Children's Aid Society now subject to third party oversight

TORONTO—As of the beginning of March, the province's children's aid societies are no longer immune from investigation by the province. Starting March 1, the provisions of Bill 8, the Public Sector and MPP Accountability and Transparency Act, 2014, which amended the Provincial Advocate for Children and Youth

Act, 2007, placed authority to investigate children's aid societies, including Native children. under the Office of the Provincial Advocate for Children and Youth. That agency now has the authority to investigate matters concerning a child or a group of children receiving services from a children's aid society (CAS) or a resi-...continued on page 9

Amber Ale in slaking the thirsts of the more than 800 beer aficionados who attended the event.

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

Assiginack student honoured at Rideau Hall as Imagine a Canada contest winner

OTTAWA—Assiginack Public School Grade 6 student Drake Trudeau was one of 10 youth selected from across Canada for his entry in the inaugural Imagine a Canada competition organized by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation (NCTR) and was honoured by Canada's Governor General the Honourable David Johnston at a special event held last week at Rideau Hall in Ottawa.

Imagine a Canada is a national art and essay competition that calls on youth to share their vision on what the future of Canada will look like through the lens of reconciliation.

Drake's entry begins in Ojibwe, stating his name and where he is from. He goes on to speak about his grandmother and how she went to residential school

"Her family life at home wasn't great, so the family thought it was best to let my Nookomis (grandmother) and her sisters go away to school," wrote Drake in his award-winning essay. "My Nookomis is smart and really busy, always going to meetings and working at being Anishinabe.'

Drake goes on to speak of attending Assiginack Public School in Manitowaning, but living in Wikwemikong and the differences between his school and the schools in his community.

"I go to school at Assiginack Public School in the neighbouring community off the reserve, even

though there is a school on my reserve," Drake writes. "My parents tell me that the services are not same (Wikwemikong), because there aren't enough helpers in the classroom, and my parents wanted to make sure I get help. When I first went to school at Assiginack, there were many things I found to be different. There is a district-wide speech competition that I never had to participate in before. There was music and a choir. I got to go on trips to see plays, ski trips, and half of our school got a week at Tim Horton's camp. So far, the kids on my reserve aren't getting the same chance to experience those things.

He also notes that at Assiginack Public School he gets to use iPads in the classroom and chrome books and other technology, but that the student's in Wikwemikong don't have the same opportunity because there isn't enough money.

"Imagine if not just the off reserve kids got iPads for learning, and got to learn using modern technology like the rest of us?" questioned Drake. "Imagine if there was enough help in the classroom with teachers' aides to help students keep up? Imagine if there was no off reserve and on reserve differ-

"My Nookomis is busy using her language and culture because the residential schools wouldn't let her use Anishnabemowin," Drake concludes in his essay. "Imagine if I knew more Anishnabemowin than just

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Gore Bay Theatre brings 'Kindertransport' by Diane Samuels to the Manitoulin stage

GORE BAY—'Kindertransport' may be the the most ambitious production the Gore Bay Theatre troupe has ever brought to the stage. The complexities of following the stories of Jewish children rescued from the horrors of Nazi Germany prior to the outbreak of World War II are immense, so it is a good thing that directors Walter Maskel and Andrea Emmerton have not only their own decades of experience to draw upon but also a stable of veteran actors from which to craft the tale.

'Kindertransport' is a play by Diane Samuels that examines the life, during world war II and death camps

afterwards, of a Kindertransport child. Although the story relayed in the play is fictitious, it is based upon many real kindertransport stories. Kindertransport was the name given to the operation which transported Jewish children and others whose ethnic origins made them targets for persecution out of Nazi Germany at the start of World War II. As the Nazis would not allow a parent to accompany their child, and frightened and on their own, these children—some as young as five-years-old—travelled by boat and train to safety in England. Most of their parents were to perish in the

"It is probably the most challenging play we have done in our lifetime," admits Mr. Maskel. "Not only do the actors have to explore four different mother/daughter relationships, examined at different times and places, they also have to take on accents." In the case of the main protagonist, the actress must master her lines in German, broken English, a German accented English and, in later life, speak the Queen's English.

"It is a history lesson come to life," said Mr. Maskel, noting that in the context of today's refugee crisis the play's character development takes on a current theme as

Innovative use of scents looks to improve G. Lakes sea lamprey control

GREAT LAKES—Man has tackled Mother Nature's barriers to commerce with gusto ever since we descended from the forest canopy, and in the early days of the industrial revolution engineering developed methods of bypassing those barriers with the exponential exuberance—with a concurrent (and some might say arrogant) disregard and ignorance of the impact our efforts would have on the often delicate balance of her designs. So it was with the sea lamprey.

Luckily, man has discovered innovative ways to help control the explosive growth of the sea lamprey that have proved very successful. Now a new use for scents (pheromones to be more technically correct) promise even greater success.

Sea lampreys are native to the vast waters of the North Atlantic, but with the creation of artificial waterways to connect the St. Lawrence to the Great Lakes and the interior of the North American continent, the parasites inevitably found their way in as

Sea lampreys were first observed in Lake Ontario in the 1830s, but it was not until improvements to the Welland Canal in 1919 that these voracious parasites invaded Lake Erie, first observed in in those waters in 1921. After their spread into Lake Erie, sea lampreys moved swiftly to invade the other Great Lakes, appearing in Lake St. Clair in 1934, Lake Michigan in 1936, our own Lake Huron in 1937 and Lake Superior by 1938. By the late 1940s, sea lamprey populations had exploded in all of the upper Great Lakes causing severe damage to lake trout and other critical fish species.

Once it invaded the waters of the Great Lakes, the sea lamprey, with its voracious appetite and facing few natural controls or predators in these waters, the parasite's numbers soon devastated the Great Lakes fisheries. To give an idea of the scale involved, by the 1940s lake trout harvests had plummeted from 18 million pounds a year to less than 300,000 pounds. It wasn't only lake trout either, the sea lamprey sucked the life out of many other species (such as whitefish) as well.

In efforts to control sea lamprey numbers, and to protect the Great Lakes fisheries, millions of dollars were marshalled into research and practical efforts that brought the sea lamprey population down dramatically. Chief among those efforts has been the use of a pesticide that, entered into the waterways where the sea lamprey spawns, kills the creatures long before they stretch out their fins into the larger bodies of

In 1955 the Integrated Sea Lamprey Control Program was established in order to tackle the issue. The joint program between Canada and the US has had great success in minimizing damage to Great Lakes fisheries and soon sea lamprey spawning had been reduced by about 90 percent. The program relied on a specific pesticide in conjunction with physical barriers on spawning streams and it proved very successful. Unfortunately, the pesticide was not entirely benign and has resulted in tragic losses of endangered species.

Sea lampreys have a very unique life cycle and it is in their adult phase where they cause the most damage to Great Lake fish-

Tentative trial date set for case of Green Bay farmer vs MNRF

GORE BAY—A tentative trial date has been set for Paul Skippen vs. the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry in the case of the dead

Last July, Green Bay farmer Paul Skippen was charged with four counts after shooting a Canada goose without a permit and leaving it in his field—unlawfully hunting a migratory bird outside the open season, failing to immediately make every reasonable effort to retrieve a migratory bird, unlawfully discharging a firearm in the travelled portion of a right of way for public vehicular traffic and knowingly making a false statement to a conservation officer—and plans to appeal all of them in Gore Bay court.

Mr. Skippen told The Expositor that a trial date has been tentatively scheduled for July 25 to 28, but will attend another court date on June 9 to firm up those dates.

Northeast Town council passes ammended animal control bylaw

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council passed the amended animal control bylaw at last Tuesday's meeting.

The changes to the bylaw focused on defining the term 'kennel' and

dealing with barking dogs. Under the new definition of 'kennel,' kennels are limited to areas zoned for the purpose of boarding and breeding dogs and associated commercial activity and only on property of at least five acres.

Also under the changes, kennels are now defined as "a building, structure or fenced area (or part of) where dogs are kept, raised, boarded and used for commercial purposes including, but not limited to, the keeping of rescue animals and operating doggie daycares.'

Councillor Laurie Cook, who opposed the changes to the bylaw at the community services and public works committee where they were first discussed, once again stated that she would like the portion of the kennel definition that's limited to rescue animals and doggie daycares to be removed from the bylaw.

There are people in our community offering these types of services that shouldn't be discouraged," said Councillor Cook.

Town CAO Dave Williamson explained that he had spoken with both the individual that operates a doggie daycare in the community and one of the rescue operators, and told them that the changes to the bylaw would not impact their services.

Carbon cost plans require clear oversight for credibility

News that the freshly announced Ontario cap and trade program is expected to raise \$1.9 billion annually as soon as 2017, making it the single largest source of new provincial revenue, played easily into a cynics' view of the program as a simple provincial government "cash grab."

Most people, at least according to recent polls exploring Canadians' feelings on the issue, are in favour of taking action on the environment and dealing with the impact of climate change—even if it does cost us more. But judging from the anecdotal feedback in coffee shops across the nation, we all still would prefer if someone else to picked up the tab.

Analysis of the Ontario cap and trade program, crafted and linked to the Western Climate Initiative that includes Quebec and California, suggests that the average household could be footing the bill to the tune of about \$13 per month more in energy and fuel costs by 2017. Gas prices are set to go up by 4.3 cents per litre, while monthly heating costs for the average home are projected to climb by \$5, and these are estimates that are based on the current price of carbon, a price that is set to rise steadily over the next few years as the carbon caps drop.

There is some putative good news, the Ontario budget has claimed that under the plan electricity bills will drop by \$2 a month—but the magic wand by which that will come to pass remains shrouded in the political mists. The government has promised that newly raised \$1.9 billion will be spent on initiatives to cut greenhouse gases through investments in public transit, clean technology and making homes and businesses more energy efficient—all welcome news to be sure.

Meanwhile, played against the backdrop of the cap and trade announcement by Ontario, Canada's First Ministers have sat down at the table in their first meeting in a decade, coming out of their twoday palaver with an agreement for a plan to develop a framework for climate policy action. Considering how wide the policy ravines the 14 ministers had to bridge to reach that common ground, that they managed to come out of the room with any kind of coherent agenda is quite remarkable and bodes well for the future, but the final analysis of that agreement will not be clear until the four working groups set up in the agreement make their deliberations public next October.

Still, a pan-Canadian policy plan has been promised for early 2017. If any of these optimistic first steps are to have any chance to succeed, they will need to be accompanied by an almost unprecedented level of transparency and accountability both in the collection of the carbon costs and in the distribution of the largesse flowing from the consumers' pockets into government coffers.

While the federal government has provided at least the appearances of a more open and approachable regime than that practiced by their iron-fisted predecessors, the embattled Ontario government has given the appearance of moving in the opposite direction.

Democracy has always been messy. It is a difficult system prone to short-sighted decisions and fraught with opportunities for disaster with every policy misstep that opposition critics are quick to exploit—the temptation to hide behind bureaucratic obfuscation grows more intense with each day in power. But if the consumers of this province are going to be asked to pay their share of saving humanity from its own worst excesses, they will need to be convinced that their hard earned money is going where they government has promised. That requirement holds true for both the Ontario and the pan-Canadian initiative.

A friend of the Norisle weighs in on the debate

Ship was ready to sail to drydock, why is council balking?

To the Expositor:

As a member of the Friends of the Norisle I am appalled by the attitude towards the future status of the Norisle. This is an opportunity for our municipality to improve the economic growth for the Manitoulin and the whole of Northern Ontario.

I would like to address some of the comments that were presented at the Assiginack council meeting held on January 19 and outlined in The Expositor. When the Friends of the Norisle was formed in 2007, Assiginack council told our group that it could find various uses for the ship, any uses that would be beneficial to the area (and there have been many over the years).

At that time, our first project was to have a study done and this was paid for with a gift from an interested individual—there was no money spent by the Assiginack council. From that study we received a massive report that outlined what should be done to the boat to prepare it to be a passenger cruise ship. Along with that study we received a thorough business plan showing proposed income and expenses and which showed a generous profit.

Mr. Moffat infers in the recent interview that the boat is not worthy of being restored, contrary to the opinion of a professional naval architect. In fact, there are many ships running on the Great Lakes today that are well over 100-years-old. I am afraid that the mayor's knowledge of large steamships is quite limited. We do not expect anyone in the group (known also as the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society) or here locally to have the knowledge of this technology—we are not experts. Council doesn't have the expertise, but we have accumulated the professionals with this expertise.

We have worked closely with experts like Wayne Fisher who restores steam engines from all across Canada and the US. In fact, he is considered an expert in steam power.

Mr. Fisher is the owner of Engineered Electric in Toronto and is also owner of the Ontario Steam Heritage Museum in Milton. I think that he

knows steam power inside and out. He has come up to Manitowaning several times, packed up parts from the ship, taken them back home, restored them completely and brought them back. Seven or eight truck loads of steam equipment have been overhauled completely from Norisle and done it all with absolutely no cost to the local community or to the Assiginack council.

Also, we were able to acquire the services of John Coulter, recently retired from TSSA (Technical Standards and Safety Authority) as a chief officer and Bill Graham who is a naval architect, retired from Transport Canada Marine Safety. This group of experts came here, drew up a complete design for a successful cruise ship on the Great Lakes. They presented this to our Society, showing that some areas were wonderful as they were; and some areas, such as the dining room and staterooms were to be enlarged. Following their input, we have done everything that was recommended by the report paid for by Government of Ontario and Fed Nor. The ship was then completely ready to go to the dry dock in Sault Ste. Marie. We just awaited funding from the Ontario Ministry of Tourism.

Mr. Moffat referred to this grant money: Assiginack council had signed to acquire this grant of \$150,000 (the one we were expecting) and the money would have come in two weeks, with absolutely no obligation to the council. Assiginack council cancelled it. The grant never came.

To this point, all the money which we have spent has been donated—we've had no government grants and no money from the municipality. Generous donations of about a million dollars indicate the interest in this project. We have a supporting membership of over 200 from Ontario, Canada and North America.

Although the council may not be prepared to continue with this project, we, as the Friends of the Norisle, along with our expert partners, are ready to do it. Why is the council working against it?

Refugee update

Mindemoya refugee family delayed by red tape, other families settling in nicely

MANITOULIN-Manitoulin's newest residents, the Eritrean-Canadian families who arrived last month, are settling in nicely thanks to the hard work of an army of volunteers, while in Manitowaning, that community anxiously awaits its family, due to arrive on Tuesday, March 15.

We are super excited," said an enthusiastic Lianne Hovingh, representing the core group of volunteers that will help the Manitowaning family. "We have a family of seven: a father, mother, 22-year-old daughter, 21-year-old son, 19-year-old son, an 11year-old son and an eight-year-old grand-

The house is ready to welcome them, although Ms. Hovingh admits with a laugh that it may have to be dusted first as its been ready to go for quite some time.

'The community has been fantastic," she said of Assiginack, also taking the time to thank Ben and Sarah Quackenbush and the Little Current group for "paving the way" for the Manitowaning group, providing helpful advice along the way.

We've been encouraged to walk alongside them," Ms. Hovingh explained. "The first few weeks are crucial to meet their emotional needs. I have no expectations, but to walk alongside them. We will just do the best we can do.

She noted that this family, like the larger Little Current family, is coming from a refugee camp and has likely been there for many years.

"It's so exciting that we have a date and they're actually coming," Ms. Hovingh enthused.

In Little Current, Sarah Quackenbush couldn't be any happier with the way things have gone for her family, a mother and two children: a girl, 7, and boy, 8—the same age as her own children.

"It was a very busy first week," Ms. Quackenbush told The Expositor. "The family stayed with us the first week and our kids are the same age so they did what children do, played together—language wasn't an issue. They are already absorbing so

much English. By the end of the week they were already putting together short sentences.'

The children have fallen in love with snow, she was pleased to report, adding that she felt a little heartbroken when she told the boy that soon the snow would be gone and saw a tear appear in his eye. They have been doing what many Little Current children do in the wintertime: they've gone skating at the recreation centre, sledding at the Manor hill, went for a snowmobile ride, built snowmen and had a snowball fight.

Ms. Quackenbush sung the praises of Little Current Public School, where the two children are attending school. "The whole school has really gone above and beyond and really helped to make the transition a good one.

The mother speaks some English and will soon start English as a second language (ESL) classes with the hopes of moving onto continuing education with an eye on elder care or perhaps housekeeping. Ms. Quackenbush said the mom is busy throughout the day sewing and learning to cook Canadian dishes, but is excited for the ESL classes to begin. "She just keeps saying thank you and is overjoyed to be here. She definitely wants to work hard and contribute."

'One of our worries was bringing these families to Canada in the dead of winter,' Ms. Quackenbush admitted. "I kept thinking, 'what are we doing?' They went from 41° every day there now to this, but they bundle up and wear their snowpants, to the post office or to the grocery store, and they're doing really well. They are so eager to try anything new."

Ms. Quackenbush said the day they moved them into their new home they brought the family door to door to meet the neighbours. "Everyone was so nice," she said, listing the comments such as 'if you ever have any trouble you just come here, 'I'll shovel your driveway,' 'if you have problems with your plumbing, you come to me.' "I know they're surrounded by good

In Western Manitoulin, Gore Bay has welcomed a grandmother and her teenaged son to the community and, according to volunteer Greg Bond, the pair are doing well and loving Manitoulin.

"Everyone I talk to, I tell them how impressed I am with them," Mr. Bond said. "(The teenager) speaks pretty darn good English. His abilities, both speaking and reading, floor me."

He noted that the grandmother spoke not a word of English, but is picking up words by the day. "The grandmother has been working really hard," Mr. Bond said. "She's a tiny wee thing-five foot nothing and barely 100 pounds—but she's tough as nails. They are the only ones left of their family, and she got him here."

Mr. Bond noted that the teenager started school the same day as the Little Current teenagers and "loves it."

"And the school did a stunningly brilliant thing," he added, explaining that the new students are all taking two gym classes, music, art and math. "It gets them socialized, improves their English and gets them credits-they can launch into the tough stuff this fall."

Mr. Bond said that the teen is also mesmerized by hockey and has caught a number of games at the Gore Bay arena. He also watched a bit of Ontario Hockey League play at Mr. Bond's house on Sunday after-

"They're adapting well, but they have a long way to go yet," he said, adding that the next phase is to continue to work on the grandmother's English and teaching them Canadian ways. Knitting classes will soon begin for the grandmother, a social outing too, and her two to three hour-long visits each day will continue.

In Mindemoya, the family the community has been so anxiously awaiting is on temporary hold as everyone, volunteers and the Canadian government included, didn't realize there was a new addition to the family, a baby who didn't have a Visa thereby halting the immigration process. The Mindemoya group is trying to make arrangements to get things moving for the new arrival, but time is of the essence.

Back in Little Current, the family of seven is also enjoying their new surroundings, schoolmates and getting to work.

Linda Erskine, the Little Current core group lead, explained that the family had a wonderful time with the other Eritrean families in Gore Bay over the weekend at a party hosted by Central Pharmacy proprietor Kidane Gebrekristose, a fellow Eritrean-Canadian. And on Monday, the adult son began work at a Little Current business, which he enjoyed very much. He also had opportunity to tap maple trees with Dr. Roy Jeffery, a member of the group.

The 21-year-old is a quick learner and eager to work. Anyone with odd jobs, and patience for the language barrier, is encouraged to think about hiring the young man on.

Ms. Erskine said the group is also putting a call out for senior volunteers, also with patience, to step forward to spend time with the mother, a widow in her 50s.

'With the adult son working and the children at school, the mom is going to be home alone," Ms. Erskine said. "We are looking for people with patience to go in and bake with her while going through the ingredients in English, take her to the seniors' group at the library some mornings, someone from the quilters guild or a sewing group to teach her handcrafts." She added that on Friday night she will be taking the three boys to volleyball at LCPS and hopes someone from that group will take that role on henceforth.

Ms. Erskine said that a couple is also volunteering their time to teach other volunteers Cambridge ESL to teach the new family and asks that people consider signing themselves up for this task.

To the Expositor:

Is our Island newspaper important?

Did you know that in 1944, the tiny shed of Mr. Alex Purvis at the Providence Bay dock waterfront had to be tore down after the steamer Manitoulin, in turning too wide, crashed into it and damaged it beyond repair?

Did you know that in 1943 rationing of canned salmon, tobacco, butter and gasoline (which the latter could not be used for pleasure driving and you could be fined if caught out sightseeing in a vehicle) was kept on close watch due to the war overseas and the need for gas for the war effort.

Did you know the government, that is the Agriculture Department, realized tobacco was in short supply and wanted farmers to up their production for the armed forces

Did you know that in 1944, near the war's end, that par-

tridge hunting season was started once again since no hunting was allowed due to a lack of ammunition (lead and brace were needed for the war). Did you know that Canada gave aid to 60,000 refugees in

Russia in 1943, money was collected from people on the Manitoulin and elsewhere and sent to the refugee families? Russia took the brunt of the war against the Nazis. Did you know that Manitoulin Island Co-operative

Turkey Growers Association had a good year in 1943? Prices for Grade A Turkeys in 1939 were 20 cents a pound; 1940, 25 cents per pound; 1941, 29 cents per pound.

Did you know that the games and fisheries minister wanted more beaver furs output, so beaver sanctuaries were increased in Ontario and also in James Bay?

I only picked items from our old Island newspapers from the war years. Yes, what a history book for our Island.

Can we do without them? No, not a chance!

Our local papers keep us informed on all issues, big and small. One of the big issues is our Great Lakes and we all need to voice our help such as the very well written letter by Jillian Bond-Smith which appeared in last week's paper.

If one city is allowed to start siphoning water from any of our lakes, we are dead in our tracks; there will be no stopping the deluge.

With these Island papers we can see where we've come from with a very informative, well written history.

Thanks to all the writers through the years.

The Ontario Landowners stick to their guns on interpretation of Bill 100

The opinions of association founder Randy Hillier and the minister responsible for the bill not withstanding

To the Expositor:

I have read, with interest, comments by the Bruce Trail Conservancy (BTC), Hike Ontario, etc. and I would like to take this opportunity to expand on our information regarding Bill 100. As the BTC, Hike Ontario, etc. could be considered an "eligible body" in Bill 100, I am curious as to how unbiased their opinion is and how, unfortunately, there have been erroneous or misinformed statements. I am also curious as to how unbiased any opinion of the eligible bodies, or members of the Ontario Trails Council can be, considering Bill 100 was created for them. Whereas, the Ontario Landowners Association (OLA) statements, based in fact, are merely for the protection of private property

Bill 100 states, under section 12 (3) the owner may grant an easement. From the Supreme Court of Canada, "The representation that he had an interest in land, which closely resembles an easement, was relied upon ... A verbal agreement which has been partly performed will be enforced...." Also, one can go to Duhaime for the definition of "easement" of which verbal agreements are also men-

Therefore, a verbal agreement can and is an easement, as it creates an interest for some other party. Merely

because, in past interaction between any of the eligible bodies there hadn't been registered easements, those agreements were easement, all the same. Now under Bill 100, section 12 (6) the eligible body shall (MUST) register the easement created, therefore neither the property owner or the eligible body have any choice, no matter what anyone, including the minister says. Everyone will be bound by the Act, wouldn't one agree?

Secondly, nowhere in the Act are there exemptions for handshake deals, verbal deals or arrangements of that kind. The focus of the bill was solely for the expansion and protection of the eligible bodies and their mandate. There is nothing in this bill for the protection of the private property owner whatsoever.

Thirdly, there have been statements in other media forums where it has been stated that: "The truth about trails is that they actually enhance the property value." I would suggest that property owners investigate comments made to the EBR 011-9565 Comment I.D. Number 160911, from an admitted lawyer, pertaining to the value of land. It is stated: "With respect to easements, registered easements do negatively impact property values and can make a property harder to sell.'

And finally it is felt that the OLA may continue refuting

the misinformation disseminated by any entity, considering comments expressed on EBR 011-9565 which consist of:

"Comment I.D. 160800: ...people visiting it and the community (Your Brain on Nature, Last Child in the Woods, Suzuki Fnd, OMNR: Estimating Ecosystem Services in S.

The Ontario Heritage Act or the Conservation land Act shall be modified to allow owners of trail easements to enforce access against private owners who have granted access for a term, and 9. The Ontario Planning Act shall be modified to ENCOURAGE severances for the purpose of allowing accredited conservation organizations to create nature reserves ...without meeting conditions for more than modest "road" access and without meeting "normal" lot size, configuration, waste disposal, or property taxation requirements."

The OLA is merely relaying proper information to ensure that those who have allowed trails, to have the information needed, to protect their private property and their


The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on March 21,

"They instead do the same job as a social service worker but call themselves child protection workers to escape the legal requirements and Ontarians suffer as a result.'

Mr. Killens noted the litany of issues surfacing daily about the CAS, noting that even the provincial Liberals, who he claims are noted for delaying decisions with studies and other tactics in dealing with issues such as Hydro One cost increases and the gas plant scandal, pointed to a quote from the premier of Ontario in which she declared herself "ready to do whatever it takes to fix the mess, including blowing up the existing system if necessary. I repeat 'blowing up,' she did not say correct, not study, not repair, but blow up. That says it all.'

"There is a litany of stories where families have been destroyed and harmed by well meaning, on the ground workers," continued Mr. Killens. "This may now force the private entities to not only have their people registered as required but to offer them training. CAS workers are not

even authorized to lay charges and police officers must consider and do so on the say of the those who are unregistered, untrained individu-

As of March 1, anyone who has a concern may now request an investigation from the Office of the Provincial Advocate for Children and Youth, but they must have first exhausted all other available complaint processes. For CAS, this will include the local CAS's internal complaints process or the Child and Family Services Review Board. As for children's residences, this will include the internal complaints process at the children's residence or the Ministry of Children and Youth Services.

The new investigative power also extends to First Nations children, but does not extend to those in youth justice facilities or children in mental health facilities. The Office of the Provincial Advocate for Children and Youth investigative powers only cover children's aid societies or a residential licensee where a CAS is the

we started out, but still small enough to retain touch with our roots."

Ms. Smith explained that it was important to herself and her business partner that their operation "grow authentically and maintain our values of being locally produced by local people here on Manitoulin.'

"We have had amazing support from people on the Island," noted Ms. Smith, pointing out that while the company has grown its own capital for the expansion of its facilities, they have enjoyed an incredible crowd-sourced base of vol-

"The existing services operated as home industry, and unless they hire outside employees or expand to a commercial level, they are able to continue offering their current services," said Mr. Williamson.

Councillor Bill Koehler suggested a few changes such as removing a portion that authorizes an animal control officer to enter on and inspect a kennel or any place that dogs are kept.

"We can't authorize going onto someone's property," said Councillor Koehler. Council agreed and that portion of the bylaw be removed.

He also suggested that the portion of the bylaw that stipulates, "No person shall allow a dog to unreasonably disturb the peace, quiet comfort or repose of any person or neighbour in any dwelling unit for a period for 30 minutes by way of barking, crying or howling. Failure to do so constitutes a breach of the bylaw," that the '30 minute' portion should be removed.

Council agreed, but wanted to keep the noise complaint log in place.

Council carried a motion to accept the animal control bylaw as amended.

...continued from page 3 eries. That adult phase lasts about 12-18 months. Adult lampreys die off during the spring, but first they swim up rivers to spawn. Once lamprey eggs hatch, the creatures go through a nonparasitic larval stage that lasts from three to six years, after that they enter the Great Lakes to feed upon the fish population. It is during the larval stage that sea lampreys are vulnerable to chemical control, but efforts also target the adults by interfering with their efforts to spawn successful-

A key component of these new efforts to tackle the sea lamprey, in the words of Michigan State University fish ecologist Dr. Michael Wagner, "we are trying to move away from brute force techniques like pesticides and achieve the environmentally most friendly control of lampreys possible."

Pheromones, those chemicals that animals and other critters use to get it together to get it on, have been used in the battle against lampreys for some time, but a new innovative study is honing those efforts right down to, well, a science.

It seems that lamprey use the scent of larvae to seek out the streams to spawn. Dr. Wagner notes that the scent of the larvae identify the best streams for their survival, thus the best places to deposit the future generation. "The odor larvae release says 'we're thriving here'," noted the fish ecologist.

The male lamprey travel to the streams to construct nests before release their own 'come hither' chemicals to attract females with which to mate.

Another pheromone released by dead or injured lampreys warns would be lovers away from deadly environs.

Researchers now hope to utilize these push-me-pullyou pheromones to deliver a one-two punch to lamprey populations. By releasing artificial versions of these pheromones into the water of selected streams they can warn lampreys off of the best streams for reproduction while at the same time luring the unsuspecting lovers into less attractive neighbourhoods.

Currently, the new techniques have not found their way into the 'wild' as it were with local sea lamprey controls, according to Paul Sullivan, division manager at the Sea Lamprey Control Centre in Sault Ste. Marie, but they are eliciting some excitement about the future.

In previous years, the Mindemoya River, the Manitou River, Silver Creek, Blue Jay Creek and Timber Bay Creek were all treated with the anti-lamprey pesticide locally.

While it seems obvious today that ecological problems involve complex and interconnected systems, the old way of thinking was to seek out the magic bullet that would work to correct a manmade imbalance in those systems. These days, invasive species managers are using an entire arsenal of weapons and techniques to provide cost effective solutions—it just takes scents.





"The culmination or next level of making the issues of confidence or self esteem public is to show how confidence looks and acts—we're now going to show the community how it looks and acts," Mr. Jones said of the fashion show event. "We're about real shapes, real shades and real confidence."

Mr. Jones explained that over the two days, the students would hear the life stories of the Turtle Concepts crew and are encouraged to share their own stories too

"We are always promoting education as a vehicle for confidence," he added

Mr. Jones said he left school teaching to launch Turtle Concepts because he saw a real need for the inclusion of self esteem in the school curriculum. "I would try to put myself in their (the bully's) mindspace," he added. "'Why do they act like that?' I come from a supportive home, they probably don't."


