Military rifle team initiative will perform at vets' services

MANITOULIN—The Sergeant Charles Golden Silver Star Memorial Rifle Team attended its first series of memorial services this past weekend starting at the Hilly Grove Cemetery in Assiginack Township.

"Last June I posted in the Legion in Little Current that I

wanted to put up a colour party for my uncle that died in WWII, but I couldn't get a firing team assembled," explained Vietnam veteran Wayne Golden. "I couldn't get the support I needed, so I purchased all the rifles and sought out members for a rifle team. No vet in any country should be put in the ground without being given

supreme honours."

The Sergeant Charles Golden Silver Star Memorial Rifle Team consists of Legionnaires and war pensioners from the Island and North Shore area.

The current members consist of Mr. Golden, Gary Trimmer, Paul Abbott, Dan McGavley and flag bearer Robert Smith.

Saturday afternoon, the rifle team gave tribute to WWII veteran Jack McGavley (the father of Dan McGavley), WWII veterans Avery Smith (father of Robert Smith) and Percy Smith (his uncle), as well as WWII veteran David Harrison, firing three shots for each soldier.

"It's been a long time coming," said Mr. McGavley of the ceremony for his father. "It now feels

Northeast host Pan Am torch run Tuesday

Little Current's front street shutting down for day of celebration

LITTLE CURRENT—The 2015 Pan Am Games Torch Relay will be stopping in Little Current on Tuesday, June 2 as part of the 41-day torch relay. This momentous occasion will be marked with a community celebration including a free concert from Juno award winning musician Crystal Shawanda.

Downtown Little Current, along Water Street, will be shut down for the day starting at 7 am to allow the set up of the stage and vendors. Water Street will reopen following the

Ontario Ombudsman declares Hydro One lied to regulators, stonewalled customers

Suggests sale of the utility, dismantling current oversight, more bad news for Ontarians

TORONTO—Following what has been billed as the largest investigation (following up on 10,700 complaints) ever conducted by his office, Andre Marin, the Ontario Ombudsman has released a report that lambasts the public utility for issuing faulty bills to more than 100,000 customers, then lying to the government and regulators in an effort to cover up the problem and then spending \$88.3 million in public funds to fix the issue.

"Like a lot of huge, monopolistic organizations, Hydro One lost sight of its duty to the public," the Ombudsman said during the release of his report on Monday at Queen's Park. "It was so focussed on the technical side of its new system, it failed to consider the impact it was having on customers."

The Liberal government has

introduced an omnibus bill that will strip legislative officers' oversight over the Crown corporation, but the concept has released a storm of protest from those, in turn, charged with oversight of the provincial government.

"The officers report to the (provincial) assembly, not to the government of the day, and provide independent, expert reports and analysis of government operations and service delivery," wrote eight independent legislative officers, including the Auditor General and the Ombudsman in a joint letter opposing the sale of a majority position in Hydro One. "The officers believe that the government's proposals...will reduce the scope of the reviews that can be conducted on behalf of the people of the province."

The plan to strip the oversight of Mr. Marin and six other inde-

Court appearances set for alleged murderers, Little Current arsonist

GORE BAY—It was standing-room only this past Monday, May 25 as the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay held its criminal

hearings in a different courtroom, not the usual large room on the second floor where there was a jury trial going on, but a tiny one with room for about 12 chairs, a minuscule table for the Crown and lawyers, a diminutive dais for Judge Louise Serré, and a miniature prisoner's box. There was much shuffling between the courtroom and the packed main waiting room outside, with police and those charged with offenses squeezing through the short, narrow aisle.

The day's business carried on despite the cramped quarters, with hearings into the homicide on May 17, 2015 in Wikwemikong. Three individuals have been charged with second degree murder in the death of Percy (Junior) Simon, 33, after an altercation at a

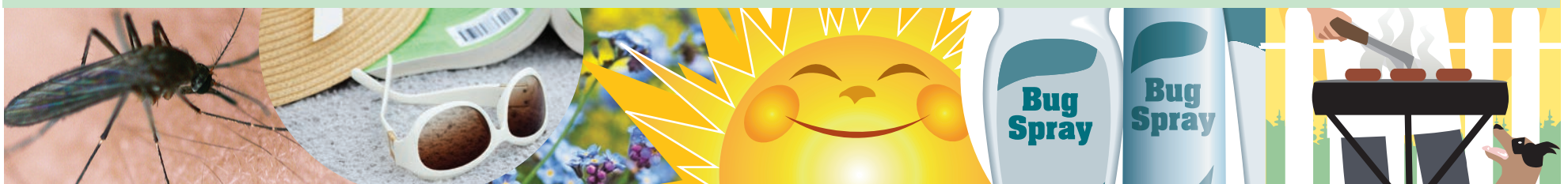

Expositor takes home hardware from annual newspaper awards

TORONTO—Expositor staffers are fresh from the annual Ontario Community Newspapers Association (OCNA) annual convention and awards held last week in Toronto, this year in conjunction with the Canadian Community Newspapers Association (CCNA) and Newspapers Canada, representing Canada's daily newspapers.

Once again The Manitoulin Expositor, the North's oldest newspaper (which turned 136 on Sunday), brought home some hardware from the awards gala Friday night, taking third place out of 24 entries in the Best Editorial category for its front page editorial "What is 'fair' about proposed Fair Election Act" and for Best Website for The Expositor's manitoulin.ca flagship site, last year's national first place winner.

"It's a difficult thing to distill what's wrong with a new and complex government bill, but this editorial did it well," the judge wrote about the editorial.

"Nice layout of stories on category pages and good use of art," the judge for websites wrote of manitoulin.ca.

The Expositor now has a representative on the OCNA board of directors as editor Alicia McCutcheon was elected to the board during the

organization's annual general meeting on Thursday afternoon. Ms. McCutcheon is looking forward to representing the interests of community papers from across the province, while bringing to the table a view from an independent, Northern and rural newspaper lens.

The annual convention gives the Expositor a chance to reconnect with old friends and colleagues while making new connections too. This year Brent Cooper, son of Little Current's Don Cooper, received his Silver Quill, marking 25 years in the newspaper industry. Mr. Cooper is a reporter with the Bracebridge Examiner, who also took home the prestigious Best News Story award at the conference as well as a share in the Best Special Section award. The reporter was eager to have his photo taken with Expositor publisher Rick McCutcheon following the presentation of his Silver Quill, crediting Mr. McCutcheon with helping him to get his start in the business. Mr. Cooper began his reporting career with an MSS Expositor cooperative job placement and two years of summer jobs at the paper before he began his career at the Elliot Lake Standard a quarter century ago.

Aundeck Omni Kaning multiuse complex opens

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—The Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation is taking names and signing leases for businesses looking to set up in the community's new multiuse complex centre on Highway 540 following a soft opening for community members earlier this month. The first public booking for the facility is slated for June 4 when comedian Don Burnstick brings his comedy show to town.

Don Burnstick is a Cree from the Alexander First Nation located outside of Edmonton. According to his website, being the youngest of 15 children (not to mention growing up on the reserve, although he does) "taught Don a variety of means of defending himself, not the least of which became his use of humour."

Mr. Burnstick's early life was very violent, notes his bio. "I lived on the streets of Edmonton as an alcoholic and drug addict," he said. "In 1985, when I sobered up at 21, there were not too many 21-year-old males that were alcohol and drug free so I just started asking to go and tell my story."

Mr. Burnstick obtained post-secondary training in holistic urban youth development at the University of San Diego, later obtaining certification as an alcohol and drug abuse counsellor, graduating from the Native Trainers Development program at the Nechi Institute in Edmonton.

Involved in the healing/personal wellness movement for the past two decades, Mr. Burnstick has "utilized humour and performance to provide a holistic approach to healing."

Mr. Burnstick's message "speaks to a proud heritage, the importance of healing through humour and his continuing desire to leave a better world for our future generations. In addition to his healing work, Mr. Burnstick has established himself as one of Canada's best comedians of all times, drawing heavily on his experiences and reserve life, his highly acclaimed comedy show 'You Might be a Redskin - Healing Through Native Humour' is a comedic performance, "that humorously portrays First Nations people, their habits, likes and dislikes."

"It's going to be a good show," said AOK Chief Patsy Corbiere, who noted that the show is a fundraiser for the community's annual powwow in June.

The new facility will feature a new fitness centre, open to the general public. **...continued on page 8**

Manor finances in best shape in recent years, according to 2014 audit

LITTLE CURRENT—The Manitoulin Centennial Manor board reviewed the audited statement for 2014 at the board's last meeting, learning that the facility had a surplus at the end of the year, a first in recent years.

"In the last three years the Manor has gone from an operating deficit of \$921,000 in 2012, to a deficit of \$24,010 in 2013 and now a surplus of \$39,085 for 2014," said auditor Kirby Houle of Freelandt

Caldwell Reilly Chartered Professional Accountants. "You have come a long way and it is a real accomplishment."

"The year end shows a surplus, but it is still fairly small so the board needs to continue to be vigilant," added Mr. Houle.

Board member Pentti Palonen commended Manor administrator Michelle Bond on her hard work and problem solving in helping the Manor stay on budget.

Laurentian bid for Barrie campus should get nod

What a surprise to learn late last week that Sudbury's Laurentian University's bid to expand its fledgling Barrie campus had been rejected by the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

Meanwhile, the same announcement cheerfully contained the news that Toronto's York University gets to build a new campus in nearby Markham, just up the road from the main York plant.

For Laurentian, this makes no sense. The school has been offering courses in Barrie for many years. In fact, in a limited number of programs students have been able to earn their full degree in Barrie for some time now.

Using Georgian College facilities, Laurentian has been testing the waters in Barrie for several years, eventually determining that Ontario's fastest-growing community was the right place to locate a full-blown university campus.

The provincial government felt otherwise, going so far as to rule out Barrie for future proposals as well. The focus, the minister said, will instead be on York, Halton and Peel regions when new campus proposals will once again be called for a year from now.

Thunder Bay's Lakehead University has been successful in this small-market university expansions game with a new campus well underway in Orillia, the other city on the shores of Lake Simcoe.

While the government did not mention it, the Lakehead campus in Orillia may well have been a factor in denying Laurentian's significant expansion plans in Barrie.

But Barrie really wants a university of its own and city council is prepared to pony up \$14 million toward the approximately \$60 million cost of developing a new campus.

But it's the \$45 million provincial share of the project that isn't going to be forthcoming.

It's an odd decision for the government to make, considering a Barrie university campus could easily serve not only that community but the Collingwood-Midland area as well as the upper reaches of York County.

While Markham, which did get the nod, is also a bustling place it is already quite close to York University's main campus as well as to the new University of Ontario Institute of Technology in Oshawa (not to mention the University of Toronto's Scarborough campus or Ryerson University and the University of Toronto's main campus, each located in the heart of the city and easily accessed by public transit from Markham).

Laurentian University has proven itself to be innovative: the main push for the Northern Ontario School of Medicine came from Laurentian and Sudbury and, more recently, the Northern School of

Architecture was pushed, successfully, into actuality by Laurentian University (with support from the Northern Ontario architectural and construction community and the city itself).

Barrie has been orphaned by this decision: it becomes the only Ontario community of its size to not have a significant degree-granting institution.

In fact several communities, much smaller, have had in the past few decades been granted their own standalone universities. These would include Nipissing University in North Bay and Algoma University in Sault Ste. Marie.

A Laurentian University campus in Barrie would doubtless eventually become its own separate degree-granting institutions just as Nipissing and Algoma Universities were previously colleges/campuses of Laurentian University.

It's an odd decision and is doubtless one that will be reviewed, no matter what the government say now.

But more than anything else, it's a slap in the face to Laurentian, not much more than a half century old itself, whose presence and initiative have had an enormous impact on Sudbury's transformation from a primarily mining centre to a sophisticated, cosmopolitan community with regionally significant centres of health, education, mining research and, now, medical research.

In the scheme of things, Laurentian's impact on Sudbury and its constant growth (witness the provincially significant new Living with Lakes research centre on Lake Ramsey) has been proportionately far greater than Trent University's impact on Peterborough or Brock University's impact on St Catharines—and these two are also relatively new institutions only slightly younger than Laurentian University.

Laurentian's experiences, had they been allowed to expand to Barrie, would doubtless prove equally enlightening to this community that many Torontonians still see as "The North" as far as they are concerned.

A spokesperson for Laurentian University has stated that the school and their Barrie council supporters will be meeting soon with Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities officials, and that "we have no intention of taking no for an answer."

Good for them.

If Barrie is indeed viewed as the south end of the North, then, like many other Northern initiatives, it is being passed over for York University's Markham expansion, both solidly southern Ontario institutions.

Proportional representation editorial omitted key arguments

William Blair Sullivan

William Blair Sullivan kept an excellent diary of his history and his personal years as a World War Two soldier. Excerpts are included here.

Blair began his life on the wind-swept prairies and spent much of his adult life in the United States, serving in the American army during World War Two and enjoying a fruitful teaching profession before he retired to Providence Bay with his wife Lillian.

“My paternal great-grandfather, James William Sullivan, was born in Rigdon, Indiana in 1854. He and his wife Eunice farmed 180 acres. In 1876, William moved his family to Kansas to a new homestead. Cattle and horses walked with them; household articles came by wagon. They farmed on virgin prairie and hunted antelope or deer for meat.”

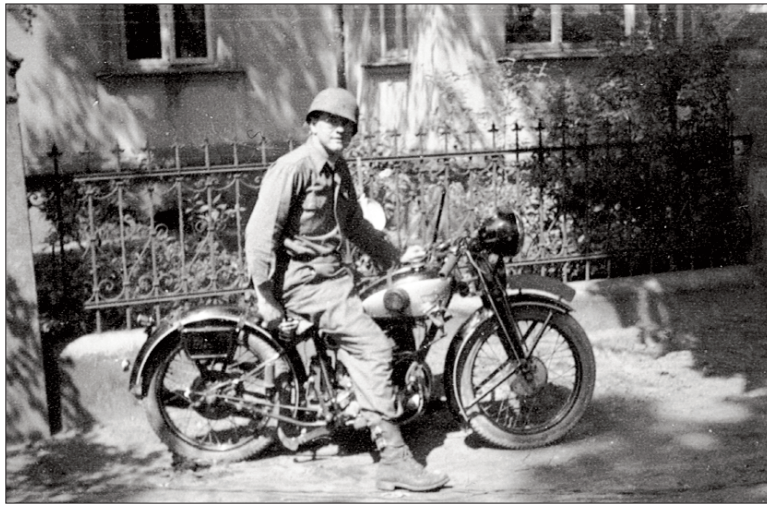
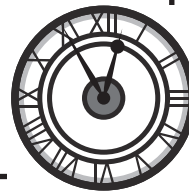
“One morning, my grandmother was horrified to see a rattlesnake hanging over her son’s cradle. It had come right through the sod roof. Terror was displaced by anger and the snake met a quick demise. The family returned to Indiana where six more siblings were born,” Blair reflects. “Had they stayed, they might have struck it rich as this part of Kansas was to become a major oil-producing area.”

Paternal grandfather Paul, the oldest in his family, married Claudia Jones in 1902. He taught at a one-room school called ‘Dead Dog’ near Rigdon. Paul and Claudia would have three sons. Their first, Gerald, born in 1903, would become Blair’s father. In 1910, when Saskatchewan became a province, flyers welcoming new settlers were sent throughout Canada and the American Midwest.

Paul and his family moved to Drinkwater, Saskatchewan, 15 miles south of Moose Jaw. They had been enticed by the opportunity to own ‘tree-less’ prairie land. Paul built stockyards for farmers and Gerald helped. Soon drought, grasshoppers, gophers, windstorms, severe winters and very little money became familiar to the new Canadians. After a fire

destroyed most of their possessions, they moved to a new community where Paul farmed and taught school.

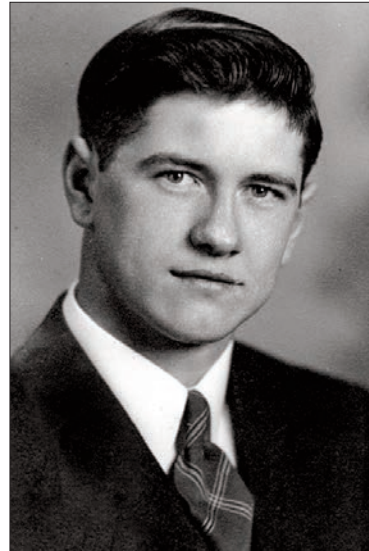
In 1892, maternal grandfather George Campbell left Staynor, near Collingwood in southern Ontario, and arrived, by boat, to Michael’s Bay, on Manitoulin Island’s south shore, a sawmilling community of several hundred members. George worked in the lumber industry for a Mr. Mutchmore. He also helped to build the 18-mile road to Providence Bay over three winters. George bought 50 acres of woodland north of Providence Bay and cleared the land with two oxen. George married Mamie McAllister in 1903. The two-storied home he built still stands on the Harold Arnold farm.

In 1918, George got a written invitation from a former Manitoulin neighbour, now living in Saskatchewan. The neighbour sent two five dollar bills for a trip to and from Drinkwater,

Saskatchewan. George took the train west to help with his friend’s wheat harvest in 1918. The Homesteader’s Act required the donated 30 acres to be under crop after the first year, so it could be registered and the applicant could ask for another quarter of land.

George soon felt inspired to move his family where he felt the future lay. After a family conference, the move was planned and the Manitoulin farm was sold. It was March 1920 when two parents, five children and two of George’s brothers walked with the horses and cattle to Little Current. Turkeys were in cages and their household items were packed on four skids. It took three days to get there, sustained by a neighbour’s parting gift of three flour bags, replete with fresh bread.

In Little Current, five boxcars were filled with tools, cattle, horses and household goods. The train stopped daily so the animals could be watered and fed, aided by railway staff. The Campbells arrived

in Moose Jaw five days later and began their new life on the prairies, farming in the Cardross area, across the road from the Sullivans.

“My parents Gerald and Anna (Campbell) Sullivan were married in 1922 on the same day Gerald’s brother and Anna’s sister also married. Gerald built a house and a garage with a filling station and began a farm-implement dealership where the CNR line ended in Cardross. Moose Jaw was 54 miles away. Cardross residents came to depend on the twice-weekly train for visitors, gas, grain seeds, mail and other goods. All the gas and oil arrived in 44 gallon barrels. The filling station had an underground tank and an upper glass tank. Gas sold for under 20 cents a gallon. Gerald also cut hair on Saturday night when everyone collected in town after a regular train delivery.

Blair was born on September 2, 1924. It was a difficult birth attended by their doctor who had

been summoned from town. Blair would have no siblings. An early memory was snagging gophers with binder twine when their heads popped up. Farmers’ crops were being destroyed by these little creatures. “Tails were redeemed at a penny apiece.”

“Grade 1 was in a single-room school house with eight rows of ‘boxcars’ (desks). In the summer, when the grain was higher and pupils were forbidden from walking through the crops it was a three mile trip. In winter, as the crow flies, you could ski a mile and a half to get there. There were three of us in Grade 1. I remember Willie taking my new pocket knife from my desk. I pounced on the thief and wrestled it back but the teacher spotted us and we both got the strap.” Both Willie and teacher Mary Blair’s became friends over the years. “I said goodbye to Mary just before she died in a nursing home in Moose Jaw in 1986.”

“Coal was free for the taking. A frozen lake allowed easier removal of two tons of coal using two horses and a sleigh. Once, my father and uncle ran into a blizzard at minus 54°F. They became disorientated, unhitched their horses and followed their animals home. Mother heard a bang and opened the door to a blanket-covered horse head staring at her. They were all lucky to be alive.”

“In 1935, our family moved to Regina where dad got a job with General Motors, driving cars off the assembly line.” The plant closed during the depression. When the war started in 1939, the family moved to Rigdon, Indiana, two miles from grandfather Sullivan’s farm. Gerald husked corn for 75 cents a day before he was hired as a night watchman for GM. Rabbits were hunted for meat and supplemented with an occasional pig from grandfather’s farm.

Blair’s family moved a few times before they settled in Alexandria, where the teen attended high school and joined the varsity football team. In May of 1942, Blair met Lillian Alice Orme. “I had been taken to her

Anishinaabe warrior who died serving in Vietnam recalled on Memorial Day

Lyman Corbiere retells the story of his uncle Austin Morris Corbiere

AUTHOR’S NOTE: Fifty years ago a Vietnam veteran was killed in action. He died May 9, 1966 in Quang Nam, Vietnam. This following story is written by his nephew Lyman Corbiere.

To the Expositor:

Austin Morris Corbiere was born on February 19, 1943 to mother Josephine (nee Kagesheongai) who was married to Frank Kewakundo. Frank was a travelling preacher who went place to place preaching the word, and having children. He had two daughters, Donna Bruder and Mary Lou Debassige and sons Steve and Austin Corbiere

The story goes that Austin arrived in this world to begin his journey.

When he was about 10-years-old he came to live with my family, we were living in Gore Bay near Tobacco Lake in a two-bedroom tar paper shack with 11 children. My parents were Phillip Corbiere (father) and Dorothy Corbiere (mother). Times were hard back then with no running water, an outside toilet and no bath tubs and in those times there was no welfare. We found work where we could, mostly helping farmers or working in the bush cutting firewood and plywood for the Ontario Paper Co., but we did alright. With all these people stuck in a small little space of a shack on a hot August night you can only imagine the smell, no thank you.

As Austin grew to about the age of 13 he went to work for a farmer, John Long on Barrie Island, and after that went to work for a mini Walmart in Gordon Township. For Lloyd Noble, who had a store that sold it all, from gas, groceries, and burgers to

meat, feed, and hardware. Lloyd was the “Walmart” of the day and was also a very fine gentleman who would give you the shirt off his back. I began working for him around 10 years of age and even stayed in his house. Lloyd was like a father to me and I will never forget him till the day I die, may God bless Lloyd Noble who helped many people through the years, including his wife Ruby who was a very nice and kind woman.

After this time Austin went to work in the southern Ontario around the Niagara region, the fruit belt, picking fruits and vegetables for \$6 a day. My brother would also come follow me as we would help the harvest. After the fruit season would end we would head to Brantford to pick and prime tobacco (which was a very hard, dirty, and backbreaking job). After this season would end we would head back to West Bay again to find any work we could find working in the bush. We would mostly cut pulp wood. This was a cycled process repeated year after year for five years in southern Ontario and home again leaving no real time for Austin to go to school.

Then one year they were working in the bush in Meldrum Bay and Austin and my brother Jim Corbiere decided to head to Trout Lake, Michigan to work for two uncles who were working in the woods offering better pay. When Austin and Jim decided to go to Michigan it was on foot

across the ice from Meldrum Bay to Blind River, which was quite dangerous since they hit open ice and had to detour a long ways around to avoid open water in the moonlight. However, they made it to Blind River and then to Michigan then finally arrived in Trout Lake. They worked there for a little while and heard that they needed

marines in the USA to fight in Vietnam and the thought of travelling the world excited them. They headed there from Michigan to Buffalo, NY where they were recruited for the USMC where Austin was accepted and Jim rejected due to a broken collar bone. Austin then set off on his journey to the Lejeune, North Carolina Marine Corps basecamp were he went to train. By this time, in 1963, after still working on fruit farms of the Niagara region and heading back to Brantford to work, I stayed there and worked at the Spalding (sports goods) plant. Austin was now in the Vietnam War and whenever he had leave he would come stay with me in my one bedroom apartment in Brantford.

Then, after his second tour of Vietnam, he called me to see about staying with me in 1965. He came and stayed with me for one week in my cramped apartment before heading back to camp Lejeune and then back to Vietnam for his third tour and I never saw him again.

That tour is when he got killed on May 9, 1966 in Quang Nam, by this time I had

moved back to Manitoulin Island to live in late November 1965. In May we were contacted by the USMC to inform us that he was K.I.A. (killed in action) and would be shipped home to us via Hawaii and California. He was sent to Lejeune camp to be prepped and then to Buffalo, NY. Finally, Doug Tracy picked up his body and brought it home after three months from the time he was K.I.A. After all that he was still displayed at the funeral home in a glass coffin. The Marines take care of their own and did a good job getting him home. Funny thing was the Vietnam War was not a Canadian war but he still chose to go fight with Americans because they were fighting for the freedom that we all strive for. If not for the USA where would we even be today? They may not be perfect but they strive for the same things we do, and with all the crazies out there and the dictators the USA keeps at bay, what kind of world would we be living in today? Vietnam War veterans were not treated very well when they came home. When Austin was buried in Holy Trinity Anglican Cemetery in Little Current there were no military honours. It wasn’t until later that the marines came and TV media from everywhere were there to witness and provide a jet fly by and a 21-gun salute from North Bay.

God bless you, Uncle Austin. Now, on May 23, 2015, I am now in my 70s and heading to Washington D.C. for Memorial Day. I plan to visit the Vietnam wall and memorial ceremonial wall and when I get back I will have a follow up of how the trip went.

M'Chigeeng man faces aggravated assault charge

During the evening hours of May 18 the UCCM Anishnaabe Police were called to a disturbance on the M'Chigeeng First Nation. UCCM Police attended a location at the Pinewood Park area of M'Chigeeng and found a person suffering from injuries to his head. During that time, police commenced an investigation into the circumstances that led to the victim's injuries. The 43-year-old male victim from the M'Chigeeng First Nation was transported to the Manitoulin Heath Centre for treatment and was later transferred to Sudbury for further treatment where he remains in serious but stable condition.

Police later determined that the victim was injured as a result of an attack on May 18 and as a result, a 26-year-old man from the M'Chigeeng First Nation now faces a charge of aggravated assault contrary 268(1) to the Criminal Code of Canada. The accused was arrested by police on May 22 and was held in custody pending bail on May 25 at the Gore Bay Court.

UCCM Police charge Whitefish River man following sexual assault investigation

The UCCM Anishnaabe Police were called to investigate a report that a female person had been sexually assaulted on May 19 on the Whitefish River First Nation. Police commenced an investigation into an incident that allegedly occurred during a house party over the Victoria Day long weekend at a private residence.

Following the investigation, police obtained an arrest warrant for a 60-year-old man of the Whitefish River First Nation and subsequently arrested him on May 23. The 60-year-old man was held on custody pending bail on May 25 at Gore Bay Court and charged with one count of sexual assault contrary to Section 271 of the Criminal Code of Canada.

M'CHIGEENG—For the sixth year, M'Chigeeng First Nation hosted a youth conference held at the community complex on May 23. As M'Chigeeng Family Resources department head Elaine Migwans explained, the name of the gathering is always Inspiring Minds Youth Conference and the theme for this year was bzindan which means 'listen.'

"The youth will find their message through public service announcements," Ms. Migwans explained. "They will work in groups or singular with magazines and Bristol board to do a public service announcement. The Bristol board visual will then go on to a DVD which they can take home. Youth have a lot of energy and we provide a venue to promote their energy in a good way. This conference is open to everyone. Everyone is welcome."

Artist, writer, screenwriter, actor, film producer and founder of the Weengushk Film Institute, Shirley Cheechoo, along with her son Nano Debassige, were facilitator's for the event. Ms. Cheechoo explained that the conference was to teach the youth to use their voice to make change and that the public service announcements are to give them the opportunity to show what they think is needed in their community.

Another event at the conference was photography. "We give them a list," Ms. Cheechoo said, "then the youth will use photography to capture the words."

Mr. Debassige explained that they were set up to do motion graphics, audio mixing and video editing for the student's project. While speaking to The Expositor, Mr. Debassige spelled out the need for more arts in rural communities in Canada. "The arts have to be supported," he said. "Rural Canada seems to be geared around sports. Creative arts have to be supported too." Mr.

Debassige is a Weengushk board member and has an extensive background in film. After taking media arts classes at Sheridan College, he worked in the film industry in Toronto and New York City as a cinematographer and has shot videos and commercials. He is also a paramedic.

Casting director Micheline Blais, another Weengushk board member, was also at the conference to host one of the games and assist Ms. Cheechoo. "I am also doing some scouting, to scout some teens who want to break in to show business. We support diversity," Ms. Blais went on to say that she had a part in the film Moose River Crossing, which was produced by Ms. Cheechoo. "I come every year," she added, "to do some film work."

Ms. Cheechoo led the students in ice-breaking exercises for everyone to get to know each other and to build confidence before students headed to tables covered with magazines from The Economist to Ontario Out of Doors to Good Housekeeping to do their project.

Aaron Courtotielle was one of the participants attending the

conference. She lives in Grouard, which is four hours north of Winnipeg. "I am taking courses at the film institute," she said, "Lab one. I love it. It is the best school I have been to." Ms. Courtotielle has a teaching degree and thought the conference was a good thing. "It builds positive relationships and gives confidence," she added.

Crystal Sagon, Chelsea Antoine and Kennedy Nakogee-Rickard worked together at one of the tables. They were covering their Bristol board with suggestive pictures from magazines. "We are showing that sex sells in advertising," Ms. Nakogee-Rickard said as she explained the message they were giving for their project. Ms Sagon was happy to be attending the forum as she felt it was inspiring for youth from different reserves while Ms. Sagon said that she had brought six students to the conference from Zhiibaa-haasing First Nation.

The conference finished with each student taking home a DVD of their project as well as a poster of their Bristol board work. The evening ended with a dance with DJ Blake Debassige.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Council applies for Official Plan amendment

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to apply to amend the Manitoulin Official Plan (OP), secondary plan for the town of Little Current, to change the zoning on a lot of town property along Highway 6 from industrial to commercial.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained that the municipality had received correspondence from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing regarding the potential zoning change, requesting that the town complete and submit a species at risk assessment.

Council directed staff to compete the assessment.

Following the council meeting, The Expositor inquired as to the reason behind the zoning change.

"I can't talk details," said Mayor Al MacNevin. "We have had a lot of interest from commercial companies in the past who would like to purchase the property, but it would be subject to it being zoned commercial."

Fire report

Northeast Town Fire Department Chief Darren Bailey presented the May department report to council.

He noted that there was a bush fire on April 30 on Indian Mountain Road and an apartment fire on May 1 on Vankoughnet Street.

He added that there had been 30 calls for service to date this year and that one member of the department is attending a course May 23 in Gore Bay.

Community services and public works reports

Reid Taylor delivered the community services report. In terms of the recreation centre, he said that the rooms were being well used by user groups, staff were busy completing maintenance tasks and preparing for the Trade Fair and upcoming summer events.

"Spider Bay opened for business on May 15 and the downtown docks are being installed and to be finished shortly," said Mr. Taylor. "Town soccer started on May 20. The public washrooms are open at the Market Garden Pavilion and all other washrooms are to be opened over the next couple of weeks."

Mr. Taylor added that the parks are being checked and cleaned regularly and that trees and shrubs have been planted for the season.

Also, the museum opened on May 4 and staff are prepping the facilities for summer programming and visitors.

Public works manager Gary May told council that road maintenance is being done and that culverts are being replaced where needed.

"Load restriction is still in force and tenders are out for gravel and roadside grass cutting," continued Mr. May. "The Ministry of Environment is inspecting the landfill this week at the Highway 6 site and the Highway 540 site and Sunday landfill openings have started from 2 to 6 pm."

He also noted that the town equipment is working well and that tenders are out for replacing the dozer.

Building controls and bylaw report

Mitch Varey reviewed the building controls and bylaw report with council.

"Open permits are being kept up with and inspections are taking place when called for," said Mr. Varey. "We currently have 16 permits out in 2015 with a total value of \$508,648."

"There are no pressing issues in bylaw enforcement," continued Mr. Varey, "however parking is still being monitored regularly and any complaints are being followed up on."

Accounts receivable

Town treasurer Sheryl Wilkin presented the April accounts receivable reports for taxes and water/sewer.

There were \$605,115.41 made in payments in April for taxes and \$120,257.34 for water/sewer.

"There are currently 29 water accounts over \$500, of which eight have been disconnected and 21 are due to recent billing on April 30," said Ms. Wilkin.

Yacht club on its own for North Channel race dockage

A motion to donate the dockage for the night of July 24 for the boats of the Little Current Yacht Club's (LCYC) North Channel Regatta was defeated.

The LCYC requested that the Northeast Town donate dockage for 25 boats that will be participating and the use of the west pavilion.

Councillor Paul Skippen asked town staff what the cost of the dockage would be.

"The dockage would be \$1,575 and the rental of the pavilion is \$50," responded Mr. Williamson.

"July 24 is peak season," said Councillor Laurie Cook. "That is a lot of money to donate to a yacht club."

"Maybe we could reduce that number if racers who already had their own slip parked at their slip instead of docking with the rest of the racing boats?" suggested Councillor Bill Koehler.

"I am in favour of this donation," said Councillor Michael Erskine. "It really helps build and promote our port and it is a positive event for our community."

"Just to clarify," said Mayor MacNevin, "the LCYC runs the learn to sail program and this race and its predecessor the MacMan Challenge fundraised to help the club deliver the program. The race also gets us advertised in national magazines and promotes our community. If they aren't able to fundraise from events like the North Channel Regatta, then the learn to sail program will disappear like it did last year."

In a recorded vote, Councillors Micheal Erskine, Marcel Gauthier, Bill Koehler and Mayor MacNevin voted in favour of the dockage and pavilion donation, while Councillors Laurie Cook, Paul Skippen, Bruce Wood and Melissa Peters voted against the motion. The motion was tied and therefore defeated.

Anglin Subdivision rezoning application continues to raise concern

MINDEMOYA—A second public meeting regarding a rezoning application for the Anglin Subdivision in Mindemoya was held May 21 in council chambers with several people in attendance. A previous meeting had seen deputations from four residents of the area who expressed concern for the rezoning which would allow two row housing buildings to be built in an area that is designated for single-family residents. Sherrie MacDougall, who lives in the area, submitted another letter to council before proceedings.

It was noted by Mayor Stephens that Steve Hill, who is seeking the zoning amendment, was not at the first meeting, but was now present. Mr. Hill apologized to those in attendance and explained that he could not attend the first meeting as his father had suffered a major heart attack and he thanked council for the letter of condolences.

Mr. Hill then proceeded to answer specific concerns of the Anglin Subdivision residents, starting with the question that had been asked about what guarantee the inhabitants had that the buildings would be for seniors as he had indicated. “We don’t want to rent to families, just seniors,” he said. “This is not low rental, it is not subsidized housing.”

The next item from the row housing opponents that Mr. Hill answered to, and was in complete disagreement with, was that “there is already enough seniors housing in Mindemoya.”

Low cost LAMBAC loans now available to artists

ALGOMA-MANITOULIN—Exciting news for artists in the Manitoulin or LaCloche area has come out of the LAMBAC offices with the launch of the Artist Investment Program (AIP). The program is open to individuals, a for-profit business (sole proprietorship or partnership), an incorporated not for profit or an unincorporated organization (special conditions apply).

“This was a project started by my predecessor Mary Nelder,” said LAMBAC General Manager Mike Addison. “She and Alex Baran had discussions when the Manitoulin Arts and Cultural Council (MACC) was starting up. LAMBAC already had a micro loan program for small business and we worked with the arts community to put together a special interest rate for the arts community.”

Under the new AIP microloan program artists can access small loans up to \$5,000 for materials or upgrading their skills to further their artistic abilities. The key to the program is focussed on artists making a living from their work, however.

“Projects should be entrepreneurial in nature, they should generate revenue directly and/or contribute to the applicant’s skills and they should enhance the applicant’s ability to earn income from their cultural activity,” said Mr. Addison.

“The program is open to all of the arts, all arts,” he stressed. “That includes not only paint, but writing, producing books, a whole range of activities qualify.”

The criteria for the program include artistic development (how will the loan enhance skills, technique and/or productivity), business development (how will this strengthen, improve the ability to compete, sell and market the product and/or operate your business more effectively and sustainably), local community (will there be job creation, volunteer development, partnership creation, increased income, local spending and event creation) and marketplace (will there be increased consumer choice, product development, stimulated competitiveness, development of new methods of promotion, marketing and sales).

The interest rate for the microloans is set at prime plus a quarter percentage point and approval is by the general manager based on the recommendation of a panel of three cultural advisors selected from the community for loans up to \$5,000, while the LAMBAC board will approve loans up to a maximum of \$10,000. The loan term will be from three to five years with a flexible repayment schedule.

The program is being offered as a three-year pilot project and will be reviewed in 2017 by the LAMBAC board.

“We are at the edge of the baby boomer generation,” he noted, “and demographics are changing. There is more demand for this housing. Seniors don’t want to deal with snow and they don’t want to deal with grass.”

In response to the concern about water in the subdivision, a particular worry of one individual who has lost her hedge to excess water, has mosquitoes breeding in her area and has an unending wet backyard, Mr. Hill stated that a water concern is a municipal concern. “As a builder,” he added, “I have to have the water run to the ditch. Water has to drain off the property and will drain west to Bay Street. You can’t drain water on to other people’s land. If we develop these lots, it may be better. We want to build quality housing.”

Mr. Hill also answered the question that had been raised about safety. “Seniors are not known for running up and down the street,” he said. “Youth cause noise and so on in an area.” He also went on to say that the development of the row housing would add value to the resident’s property and that seniors are looking for housing that has municipal water and sewer.

Ms. MacDougall also spoke at the meeting, explaining that she was speaking for the residents. “What are you going to do with the water,” she asked. “What do you plan to do? Are you willing to divert the water?” to which Mr. Hill responded, “You have

to swale along your property to the drain.”

It was evident throughout the meeting that there are serious water problems in the Anglin Subdivision. Mayor Stephens explained that the municipality ran out of money in responding as to why the drainage wasn’t done. “It doesn’t seem to me to be a major issue, the drain is there. If this project goes through, we will have to look at the whole area. We have to look at programs available.”

Ms. MacDougall also asked what Mr. Hill had planned about privacy fences at the back of the properties and about garbage and snow removal. Mr. Hill responded that there will be 30 feet in front of the proposed units with lots of room for snow. When Councillor Derek Stephens then also asked if privacy fences would be a problem, Mr. Hill said “no.”

The question was also asked at the public meeting if the amendment is approved by council can it be appealed, to which Mayor Stephens answered in the affirmative.

As the mayor had mentioned during the public meeting, the job of council is to make a decision on allowing the project to proceed after consideration of everything. A meeting of the finance and economic development committee under chairperson Councillor Alex Baran did just that. “The motion,” Councillor Baran explained, “is that we recommend to council that the amendment be accepted.”

“There has been a fairly exhaustive response to this issue,” Mayor Stephens said. “It has been open to the public, we heard from the proponent. It is up to this committee and council to proceed with this.”

Councillor Linda Farquhar informed council that she was voting against the motion as it is a single

residential unit area, that the row housing would spoil the aesthetics of the area, that she thinks that the drainage issue should be solved and “I agree,” she added, “with the gentleman who said that they are going to be on top of each other.”

Councillor Baran noted that he had addressed the four major concerns of the residents at the last public meeting but that the subtle message he was still hearing is no. “I hear the concerns,” he said to the people present. “My inclination would be to not support this simply because you don’t want it.”

Councillor Dale Scott spoke of the drainage concerns saying, “I agree with Mayor Stephens. That is our concern. The south and west drains were done. The north drain from Anglin was done. It was asked if it could go to the south drain. It was left undone and that is our responsibility. I hope we take on that responsibility issue soon.” Councillor

Scott went on to say that he agrees with Councillor Baran as the residents “don’t want multi-units.”

Councillor Derek Stephens then observed, “If this doesn’t get to council, we will never get a vote. We will be stymied and that is not right.” Mayor Stephens agreed, saying, “I would like to see it go to council.

All councillors should have a right to vote. It needs to go forward.” On Councillor Pat MacDonald’s recommendation that one reading will get it on to council, it was agreed that the zoning amendment be given its first reading and the amendment will go to the next council meeting for a final vote.

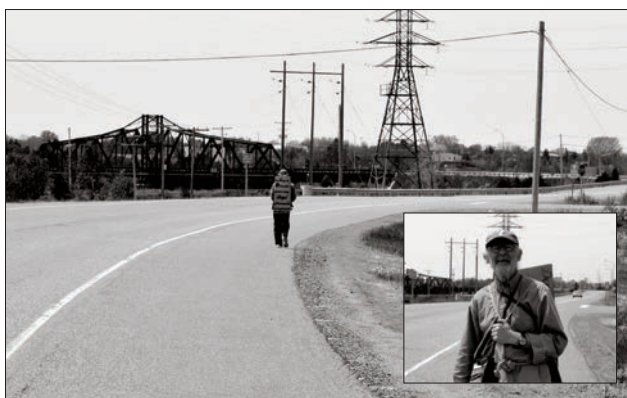

Manitoulin Centennial Manor board minutes

Board welcomes new member

Longtime Manitoulin Centennial Manor board member Kathy Davidson retired from the board last month and has been replaced by Billings Councillor Tom Imrie as the Gore Bay and Billings municipal representative on the board.

Strategic planning

The board is continuing to develop its strategic plan and hopes to hold another committee meeting to 'firm up' ideas before presenting a draft budget to the board.

The board also hopes to meet with representatives from the North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) to discuss its strategic objectives to help shape the Manor board plan.

Board explores home's future

Board Chair Paul Moffat and Vice Chair Pat MacDonald gave a report on a phone conference they had with representatives from the NE LHIN.

"We were told that the Manor is the most sought after home on Manitoulin," explained Ms. MacDonald. "The majority of people seeking long-term care on Manitoulin want to be at the Manor. This puts us in a good location moving forward with anything such as possible expansion."

"They also informed us that there are 14 small homes that are 'C' level in the region (the Manor is an 'A' level home) that are going to be eligible for redevelopment. These homes will either have to bring their homes up to standard or sell their licence."

Ms. MacDonald said that the NE LHIN reps had reiterated that the Manor has mandated beds which is different from the other homes on Manitoulin (opposed to licenced beds).

"They stressed that they are really focused on assisted living and suggested that if this is something we are interested in we could look at opportunities to partner," Ms. MacDonald continued. "I think we should review the study we had done (Continuum of Care Business Plan) and see if there is anything we can take from it."

Pentti Palonen said he

felt this was a bad idea because, in his opinion, the plans presented in the Continuum of Care hadn't been feasible for the Manor.

Wendy Gauthier said she agreed with Ms. MacDonald and would like to see the Continuum of Care and any other past documents on the subject, noting "there could be something useful that we can draw out."

"The meeting with the NE LHIN was productive," Ms. MacDonald concluded. "It put us on their radar and now they know we are interested in more beds."

Administrator's report

Manor administrator Michelle Bond reviewed her monthly report with the board. She said she was pleased to report that the flooring fundraising, to replace all the carpet in the facility with tile, had reached the \$7,000 mark of the \$11,000 goal.

"We only have five-six residents rooms left to do downstairs and then we can start upstairs," said Ms. Bond.

Ms. Bond also reported

that a \$10,000 private donation had been made to replace the call bell system.

Board accepts oil tender

The board reviewed oil tenders from Manitoulin Fuels for \$83.85 per litre, McDougall Energy for \$88.59 per litre and Petro Canada for \$87.29 per litre. The board carried a motion to accept the lowest tender, Manitoulin Fuels, which is also the current provider for the facility. The rate will be effective as of June 1.

Fundraising update

Ms. Gauthier updated the board on the home's fundraising campaign. As the campaign for the flooring has neared its goal, she suggested they turn their attention to the call bell system.

'Calling on You' will be the slogan for the new call bell system fundraising campaign which the board hopes to launch in the near future.

Ms. Bond said that the facility is still waiting on two more quotes for the new system. Once the

board has an idea of the cost, they will set their fundraising goal and launch the campaign.

Ms. Gauthier suggested they follow the lead of the Manitoulin Health Centre, which is "very effective" at fundraising. ...Court appearances set for alleged murderers, arsonist

home on Andrew Crescent. Appearing in court were Robert Travis Wemigwans, aged 31, Tammy Trudeau, 43, both of Wikwemikong, and Byron Kagige, 56, of Hamilton.

Mr. Wemigwans, represented by Glenn Sandberg of Sandberg Williams law firm in Sudbury, was escorted into court wearing handcuffs and a neon-orange prison jumpsuit with canvas slip-on shoes. He is tall, slim and wore his waist-length black hair tied back in an elastic band; on the left side of his jaw was a large white bandage. In a brief interchange between Mr. Wemigwans' lawyer and the judge, it was agreed that the accused would appear in court on June 22, to be spoken to. Byron Kagige, co-accused, will also appear again on the same date. Tammy Trudeau, escorted in handcuffs into the prisoner box, wore dark green sweat-pants and a matching sweatshirt, with canvas shoes. A small woman with short hair in a ponytail, she remained in court only briefly to hear that her next appearance is scheduled for June 1. The names of legal counsel for Mr. Kagige and Ms. Trudeau were not known at press time.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) North East Region Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective

Inspector Gilles Depratto, are continuing their investigation into the homicide. In an interview with the Expositor last week, Acting Detective Inspector Gilles Depratto said that police will not release details of the cause of death, despite a post-mortem examination having been held. He also indicated that, while there have been rumours of a cell-phone video of the altercation in the Wikwemikong home, he is not aware of any such video and added that there is "lots of evidence" against the three accused. Acting Detective Inspector Depratto would not comment on whether any of the three accused were known to police, but said that there are no outstanding charges pending, and no further cause for concern for the public; the OPP will continue to support Wikwemikong Tribal Police in its investigation.

The case of Kimel Corbiere, aged 27 of Mindemoya, accused in the murder of Johnny Panamick, aged 70 of M'Chigeeng, was remanded until June 22, when he will be spoken to. Mr. Corbiere did not appear in court and was represented by his lawyer, James Wepler.

Mr. Panamick was found in his home on Back Street in M'Chigeeng by a neighbour on May 11, 2014, having suffered extensive bodily injuries and was taken to Health Sciences North in Sudbury, where he died on June 13, 2014.

Kimel Corbiere was

arrested on July 17, 2014, and charged with the first degree murder of Mr. Panamick. He appeared in court for the first time the day after his arrest, on July 18, and has been in custody since then.

The previous week, on May 21, dates were set for a preliminary hearing into the case of Clinton Gordon Haggart of Little Current, aged 32, charged with seven counts of arson in five suspicious fires that occurred in Little Current in the summer of 2014. Mr. Haggart remains in custody in Sudbury; he made his first court appearance via video on August 14, 2014.

The preliminary hearing of Mr. Haggart, who is represented by Glenn Sandberg, will be held June 15 to 18, 2015, when the Crown will call its evidence against the accused, usually through witnesses who take the stand and testify, providing an opportunity for the defence to evaluate the case against their client.

The charges against Mr. Haggart are: intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to personal property owned by Clinton Haggart, 25 Wilson Street East, Northeast Town, Ontario Aboriginal Housing Services, under Section 434.1 of the Criminal Code on June 13, 2014, and intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a dwelling house, property of Ontario Aboriginal Services, 25 Wilson Street East (the home of the Haggart family);

intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a dwelling owned by Ontario Aboriginal Housing Services, 35 Blake Street West (the home of Mr. Haggart's mother-in-law, Margaret Bowerman); intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a garage, property of Lorne Alston, on July 23 at 15 Blake Street West; intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a shed, property of Jamie Still, on August 5, 26 Blake Street West; intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a dwelling/recreation centre, property of Michael Maciuk, on August 17, 21 Campbell Street West (the Island Training Centre); and intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a storage facility, property of Floyd James Renton, on August 17, 23 Campbell Street West (the former Little Current curling rink).

pendent watchdogs is integral to the government's plans to sell off 60 percent of Hydro One, the company that manages the province's transmission lines, to private interests, with no single owner able to acquire more than 10 percent of the stock.

Mr. Marin has urged Premier Kathleen Wynne to reconsider that move, alleging that many of Hydro One's problems were only solved because of his investigation. The Ombudsman also pointed to the example of ORNGE (Ontario's air ambulance provider that was the centre of a slew of financial scandals) as what can happen when public oversight is lost.

The Ombudsman suggested that privatizing Hydro One and believing that will solve its problems is tantamount to living in a fool's paradise.

Premier Wynne countered, however, saying "I am confident that the company will be better run because that, again, is another part of this process. It is going to be a different entity. It's going to have different controls on it."

The province is planning a separate oversight agency to monitor the new hybrid organization, but that corporate ombudsman will report to the corporation's board, rather than to the legislature. Mr. Marin derided that style of oversight as "omsbuddies" and suggested they would be too close to the corporation to raise any serious issues.

As it was, Hydro One reported only 22,000 complaints to its regulator; according to Mr. Marin's report, even though the correct number likely numbered nearly five times that figure. Many of those complaints, some involving several thousand dollars and running unresolved for a year before finally being resolved by the Ombudsman's office.

In response to those ongoing software issues, which Mr. Marin declared were themselves the result of the corporation's

culture of hubris over its technology superiority, Hydro One attempted to obfuscate its way through.

"They obstructed and lied to the Minister of Energy's office when they asked questions, the board of directors and the Ontario Energy Board," Mr. Marin claimed, noting that he received several different answers as he tried to discover the depth of the problem. "Trying to deal with Hydro One math is like trying to pin down a kangaroo on a trampoline."

Hydro One CEO Carm Marcello pushed back, however, and denied lying to Mr. Chiarelli's staff. Mr. Marcello claimed that the number of customers affected by the billing problems fluctuated constantly and that was the reason for the varying answers.

Although denying any prevarication, Mr. Marcello did admit that the billing issue "got away from us" and that the company had let its customers down, adding "I'm sorry we put our customers through that negative experience and they felt that they had no recourse but to go to the Ombudsman."

The opposition party leaders were quick to support Mr. Marin's position.

"The culture at Hydro One needs to change. Selling any portion of it won't necessarily accomplish this," said Progressive Conservative Leader Patrick Brown, adding that he did not think the issues at Hydro One would have seen the light of day if it wasn't for the Ombudsman.

"Having the legislative authority to go into that corporation, that public corporation, that Crown corporation, and do the digging and do the research and compel documents and compel witnesses so that they can get to the bottom of what the problem is an extremely important tool and it's a tool of the people of Ontario and that tool will be lost when this gets sold off," said NDP leader Andrea Horwath.

torch will then continuing east on Sims Street, ending at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre.

The town will also be hosting a free community concert, followed by a meet and greet with Crystal Shawanda starting at 5:30 pm downtown.

"I am happy that the municipality and the Island as a whole gets to share in the celebration of the 2015 Pan Am Torch Relay," said Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin. "I am looking forward to seeing Ivan Wheale represent our community as our torch bearer and I can't wait to listen to Crystal Shawanda. It will be a great event to kick off the summer on Manitoulin."

Mr. Wheale is one of

3,000 torchbearers who will complete, on average, a 200-metre relay segment. The torch will be carried by more than 60 modes of transportation and exceed 5,000 kilometres on the road and 15,000 kilometres by air.

The aluminum torch stands 65 centimeters high and weighs 1.2 kilograms (roughly the same weight as a baseball bat). With a burn time of 10 to 12 minutes, the flame can withstand winds of up to 70 kilometres per hour and is visible in all kinds of weather conditions.

The 41-day torch relay starts this Saturday, May 30 at the Harbourfront Centre in Toronto, travelling to the Distillery District before making its way north to Thunder Bay on Day 2 (May 31). From Thunder Bay the torch will travel to

Nipigon, Terrace Bay, Marathon, White River, Wawa, Sault Ste. Marie, Thessalon, Blind River, Serpent River First Nation, Massey, Espanola and Manitoulin. From Little Current, the torch will make its way to Sudbury and east across the North, making stops in areas such as Sturgeon Falls and Algonquin Park and then looping back west towards Toronto after a stop in Ottawa and concluding July 10 with the dramatic lighting of the cauldron at the 2015 Pan Am Games opening ceremony in downtown Toronto.

home by a friend to buy a schoolbook. As soon as I saw her, I knew she would become much more important to me than that book I came for." Later Blair learned that she had felt the same way.

"At Christmas of 1942 my father took me to Windsor so I could enlist in the Canadian Air Force. I filled in the paperwork, passed the physical and was asked to report for training after graduating from Alexandria High School in June 1943." Before Blair could report to the RCAF, the US Army conscripted him. After basic training at Camp Roberts, the young recruit was given three options: remain in the 500-man battalion and ship out to the Pacific; attend officer training school at Fort Still or enter an Army Specialized Training Program as a pre-engineering cadet at Stanford University. "I chose the last option." Only six of 500 recruits were heading to Stanford.

Later in 1943, as the war progressed, Blair transferred back to Indiana University. On weekends, the young student could visit his family and Lillian who was doing nursing training at Indiana Medical School campus. "Lillian's dad operated the Standard Oil Company bulk station so we were able to get added gas stamps despite the rationing."

In January of 1943, America was pressured to add infantry to the war. The school program was halted and Blair joined his peers at Camp Shelby, a huge army base. He was assigned to the 516th field Artillery Battalion, to work in the 'Survey and Forward Reconnaissance Squad.' "I remember trying to impress the boys one day while running a survey line. I was confronted with a creek while carrying a large pole so decided to try pole-vaulting. Mid-creek, I found myself face-to-face with a water moccasin snake, mouth wide-open, ready to strike. I leapt away, simultaneously thrashing the water, and escaped the attack." His buddies were bent over laughing.

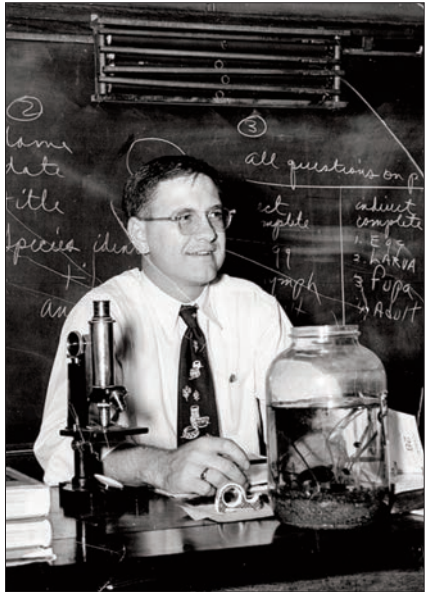
After training, Blair, now nicknamed Sully, headed for New York with his cohort for final processing prior to getting ready to be shipped to Europe. Over 20,000 men and 600 nurses boarded the Aquitania, a sister ship to the Titanic. "We were assigned hammocks outside." The ship zig-zagged across the ocean in a south-east direction heading north along the shore of Ireland and Scotland where they anchored six days later.

The men boarded south-bound trains at dusk to escape bombing; they were cheered by children who had been evacuated from London to safety. "The children chanted 'gum chum' and we threw them gum. We took over evacuated homes in Broadstone on the English Channel. Two months later, we got our marching orders for France."

Blair wound up on LST

(Landing Ship Tank) number 350 headed for the Seine River near Rouen, France. The men and twelve '155 mm' guns landed on the river's edge and regrouped in a field. They stopped at Nolleval France for 10 days in the rain and were surprised at the anger they encountered from locals. "We were upset because we felt we were helping them. We never really found out why they were angry."

Later in December 1944, the 516th marched to Cambrai which had a walled inner city built by the Romans. Marching to Belgium, they found many dead horses and destroyed vehicles. On December 16 the Battle of the Bulge against Germany was launched and the 516th battalion became part of the 9th army under the command of British General

Montgomery.

"We came to the front lines near Palenberg, Germany where gun crews were firing at enemy targets. The roar of twelve '155 mm' guns firing at once was deafening. We established an observation post in a bombed house, a mile away, to assess the status of our targets." Christmas Eve was spent in a stone building with a partial moat. On Christmas day the men enjoyed a hot meal but were strafed by a ME 109 and had to dive for cover. Nobody was hurt, but a Christmas cake sent by family was blown off the hood of the truck.

The next morning Blair helped run a survey for the new gun positions. He was hit by mortars but only the rear of the truck got the shrapnel. B17s were bombing the industrial Ruhr area. Occasionally one would be shot down and we would see a parachute emerge. In January 1945, Blair and his survey team were establishing observation

points. "I was standing in a doorway when debris hit my head. I realized someone was shooting at me but the rounds hit high. I dropped to the ground and the shooting stopped."

"The most deadly encounter saw the Germans shooting OK-bazookas at American and British tanks. The tanks just exploded and there were many casualties. It was a terrifying scene for the men of the 516th battalion. All the American and British soldiers had been killed and the half-tracks and Sherman tanks destroyed. Eventually the remaining German soldiers were killed or crushed in their dug holes where they had been hiding."

Blair, on a German motorcycle, was one of the

first to cross the Rhine River on a pontoon bridge that the men had built. Sherman Tanks followed. On the other side they found complete destruction as they moved forward, sheltering in basements overnight. "On April 12, we found a forced labour concentration camp in Melle. The desperate Russian and Polish people rushed towards us. We only had one soldier who could converse with them, in German. They were overjoyed. We found out that they had been there for years. Food was brought in and then the freed captives were put on trains bound for the Ukraine. The women had tied lilacs to some of the box cars in celebration. It was quite a scene."

On May 8, the war ended and the men were in the town of Halle, controlled by the British Army. It was a joyous day and celebrations were potent. A factory in Backnang became a temporary home. "We worked with local people, giving them coffee in return for a good meal. Blair and a buddy found a Mercedes hidden in a haystack, reportedly left by an SS officer. The two men brought gas, an air pump for the tires and a new battery. Their joy was short-lived because the keys were soon requested by their commanding officer. Travelling celebrities helped substitute for the missing car rides. The men

enjoyed shows by Jack Benny, Betty Hutton and other travelling stars.

It took a while to get men of the armed forces back home. Some remained in camps in France until February 1946. Those with the

most combat time and months of service had more points and were taken home first. "I was the only Canadian out in 1946. Our cohort arrived to Long Island on March 6. There wasn't a dry

eye when the Statue of Liberty came into sight. The joy of coming home mingled with the pain of realization that so many of our fellow soldiers could not enjoy this moment."

Blair was joyfully welcomed home by his father, mother, Lillian and other family members. He soon learned he had 42 months of prepaid university waiting for him, so he applied for forestry. His father had a friend in the US Congress who helped him get into that program at Ball State University in Indiana."

Lillian and Blair married on July 21, 1946. After graduating in 1955, Blair became a high school biology teacher. He became vice-principal after 11 years and principal for 16 more years. The young teacher was asked to be a PhD candidate at Purdue but his professor died tragically in a car accident and Blair decided not to pursue the program. He became a 30-year member of the Presbyterian Church and, in 1948, joined the Masonic Lodge. Lillian got her



Blair at home in April of this year.

Masters degree in psychometrics and worked in the public school system.

The couple had two children, Ann and Blair Paul. Ann is now retired from her high school teaching job in North Bay. She is active in the Catholic Church and helps to take care of retired nuns. There are three grandchildren: Ben Oakes is Ann's

son. He works for a British tobacco company. Megan and Shannon are Blair and Jenny's daughters. Shannon is an Olympic swimmer and is finishing her second year of veterinary medicine training. Megan has a degree in foreign languages and business.

In 1950, Blair and Lillian came for a visit to Manitoulin. "We loved my ancestral Providence Bay, and decided this would be a great place spend our summer and ultimately retire." They bought some land on the water and built two camps on the shore, aptly named Sullivan's Cottages. An A-frame was added in 1970. We also fixed up the old town jail in Providence Bay. Singer Jane Siberry stayed in one of the cottages with a friend and the Sullivans got to know the talented young singer. Two young Australian ladies stayed 'in-jail' for a month as well."

"In 1979, we retired to Manitoulin, living in the jail ourselves, until the A-frame renovations were done. My parents moved into a house in town we had purchased 10 years

earlier. Unfortunately, my father died within a year." Blair and Lillian also kept a home in Arizona for 20 years.

"Lillian continued with psychometrics, working with RN Glen Hallet. I spent many good hours helping set up the information display and teach students at the Providence Bay Interpretive Center," Blair offers. "In 1985, for our 40th anniversary, Lillian and I visited England, France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, Austria, Switzerland and Luxemburg. We met a couple in Germany that had researched the American Ninth Army. We also noticed that many rebuilt houses had "tile" roofs made of spent shell casings that had been cut in half lengthwise."

"The most important events in my life were the birth of my daughter and my son. Lillian was awake for our son's birth and it was an outstanding experience for me as was coming home with 5,000 troops, being met by two escort ships shooting streams of water over us, a waiting band, and the

Seed bags dating 145 years donated to Centennial Museum

SHEGUIANDAH—Last week, Richard Lathwell presented Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah curator Heidi Ferguson (nee Burnett) with a set of pristine linen seed bags stamped with the name of her great great uncle, Moses Burnett, who built the farm where Mr. Lathwell now owns.

Moses Burnett is considered to be one of the pioneers of Howland Township, settling along Townline Road in 1866 where he built a log house and barn on Lot 11, Concession 1, now home to Mr. Lathwell and his Lobo Loco alpaca farm.

Mr. Lathwell explained that he found the seed bags, including one stamped with the name of 'R. Stringer,'

another prominent Howland name (most likely Robert Stringer, the curator

said) and which was also donated to the museum, in the farm's old grainery. He

has seven barns on the property, all of which "are loaded with 100-plus years of collected stuff." Ms. Ferguson said she guessed the seed bags date from the 1870s. Linen was used, particularly for the use of fine grains and seeds, as the weave was particularly fine. Small patches are evident, some messily done and some neatly stitched, that show the bags were used

year after year and are in perfect condition today.

According to the historical tome 'Reflections,' he later built a large frame house further back from the road, his wife Elizabeth refusing to move in until a new well was dug close to the new house. Moses and Elizabeth Burnett had 14 children: Laura, Annie, Eliza, William, Sarah, John, Walter, Martha Maria,

Mary Melissa, Jesse James, Norman, Amanda and Alice. On their golden wedding anniversary in October 13, 1914 the couple had 47 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. Elizabeth died six days later on October 19, 1914 and Moses died on May 18, 1917.

The Burnett farm seed bags will be on display at the museum this summer.

Help is close at hand. Two years ago, when I had some heart trouble, I pushed a button on my Phillips Lifeline and my neighbour Rick Hibna was here in no time with the ambulance. Murray McDermid and I can call each other too, if either need help. I really can't ask for anything more. After the heart-wrenching drama of WW Two, this really is an ideal place to spend my remaining years."



LITTLE CURRENT—Twisted Image tattoo artist and body piercer John McKee has moved from his old location on Worthington Street and opened a new shop along Water Street in Little Current.

"I have been interested in this spot since the building first came on the market, but I didn't need the whole building," said Mr. McKee of his new shop in a portion of the former Little Current IDA (the building has been divided into three businesses with separate entrances and amenities). "When the new owner approached me with the option I was very excited. It is such a great location and the perfect set up. Plus, I have a view of the North Channel."

In recent years, the area of the new Twisted Image shop was part of the Water Street Clinic, making it a good location for tattoo and piercing shop.

"My background in dental really gave me the base that my shop should be like a clinic," explained Mr. McKee. "It was really well set up and I didn't have to do too much work to the space other than paint it."

The result of Mr. McKee's work is a modern space, featuring red and black décor, black leather seats in the waiting room and an electric fireplace and television.

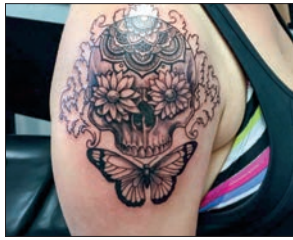

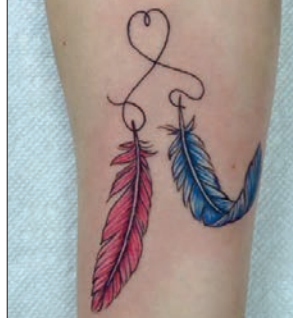

ever wants to come see you, but with tattoos people want to be there," said Mr. McKee. "It's a lot more fun. Ironically, the graphic design course taught me nothing about working in the field because by the time I graduated everyone was switching to computers, but everything I learned in the course I use daily as a tattoo artist."

He also started body piercing several years ago after a body piercer interned with him, learning to be a tattoo artist.

"I learned from him, and vice-versa," Mr. McKee shared.

Mr. McKee's passion is black and grey tattoos, but like most artists Mr. McKee is versatile and able to work with customers to design the perfect tattoo for them, in the style of their choice.

Mr. McKee also enjoys doing cover-up work, finding it extra rewarding.

"Individuals can purchase tattoo equipment for \$200 now online, but have no idea how to use it," said Mr. McKee. "People come in with some pretty awful stuff. Being able to take a tattoo someone hates and make it into something they love is really special."

"Being a tattoo artist is a huge responsibility," concluded Mr. McKee. "People are walking around with your art forever and every tattoo is a billboard for your business. I love my job, it's a lot of fun, but it is something I take very seriously."

Mr. McKee is booked into June for tattoos, but has a few openings for small tattoos at the end of June, July for large tattoos and is booking into August for weekend appointments.

Body piercing is available by appointment daily by availability.

"I encourage anyone who is interested in getting a tattoo or body piercing to stop in, or anyone who would like to see the new shop," said Mr. McKee.

Hello everybody! I'm so happy to be back. Recently I went with the Outside Looking In (OLI) program to one the Tim Horton's Kids Foundation camps called The Onagonda Farms. It is located between Branford and St. George. The students were gone for two weeks, away from home without any communication to back home. They practiced in a barn everyday for two weeks, but had one day off to go Canada's Wonderland. There were bad days but when they were together there with three other First Nation Communities (Lac La Croix, Ontario, Garden Hill and St. Theresa Point, both from Manitoba). They basically became family. Everybody had to rely on each other, trust each other and make sure everybody was okay. Everyday students would wake up at 7:30 am and have breakfast all together as a group, they would also have lunch and dinner together. While at camp, some students had struggled not having their electronic on them, but they made it through the whole two weeks and were thankful they didn't have them. Austin Pangowish, future leader, says, "It wasn't too bad. It actually felt good to be away from it, considering that I like being on the Internet. But it was more fun. I actually had a really good time. I really enjoyed myself at the camp."

Students worked hard every single day, preparing for the final show. Everybody (which includes the three other communities) had to learn a whole new dance for the final number. A day before the big performance students were taken to the Sony Centre Stage to have a dress rehearsal. They got a taste of backstage (costumes, hair and makeup) so by the next day they were prepared for two shows. On the final performance day everybody was full of excitement and tears. The crowd was going crazy for all the amazing dancers up on the stage. When I asked student Tessa Copper how she felt after performing on the stage she said, "I felt pretty great about myself. Full of excitement and I felt a little emotional because I did something I thought I wasn't able to do. It felt amazing; I had goosebumps, tears coming out of my eyes. It was the best experience."

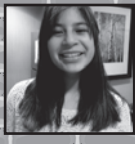
Now that OLI is back at school after two weeks, students are quickly adapting back to the school life. They are already thinking of planning for next year's fundraising.

They have planned performances for the community. When I asked Alexandria Shawongonabe how she feels from the beginning of the program to now (after the show) and if she felt any different, Alexandria replied: "At the beginning I was really excited to be dancing again, throughout all of the practices it was kind of scary knowing that some people were on the edge of getting cut for behavioural reasons and academics and maybe just not knowing the choreography, but making it to camp with almost everybody was awesome, making us the biggest group there. The camp really brought us all a lot closer, making us dance better on stage, so that made the performance so much more fun. I'm sad the performance is over because this is the point where people become less motivated to do performances - it might be because they don't compare it to being on stage in Toronto."

On another note, Wikwemikong High School attended NSSSAA for Track and Field in Elliot Lake. Everybody gave it their all and some will be going to NOSSA. The track team consisted of the following students: Harmony Rivers, Andre Rivers, Delani Trudeau, Matthew O, Dehmin Eshkawkogan and myself. Harmony had placed first in midget high jump, Dehmin had placed second in midget high jump. Delani placed first in midget shot put.

The Warriors also completed the Spartan Race in Mont Tremblant, Montreal. It was a very big accomplishment crossing over the finish line, it took some over five hours to complete the race but they did it and that's all that matters! The whole team should be very proud of the hard work they put into this. If you're wondering what it felt like for students to complete this race, I asked team member Adrian Trudeau how he felt and he said, "After the race I just felt so accomplished from last year's spartan race. This year was a lot harder and more challenging. I was so happy I made it at the end. On the run I was so mad from the big hills but I was

Recipes from **Rose's Kitchen**

Busy schedules, and in my case having too much fun in my garden, can make it hard to cook healthy meals that are quick. The best are the one-dish meals. Everything goes in one pan and voila you have dinner.

Chicken and Rice

I added extra tomatoes for juice while cooking and if you leave the dish to sit and reheat you will need to add extra liquid. I find that when you use short grain rice it becomes more creamy and sticky than the regular rice. The avocado salad is excellent as a side and also very healthy.

- 1 Tbsp chopped garlic
- 2 tsp paprika
- 1Tbsp ground cumin
- 2 tsp grated lime zest
- 8 chicken thighs, boneless and skinned
- Salt and freshly ground pepper
- 2 tsp olive oil
- 1 1/2 cups chopped onion
- 1 red pepper, coarsely chopped
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes, canned with juice
- 3 1/2 cups chicken stock
- 1/2 cup beer
- 2 cups short grain rice such as Arborio
- 1 cup frozen peas
- 1 roasted red pepper, sliced into strips
- 1/4 tsp red pepper flakes (optional)

Combine garlic, paprika, cumin and lime zest. Rub half of mixture into chick-

en thighs and reserve remainder for the rice. Season chicken with salt and pepper.

Heat oil in wide, deep skillet on medium heat. Add thighs and brown on each side, about 3 minutes per side. Remove from skillet and add onion and peppers. Reduce heat to medium low. Sauté for 3 minutes or until onion softens.

Add remaining garlic mixture, oregano and tomatoes and fry slowly for 5 to 8 minutes until flavours have combined.

Stir in chicken stock and beer and bring to boil. Stir in the rice. Return thighs and simmer uncovered for 30 minutes or until chicken and rice are cooked. I added more liquid because I wanted a creamier texture.

Add peas and roasted red pepper. Add the red pepper flakes if using. Season well with salt and pepper and serve.

Avocado Salad

- 2 Tbsp fresh lime juice or cider vinegar
- 2 Tbsp olive oil
- Salt and freshly ground pepper
- 2 large avocados
- 2 Tbsp finely chopped red onion
- 2 Tbsp chopped fresh coriander
- 1/2 chopped jalapeno pepper (optional)
- Whisk together the lime juice and oil. Season with salt and pepper.

Cut avocados in half. With a spoon remove the pit and scoop flesh out of skin.

Chop flesh into small pieces. Combine with chopped onion, chopped jalapeno pepper and lime dressing. Sprinkle with coriander.
