## Mystery human skull found at Mindemoya 800-900 years old, forensic report says

MINDEMOYA—Ever since a moss-encrusted human skull rolled down a hill and through forest debris lining a Mindemoya path to land wedged against a tree in front of shocked Mindemoya nature photographer Jamie Pyette, members of the community have been wondering about the history of the human remains.

This week the skull revealed a few of its secrets, although many more will likely remain hidden for eternity.

"We finally received a report back from the forensic facility in the US where the samples had been sent for analysis," noted Island Coroner Dr. Shelagh McRea of Gore Bay when contacted by The Expositor. "It was centuries old, centuries," she noted.

In fact, the person whose remains were discovered last May is thought to have walked the earth some 800 to 900 years ago. "It is similar to the remains found in Providence Bay a few years ago," she said. That age dates the skull to long before first contact between First Nations and Europeans took place. The skull most likely belonged to an adult male and to add to the mystery, it is believed the skull's original resting place was not where it was eventually discov-

ered. The plant life on the skull and the fact of its sheer survival through nearly the near-millennium since the death of its owner, mitigate against the remains having been exposed to the elements for a significant period of time.

"In this climate, over that length of time, it would have deteriorated a long time ago," surmised the coroner.

Now that the remains have been

MANITOWANING—The Burns Wharf Theatre Players (BWTP) will open the curtain on their newest Gilbert and Sullivan production, The Sorcerer, starting tonight (Wednesday, May 31). The operetta will continue until June 16 at the Debajehmujig Creation Centre in Manitowaning.

"The company has been performing Gilbert and Sullivan musicals for a long time now, and this naturally seemed like a good fit," said Stage Director Peter Baumgarten. "We hadn't done it (The Sorcerer) yet and I really liked the premise. We looked at it a few years back, but we decided that this was the year."

With rehearsals starting the first week of January, the cast and crew have been incredibly hard at work, rehearsing weekly and, last month, ramping it up to nightly.

"We aren't able to be in our true home (The Burns Wharf Theatre) so we rely on Debaj being able to house us and, with Canada 150, this was the only time frame," shared Mr. Baumgarten. "Community theatre goes beyond what people see on the stage. In addition to the hours of time rehearsing there are the sets, costumes and all of the other elements that the cast and their spouses put into bringing a production together."

The Sorcerer was Gilbert and Sullivan's first twoact operetta. Produced in 1877, it laid the foundation of comic satire that would continue in productions such as HMS Pinafore, The Mikado, Pirates of Penzance and many others.

"The villagers of Assiginack are preparing to celebrate the betrothal of Alexis Pointdextre (played by BWTP veteran Patrick Therrien) and the blue-blooded Aline Sangazure (Rachel Gulyas)," explains the plot description in the playbill. "Love is in the air and a celebratory mood surrounds the village, with the exception of Constance Partlet (Sandi Kuntsi), a young lady of lower class who pines for the much older town vicar, Dr. Daly (Alex Baran). Despite Mrs. Partlet's best attempts at matchmaking, the middleaged Dr. Daly seems unable to conceive that a young girl like Constance would be interested in him."

"It soon becomes clear that Alexis' widower father Sir Marmaduke (Ray Scott) and Aline's widowed mother Lady Sangazure (Debbie Robinson) are also concealing long-held feelings for one another," the playbill continues. ## Aundeck Omni Kaning chief charged following OPP investigation into allegations

AUNDECK OMNI KANING—The chief of Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) has been charged with breach of trust following an OPP investigation in response to an October 2016 formal request made by the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police.

As a result of the request, the Sudbury/Manitoulin OPP Crime Unit under the direction of Detective Staff Sergeant Matt Watson of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) conducted an investigation.

As a result of that investigation, Patsy Corbiere, age 60, of Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation, has been arrested and charged with criminal breach of trust, contrary to section 122 of the Criminal Code of Canada (CC); criminal harassment, contrary to section 264(2)(d) CC; and Intimidation of justice system participant, contrary to section 423.1(1)(b) CC.

Chief Corbiere was released from custody and is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on July 25.

Lawyers for Chief Corbiere issued a statement on her behalf. "Chief Patsy Corbiere denies the allegations and maintains her innocence. The matter is currently before the court and Chief Corbiere looks forward to vigorously defending herself."

None of the charges have been proven in court.

The timing of the UCCM request for an OPP investigation coincides with a protest held by AOK First Nation community members last fall in which a number of allegations against the chief were made. That protest was reported in The Expositor at the time. None of the allegations made have been proven in court.

# Special meeting of Tehkummah council ends precipitously

TEHKUMMAH—A small group of local taxpayers voiced their dismay when a special council meeting called by Reeve Eric Russell abruptly ended on a motion by Councillor Paul Bowerman. As most members of the council quickly vacated the building, Councillor Laurie Leeson remained behind for a discussion with a couple of audience members that quickly escalated in volume on all sides.

"No, I don't think so at this time," said Reeve Russell when asked if he had a comment on the meeting.

In making his motion to adjourn Councillor Bowerman rose from his seat to read from a written statement. He indicated that he was upset at having been called and asked if he had voted twice on a poll to select candidates for a position with the municipality. "I am sick and tired of this stuff," he declared. "Something has to be done about the goings on in Tehkummah Township." His motion to adjourn was seconded by Councillor Ron Heirons. The meeting had begun, as is the usual custom at Tehkummah council, with a prayer delivered by the reeve, but had not proceeded to motions to open the meeting or approve the agenda when Councillor Bowerman rose and was recognized with his motion. There was no vote on the motion, as the bulk of the councillors and the reeve vacated their seats and quorum was dissolved. The town clerk, Karen Gerrard, confirmed that the town's procedural policy "follows legislation of Ontario.' Ms. Gerrard noted that, "According to the AMCTO (Association of Municipal Managers, Clerks and Treasurers of Ontario) course I took. legislative parliamentary procedures state that a motion to adjourn does not need a second, as per Mason's manual. It was most surprising to me to learn that, and I have not forgotten it.' Councillor Bowerman was challenged by those in attendance in the audience as to why he had adjourned the meeting, to which a visibly distressed Councillor Bowerman noted he was too upset to discuss the matter at that moment. He left the council chambers with cries of "this is not fair to us" ringing in his ears. The swift conclusion to the meeting left some in the room questioning the procedure and the ensuing discussion between Councillor Leeson and the audience became quite heated.

first began his work it was not fear that permeated the field—it was sheer terror.

The field was both complex and challenging, and it was all too clear that those challenges were going to grow dramatically as time went on. "I realized quite early that I would have to get on top of it," he said. "I told them I would only do it if I got to meet the natient "

## <u>editorial</u> A debt of gratitude is owed to Cup and Saucer owners

The vital role the Cup and Saucer trail plays in Manitoulin's tourism industry was clearly reflected in the shock and dismay expressed by many when the trail was temporarily closed last week. Comments in the Twittersphere and on Facebook flamed furiously as commentators weighed in with self proclaimed authority on the causes for the closure. As is all too usual the case with a social media furor, most of those pitches did not cross the plate and some (although assuredly not all) were most definitely foul.

Manitoulin Island owes a huge debt of gratitude to the private property owners who have opened their property up for the public's enjoyment-particularly Casson Eadie and his late father Don Eadie, who despite years of not unreasonable concerns over liability and public safety, provided the entrance and parking lot at the head of the trail. But gratitude is no less due to Randy Noble and Meredith Chandler, upon whose property the "saucer" in Cup and Saucer lies, along with the very popular lookout. These private land owners have gone above and beyond in their commitment to public service and simply cannot be thanked enough for their generosity.

Thankfully, a significant number of those weighing in on the issue online did point out the generosity of the private property owners.

There is a lamentable tendency for people to weigh in on subjects online with little or no direct knowledge of the subject, depending largely on what they believe should be the case and often seeking villains where a close examination of the facts prove that none are to be found.

In the newspaper industry, we spend a tremendous amount of time and resources verifying "facts" that we have been told, chasing rumours and determining the truth behind a story. This takes a great deal more effort than a click and a prayer, and, more often than not we

discover the undisputed "fact" with which we have been supplied has no actual basis in reality. We soldier on.

A little history on the current case. The entrance to the Cup and Saucer has long been problematic, running as it does in close proximity to an operating aggregate pit. The entrance has been moved at least once in the recent past, and both the Northeast Town and the property owners have recognized that it was only a matter of time before the current entrance would need to be moved. Mr. Eadie has, in the past, offered his own equipment and materials to relocate the entrance to another property, one that would not likely need to be moved again. At that time the current solution was not possible.

Entitlement tends to be a term lately reserved for those in public service who believe they deserve the perks that accrue to their position. For some few members of the public, thankfully not all, that term can also be applied when it comes to public use of their property.

When private property owners provide access to trails, whether they be for hiking or snowmobile trails, they are doing a public service that they are not obligated to provide. In the case of the aggregate owners, they pay taxes, they provide the province with royalties in return for their extraction of the material that is then used to build the roads upon which we travel and the very buildings that shelter us from the elements. They should not be vilified or challenged when, in the course of their own private needs, circumstances change and they can no longer provide their gifts to us. Instead, we should all be standing eagerly in line to shake their hands with a true and heartfelt thank you for their years of service to the community. The gravel pit operators are local businesspeople, who deserve no less, and a lot more, from each of us.

I also happened to disinter a feature story I edited when I was at the Financial Post magazine, let's go with 20 years ago.

We dispatched a non-Native writer named Pierre Pelletier to pass as an urban Native and travel around Western Canada for a few weeks. He straightened his curly hair, darkened his skin a bit, bought an old jean jacket and hit the streets. He was quite courageous to step that far out of his comfort zone and he did a terrific job on the story and I'm still proud of it

## **Cliff and Nelda Orford**

"I am the last of the Orford boys of my generation walking on Manitoulin," Cliff shares, "most of my siblings and close extended family have passed on." Cliff and Nelda welcomed the writer to their fine home on Union Road. It was a bright sunny day and the living room featured numerous plants, one with bright red leaves, glowing in the sunlight. "I built this house for our family 35 years ago," Cliff offers by way of introduction.


This Manitouliner has spent decades, cutting timber, building homes and learning skills that a man of the land needs to prosper. Nelda has always been by his side, starting her working life as a young teacher at country schools in Mills and Honora, later as a weather station employee, driving the school bus with her husband, and of course, raising their family of four.

Cliff's maternal grandparents George and Sarah Badgerow farmed near Gore Bay, where the hydro transfer station is today. They struggled with scant topsoil and lots of rocks, familiar to farmers on the Island. Their daughter Viola Eliza Rebecca married Ed Orford and became Cliff's parents. "I was born on September 22, 1927in Saskatchewan, where my parents had moved to in 1921. A lot of dust and grasshoppers hampered their dreams of becoming productive wheat farmers. The family moved back to the Island in 1928 bringing four children with them.

Eventually, there would be seven children: Lloyd, Delbert, Austin, Cliff, Les, Edna and Reona. In the years before the snow

plow cleaned the roads, mail was carried by horse and sleigh from Gore Bay to Massey, across the ice. "One day we found out that my grandmother was very sick. Dad stayed home to look after the farm and mother took four of us on the mail sleigh across the ice to Gordon Township on March 28, 1928. Sandy McDermid drove that Purvis team. I was only sixmonths-old. I was told that the ice remained strong and we made it safely both ways."

Ed and Viola's 100-acre farm, with the old log house and big barn, was located near the Mills cemetery on Union Road. Brother Delbert later inherited the farm because eldest son Lloyd had been killed in the war, one month after D-Day. He and his troops had been cornered in a small village in France. Air support was called in but, sadly, the report indicated that the Allied air force mistook them for the enemy and 88 of them were killed by friendly fire. It was a sad day in July of 1944. Delbert had also been in Germany three days after the war ended. He had come close to downing a plane prior to the end of the war by shooting off the

ing baseball at recess. It would constantly get in their way. Perhaps it was instinctive when the unfortunate squirrel picked a bad time to come out of the wood pile. Cliff was up at bat and he swung at the rodent instead. "All the kids had been challenging each other to get the squirrel, but I got him. My victory was short-lived, though, because I also got the strap." After Grade 9, in 1943, school was over for 16-year-old Cliff.

"I associate those war years with ration books. You were restricted to limits in the amount of sugar, butter and other items so the soldiers would have enough to eat." Nevertheless, there was always lots of stuff to spend the money on such as his first motorcycle when he was 18, in 1945. "I loved the freedom of riding that bike." In the summer, Cliff drove a steam-driven carriage to pile cut wood that had been collected in booms and pulled by tugs from local bays and islands, like Wardrobe Island. Cliff worked here for about 12 summers. Nelda was born on March 17, 1933 to William (Bill) and Ethel Victoria Shaule (nee Clark). Her dad was renting a farm in Cloudsley, seven miles northeast of Bruce Mines. The family ran the local post office. Bill and Ethel soon bought their own farm in the same area. "We did mixed farming, growing small crops and raising chickens," Nelda muses. "I remember being surprised that it took the hen three weeks of sitting on the eggs to hatch the small chicks." "I had three brothers and two sisters. Dale, who worked in the steel mills in Sault Ste. Marie; Darrell, who became a United Church minister in Lucan, just outside of London; Dwight, who died as a baby of nine months of pneumonia; Gail, who passed

the strap. Families often doled out the physical discipline so I could use alternate forms. I found I didn't have many problems with the kids even though some of them were close to me in age."

Cliff and Nelda met in 1951 when Nelda was teaching at Mills school. Cliff was one of the gang that included Nelda from time to time. Nelda also taught Cliff's sister, Reona, in Grade 6 so she ran into Cliff regularly and in due course they found they enjoyed each other's company. "We attended lots of functions but didn't go to dances because Cliff didn't like to dance, but we did spend a lot of our time together."

Cliff was into his six-year stint at KVP (Kalamazoo Vegetable Paper) in Espanola, the business now owned by Domtar. "One day Cliff came from 'KVP land' for a visit and saw me knitting a pair of socks. He was intrigued, 'why don't you make me a pair of work socks?' so I did." This little personal request seemed very fitting for a young man who wanted a more permanent relationship.

Nelda started to teach at Honora, moving into the main house at Silver Birches Resort. "I had left Mills because they got a teacher with a certificate," she explained, "I didn't have one of those." Nelda taught 13 kids, 12 boys and one girl. "One of the students, Doug Hore, would become a wellknown musician on Manitoulin and has been a barber in Little Current, in the same location, for 55 years. Nelda continued to see Cliff and they soon set a date.

They were married on August 22, 1952 by Reverend Kaill in Gore Bay. The small wedding was followed by a honeymoon in Niagara Falls to where they travelled in Cliff's beloved 1950 Pontiac.

In 1960, Cliff was working for Gerald Runnalls. "We worked all over the island, including Carter Bay, Michael's Bay and Providence Bay where there was another sawmill. The booms brought the logs in and they were trucked to the saw mill.

The couple had four children, Laurie, Cheryl, Gordon and Donna. "Laurie loved horses so we bought her a steed from Sandfield for \$20 down. This deposit would hold the horse for three days until we made sure that Laurie was happy with the purchase," Cliff adds. "Sunny the horse, would shake your hand but you had to warn people first so they wouldn't be knocked down by his enthusiastic greeting."

Laurie rode him everywhere without a saddle, taking great care when they approached the edge of the lake. Sunny would slowly slide down and bury himself in the water, taking her with him. She had to jump off quickly, or give him a pop bottle. Sunny could take the top off the bottle with his teeth and then he would hold the can up and drain it. "If vou were unfortunate enough not to have the foresight to bring the pop, you had to really holler at him to get him back out of the water." The family also had a dog that slept on the bed with Gord and a cat named Sam." "We travelled a bit too, taking three of the kids out west to Alaska and Dawson City where we looked for gold in 'claim 35.' We saw Vancouver. On another trip, we went back to Saskatchewan to show the kids where I was born." Cliff adds. "When I was younger, Austin and I and two friends had returned to that province, near the Blackfoot Reserve, at harvest time. The work was hard and long, but we had fun too. We saw billygoats and elk for the first time.' After the pulpwood years, Cliff started working with Charlie Middaugh, building cottages. houses and a lot of chimneys for about eight dollars a day. "Blocks

Cliff started school at age six in Mills Township, along with 37 other kids scattered among nine grades. "It was a daily four-mile hike to and from school, with my tin lunch can swinging by my side. I can honestly say that during all my time there, I was only driven in a vehicle four times. There were three of us in Grade 1 and we gained one more student a year later. "I remember one poor fellow who was teased a lot because he couldn't spell at all. If the teacher asked him to write words down, they would all be wrong." One wonders if he might have had dyslexia before instructional staff became aware of this disability, about 40 years later.

Cliff recalls the squirrel that had been annoying the kids playexpired. However, he eventually recovered and lived a good long life."

"I never learned how to milk a cow but I did do a lot of work on the farm, as we all did. I was often asked to stay in the house with my younger siblings while mum and dad milked the cows and fed the calves." Nelda liked school, especially spelling. She stayed to finish Grade 12 and then went right into teaching. "Circumstances made me a teacher," she attests. "They needed teachers when I finished school and they didn't ask for a certificate, so I became a teacher."

"My teaching style was a bit different from another teacher who wanted to have absolute power over the kids. I felt there should be some give and take on both sides," she shares. "I tried to teach them by getting their attention in a positive way, so they would want to learn. Discipline can be applied in different ways too; it doesn't always have to be

# **Canadian Human Rights Tribunal rules Jordan's Principle applies to all First Nations children**

OTTAWA—On Friday, May 26, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) has again ruled that Canada has yet to comply with previous orders to implement Jordan's Principle, which is a child-first principle that every First Nation child should have access to the same government services as all Canadian children. The Tribunal has clarified that if a province provides a health or social service, the

OTTAWA—On Friday, May 26, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) has again ruled that Canada has yet to comply with previous orders to implement Jordan's Principle, which is a

In addition, the CHRT has ruled that Jordan's Principle applies to all children on and off-reserve; it is not limited to children with disabilities; and it is not limited to health services, but also includes dental and mental health, physiotherapy, special education, speech therapy, and so on.

To date, despite the Tribunal's rulings, the Government of Canada has been applying Jordan's Principle only to children with disabilities living on reserve. "Canada has also failed to live up to its own motion in the House of Commons from 2016 to immediately inject an additional \$155 million into the child welfare system," a press release from the Assembly of First Nations states. To date, it is estimated that only an additional \$67 million has been allocated nationally.

"Jordan's Principle was passed unanimously by the House of Commons back in 2007 to ensure that First Nation children were not to be denied or delayed health and social services," said Deputy Grand Chief Denise Stonefish, chair of the Chiefs Committee on Social Services. "Last November, I was in attendance when the House of Commons again unanimously passed an NDP motion to immediately provide the additional \$155 million. This has yet to happen."

"In this day and age of Reconciliation, Canada must comply with all CHRT rulings. I want to remind Canada that the Truth and Reconciliation Commis-

sion's Calls to Action are strongly focused on equality in child health and welfare,' added Regional Chief Isadore Day. "Our children must no longer be left behind, must no longer suffer needlessly due to bureaucratic denial and delays. Now is the time to allow our children and their families the basic human right to health and welfare enjoyed by all Canadians.'

## Mindemoya hospital has its first divert patient situation

by Alicia McCutcheon MINDEMOYA—On Friday, May 19, the Manitoulin Health Centre's (MHC) Mindemoya site had its first ever 'divert' situation, meaning that the hospital had so many critical patients at one time that all other patients coming into the Mindemoya Hospital had to be diverted to the Little Current site.

"Occasionally we run into these situations because of the acuity of the patients involved," said Derek Graham, MHC CEO. "In review and in retrospect, it was the right thing

to do."

Mr. Graham explained that when there are several patients requiring one-onone care it doesn't take long before the medical team is "overwhelmed."

"It was a proactive decision," he added.

The Manitoulin-Sudbury

District Services Board (DSB) told its board at the May 25 meeting that a note of thanks had been passed on to them regarding the hard work and partnership between the MHC and the DSB paramedics during that situation.

Mr. Graham said this

recent divert points out the need for a two-site facility on Manitoulin. Having two hospitals is also helpful when the beds are full at one site, but a bed is free at the other hospital.

proceeds of crime (under \$5,000) and possession of cocaine.

Billie-Jean Mills, a 22-year-old female from Sudbury, has been charged with possession for the purposes of trafficking, trafficking in a controlled substance, conspiracy to traffic a controlled substance and fail to comply with a probation order (three counts).

The new drug-related charges follow police activities many passersby witnessed two weeks ago when the OPP and Wikwemikong Tribal Police combed the ditches of Highway 6 between Sheguiandah and Little Current, where the accused were eventually apprehended.

Mr. Dixon-Johnson, Mr. Shaw and Ms. Mills have been remanded into custody. All four are scheduled to reappear in court in the coming days.

### Five charged in Wiikwemkoong midnight drug raid

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police in partnership with OPP Tactics and Rescue Unit (TRU), the Greater Sudbury Police Service Tactics Unit, the Northeast Region Emergency Response Team (ERT), Provincial Operations Intelligence Bureau (POIB), Manitoulin OPP Detachment, UCCM Anishnaabe Police and the OPP K9 Unit have charged five people with drug related offences.

On Tuesday, May 23, shortly before midnight, a Controlled Drug and Substances Act warrant was executed on two residences in the community of Wiikwemkoong. Four

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men and two women were arrested at the scene.

A search of the residence located a quantity of cocaine and Canadian currency. The street value of the items seized is valued at \$15,000.

## The Buddhist monk formerly known as Noah Greenspoon visits MSS

**by Michael Erskine** M'CHIGEENG—So how does a young boy from Ice Lake grow up to travel to distant Asian countries steeped in eastern mysticism and eventually come to embrace Buddhism? That was a question that easily came to mind as Yuttadhammo Bhikkhu, the man formerly known as Noah Greenspoon, came to deliver a talk to the students of Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) on the topic of 'mindfulness' as a path to personal wellbeing, but it would have to wait until later.

The monk was delivering the keynote address at the Tuesday, May 16 Wellness Day celebrations at the high school. It was to be a day filled with a wide range of teachings that included 'Eagle Feather Teachings,' 'Intro to Meditation,' 'Mindfulness Apps,' 'Physical Mindfulness,' 'Prayer and Mindful-ness,' 'Therapeutic Writing,' 'Traditional Indigeness, nous Teachings,' 'Walking in Balance,' 'Mindful Gar-

dening,' 'Indigenous Games' and 'Indigenous Crafts.' Students could either sign up online for the sessions that appealed to them or write their names on a large set of paper sheets set up in the foyer of the school.

Yuttadhammo's mission (Bhikkhu is an honorific meaning a Theravada Buddhist monk) in addressing the students at MSS was "not to convert you," as he explained to them at the beginning of his talk, but to offer up some simple tools of meditation with a focus on mindfulness that might help them deal with the challenges of youth and life.

This talk would be a bit of a challenge, admitted Yuttadhammo. "I have been teaching for some time, but this is the first time to non-Buddhist kids," he said. "I do a lot of online teaching, a lot of videos and have met a diverse number of people." He also works on peace studies with McMaster University. Getting to know Yuttadhammo, his personal journey to Bud-



...continued from page 7 dhism and lessons in the various aspects of his faith are very accessible. He has posted some 1,500-odd videos on YouTube. A search on the site for either Noah Greenspoon or Yuttadhammo Bhikkhu will bring up a host of examples. His video 'Ask a Monk: How I Became a Buddhist Monk' had 241,689 views as of Monday evening.

Despite his usual student cadre, Yuttadhammo is hardly a stranger to the halls of MSS, having been a student there in the mid-1990s, graduating in 1997. "It has been a 20-year journev back to this school," he said. The techniques he was sharing were a gift that he hoped "you can use in your life when things get difficult." Yuttadhammo referenced memes in his talk, connecting that as a mutual reference point. He noted that life is often difficult and fraught with challenges that can beset our sense of inner peace. The mind, he noted, is a very elastic and malleable organ and it is very possible to change. He noted that we are largely defined by the people we hang out with. "You pick up their habits," he noted. Habits are simply that and so much of what besets us in life are simply habits. "There is nothing magical about it," he said. "Worrying about things is a habit, anxiety is just a habit." Yuttadhammo is familiar with these habits and their

In an audience noted for often producing a substantial undertone of whispered conversation, the audience was almost eerily silent as they sat, eyes closed and listening respectfully, lending a spiritual air to the cafeteria as the cadence of Yuttadhammo's voice overlay the silence. This was a demonstration of the first of two types of meditation. "A simple example of calming." Yuttadhammo explained that the students had just experienced the basic tenets of mindfulness meditation. The phrases he had the students repeating in their minds, Yuttadhammo noted, are a mantra. A mantra is essentially a

repeated phrase that helps

focus the mind. There are so many things that assail our lives, he noted, and most of them are things that we cannot change, such as physical pain. All one can control is 'how we react."

"With mindfulness, you are not judging anything," he said.

Dealing with pain can be highly effective through meditation, counterintuitively by focussing on the pain. "Pain, pain, pain,' repeats Yuttadhammo. "It is yelling at you. Why does it work? You are reminding yourself, it is just pain. It's pain, but yeah, so what?" Instead of running from it, embracing the pain takes phy, art, construction and music business class.

'They all worked together to make the night a suc-

There were a number of examples, including dealing with stage four cancer and its associated pain. Meditation had helped people through the experience without resorting to pills. "It didn't take away the cancer," he cautioned. "This is just a skill, something you can learn to help you deal with the trials and tribulations of life and get through it."

OPP's delivery of policing services, and will enhance community safety in areas across the province," stated Marie-France Lalonde, Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services (MCSCS). "We all benefit from efficient, effective, and modern policing services."

"I was advised on Friday of the location," said Manitoulin Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb, who noted that he couldn't speculate on the size of the new building. "There will be some space in the building for partners. We don't know who yet, but the building will be community friendly and we will have some office space available in addition to elements like a boardroom."

"It will be a modernized building to ensure the best facility possible to serve Manitoulin and Espanola," he added.

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin noted that he was also pleased that the location of the new detachment would be in Little Current. "The new detachment will mean new jobs and services here in Little Current," said Mayor MacNevin. "It is nice that it will stay here (the current detachment is located in Little Current). I am pleased that the town has invested in the subdivision property—it is good to see that the investment has paid off."

Cary Mignault, a media representative with Infrastructure Ontario (IO), explained that IO has issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for the project (to build all nine detachments). Once the RFQ closes they will select a shortlist of bidders. From there IO will issue a Request for Proposals (RFP). Once the RFPs are developed and submitted, a builder will be identified. Mr. Mignault said that IO expects the project will break ground in late 2018.

Funding for the new detachment will come as part of phase two of the OPP modernization project. The other eight communities to receive new detachments are: Moosonee, Orillia, Fort Frances, Marathon, Hawkesbury, Port Credit, Huron County and West Parry Sound.

...continued from page 1 had trails there for some time, but they are not well marked."

Mayor MacNevin said the 'hitch' in this plan was approval from the Ministry of Transportation (MTO).

"You can't open up a new access point on a provincial highway without an entrance permit from the MTO.' the mayor explained. "Usually you have to do a traffic study prior to getting the permit, but we have been lobbying the MTO to give us temporary approval due to the importance of the trails to both the community and tourism. The MTO has agreed to give us temporary approval, and we will do the traffic study down the line.'

Mayor MacNevin said that work will begin on the new trail access and parking lot as soon as later this week.

"We have received the temporary permit from the MTO and are just waiting on the MTO to approve a culvert, which we expect in the next couple of days," said Mayor MacNevin on Monday. "We hope to have the trail open by the summer."

Mayor MacNevin said that the Northeast Town will be helping to cover initial costs with the new trail access and parking lot, but that the EBC will also be launching a fundraising campaign. "I have also been in initial conversations with neighbouring municipalities and will be hoping for financial support from them as well," he said. "Every community knows the benefits of the Cup and Saucer to Manitoulin."

Saucer parking lot, trail access point and a portion of the trail is owned by Casson Eadie, proprietor of Don Eadie Construction, who closed the trail access on the Friday of the May long weekend.

Mr. Eadie noted to The Expositor that it was this exact scenario, utilizing the EBC property for new trails, that he had suggested to the Northeast Town and Manitoulin Tourism Association over five years ago.

At the time, he explained, his company, Don Eadie Construction, was applying for a new gravel pit licence and the then-Ministry of Natural Resources was uncomfortable granting the licence as it was so close to a walking trail. Mr. Eadie said he approached Bob Barnett of the EBC at the time about creating an alternate route for the Cup and Saucer on EBC trails, and even offering a reduced rate for the construction of a new parking lot but the suggestion was not well received. Mr. Eadie said he was turned away by Mr. Barnett and told that he did not want that many people (the estimated 10,000 hikers that come to the Cup and Saucer each year) on EBC property.

"I never said the trail would be closed forever," Mr. Eadie said of his decision to close the trail before the May long weekend. "Someone will be taking cedar from the trail, but it won't affect the trail."

"It's just amazing how the town is going to spend all this money, but they wouldn't give me a cent for help with the trail," he added. "I never said it was closed forever," he reiterated. "I didn't want to do that.

who do.

"It was certainly an interesting race," noted former Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing CPC candidate Andre Robichaud. "With 14 candidates it went right down to the end."

Mr. Robichaud said that he is confident in the new leader and his prospects going forward. "Andrew is going to do an excellent job," he said. "He speaks with intelligence, his policies are sound and he is a personable guy. Not too many people know him yet, but I think he will grow on people."

"Andrew Scheer represents a new chapter in the Conservative movement in Canada," said Island Conservative Mark Volpini. "At 38-years-old, he is a young, genuine, dynamic and an ambitious leader. He strikes the right balance between values and experience. Mr. Scheer's personality and leadership style will allow him to continue uniting the Conservative Party of Canada, much like interim leader Rona Ambrose did for 18 months."

In his victory speech, the new leader promised to stay the course and to keep the party true to its roots and work for average Canadian families and not Ottawa insiders. Mr. Robichaud, who is the candidate director on the local riding association said that it was too early to say if he planned to carry the party's banner in the next election. "It wouldn't be fair to myself or the party," he said. "We need the best person to ensure that we have a Conservative member in Ottawa. If that person is me, so be it."

Mr. Scheer's webpage thanks his supporters, but as befits the winner of a national party's leadership contest, the policies and biographical information that propelled him to victory were no longer available. ture and world quite alien to his own experiences up until that time. Prisons and their residents are noted for being a challenging environment in which to navigate at the best of times.

Dr. Ford retired in 2015 at the age of 75. He admits with a laugh that he might well have retired sooner if he had been able to find a replacement sooner. "Nobody else wanted to do it," he said. "It was generally not a good environment."

What sustained the passion that kept his shoulder to the grindstone in such a challenging field for so long? "It was interesting," he said. "There were aspects to the work that were quite rewarding."

Dr. Ford's wife Sally was also involved in the early work in setting up the clinic and working with the AIDS patients, but she was later offered another position that fit with her own interests and career goals.

This is not Dr. Ford's first award recognizing his work in the field. In 2012 the Canadian Association for HIV Research (CAHR) presented him with its Red Ribbon Award. That award is "presented by CAHR to an individual who has given outstanding service to the cause of research in a way that has increased our understanding of the treatment and prevention of HIV/AIDS, while enhancing the quality of life of those living with this disease." Or, as the CAHR website notes "in the words of Dr. Ken Rosenthal, who instituted the award in 2001 during his term as president of CAHR, the award recognizes someone who has gone 'above and beyond the call of duty'."

The citation goes on to point out that "no one can accuse Dr. Peter Ford of mincing his words. More than 20 years of working with HIV-positive inmates in Ontario's federal prisons has made him outspoken about the need for Canada's correctional system to attend more to the rate of HIV infection in prisons and the risky behaviour that leads to that infection."

"Large chunks of the system don't want to pay attention to the problem," Dr. Ford said in response to the Red Ribbon Award. "But once you start seeing prisoners, you realize there is a problem with risk behaviour and the volume of people with HIV."

Perhaps most telling about the quality of Dr. Ford's dedication to his work can be found in his expressed surprise at receiving the Red Ribbon. "No one pays much attention to what goes on in prisons and the people who work with them," he said. Despite being well aware of that fact from his life's work, Dr. Ford continued to work with that population long after he retired from his other commitments. tion. He has championed scrapping the carbon tax and taking a tougher stance on crime.



...continued from page 1 identified as being ancient, and not the result of a recent mishap, the role of the police and the coroner's office are over, explained Dr. McRae. "It is now in the hands of the registrar of burials.'

"This discovery was just reported to me and I am currently initiating the

process, which will include notification of the nearest indigenous community to the site where the remains were found," said Nancy Watkins, senior policy advisor and analyst and Registrar of Burial Sites, War Graves, Abandoned Cemeteries and Cemetery Closures with the Ministry of Government and Consumer Services (MGCS).

The previous pre-contact remains that had been discovered in M'Chigeeng a number of years ago were placed in the care of M'Chigeeng First Nation and buried with reverence and care under the direction of Sheguiandah elder Gordon Waindubence in a M'Chigeeng gravesite.

Mr. Pyette was pleased to learn that there was more

the Crimestoppers anonymous tip line. Ms. Peltier noted that there is much stigma in her community about going to the police with information involving crime. The OPP officer was there to explain that people can indeed call the 1-800 line and leave their tips to police anonymously. Wiikwemkoong-based security company Can-Com Security also gave a presentation about their services.

"Then the band membership started talking about what they would like to see happen," Ms. Peltier said. "It was a good discussion.'

Some of the ideas brought forward at the meeting included a need for shelters; a place for men, women and children to go in crisis

Others spoke of their hope to start teaching children the dangers of drugs and alcohol at a young age and teaching it right through the school system as part of the health curriculum.

The need for more mental health and addictions programming was also cited as a need in the community, as was the need for a 24/7 crisis centre. "Right now, if something happens on the weekend, where do they go?" Ms. Peltier asked.

Ms. Peltier said that the lasting effect of residential schools and its role in the cycle of addiction was also discussed at length in the almost five-hour meeting.

"I brought up how we were raised before," the Grandmother said. "In my day, there wasn't any drugs, just alcohol. Now

it's drugs, and prescription drugs. People are selling their pills."

Ms. Peltier said the father of the 39-yearold victim of the vicious attack from earlier this month was also in attendance and spoke to his son's story.

"The topic of a neighbourhood watch was discussed," Ms. Peltier added, noting that the police and property management explained that they would be working closely together in the coming weeks. Property management also told the meeting that it wold be reviewing its own policies.


"I'm really happy with the meeting," the Grandmother said. "I do believe our leaders and the police will do a good job at looking at the issues the community members brought up."

"People have to understand that it won't just happen overnight," she added. 'There's processes that have to be followed and money has to be found to increase those services.

Ms. Peltier said she is pleased to have got the ball rolling once again, helping to spark a discussion in her community, but she says it's time for her to step down.

"Someone else might carry it on," she said. "There's young grandmothers out there that can start doing things for their community."

"I just wish people would do the same things in the other communities," Ms. Peltier added, pointing to Little Current and the swing bridge that sees the many of the drugs carried on to Manitoulin.

date to the list of those being considered for the position of marina attendant. In a previous meeting, Councillor Bowerman indicated that the name of one of the candidates had been mentioned at the council table.

An administration report to council indicates the issue was not being taken lightly.

'In response to requests received from council with regards to releasing the names of candidates that have been shortlisted along with the tally sheet: I cannot overemphasize the importance of the requirements of confidentiality which apply to the township council and its mem-bers and staff," reads the report, "particularly with respect to personal information relating to members of staff, applicants for public appointments and other individuals who may be impacted by actions of the municipality or its council members.

The report went on to cite the requirements 'inherent in the role of the head and all other members of council; the requirements and offence provisions of the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act; principles of municipal and member liability with respect to unlawful acts and offences; and the responsibilities of councillors, including, specifically the head of council, under statutory and common law.'

According to the report, "on Wednesday, May 17, the reeve was provided with a confidential list of candidates to be interviewed that contained the candidate number, candidate name, and the number of votes which resulted in producing five candidates for interview." Under the pro-cedure used, the candidates with three or more votes were shortlisted. There were six members of the interviewing committee, all five members of council and the clerk.

On the afternoon of Wednesday, May 17, the reeve stated that the numbers did not add up with regards to the candidates short listed. The reeve then informed staff that he had contacted Councillors Laird Lee and Leeson and



All seemed quiet and set for a normal evening's work before a special meeting of the Tehkummah Council called by Reeve Eric Russell got underway. The meeting was abruptly ended within minutes when Councillor Paul Bowerman rose to move the meeting adjourned. Reeve and councillors, except Councillor Laurie Leeson, quickly exited the building as the audience of taxpayers erupted into angry questions as to what had just taken place.

"found out how they voted on the candidates." When asked how he figured that out, the reeve apparently informed them that there were too many votes on a few candidates and that the clerk-treasurer must have voted and he believed that is not allowed.

According to the town's hiring policy, however, the clerk-treasurer is in fact part of the interview committee, and as the supervisor of the municipal position for which recruitment is taking place, is involved in the short listing of candidates.

On Friday, May 19, Reeve Russell attended the clerktreasurer office on two separate occasions, once by himself and then again with Councillor Leeson. During the second meeting, the clerk presented Reeve Russell with a copy of the email he had submitted with his choices. According to the report to council, Reeve Russell stated that he had made a mistake in sending his selections. His submission was altered by deleting candidate five and replacing it with candidate six.

The clerk-treasurer then advised the reeve that she would look into what could be done with the amendment "as per the policies in place."

"Although the reeve may have made an honest mistake," notes the report, "the situation is that since there were days since the submission of candidate selection and since there was a phone poll amongst most council members, that there was opportunity for the influencing of a decision of a council member."

The matter is complicated by the municipal hiring bylaw which states: "No elected official, appointed officer or employee of the Township of Tehkummah, shall attempt to directly influence the hiring of any applicant."

The Tuesday night special meeting of council was to determine the question: Should candidate number six be added to the short list of candidates to be interviewed?

On Tuesday, May 23, the clerk-treasurer provided the following recommendation to council: "While this concern is being addressed, interviews of the five shortlisted candidates should be held as scheduled and those interviewed should be ranked with the top selection being asked to start employment as soon as possible. This would enable the marina operations to get underway until such time as a second candidate is selected." But at 3 pm that afternoon, the reeve gave the direction to cancel the interviews scheduled for that evening. The reason stated was that Councillor Lee could not attend. Interviews have not been rescheduled.


In addition to Mr. Baumgarten as stage director, Mr. Scott and Marilyn Wohlberg are the music directors.





... continued from page 5 and bricks went into the chimneys," he adds. "We also tore down some buildings in Gore Bay and got paid \$100 a day for that work. We built this house in 1979 with the help of our kids." Cliff felt strongly about fair play in the construction industry on Manitoulin. He stood up for a few carpenters who worked more slowly but did good work. He didn't think it was fair to let them go, just because they took a little more time.

"Both Nelda and I also drove a 60-passenger school bus for 20 years until we sold the bus in 1989. The first bus cost us \$6,800 and the second one was a pricier \$32,500. I got a certificate for all those years of service. After that, I did carpentry work up until last year when walking became more of a challenge for me. Meanwhile, Nelda had spent many years at the weather station in Gore Bay.'

Cliff's brothers Austin and Les both died of cancer, Austin at middle age and Les when he was older. Edna lives in Kelowna, BC and Reona in Mississauga Beach near Owen Sound. "We have 10 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. Gord's son Mathew. an air-traffic controller, will be going to Toronto for extra training in radar operations. His daughter April teaches in Gore Bay and daughter Ashley lives in Sudbury."

"Donna's son Curtis is a dispatcher at Manitoulin Transport. He looks after the 'ice wagons' that go north over frozen lakes in far Northern Canada every winter. Her other son Kenton worked for INCO, fixing mine breaks. Laurie's son Ryan has a drilling outfit for oil wells and he does welding too. His daughter Leslie does catering and other son Colin owns 16 tractor trailers and works in the fracking business all over the Arctic and in the south. Cheryl has two boys; Kyle, a welder in Hamilton and Kristofer, a carpenter in Toronto.

"The most important event in my life was finding Nelda, getting married and having our four children," Cliff holds. "They all turned out well with no bad habits. Our

"All 36 of our extended family members are happy and healthy. This August we will have been married for 65 years."

"Manitoulin has been good to us," Cliff attests. "This is a friendly place to live when you compare it to big cities. They are more dangerous with all that traffic. People on the Island are great. We had but two dollars to our name when we married and if it hadn't been for Bill Middaugh getting a store credit for us, we would have been very hungry. Charlie Middaugh, my boss, also managed to fire me three times when he was annoyed," Cliff offers, smiling, "but I just kept on working and he was happy with that. He had a good

heart."

"If you are sick here, people really come through and help you out too. That was very true in the early years but it is true today also. There is a lady that lives near here and she gets help from her neighbours, including us. It is so much nicer to know that support is here if you need it. That's what makes this place special. 





# Jean's Walk: An Historical Walking Tour of Mindemoya

## by Jan McQuay

MINDEMOYA—"Where did the early settlers in the Mindemoya area go to obtain necessities such as flour, sugar, clothing and implements?" On Wednesday May 17, with rainclouds hovering in the west, Pat Costigan began an historical tour of King St. east of the main corner, engaging her audience with this question, like the experienced teacher she is.

Costigan, Pat nee Williamson, retired teacher and dedicated volunteer with the Central Manitoulin Historical Society, didn't grow up on Manitoulin, but she has delved into the history of her Mindemoya relatives and the growth of their community. She painted a lively picture of life in the community for the dozen or so people who joined the walking tour despite the uncertain weather.

So...did the early settlers

buy their goods in Sandfield? Manitowaning? Michael's Bay? No, for the most part they went nine miles to Providence Bay, by horse and buggy.

Settlements normally grew around natural har-

bours and along rivers, but in 1899 William McKenzie took a chance and built a general store at the junction of Hwy 542 and 551. A year later he sold it to Francis Wagg, and his son A.J. Wagg

#### Keeping the fun in the sun by Andrea Wong

nince the May long weekend is now behind us, the weather is starting to warm up. Summer activities are starting up at full force and everyone's out soaking up the nice sun after a long winter.

Everyone knows that sunscreen is important. By why exactly? The main purpose of sunscreen is to protect us from ultraviolet radiation from the sun's rays which can cause sunburns, premature skin aging and skin cancers. There are two main of rays known as UVA and UVB.

When selecting a sunscreen, the sun protection read the label to ensure it says "broad spectrum" coverage to include UVA coverage. As a general rule of thumb, as the SPF increases, the amount of protection you get also increases. Anything above an SPF 30 will give you a decent amount of coverage.

The best thing to do is to make putting on sunscreen a habit. Not only is it important to put it on before enjoying a nice day at the beach, there can be strong UV rays during the winter and on cloudy days. Although everyone should be using sunscreen, it is especially important for people on certain medications like antibiotics that can cause more sun sensitivity and in children or the elderly due to thin skin. However, only 25 to 50 percent of people use the proper amount of sunscreen. To properly apply sunscreen, the general rule of thumb is to apply 1 Tbsp to the face and neck area, 2 Tbsp to the front torso and back, 1 Tbsp for each arm, and 2 Tbsp for each leg. Try to apply is 15 to 30 minutes before your activity and reapply at least every two hours. Even with perfect application, sunscreen alone will

tection. It is still important to cover up and find shade whenever possible. Reducing your sun exposure will decrease your risk of skin cancers by 40 percent!

...continued from page 2A ness, Jake's Home Centre.

In the early days, due to a shortage of housing for the employees at the store and creamery, Francis Wagg and his son "A.J." also moved houses to Mindemoya from as far away as Honora Bay. The house next to Wagg's store, and a house further along the street that is now Rainbow Tax and Accounting, are among the buildings that were moved from Honora Bay. That must have been a huge undertaking for the time.

Pat Costigan led her troupe of eager listeners along the street, explaining the background of each building. The Cooper/

Williamson/McCutcheon/ Wilson Corner Store has been a gas station since the 1930s. Wagg's Boarding House is now the private home of the family who own Jake's. The Oliver Bond house now belongs to Community Living Manitoulin, and Oliver's plumbing business, started in the 1930s just a few doors down, is still a plumbing business after all these years. Just past that, a restaurant has served hungry customers since the

1920's. It started as Andy Williamson's The Village Grill, and his daughter Sadie Williamson continued to run it until 1958. It burned down shortly after she sold it, but the new owners rebuilt. The current owners, adopting a rooster decorative theme, call the restaurant The Roosterant, an imaginative play on words.

Along the street the group continued, past the Andrew and Charlotte (Becks) Williamson house, the church, the Rolston/Wagg/Williamson house and more.

At the former Minde-

mova Consolidated/Continuation School, finished in 1922, Ms. Costigan explained why the rather imposing school was a real boon to the community. For the first time, young people in the area were able to obtain a secondary school education without moving away. Between 1922 and 1969 most of the children of Central Manitoulin went to this solid brick school, and many still hold a strong sentiment for their old alma mater.

At the next stop, the clouds in the west became more threatening and Ms.

Increase

Costigan quickly explained that the uniquely designed War Memorial Community Centre was an ambitious project in the early 1950s. To help pay for it the local women formed the Everywoman's Club, putting on fundraising dances, euchre parties, and suppers, whatever they could to raise the money for the new building. Efforts such as these illustrate the strong sense of community in Mindemoya.

Luck had been with the walking tour for about an hour, but darker clouds sent the group hurrying back to Mindemoya's new Welcome Centre, losing no time to avoid getting soaked by the coming rain. So ended the 2017 Jean's Walk, with delicious homemade cakes, tea and coffee.

"Your Guide to Jean's Walk: An Historical Walking Tour Part II" researched by Pat Costigan and produced by Norma Hughson, is 60 pages sprinkled with photos both new and old. It will be available for sale at the Pioneer Museum in Mindemova in July and August.

The family of the late Lisa and Gerry Langridge are holding a service for interment of their ashes in the Providence Bay ceme-


tery on Saturday, June 3 at 12:30 pm. There will be a light lunch and refreshments along with a sharing of memories at the curling club following the service.




