ONTARIO-The Ontario government has recently announced its updated Indigenous curriculum, update that is being an approached in a number of different ways by different groups across the province.

"We are committed to ensuring that Indigenous perspectives are present in Ontario's curriculum,' said Lisa Thompson, Ontario's minister of education, at an event in Thunder Bay last week.

The new curriculum involves an array of 10 electives in areas including First Nations, Métis and Inuit cultures and viewpoints, as well as Canadian Indigenous contributions to art, literature, law, humanities, politics and history. These new courses are planned to begin in September.

Some critics have panned the elective nature of the new Indigenous studies courses, meaning that students will be able to

choose whether or not they take the classes and many students will not have the space in their schedules to take any of the class-

"It feels like the anchor's being sent to the bottom," said Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare. "What's going to happen to all these things we've been putting in our education system? Our curriculum, books, starting to write our own language and all that? ... I truly believe this is all coming way too fast. It's overspeed.'

Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) director of education Norm Blaseg said he had heard a lot of advocates speaking about whether the courses should be compulsory or elective in nature, but RDSB was more in favour of including aspects of traditional teachings in a broader sense. # **Manitoulin Island** benchmark survey on climate change has disturbing trends

MANITOULIN—Despite all the media coverage of climate change and its impact on the global environment and humanity's future survival, coming to grips with what that actually means locally can be a challenge. Manitoulin Streams' Climate Change Adaptation Liaison staff person Liam Campbell has been working diligently on a climate study of a number of factors that will impact life on Manitoulin as we know it going forward and some of the findings are now available-but much more needs to be done before the picture is as clear as it can be. Mr. Campbell has put out a call for anyone who may have old diaries, letters or other historical documents that might contain information on water levels, temperatures, precipitation and ice cover.

The climate study was funded in part through the Ontario Cen-

tre for Climate Impacts and Adaptation Resources (OCCIAR), a university-based resource hub for researchers and stakeholders searching for information on climate change impacts and adapta-tion and Manitoulin Streams Improvement Association, an award winning grass roots, notfor-profit organization that is focused on large-scale, community based efforts to rehabilitate aquatic ecosystems on Manitoulin Island.

While Mr. Campbell's work is focussed on establishing a baseline for future study, two things have become very clear from the available data. Manitoulin's temperature is showing a steady rise over time and the water levels around the Island's shores is on a steady and perceptible decline.

Many Islanders have been breathing a sigh of relief as water levels have risen over the past

**Province reinstates funding for**

SUDBURY-Interlibrary loans for Northern Ontario libraries are slated to resume on Saturday, June 1 following considerable backlash over the impacts of funding cuts imposed by the Ford government, another instance in the growing list of protests following recent budget reductions by the province.

'We're pretty happy about this news. We use interlibrary loans quite a lot and we have patrons who mainly use that," said Little Current Public Library head librarian Karen Gallo. When resumed, the interlibrary

loan system will operate just as it had before, but only between Northern libraries. It will continue to enlist the services of Canada Post to ship books and other borrowing materials between libraries, including DVDs, documents and CDs.

"Once the program starts,

libraries in Northern Ontario will be able to log back into the software to process interlibrary loans. Ontario Library Service-North (OLS-N) will provide a rebate that will help pay for the postage at the 2018 rate," said

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# Gore Bay teacher Dan Smith awarded by Rainbow Board



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# WSIB claims, funding changes could cause half million deficit for DSB

ESPANOLA-The Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) learned at its May meeting that it's looking at an estimated \$500,000 deficit for 2019.

When the estimated deficit was raised by one board member, the DSB's visiting auditors, who were there presenting the 2018 audited financial statements, noted that it should be of concern and said steps should be made to budget appropriately, as rising Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) pay-

ments over the last five years should mark a trend.

CAO Fern Dominelli explained that some of the shortfall comes from WSIB payments on behalf of paramedic services—something that is hard to budget for. The remainder, \$351,995, is due to provincial funding changes.

"We've taken steps in this year's budget," Mr. Dominelli said, noting that an additional \$113,000 has been budgeted for WSIB payments for 2019.

harm and wipe out this organization's reserves," the CAO added. "Right now it's \$500,000, next year it could be \$1 million—we just don't know.'

Mr. Dominelli told the board that the DSB has taken major steps toward preventative measures to help ensure their paramedics are safe and healthy, such as outfitting all the ambulances with special stretchers that save back stress as well as Road to Mental Readiness training to "Having an unbudgeted help tackle Post Traumatic Stress \$500,000 deficit can be of big Disorder and other mental health-related issues. Potential employees also undergo psychological analysis upon hiring to make sure they are a good fit for the stress of the job.

Mr. Dominelli told the board that paramedics are nearing police officers in terms of WSIB claims.

When contacted by this news-

paper to ask why the DSB doesn't budget more than the aforementioned \$113,000, Mr. Dominelli replied, "Because that's all we can afford."

"It's something you hope will disappear, but year after year trends show that's not likely to happen," he added.

# Feds commit \$169.2 million to four laning Hwy 69

SUDBURY-There will soon be more four lane sections of the highway leading North from Toronto following a May 21 federal announcement of a \$169.2 million investment in improvements to Highway 69.

"It's just going to make it so much safer," said Killarney Mayor Ginny Rook when contacted by The Expositor following the announcement. "I don't know how many times I have been doing the speed limit on the two lane portion of the highway when someone would go speeding past me on a double line section. It also make it easier for tourists to get up here from down south and that will be good for our businesses here in the North.'

Marc Serré, MP for Nickel Belt and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Rural Economic Development, the Honourable Bernadette Jordan and Paul Lefebvre, MP for Sudbury and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Natural Resources, the Honourable Amarjeet Sohi, announced funding for two major projects providing important upgrades to Highway 69.

The first project involves twinning and realigning an 11 kilometre stretch of road from north of Highway 559 to just south of Shebeshekong Road. Work also involves constructing a new interchange at


Woods Road, building new service roads to improve access for local drivers, and installing 14 culverts and 22 kilometres of fencing to protect wildlife.

The second project involves expanding a 19.3 km section of the highway to a four-lane, divided highway, including new twin bridges over Still River, Key River and Straight Lake. The project work also includes building new interchanges at Bekanon Road and at Highway 522.

These upgrades will improve safety and efficiency along this key route, boost trade and support economic prosperity for the region by accommodating a greater number of commercial and passenger vehicles, notes a release.

"These vital improvements to Highway 69 will make it easier for businesses to get their products to customers, reduce pollution and allow local residents to spend less time in traffic and more time with their families," said Mr. Serré. "Projects like this improve the daily lives of Northern Ontarians now and lay the foundation for a bright and prosperous future.'

"Now more than ever, communities need help meeting the long-term infrastructure needs of residents," said Mr. Lefebvre. "Our government is mak-... continued on page 8

# Manitoulin OPP investigate rash of vehicle thefts, break and enters

MANITOULIN-On Monday, May 27, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) with the assistance of the OPP Canine Unit and the Emergency Response Team (ERT), as well as officers from the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police were called to three separate reports of stolen vehicles. Some time overnight, a GMC Sierra pick-up truck was stolen from a residence on Bidwell Road in the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands (NEMI). At approximately 2:27 am, officers located the stolen truck, abandoned after a collision, on Highway 6 in Assiginack Township A short time later, the Manitoulin OPP received a second report of a stolen vehicle, a Ford Ranger pick-up truck, from a residence on Dunlop Street in Sheguiandah. This vehicle was located abandoned in Wiikwemkoong. A third pick-up truck, a Chevrolet Silverado, was reported stolen to the OPP at approximately 2:30 am from Lecourt Street in Assiginack Township. # Ford government backtrack on cuts a welcome relief

Democratic governments are supposed to be elected by the people, based on their platforms and general policy approach to governing, but the truth of the matter, in modern times at least, is that governments tend to be unelected by a disgruntled public. While politicians of every stripe lay claim to having the mandate to move their agenda forward upon being elected, the link between platform policies and vote count is somewhat more tenuous than would be hoped

The recent Ontario provincial election might well be a case study of that phenomenon. The government of the Ontario Liberal Party were so weighed down by the lack of personal popularity of former premier Kathleen Wynne that current Progressive Conservative Premier Doug Ford famously sailed into power without a clearly defined platform—leaving a claim of a mandate that included massive cuts and a complete remolding of the body politic with very little in the way of sound underpinnings, as evidenced by the unprecedented collapse in the polls of the Ford government "for the people." The people, it seems, are mostly unimpressed particularly in the urban ridings of Canada's most populous city.

So the news that the Ford government has backtracked on some of the most egregious cuts, particularly in the city of Toronto, but also for rural and Northern Ontario, was politically sensible and welcome news for many small rural communities.

Considering the huge impact that the cuts being implemented by the Ford government were projected to have on municipal governments, the sighs of relief being expressed by municipal politicians can well be understood. Aside from direct cuts to health, education, legal aid and a host of other vulnerable sectors are the less obvious impacts of cuts to essential services that municipalities will have to backfill.

A clear case in point is the decision by the Ford government to slash \$31 million from the Ontario Provincial Police budget in essentially the same moment the police force that serves most, if not all, small rural municipalities is facing an arbitrated wage increase for uniformed and civilian staff. The idea that there are sufficient "efficiencies" within the OPP to shield rural property owners from the impact of this perfect storm defies any non-ideological assessment of reality. Will the result be less policing in rural communities or larger bills for service downloaded onto the rural ratepayer?

While government spending is a favoured target of populist politi-

cians of both the right and the left (for the left-leaning argument see "corporate welfare bum" subsidies, coined by David Lewis), the quantifiable fact is that Ontario's program spending is the lowest of any of the provinces. True, the provincial deficit is the largest of any subnational government in the world, but those levels of government around the globe do not heft the cost of a universal Medicare program.

The rationale of the "government for the people" that Ontario must be open for business blithely ignores the fact that over the past 15 years this province has seen huge growth in foreign investment and is currently enjoying the lowest unemployment rate in living memory. Ontario has always been open for business, the memes of Ontario Proud notwithstanding. Ontario remains the economic powerhouse of the nation-exceeded only by the American economic powerhouse of California.

Our current (and future) challenges are a dearth of bodies to fill many of the skilled, relatively high paid trades positions that will be required to maintain that position as we head into the 21st Century.

The polls illustrated the will of the people to Premier Ford and his compatriots that the Progressive Conservative caucus claim to represent. All cynicism of political self interest aside, is to the credit of the Progressive Conservative government that they have pulled back the high profile cuts to essential services that the people of this province require and today we give credit where credit is due, a government who "listened" but more importantly the people who made their voices heard.

There are still far too many less visible programs and essential services whose downloading onto local taxpayers are going to cause immense, and ultimately unnecessary, pain for many who are already struggling to make ends meet in that other Ontario that lies north of Steeles Avenue.

We must ensure that Northern and rural Ontario do not become the victims or sacrificial lambs of a reactionary and outdated economic and social outlook by making sure our voices are heard, loud and clear, at Queen's Park. That "we" not only includes our political, business, social and legal leaders, but also those individual Ontarians upon whose property taxes the impact of the people's government's "efficiencies" will inevitably fall.




Allan, a cheerful, amiable gentleman and a good friend, spent much of his career at Hydro One, ranging in jobs from forestry, linesman to management. His true passion was always hunting and fishing. Further to that desire, Allan has assembled an impressive line of trophies from antelopes to alligators. His home boasts several deer mounts as well as the cranium of an 11 foot alligator, teeth intact. He has also challenged and landed a 127 lb halibut while on vacation, sacrificing a few stitches from a 'surprise' appendicitis surgery a day earlier. After retiring from Hydro One, and during the time of his charter business out of South Baymouth, he helped many happy clients catch lots of lake trout, rainbow trout and salmon.

Al's dad Donald, originally from Midland, was an avid hunter and fisherman too. Donald also worked for (then) Ontario Hydro, and he was transferred to Manitoulin from Stayner in 1939, when the HEPC, the Hydro Electric Power Commission, needed a linesman in Kagawong. It was hard to get people up here at the time, but the north was excellent for an outdoorsman. "Dad started as a linesman and eventually retired as an area foreman. Ron Tideman, our uncle, married to dad's sister, was the manager at that time. My mother Eleanor (nee Patterson), hailed from Toronto. She met dad at Wasaga Beach in the late 1930s and they married in Mindemoya in 1940. Dad had to borrow a car from Ron to get to the wedding.'

Allan was born to Eleanor and Donald Clark on March 12, 1942. "A neighbour and Aunt Betty helped mum with the birth. Doc Strain arrived by horse and cutter, a little too late. Earlier that day, mother had been down on her hands and knees scrubbing the floor, so it would be perfect for the doctor. Unfortunately, the slippery floor was hazardous for dad who kept losing his balance that day. He quickly created a non-slip surface with ashes form the fireplace. "Mother was mortified."

Allan would have five siblings. Margaret is married to Tom Stringer, living in Green Bay; Marilyn, married to Mike Farquhar; Ken, married to Shelley; Anne, married to Eric Parsons; and Jim, married to Melody, all live in Kagawong. "Our original house was the Hunt house, up the hill in Kagawong. It was two doors down from the candy store on the corner today. (Boo-Bah-Loo Candy)

"I remember riding my new tricycle on our deck. That fall, I was on the same deck, when I was captivated by the exciting scene below. A herd of cattle was moving along the road right in front of us. Bill Hillyard was directing the cattle with a hired hand and a dog. Some of the cattle wound up in our yard but his trained dog would come and coax them back into the herd. The cattle were angled towards the dock in Kagawong where a boat was waiting to take them to Toronto." "There were no boys to play with on the hill, but I had friends, Gail Fisher and Carol Richards. Occasionally Bruce Gordon came up to play. The kids in town had to go by our place to get to school which was the building where the Main St. Café is today. Stan Gordon's mother, Maime Gordon, was our teacher. Despite her best efforts, recess was my favourite subject," Al admits. "Mrs. Gordon did take us for nature walks, and they were the best. She would name all the trees, the plants, even the weeds and we became familiar with all of them. We also learned about various breeds of cows and horses, all very practical things to know for a farming community. We were tested on all these items too.'





#### A terrific catch!

Another highlight for Al was walking home from school. "I would head down to the river and find a snake, then sneak back up and reveal this reptile in the proximity of a female." Connie and Judy Elliott were two of these girls subjected to random fright attacks. Other good times happened when Al visited his Patterson grandparents in Toronto. "If we were lucky, we went to the Exhibition in late summer. Grandfather liked to take me to see the exhibits."

"When I was old enough, I thought about earning money picking dew worms for dad and his friends. I was about 10 and I made two cents for each worm. That money got me my first bicycle. Dad introduced me to hunting and fishing. Dad would hang his deer in the back porch. We didn't have a fridge, so the meat had to be canned. We kept two pigs in a pen in the back. They lasted two seasons until mum got tired of feeding them, then we ate the pigs and she was happier."

High school was in Gore Bay where the nursing home is today. We were on the top floor and we had to rotate at three in the afternoon to the old municipal building downtown for some of our classes. Occasionally we were left alone at the C.C. McLean site because the teacher was busy at the other site. The best part of high school was science, finding an experiment that would blow up." Allan went as far as Grade 10. "I spent four days in Grade 11 before realizing there was no hands-on work here, just a lot of languages and a distinct need to learn the operation of a typewriter. I was 17 and I left to do what was more important to me at the time, making a paycheck. I applied to Hydro, INCO and the Navy. Both Ontario Hydro and INCO wanted Al to go for a physical. "The Navy told me they were recruiting in the spring and would get in touch with me then. I decided the Hydro work would be more familiar and less dangerous. compared to mining, below the ground." Ontario Hydro asked Al to move to Matheson and work with the forestry division. "They trained me to cut down trees, do trimming and spray chemicals where needed. We weren't aware of the dangers of 2-4-D and 5T so much back then, and we would occasionally hit our partners with a blast when we were turning around, or the wind caught the spray." After four years of forestry work, Al was transferred to lines. "By then I knew all the safety regulations and the background of hydro work practices. I could tell how much voltage was in the line

by the size and type of insulators that were used. Despite the three years of seniority, I took line training. We used spurs to climb the poles. In later years that was a lot quicker than getting a bucket set up. We dug holes by hand to set up lines."

"We did all the needed jobs at that time, from domestic work to industrial work. I liked the variety of all the tasks," Al relates. "Poles were put in during summertime We worked with high tension wires in the winter when swamps and rivers were frozen, and you didn't need a boat. When asked if there were any close calls, Al confirmed "no close calls; you are either there, or you make a mistake, and you are not there.

We don't talk about close calls." Al met Diane Haley in 1962, in Matheson. She was training at the Ottawa Civic Hospital as a nurse. She graduated in May of 1966 and the couple were wed in October of that year. After two years, the couple bought a house on a farm that came with 20 acres. Al continued his work as a linesman and Diane worked at Bingham Memorial in nursing. Both their children, Greg and Colleen, were born in Matheson. The family enjoyed tent camping and fishing After Matheson Moosonee was the next stop in the late 1970s. Part of the line from Cochrane to that community, the stretch from Otter Rapids to Moosonee, had just been completed. Hydro was going to include Moosonee in their grid system. At that time, two caterpillar diesel engines were producing power for this community. The engines were housed in a box car owned by the O&R, Ontario Northland Railway. It was costly to run those two engines. "I was to commission the line, which entailed flying over it by helicopNorth Bay until Al retired in 1993. They had bought a cottage in Kagawong, three years earlier and spent the next five years fixing it up. Summers were enjoyed on the island and winters in Calendar. Son Greg and daughter Colleen and their families had already moved back to Manitoulin. Al bought a fishing charter business in South Baymouth the same year he retired from North Bay. He called it 'Al-E-Cat' Charter, the logo was a big cat holding a fish on his back. He spent 22 years taking guests out for fishing trips on the big water, catching many large fish and keeping his customers happy. He retired from that business in 2015 but kept the boat.

It was also a time for travelling. In 2000 Al and Diane went to Alaska in their truck, bearing a slidein-camper that Al had rebuilt. "It was a beautiful six-week trip just for the two of us." It was abruptly postponed for three days while Al had an emergency appendectomy in Fairbanks. "The ambulance picked me up in the campground which left Diane to drive the truck and camper alone to Fairbanks. Thankfully, the \$25,000 medical bill was entirely covered with our insurance."

Al was quickly back to his Alaskan fishing, pulling in a 127 lb halibut and sacrificing a few of his stitches in the process. Thankfully, he had a wife who happened to be a nurse. She helped him when he finally shared this information with her. Al went on to leave his own mark on local history by winning the 'best dance prize' while twirling with a Can-Can girl on stage at Diamond Lil's. This time no stitches were lost. Al grinned as he shared, "My reward was her garter which I had to remove with my teeth. It was all in good fun."

"We were back to Alaska in 2002 with brother Ken and his wife Shelley; they had the same 32-foot fifth-wheel trailer as we did. We had another great trip travelling the same moose-bound route and doing a considerable amount of fishing." A highlight on this trip was Jack London's Bar in Dawson City. This bar kept a toe soaked in formaldehyde, reputedly the toe of an old prospector who had suffered with frostbite. This toe was added to drinks for those with iron-cast innards. Customers were expected to down the beverage and hold the infamous toe between their teeth to prove that they had completed the required due-diligence as outlined in the bar rules. Diane was compelled to honour this expectation and managed to down her drink and bite the toe. The foursome also went back to Diamond Lil's but this time there was no dancing.

In 2004, Al and Diane moved to their new home where Al lives today. "We had it built so we could get out of our cottage, which was sold to Richard and Colleen. Wild deer and turkeys would wander through our new yard during the year and we would put feed them in the winter." "We still wanted adventure, so we looked into elk-hunting in Colorado, antelope hunting in Wyoming and alligator hunting in Louisiana. We both loved the excitement and the fine scenery," Al continues. "I recall searching for wild horses in their natural habitat in Wyoming. We were told to check out the box canyons and sure enough that was where we found them. Both Diane and I enjoyed their natural grace, unrestrained in their desert-like environment." "Fishing for alligators is similar in format to what you see in the show called 'Swamp People.' A fishing line baited with a rotting chicken is hung from a tree. When the alligator takes the hook, you move towards him in the boat and shoot him in a specific spot on the

# **Manitoulin Centennial Manor Minutes**

### May 16 Honeywell contract

Following a review of the April board minutes, Manitoulin Centennial Manor administrator Tamara Beam told the board that she had discussions with Honeywell about the costs of finishing the Manor's HVAC system. As was reported previously, Honeywell gave Manor administration an improper quote for its HVAC system, with the actual cost coming in significantly higher.

Ms. Beam explained that the per year payments are \$38,048 a year for the next five years and that the board has the option of paying biannually or quarterly. She said that there is no difference in the payments, but the board would see a difference in the financial statements. Quarterly, she suggested, might make it easier for budgeting purposes.

Hugh Moggy made a motion that the they pay Honeywell on a quarterly basis and it was seconded by Aurel Rivet. The motion was carried.

### Administrator's report

Ms. Beam shared with the board that the Manor is at 99.3 percent occupancy with a waiting list of 32. There are no compliance, ministerial issue or outbreaks.

The Manor has had three fire drills since April 5. Ms. Beam also shared that October 27 has been set as the Ontario Nursing Association arbitration date.

In budgets, nursing is over budget by over \$17,000; food, under budget by \$364; personal support workers (PSWs), under budget by \$5.800; and accommodation, under budget by \$28,000. Those categories that are under budget are helping to offset the nursing budget, it was explained. Year to date, the budget has a slight surplus of over \$6,000.

### **New Director of Care**

Debbie Selent of Little Current was welcomed by the board as the Manor's new Director of Care.

Ms. Selent, a nurse by trade, has an extensive background in health administration through her time with Mnaamodzawin Health Services, also as a Director of Care, and the North East Local Health Integration Network. Ms. Selent also plenty of background in geriatrics.



since their prime as components of the former Manitowaning Lodge facility.

"We were going to take them down anyway. They're in disrepair," said Mr. Deforge, noting that the main lodge will be torn down and rebuilt. "The cost to repair the buildings was too high and we wanted to have fully winterized structures now.

An interesting opportunity arose when producers from the show 'Salvage Kings,' a new History Channel offering produced by Toronto-based Media Headquarters, contacted Mr. Deforge and expressed their interest in facilitating the demolition for an episode.

'I showed them the lodge and it has an especially good historical value; it would make a good show. They've actually had a crew on the Island for a while now doing all the historical end of it," he said.

'Salvage Kings' is focused on the demolition and salvaging of historical properties within Ontario. It focuses on Priestly Demolition Inc. and follows crew members to

job sites where they conduct their operations.

An aspect of its business model is asset recovery and salvage, which is intended to "reduce future construction costs and protect the environment." Mr. Deforge emphasized this as a key outcome of the plan.

"They're going to take them down and repurpose all the wood to save it from landfill, so it's done in a very environmentally friendly way. Obviously, some will still go to landfill, but they're trying to take as much of the historical stuff as possible and repurpose all the wooden beams," he said

Mr. Deforge and his family will be featured in the show, both for the demolition of the lodge and for the tear-down of a barn on the family farm.

"This is going to be really good for the Island because the episode is going to promote the Island as an awesome tourist spot. I think any advertising for the Island is going to be great," he said.

# ...benchmark survey on climate change has disturbing trends

couple of years to something closer to the norm, and in fact many inhabitants of the lower Great Lakes have been sounding the alarm over disappearing shorelines as water levels have risen significantly.

What can be lost in the shuffle of anecdotal observations of temperatures and water levels is the overall trends toward which those levels are headed. Once the long-term data is examined, some sobering evidence can be revealed.

"I do have all of the trends, in fact so many different trends that it can be difficult to absorb," said Mr. Campbell. "Eventually, all of these will be available on the Manitoulin Streams website.'

Mr. Campbell, a scientist, was quick to add a caveat to his findings when applied from specific areas to broader regions. "Trends are only in areas where data is available," he said. "But while weather over the Island might be different, the overall trends should be similar.'

Official records can be spotty and there are often large gaps in data sets, but Mr. Campbell's work has been greatly assisted through groups like the Lake Manitou Area Association, which has ice in and ice out data recorded from 1980 to 2009. "An individual member also had observations of ice cover from 1993 to 2018.'

Unusual pieces of data, extraordinarily high or low temperatures for example, are often those things we remember as individuals. In scientific terms these are called outliers and when you are dealing in averages, those outliers can wreak havoc. Fortunately, Mr. Campbell has access to statistical analysis software to deal with those outliers.

Mr. Campbell's findings include the observation that the mean (average) temperatures, as measured at the Gore Bay weather station, have been increasing at a rate of about 0.15 degrees Celsius per decade. "Seasonally, winter is seeing biggest increase, with 0.21 degrees Celsius in mean air temperature a decade," he said. The data is over the period of 1935 to 2017. "If you only look at the last 30 years

mum temperatures, the increase is 0.14 degrees Celsius. The winter minimum is increasing faster at 0.24 degrees Celsius. The numbers, (while not seeming to be so very much taken by themselves) as they accumulate, point to serious repercussions.

Although the trends are there, Mr. Campbell's work is actually focussed more on establishing a baseline from which later observations can be informed.

Mr. Campbell stressed that, considering the politically charged nature of the current climate debate, he has been extremely careful to ensure that his analysis is free from conjecture or bias. Just like the Joe Friday character on Dragnet was wont to say "just the facts, ma'am.'

"It is not a partisan thing," he said. "This will establish a baseline so that we can objectively look at what is happening going forward.'

When it comes to precipitation, the findings may have huge impacts in the not too distant future for agriculture on Manitoulin. Overall trends show the amount of precipitation between 1935 and 1993 has declined by 13.2 millimetres per decade. What seems a bright side of an increase in yearly precipitation over the last 30 years, however, isn't so bright when the timing of the precipitation is taken into account. Spring sees an increase of 16.4 mm, but the summer trend sees the precipitation over that 30 year period fall by 13.4 mm, before rising again in the fall by 16.7 mm. "Summers are not getting as much precipitation," he said. "Some crops will not do as well, but others might do better.

Another ominous factor for agriculture is that the precipitation falling in the winter is not necessarily coming in the form of snow. "The amount of winter rain is increasing," said Mr. Campbell. With increasing winter temperatures, a lot of that water is coming in an unfrozen format, aka rain, and then it is freezing into ice. This is not a good thing for overwintering crops that depend on a blanket of snow to protect them.

That being said, Mr. Campbell notes that the changes are not necessarily bad, per se, just indicative that there will likely be a need to change what

types of crops are being grown locally. "It could be an opportunity," he notes.

As for water levels, looking at the trends from 1962 to 2018, the average Lake Huron water levels have declined by .05 inches per decade.

"That's part of the climate aspect," said Mr. Campbell. "What we are seeing is an increase in temperature and that comes with an increase in evaporation and the rate of evaporation is increasing. The Great Lakes appear to follow a 30 year cycle, but Mr. Campbell admits that there is not vet enough historical data to meet the scientific bar.

The impact on fisheries is of great concern as the rise in average water temperature in Lake Huron between 1925 and 2017 was .05 degrees Celsius.

"That's pretty astounding," he said. "A lot of fish species' life cycles depend on a particular thermal habitat. A lot of cold water fish such as salmon are cold water fish." Walleye are more resilient, however, and bass enjoy warmer environs.


Ice cover on Lake Huron has shown a three percent decline per decade. On inland lakes, the Lake Manitou Area Association records from 1980 to 2009 show a trend to 3.2 days later for freeze up and a trend of 1.9 day for later break up. "We are losing around five days of ice cover a decade," he noted.

Without the "official" data of government and institutional records, Mr. Campbell is looking for assistance from the public who may have historical records hidden within letters and diaries.

"If you know of someone who has been keeping records, please reach out," he said. "We are unique on Manitoulin, not only in the type of people but in the climate. Although we may be protected somewhat by Lake Huron, we should do everything we can to protect that."

Mr. Campbell noted that the type of remedial work that Manitoulin Streams engages in, in partnership with local land owners and municipalities, goes a long way toward helping to do just that: protecting and enhancing the fishery and biodiversity that helps make Manitoulin the little bit of heaven we all enjoy.



### **Ådministrator's report**

Things are looking pretty good at Manitoulin Centennial Manor these days. The occupancy rate is hovering around 99.74 percent with 32 applicants lined up on the waiting list.

Currently there is one resident in the palliative care room. The Manor cannot free up that person's room, however, as they are counted in the maximum number of residents the Manor may have even though they are no longer occupying their normal room.

"We have had no issues with compliance," said Manor administrator Tamara Beam, who has moved up from the director of care position.

Ms. Beam noted that the Manor continues to access locums to fill the staff schedule, with 32 shifts of PSWs, one of RPNs and two of registered nurses.

"In the first quarter we had one RN who was very ill," explained Ms. Beam. That individual has now retired from the Manor and her replacement is currently being sourced. "We are in the hiring process for an RPN."

There are no outstanding grievances

The Ministry of Health and Long Term Care conducted an inspection and found no issues. "She was very happy," said Ms. Beam of the inspector. "Public Health also came in.'

### Fundraising going well

The Manor fundraising program currently tops out at \$78,385.34, according to coordinator Wendy Gauthier. "I am so appreciative of the community for their support," she said.

There are changes coming to how people will be able to chip in to the Manor fundraising efforts.

"I am currently looking for a better way to donate," said Ms. Gauthier, who noted that with the rise in etransfers and other electronic

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# ...Critics concerned by optional nature of Indigenous content in classrooms

Nations' history embedded in all curriculum. It's not about having a separate curriculum, it's about making sure that it's a living document. Whether it's English, math or history, it should be embedded," he said.

The new curriculum's fate was first called into question after moves by the provincial government in June of 2018.

Shortly after taking office last summer, the Ford government cancelled consultation meetings regarding curriculum revisions as recommended in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC).

Grand Council Chief Hare and numerous others expressed their frustration over the decision, viewing it as a regression in CanaIndigenous peoples. "In cancelling these essential meetings, it's taking a step backwards and can keep us in a place

with

where lack of education and ignorance can continue to prevail—education is crucial to counter ignorance, so investing in education is critical in ensuring that this doesn't happen," said Grand Council Chief Hare in a press release from last summer.

Mr. Blaseg said any educational reforms that involve Indigenous teachings must be implemented in partnership, or else they will not be successful.

"There will always be nuances that we will look to Anishinaabe people to get their interpretation. It's their history, their culture,

their language which we're trying to educate our kids about, so why wouldn't we?" said Mr. Blaseg.

He added that RDSB has its own action plan regarding how best to implement the recommendations from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, a document he said he hoped to release publicly soon.

An announcement states that the new curriculum is "the result of collaboration with Indigenous teachers, elders, knowledge keepers, Métis senators, First Nations, Métis and Inuit community representatives, residential school survivors, Indigenous partners and other education stakeholders."

However, critics have questioned the amount of consultation that actually took place. There are reportedly consultations scheduled for this coming June regarding the updates, a date that falls after they have been announced.

'We look forward to continuing strong partnerships with Indigenous leaders and the community, and this represents an important step in our ongoing collaboration," said Minister. Thompson.

Grand Council Chief Hare said post-announcement consultations are nothing new in his experiences.

"We're used to that, asking us after the decision has already been made. If the decision's already made, why are we going to meet?" he said. "It's absurd. It doesn't make sense ... we're not being part of it."

In addition to the new courses, Minister Thompson said the government would look at Indigenous graduation coach pilot programs, similar to the program that exists at Westgate Collegiate and Vocational Institute, the location where she made the announcement.

These programs will offer to Indigenous students in-school coaches who have connections to Indigenous cultures, who offer support through

'Our goal is to modernize classrooms. You might like the idea of that. Maybe?" said Minister Thompson. "The introduction of our new Indigenous curriculum reflects one of the major components of our new vision for education."

A major challenge for Grand Council Chief Hare was the strength that French and English have, especially in comparison to the numerous Indigenous languages that receive far less attention.


"I just spoke at Laurent-

ian University a couple weeks ago. The introduction was given by a French guy and he was using his language proudly and lovingly. When I spoke, I said I feel the same way, but why is our language at the bottom? Why is it not recognized by the country?" he said. Mr. Blaseg said RDSB has

involved elders, speakers of the language and Indigenous teachers alongside members of RDSB's non-Indigenous teaching staff to create a "living document" that best discusses how to make positive progress.

Moving forward, Grand Council Chief Hare implored the government to include Indigenous peoples within its decision making.





The funding cuts that came to Ontario libraries have necessitated a number of staffing changes. One of which is OLS-N's finance assistant who will be moving into a part-time role. The finance assistant's duties include processing rebate requests for interlibrary loans.

Northern Ontario libraries had been impacted much more significantly by the loss of interlibrary loans than their southern counterparts. Although both regions depend on the service to offer a full range of offerings for library patrons, the North's higher proportion of small communities that are spread quite far away from neighbouring towns means sharing library catalogues has been the only way to feasibly offer adequate library services.

"(Interlibrary loans) give us the opportunity to provide more books to the community. Because we're a small library, we can't house and we don't have the budget for a large amount of books. This allows us to borrow from other libraries for the things we might not have, rather than having to

and Archives Canada have provisions to support interlibrary loans. The federal agency does pass along processing costs to the end user, as may have been the case in Ontario following proposed funding cuts, however it only offers loans on extremely rare items that cannot be found anywhere else.

In many small communities, libraries function as hubs where people of all ages and backgrounds can gather and find something that appeals to them, whether it be a social club, an exciting new read or even access to a computer and internet, the latter of which can be rare in certain parts of the province. Most importantly, library services are free, breaking down economic divides that might otherwise obstruct lower-income individuals from participating.

"Libraries are important for communities to provide access to information and space, and to foster a sense of community. I think that's particularly important in smaller Northern communities where those kinds of community spaces may be even more at a premium," said Ms. D'Onofrio-Jones.

"Libraries are hugely innovative, pro-



purchase them ourselves," said Ms. Gallo.

An additional aspect of Northern Ontario libraries is that there are a higher proportion of libraries servicing communities with fewer than 5,000 people, as opposed to southern Ontario.

'The boards who serve those communities are almost always volunteers. We provide training and support to those boards as well as an important component to the services we provide. We will still be providing board training and consultant services," said Ms. D'Onofrio-Jones.

Interlibrary loans are effectively an essential part of any modern library. They reduce costs by cutting the number of copies of any given item a library must purchase, as well as offer patrons a nearly infinite amount of content from which they can choose. Libraries at educational institutions and even the federal Library

viding services like seniors' tech help to youth story time and also other tech programs like coding and those kinds of youth computer preparation programs in their communities. They're definitely community hubs, and definitely provide community services well beyond what we think of as a traditional library-physical or electronic books," she added.

Despite the North's interlibrary loan service being reinstated, libraries in southern Ontario currently remain without such a service after facing similar budget cuts. Their loans were handled internally, rather than through the mail. Ms. Gallo said this may impact the North as well.

"It's too bad our support system has been cut in half. Having the whole system meant a lot to us. We now will have much less support and the support won't be there as quickly as

# Manitoulin Trade Fair 2019

LITTLE CURRENT—The anticipation was palpable this past Friday afternoon as dozens of people gathered in front of the Little Current-Howland Recreation Centre to witness the opening ceremonies for the 2019 Manitoulin Trade Fair in its 15th edition, marking 30 years since the first-ever event of its kind in 1989.

"We are very pleased to have a great representation here today to help us officially open the fair," said Mike Addison, general manager of the LaCloche Manitoulin Business Assistance Corporation (LAMBAC).

About 5,800 people turned out for the fair this weekend. Mr. Addison noted that the number may appear a bit lower than recent years due to selling weekend-long admissions rather than charging for each day.

Standing next to the podium, after having been escorted in by a small delegation from the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Manitoulin, were FedNor director general Aime Dimatteo, Waubetek business services manager Jason Peltier, Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin, Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes, LAMBAC board chair Dennis Shepitka, LAMBAC board member Kelly O'Hare and Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha.

Whitefish River First Nation elder Leona Nahwegahbow began with a prayer and smudge before the special guests had a chance to address the crowd.

"You know the Trade Fair is on when Bonnie Kogos is back on Manitoulin Island," said Mayor MacNevin, referencing the Manhattan-based Sudbury Star columnist and author who pays visits to the Island on special occasions and who appeared rather pleased at the shout-out.

Trade Fair co-ordinator Diane Newlands said there were several new businesses present for the 2019 fair, including the added bonuses of mascots, magicians and a clown to entertain the younger patrons.

Ms. Hughes noted that the weather has been stellar on the opening afternoon for as long as she can remember.

"This fair is a great way to showcase the businesses we have on Manitoulin Island. Please go out and support them," she said.

This newspaper had an especially sweet offering on opening night—Friday marked the 140th anniversary of The Expositor's first edition and staffers were on hand to distribute 200 birthday cupcakes, including editor Alicia McCutcheon and publisher emeritus Rick McCutcheon.

The number of vendors meant tough competition for the best booths in the competition. In the small booth category, Mindemoya's Danielle Legge and her booth for Freshwater Studios came in second place. Top prize went to EagleOwl Party Rentals, also of Mindemoya, which was helmed by Janice Abbott.

Second place in the large booth division went to Manitoulin Radio Communication owners Craig and Kelly Timmermans and their radio stations Country 103 and Glow 100. First prize was awarded to the Township of Assiginack with booth representatives Jackie White and Sylvie Thibault.



# Assiginack Public School opens new child care addition

MANITOWANING—Assiginack families have recently gained access to better-integrated child and family support services through a recently-opened addition to Assiginack Public School that houses an additional classroom, child care space and an EarlyON centre.

"I grew up in the community and the school has always been a pivotal part of the town. People are always worried if we have enough students to keep the school, but now we're helping children from babies to Grade 8. It truly makes it a community hub," says School Board (RDSB), who was present for the open house.

This includes the full gamut of services that Manitoulin Family Resources provides, including the food bank and its crisis services.

Past a small kitchenette lies the next major room, the child care room run by the Gore Bay Child Care Centre. This room is licenced for a capacity of 15 children and it opened on April 29. Assiginack Child Care and Gore Bay Child Care manager Andrea Lewis oversees the operation of the facility. Gore Bay Child Care has been involved in Assiginack Public School since 2014.

Ms. Lewis says the new facility contains a standard range of up-to-date services that would be found at any contemporary child care service provider.

Finally, at the end of the new addition lies a brand new classroom. It features unique seating and a bright design that enhances the learning environment. At the time of the open house, the school had been hosting a book fair as a way to invite the children in and walk around the new class that they may find themselves using in the future.



The EarlyON centre within the new addition to the Assiginack Public School building features open and inclusive play spaces for families to gain new skills and techniques. It also hosts structured programming and opportunities for parents to interact with early childhood education staff.

The new facility hosted an open house last Thursday to show families and children the services which they may soon find themselves using. The addition is located in the south corner of the school building and is complete with a separate enclosed play area for the coming warmer weather.

Inside the addition's south entrance, a first room houses the EarlyON centre that is designed with both children and families in mind. EarlyON is a drop-in program that allows families to participate in structured programs, play with their children and gather advice from early childhood experts on staff. It offers information and teaches parents how best to support their children in a play-based environment.

Past the classroom, the hallway takes a couple of turns and joins the halls of the main school in a barrier-free layout.

Ms. Longarini says the decision to bolster the child care and family support services at Assiginack Public School was entirely evidence-based. As part of the planning process with the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB), decision-makers consult demographic studies to determine the best steps forward. Assiginack was deemed to be among the fastest-growing population centres within the DSB's service area, leading it to become the natural choice for the centre.

Rainbow District School Board Manitoulin trustee Margaret Stringer also attended the open house. She says the new addition will ensure the school is well-populated and within its capacity limits into the future.

"This will really let parents have an opportunity to feel like they're part of the school," she says, referring to the family-oriented programs on offer.

"It really builds that sense of community," adds Ms. Pennie.

Manitoulin Family Resources, which also oversees EarlyON programs in Little Current and at Central Manitoulin Public School in Mindemoya. Charles C. McLean Public School in Gore Bay does not have a facility on site but receives EarlyON services twice per week through its outreach program.

Having the EarlyON space at Assiginack Public School also serves as an additional resource for the school staff to use when trying to assist parents and families within their school.

"For parents needing additional services, the principal could send the parent to the EarlyON centre and get resources to help them out," says Kathy Longarini, community outreach co-ordinator at the Rainbow District

top of his head. You can use a .22 and this kills him quickly. We eat all that we shoot, so we harvest the front legs and his tail and freeze them. We have also sold alligators to Troy of the Swamp People."

A trip to the East Coast, in their fifth-wheel camper, had them tapping their toes to good old-fashioned Newfoundland music while being screeched-in. "Bob and Anna Lewis came too. I went cod fishing just off Woody Island and brought in my limit. We had such a good time."

Sadly, Al lost his hunting partner suddenly on May 2, 2017. Diane had been baking some bread at home when she began to feel dizzy. Al took her to the medical clinic where her dizziness got worse. Dr. Bedard saw that she was having a stroke, and immediately accompanied her to Sudbury in the ambulance. The next day, there seemed to be some recovery, but sadly she passed away later that day. "I lost my best friend; the mother of our children, my hunting and fishing partner," He adds softly, "It was a very difficult time."

"What was an important event in my life? Meeting and marrying Diane and having our children. What am I most proud of? I am most proud of my family. Recipe for happiness? Iron out problems right away before the sun rises the next day and don't give up easily on your relationship. You can work it out."

"My favourite time of the year? It is the crisp weather of fall when hunting and fishing are enjoyed and most of our trips took place. Favourite television shows? Adventure intrigues me as well as any outdoor shows and documentaries."

"My strengths? Hard to say, perhaps, hunting and fishing. I will always recall

pulling in that 127 lb halibut, and the five by fivepoint elk as well as that 11 foot alligator. What's still on my bucket list? Seeing Kodiak Island in Alaska as well as Dutch Harbour where they film the 'Deadliest Catch.' In the town of Homer, Alaska, there is a brass plaque with all the names of fishermen who died at sea. One in seven people owns a plane there, so there is more risk in just living there too. Planes land on roads and taxi to the wide areas of the road when necessary."

"What family event did I enjoy most? Camping with my family at the mouth of the French River or at the beach in a hidden area below Calendar. On August first weekend each year, we would head for the Benjamins area by boat and go camping with the kids. Associations that I was involved with? Fish and Game Club in Moosonee and Calendar, as well as the Fish and Game Club here, but I am not active there now."

"Manitoulin is definitely a special place, clean water and fresh air abound and there are still not too many of us living here. Wyoming is similar. You can drive for six hours and never see another truck. There are more cattle than people there. Here on Manitoulin, it would be even nicer if we could get rid of the windmills. Nevertheless, it is always a good feeling to come over the hill and see the Island in the distance on the way from Espanola. I have been to many places and this place has always felt like home to us. All our family has gravitated back here. I have found a buddy to share some adventures with and I have made other new friends, so I am not likely to ever leave."




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
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# **Record crowds pack long weekend Perivale Gallery opening**

200 people coming in the door," said Perivale Gallery owner Shannon McMullan. "We are pretty close if not at a record for sales this opening as well, I can't say positively because I haven't had time to tally up all the numbers."

Mr. Wheale is hands down the gallery's artist emeritus, but he is quick to point out there are a large number of outstanding artists whose work are featured in the gallery and many of those artists were present this year for the opening of the season.

"This is the first year we

did that," said Ms. McMullan. "I made up name tags for all of the artists who indicated they would be coming."

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# WHS students building largest canoe ever made on Manitoulin

Industrious students from Wikwemikong High School (WHS) are well underway on the construction of the "North" largest (also known as voyageur) canoe ever built on Manitoulin Island and the first-ever canoe build of its kind at the school, a project that has taken well over 30 hours of student work to date.

"We've really tried to ensure that this is all hands-on and done by the students," said outdoor education teacher Nimkii Lavell. "You can see a lot of the positivity going into this; people are always stopping by and rubbing their hands on the hull."

This project has involved the assistance of By Path or Paddle's Mark Gibeault and the insight of paddler and canoe builder Rob Mellan. Mr. Mellan is the retired wilderness survival instructor for the **Ontario Provincial Police** and is an avid paddle racer.

By Path or Paddle has helped to provide the tools, expertise and materials needed to build the paddle, but WHS principal Maureen Peltier said the school has since purchased all the tools to build a North canoe on its own for next year.

The canoe has been coming together in a remarkably short span of time. The build started on March 26; by May 6 the hull was sanded smooth and nearly complete.

"These are the same types and shapes of the canoes that would have been paddling past these waters on the traditional Voyageur route from the French River to Killarney and the North Shore," Mr. Lavell said.

"This is a very concrete example of the outdoor expertise of Anishinaabe people and the cultural resilience of the Anishinabek, in that these boats are essentially unchanged in form since the time of first contact.'

Student Mandaago Osawamick said he could feel the cultural significance of the build from an receive a full morning of early stage.

"It gives a sense of who two areas. This enables our people are and what we them to better plan used to do. I hope they continue to do this in the future, it's a good project," said Mandaago. Evanson Peltier is another student who has helped to construct the canoe. He agreed that he often feels culturally disconnected but that this project is a powerful antidote to those sentiments. "It's kind of stressrelieving. It has to do with our people from back then when they used to build canoes," he said. "It feels therapeutic to me. Mandaago added that there was a special sense of satisfaction that came from seeing the hours of hard work amount to a finished product. The canoe itself is made of roughly 170 strips of white cedar, a quarter of an inch thick, that are each between 12 and 18 feet in
