, compared to eight such incidents and 11 deaths to this time last year. Thirteen of the deaths have occurred within the past six weeks. The causes and contributing factors clearly reflect snowmobilers' ongoing disregard for their own safety and that of their fellow riders and passengers:

Twelve of the deceased either collided with a tree, a rock, a snowbank, a road vehicle or another snowmobile.

Speeding excessively, too fast for the conditions and/or losing control of their snowmobiles were actions in nine

Four of the snowmobilers were travelling on frozen waterways. Three of them encountered open water and the fourth fell through the ice. Sadly, in one of those incidents, a young passenger died.

Driver inattention was the primary cause of four fatal-

A lone snowmobiler died of hypothermia after her snowmobile became stuck in the snow—a harsh reminder of what can happen when you do not pack an emergency kit for each ride.

Seventeen males and three females, which include a 16year-old and an 11-year-old girl, have been killed to date. According to OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair. the prominent demographics among the deceased may come as a surprise to some and are telling in terms of the attitudes and behaviours among some Ontario snowmobilers.

Men in their fifties and sixties make up the majority of this season's snowmobile deaths, with 15 of the 20 deceased within these age groups," said OPP Deputy Commissioner Brad Blair. "What snowmobilers and their families need to take away from this is that even those with considerable driving experience—be it on a snowmobile or in a road vehicle—are equally vulnerable to the inherent risks associated with this popular, yet high-risk recreational sport."

The OPP is urging snowmobilers to stay off lakes and vers, the conditions of which are deteriorating rapidly in many parts of the province. Family members are also encouraged to help their loved ones make smart decisions before they head out, to help ensure a safe return home from their ride.



These are important enormously that meet the demand for cleaner and reliable power everywhere in the province. These are assets that belong to all the people of Ontario and that will serve us for many

decades to come."

Wynne as Ms.explained how the rate reductions were made possible. "But the way we financed those investments was a mistake," she said. "We asked one generation—today's generation to unfairly shoulder the burden of nearly all of those costs. We had to play catch-up and we asked today's ratepayers to cover nearly the whole tab. Think of it in terms of a mortgage. We needed to rebuild the system and so we went to the bank for that money. But the terms that were set weren't fair—particularly the amortization. Instead of paying off the mortgage over 30 years, we agreed to a term of 20. That means that we pay things down faster. But the monthly mortgage payments, or, in this case, your hydro bills, are higher. And it doesn't really make sense since that house—or in this case the electricity system—is an asset that will continue to benefit people far past that contract

"In effect, this generation has been subsidizing not just those who came before, but those who will come next. That's not right, and it has been notably unfair on play," adding that the move more

today's hydro users. So we're fixing that. We're refinancing the mortgage and setting a new term that stretches over a longer period. Over time, it will cost a bit more. And it will take longer to pay off. But it is fairer-because it doesn't ask this generation of hydro customers alone to pay the freight for everyone before and after. The burden will now be shared more evenly and more appropriately. That's the first and most important fix we're putting in place."

Critics have charged that the Ontario Liberals are seeking to buy votes and burdening future generations with the cost.

"Ontario deserves a break on their hydro bills," said Algoma Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha, but he pointed out the cost will see \$40 billion added to the bill down the line. "We will be paying for this for over 30 years. The real benefits will be going to the banking sector.'

Mr. Mantha said the NDP would reduce rates by 30 percent while reversing "the wrong-headed decision to sell off Hydro One." Mr. Mantha noted that the sale will prevent revenue from the utility from coming into provincial accounts.

He went on to challenge the continued implementation of time of use pricing, using the example of a person on oxygen at home who requires the electricity to live. He advocates moving back to a fixed cost on elec-

"does nothing to alleviate the mess created by a government and is intended to appease the 905 voters and the electorate in the corridor down south." Mr. Parker continued by pointing out that "extending the amortization period of any contract or sale only extends the pay-off period into our kids' pockets and costs Ontarians countless millions of hard fought dollars." The end goal, he contends, is, "without a doubt influencing next year's election results in their favour at our personal detriment and long term suffering."

Hydro One, the semi-privatized utility that distributes electricity to much of the province was positive on the development, however, issuing a press release that "thanks Premier Kathleen Wynne and Energy Minister Glenn Thibeault for introducing immediate measures to reduce the burden of rising electricity costs on our customers."

"The changes announced today will provide significant relief, particularly for those who need it the most—our fixed-income, rural and Northern customers and small businesses," said Mayo Schmidt, Hydro One's CEO. "Ontario households and small businesses could start to see their bills drop by an average of 31 percent each month as early as this summer.'

The Government of Ontario's announced plan will see a reduction in the Global Adjustment charge by 20 percent, a lowering of the delivery charge for lowcurrent smoke and mirror acceleration of the move to charges; the introduction of an affordability fund to help those customers in need; and the introduction of a First Nations electricity rate.

Businesses will not see as much of a boost from the changes announced on March 2, however. Instead they see an expanded rebate program for those that can shift their consumption to off-peak hours. Companies in Northern Ontario and rural areas will, however, also benefit from a reduction in delivery charges that have driven up bills in less-populated regions.

To pay for the rate reductions the province will add \$25 billion in interest costs over 30 years as a result of it stretching out financing for existing generation projects. It will also shift \$2.5 billion over three years in costs from ratepayers to general provincial account-essentially moving that amount from the bills of the user to that of the general taxpayer.

Hydro One notes that the initiatives were developed following discussions with interested stakeholders that included Hydro One. Hydro One noted that its recommendations "based on direct feedback and data from our customers and focused on providing greater fairness for rural and Northern customers who will see their delivery charges fall in line with the provincial average. This underscores our ongoing advocacy on behalf of our customers.

"As a new public company with new leadership, we nave put our customers first," added Mr. Schmidt.

drought and by excessive defoliation from an eastern tent caterpillar larvae or gypsy moth larvae population

Taking extra care when tapping trees this year will ensure trees are left with enough sap for reasonable leaf production and encourage longterm productivity.

"Remember not to drill tap holes or install spiles while tree trunks are frozen below -5° Celsius," recommends Mr. Leuty. "Tapping into deeply frozen wood can cause the bark to split above and below the hole as the spile is seated into the hole. With splitting, vacuum in sap tubing can be reduced due to a poor spile-to-tree seal, and sap can leak down the trunk instead of into the spile. Drill tap holes 1.5 inches deep, at a slight

upward angle using a sharp sanitized tapping bit. A downward sloped tap hole will drain by gravity to prevent sap or rain water from collecting in the hole after sap harvest has ended.'

As for how the drought will affect the sap volume for 2017, Mr. Leuty said it's too early to tell.

"You just can't predict what the sap volume will be," said Mr. Leuty. "It depends a lot on the weather—the freeze/thaw that makes the sap flow."

Mr. Leuty said that syrup producers in some areas of southern Ontario are three weeks ahead of Manitoulin and have already been tapping trees.

In his March 2 Ontario Maple Syrup Production Report, Mr. Leuty says that so far the 2017 maple syrup crop is reported to be of very fine quality with rich maple flavour.

"Syrup producers in early south-

west regions report 50 to 75 percent of a syrup crop has been processed so far with more fresh sap to come," said Mr. Leuty. "Mid-season areas report a 10 to 25 percent syrup crop so far.'

He also reported that in Northern areas, deep snow has made tap installation difficult for many syrup producers. "A few have just completed tapping, while others are waiting until temperatures warm above negative 5° Celsius to allow tapping activities to continue," he shared.

The short term flow forecast for Northern Ontario reads, "Snow covered areas in Northern Ontario should help keep trees in the sugar bush cold to help hold back bud development if a warming period occurs. Maple syrup producers in the Thunder Bay area can expect sap flow the middle of next week.'



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#### Healing takes the stage at Noojmowin Teg Health Centre IRS Wellness Conference Lifelong journey to reconciliation lies ahead for both survivors and their children's generation

MANITOWANING—A two-day Indian Residential School Wellness Conference hosted by Noojmowin Teg Health Centre Traditional Services was held in the Debajehmujig Creation Centre in Manitowaning at the beginning of Feb-

Master of ceremonies Susan Manitowabi provided opening remarks along with welcomes by Debbie Francis, director of operations at Nooj, and Councillor Rachel Manitowabi on behalf of the Wikwemikong chief and council. Elder Urban Mejaki provided the opening prayer and Sunset Sagutch performed an honour song for residential school survivors before keynote speaker Barb Nolan took

Ms. Manitowabi noted that throughout the two-day event, support personnel were on hand for those who might be overcome by the experience. "Sometimes these things trigger us," she said. "It is nice to know that there's support here. Ms. Manitowabi went on to introduce the support personnel and to point out the separate private room that had been set aside for counselling or if elders simply wanted to "sit and chat."

Door prizes for the event were far from shabby either, including a weekend pass to Manitoulin Country Fest donated by Great Lakes Country 103 radio and Noojmowin Teg. Also near to hand were "tear bags." "If you feel the need to cry, put it in a tear bag and we will take it back to Noojmowing Teg to be burned in the sacred fire," said Ms. Manitowabi. "If you keep tears in they can be toxic." She also strongly suggested that, due to the prevalence of the flu, attendees should frequently wash their hands.

Keynote speaker Barbara Nolan, of Garden River, but originally from Wikwemikong, began her address in Anishinabemowin but said she would attempt to speak in English as well so "non-speakers would get something out

Ms. Nolan discussed the history of the residential school system, noting how young Anishinaabe were sent to residential schools far from their homes, family, culture and language as part of an official government policy of assimilation. She related the history of her own story, how she was born in the Wikwemikong community of South Bay. "We didn't speak English," she recalled. "We went to church, so we only knew our prayers in English.'

She recalled how her father, a tourist operator, would bring non-Native families fishing or rent boats and motors. One day, she and her siblings saw a group of black chil-

dren with one family and wanted to play with them. Her older brother Isadore intervened and told them that they could not because they did not speak English. "I stood up and said we can speak English," she recalled saying, fol-

lowing her declaration up by reciting "Blessed art thou... (a line from the prayer 'Hail Mary').

Ms. Nolan noted that the residential school impact has been multi-generational. Including helping to create a situation where fluent speakers have refused to share their language with younger generations. The language having been successfully driven underground by the traumatic experiences of that older generation. "They do not speak openly anymore," noted Ms. Nolan. In her own case, she has tried to bridge the gap with her grandchildren, although she did not pass the language to her own children. "It's too late to turn back the clock," she said. "But if I had stayed on my language, my own children would be speaking today.

The teachers in residential school were very strict, she noted, and that approach to childrearing spilled over into her own parenting skills. Even though her own children tell her "oh mom, you weren't that bad," Ms. Nolan said that she is still wracked with guilt over how she raised her children in the harsh glare of hindsight.

Some of the stories related at the conference were only spoken in the language, prompting Jeanette Corbiere-Lavell to lament "it's too bad there isn't simultaneous translation, it's really funny when you can understand."

"I usually remember the funny things," admitted Ms. Nolan. "Those are the things that I like to remember—but there were other times."

Ms. Nolan noted that the conference functions as a safe

place and that it takes time to reconcile the past. "We are here today," she said. "We will continue our lives. Remembering your days at residential school is okay. You have the resources to do that."

The second day of the conference was further focussed on the process of reconciliation, including an elders' panel for 'Reconciliation of Body, Mind and Spirit' moderated by Ms. Nolan and Dan Garcia.

The afternoon session on the second day included a presentation on 'Caring for, and Healing, Body, Mind and Spirit though Miijim (food),' presented by Mary Ellan Flamand of the Wild Rice Project in Wikwemikong and Cody Leeson of the Child Nutrition Program at Noojmowin Teg.

The late afternoon of both days featured 'Fun Tyme' with Debajehmujig.

As part of the first day's activities artist Mark Seabrook took the attendees through an interactive art therapy presentation that engaged them in a creative process as an outlet. "Art can provide a great therapeutic outlet," he noted. Mr. Seabrook said that the sessions would be freeform, although he did hope that they would follow along the theme established by other sessions.

choke point" "key between the river and Lake Michigan, and the rest of the Great Lakes.

One of those members of Congress is the Democratic US Senator for Michigan Debbie Stabenow, who, along with fellow Michigan Senator Gary Peters, also a Democrat, called for the issuance of the plan.

"It's extremely alarming that it appears the Trump administration has decided to delay the release of today's plan, which is a critical part of our efforts to stop Asian carp and other invasive species from reaching our Great Lakes," Senator Stabenow told mlive.com, a Michigan local news website. "After a lengthy review process, which included extensive outreach and collaboration with a broad range of stakeholders, it seems that the administration has decided to side with a narrow group of special interests intent on preventing actions to address the movement of Asian carp toward Lake Michigan."

It has been suggested that the plan was to include an engineered channel, another electric barrier (one is already in place), water jets and noise cannons and a flushing lock system, which would be the first of its kind. The plan was expected to cost as much \$270 million to build and \$10 million to maintain, mlive.com reports.

The senator also called on the Trump administration to "fully explain the rationale for this delay and to provide a date for when this plan will be released."

The Expositor did reach out to Senator Stabenow's office to request an interview, but did not hear back from her by press time Monday.

Jim Nies, of Whitewater, Wisconsin and in the summer, Kagawong, expressed his disappointment to The Expositor at his country's new government taking such an action.

"Asian carp pose a serious threat to the Great Lakes' ecosystems and economy, including the \$7 billion fishing industry," Mr. Nies said. "Existing

barriers are not effective against juvenile fish, and larvae have been found less than 50 miles from Lake Michigan. Stopping their progress is an urgent imperative."

The plan for the Brandon Road Lock and Dam near Joliet, Ill., was set to be released by the US Army Corps of Engineers, an important step toward finalizing a project that was expected to call for barriers at a key choke-point on a Chicago-area river," Mr. Nies continued. "But this plan has now been put on hold by the Trump administration."

"The reason for the stoppage is resistance by corporate interests in the Joliet. Illinois, area, assisted by their anti-environmental right wing Republican allies," he said bluntly. "The damage done to the Great Lakes by Asian carp will be minimal in Illinois, but will be devastating in

other states, and especially bad for Ontario. I've called my (Wisconsin) senators and US House representative. Both Republican senator Ron Johnson and congressman Sensenbrenner have given me the pro forma response, but it is obvious from their previous statements and actions that they don't really give a damn about the dam, the fish, the environment, or the people they are supposed to represent. Democratic senator Tammy Baldwin will try to help but is outnumbered.

"I see this not just as a possible invasion by a murderous fish but an actual attack on the livelihood and quality of life of the people of Canada," Mr. Nies sup plied. "I think the government of Canada should vociferously object to the delay, and likely suspension, of the plan to stop Asian carp."




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# New Central Manitoulin fire hall moves to RFP stage

by Michael Erskine (with files from Tom Sasvari) MINDEMOYA—No existing fire halls will be harmed in the building of the new Central Manitoulin fire hall planned for Mindemoya, except the one the new hall will replace.

Council voted to send out a request for proposals for construction of the new fire hall during the February 24 council meeting.

"We are hoping that the fire hall will be complete by late this fall. That is the game plan," said Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens, following the council meeting.

The new building will be constructed on Highway 542 on a property beside the Mindemoya Motel.

During the council meeting, a recommendation from the property committee, "that the design plans be approved as presented by Dan Moody of Tulloch Engineering for the as discussed, and to direct staff to proceed to the tendering stage of the project" was passed. Everything that needed to be done has been done, includstage ing having the site cleared, engineering drawings completed and approved," said Mayor Stephens, "now we go to the tendering stage for the construction."

The designs for the new fire hall include a 46 foot by 105 foot building with a total of 4,830 square feet. It is anticipated that the building will include a pre-engineered steel building frame designed in accordance with the Ontario Building Code 2012 as a "Post-Disaster" building and it will include energy efficient structural insulated walls and roof panels, have a three (fire) truck capacity and will meet provincial accessible

There will be energy efficient LED lighting and dark sky compliant exterior lighting, as well as an emergency decontamination shower, automatic gas detection/ventilation system and a vehicle exhaust system.

The design team will include Tulloch Engineering, MET Energy Systems and David Ellis Architect Inc.

Funding for the new fire hall is in place, noted Mayor Stephens. "Like any other major project, we will review the tenders we receive and then determine if we have to scale down the project slightly, or get suggestions from contractors on what we can do." He pointed out that Tehkummah Township and the Town of Gore Bay/Gordon Barrie Island have both had new fire halls constructed in the past few years. "It is very important to have the proper equipment and facilities in place for the community," he added.

The municipality has four existing fire halls, one each in the communities of Providence Bay, Spring Bay, Sandfield and Mindemova.

Mayor Stephens noted that the old fire hall in Mindemoya will likely be sold off as the municipality has no future plans for the facility.

#### High tech library

councillors discussed the many high-tech additions that are now housed within the Assiginack Public Library that will soon be available to the public, including virtual reality, a green screen and much more.

#### All greased up

Council reviewed report from Public Works Superintendent Ron Cooper regarding the automatic greaser purchase for the municipal grader. He explained that the pricey greaser injects a small amount of grease every hour while the vehicle is in operation.

"It's a good thing," Mr. Cooper explained.

The total bill to fix the aging grader came in at just above \$52,000 still cheaper than purchasing a new one, it was noted.

#### Manitowaning lagoon

report Council reviewed the Manitowaning lagoon preliminary engineering study report which found the lagoon in need of two new master aerators to replace the nine mechanical aerators currently in place. The two aerators come at a cost of \$120,000 with an estimated annual energy savings of 121 MWh and an estimated simple payback of four years, saving \$14,400 each year in energy costs.

"It will be a nightmare,

but we really have to do it because of the savings that will be realized," said CAO Alton Hobbs.

Mr. Hobbs explained that the report was funded, but the project wouldn't be.

Councillor Hugh Moggy asked if it would be billed back to the users. Yes, Mr. Hobbs replied, adding that these costs would ultimately impact taxpayers positively through the savings in operating the facility back to them through sav-

"You've got to spend money to get money," Councillor Moggy added.

Councillor Fields noted its cost effectiveness in terms of maintenance as well as in hydro savings.

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

is routinely given at 12 months (as MMR, or measles, mumps, rubella) and again at 4 to 6 years of age before starting school (as MMRV, where V is for varicella, or chickenpox). If you are a parent or guardian, check to make sure your children's vaccinations are up-to-date, the SDHU states.

Adults born between 1970 and 1992 in Ontario may have only received one dose of mumps containing vaccine. A second

dose is recommended for adults in this age group who are post-secondary students or health care workers. Your healthcare provider may recommend a second dose based on a health assessment. Adults born before 1970 are assumed to be immune to mumps through natural infection.

"Check with your health care provider to make sure your vaccines are up-to-date and get vaccinated if mumps is missing," the SDHU urges. "That is the

best way to protect yourself and your family from being infected. An infected person can easily spread mumps in crowded environments such classrooms, sports teams, and student residences, and vaccination is your best defense."

was far more complex than that of the Manitoulin Central Family Health Team for many reasons, one being the obligation to continue service while the ED was under construction," added Ms. Foster. "MHC's seasoned professionals and solid team approach contributed to the project's successful close."

The project was divided into two phases so as to maintain ED service continuance. The first phase highlighted the addition of a two-bed major resuscitation suite for trauma patients, an isolation suite for infectious cases, and an area specific to the treatment of minor injuries. A dedicated space for triage and registration were also added, adjacent to the nursing station. Clear lines of site throughout the patient care area were determined, enhancing patient safety.

The second phase featured the addition of a room designed to match the needs of mental health patients, along with a connecting family room. Also, a brighter and larger patient waiting area was included to enhance the patients' experience.

"The physicians are excited by the many new features available in the emergency department including a family room, a double bay trauma room and an infectious diseases room," commented Dr. Simone Miekleham. "We look forward to working in the new department and seeing our sick patients there."

Concurrent with the renovations, a daylong 'Value Stream Mapping' session was held, led by MHC's VP Clinical and Chief Nursing Officer (VP/CNO), Pat Morka, to assess the existing patient flow patterns and how best to improve them under the new Emergency Department footprint.

"I was impressed with the participants' enthusiasm and commitment to improving the quality and efficiency of MHC's emergency services," said Ms. Morka. "It was unanimously demonstrated."

This session was well attended by various stakeholders, including one of MHC's

volunteer patient advisors. This day was very productive, leading to several improvements which are now being implemented.

"I believe the optimum treatment flow plan was achieved and continued communications amongst all parties will assure its success," said MHC patient advisor Ivan Edwards.

The successful completion of this project is extremely meaningful to those involved. It represents vision, commitment and tireless efforts in planning and execution. Ultimately, this new ED represents a legacy for generations of patients to come.

As a reminder, the east side entrance adjacent to the Family Health Team is to be used to access emergency services at this site. The canopied, west side entrance is to be used for patients seeking outpatient services such as lab, X-ray, ultrasound, physio, specialists clinics and nutrition counselling.



# New Island business strives to improve health and safety in the workplace

MANITOULIN—Meredith Chandler of Kagawong has launched a new business, Health and Safety Matters, which aims to help Manitoulin businesses and organizations by improving workplace safety.

"I know from past experiences that it can be difficult to establish health and safety regulations in the workplace," said Ms. Chandler of her new venture. "My hope is that I can help with the learning curve and assist businesses and organizations establish health and safety programs, or if they have a good foun-

dation, update or improve their program."

Ms. Chandler said her focus is to assist organizations in gaining a better understanding of the legislated requirements, more specifically, how current safety laws apply to their particular business.

"Almost every workplace, employer, supervisor and worker in Ontario is covered by the Occupational Health and Safety Act (OHSA) and its regulations," explained Ms. Chandler. "My goal is to ensure your organization is compliant through the development, implementation and

maintenance of an effective, dynamic Health and Safety Program. Whether you are starting from scratch, or perhaps require updating to your present

system, no job is too big or

too small when it comes to

protecting your greatest asset—people."

Ms. Chandler stressed that she is not a "safety enforcer" and that she won't be judging workplace safety. "My intent is to work on behalf of the employers/owners/supervisors to ensure a program that meets legislated requirements," she said.

To make things easier for employers, Ms. Chandler has become an instructor for the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS).

"I know many programs offer this required training online, which is convenient in remote areas, however I feel the on-site instruction offers many worthwhile benefits," Ms. Chandler shared. "The program I instruct includes both the original WHMIS 1988, as well as the Globally Harmonized System (GHS) implemented in February 2015. The GHS is an international system and is mandated to be fully incorporated in Canada by 2018. During this transition stage, employers, supervisors and workers (all relevant parties within the organization) are to be trained in both.'

Ms. Chandler has 22

years of experience with health and safety regulations. She has worked in the construction industry for several years and more recently in the industrial and mining industry.

"I am the mother of two young workers, and as such, I have a particular interest in promoting awareness regarding workplace parties' rights and responsibilities," she said of her passion for workplace safety. "I always ask myself, 'would I leave my son or daughter at this site and walk way feeling secure that they will come home at the end of the shift?' If it's not safe enough for them, it's not safe enough for anyone else's loved ones either.'

There will be a lunch break with a buffet featuring regional ingredients at 12:30 pm.



# Paws for Thought

with Dr. Janice Mitchell

No, this is not meant to be a depressing article based on Rachel Carson's "Silent Spring." Instead, as spring is thankfully around the corner, it is to be an enlightening article pertaining to some immediate vegetative hazards

This time of year, luckily, shamrock plants (oxalis species) are in abundance. As my own cat Bee can attest to, their lovely green tendrils are the ultimate temptation. Alas, they are toxic to both dogs and cats. Although a large ingestion is necessary for poisoning to occur, the clinical signs of toxicosis include drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, and tremors. The onset of signs can occur within 24-36 hours. Generally prognosis is excellent with few problems other than gastrointestinal irritation.

Soon, Easter lilies will be cropping up for sale in the stores. This is one plant that I would not advise having in the house if you have a cat. Lilies (Easter, Asiatic, or day lilies) are highly toxic to the feline. Just 1-2 leaves or petals, or drinking the vase water, is enough to cause kidney failure. Onset of clinical signs which include anorexia, vomiting, depression, occur within 6-12 hours. Prognosis is fair if treated early, less than 18 hours after ingestion.

Spring bulbs (crocus, hyacinth, amaryllis, narcissus, tulip) are just waiting beneath their frosty blanket to emerge. However, despite their beauty, they too can be a mild toxin to all species. The toxins are most concentrated in the bulbs and even small ingestions may cause signs.

Ingestion of leaves and flowers typically result in less severe signs. Drooling, vomiting, diarrhea and rarely cardiac arrhythmias and seizures may occur. Prognosis is good with early and appropriate care.

So what is a plant loving pet owner to do? There is hope. First, especially for our indoor felines, 'cat grass' is an irresistible finicky cat treat.

Basically a combination of oat and wheat grass, 'cat grass' is a quick to germinate grass. The fresh young grass keeps them from chewing on your prized houseplants. No, it doesn't help with furballs, nor does it satisfy vitamin B deficiencies...it just satisfies a craving that only 'O'Malley'

Second, the ultimate treat, catnip (Nepeta Cataria). Brought to America by early colonists, it was used for numerous medicinal properties, including inducing a good night's sleep and a remedy for cold and fevers. Today its uses are largely confined to feline entertainment as its active ingredient is a mild hallucinogen. Rubbing, rolling, and other merry making actions are produced, though one should be careful as aggressive behaviour is often made worse by catnip indulgence.

Response to catnip is inherited genetically as a dominant trait, which means that not all cats will be affected. Furthermore, kittens under age 6 to 8 weeks are not able to

"The Ox knows its owner, and the donkey its master's crib, but Christians do not understand", IS.1:3. Isaiah and many of the other prophets spoke to people who were spiritual deaf and blind, IS.6:10. Jesus did the same, MAT.15:14, 23:11 and 17. 24+27, JOHN 12:40. Today I am facing the exact same problem, people "Christians" cannot discern between the voice of God and the voice of Satan. They do not hear Yahweh say, "Remember to sanctity the 7th day (Sabbath). They do not hear Yahweh say: "not sanctifying the Sabbath is as serious a sin as Yahweh say: "not sanctifying the Sabbath is as serious as sin as murder or adultery, and it has the same results. A person who does not sanctify the Sabbath will not enter the (Millennial) Kingdom of God." The voice of God always agrees 100% with what the Bible says, God inspired it and he will not contradict himself. You cannot have both; you either understand or are confused, you either obey God or you disobey God. But when you disobey, you will automatically be blind, deaf and confused. But because you are (spiritual) blind, you cannot see yourself how (spiritual) deaf and confused you are. And the only way to prevent spiritual blindness, deafness and confusion is by first making up your mind that you are going to obey all of God's commandments (do God's will). Notice Isaiah 1:19: "If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land (enjoy the blessings)." See also DEUT 28:1-16. The most important lesson that every person needs to learn is that the only way we may expect God to bless us is by first making up our minds that we are going to live in obedience to God's commandments, Acts 5:32, 1 John 3:22. And let no one deceive you into believing that these commandments do not include the sanctifying of the seventh day Sabbath (Friday sunset till Saturday sunset). All true servants of God will remind you to sanctify the Sabbath: Moses, LEV.26+34+35, Isayah, IS.56:1-7, Jeremiah, 2 CRON.36:21, JER.17+19-27., Nehemiah, NEH.13:15-20, Ezekiel, EZ.20:12,13,16,20,21+24. The sanctifying of the Sabbath is the basic sign by which to recognize a true Christian, EX. 31:12-18. And do not expect that you will enter the Kingdom of God because you agree with the other 9 commandments, James 2:10. 

Catnip is felt to be a safe and non-addictive recreational drug for cats but there is some thinking that overdose can produce seizures. For this reason, it is best not used in cats with a history of seizures. Chronic exposure to catnip may cause an apparent loss of mental faculty and a possible personality change.

Now how about toxins for our livestock? With few exceptions, livestock will not eat poisonous plants unless forced to by hunger. Thus, the single most important way to prevent poisoning is to use proper range and pasture management to provide ample forage.
