Edna Manitowabi a vital Nokomis in Indian Horse

Her pivotal role in the movie drawn from her own childhood experiences

PETERBOROUGH—At almost 78-years-old, Edna Manitowabi, originally from Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory, has lived a life shaped by her time at the Spanish residential school. Ms. Manitowabi, a success in her own right, has recently acquired much media attention from her role as Naomi, Saul Indian Horse's Nokomis (grandmother), in the recently-released film 'Indian Horse'—a role that has been life-changing for the elder.

Ms. Manitowabi played alongside fellow Wiikwemkoong band member Sladen Peltier, who acted the part of young Saul in the movie. Sladen, who had never act-

Entire Island shoreline is under threat from aging oil pipeline lying beneath waters of Mackinac Strait, experts warning

'Line 5' rupture would cause worst-ever environmental disaster

MICHIGAN—The Enbridge Line 5 pipeline beneath the Straits of Mackinac has been cited by environmentalists as holding the potential for the worst environmental catastrophe in North American history—and the data backs them up. Yet the governor of the State of Michigan has just signed off on concerns about the line during a closed door meeting with the company, a meeting that took place on the very cusp of the start of a series of public commentary meetings.

Built in 1953 during the Eisenhower administration, the two 20inch-in-diameter conduits that make up the dual Line 5 pipeline travel nearly 2,000 miles from the oilfields of western Canada to the Ontario refineries located in Sarnia, with roughly four of those miles running beneath the waves of the Straits of Mackinac. The pipeline carries roughly 23 million gallons of heavy tar sands crude (thinned with benzene) through what has been described as one of the most environmentally sensitive areas in the world.

Sections of Line 5 are cracked and dented, with recent reports noting new dents that came apparently from anchor strikes. Some

We are in the midst of an epidemic. Opioid deaths continue to rise in Ontario, with a 52 percent increase in opioid deaths from January to October 2017 (1,053) over the same period in 2016 (694,) and a 72 percent increase in opioid-related emergency department visits with 7,658 in 2017 versus 4,453 in 2016.

Given the right circumstances, anyone can become an addict. It could be your 14-year-old neighbour or the grandmother playing bingo. Addiction, whether to prescription medications (like hydromorphone or dilaudid) or street drugs (like cocaine, heroin or synthetic fentanyl) is treatable and can be managed. However, while research has shown that combining addiction treatment medicines (such as methadone and suboxone) with other therapies and community supports offers the best chance of success, rarely are addicts offered the full range of assistance options.



Line 5 pipeline should be of concern for us all

North Channel where they travel under the Little Current swing bridge and those of the Straits of Mackinac that flow under the Mackinac Bridge linking upper and lower Michigan—both sets of waters flow back and forth, depending on a number of environmental factors. That similarity is one of the factors that make Enbridge's Line 5 pipeline a concern for anybody with a connection to the waters of two of the Great Lakes—Huron and Superior.

Scientific data indicates quite conclusively that the ebb and flow of currents through the Straits of Mackinac guarantee that anything that spills into the waters in that region will alternately impact Lake Superior and Lake Huron. We are front and centre on that firing line.

There are safeguards in place to ensure that a major catastrophe does not come to pass. Those safeguards have proven to be quite inadequate to prevent spills along other, more accessible parts of the pipeline, but even more troubling are the revelations that the company operating the pipeline was found to be out of compliance with

Compounding the issue in this age of terrorism, a cloak of secrecy lies across most details of the pipeline and its operations and inspections. Many of the normal checks and balances provided through transparency and accountability are thereby short circuited.

Pipelines are efficient, cost-effective means of transporting natural gas, crude, gasoline and a host of other fossil fuels and there is a massive economic benefit associated with pipelines, for all Canadians. They are arguably safer and less prone to spills than the alternatives of rail or truck transport. But, and this is a very big but, when they do fail us, they fail us in a very big way with clearly demonstrated massive economic and environmental costs—we know all about oil spills, in some cases through dealing with spills in other lengths of the Line 5 line.

There are those who will quickly point out that if you factor in all of the costs associated with our dependence on fossil fuels, pipelines are not at all efficient or cost-effective when placed up against the clean energy alternatives and conservation. In time, that argument will win out. The mere fact that fossil fuels are a finite resource will establish the truth of that argument even if no other appeal to reason does in the meantime.

But that day remains somewhat distant. So we are left with the question of how to proceed down the road to ever increasing climate change perdition. Do we proceed with breakneck speed, damning the

environmental torpedoes and trusting to luck the goodwill of massive faceless corporate entities to protect our interests? We would argue that gamble is not worth the throw of the dice. Do we shut down all pipelines, cancel all oilsand leases and take the economic hit for the benefit of mankind—probably a better choice, but not one that will find any traction in creating the political will or capital necessary to actually make it happen.

We all want to save the world, so long as it doesn't cost us anything

So in practical terms, a balance must be found. But it is a balance that must take into account that 40 million people depend on those waters for their drinking water.

But while pumping heavy fossil fuel products through a more than half-century-old pipeline vulnerably laid out across one of the most environmentally fragile and significant waterways on the Great Lakes may be the least expensive short term option for the pipeline company and its shareholders, and therefore in the convoluted calculus that lies behind corporate math the most desirable, it simply isn't in our best interests or the long-term interests of the company itself. The cost of a significant spill in those waters would devastate the share prices and dividends of even so massive a corporation as Enbridge.

One of the main justifications for the modern democratic state and its impositions on the conduct of our individual lives is the duty to protect society from our worst instincts. Leaving a corporate entity, essentially a creature of sociopathic conscience, to oversee the inspection and remediation of an aging pipeline is not in at all in our collective best interests. Giving a corporation (or government for that matter) the cloak of national security to place over their operations ups the ante on the environmental gamble almost to the point of making the use of the pipeline in the Straits of Mackinac something of a Hail Mary pass.

Laying a pipeline across the Straits of Mackinac was simply a bad idea. It remains a bad idea a half-century later and is only compounded by the age of that pipeline and the complications inherent in maintaining the required security blanket that keeps us all in the dark.

If a pipeline is needed to transport those materials from the west to our eastern refineries another option must be found. If it cannot be afforded, then it simply does not make economic sense and the idea should be abandoned for the sake of all of our best interests.

Expositor headline on Tehkumah Ombudsman report questioned

But coverage of council meetings appreciated

To the Expositor:

Many residents, permanent and seasonal, of the Township of Tehkummah are very appreciative of the reporting that the journalists of The Expositor have undertaken in the past year, shedding a light into the municipal government affairs which impact us.

However, the most recent article had a misleading headline: "Tehkummah council cleared by Ombudsman in December 2017 closed

The Ombudsman Report, as published on the Office of the Ombudsman website, states that "the complaint alleged that township council did not provide proper notice for a special council meeting held on December 22, 2017 in contravention of the Act and the township's own

The meeting was attended by three of the four sitting councillors, as well as the acting deputy clerk-treasurer. Councillor Ron Hierons and Clerk-Treasurer Karen Gerrard were not present at the meeting as they stated that proper notice was not being provided and they would not be part of a meeting that contravenes the legislation and would be considered to be an illegal meeting.

The right of citizens to attend public meetings and view council proceedings in action is the foundation of the municipal open meeting requirements. The open meeting requirements set out in the Act demonstrate that the public has the 'right to observe municipal government in process'."

The Ombudsman Report clearly states that the council for the Town-

ship of Tehkummah failed to abide by the Municipal Act and the municipal procedural bylaw, by failing to provide adequate public notice of the meeting. "With respect to the December 22, 2017 special meeting, the procedure bylaw requires that public notice of meetings be provided by posting the meeting agenda for public viewing in the township office at least two days prior to the meeting being held. The December 22, 2017 meeting did not meet this requirement. Not only did the reeve call the special meeting only one day prior to the meeting date, but based on the information provided to the Office of the Ombudsman, public notice of the meeting was not posted in the township office at all or otherwise advertised in the township.

...the failure of council to provide notice for the special meeting is a violation of the open meeting requirements in the Municipal Act, 2001 and the township's procedure bylaw. In addition, council failed to ensure that minutes of the in camera meeting were recorded."

Although the reason for a closed meeting was valid, the Tehkummah council was not cleared by Ombudsman in December 2017 closed meet-

A poorly worded headline such as this leads readers to believe that the council did not break any rules, when in fact Council failed to follow its own rules and turned their backs once more on the Municipal Act.

Office and little information or comment was available as to the cause or source of the fire from the Northeast Town fire depart-

On Saturday morning the restaurant was surrounded by yellow tape and a police officer was stationed onsite awaiting the arrival of the fire marshal, as per normal procedure, but by Monday morning the site had been released

"We are just waiting for the insurance to come and inspect things so we can get to work," said Ms. Elliott.

The fire department also responded to a grass and structure fire on the Sheguiandah First Nation at around 6:45 pm on Saturan abandoned house.

In the case of the brush fire in Rockville, the fire department responded around 5:45 pm on Sunday and the fire was quickly brought under control.





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...Entire Island shoreline is under threat from aging oil pipeline lying beneath Mackinac Strait

...continued from page 1 segments of the line have lost over a quarter of their original wall thickness to corrosion and, despite against admonitions unsupported sections of the submarine pipeline longer than 250-feet contained in the easements from the State of Michigan, there are apparently several unsupported sections far in excess of that limit currently along the pipeline's length. The pipeline lies in waters ranging from 50 to 250 feet below the surface, running along the lakebed. These sections are flexing continuously in the strong currents to be found in the Straits of Mackinac.

A water current simulation study by the University of Michigan shows the distribution of oil from a rupture in the Line 5 pipeline in the straits could potentially impact as much as 740 miles of shoreline in Lake Superior and Lake Huron, including the entire northern shore of Manitoulin Island. It should be noted that Enbridge, a massive Canadian company disputes simulation results.

A PBS special documentary 'Beneath the Surface: The Line 5 Pipeline in the Great Lakes' produced by Great Lakes Now, follows the story of the pipeline since its first conception to the current concerns being voiced by those living and working in the waters that could be impacted by a spill from the Line 5 pipeline.

"If you were to pick the worst possible place for an oil spill in the Great Lakes, this would be it,' said David Schwab, Ph.D., research scientist at the University of Michigan Water Center, one of the foremost experts on Great Lakes water currents and the creator of the animation that models how a spill from the pipeline would impact the lakes. "The currents are powerful and change directions frequently. In the event of an oil spill, these factors would lead to a big mess that would be very difficult to contain."

The waters of the strait can be very rambunctious throughout the year, but should a spill occur during the dead of winter, remediation and containment efforts would be hampered exponentially.

"We do some pretty stupid things, but that takes first prize," said Mike Wilton of Algonquin Eco-Watch. "Especially when you consider that there are other options available."

Mr. Wilton points out that if the line were to be extended overland to Duluth, Minnesota, it could traverse nearly its entire length over a more accessible land route.

"All of Manitoulin should be concerned about this," pointed out Mr. Wilton. "This will effect us directly. With the prevailing southwest winds the Island is directly in the path of any spill."

But aside from the direct impact that a Line 5 would have on Manitoulin Island, Mr. Wilton notes that the environmental impact would be disastrous for literally millions

of people. With more than 40 million people dependant on the Great Lakes for drinking water and for commercial activity, including tourism and the fisheries, a spill would be the largest single environmental disaster in human history.

Chief among the concerns about the Line 5 pipeline is the track record of the company when it comes to transparency and safety. The aforementioned recently released PBS documentary (available online on YouTube) noted that when private citizens attempted to save oil-soaked wildlife from a previous massive oilspill on the Kalamazoo River, the company threatened those volunteers with lawsuits.

When it comes to cracks

in the pipeline, Enbridge had been aware of the issue for five years and when a spill did eventually occur, it took the company 17 hours to shut the pipeline down.

Enbridge spokesperson Roger Duffy, a former journalist who in fact covered the earlier Kalamazoo River spill has since gone to work for the company. He said that during his investigative reporting he discovered that Enbridge was a "good company" that has learned from its mistakes and seeks to do the right thing and "changed the way we do things" in response to the disaster. He maintained that the company shares the environmentalist concerns and that the pipeline through the Straits of Mackinac is "the best way to protect the Great Lakes."
That argument lies at the heart of the creation of the Line 5 pipeline. It was built during the aftermath of one of the worst disasters of the 1950s, when a tanker (the previous preferred method of shipping fossil fuels) exploded shortly after entering the har-

bour at Sarnia. One person

was killed and others

wounded in that incident.

The design of the pipeline, with its attendant two pipes, was designed to reduce corrosion. The pipelines are coated with seven layers to shield the metal from corrosion, but inspections have indicated that those seven layers "have been reduced from one to zero" according to the documentary.

Spokespersons for the US Coast Guard, those who would be tasked with dealing with a spill in the Straits of Mackinac, suggest that "it isn't as big a concern as people think."

The propane industry is one of the key supporters of the Line 5 project, with industry spokesmen citing that it would require 10,000 rail cars loads a year to replace the capacity of the line. With visions of Lac Magentic not yet faded from the public consciousness, that prediction may make the cure worse than the disease in some minds.

But the Pipeline Safety Alternatives Board formed by the Michigan state government and tasked with creating a report on the pipeline, a report released in October 2017, seemed to place the future of the pipeline in question and the board had scheduled public meetings seeking public comment on its report.

In November, the governor of Michigan and Enbridge signed an agreement that included seven new safety requirements (of the company that allegedly ignored previous safety commitments), including the concept of creating a new pipeline into a tunnel under the lakebed.

In the meantime, according to environmental groups monitoring the issue (including retired former company scientists), Line 5 continues to be a major concern and potential threat to the way of life of practically everyone who lives and works along the shores of the Great Lakes.



alcohol, smoking, work, sex, shopping or eating because they were traumatized, often early in life. If we as a society respond to this trauma as a criminal justice issue or a moral failing, we end up inflicting even more trauma on an already traumatized individual. The worst thing we can do is to respond punitively.

My position on this subject has been highly influence by Dr. Gabor Mate. Dr Mate is highly respected Canadian physician who spent much of his professional life treating addic-

tions. He writes and speaks extensively on this subject. As a Green, I would enlist his help to guide our government to form policy and implementa-

There are highly successful models internationally that are worth considering as an option in Ontario. The largest that I am aware of is San Patrignano in Italy. It is an enormous community that exists to support those on the personal and spiritual journey of healing trauma and resulting addictions. There is much we can learn and borrow from them.

I have (for lack of a better term) a liberal position on drugs. I am in

favour legalizing all drugs. Criminalizing drugs does little to stop their availability, fuels criminal activity, requires substantial policing and forces peoples' habits into the shadows where they are more difficult to reach and support. Resources currently spent on policing and law enforcement would be better used on compassionate care and support. Being able to legally access drugs eliminates the dangers of many street drugs and would provide additional revenue to our government which can be directed towards care and treatment. This approach also stems the flow of funds

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Single tender for gravel bid accepted by council

CENTRAL MANI-TOULIN—Only one tender to supply Central Manitoulin with granular "M" gravel was received in response to a request for proposals issued by council. The Road Committee meeting of May 1 recommended that the tender be accepted as presented.

The successful bidder for the tender was C. Pearson and Son, who submitted a bid of \$13.50 per cubic metres for 500 cubic metres at \$6,750 plus \$877.50 HST and \$17.49 for 6,000 cubic metres for a cost of \$104,940 plus \$13,642.20 and a total

of \$126,209.70.


The motion to accept the bid was moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Ted Taylor and passed without dissent by council. Mayor Richard Stephens was not in attendance, Deputy Mayor Alex Baran was in the chair.

"I was very surprised that we only got one bidder," said Councillor Stephens. "Usually we get two or three." Councillor Stephens quickly added that "Calvin really sharpened his pencil, so we did get a good price.

A tender process in May

2016 saw council reject the lowest bid in favour of a local supplier. That local bid, also from C. Pearson and Son, was awarded the contract to supply both with a bid of \$7,401 at \$13.10 per unit for 500 cubic metres of broken 3" and \$116,073 at \$17.12 per unit for 6,000 cubic metres of granular M.

Mayor Stephens noted during the 2016 debate that the difference in tender amounts was not significant enough to move the municipality from its current supplier.

...continued from page 1 ed before, is "going places," Ms. Manitowabi told The Expositor in a Monday interview.

Ms. Manitowabi, along with fellow Wiikwemkoong band member and Trent University traditional elder Shirlev Williams, acted as the official residential school consults for the movie, as both attended school in Spanish.

"It's a difficult film to watch; it's heavy," Ms. Manitowabi said.

Ms. Manitowabi said she was excited to plan the role of Naomi, wanting to leave a legacy for her grandchildren and great grandchil-

"I was six-years-old when I was taken," she said. "It's a part of history that's been very difficult. Even at my age we've struggled with those emotions all our lives; those issues of abandonment, rage, anger."

Manitowabi explained that nine of her brothers and sisters were taken away from the family home and placed into residential school. She was the youngest.

"We ended up being quite dysfunctional," allowed. "You're severed from your family and there's a disconnect that went on into adult years.'

Ms. Manitowabi said she was familiar with Richard Wagamese's work, the author of the book of the same name on which the film script is based and felt she could relate to his books as he is also the child of residential school survivors and a product of them, having been placed in foster care as a child.

'Reading was his way she said. "For me, it was ceremony. It wasn't until my late teens and 20s when the powwow first came to Wiky. It was quite cathartic. It created a hunger and a thirst for cultural knowledge.'

Until that time Ms. Manitowabi felt almost naked, that she was lacking something.

In the 1960s it was taboo to talk about traditional or ancestral knowledge," she continued. "I pursued that knowledge in my 20s and into my 30s. I had to find the elders and teachers." That quest for knowledge even took Ms. Manitowabi west and eventually led her to become a professor at Trent University in the school's Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies. Seeking a creative outlet for tradition,

Ms. Manitowabi founded the Nozhem Theatre, Trent's Indigenous theatre space. It was after seeing a production of Debajehmujig's 'Lupi the Great White Wolf' that Ms. Manitowabi was spurred on to use theatre as a way to pass on the

Ms. Manitowabi, who's now retired but stays on with the university as an elder, received a phone call from her sister who had received a call from a Mohawk actor. The actor had been asked to audition for the role of Naomi, but didn't know Anishinaabemowin so didn't feel comfortable with the part. Ms. Manitowabi's sister recommended her for the job, and so she auditioned and got the part.

"I really have to thank his spirit," Ms. Manitowabi said of Mr. Wagamese (who passed away earlier this year before the film's release). "I was able to use his spirit and his words to really help me with my own healing. He helped me conjure up strong emotions that were buried deep inside." When she first read 'Indian Horse,' Ms. Manitowabi cried and knew it was a story that had to be told.

"It's about a grandmother who loses a grandson to the school," Ms. Manitowabi said of the story. "He runs away to find her (his Nokomis), but comes back with the coughing disease, TB (Tuberculosis). Another son, Saul, him and I really bonded. I'm trying to protect him and the boys so I encouraged the parents to let me take them to a safe place where they can't be found."

Manitowabi explained that in the movie, her grandsons' parents are struggling with alcohol and, eventually, the eldest grandson passes away. In that scene director Stephen Campanelli asked the grandmother to wail.

"I thought 'how am I going to do this'," Ms. Manitowabi shared. "I use the images from my own childhood and remember the look on my mother's face as her last child was taken away and her own wailing. There wasn't a dry eye on the set," she said. "Even the cameramen had tears in their eyes.

Ms. Manitowabi also used her own lived experiences for the scene when the parents come to take the body of their son away. Naomi tells the parents to leave the booze behind, that they won't find their way. "I used my own experiences with my brothers; I remember hearing my mom say to them 'don't drink, you won't find your way back home'."

The scene that sees young Saul and his Nokomis trudging through the snow after losing their boat, with Naomi losing strength with every step, was also a powerful one for Ms. Manitowabi. 'As we're trudging I'm encouraging him," she explained. "I'm using that scene as a metaphor for the way I taught my own children.'

"I always taught my children to find the Red Roadit's been my own salvation," she explained. "A way to overcome the 'ghosts from the past,' as Richard says. The road is up ahead, but grandma knows she won't make it. 'No matter what, don't stop. It's just ahead'.

Ms. Manitowabi also spoke of the scene in 'Indian Horse' when Saul first arrives at the residential school and is forced to cut his long hair.

"That scene is pretty traumatic. When your hair is cut like that, it's like something is severed. (With residential school) everything is severed—relationships with your mom, dad, siblings."

Being a part of the cast of 'Indian Horse' was a powerful experience for Ms. Manitowabi and one that has helped her on her path to healing. "It's almost as though it shifted me to a different space.'

"It was a story that needed to be told," she added. When word of the film first got out, there was talk of cultural appropriation and even some protest, but Ms. Manitowabi credits the directors with shooting the film true to Mr. Wagamese's vision and doing their due diligence ...continued on page 12

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Central Manitoulin votes to launch garbage haulage pilot project pending MOE approval

CENTRAL MANITOULIN-A pilot project aimed at alleviating pressure on the Central Manitoulin landfill site received tentative approval during a May 10 meeting of council. The motion recommending that the garbage haulage pilot project start in July pending discussions with the Ontario Ministry of the Environment was moved by Councillor Derek Stephens and seconded by Councillor Patricia Mac-Donald.

"This is something that we have talked about for several years," said Councillor Stephens. "We have actually put money aside for a number of years for the pilot, not this council, but previous councils. I think this is something we have to do." Councillor Stephens noted that the current landfill site is rapidly filling up, but ref-

erenced that the rate has varied according to which study is referenced.

"What is the cost per year of hauling the material to the Dodge landfill operation?" asked Councillor Dale Scott.

"About \$100,000," responded Councillor MacDonald.

"But if we go with every second week it will whittle down to around \$50,000," offered Councillor Stephens. "We do have the money in reserves for this. We need to see how the MOE (Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change) feels about it."

Councillor Ted Taylor said that he was surprised to learn that the haulage of waste to an outside landfill could extend the life of the town's current landfill by between 10 and 20 years.

"One of the things I was surprised to learn was that

as much as 50 percent of the garbage going into our landfill was commercial, not residential," said Councillor Stephens. "I would have thought that most of the garbage would have been residential."

Councillor Scott noted that household garbage is a concern for many municipalities and suggested that the town might want to consider a ticketing system wherein residents purchase tags for the disposal of their garbage.

"Tickets go by weight," he said, "so households are more careful, being as they have to pay for it. It works in a lot of communities that are using the system. It would probably reduce a lot of garbage."

Councillor Alex Baran, who was chairing the council meeting in his capacity as deputy mayor, suggested that some form of composting and programs to redirect recycling away from the landfill might be explored as

"This may extend the life of the landfill while the

municipality explores other

avenues to deal with the issue," said Councillor Baran.

with every facet of the movie.

"I may have done some things in my past with my own kids to make sure my kids didn't go through what I did," Mr. Manitowabi admitted. "I left the reserve quite young. I was always searching, and for me it was searching for the Road—my identity, my voice, my spirit, my songs, my music."

"I wanted to make sure my children got that and we got ceremonies, even if we had to travel a great distance to get to them," she shared.

Ms. Manitowabi says she feel strongly that the healing is to be found in the culture. "Tell your story, express it. Tell the whole world."

"The images on a big screen—this is a powerful way to communicate to the rest of the world what happened to us. You get tired of people saying 'get over it.' In order for a person to heal you need to bring it out or the poison inside will fester, and what an incredible way to do that."

"Our people have a feeling of being infemy life and now I'm free."

rior," Ms. Manitowabi continued. "When that is drilled into you from childhood, things latch on—they stick to you, you wear it. But now you can't shut me up," she laughed. "I struggled with finding a voice; that's why I got into theatre."

When the movie first came out she said she heard a lot of 'I didn't know.'

"Well how come?" she questioned. "How come you didn't have the sense to ask what happened to the original people of this land?" This dark chapter of Canada's history, until recently, has been an afterthought with hardly a mention in any textbook. "I say to mainstream society, 'you have to be enlightened because you are enjoying the fruits of this land'."

"It's about time this story was out there in the open," Ms. Manitowabi said. "Before reconciliation can happen we have to tell our truth. Before we begin our healing, there has to be compassion."



Highway 540 was closed for approximately five hours while officers investigated the collision. No charges have been laid.

Province-wide campaign yields unwanted weapons and ammunition

Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) and its municipal law enforcement partners have received and rendered safe hundreds of weapons and thousands of rounds of ammunition during a month-long Gun Amnesty.

During April 2018, the OPP: received 592 gun amnesty calls for service, 86 of which (or 14.5 percent) were received through the online reporting option on the OPP website; recovered 689 items through appointments made OPP

including 267 rifles, 156 shotguns, 113 prohibited firearms and 62 other guns such as replica and vintage weapons. The OPP also collected 12,615 pieces of ammunition.

All Ontario police services participated in the monthlong initiative. During that time, a total of 1,503 guns were voluntarily surrendered in non-OPP jurisdictions.

A majority of firearms that have been surrendered to police will be destroyed, but a number of guns will be retained for historical, educational or training purposes. Although the gun amnesty has officially ended, police will continue to accept submissions from the public. Interested gun owners may call the OPP at 1-888-310-1122 or their local police service's non-emergency lines to arrange for officers to attend and safely retrieve the weapons.

Police continue to encourage members of the public to turn in unwanted weapons despite the conclusion of this initiative. Police retain the ability to exercise discretion (amnesty) regarding weapons related charges at all times, not just during this month long event. The public is reminded that no one should ever deliver guns, ammunition or military ordinance directly to police facilities.

Manitoulin-Espanola OPP April statistics

During the month of April, the Manitoulin-Espanola Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to 532 calls for service which included the following: four drug related occurrences; four driving related occurrences; one impaired driver; 13 violence related occurrences; 18 property related occurrences; and 37 motor vehicle collisions (MVC) (75 percent of which were animal-related).

In addition, Manitoulin-Espanola officers conducted numerous hours of traffic patrols, foot patrols and Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) checks.

As we ease into the warmer weather, Staff Sergeant Webb, detachment commander of the Manitoulin-Espanola OPP, reminds motorists that "Canada Road Safety Week is approaching May 15 until May 21, during this time the OPP will be focussing on the 'Big Four,' which consists of impaired, inattentive and aggressive driving as well as lack of seat belt use. These causal factors account for the majority of MVC fatalities in jurisdictions across the country, including those policed by the OPP."

OPP to offer Safeguard Ontario Property Security Program

by Alicia McCutcheon SHEGUIANDAH—In light of a spate of recent break and enters and thefts in the village of Sheguiandah, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) will be hosting a community crime prevention program at the Howland Seniors' Hall in Sheguiandah later this month.

Community Services Officer (CSO) Constable Marie Ford explained that, following the recent article highlighting the Sheguiandah crime, Auxiliary Constable Brian Boyd, formerly of Little Current (and son of retired CSO Al Boyd) reached out to Constable Ford and suggested he present the Safeguard Ontario Property Security Program to the community, a program in which he is

trained.

Constable Ford noted that there have been no further occurrences in Sheguiandah to date but the community was chosen as a good place to offer the program, which is open to anyone who would like to attend.

"Safeguard Ontario is a community-based crime prevention program developed to help citizens 'lock criminals out of house and home'," Constable Ford told The Expositor. "It also gives the public a chance to see what auxiliary constables do and have a chat with them."

"It can happen to anyone," Constable Ford said of crime. "If we can give people the tools, we're maybe one step ahead."

The Safeguard Ontario Property Security Program will be held on Monday, May 28 at 7 pm at the Howland Seniors' Hall in Sheguiandah. Team/Peer Support Program.

Continued progress was made in the established priorities for action during the second year of implementation of Supporting Our Communities. Achievements include increased referrals to community support services, tools to aid police in communicating more effectively with medical professionals and people experiencing a mental health crisis, over 1,200 OPP members have completed Crisis Intervention

Training, and continued training for OPP members in de-escalation techniques.

"Members across the organization continue to embrace this evolving strategy," Commissioner Hawkes said. "We have made significant achievements, but recognize there will always be more work to be done. I am proud of all that has been accomplished in just over two years in support of the important issue of mental health."



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Ontario Liberals release Northern Ontario platform



SHEGUIANDAH—Their portraits stand sentinel, perched stolidly on the walls of the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah gallery, their stern Victorian/Edwardian style gazes surveying Island descendants who come to visit the 2018 Manitoulin Genealogy Heritage Exhibit.

The portraits may be forgiven their sombre demeanor, as these are the hardy folks who hacked farmland from a tangled wilderness, first hewing rough log (and even sometimes earthen) shelters to protect their families from the elements in what was then generally considered a wild and savage land located on the very fringes of "New Ontario."

The Heritage exhibit runs from May 8 to May 19 and was complemented with a Heritage Tea held from 2 pm to 7 pm on Thursday, May 10.

"We encouraged people to bring in their family photographs, antiques and family treasures," said Manitoulin Genealogy spokesperson Marjorie Collie. "Or to just come in and view the portraits we have on display."

The Heritage Exhibit is intended as an interactive experience. "Kids can do their family tree, and so can adults, view the genealogy materials and get in touch with their family roots."


Ms. Collie noted that Manitoulin Genealogy

Providence Bay Beach cleanup permit is being put to good use

PROVIDENCE BAY—Central Manitoulin crews were busy at the Providence Bay Beach recently as they conducted remedial work on the famed beach and boardwalk under the auspices of a 25-vear permit secured by the town last year.

"It's a little bit funny," admitted Councillor Alex Baran. "For years it was assumed that because of the stringent environmental regulations that are in place these days and the presence of endangered species that nothing could be done about the beach.' So essentially nobody really pushed the matter with the Ministry of the Environment or the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF).

But a couple of wellplaced phone calls and a bit of follow up discovered that there was actually a process whereby the beach could be cleaned up and maintained. Particularly since much of the damage being done was actually being caused by the presence of invasive species that were crowding out the endangered native species that were assumed to prevent any cleanup attempt.

"We are in the second year of our permit," said Central Manitoulin Economic Development Officer Nancy Kinoshemeg. "The permit allows us to conduct

beach and boardwalk thing to emphasize is that cleanup.'

Under the careful guidance of Island biologist Judith Jones of Winter Spider Eco-Consulting the town has identified those parts of the beach where endangered species are located and what invasive species have encroached on the beach.

Thanks to the detailed plans submitted to the MNRF and the 25-year permit that the ministry issued, the town has been relieved of the necessity, and considerable paperwork required in reapplying for a permit to work on the beach every year.

"We have found a balance between having an area that everyone can enjoy and protecting species at risk," said Ms. Kinoshe-"Last year we meg. removed a lot of invasive vegetation around the playground and volleyball court." This year the work was a bit more aggressive, removing trees and shrubs that do not belong in the beach dune ecology that supports the endangered species. Some of the shrubs were removed last year and the remainder were removed this year.

There is still a bit of work to be done this year, including clearing the pathway from the boardwalk to the water.

"The most important

the work has to be completed as part of a proper beach management plan," noted Ms. Kinoshemeg. The work has been completed on municipal property but the hope is that private landowners will take their lead from the work being done by the municipality. "The hope is that other waterfront owners would look and see what can be achieved," she said.

The annual Providence Bay beach cleanup took place on Saturday, May 12. Volunteers picked up garbage and raked mounds of debris left behind by municipal workers. Some walked the shoreline looking for phragmites fragments and roots that constituted a tripping hazard.

One volunteer, Joanne, was singled out as someone who is instrumental in maintaining a clean and welcoming beach. In addition to participating in the annual cleanup, Joanne walks the beach daily on garbage and phragmites patrol. While phragmites removal was undertaken last year you have to remain vigilant, she explained.

The Providence Bay residents expressed relief that beach remedial work was finally underway, noting the sandy beach and clear waters were the main draw for the tourist town.







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2018 Show and Share sees over 200 quilters flock to Manitoulin

by Alicia McCutcheon LITTLE CURRENT—Manitoulin Island once again hosted the Show and Share, the annual event that tours Northeastern Ontario, allowing quilters to gather for fellowship, fun and to share their quilted creations to a large and admiring group.

Late last month the Island Quilters Guild, Current Quilts and Stitchery Guild and Happy Quilters (the three Island quilt groups) worked together to host the group of over 200 quilters from across the northeast at the recreation centre in Little Current.

"The Island Quilters had never hosted and we were feeling very guilty," Lauren McDonald, one of the chief Show and Share organizers, admits. There is a lot of cross-pollination among the guilds and so a committee was formed and the offer to host was given. It was readily accepted.

This reporter commented on the filled-to-capacity rec centre hall on the day of the event. "That's what it's like every year and it's been that way since 2004 when Rayside Balfour started it," Ms. McDonald said.

The April 28 Show and Share saw 13 of the 14 Northeast guilds represented. "We didn't think the (poor) weather would mean people would come, but they did," she added. You can't keep a good quilter

A Show and Share consists of lunch followed by an afternoon of, well, showing and sharing.

"It's an unwritten rule that if you're coming, you're sharing," she said.

One by one, tables are called and the quilters, or fibre artists, get in line with their creations. Ms. McDonald explained that some of the guilds, such as Current Quilts, do stitchery too, and some do fibre arts, so there is a good mix of what is being showed.

Volunteer students wait on the rec centre stage to help show the quilt off to the audience. Each quilter is then given a moment to say a few words about their piece. The unveiling of the quilts is often met with 'ooohs' and 'ahhhs' from the audience.

Each Show and Share also includes a special quilt block (the basic unit that goes into making quilt). This year, the Island groups asked each quilter attending to create a Mason jar block. All of the blocks met the same specification (8.5 inches square) with the same Mason jar pattern. After that, it's up to you. The walls were lined with Mason jar blocks, each jar something holding unique-from strawberries to cookies to skunks. A raffle is held at the Show and Share that sees one lucky quilter the winner of the blocks, giving them a quilt almost ready to go, or at least the pieces ready to be sewn together and quilted.

"On the Island, we're famous for making our own food, so we picked a Mason jar," Ms. McDonald said of the design.

Each of the place set-

"People think quilting requires patience; it's not patience," she said. "Working with your hands in any way can be a meditation and help to calm down the racing thoughts in your





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
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
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

Assiginack Council Notes

Special council meeting A special meeting was held April 17 with council and New North Fisheries representatives Jeff Tuerk and Ross Herbert in regards to their whitefish aquaculture project in Manitowaning

In 2017, council had supported the project and entered a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for use of a municipal road allowance for placing a sea container, for storage use, on the site.

Council expressed to Mr. Tuerk and Mr. Herbert that concerns have been expressed over the use of the road allowance, insurance and water quality of the Bay and said they would like to see this project move onto private property if it is going to continue beyond the one-year term of the

Mr. Tuerk and Mr. Herbert said that as the pilot project has not been concluded, they would like an extension of the MOU until the end of Jun,e as it would be difficult to find and prepare a new site for the sea container and move the fish cage in a short period. They did acknowledge that the project would have to move on to private property and will work towards that goal for the end of 2018.

Staff is investigating the terms of an MOU extension.



Over 100 students tour Sheguiandah fish hatchery at annual visit

SHEGUIANDAH—The Little Current Fish and Game Club (LCFGC) had another successful week of tours from Grade 4 classes from across the Island last week as students had the chance to learn about the lifecycle of the walleye and of fish conservation.

Almost 100 students from Little Current Public School, Assiginack Public School, Central Manitoulin Public School, Lakeview School and new, this year, Charles C. McLean Public School toured the Bass Lake Creek Walleye Hatchery over four days. Students from Wiikwemkoong's Pontiac School were also scheduled to come but had to cancel their annual trip.

The educational four sees the students get up close and personal with different species of fish live-trapped in a hoop net before their visit and learn about the massive amount of eggs that come from one female walleye. If that walleye is harvested before the female lays her eggs, that's hundreds of thousands of potential fish that will not be born and repopulate Manitoulin's waters.

The students got to see the hatchery in action with LCFGC President Bill Strain, learn about the native fish and wildlife of Manitoulin with Gary Green, build a bass nest with Manitoulin Streams' Seija Deschenes, tour Bass Creek and see rainbow trout and walleye in their annual spawn, have a visit with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry's Conservation Officer Iain McGale and learn all about the tiny invertebrates found in our waterways.

At the end of each tour, the LCFGC gifts each student with a high-end rod and reel, encouraging them to get out and fishing while being good stewards of the land with their newfound knowledge.

Mr. Strain told The Expositor that this has been a poor year in terms of capturing spawning females for the fish hatchery. Of approximately 50 fish captures in hoop nets, only four were female and only two of those females had eggs.

"I don't know if it's because of the late year," Mr. Strain said. "Perhaps they spawned out on the shoals."

The club has a little less than three litres of fertilized eggs this year. Normally that figure would be around 15 litres.

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National Day of Mourning observed in Aundeck Omni Kaning

by Michael ErskineAUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING-A small and sombre group of Island elected officials, union representatives and organization heads joined members of the Manitoulin Injured Workers Group (MIWG) for an April 28 candlelight memorial observance of the National Day of Mourning held in the board room of the Manitoulin Legal Clinic. The National Day of Mourning is held each April 28 to remember those who have died, were injured or made ill from their work and to make the commitment to protect workers and to prevent further workplace tragedies.

"Today being the National Day of Mourning, there are many observances taking place," said Colin Pick, master of ceremonies for the afternoon. "This is the fifth year this ceremony is being held on Manitoulin

Mr. Pick called for the recognition of Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin and Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens, as well as Manitoulin OPP Detachment Commander Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb, MIWG President Gary Hrytsak, UNIFOR rep Kevin Bailey and Pastor Martin Garniss, thanking them for their attendance at the memorial.

Manitoulin Legal Clinic Executive Director Mike Shain was the first speaker and he recalled one of the most shocking revelations he found while reading the

book 'Working Class War,' a book on the American involvement in the Vietnam War. "Same number of soldiers died in 1968, the year of highest casualties in the Vietnam conflict," he said. "There were 100,000 people dying each year from industrial accidents and diseases." The Vietnam War casualties resulted in massive protest marches and opposition, yet for those lost to workplace tragedy

there was, and continues to be, "relative silence," He was left wondering about the worth placed on workers' lives—"there have nevbeen nation-wide protests, workers' names have never been inscribed on a black granite monument. You are left with the impression that workers' lives don't matter, they don't count—if they did matter they would continue

Although politicians are often heard to utter words of support and assurances that they have passed laws to protect workers "it obviously has not been enough, workers continue to be injured and killed in the workplace."

Mr. Shain called for a national inquiry into why so many workers continue to be killed on the job. "These are not numbers in the abstract," he said.

"These are fathers and many times; a company mothers, these are our brothers and sisters, our children—not lines on the spreadsheet denoting the cost of doing business. We need to understand that there are things in our society that need to be fixed."

MIWG President Hrytsak recalled the working life of his father, who passed at age 95 in relatively robust health. "He took care of himself," he said, noting that in the days before hearing protection equipment, his father and co-workers would stuff wet toilet paper wads into their ears to ward off the impact of the loud industrial machinery.

In conversation following the official statements, President Hrytsak noted the challenge that organizing injured workers into an effective lobbying voice has proven daunting, made even more challenging by a social reticence to push back against the system and an odd reluctance of people to recognize that it could so easily happen to them or their own loved ones, but that something has to be done. "We go to work to earn a living." he said. "We don't go to die."

UNIFOR rep Mr. Bailey spoke of some of the industrial issues that he has faced locally, including the propensity for industrial companies to pressure employees to not file WSIB (Worker's Safety Insurance Board) claims when injured and to retaliate when they

"But we have seen it so

pays an injured worker their wages while they are off injured, but then later, when the consequence of that injury comes back, the company has gone bankrupt, moved on, and the worker is left without recourse," he said. Mr. Bailey said that such abuse of authority is all too commonplace and needs to be stopped. Too often in the past both a company and the union representing their workers have been complicit in preventing the filing of claims.

Staff Sergeant Webb said that it was "humbling to be a part of this important event, remembering those who lost their lives as a result of workplace incidents, also the many individuals who have suffered injuries which altered their personal and professional lives. No one goes to work with the intention of not coming home safely at the end of the day," he stated.

Staff Sergeant Webb noted that, in his capacity as a police officer, "specifically when I was a detective, I investigated serious injury and death occurrences related to the mining industry, the logging industry, construction industry, commercial transport industry and, of course, emergency services employees." All of the victims in these cases had intended to come home safely to their families.

The staff sergeant took the opportunity to memorialize fallen officers, in par-...continued on page 5A

ticular Constable Lloyd Lackey. Although he did not personally know Const. Lackey, who died in 1972, he did have the opportunity to meet some of his family during a bridge dedication ceremony held not far away from where that day's ceremony was being held. Constable Lackey was killed while returning from a domestic call. Travelling down Highway 540 late at night an oncoming car swerved into their lane. Although his partner survived the head-on collision, both Const. Lackey and the

driver of the other car were killed.

Today, Const. Lackey's name graces the OPP Wall of Honour at its headquarters, but is also memorialized by the bridge over Graham Creek in Honora on Highway 540, dedicated to his memory in a ceremony held in August, 2013.

Staff Sergeant Webb said it was "very gratifying for me to see that we have events such as this to recognize and remember all those who lost their lives or made significant sacrifices through serious injury in the workplace." He went on to publically thank the

event and family members of those who lost their lives for allowing him the opportunity to honour their loved ones. He concluded his remarks by saying "we will not forget."

Mayor MacNevin and Mayor Stephens together lit a candle in memory of the fallen on a table decked with icons of the mining industry, including a vintage mining helmet, an old miner's lamp and a canary cage (symbolizing the canary in the coal mine concept, where miners would use a canary as an early warning of poison

Pastor Martin Garniss read out the names of the Manitoulin Island workers who had been lost to workplace injuries and members of the MIWG who had passed on in the last year

MIWG member Herne Steelgrave noted that the organization is not just a group that deals with injured workers, but is also a support group and he urged those suffering from the isolation of workplace injury to reach out to the group.


