Brave Island women discuss unusual health hardships

Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, rare disorder, afflicts Kari Bourque

LITTLE CURRENT—The pain of losing her twin sister is never far from the surface, but Kari Bourque takes some solace in knowing that the rare disease that took her sister's life at age 22, and only days after giving birth to her son, is not bringing pain and suffering to her now. In January 2010, the Little Current twin sisters, known for their

tiny statures and big attitudes, were driving home from Health Sciences North having just visited Kayla Bourque's new baby boy (who had to be hospitalized at birth) when the unthinkable happened. Kayla took an attack in the car, dying with her sister by her side. A coroner's report revealed that Kayla had died as a result of a ruptured aorta, but also uncovered something else; the young woman had been living with Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome (EDS) type four, or also known as the 'vascular type,' and he contacted Kari to see a geneticist as soon as possible as it was likely that she carried the disorder too.

Following some testing it was confirmed—the disease that took the closest person to Kari was now shadowing her life at every turn.

For people living with the genetic disorder, it means that they are lacking in the collagen found in the connective tissue of healthy people which means they are prone to tearing or rupture.

'Mutations in the COL3A1 gene cause the vascular type of Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome," the Ehlers-Danlos Network website states. "The protein made by the COL3A1 gene is used to assemble larger molecules called type III collagens. Collagens provide structure and strength to connective tissue throughout the body. Type III collagen is mostly found in skin, blood vessels, and internal organs. If the structure or production of type III collagen is altered by a mutation in the COL3A1 gene, collagen fibrils cannot be assembled properly in these tissues and the signs and symptoms of the Vascular Type of Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome result.'

Some signs of people living with EDS type four are thin, fragile skin that bruises easily; visible veins beneath the skin, particularly on the chest and abdomen; hands and feet with an aged appearance; protruding eyes; a thin nose and lips; sunken cheeks; and a small chin. Other signs can be an unusual range of motion of hand and foot joints; tearing of tendons and muscles; painfully swollen veins in the

Pancreas, kidney transplants will cure Dawn Young's rare diabetes

PROVIDENCE BAY—It was supposed to be a happy family diversion to cap off the summer season, but by the time seven-year-old Dawn Young had returned home with her family from visiting the Toronto Zoo, she had lost seven pounds and was diagnosed with Type I diabetes. That began a lifelong struggle against the disease that has cost the now 42-year-old woman the use of her pancreas and kidneys, but a recent qualification for the transplant list is holding out hope for a new lease on life.

Listening to Ms. Young chat on the telephone, it is hard to fathom the extent of her dire medical situation. Her voice is cheerful and tone upbeat, reflecting what her mother characterizes as the unsinkable nature of her character. Ms. Young herself points to the prospect of finally being free of her diabetes as tremendously uplifting.

"It has been emotional," she admits, "but I do count my blessings

It has been a very long road to this point. "The first sign we had that there was a problem was at the Toronto Zoo," recalled her mother Pat Young. "She had to stop at every water fountain to drink."

The family was left asking how a seven-year-old child could suddenly develop diabetes, there were even more questions. "You don't show any outward signs of the illness," noted Ms. Young. "Other than she had lost all that weight. Everybody thought 'cancer'

Ms. Young noted that it was Dr. David Stephen of Little Current (since retired) who diagnosed Type I diabetes, but it wasn't a simple and straightforward form of the disease.

"Apparently I have a very rare form of diabetes," confirmed Ms. Young. When most diabetics are suffering from low sugar, feeding them candy or a sweet drink can help bring their sugars back up. "When you do that with Dawn, her sugars can go down," said her mother. "The doctor said that he had only seen four cases like that in his lifetime.'

Balancing sugars has been a tremendous challenge over the years and the disease has taken a huge toll on her organs. Ms. Young has recently learned that she will need a transplant for both her pancreas

OPP, Wiky, **UCCM** police tri-force squad make big inroads in drug scene

Enforcement on Island increases by 23 percent

by Robin Burridge MANITOULIN—The Anishnaabe Police, Provincial Police (OPP) and Wikwemikong Tribal Police have joined forces to tackle the issue of illicit drugs on the Island through a new tri-force drug unit, which has already led to a 23 percent increase in drug enforcement.

"The Island police commanders Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb with the OPP, Chief Gary Reid of the Wikwemikong Tribal Police and myself (UCCM Anishnaabe Police Chief Rodney Nahwegahbow) meet a couple times a year to discuss issues in our communities across Manitoulin,' explained Police Chief Nahwegahbow. "We all recognized that drugs in our communities were affecting all of us and came up with the tri-force drug partnership strategy.'

This is something that has been on the go loosely since last year, but we made it more formal about six weeks ago," added Sergeant Webb.

police commanders explained that each force has an officer assigned as the lead for their force and that they meet to exchange intelligence.

"The leads gather intelligence

Mindemoya skull found last week sent for tests at forensic lab

MINDEMOYA—It was a stumble and a tumble that Jamie Pyette of Mindemoya will never forget as he came face to face with a moss covered skull.

The nature photographer described how he was out seeking the images that have become his forte on Monday, May 2, when he slipped and stumbled on a pile of wet leaves at the base of a small cliff along a heavily forested path behind an apartment complex just down the road from Central Manitoulin Public School. As Mr. Pyette steadied his balance, a flash of white rolled past his head, causing him to do a quick double take—the round white object appeared to be a moss-covered human skull.

Mr. Pyette was so taken aback by his horrific discovery that he didn't even pause to take a photo. "I thought it would be bad luck,

Manitoulin Transport's terminal spared Fort McMurray inferno

by Michael ErskineALBERTA—Manitoulin Transport's terminal and garage in Fort McMurray escaped the wildfire that destroyed more than 20 percent of that Alberta city, but the Manitoulin based company's transports have been busy delivering aid within that province.

'We have been very fortunate in that both our terminal and our garage in Fort McMurray have not been damaged," said Maureen Dumond, executive assistant to Manitoulin Transport owner Doug Smith.

We sent five trucks for the Red Cross from Edmonton to

the evacuation centres south of Fort McMurray," she confirmed. "We were not able to send trucks north of the city due to the fire." Only a single highway serves the region, and that highway runs through the heart of the fire.

Ms. Dumond noted that the company is not sending any trucks from Ontario, or province other than Alberta.

'We found from our experience when Slave Lake had the fire and the flooding in Calgary that it was not the best use of resources," she said. In those cases, the materials arriving from Ontario had proved to be in excess of the needs in the emergency. "We found out later that it went to

the landfill."

So in this event, the company has been transporting items within the province, but is encouraging its own employees to make cash donations to the Red Cross. "We have employees in Fort McMurray," noted Ms. Dumond. "We have been getting a lot of calls from people wanting to help. At this time, the best way to help is to make a donation to the Red Cross. That is what we are advising our own employees—money is probably the best thing." The Canadian government is matching any donation made to the Red Cross, on top of the federal disaster relief funding

Sudbury hepatitis A case linked to national outbreak from contaminated Costco berries

SUDBURY-On April 22, the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) reported a laboratory-confirmed case of hepatitis A in an individual within its service area who had consumed the recently recalled Nature's Touch brand Organic Berry Cherry Blend frozen

Laboratory testing has confirmed that this case is part of the national outbreak," said Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Sudbury and District Medical Officer of Health. "The virus strain matches the strain found in other individuals in this outbreak.'

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency issued a food recall warn ing on April 15, 2016, for Nature's Touch brand Organic Berry Cherry Blend frozen berries, sold between December 11, 2015, and April 15, 2016, at any Costco location in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland and Labrador, due to possible hepatitis A contamination. People are reminded not to consume the recalled berries, and if they have been consumed, to seek health advice.

The Health Unit continues to offer free hepatitis A vaccine to anyone who consumed the product in the last 14 days and who is not fully vaccinated. Vaccine is available at the Health Unit's office located at 1300 Paris Street, Greater Sudbury, Monday to Friday, between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm. Vaccine is also available through the Health Unit's offices located in Espanola, Mindemoya and Chapleau or by contacting your health care provider.

Food handlers, individuals who have direct patient care (hospital or long-term care home workers, volunteers or students) or who work in a child care setting should report to the Health Unit if they consumed the frozen berries within the last 50 days—even if they do not have any symptoms. The Health Unit will provide these individuals with employment-specific education.

Individuals who have served recalled product to others including patrons of food premises, family, friends and colleagues are also encouraged to communicate this potential exposure to the Health Unit or with these individuals directly.



Literary Manitoulin has long since come of age

When a community can write about itself, it has come of age. Nearly 40 years ago, when The Expositor Office christened the front part of its office building in downtown Little Current as Print Shop Books, there were no local books in print.

That was in 1979 and Print Shop Books stocked its shelves primarily with paperback titles it sourced through Penguin Books. Penguin is a large, international publishing business and its catalogue of books was distinct from the bestsellers available, for example, at local pharmacies.

And so it went for many years, with Print Shop Books accessing its stock from Penguin and other big-name publishers.

But then, about 25 years ago, things began to change.

Shelley Pearen of Ottawa (but with Manitoulin Island roots) published 'Exploring Manitoulin' and it was and remains an ongoing seller as it combines details of travelling around Manitoulin Island with bits of history.

The book is currently in its third printing by its publisher the University of Toronto Press and is deemed by them to be a best seller.

Since then, Ms. Pearen has also written the unique 'Four Voices' that details the signing of the 1862 Manitoulin Island Treaty from the perspective of four different actual historical characters, all of whom were associated with the event.

She has also written scholarly articles and produces useful articles for this newspaper on a regular basis that give an historical context to current events as they unfold on Manitoulin and elsewhere for both First Nations people and those of European ancestry.

Around this same time, Jack McQuarrie, the former publisher of the Recorder in Gore Bay, became a prolific Manitoulin Island historian and produced at least a dozen books on a range of history topics.

People were starting to write about what they knew and after nearly 150 years (more than that now) of First Nations people living side-by-side with the European settlers and their descendants, there was a lot to know.

As time has passed, the same bookshelves at The Expositor Office that have comprised Print Shop Books since 1979 are now filled almost exclusively with books about or pertaining to Manitoulin Island

They are books of history, of poetry, of photographs, coffee table

books, novels set on this Island.

This phenomenon came into sharp focus during the past two weeks when two new books appeared.

One was written about in last week's newspaper: it is a deceptively simple book about gardening and is written by former Ice Lake (and now Billings) farmer (and gardener) Ed Burt.

It is titled 'My Journey in the Garden' and subtitled 'Ed Burt's Way of Growing Food' and it is a very practical guide for gardeners, novice or veterans. It's also a fascinating read as Mr. Burt includes growing lore passed on to him by his grandparents.

The other new Manitoulin Island book is titled 'Michael's Bay: The Rise and Fall of Manitoulin Island's Forgotten Town' and is written by Derek Russell, a man whose roots are in Tehkummah and who now lives and works in Toronto.

But, like Ed Burt, Shelley Pearen, Cecil King, Margo Little, Sandy McGillivray, the Manitoulin Genealogy Club, Jan McQuay, Bill Caesar, Jake Doherty, Tom Peltier (whose Bearwalker novel predated all of these), Merdick McFarlane, Bonnie Kogos, Paula Mallea, Kate Thompson, Marion Seabrook, Alanis King, Ann Carson, Margaret Derry and all the countless others who have things they want to put down on paper for posterity, Derek Russell has diligently researched the history of what was, in its day, Manitoulin's largest and busiest community.

From a literary standpoint, Manitoulin Island has certainly come of age. There is a rich tapestry of collected history and wisdom to draw on and it is predictable that this publishing avalanche, now that it is well underway, will continue infinitely.

Harrowing ordeal for expat Islander in Fort McMurray

FORT MCMURRAY—The small Northern Alberta town of Fort McMurray has been built on a field of dreams, quite literally, as people from across the country and the world have settled in the oil sands supply post looking to create a better life for themselves and their families. This past week some of those dreams have been tumbled as a massive wildfire ripped through the town, forcing the evacuation of a population of 80,000 and culminating in the destruction of 20 percent of the town.

Melissa Dawn Hiller travelled to the remote Northern Alberta outpost looking for work and an income that would help her keep her Manitoulin property above water and hoping to reset a life that had seen a tremendous amount of trauma in recent years, including the death of her baby.

"It has been a life altering experience," said Ms. Hiller, contacted at the motel south of Fort McMurray to which she had fled following the order to evacuate the communi-

Ms. Hiller's life had recently taken a surprisingly direct upward path. Not only had she secured employment, she also found her husband Jacob through a disastrous series of events that threatened at the time to extend her terrible fortunes straight into the abyss. In retrospect, as unsettling as recent events have proven to be, life in the west is still looking comparatively good.

Ms. Hiller (then Golder) arrived in the fabled west with a handful of personal effects (including her grandmother's wed-

a small fire quite a ways off in the distance and there was this huge water bomber going overhead." That fire didn't seem so threatening, and the next day her husband headed off to work at a northern camp. "He works 12 days on, two days off," said Ms. Hiller. "Reports were saying that they had the fire under control.'

"But while I was watching that Mickey Mouse fire from my balcony, there was a huge blaze going on on the other side of the building," she said. "The next day I said 'oh my God,' the whole town was full of smoke," she said.

Ms. Hiller described Fort McMurray as a long thin town. "People don't really understand how Fort Mac is laid out," she said. "The whole thing isn't as wide across as Little Current. It just follows the road in this long strip.'

The following day, when she stepped outside following news that they were evacuating people from "just up the hill," she found that ash was falling all around her. "I thought 'holy shit,' this is happening at the

"I knew I wouldn't get far with what I had in the tank," she said. Stopping to fill up at the next available gas station presented a new challenge. "I waiting two-and-a-half hours in line for gas," she said. "It was

Calamity and panic can bring out both the best and the worst in people. "There were people budding into line, people walking up to the head of the line with gas cans in their hands, I mean really," she said. "Here we were waiting in line and these people were cheating."

Just a few moments after she pulled out from the station, a sign went up announcing they were out of gas. The same sign graced a number of other establishments along the highway as well.

The journey along the packed roadways was a major ordeal. "It took 14 hours to drive what normally would have taken four hours," she said. Once she had reached the town of Morinville, about 10 minutes north of Edmonton, after two hours of searching, Ms. Hiller was finally able to find a motel that would allow her pet to stay with her.

"It really eats into our savings," she said. "But what can you do?"

Her husband has a trailer on a piece of property not far away, but the couple had winterized it, shutting down the electricity and putting anti-freeze in the pipes. "I'm not the helpless type," she asserted, "but dealing with that is beyond me."

Meanwhile, Mr. Hiller was frantically trying to get out of the lodge where he was staying to travel south to meet her, to no avail. He and a friend set out from the work camp to try and reach their families. The situation in the camp was also less than ideal, with food supplies running low and tempers running high.

"They arrived at the gates to the camp and there were two guards there who told them they could not leave," she said. "The fire was on both sides of the road heading south."

Ms. Hiller said that she was angry that the bosses at the camp were able to arrange flights out of danger, but the workers were expected to stay behind.

"The forest up here isn't like back home," she said. "They don't have deciduous trees, they are all these bottleneck pines, little skinny things." Anyone who has seen a pine branch laid on a campfire at night has a good idea how volatile they can be when touched by flame.

"I am okay, I am trying to stay calm," said Ms. Hiller, "but my eyes are red from cry-

ding ring) that represented just about everything she had in the world.

Not knowing anyone and being very short of resources, Ms. Hiller found herself having to avail herself of the shelter system as she tried to get herself established. Things seemed to be on an upswing when she met a woman at the shelter who offered her a place to stay in the apartment she had just found.

She later discovered to her dismay that the woman, who seemed at the time to be a godsend, turned out to have severe mental health issues, was known to the police, and who not only locked her out of the apartment but refused to return any of Ms. Hiller's possessions.

It was in the ensuing pit of despair that

she found her Mr. Right, or perhaps Prince Charming, as he rescued her from her predicament with, as it turned out, no ulte-

A short time later they were married and settled into an apartment in Fort McMurray, living frugally as they attempted to save every spare penny that came their way to build a home.

It was sitting on the balcony of their apartment that the first inklings of what was to come appeared in the form of helicopters landing in the nearby river to collect water to fight a fire.

"We were watching the helicopters come in and pick up water, it was kind of entertaining, I even took some small videos with my phone," recalled Ms. Hiller. "There was

end of the street," she said. The fire was mere blocks away at that point. "If that fire came forward, it would be right in the middle of the city. I decided that it was time to get out of the city.' But that proved easier said than done.

"I thought, 'this is not good'," she recalled. "There were alarms going off in my building, police were going door to door,

there were alarms and blinking lights everywhere. I said 'I have to go, I have to go now'." Water was literally dropping on her head, she said, as spray from water bombers attacking the nearby fires was blown over her building.

Her truck, no longer in the most reliable prime of its life, had barely half a tank of gasoline on board, but Ms. Hiller packed up their dog Luna and began to edge out of town along with several thousand other ing. The stress has been unbelievable." She noted that the town "has done an amazing job, keeping everyone up to date with regular updates.'

"It's so frustrating to be paying rent on a place you can't stay, and yet having to pay for another place to live," she said.

By Monday, Mr. Hiller had been able to make his way south to meet up with his wife and pet, and the three travellers set out for British Columbia.

'We're on the move," she posted on her Facebook page, "heading to northern British Columbia. Our leasing agent is offering accommodations wherever they own buildings. They have a vacant, furnished unit in Dawson Creek, so we're enroute now. It'll be a roof over our heads until we can return home to Fort McMurray again."

UCCM Police seize over \$12K in cocaine

On Friday May 6, at approximately 8 pm, a vehicle was stopped on Highway 540, just entering the M'Chigeeng First Nation.

A search of the vehicle was conducted and approximately 125 grams of cocaine was located inside the vehicle. Subsequently a male and female occupant of the vehicle were arrested. Both occupants of the vehicle were taken into police custody and were before the courts on Saturday morning for an audio remand hearing.

Both accused have been released on strict bail conditions.

Charged are a 35-year-old male of the M'Chigeeng First Nation and 30-year-old female of Scarborough. Both have been charged with possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

The estimated street value of the drugs is \$12,500.

Police are reminding the public that ingesting any form of drug is very dangerous. In most cases, the source of the drug is probably not known to the user. Many times people that are dealing the drugs "cut" the drug or mix it with unknown toxic chemicals in order to create more products. Persons ingesting these substances have often become ill or died as a result of using the drug. The safest

MANITOULIN—The two wildfires burning in Wikwemikong have been extinguished, according to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry's Aviation Forest Fire and Emergency Services sec-

Shayne McCool, fire information officer, confirmed that the two fires, Sudbury 9 at 0.3 hectares, and Sudbury 11, at 0.2 hectares, were extinguished on May 3, one day after they were reported.

Mr. McCool explained to The Expositor that Sudbury 9 did require an air attack from a water bomber, while Sudbury 11

The fires outside of Killarney and in the Bay of Islands are also out. There are currently no active fires in the area, Mr. McCool stated.

The fire hazard for Manitoulin Island remains moderate.

Man hits mother with tractor while driving drunk

On Sunday, May 1, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a report of a collision involving a farm tractor and a pedestrian that had occurred the day previous, on Saturday, April 30, at a farm in Campbell Township. As a result of the accident, an 82-year-old



woman was transported to hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

As a result of this investigation, a 49-year-old male of Campbell Township has been charged with the following: impaired driving; care or control of a motor vehicle over 80 mg; failing to stop at the scene of an accident involving bodily harm; and failing to provide the necessities of life, all contrary to the Criminal Code.

A Spring Bay resident has confirmed with The Expositor that the injured woman is the mother of the accused and stated that they did not believe the incident to have been intentional. The resident also noted that the mother is okay, but suffered some bruising as a result of the accident.

The accused is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on June 27.

The OPP is reminding motorists that there is no safe amount of alcohol consumption when driving. Anyone who suspects a driver is driving while impaired is urged to call police by dialing 9-1-1 immediately.

The Expositor contacted UCCM Police Constable Murray Still who noted that all of the fires are currently under investigation but said police believed that all of the fires were set as grassfires.

"They do not appear to be all related at this point," he

Constable Still asked that people re-think their spring grass burning plans in light of dry conditions. "There isn't a fire ban, but people need to be vigilant," he




Hockey awards time

Manitoulin Streams ramps up for 2016 restoration work

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin Streams is getting ready for another great season of helping rehabilitate and enhance water streams and creating healthy and self-sustaining river ecosystems

Sites on the Mindemoya River, M'Chigeeng Creek and Blue Jay Creek and Manitou River are all on the docket.

"All these projects are dependent upon funding approval, which we should hear about shortly," explained Manitoulin Streams Coordinator Seija Deschenes.

One of the projects is part of the Mindemoya Enhancement Strategy, sites MIN 624 and MIN 680, two of 144 locations along the Mindemoya River in need of restoration.

"Environmental issues at site MIN 624 and MIN 680, as well as M13 (another project scheduled for this year as part of the Blue Jay Creek and Manitou River Enhancement Strategy (1 of 71 sites in need of restoration on the Manitou River)) and the M'Chigeeng Creek include bank erosion, sedimentation occurring over spawning habitat, lack of in-stream habitat, lack of riparian vegetation and canopy, dams that affect water flow fluctuations and log jams that block fish passage to critical habitat," said Ms. Deschenes. "These cumulative impacts affect critical spawning and aquatic habitat that bring both socio-economic benefits to the area. Recommendations include improving riparian vegetation and canopy, preventing and restoring bank erosion, improving in-stream habitat,

improving edge habitat."

Ms. Deschenes explained that the stream restoration on these sites will protect stream habitat and safeguard Manitoulin's aquatic ecosystems from erosion reducing the amount of sedimentation from occurring over prime spawning habitat.

"By improving the fish and aquatic habitat—channel edges, channel centre, improving available river bottom substrate—it will reduce the effects of low water levels and reduce water temperatures from getting higher in the summer thereby enhancing the overall quality and productivity of this river's aquatic habitats over the long term," continued Ms. Deschenes. "Bio-engineering techniques that may be used will include stabilizing the top of stream banks with boulders, root wads, soil and bio-degradable coconut coir matting to prevent erosion, and installing enhanced in-stream habitat such as boulders clusters and islands, creating pool and riffle areas, placement of spawning gravel, sweepers, wing deflectors, vortex weirs, submerged semi half-logs. Increasing riparian habitat will help to protect and provide habitat for species at risk. Also, it will increase biodiversity of fish species in all areas supporting biodiversity conservation.

"Manitoulin Streams plans on encouraging community stewardship activities by conducting stream cleanups and removal of log jams as well as native tree and shrub planting along this reach of the river with the Ontario Stewardship Rangers and volunteers," she added. "Work along M'Chigeeng Creek will take place in partnership with Lakeview Public School."

Also scheduled for this year is site MIN 620 on the Mindemoya River. It is unique because it was an old dam site with some of the dam structure is still there. Also work will be done on MIN 622.

"This site has been identified as a high priority site for restoration because the river section has a large rising limestone barrier that is a natural land-based feature which causes problems with fish passage when there is low water flow during the spawning season," said Ms. Deschenes. "At this site, we will need to reduce the stream width and increase the stream depth by creating four pools in a fish ladder extending 21 linear meters long to improve continuity to the upper reaches and improve in-stream habitat along the site."

"MIN 620 will have one boulder cluster and spawning gravel installed," Ms. Deschenes explained. "The total restoration of site MIN 620 is 50 linear meters of stream and it will improve in-stream habitat as well. Also riparian habitat will be restored by volunteers helping plant native trees and shrubs."

The downstream site on the Mindemoya River, MIN 622, will be rehabilitated by re-grading the banks and installing seven root wads and coconut coir matting to prevent erosion and installing vegetated riverstone and native trees and shrubs in the riparian area.

"There will also be one boulder cluster installed and spawning gravel," said Ms. Deschenes. "Restoration of site MIN 622 will restore 10 linear meters of stream and improve in-stream habitat."

Ms. Deschenes said Manitoulin Steams is also hoping to do some stream cleanups and tree planning in Wik-

wemikong, but that the partnership is still in early stages.

having been completely dispelled by the closer examination. "She wanted to go see it for herself just to make sure it really was a human skull."

"I called my co-worker Lisa Durdle and we went up to check it out," she said. What followed was a bit like the old children's game of hot and cold, with Mr.

Pyette standing well back and guiding the duo to the site. After a few moments of searching, they found the grisly orb.

"It was right there in the open," said Ms. Dickinson, 'exactly where he said he found it.

After a brief glance around the area to see if there were any other obvi-

ous bones, Ms. Dickinson took a few photographs to prove what she had found, and then retreated back down the hill and contacted 911. "It was pretty obvious that it was a very old skull," she said.

"I explained to Jamie that we had to call the police," said Ms. Dickinson.

The Manitoulin Community Living counsellor has seen a lot of things in her 26 years working in her field, but this was definitely the most unusual incident of her career.

"I had to give a statement to the police," noted Mr. Pyette.

The normally quiet street quickly became inundated with swarms of police and forensic vehicles as members of the Manitoulin OPP detachment were joined by colleagues from Sudbury and crime scene specialists. Over the course of the next couple of days, police officers and the forensics team combed the area to ensure that the skull was an isolat-

legs; lung collapse; and slow wound healing. Infants born with the disease could also be born with club feet.

Growing up, Kari shares, she and her sister were always bruised, so much to cause their mother enough concern to bring them to the hospital on occasion. The girls were always pale too, with translucent skin. And in the final month of Kayla's pregnancy, she suffered a collapsed lung.

Three years after the passing of Kayla and her own diagnosis, Kari helped her cousin create a video about EDS type four as part of a college assignment. In it, the tiny 25-year-old sits in her home and shares with the viewer information about the disease and how it has changed her life. She spoke of her once athletic lifestyle and that she can no longer participate in any activity that increases her heart rate. Kari also shares the difficulty she finds in working since standing for any prolonged time causes wear and tear on her joints. She suffers from leg tremors, near sightedness, irritable bowel, anxiety and depression.

Now, one month away from 29 and seven years after her diagnosis, things are much different for Kari. "Man, I look different, eh?" she references her younger self in the video, shaking her

As she shares her story in this newspaper's editorial office she complains about the swelling in her face. The once 90-pound woman has gained almost 40 pounds of unexplained weight, causing her cheeks to swell. She says that it was recently discovered that she has elevated levels of prolactin in her system, a hormone normally produced by pregnant women or women who have just given birth and which is responsible for milk production. Doctors are currently looking into how to lower these levels and, she hopes, help her to lose the weight from her small frame.

"I don't have much energy," she says slowly. "I have a hard time sleeping

now, and I have leg and neck pain," she adds, rubbing the back of her neck.

Kari explains that she's also been diagnosed with gastroparesis, basically a paralysis of the stomach. "I need to take a pill to keep food down, I need to take a pill to help me digest, and I need to take a pill to help me go to the washroom.

When asked if she required a special diet, she says that while she should be on such a regimen, "it doesn't matter what I eat; I get sick most

She's now on nine different medications daily and going through a new round of testing.

Kari is no longer able to work either. "I'm an ECE (early childhood educator), but I just can't do it. When I wake up I see how I feel and go from there."

She spends a lot of time doing her own research as she feels the knowledge on EDS type four in Canada is limited, but has heard that a special clinic will soon be opening in Toronto and is looking forward to that day. Her

appointments are spread between Sudbury and Toronto and she must have a yearly MRI and echocardiogram to check on her internal organs. Kari credits much of her help to her gynecologist, cardiologist and gastroenterologist.

Through her days as she puts one foot in front of the other, sister Kayla is always on her mind.

"It never gets any easier," she whispers, tears spilling down her cheeks. "I thought it would have by now, but it doesn't. Brutal.'

"Sometimes I think it's a blessing because I know she's not living with this," Kari adds, looking down. "As much as I want her here, I know she's not going through this.

Kari explains that the month of May is Ehlers-Danlos Awareness Month, pointing to her hoody which reads 'I'm not superwoman, but I'm fighting Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, so close enough.

(the organ that produces insulin) and kidneys (the organ that cleans waste out of the blood). It is news that contains more hope than despair, however.

'Dawn has flat-lined three times in the hospital," said Ms. Young. Having lost three of her eight children previously, the 72-year-old lives in constant fear that Dawn might prove to be the fourth. "The thought of losing another one is completely overwhelming," she said.

The family has poured most of their life's savings into the battle to keep Ms. Young alive and supporting her through her lifelong ordeal.

Most Canadians assume that if you need medical assistance it is provided free of charge, but that isn't exactly the case. Drug costs can be astronomical and travel for family members and support come out of pocket.

'When she passes out because of her sugars, you can't give her anything orally," noted her mother. For that there is an EpiPen-like Glucagon injection—at \$100 a shot. "In one week alone we had to use the injector five times.' That's a \$500 touch, just in one week, and it is not an optional decision.

ed set of remains and that the area was secure as bemused neighbours looked on from their apartment windows.

During the investigation, the area where the skull was discovered was taped off with yellow police tape and a police guard kept rubberneckers (and the media) at bay to allow the specialists to do their work unhindered. Once the police investigation was completed, forensic anthropologist Dr. Scott I. Fairgrieve and consultant retired forensic botanist Dr. Gerard Courtin studied the find, its location and other indicators on site.

The collected bones (only the skull appeared to have been found as of press time Monday) were transported to the forensic osteology laboratory at Laurentian University, where testing may allow a better understanding of the sex, age and provenance of the remains.

As she waits for the fateful call that will signal the start of her odyssey to a double transplant, Ms. Young requires regular dialysis at the Manitoulin Health Centre. Although she has trained as a social service worker, her health status has prevented her from being able to work.

'When this is over, I want to be able to help those who find themselves in a position like mine," she said.

Once the transplants have been successfully completed, the change in Ms. Young's life will be dramatic.

"I asked the doctors 'when this is over, will she still be diabetic?'," said her mother—the answer blew her away. "No, she will not".

For much of her life, Ms. Young has had to maintain a strict diabetic diet, had to watch her sugar levels with an eagle eye and lived life not knowing for certain that there will be a tomorrow. Today, tomorrow finally seems possible, and the light at the end of the tunnel shines bright.

When the call comes, Ms. Young will have to rush to the hospital. The organs can only be kept for 13 hours and there are three hours of preparations that have to be completed before she gets onto the operating table. "They will be sending a plane to pick her up," said her mother. "There is no way that she can travel all that way by automobile."

In the meantime, the family estimates that it will cost in the tens of thousands of dollars to meet the expenses that will accumulate through the transplant operation process and the decision was made to reach out for help.

The Manitoulin Island community is pulling together for Ms. Young and her family to help defray the massive medical and travel expenses that pile up with a devastating disease. A 50/50 draw has already been held, and the winner of the \$1,300 prize donated half their winnings back to the cause.

In addition, a benefit spaghetti dinner to be held for Ms. Young will take place tomorrow (Thursday, May 12) from 5 to 7 pm at the Providence Bay Hall. Dinner is \$10 per plate for adults and \$5 for children 5-to 10-years-old. The dinner will include spaghetti, garlic bread, drink and dessert.

Crowdfunding is taking a role as well in the campaign, with an open-ended GoFundMe campaign that can be found at www.gofundme.com/r8zjzg4s available for those who would like to assist.

She says she'd like people to take the time to learn about EDS. "There's no guarantee there will be a tomorrow for anybody, but for someone like me...

She shares that her future weighs on her a lot. "I'm limited to so much.'

Among her many other symptoms, Kari also has rheumatoid arthritis, has become sun sensitive and noticed a change in her short term memory. "My hands and feet go black at random times too," she adds.

Kari says she likes to help out with Legion dinners when she's able, plays darts on Tuesday nights and was looking forward to the dance being held there last weekend, but these things don't keep her mind off of the fact that she will likely see more symptoms. Over 80 percent of people with

her form of EDS will see life threatening complications, like the one that took Kayla's life, by age 40.

"It's hard to find something to do for the day," she says softly. "My stomach issue limits me a lot. I'm always in She says she hopes to participate in the upcoming Alzheimer's Walk with her family, or at least do as much of the walk as she can.

Kari says she will continue to spread awareness about the disease that runs her life, and took her sister's, and hopes that one day there will be a cure.

When the twins were born, they were well known across Manitoulin for their determination to survive, being born premature and weighing just 1 lb, 14 ounces.

"I came into this world fighting. I guess that's how I'll leave it too.

Plaque recognizes veteran for service to his country

LITTLE CURRENT—Most Islanders would recognize Gerry Timmermans as the visionary entrepreneur who founded Tims and Co., some might remember him as the Canadian Customs director who, for two decades, worked out of their offices in Little Current, or perhaps as mayor of Little Current, but a recently arrived plaque, signed by both the prime minister and the minister of Veteran's Affairs, recognized him for another, very martial, reason.

Mr. Timmermans is one of a dwindling handful of those brave and adventurous men and women who we recognize as "the Greatest Generation." People who grew up in the Great Depression and then went on to fight in the most destructive war the world has ever seen.

"There were six of us boys in the family and five were in the air force," he said of his volunteering for the Royal Canadian Air Force, adding with a chuckle, "I didn't want to be put into the army."

Mr. Timmermans trained as a front turret gunner and radar operator. "They called us wireless air gunners," he said.

Whatever the rank, being part of an RCAF air crew meant going up each night to brave the enemy flak and night fighters that prowled the dark skies over Europe. "Night after night there, we hardly got back half of them," he said. Many nights less than half of the massive bombers returned to the Yorkshire airfield where they were based.

Mr. Timmermans might well have been one of those statistics but for a twist of fate that saw him afflicted with a painful sinus con-

dition that restricted him to the ground. "I became an intelligence officer," he recalled. "I was there meeting all the big brass and telling them what we knew about the enemy and what they were up to." He later served as an air field controller.

Mr. Timmermans survived the war, as did his brothers, but one brother was to lose his life over the jungles of Burma in 1946. "They didn't find him until about 10 years later," he said.

He left the service just as they

were dangling his officer's rating in front of him. In the meantime, the dashing young air force sergeant had caught the eye of a pretty young nurse in early 1944 and by 1945 they had married. Over the course of the next few years the couple produced three children, Bob, Cathy and Craig. Craig Timmermans is the founder of MSD Computers and co-founder of 100.7 The Island country radio station (now moved to 103.9 and the new top-40 GLOW has taken on the 100.7 spot on the dial).

"We all had a pretty good career in the air force," said Mr. Timmermans of his siblings, but once back home it was time to seek out peacetime pursuits. He became a customs officer and was based for a time in Blind River. "I spent about five or six years in Blind River, from about 1947 to 1952," he said, before transferring to the Island in 1952.

While Mr. Timmermans was working his way up the ranks in Canada Customs, his wife Elizabeth (everybody called her Betty) was building the largest live bait business in Canada, focussing on the lowly earthworm.

"We had people all over working for us collecting them," he recalled. With dozens of girls working under her to sort and pack the wriggling creatures, Ms. Timmermans shipped product across the nation.

But it was after reading a piece in a magazine that Mr. Timmermans was inspired to make a major entrepreneurial jump. "It was in an American magazine, I remember, they were talking about how the next big thing was going to be what they called 'home centres,' a business where you could get everything you needed for a home," he said. "When I read that piece I realized that this was going to be the number one business, so I went into that business."

With the baby boom generation being created and demand for bigger and better appointed homes growing along with the population boom, that decision was a winner.

Aside from a short three year stint dealing with investments on the west coast, Mr. Timmermans has called Manitoulin his home. "We liked it here," he said.

Over the years Mr. Timmermans has kept his hand in investing, something of hobby that keeps him sharp. "I'm still at it," he grins.

Mr. Timmermans said that he was proud of his service to his country, and pleased with the recognition provided by the plaque he has recently received.

"It's pretty nice," he admitted.







Since 2012, the Enaadmaagehjik Development Commission Tourism Department has been working with the Killarney Provincial Park in the development of Point Grondine Park. The signing of the MOU formalized an already existing relationship between the two parks.

The new formal mutually beneficial agreement will provide Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory with mentoring opportunities in park operations and management and provide Killarney Provincial Park support for their operational programming.

"It's an excellent opportunity to establish a working relationship with the Ontario government through its Ontario Parks system that supports our tourism efforts by building capacity in order to effectively manage the Point Grondine Park, which we recently opened," said Wiikwemkoong Chief Duke Peltier.

Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory has made substantial investments in Point Grondine Park (www.grondinepark.com), located off Highway 637. Northeast Town issues drinking water advisory over the weekend

by Robin BurridgeLITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town issued a drinking water advisory on Saturday, May 7 after there was a loss of pressure at the Little Current water treatment plant during the planned Hydro One power outage.

"We have sent water samples to Sudbury for testing and anticipate that the drinking water advisorv will be lifted late this evening or early Tuesday morning as long as the samples are clear," Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson told Expositor on Monday morning.

The drinking water advisory was lifted by 5 pm on Monday.

Williamson explained that during the power outage the backup generator shut down due to a break in a coolant line that led to an anti-freeze leak causing the fail safe to shut down the generator. The generator shutting down led to a drop in water pressure which created a risk that contaminants may have entered the distribution system.

"The low pressure sent off an alarm and both the manager of public works (Gary May) and OCWA (Ontario Clean Water Agency) responded and generator was repaired very quickly, but the water pressure had already dropped," added Mr. Williamson.

Little Current residents were advised to run the water until it felt noticeably cool and continue to allow the water to run for another minute, flushing the plumbing in their home. They were also told to remove and rinse and replace any screens on the taps.

"For 72 hours following the return of power and water pressure, assume the water may not be safe to drink; use an alternative supply of drinking water," stated a release from the town. "This precaution applies to water for drinking, cooking and oral hygiene. If you have a water softener or other water treatment attached to the cold water supply line, you should consider additional flushing. Ask your supplier for appropriate direction."

Bottled water was sup-

plied by the town at the recreation centre for the duration of the drinking water advisory and bulk water was available at the Sheguiandah water treatment plant.



A spiritual journey

Wikwemikong water walkers set out on 14-day trek

by Michael ErskineWIKWEMIKONG—In a tradition that has captured the imagination of the Wikwemikong community since it was founded nine years ago by the late Karen Manitowabi, a troupe of about 150 community members have set out on a water walk that will see the hardy band complete a circumnavigation of the Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve.

The walk is both a physical and spiritual journey, as women carry a bucket of water along the shoreline of the reserve, often traversing ankle-bending boulders and knee shattering crevasses with little more than a balsam walking stick for support. A group of men-warriors-accompany the walkers, with Ms. Manitowabi's son Brad Pitawanakwat-Manitowabi taking the lead and Mark Eshkawkogan acting as "the caboose," ensuring that no walker falls behind and unassisted.

The journey is not without its dangers, although wild animals are kept well at bay by the accompanying warrior escort, much of the rough terrain being traversed is inaccessible even by boat and a good portion of the journey takes place beyond the range of cell towers.

"This is not a race," advised Elder Urban Majacki, who conducted a pipe ceremony and smudged participants prior to the group setting out. "Once you start walking, do not look back, look ahead, when you look back you start thinking about how far you have to go. Looking back is negativity, let everything that is behind you go, let go and look to the future. Support each other on this journey.

As the walkers gathered, including a large group of Native Studies teacher Sandra Peltier's students from Wikwemikong

the kind of things they are telling you, they are acknowledging your presence on the

Mr. Odjig concluded his remarks by voicing the hope that soon all people will walk in unity

"I am looking forward to some of this walk," admitted Wikwemikong Chief Duke Peltier. "There are some parts of the territory that you don't see very often.'

Wikwemikong is one of the largest First Nation communities in Canada and its

boundaries encompass a significant portion of deep bush and heavy forest. The community is very proud of its heritage as having never surrendered its land to the

The water walk traditionally takes place in the spring, a time of natural re-growth of the natural habitat, symbolizing a time of renewal, re-growth and re-birth.

M'Chigeeng First Nation also held a water walk in their community on the weekend, although that traverse takes a single day to complete.

High School and many of Ms. Manitowabi's friande eieter reen Trudeau-Manitowabi sang a water song with the hand drum, encouraging other walkers to join in. As the walkers set out, Harvey Bell Jr. sang a water song to see them on their way.

Community member Louis Francis unloaded a large number of hand cut staffs and walking sticks that he provided to the walkers without cost. Made of balsam, the walking sticks were light as a feather, but strong enough for the job.

Family members, including Ms. Trudeau Manitowabi, sister Cindy Ominika, nieces Seneca Manitowabi and Tessa Rose Ominika, along with son Brad Pitawanakwat, also took up the walk, honouring the memory of their departed family member.

This is a very spiritual journey for mankind," said community member Gordie Odjig, addressing the walkers before they set out. "Without water we could not sustain ourselves. This is not a leisurely walk, put your heart and soul into it. We are walking for the water, but also the earth and the sun that shines upon us every day. The spirits walk with you, don't be frightened if they speak to you on this journey. Open your minds and your hearts to



In my freezer, buried, I found a whole chicken that looked a bit worn out. Think it's called freezer burn, plus it was missing a wing. Turning the chicken into a piece of art by roasting it, wasn't going to happen so I found a recipe to make pulled chicken. The best part was putting it in the slow cooker and having extra for lunch the next day.

Barbecue Pulled Chicken

If you are really short on time buy the barbecue sauce, but remember: read the label and find the one with the least amount of sugar and extra added chemicals. I cut the whole chicken in half and placed both halves in the slow cooker and covered them with the sauce. When the chicken was done I took it all apart—easy while still warm. Serve it on a bun with a side salad and you have a hearty main course with leftovers for lunch the next day.

** I doubled the sauce recipe

- 1 cup tomato sauce or pasta sauce
- 3 Tbsp cider vinegar
- 2 Tbsp honey or maple syrup
- 1 tbsp sweet paprika
- 1 Tbsp tomato paste
- 1 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tsp dry mustard
- 1 tsp ground chipotle chile
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 1/2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs, trimmed of fat or whole chicken cut in half
 - 1 small onion, finely chopped
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1. Stir all the ingredients together except the chicken.
- 2. Place a little bit of the sauce on the bottom of the slow cooker, add the chicken and pour the rest of the sauce over the chicken.
- 3. Put the lid on and cook on low until the chicken can be pulled apart, about 5 to 6 hours.
- 4. Transfer the chicken to a cutting board and shred with a fork. If using a whole chicken take the skin off first, then pull the meat from the bones, then shred with a fork.
 - 5. Return the chicken to the sauce, stir well and serve.
