Island Cold War veterans receive service medals for NATO action

LITTLE CURRENT—A warm Vic-toria Day Weekend sun shone down brightly on the men dressed in dark Legion blue as they assembled under the stony gaze of the Little Current cenotaph this past weekend. Their mission on this fine warm day was to honour two men for their service during some of western civilization's darkest hours-known to history as The Cold War.

Canadian Armed Forces as Little Current Royal Canadian Legion Branch 177 public relations officer Roy Eaton explained the day's events to a small crowd of family members, local veterans and Legion members, leavened with a smattering of May 24 weekend visitors to the Island.

Quoting the honourees who claimed not to know what they were being awarded medals for, Comrade Eaton explained that "the Special Service Medal is a medal awarded to members of by Queen Elizabeth II on June 16, 1984, and that recipients of this medal must have performed 'service under exceptional circumstances in a specifically defined location for an established period of time'.'

Comrade Eaton went on to explain that "the medal is always issued with a bar, which specifies the special service which the medal recognizes" and that, "each bar has its own criteria.

The bars being presented that day were authorized on November 26, 1992, and included the ...continued on page 9

Northeast Town working with Cup and Saucer owners to ensure trails remain open

MANITOULIN-The Cup and Saucer trails opened again for the season this past May long weekend, but after a number of trespassing incidents in the off season, one of the property owners was forced to consider closing it to the public permanently.

The property that the Cup and Saucer trails are accessed from, including the parking lot and portion of the trails, is owned by Casson Eadie, proprietor of Don Eadie Construction. Mr. Eadie had concerns prior to the long weekend this year after a number of individuals trespassed on his property when the trails were closed for the season.

"I had a bunch of people trespassing when the trails was closed," Mr. Eadie told The Expositor. "I spoke to a few of them and they were really rude. I'm frustrated. The Cup and Saucer is on my property—private property. It's a nice piece of land I could just keep to myself, but I don't. When I close it for the season I put rocks in front of the parking lot and put up signs, but people just ignore it and use the trails anyway.

Earlier this month the Northeast Town Fire Department, OPP and EMS were all called to the Cup and Saucer after a hiker, trespassing on

Reading The Expositor convinced Les Kostick to leave Toronto, move to Manitoulin Your local community newspaper turns 137 with this issue

MANITOWANING-This week's paper marks the change in volume from 136 to 137, meaning that your community newspaper, the oldest in Northern Ontario, is celebrating its 137th birthday. The very first edition of this newspaper came out on May 24, 1879, presumably scheduled to coincide with the birthday of the popular Queen Victoria. The paper spent its first few years in Manitowaning. Fitting, then, that our annual birthday story takes place in that same community and relates how this newspaper convinced someone to move there from Toronto.

Many know Island transplant Lorne Kostick from his Les Stuff business just outside of Manitowaning. He jokes that "I'm the place with the green house that grows machinery,' and true to his word, his lawn is covered with mechanical

bits and bobs waiting to be sold. Mr. Kostick is an affable fellow with a pleasant word for everyone and a love of Manitoulin that runs deep, despite his having been here for a relatively short 13 year stint (not long enough yet for him to lose the 'from away' status).

During March Break of 2003, the Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO) had an art installation titled 'Audge's Place' that literally saw Audrey Wemigwans' Wikwemikong kitchen dismantled and brought to the AGO, a pot of corn soup always simmering on the stove, inviting visitors in for a bowl and some good conversation.

"I went to the AGO, I hadn't been there for 35, maybe 40 years," Mr. Kostick told this newspaper last week. As part of the installation, The

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Point Grondine Park signs understanding with Killarney Park

KILLARNEY—A memorandum of understanding (MOU) between Wikwemikong's Point Grondine Park and Killarney Provincial Park will solidify a relationship that has already been in place for several years, providing a framework for training personnel in the short term and a template for future collaborations between Killarney Provincial Park and Point Grondine and the Wikwemikong band.

Killarney Provincial Park Superintendent Jeremy Paulson explained that the MOU provides and exciting opportunity for both groups. "It's great," he said. "It formalizes the partnership and allows Ontario Parks to support Wikwemikong and Point Grondine."

"The MOU basically solidifies an existing partnership," agreed Wikwemikong Tourism Manager Luke Wassegijig.

The MOU indicates the details of training that will take place over the next few years, including job shadowing with the Point Grondine staff. "That includes our park warden training," said Mr. Paulson. The warden training has been underway for the past year, where the trainee studies the principles of management planning and operations.

"We operate officially with ecological integrity, it is right in the Act," noted Mr. Paulson. "It's our number one mandate." That focus provides an important link between the First Nations and Ontario Parks.

Over the next three years, personnel from Point Grondine Park will also be accommodated in the Killarney Park ranger accommodations as they study operations at Killarney. On the Killarney side of the ledger, the interpretive program at Wikwemikong will see staff provid-

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Manitoulin Nature Club to highlight Island Notable Trees at free conference this weekend

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Nature Club is hosting a two-day Notable Trees of Manitoulin (NTOM) 'Trees, Trees, Trees' Conference this Friday, May 27 and Saturday, May 28 in Mindemoya.

The conference will include presentations and workshops from arborists, foresters and other industry professionals, as well as guided walks to see some of the NTOM.

"The idea behind the conference was to help make people more aware of trees and what a treasure they are," explained one of the organizers and a member of the Manitoulin Nature Club. "We also want to highlight the many trees that were recognized through NTOM whether they are historical or special to individuals and families. Its important to preserve and recognize the importance and emotional attachment people have to trees."

The Manitoulin Nature Club started the NTOM initiative last year, reaching out to Islanders to nominate 'witness trees' or trees of significance.

Early surveyors documented trees at the imaginary corners and angles of parcels of land to mark boundaries and called them 'witness trees.' This distinction is also used to describe trees present at key historical events or events specific to a particular person such as a wedding or engagement. Notable trees can include notable specimens because of their size, form, shape, beauty, age, colour, rarity or other distinctive features. It can also include living relics that display evidence of cultural modification by aboriginal or non-aboriginal people, including strips of bark or knotgreen wood removed, test hole cuts to determine soundness, furrows cut to collect pitch or sap or blazes to mark a trail. As well, prominent community landmark trees, trees associated with local folklore, myths, legends or traditional or specimens associated with a historical person, place or event, qualify for nomination.

BIRCH ISLAND—Teachers and students gathered around the microscope taking turns observing developing walleye fry up close and personal as they learn the importance of conservation, the Seven Grandfather teachings and the importance of preserving a resource for the next seven generations.

The Children's Micro Hatchery Project is a collaboration between Waubetek Business Services' Aboriginal Fisheries Strategy and the United Walleye Clubs, with funding provided by Aboriginal Aquaculture in Canada Initiative and the Canadian Department of Oceans and Fisheries.

"We are starting with four (classroom incubator systems) and are hoping to expand it," said Waubetek General Manager Dawn Madahbee. "The project hopes to combine fisheries and conservation with the grandfather teachings, not only passing on traditional values but utilizing modern technology, environmental issues and the impact of conservation on the land."

United Walleye Clubs volunteer Rolly Frappier has been engaged in the classroom hatchery project for several years. "This is my passion," he admits, smiling as he watches the students' excitement as they observe the fish fry under the lens. "This is what makes it all worthwhile for me."

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

Honeymoon period may be over for Trudeau's Liberals

Every new government, especially one led by a newly-minted and first time prime minister, enjoys a "honeymoon period" with the electorate, the first few months following the election when both the new government and new prime minister are given the benefit of the double as their actions and policies are closely watched.

Eventually, this period will end and, for many Canadians, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's honeymoon time with voters ended last week when he marched down the center aisle of the House of Commons and laid hands on the opposition Conservative party whip in a physical effort by a frustrated prime minister in an attempt to move along the debate, and eventual vote, on a crucial piece of legislation related to people's rights, under certain circumstances, to determine the time and means of their deaths with medical assistance.

In the process of attempting to push the Conservative whip back to his side of the House, another MP, a female member of the NDP caucus, was also joslted by Mr. Trudeau.

For the balance of that day and the next one as well, the opposition parties made as much of a political meal as possible from the young prime minister's unusual physicality and Mr. Trudeau spent much of that afternoon and the following day giving public apologies for his actions.

Prime Minister Trudeau was trying to urge along a vote on a procedural matter that, it is clear, would diminish the effectiveness of the Official Opposition Conservatives and the third party New Democrats as its intent was to limit debate on the government's physician assisted suicide bill.

After the kerfuffle last Wednesday, the government, because of its majority, had its way and the bill to limit debate was passed.

The next day, however, no doubt due to Mr. Trudeau's actions in attempting to herd the Conservative whip back to his seat for this very vote and elbowing the NDP MP in the process, the government wisely decided that these circumstances had tainted the procedural bill's passage and so it was withdrawn by way of another indirect apology by not only the prime minister, but the entire Liberal government to the House.

To have done otherwise in light of the prime minister's uncalledfor actions prior to the vote would have left the Liberal government and prime minister looking like bullies determined to get their way no matter what.

The Supreme Court of Canada, in its February 6, 2015 ruling, determined that Canadians have the right to physician-assisted suicide. Part of its ruling at that time was to direct all the provincial governments and the federal government to have in place their own laws legalizing dying in this way within a year.

Because of last fall's federal election and the dissolution of parliament in the early summer, the new Liberal government petitioned the Supreme Court for an extension to have the federal law in place. In January, a four-month extension was granted and so the Liberals, by limiting debate, were attempting to live within the timeframe alloted by the Supreme Court in its extension.

The government will of course pass a law on physician-assisted dying because they have a majority in the House of Commons.

Prime Minister Trudeau erred in judgment, however, in a number of ways and that is why his honeymoon period with the Canadian public can be seen to be effectively over.

He certainly should not have taken the law into his own hands and tried to lead the Conservative whip back to his seat so the government motion on limiting debate would proceed.

The female NDP member's jostling was clearly an unintentional act but it wouldn't have happened at all if common sense had prevailed and Mr. Trudeau hadn't thought it necessary to lay hands on the Conservative Party whip.

The Liberals were using the power of their numbers to enact legislation that, by limiting debate, would allow government to eventually pass a bill formally legalizing physician-assisted dying and to do this within the time limit set by the Supreme Court.

From the opposition parties' viewpoints, no one likes to be manipulated by procedure and so doubtless the members of the Conservative and New Democratic Parties were standing in the center aisle chatting because they were in no hurry to return to their seats to vote on legislation that would limit what they had to say about a topic that, for many of them, may be ethically troubling.

The prime minister should have recognized all of this, and, by humor or other means of cajoling them, encouraged them to eventually take their seats for the vote with its known outcome.

The fact that he attempted to physically move members around speaks to an immaturity and lack of judgment, which must be a lesson learned.

But the fact that the government side of the House so profoundly misread the opposition's response to an issue that is important and that they were pushing back, as best they could, to the procedural legislation that would, in effect, shut them up, is equally troubling notwithstanding the Supreme Court's deadline on the matter.

In the past, it has been common for the Conservatives and New Democrats to characterize the Liberals as arrogant.

Up to this point, Mr. Trudeau and his new government have gone out of their way to avoid this characterization.

This issue, and the Liberal majority's backtracking on the legislation they pushed though following the prime minister's aggressive blunder, must give the government pause to consider their future approaches to important legislation, especially laws that that have emotional overtones such as this one so that all sides can claim to have done their best even though the outcome was inevitable.

A call to reconsider not investing in the future of the cruise industry on Manitoulin

Dear Mayor Alan MacNevin and members of council:

News of your recent decision to not contribute to funding your community's share of membership in the Great Lakes Cruising Coalition has been published and I would offer the following comments. Your \$2,000 share of membership in the GLCC, which costs three stakeholders a total of \$5,000 per year, has been an excellent investment for the town of Little Current and has paid dividends in sustainable revenue for the community and its partners. Because of these promotional efforts, Manitoulin Island has developed a reputation as a "must see" and "must visit" destination in the Great Lakes, on par with Mackinac Island for popularity and patronage. The Little Current membership consortium has been led by the Great Spirit Circle Trail, a creative aboriginal tourism community with many years' experience in the cruise business and it is they, along with Lakeshore Excursions, that have spearheaded the drive to raise the profile of Little Current as the access point for the Oiibwe Cultural Foundation, which has provided a unique cultural experiences for visitors to enjoy.

Each cruise ship in the Great Lakes currently calls at Little Current, tying up adjacent to the front street opposite most of your stores and retail outlets. It is safe to say that each of those traders have benefitted from the cruise business, as well as your "invisible" service providers such as coach companies, guides, food suppliers, garbage disposal firms, engineering companies and the rental of space on your waterfront mooring wall. You may remember that it was not too long ago that this downtown mooring wall was in desperate condition, in need of considerable repair and I am confident in saying that without the presence of these cruise ships, Little Current would have been challenged to make a solid case for infrastructure funding that resulted in such a handsome rebuild of the facility. In many respects the cruise business played a pivotal role in attracting that funding and has contributed towards the wellbeing of the town and region.

The work that the GLCC does on behalf of Little Current far exceeds the investment of \$5,000 per year and not a day goes by without us making a case for cruise ships visiting your community. We are able to work on your behalf because your investment allows our outreach program to promote the town. Without that funding, our ability to take Little Current to the cruise market is severely diminished and absolutely unable to continue.

I would urge council to revisit their decision and remain a part of this most effective marketing trade association

Bid Smith

EDITOR'S NOTE: This story began on March 9 with an interview of Bid Smith at that time with one follow-up appointment with his daughter Bev Stevens. This writer was very upset and sad to hear that Bid had passed away on Monday, May 9 after a short illness. It was pure serendipity or good luck that we got his story in time. Bid was proud to be 100years-old and in his own words, "still kicking." His story was not changed after his passing was confirmed. It was left it the way he wanted us to see it and it is published with his family's encouragement and support.

This Centenarian has been part of Manitoulin's nostalgic transformation for over 100 years. He has been a resident of Little Current since his home birth on October 15, 1915 to Thomas and Mary Ann (nee Clark) Smith. In the early part of the 20th century, most babies were born at home with the assistance of a midwife. The hospital wasn't set up for births as today. Older brothers Arnold (AJ), Austin, and Elmer welcomed little Orvil Francis, thereafter known as Bid. Clarence would be born later. "I was named after uncle Frank," Bid explains, "and this

place has always been home to me." Hockey was an important aspect of this young man's life and also in later years. Much of his working time was spent at his oldest brother AJ's hardware store, helping with the family business.

Bid's father Thomas and mother Mary-Ann were born at the end of the 19th century, in 1882 and 1884 respectively. They have always had close ties to Manitoulin as well. Thomas, the son of William Henry Smith and Sarah McLaughlan, was an early entrepreneur. He had a home construction business for many years. He would build a new home in Little Current, move his family in and



two dollars a day. There were lots of boats on site we could use and from time to time we would serve shore lunches for visitors."

Mary Ann would home-school her children after they left school in May until late September when the cottages closed. The school provided the teaching materials. Mary Ann likely helped out at the camp too because she was a good cook. The family lived in the top of the boat house. "There is a photo of my parents at the window of the boat house, watching my brother and I playing in front," Bid holds. "We used to go on a lot of picnics in McGregor Bay as well. Those were a lot of fun. A big wicker picnic basket, full of good food, would be enjoyed on Baker's Island or on a beautiful, remote spot." Daughter Beverly fondly remembers also going on these picnics when she was a little girl.

School was not something young Bid coveted. It interfered with all the activities he could be doing at home, like hunting or fishing. "I went as far as Grade 5. It seems I played hooky quite a bit so eventually they let me go so I could do what I really enjoyed." The school burnt down in 1925 but Bid had nothing to do with that. Hockey was a beloved sport for the Smith family. "I was about 10years-old when hockey started on the Island. The original Little Current arena was built on Russ and Bill Collins' land, where RONA Building Supplies was. We played our first hockey games right there. Austin, Elmer, Clarence and I played on the same team. We won 16 and tied one that year. There were no losses." Many games were played in Killarney and the team travelled over the frozen ice from Manitoulin to Killarney, originally by horse sleigh and later by bus or by car. They would usually get home before dark.



we always made it without mishap. For a game in Little Current, the trip was just as challenging. If we left from Baker's in the fall, we used a boat to get to Birch Island, then we walked to the railway to catch the train to Little Current. To get to West Bay for a game, we occasionally had to skate Northern Channel to get closer to West Bay." During the years the horses pulled the sleigh, trips to Gore Bay involved stops for fresh horses at Honora or West Bay. If it was really cold, the boys would jump off and run behind the sleigh just to keep warm.

"We had good teachers and coaches who also helped us win lots of trophies." Dad Tom helped with the coaching in Little Current. Mary Ann agreed to the boys using her kitchen for hockey practice. Occasionally she would long for summer when her boys would stop hockey practice.

Austin played hockey in Chapleau after his teacher and coach moved from Little Current to that community and asked him to play on the new team. In due course, he became a barber and a carpenter but preferred the tourist business in later years. Austin developed his own facility, Smith's Resort, on land beside where Harbor Vue Marina is now. He had three daughters to help him with the new venture.

Elmer was 15 when he moved to Cleveland to work in his aunt and

uncle's restaurant. He was also in the American war effort for a while. Clarence worked for Ontario Hydro. He was the captain of the hydro boat the 'Nanabush,' which delivered and erected hydro poles in remote locations. His team would also string the lines for the cottagers. Clarence loved to prepare meals on that boat. "Austin, Elmer and Clarence learned to be carpenters. I really didn't have any specific skills,' Bid shares. When he was old enough and the family moved back to Little Current from McGregor Bay in the late fall, Bid worked with his dad at Smith's hardware, his older brother AJ's store in Little Current. It sat next to Grant Turner's store. AJ had come down with polio at age six and his disability necessitated getting help at the store. "I would do whatever AJ needed, stocking shelves, helping customers and selling them what they needed," he explains. Daughter Bev adds, "He could sell anyone anything; he was that good a salesman. AJ appreciated Bid's expert assistance." Bid lived with AJ and his wife Irene at that time.


and Elmer Vincent on drums. They played in the Shaftsbury Hall and in Sheguiandah and for other groups. Tickets were 25 cents and each member of the band made five to six dollars per night.

"In the late 1940s and fifties, the Smith family had their own band for family get-togethers and other events. Uncle Clarence played the accordion, Aunt Marion played piano, Dad was on the drums and Walter Morphet joined us playing the fiddle," Bev adds. "The band would play after the cattle sales in the Orange Hall (now the Masonic Hall) where dances were held. I remember dad playing the drums; his powerful rhythm would draw me to my feet," she continues. "After the break, he would come for me. He taught me to dance. Ordinary dancing and round dancing were popular when I was growing up." Sometimes Beverly would practice at home with her dad who let her step on his feet while he guided her through the motions. "He was fine with that until I started to lead, then that practice stopped."

Bid, his brothers and his dad would go hunting for deer in season. "We gave away all the meat and the fish we caught to neighbours. Our family didn't enjoy the wild meat but we enjoyed giving it away. Our neighbours and friends were happy." Bev adds, "I remember going to the edge of town to the first hill and pulling suckers from the ditch; there was a culvert there and the fish were plentiful." The family would catch them with their hands and load up the truck from the 'sucker run,' then drive slowly through town to distribute them to waiting families. "We caught two big sturgeons in the lake and put them in a tank for a short while, so people could see them. Then we released them again." Fish were plentiful.







NATO bar, which recognizes honourable service with NATO."

Comrade Eaton noted that qualifying service is defined as being posted with a NATO unit, or to an allied unit or Canadian Forces unit beyond the territorial borders of Canada serving under the command of a NATO headquarters.

"Shipmate Jeff Marshall served for 10 years and Shipmate Gary Trimmer for three years with the Canadian Forces, Navy both on separate destroyers," said Comrade Eaton. "Jeff was an engineer and Gary was a sonar operator. Both saw service around Cuban waters during the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962 when the world almost erupted into nuclear war. During those troubled times, both served on ships which had rounded topsides so nuclear dust would be washed away and no chance of being trapped in raised bulwarks." Comrade Eaton had a photograph of the type of destroyer the shipmates had served upon, which he used to demonstrate the vessels.

"To be eligible for the medal, one has to see service in a number of NATO operations," he continued. "The Cuban Missile Crisis was one, a combined training exercise under British command in the Hebrides and a Mediterranean exercise was another. In addition, between the two of them they sailed in the waters off Greenland, Iceland, Denmark, Portugal, Gibraltar and Bermuda, to name a few."

Comrade Eaton related one of Mr. Trimmer's memories while off the coast of Italy. "That real estate section really caught my eye and I thought 'what an interesting place'."



Plow. \$248,397; and Tru-Nor Truck Centre: 1) International 7500 SFA, Viking Plow, \$195,770.25; 2) International 7500 SBA (tandem), Viking Plow, \$205,050.12.

Council deferred to Ron Cooper, roads superintendent, who suggested option three of Cambrian Truck Centre's bids. While they had asked for quotes on single axle trucks, a tandem would allow for more scope as to the use of the truck.

Council chose option three from Cambrian Truck Centre, the Western Star 4700PRL-T, Viking Plow at \$203,944.

Lowest bid for gravel not accepted

After extensive discussion at the committee level, council decided to accept the second lowest bid for the supply of gravel to the municipality, rather than the lowest bid.

"We looked at it in committee and did our due diligence," said Mayor Richard Stephens, noting that in the end "it wasn't enough dollars to change it from our current supplier."

Although not all councillors are present at each committee meeting, with five of seven councillors assigned to each committee, Mayor Stephens noted that the information on each of the bids was provided in the councillor's council meeting packages. "Of course any councillor is welcome to attend each committee meeting, they just are not able to vote," he said.

The gravel request for proposal had three bidders: Pearson Calvin and Son Excavation and Haulage Ltd. of Providence Bay, Don Eadie Construction Ltd. of Little Current and C.C. Construction of M'Chigeeng.

Each contractor bid on the supply of two

types of gravel, broken 3 and granular M. The Pearson bid was awarded the contract to supply both with a bid of \$7,401 (\$13.10 per unit) for 500 cubic metres of broken 3" and \$116,073 (\$17.12 per unit) for 6,000 cubic metres of granular M.

The Eadie bid was lowest at \$7,390.20 (\$13.08 per unit) for 500 cubic metres of broken 3" and \$116,073 (\$16.72 per unit) for 6,000 cubic metres of granular M and the CC Construction bid was highest at \$7,203.75 (\$12.75 per unit) for 500 cubic metres of broken 3" and \$118,524.40 (\$17.48 per unit) for 6,000 cubic metres of granular M.

The total of each collective bid saw a difference of \$2,723.30 between the lowest and second lowest bids (\$120,751.80 and \$123,475.10). Mayor Stephens noted that the committee decided that amount was not enough of a difference to warrant a change in suppliers. "We had good service from the current supplier," confirmed Mayor Stephens.

The highest gravel bid came in \$2,243.05 over the winning bid and \$4,966.35 above the lowest bid.

The flat water rate for Sunsite Estates is set at \$1,651. The total annual water and sewer rate for a single family home is \$1,395.90 or \$747.55 for a multiple family home and apartments.



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Manitoulin holds first LGBTQ Two Spirit Health Awareness Conference

by Robin Burridge AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Noojmowin Teg received overwhelming support for the LGBTQ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgendered or Queer/Questioning) Two Spirit Health Awareness Conference it hosted last week in Aundeck Omni Kaning.

"It went really well," said conference organizer, Noojmowin Teg Child and Youth Mental Health and Addiction Worker Sarah Seabrook. "We had over 100 service providers attend the first day of the conference and just over 70 the second day (which was open to service providers and the Island community). It was beyond my expectations."

Ms. Seabrook was just in the process of reviewing the conference evaluation forms when The Expositor spoke to her on Monday, but she said so far the response has been very positive.

"Everyone seemed to really get a lot from the conference and provided a lot of positive feedback," she said. "I think Manitoulin is way more advanced (in terms of LGBTQ acceptance) than people think and the interest in the conference really showed that."

The speakers at the conference included Donna Turner from Rainbow Health Ontario, Teddy Syrette from Egale Canada Human Rights Trust and Blu Waters, an elder on campus at Seneca College.

Ms. Waters spoke about two spirited individuals and cultural practices during her presentation 'Reclaiming the Two Spirit.'

Ms. Waters began her presentation by speaking about the importance of the medicine wheel and keeping your life balance, giving the example of the harm it can do to a two spirited person if they are forced off balance.

"Back before colonization, we never had the labels we had today," said Ms. Waters. "Traditionally roles were based on the gifts and skills given to people from the Creator. Two spirited individuals were regarded as gifts from the Creator and were honoured by their community. They were taught all the skills in the community and were believed to be able to hear the Creator. They were trusted people with a lot of responsibility." Ms. Waters said that when First Nations ways were taken away from them by colonization and residential schools, the understanding of two spirited people and their role was lost. As a two spirited person, elder and traditional teacher. Ms. Waters said she is trying to help others understand the role of two spirited people. Ms. Waters asked that elders who may have hesi-



"I was part of the first


ever gay pride event in Toronto," she said. "I didn't know what was going to happen—we were nervous."



...continued from page 5 at the farm where she was visiting were in 'pig Latin.' "I could tell something bad had happened but I didn't know what. Apparently the neighbours had been told not to share anything with me so they communicated in code. I found out three days later when I came to town on Saturday night, and dad told me, 'we don't have a house any more.' Our home had burned and my mother was away in Toronto."

Bid explained that he had turned on the oil space heater and then had gone next door to visit his aunt while the house was warming up. He was standing in her living room when he noticed flames coming from his own home. He raced next door and threw open his front door to be met with a wall of smoke and

to eat this cute duck. We named him George and he was our pet for some time. Finally, he got to be too big and we didn't want to keep him over the winter so he was slaughtered and mum cooked him. Both mum and I cried; we just couldn't eat six teams. After we moved to the highway location we had to make do with our old black and white television. When that was on the fritz or the signal was not coming in, we would listen to the games on the radio. We never missed the play-offs."

When asked to identify his strengths, Bid responds with a little dry humour, "eating and sleeping." He claims there is nothing that he is afraid of and he has no regrets. Bev adds that he has a "good personality,

Back in 1936 when AJ bought the store from the Sims family, the population of Little Current was stated to be 5,000 people. "Blueberries were big business in the 1920s and 1930s. They were picked on the North Shore by the local Anishinand abek population brought into the store. We would trade 800-15 lb baskets on a Saturday morning. These would be taken to Owen Sound by boat on Sunday and sold there, at the open market, on Mon-



discussion. Panelists included: Aaron Bowerman, a two spirited youth from Sheguiandah First Nation who lives in Toronto and is a regional outreach and support service worker for the Ontario Aboriginal HIV/Aids Strategv: Eileen Letander-Trudeau, the president of the Equality Project, a youth group for sexual and gender exceptions and LGBTQ 2S Allies in Wikwemikong, who identifies as pansexual, non-binary; David Jackson, the secretary of the Equality Project and identifies as an aboriginal trans man; Dagmar Werkmeister, who identifies as queer and lives and works on Manitoulin; Jamie Lee Oshkabewisens, a two spirited male youth from Wikwemikong; and Mason Forsell, a transgendered male youth from Sault Ste. Marie.

Each of the panelists took the floor to share their story prior to taking audience questions.

Among the many powerful stories was Mr. Bowerman's, who spoke of how nervous he was to come out, but how accepting his community was.

"When I was 24 I officially came out in Sheg," said Mr. Bowerman. "Everyone seems to know before you do, so the first person I told said she had already known. I slowly told 15-20 friends, asking each to not tell anyone until I had told everyone I wanted to tell in person first. Everyone I told was excited for me and very supportive. I had a positive experience coming out and I owe that to my community."

David, a 15-year-old youth from Wikwemikong, shared a different story. He said he officially came out before starting Grade 9

"I was lucky to have an understanding guidance counsellor and when we were selecting courses and I wrote my name as 'David,' I was asked it that is what I wanted to be called at school," said David.

David said that he was called his chosen name and male pronouns at school, but that his mom is still having difficultly and calls him by his birth name and pronoun.

"I think that it is hard for people to understand trans," explained David. "I think gay is easier for people, but both make it hard to be part of our culture."

David told a story or learning about water walks and other cultural events in the community when he was told he would be required to wear skirts in order to participate in ceremonies.

The conference also included an evening workshop for doctors, nurse practitioners, registered nurses and medical students on trans health, with 21 area health care workers in attendance.





The Mutchmor Galleries to open June 3 in Providence Bay Owner commissions Manitoulin themed mural from world famous artists

PROVIDENCE BAY—The transformation of the old Providence Bay Home Hardware (McDermid's Home Hardware) into The Mutchmor Galleries is still in the works, but this past week it took a leap forward with the completion of a large-scale mural on the south side of the building.

Providence Bay's Lake Huron Fish and Chips Co. owner Matthew Garniss purchased the 10,000 sq foot historical building last year and began renovations, turning the building into The Mutchmor Galleries, a café, health food store, art galleries, antique store and yoga studio.

The name of the new space, The Mutchmor Galleries, comes from the name of the street on which is stands, with 'Mutchmor' being the original name of Hwy 551 and one of the original family names

ing up espresso, lattes, drip coffee and teas, in addition to baked goods, chocolate and daily healthy food options in the Peace Café. It will feature a gallery component with work from Island artists Ann Beam, Anong Beam, Linda Williamson, as well as photography, pottery and jewellery.

The café will also host a health food store carrying a variety of items and some bulk options, juices and eco-friendly household products.

The other space at the front of the building will be occupied by the Oriole Arts Studio and Gallery.

Diane Cruttenden, weaver and fiber artist (of the former Sheepish Grin), will be opening a studio/shop in the building and will also be using the space for workshops.

in the village.

Mr. Garniss has been hard at work getting the building ready on the inside for its first season, with the goal of opening on Friday, June 3, but wanted to do something extra special for the outside.

"My overall idea was to do something to draw attention to Providence Bay," Mr. Garniss told The Expositor. "At the fish and chips store I get a lot of people asking for recommendations on what to do during their time on Manitoulin and I suggest things like Bridal Veil Falls and the Cup and Saucer. I hope that other people on the Island will recommend coming to Providence Bay to see the mural and all the other wonderful things we have to offer."

Mr. Garniss, who spends his winter in Toronto, said he and his girlfriend Bridgette Sarpong (who is opening the Peace Café in The Mutchmor Galleries) were exploring the city this past winter, commenting on their love of street art when they discovered the work of Essencia.

"They were working on the largest mural in Canada on Lawrence Avenue West and we drove by one of their last days and stopped to hang out and chat," said Mr. Garniss, who said that he was so taken by their work he asked them to come to Manitoulin to do a mural on the gallery.

"The artists, Shalak Attack, Flya Bruxa and Bruno Smoky, came last week and stayed in my family home, working on the mural all week," explained Mr. Garniss.

As for the subject matter of the mural, Mr. Garniss said that he sent the artists a list of words to describe Manitoulin ahead of time and told them a few stories about the Island.

"They are internationally famous artists, so I didn't want to give them too much direction," he said, noting that he wanted to give them creative space. "They were really great at adding elements in as they spoke with people who stopped by to see their progress. My carpenter showed them a hawberry branch and explained the significance of the tree to them and they added a hawberry branch in the owl's talons. Someone else was telling them about morels so they hid a few in the mural."

Essencia finished the mural on Monday, which includes images of an owl, bear, fish, the beach and waterfalls.

"It has been getting a great response," said Mr. Garniss. "It has been overwhelming. People have been coming all week to see it and the progress and there have been a lot of photos posted of it on social media."

"We have fallen in love with Manitoulin and the people," commented Essencia of their time of the Island. "We hope to come back to do more art and perhaps to even live here."

The inside of the building is also coming along also, with carpenters even working on the holiday Monday.


"We are able to start varnishing the floor and we have competed the dry walling," Mr. Garniss shared. "With all the work, we wanted to ensure the historical charm of the building."

Controlling house flies in your poultry barn Got house flies in your poultry barn? Are you searching for control options? Poultry barns provide an ideal environment for house fly populations to thrive if sufficient control methods are not in place. Controlling house fly populations is important for maintaining a healthy barn environment. Without control methods, large fly populations can: Damage equipment and increase biosecurity risk; decrease poultry production; affect relationships with neighbours. Flies can also be carriers of food-borne diseases, carrying bacteria such as Salmonella and E. coli from one location to another. Controlling flies involves the combined use of different methods: Barn management: biological control; mechanical control; chemical control. The Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs' (OMAFRA) book, "House Fly Control in Poultry Barns," describes integrated pest management practices and provides information on different control methods for effective house fly control. 


On a quest

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
