Assiginack reinstates agreement with S.S. Norisle Steamship Society

MANITOWANING—Following an in camera session of Assiginack council last month, council passed a resolution to reauthorize an agreement between the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society and the municipality with the hopes of aiding them in their quest to see the aging vessel refitted at dry-dock to, hopefully, sail again.

The 'S.S. Norisle Refit/Restoration Project Agreement' states that the township agrees to a partnership in support of the Society's efforts to repurpose and refit the Norisle and is in support of its efforts.

Under responsibilities, it states that the township will provide safe, secure dockage and utility services as well as the manpower and resources of its public works department to assist in dockside maintenance as requested by the Society and will continue to provide general liability insurance for the Norisle and consider the Society as community volunteers for the purpose of extending all existing coverages to include their work on the Norisle.

The agreement goes on to state that the township will issue charitable tax receipts on behalf of the Society for monetary, in-kind and material donations for the project, that it will provide administrative

support and that it will apply for financial aid, grants, donations, gifts or other support for the Society as authorized by council resolution.

On the Society's side, it promises the attainment of repurposing funds and resources will be its sole responsibility and that it is responsible for scheduling, coordinating and overseeing all efforts to repurpose the ship. Lastly, the

Society has agreed to present an annual progress report by way of delegation to the council.

The agreement, which has yet to be signed, will end on the third anniversary of its signing, but will renew automatically for another three-year term unless notice is given by either party.

The township has also agreed to transfer ownership of the Norisle

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Lake Huron levels surpass 2018's May 1 mark by 24 centimetres

Lake 'most healthy' of the Great Lakes

LAKE HURON—It's a far cry from the 2013 water levels stories this newspaper reported on that shared the news of frighteningly low water levels in the Great Lakes. At the beginning of May, Lake Huron water levels are well above average.

Derrick Beach, water resources engineer with Environment and Climate Change Canada, told The Expositor in a Monday interview that as of May 1, Lake Huron is 65 centimetres above average and 24 centimetres above last year's beginning of May figures.

There's no need to panic, though; Lake Huron is still 17 centimetres below the 1986 highs that caused much consternation on the lake.

"There's still a ways to go," Mr. Beach commented. "Lake Huron is the only lake where, even if we experience extremely wet conditions for the next six months, we still aren't expecting to break

records."

Mr. Beach continued to note that Lake Erie has broken a beginning-of-May record and Superior is coming close to it too, which will have implications on the out-flow into Lake Huron.

"(Lake Huron) is probably the best off of the Great Lakes," Mr. Beach added.

The reason for Lake Huron's current status is a trend of above average precipitation. January was an average month in terms of water levels remaining stagnant, but February to April saw small increases in water levels, which rarely occurs during this time of year. Mr. Beach said evaporation was average to less-than-average, which would have played a role in the increase.

There was a 20 centimetre rise over April, the sixth highest rise for that month on record. The average April rise is 11 centimetres, which was mainly due to precipitation and the snow melt.

among youth will be officially recognized on June 12 as Honora Bay's Don Prescott is officially inducted into the Builder category at the Sudbury Sports Hall of Fame.

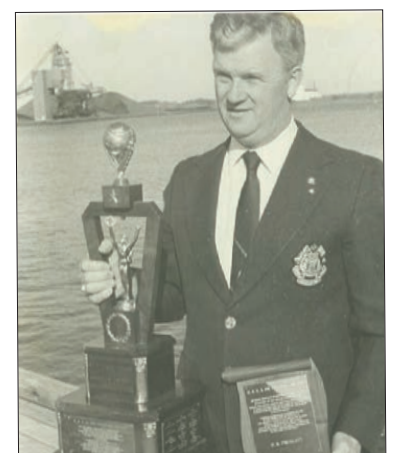

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Brian Dittmar, Steve Prior awarded for bravery in ice rescue

OTTAWA—Two Western Manitoulin men were awarded for their bravery on April 25. Brian Dittmar and Steve Prior were guests of the Governor General of Canada, the Right Honourable Julie Payette, when she presented them with a Meritorious Service Decoration (Civil Division), a Decoration for Bravery or the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers at Rideau Hall.

The Expositor reported exclusively on the harrowing tale of the Julia Bay ice rescue, which can be read in its entirety below, and which was part of the nomination package sent in by the municipality.

The pair were nominated for the award by the former mayor, Ron Lane, and council of the Town of Gore Bay.

"It was quite an experience being there for the ceremony with people from all over Canada who were receiving different medals for their efforts, including other bravery medals," Mr. Dittmar told the Manitoulin West Recorder. "I talked to several of the other people including two RCMP officers who pointed out that they were trained to do a rescue, but noted that Steve and I haven't had training like this."

"If there was anything I realized while I was there at the ceremony and after being interviewed it is that for the whole picture, if it wasn't for Lisa Addison and Crystal Lane, who made the calls to 911, and to Steve and I there, we couldn't have saved him," Mr. Dittmar continued. "And I wouldn't

have been able to rescue Kirk without Steve being there; and vice versa. Neither of us could have done it ourselves."

Mr. Prior told The Recorder he was "humbled" by the award and was glad he had the chance to go to Rideau Hall.

JULIA BAY—An Evansville area man was rescued from the frigid waters of Julia Bay on Saturday afternoon by two men who risked life and limb to save his life.

Brian Dittmar is a former member of the Gore Bay Volunteer Fire Department and an avid snowmobiler so it was he who Lisa Addison called when she saw a snowmobile carrying two people break through the ice just after 1 pm on Saturday while fishing on Julia Bay. She heard the screams of the couple as their machine crashed through the ice, leaving them both in the icy cold waters.

Mr. Dittmar told The Expositor on Monday that Ms. Addison first called 9-1-1 to report what she had just witnessed on the other side of the bay, then called him. Mr. Dittmar still had his two snowmobiles loaded on his trailer from a recent trek to points north and so, heeding the call, took a quick inventory of what he might need, including a roof rake—the longest, lightest instrument he could find in short notice—and headed in the general direction of

where he thought the incident had occurred, parking along the Barrie Island causeway and unloading one of the machines. Mr. Dittmar said that he left the trailer open and with a key in the ignition of the other snowmobile in case a fellow rescuer should come and assist. In the meantime, Mr. Dittmar's wife called fellow firefighter Wendell Clarke to

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Ice hut debris leaves a bad taste on Mindemoya shores

MINDEMOYA—Spring Bay resident Pat Zacharjewicz was dismayed on a recent trip to the shores of Lake Mindemoya this spring. The remains of an ice fishing hut and a massive pile of garbage debris floated and lay around an ice floe.

"It really bothers me that people do this," said Ms. Zacharjewicz. "I have to say something to someone. I didn't bother calling the MNRF (Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry) because they don't have the staff to deal with anything like this." So Ms. Zacharjewicz called The Expositor, where her son Neil once worked as a reporter.

Among the 30 to 40 pieces of debris was a box, the base of the ice hut—apparently fused into the ice—and a gas can. "There were six-packs on the floor," she said. "Saucepans, pop bottles, water bottles, tools; it was a real mess."

"My husband said maybe we should get it out," said Ms. Zacharjewicz, "but we are both seniors."

Ms. Zacharjewicz said she contacted the town, but Central Manitoulin was not in a position to assist as errant ice fishing huts are MNRF's responsibility.

"We did call the MNRF for her," said CAO Ruth Frawley.

There was no response to messages left with the MNRF on the issue as of press time Monday.

MSS groups lead water walk across Island this Saturday

M'CHIGEENG—Students at Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) are all set to take part in the school's biggest-ever water walk this coming Saturday, one that will follow a roughly 120-kilometre route that spans from Misery Bay to Wiikwemkoong, to raise awareness and funds in support of clean water initiatives worldwide.

"I'm hoping we will see lots of people all over the Island walk with us," said Yana Bauer, MSS teacher and a supervisor of the school's Students Helping All 'Round Everywhere (SHARE)/Go Green Committee. That committee is organizing the walk.

"Youth are not apathetic to what's going on in the world. They are passionate, they want to go big and they want to see change," she said.

As of last week, roughly 40 students had signed up for the walk. The public is invited to join in on the event and share their support for the increasing threats to safe, clean drinking water worldwide.

MSS has hosted water walks sporadically in previous years, but they have been mostly symbolic gestures around the track on the school grounds. This year marks a spectacular departure from the past. It was originally planned to be on the same scale as other years, but some students had discussions with other school groups to try to incorporate more people into the walk. Members of the school's CrossFit group were the ones to launch the water walk

into this new domain.

"April (Torkopoulos, a student helping to organize the walk) came back and said, 'I don't know if they're serious, but the CrossFit group wants to walk the whole Island,'" recalled Ms. Bauer. "The students really like the epic nature of this undertaking."

The planning process soon began. After considerable deliberation, the final plan culminated in a 120-kilometre route from Misery Bay to Wiikwemkoong. However, the walkers will be divided into two groups that start at one end and walk toward MSS.

"We were looking at doing a full 30-hour walk across the whole Island, but the police advised us against it for safety reasons," said Ms. Bauer.

At the bright and early hour of 6 am on Saturday morning, the enrolled students and supporting community members will embark on the 79,000-step journey toward the school. There will be safety vehicles pacing the students with plenty of drinking water in reusable containers as well as several stops along the route with community members who have opened their homes as rest stops.

Noojmowin Teg Health Centre has offered reusable water bottles for the walkers and Ms. Bauer estimates the trip will take about 12-and-a-half hours.

The participating students are raising money for the walk, with proceeds going to support WE Walk For Water. MSS is affiliated

Legal Aid Ontario cutbacks are a short sighted misstep

For 32 years the Manitoulin Legal Clinic has been providing services to low income Islanders in the areas of community development, public legal education and offering summary advice, brief services and legal representation. The recent decision of the Ford government to drastically cut Legal Aid Ontario's funding is not only an unconscionable attack on the province's most vulnerable, but even more reprehensible when it is considered that the Progressive Conservatives have used the cover of refugees and immigrants as a shield from any blowback.

It can come as no surprise to anyone paying the least bit of attention that the cost of participating in Canada's legal system has spiralled far beyond the reach of the middle income cohort, let alone the poor. It could rarely be said in the past that the Canadian legal system could be defined as a justice system although it has largely served the silver spoon crowd fairly well. Canada lags the entire developed world outside of North America in access to justice. With this latest travesty of a budget cutback, Doug Ford and his colleagues are making a mockery of what little that was just.

The easy targets of immigrants and refugees set aside, too many citizens equate Legal Aid Ontario with the protection of criminals from prosecution. But legal aid defence is only a small part of what that organization does.

The Manitoulin Legal Clinic practices poverty law, and Manitoulin has plenty of citizens whose poverty qualifies them for assistance. When decisions are made that impact negatively on those who depend on Ontario Works, the Ontario Disability Support Program and the Canada Pension Plan, or for those who have issues that must come before the Landlord and Tenant Act tribunal, who need representation to challenge the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board or need assistance for Criminal Injuries Compensation Board hearings, the Manitoulin Legal Clinic is the only place they can turn to to ensure their access to any semblance of justice.

The Manitoulin Legal Clinic also assists the poor with wills and powers of attorney, consumer and debt issues, accessing birth and death certificates, accessing name changes and a host of other mat-

ters that our bureaucratic labyrinth are so difficult to navigate—especially for those with low incomes.

The April 11 announcement by the provincial government to reduce the budget of Legal Aid Ontario by 30 percent will have a direct and devastating impact on those services that are provided to low-income residents in the Manitoulin Districts and across the entire province.

This from a government whose blatantly propagandistic press releases daily trumpet that theirs is a "government for the people."

With these and a host of other cutbacks that have disproportionately targeted the province's most vulnerable, of which the North and Manitoulin count more than their share amongst their population numbers, the Ford government clearly defines "the people" within very tight and exclusive parameters.

If there is one thing that has been proven will impact this government's decisions and effect change it is hearing from "the people." The outpouring of anger and pushback the Ford government has received over their decisions on autism and the loss of jobs in the educational sector are recent examples where this government has rethought its initial ideological cuts.

When the people start to bite back, this government tends to pull in its fangs.

The Ford government would do well to remember that it was the unprecedented personal unpopularity of former premier Kathleen Wynne that got them elected, not any facet of their own election platform—as those who might recall during the last election campaign that platform was missing in action.

Contact your MPP, or the nearest Progressive Conservative MPP to voice your objection (the ever approachable Roy Romano springs to mind. Better yet, Premier Ford likes to take calls and answer emails personally—we are sure he would like to hear from the electors of the province).

Remind him that governments tend to get themselves unelected, rather than elected, and three years isn't really all that long down the road.

'Material Witness' pulls story threads together at Debajehmujig

MANITOWANING—It would be hard to discover a more appropriate title for 'Material Witness,' a play/art installation that took place at the Debajehmujig Creation Centre on the evening of May 1. The production, brought to Debaj through the collaborative efforts of New York's Spiderwoman Theatre and Aanmitaagzi, a multi-arts company based in the Nipissing First Nation, wove together the intricate threads of personal and individual women's stories to create a fascinating fabric of violence and healing.

Accompanying the performance, and forming an integral part of its genesis and stage set design, was an art installation developed through a series of Pulling



Threads Fabric Workshops that were held over the four years when the two companies developed the production. As theatre patrons wandered in to take their seats, fabric artists Sherry Guppy of Temagami and Nimkii Couchie of the Nipissing First Nation were there to greet and enlighten them about the project.

"It doesn't really have a name," said Ms. Couchie of the exhibit. "It's just another component of

the show. I guess it would be called the Pulling Threads Workshop installation."

Ms. Couchie explained that the installation, and the many quilts that helped form the stage set, are the product of 23 workshops that took place before the performance. One of those workshops took place at Debajehmujig last year. The fabric creations are a physical legacy of the stories that women shared during those workshops.

Before the performers took to the stage, Debajehmujig's Traditional Teachings Advisor David (Sonny) Osawabine welcomed the audience and made note that, due to the powerful and emotional subject matter that 'Material Witness' deals with and the potential for triggers causing attendees distress, there were wellness responders on hand in the lobby should anyone have need of support.

The play was a powerful roller-coaster of emotions, as the cast threw themselves into the fray with an unbridled passion that

reflected the cast members' personal connections to the stories being told. In fact, the cast consisted of many of the writers of the piece, as the stories told onstage were intimate reflections of the actors' own experiences.

The ensemble included Cherish Violet Blood as Cholula Daisy Fience Post, Penny Couchie as Louella Jean Finesse, Donna Counteau as Warrior Woman, Gloria Miguel as Du Tu Kapsus and Henu Josephine Tarrant as Entrance. Rounding out the writing crew in addition to the former were Ange Loft, Muriel Miguel and Carol Guppy.

'Material Witness' premiered in New York City in May of 2016 and the Debajehmujig performance was at the midpoint of the tour.

The choreography of the production wove its own tapestry to add to the power of the production, and the music chosen, from the bubble gum pop anthem 'Our Lips Are Sealed' by the Go-Go's through the contemporary 'Til It Happens To You' by Diane Warren

and Stefani Germanotta to the lilt-juxtaposition of the acappella rendition by the 92-year-old actress Gloria Miguel of 'Let Me Call You Sweetheart,' was an inspirational match to the themes playing out on stage.

There was a homecoming of sorts in this production, as the director Muriel Miguel and her sister Gloria Miguel were two of the original cast of famed Cree writer Tomson Highway's 'The Rez Sisters,' which was originally developed at Debaj in the 1980s.

Following the stage production before a packed house the cast and director came out to sit before the audience and take questions.

Asked about their inspiration for the play, Muriel Miguel cited her sister, who always insisted that she could "do anything you want." The performance itself was dedicated to Spiderwoman founding members Lisa Mayo, Rosemary Richmond and Grace Valdez—as well as "all the murdered, missing and abused women and their families. We hold them in our hearts and they are an inspiration to us all."

The silence in which so many of the stories of abused women are bound was also a key inspiration for many of the performers and writers. "Having so long not saying things about what happened in our lives," said Gloria Miguel. "What women are doing, what men are doing, we have to talk about what to do about that. How we are to go about healing. When you live as long as I do you have to be healthy," she laughed.

Refreshments in the lobby before and after the show included homemade tarts and coffee.

Predicting the forest tent caterpillar population in 2019

Heavier than usual collapse of caterpillar populations in 2018 due to disease suggests something is wrong with Manitoulin's ecosystems

MANITOULIN—As residents and summer visitors to Manitoulin Island are painfully aware, 2018 was a bad year for forest tent caterpillars. On the eastern side of Manitoulin in particular, residents had to put up with defoliated trees and withering masses of caterpillars on houses, trailers, decks, roads and sidewalks, along with a steady rain of fecal pellets.

As the winter of 2018-2019 disappears, residents throughout the Island are wondering what the numbers will be like in the summer of 2019. Predicting outbreaks or estimating the number of years forest tent caterpillars will be abundant is difficult, but there are signs that the current cycle may be over for at least part of the Island.

The population in the eastern half of the Island appears to have crashed last June in the caterpillar stage, but it is not known if some moths managed to survive and flew to other parts of the Island in mid-summer to lay eggs which will result in high nuisance numbers in 2019.

However, there are worrisome signs that the 2018 version of what is usually a 10-13-year cycle ended differently from that of previous years. Outbreaks usually last two to four years, so past experiences suggest one more year of high numbers south of Little Current, but I suspect not.

Quick overview of tent caterpillar biology

The forest tent caterpillar is the immature stage of a moth with the scientific name *Malacosoma disstria*. It is a member of a family of tent-making moths, however, this species does not make tents.

In contrast, its close relative, the eastern tent caterpillar, with the scientific name *Malacosoma americanum*, does make tents and are commonly seen on roadside shrubs throughout the Island (see The Manitoulin Expositor June 7, 2017).

The life cycle and biology of the forest tent caterpillar was described in this newspaper last summer (see The Manitoulin Expositor June 6, 2018), however, in brief, its biology is as follows:

The forest tent caterpillar is a common and natural insect herbivore across central and southern Canada. Its preferred hosts are aspen poplar, birch, maple and ash. In most years, populations remain low and small clusters are found widely dispersed in forests with rapid increases in populations usually prevented by the actions of parasitic wasps and flies.

However, for poorly understood reasons, the numbers start to increase dramatically every 10-12 years and host trees are heavily defoliated. Fortunately, healthy trees are usually not harmed during such outbreaks and produce new leaves about two weeks after the defoliation.

Stripping foliage by forest tent caterpillars is therefore one of nature's regular cycles. There is even evidence that the huge amounts of fecal pellets produced by caterpillars give the trees such a jolt of nitrogen fertilizer that they grow more luxuriantly the year following defoliation compared to years without defoliation.

This insect has one generation per year. It overwinters in the egg stage which are found in clusters that encircle small branches. Clusters of eggs look like the metal eraser holder on pencils. They are easy to see on small yard trees and can be removed before eggs hatch in the spring.

Caterpillars hatch in early spring and start feeding on newly flushed leaves. They grow rapidly in the next five to seven weeks becoming full grown by mid-June.

Caterpillars feed in clusters while immature, but once they are full grown they wander individually in search of

sites to make their white, silken cocoons.

It is in this wandering stage they become a nuisance as they walk in mass across sidewalks, decks and roads and climb up the sides of our buildings. Some roads of Manitoulin last June were blackened with their squashed bodies.

Cocoons are made in protected sites such as crevices in bark. In urban areas, they construct cocoons under any structure with an overhang. Caterpillars turn from pupae to adults in about two weeks inside the cocoons.

The moths are nocturnal with the males appearing first so they can mate within minutes of females leaving their cocoons. Females are strong fliers and can be dispersed by the wind, often flying hundreds of kilometres.

Events in previous outbreaks

In the two previous outbreaks I experienced (1989 and 2003) in Sudbury and on Manitoulin Island, the first year of the cycle resulted in masses of caterpillars, followed a few weeks later by huge numbers of moths on the sides of buildings near outdoor lights.

Then in the following years, numerous species of parasitic wasps and flies that attack forest tent caterpillars were abundant and it was these insects that caused the population of caterpillars to crash.

That is, as the population of caterpillars increased, the insects that feed on them also increased. One of the most common parasites is a fly about the size of a housefly.

It is commonly known as the 'friendly fly' because of its habit of landing on our skin. Its scientific name is *Sarcophaga aldrichi* and were so common in past outbreaks, they killed about 80 percent of the forest tent caterpillar pupae.

Bacterial, fungal and viral diseases also impact caterpillars with the most common called baculoviruses. These viruses, come in the form of protein crystals that are found naturally in the ground and on leaf surfaces. They only affect caterpillars and can cause high rates of mortality during an outbreak.

When the viruses are ingested, they proliferate in the caterpillar's stomach and turn the internal organs into mush. Body fluids leak from the corpses and when they dry out, millions of new virus particles are released into the environment to infect other caterpillars.

2018 season

As most fully grown caterpillars near Sheguiandah started looking for sites to pupate in 2018, they soon became infected with viruses. Many died with their bodies going limp, hanging in an upside down U-shape by one or two legs, characteristic of death due to viral diseases. This is why the disease is sometimes called the wilt disease.

Virus particles persist in the environment even when populations of tent caterpillars are low and cause little mortality. But when the populations explode, massive propagation of the virus occurs, resulting in higher mortality.

After having our summer trailer, deck and patio covered with full-grown larvae in late June last year, I could not find a single healthy larva. Some made it to the cocoon stage as about 100 were found on and near our trailer; however, not one of the cocoons I opened contained a live pupa.

Furthermore, not one adult moth appeared at the outdoor lights on our trailer, whereas typically at this stage in an outbreak, hundreds of moths cluster on the side of buildings near light fixtures.

It appears that after defoliating their host trees in the Sheguiandah area, the 2018 population of forest tent

caterpillars came to an abrupt and atypical end.

Something is not right as the usual population trend of this insect, along with its parasites, did not occur. That is, the usual parasites did not appear in synchrony with the large populations of tent caterpillars.

Predictions for 2019

Forest tent caterpillars will be less abundant on the east side of the Island in 2019 than they were in 2018. Pockets of infestation may occur elsewhere on the Island if some of the 2018 caterpillars made it to the adult stage and flew west to lay eggs. It is also possible that adults from north of the Island arrived in July to lay their eggs.

Although the 2018 caterpillars near Sheguiandah died because of viral disease without the involvement of parasites, such a trend, if widespread, would be unusual. Of concern is that the parasites of forest tent caterpillars appeared to be missing in 2018. These parasites also feed on the caterpillars of other moths and it is possible their populations will increase if unchecked.

If the absence of parasites of the forest tent caterpillar near Sheguiandah occurs elsewhere on Manitoulin, it may be an example of a trend in overall decreases in insect numbers.

Although there is no scientific proof or long term data obtained by yearly sampling, it appears there are fewer insects today than years ago.

Manitoulin OPP lays assault with a weapon charge

Manitoulin OPP remind drivers of proper cannabis storage

On Saturday, April 27, an officer from the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) was conducting traffic enforcement on Highway 17 in Baldwin Township.

At approximately 7:24 pm, the officer observed a traffic violation and conducted a traffic stop. After speaking with the driver, the officer observed cannabis within reach of the driver.

As a result of the investigation, a 19-year-old female from Sudbury was issued two provincial offences notices for: speeding 1-49 km/h over posted limit, contrary to section 128 of the Highway Traffic Act and drive vehicle or boat with cannabis readily available, contrary to section 12(1) of the Cannabis Control Act 2017.

The OPP would like to remind the public that although cannabis is now legal to possess and consume, it is not legal to have cannabis in a vehicle or boat unless one or both of the following conditions are met: cannabis is in its original packaging and has not been opened; or cannabis is packed in baggage that is fastened closed or is not otherwise readily available to any person in the vehicle or boat.

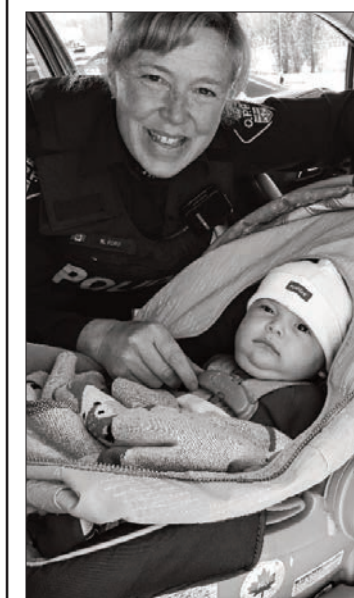

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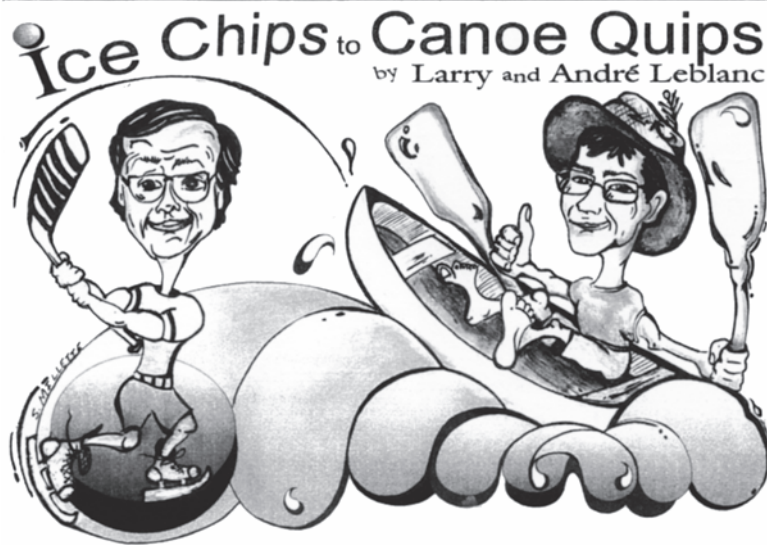

M'CHIGEENG—Zaagaasge Corbiere (Z for short) has had quite a run as she pursues a hockey career in a sport still largely dominated by the males of the species, making waves as one of the few females playing the sport on the upper tier teams' rosters. Zaa-gaasge recently returned from a sojourn overseas in Italy and France as a member of the Canadian Pro-development team.

"It was a really great experience, a lot of fun," she said. "I really liked going on the tours and playing against all the other girls from different countries."

There was some trepidation heading into the tournaments and training in Europe with the possibility of a language barrier, but that proved to not be the case.

"Actually, a lot of the them were really fluent (in English), well a handful were fluent and the rest were pretty good," she said.

Z's team did well in the tournaments, playing five games, but Z was only able to play in four, and although she played the last game, she was a long way from 100 percent as the team was struck by a flu-like ailment that laid most of the young women low.

"We only had seven players in the fourth game (the one Z missed)," she said. By the fifth game she had rallied enough to take to the ice, but that was more of a dedication to the concept of 'the show must go on.' "In the final game we only had nine or 10 players on the ice. I played the final one."

The Italy sojourn, and where the team was mostly based, centred in a mountain valley at a place called Chamonix. The team played mostly in local arenas, but there was one notable exception.

"When we were in Italy, we went to a really old Olympic arena," said Z. "It was not as big as I thought

inform him of the situation and also dispatch him to the scene.

"I headed out to where I roughly thought it happened," Mr. Dittmar told The Expositor. At the same time, Julia Bay resident Steve Prior showed up with his ATV, also ready to help. The pair saw no sign of anyone, just "debris," as Mr. Dittmar described it—mittens, a helmet.

Mr. Prior had brought with him a rope, about 15 ft. long, which the two men used to tie off on one another. Mr. Prior stayed farther back while Mr. Dittmar inched closer to the hole where the debris lay, following foot-steps that came from the area. He realized that one of the helmets had been abandoned, indicating someone had made it to shore, but the other helmet bobbed in the water and, when he tapped it with the roof rake, it moved slightly. "It was him, and he was face up," Mr. Dittmar said of the discovery. "His mouth, or maybe just his nose, was sticking out of the water." Mr. Dittmar thought he recognized the man and, it turns out, he was right. That man was Kirk Longmuir.

Mr. Dittmar said Mr. Longmuir appeared to be semi-conscious, and so they began to yell at him to grab hold of the rake. Mr. Longmuir could barely lift his arm in return. For several moments the rescuer tried to organize the rake under his arm, but this didn't work. The rake kept getting stuck.

"I got closer, inching, just to the point where the ice was mush and then I went in too," Mr. Dittmar recounted. With Mr. Prior tied to him, Mr. Dittmar grabbed hold of the Mr. Longmuir's hood and, pushing themselves backwards, both in the icy water, began to make their way through the mush, foot by foot, until the hood broke away from the man's

jacket. Eventually, using this same method, they found their way up and onto safer ice. Mr. Dittmar recalled that when he was pushing the victim through the mushy ice, they were following the trough left behind by the four-wheeler as it broke through.

"He couldn't do anything," Mr. Dittmar said of Mr. Longmuir.

The rescuers decided their next move at that point, realizing that just because he was free from the water did not mean that he was not still in perilous danger. They pulled Mr. Longmuir across the ice with the rope until the ice was thick enough to stand on. Realizing that a snowmobile would not help the situation as a mode of transport, the two decided to load the semi-conscious man onto Mr. Prior's two-up ATV and Mr. Prior would pin Mr. Longmuir in his seat using the weight of his own body, leaning backward. By this time Mr. Clarke had joined the efforts too. Another firefighter had also made his way to the scene and was ready with a blanket.

"We kept talking to him, kept trying to keep him awake," Mr. Dittmar said, adding that another call was made to ensure that an ambulance was on its way and giving the dispatcher the best description of where they would meet the paramedics.

Mr. Longmuir had been in the water for 40 minutes. His female partner had got herself out of the water and to shore in search of help.

"He was pretty lucky," Mr. Dittmar said of Mr. Longmuir, who was sent to hospital and released the next day.

"You just gotta do what you gotta do, right?" he added, noting that it's part of his duty as a first responder.

Mr. Dittmar said the spot where the pair went through is known as a bad area and that, at that time, there was an open area about one acre in size

close to where the incident occurred.

"I had a good partner," he said of Mr. Prior. "It takes cooperation. I would never have been able to do anything for him by myself."

Mr. Longmuir was reached for comment, resting at his home near Evansville and weak from his ordeal.

"I'm just so grateful 'cause I didn't think I was going to make it," he said, noting that he remembered most of the rescue, but things went dark just before he reached the ambulance.

"My bike went through the ice and I tried to the best of my ability to get out," he recalled. "My girlfriend got out, but I couldn't. If it wasn't for them showing up and doing what they did..."

"I'm just so lucky to be alive," Mr. Longmuir said. "Another few minutes and it wouldn't have been the same story. It's something I can't ever forget. For sure, I won't be out there again."

Mr. Longmuir said he and his girlfriend had been out fishing, drilling numerous holes all with ice that was at least one foot thick. After not having any luck, they decided to set out for home, taking a different route—a route that put them in grave danger as it worked out. "I thought I knew where I was, I thought we were safe."

Mr. Longmuir said he suffered from hypothermia, which "the good people at the Mindemoya Hospital" took care of, and also a heart condition caused by the release of an enzyme as a result of the incident. Mr. Longmuir will be getting checked out in Sudbury for the condition this week. Hopefully, he says, it doesn't amount to much.

"I'm truly grateful to everyone who had anything to do with it—to Lisa Addison, to those two men, the paramedics and the staff at the Mindemoya Hospital—thank you," Mr. Longmuir said.

Water walkers are significant in Anishinaabe traditions, especially the late Biidaasige Josephine Mandamin who founded Mother Earth Water Walks in 2003. That organization raises awareness and advocates for the protection of fresh water. It is rooted in the assertion that water is life.

"The Three Fires Confederacy has also gotten involved and offered us their support. Water walk-

ing is a long-standing tradition in First Nation communities and we wanted to honour that. They've offered their support and instruction to us," said Ms. Bauer.

Ms. Bauer and a couple of students met with water walkers in Wiikwemkoong who helped to explain some of the traditions and offer their support in getting the event underway. They also spread awareness of the event among those who have supported their own walks in the past and Ms. Bauer said she hoped that would boost attendance.

"The water walkers offered us some cloth for tobacco ties, and we were able to give them a tobacco plant that we had grown here at the school. It was a really beautiful exchange," said Ms. Bauer.

A component of water walks is collecting water from the many waterways along the route. Ms. Bauer said that in an effort to expand its reach into as

many waterways as possible, students living in all corners of the Island were asked to bring in water from a natural source close to their home.

All the water will be collected in a copper container—a material significant for its healing and cleansing properties in Anishinaabe customs—that was donated by a woman from Honora Bay. A student also donated their copper water bottle for the initiative. The collected water will be mixed with the waters of West Bay in a ceremony at the end of the walk.

"We want this to be an act of solidarity because everyone is affected by water issues," said Ms. Bauer.

Following the walk, there will be a community feast at the high school.

teams to championships throughout his scholastic career in Gatchell and later as team captain at Sudbury Tech High School. Mr. Prescott played hockey, basketball and football.

Sudbury's redoubtable Max Silverman, a Northern Ontario sports legend, personally recruited Mr. Prescott to play for his new Junior Sudbury Wolves and even signed a tryout agreement with the Boston Bruins. His outstanding career in sports continued on in college, where he was the Ryerson hockey team's captain. After school he continued playing sports and it was when he moved to Capreol where he became the playing coach for the Capreol Chiefs—it was there that he began what was to become a lifelong affiliation with fastball.

He began umpiring at Sudbury's Queen's Athletic Field, a role he continued for the next five decades, going on to call many All Ontario and league playoff games across the province. But it was his involvement in hockey that was to lead indirectly to a 30-year career in teaching when, after leaving the Chief's dressing room one evening, Mr. Prescott was approached by the Lo-Ellen High School principal asking if he had ever considered teaching. Mr. Prescott's Lo-Ellen team would remain undefeated at the Northern Ontario Secondary School Association championships.

In 1963 Mr. Prescott was elected to the Ontario Amateur Softball Association and found himself often as the sole Northern Ontario voice at that table, according to his son Delroy Prescott. "He had to work his way up the ladder through three vice president stints before becoming only the second person from the North to be elected president in 1979," said Delroy Prescott. "One of the highlights of his amateur sports administration career was being the chef de mission (manager) of the gold medal winning Team Canada at the Pan Am Games in Puerto Rico."

He went on to be elected chairman of Softball Ontario for several years. In 1984 Mr. Prescott was awarded for his efforts with

the prestigious F. R. Feaver Award, which recognizes an individual who, through their dedication, service and devotion has played a major role in the development of softball. The Ontario government awarded him the Corps d'Elite Provincial Award for Volunteerism in Sport and Fitness.

The testimonials for Mr. Prescott were as unanimous as they were effusive in their praise.

"Some of the most memorable moments in Capreol sports took place on the softball diamond," said Jim Cappodocia. "In those years the Town of Capreol produced many championship teams competing in both the Sudbury League and the All Ontario Junior C and Intermediate B and C categories. Don Prescott played a key role in all of this."

But all the personal accolades came secondary to Mr. Prescott.

"As a 16-year-old I was fortunate to play for Don," said Stu Thomas. "He taught us to play competitively, but also stressed fair play and sportsmanship. He was a role model for all the young men who played for him. Don was always there as a community leader and a volunteer."

Son Delroy recalled asking his father how he felt about his long career as a coach, umpire and sports administrator. His reaction was that the accolades were all well and good, but he

was much more proud of how many of the young men he had coached through the years had turned out.

"It's fantastic news, his recognition for Don Prescott is long overdue," said local sports organizer Greg Lockyer. Mr. Lockyer credits Mr. Prescott's example with inspiring his own involvement in organizing sports for youth and he recalled the many long hours Mr. Prescott and his wife, the late Naida Prescott spent preparing for the weekend ball tournaments on the Island. Delroy Prescott has also caught his father's dedication to sports, umpiring countless numbers of games each year in the still quite healthy Island league.

"My dad had a great advantage in organizing sports on the Island," laughed Delroy Prescott. "As a teacher at Manitoulin Secondary School he would go out to the buses at the end of the day to hand out brown envelopes for each of the Island communities; this one's for Mindemoya, this one is for Wiky, this one is for Manitowaning. He had it all lined up."

Even as the couple got older they were a familiar sight at Island games. "Naida could be seen at baseball games with her pad of paper keeping score," Mr. Lockyer recalled fondly. "At the Mindemoya Youth Ball Tournament last year one of the division champs took home the newly creat-

ed Prescott Family Trophy in their honour."

At a June 12 ceremony Don Prescott, now a resident of Manitoulin Centennial Manor, will be inducted into the Sudbury Sports Hall of Fame in the Builder category—a place he holds in the hearts of many Manitoulin sports players and fans.

well at the competition. According to Mr. Zegil, the intermediate division winner was from Sault Ste. Marie and the senior division winner was from Kapuskasing.

In a change of pace from the Legion competition, Grade 12 Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) student April Torkopoulos took part in a French-language public speaking competition at York University's Glendon campus on the very same day. She adapted the speech she had been presenting for the Legion competition about the cost of post-secondary education into French and entered the competition. Her French teacher Mel Cheng was the one who first informed her class about the opportunity.

"It was such an awesome experi-

ence. It was pretty different from the other public speaking competitions I usually go to, this was way bigger," said April. Across all the post-secondary divisions there were 172 speeches during the event which ran from 11 am to 5 pm.

April netted an honourable mention for her performance, which she said was among her best.

ect co-ordinator Seija Deschenes.

Mr. Killens was removed from his position as Manitoulin trustee in the RDSB last year in a contentious move that drew strong community support behind Mr. Killens.

"The accolades I've received from the fish and game club and the Manitoulin Streams organization certainly cement and reinforce my thoughts and my urging that I wasn't guilty of these things they were saying," he said. "Any bad thoughts I had that I let people down are completely gone. That was the highest reward I could get."

Mr. Killens also helped to honour the LCFGC and Mr. Strain through a community service award from RDSB in 2014.

"He was instrumental in promoting that, in getting it acknowledged and getting us that award," said Mr. Strain, adding that he accepted an award from the Ontario Federation

of Anglers and Hunters for the LCFGC as well.

Mr. Killens' involvement with the LCFGC began when they asked him to find a way to get children involved in conservation. He worked on a business case with other community partners such as educator and outdoorsman Neil Debassige and they managed to integrate these conservation activities within the standard curriculum.

"If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem. You need to get involved to get our kids out, away from their computers, to get out there and get involved," said Mr. Killens, referencing Wiikwemkoong's Autumn Peltier as a "stellar example" of what involvement can lead to. He added that spending priorities should be focused on health and enrichment first, such as ensuring lead-free pipes run to schools, before spending on recreational or less-critical infrastructure.

"When I talk about a community effort as part of the solution, I want to thank The Expositor's staff for being there. Without the paper to get these stories out, nothing would happen," said Mr. Killens.

Mr. Strain said he was confident in the new RDSB trustee for Manitoulin Island in terms of advocating for students going forward. Trustee Margaret Stringer was present at the LCFGC event last Thursday when Mr. Killens received his award.

"We have a good replacement with Margaret. She's assured me that she wants to be involved as well and will certainly support in any way that she can. I think we're in good hands," he said.

Mr. Strain extended his final thanks to the unnamed company that donated the rods and reels for the nearly 150 students that took part in this year's program, as well as the club volunteers who offered their support.

Suzanne, Beth's mother; Jeff Hanson playing the kind-hearted and charming next-door neighbour, Patrick; and Melanie Janzen as Glenda, Suzanne's sister and house-

mate. Glenda and Suzanne are retirees living in Little Current who spend their days looking after their backyard chickens and admiring the figure of their younger neighbour Patrick, who often stops by to drop off copies of The Manitoulin Expositor and enjoy some of the treats that the ladies provide.

Beth announces that she is making a trip home, a visit that is causing considerable stress on Suzanne because of their strained relationship. Both Suzanne and Glenda as well as Beth have secrets that they have not been sharing with each other, including a major secret that underpins much of the motivation behind the sisters' lives—spoiler alert!—Glenda has cancer.

"It's a story that came from my personal life. I lost an aunt to pancreatic cancer (three) Decembers ago," Ms. Da Silva told The Expositor last November. "It came from watching my mom go through losing her sister and knowing she was going to die. They've been very close ever since my aunt was born."

Ms. Da Silva visited Manitoulin Island last summer for the first time and realized that it would make the perfect setting for some of the themes in the play. Island residents will recognize a long list of references to landmarks and calling cards that Manitoulin is famous for. These included hawberry jelly, Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Little Current, this newspaper, Boozeneck Road, 'Hawaters,' McLean's Mountain Lookout, Gor-

don's Park and the swing bridge.

Although the play was billed as a comedy and contained no shortage of expertly-timed jokes, it has its share of serious moments that sliced straight through the comedic air and tugged at the heartstrings of the audience. There were moments of shattering silence whenever the actors delivered a particularly emotional line.

Theatre Orangeville's casting choices for the production all proved to be successful as the actors slipped into their roles in a seamless fashion that swept the audience deeply into the story. Their execution was only made better by the show's writing—even the ushers who would have undoubtedly heard and seen all the lines before were in stitches in the corners of the room at parts of the play.

"I hope people on Manitoulin Island feel how much we've come to love the place," said Ms. Da Silva. "I've really gotten to understand how much their home means to them. It's a special place."

Theatre Orangeville's artistic director David Nairn said he felt the world premiere went spectacularly well and that he was happy with how the audience responded to the production.

"To do a world premiere of a new play, in many

ways, that production will define the future of the show," he said.

Although the play takes place on Manitoulin Island, the core messages can transcend time and place, Mr. Nairn said. He also served as director for the play.

"It makes my job so much easier when you get the casting right," he said. "This is such a beautiful story and it's so honestly told."

Mr. Nairn, who has connections to the North Shore and Greater Sudbury areas, said he felt the play honours Manitoulin and the spirit of those who live there. He added that a scene involving doughnuts had to be reworked for this production.

"Whenever you mention Tim Hortons on stage, it always gets a laugh. But there are no Tim Hortons on Manitoulin! Instead of using a Tim Hortons box we created one that riffs on the Loco Bean logo," said Mr. Nairn.

He described a subscriber who has been attending Theatre Orangeville productions for 25 years and is also battling cancer, who described 'Where You Are' as the best show they had ever done.

"He said that every word was honest and true and everything he felt in his own journey. He said it embodied everything he hoped his last days would

be filled with. That's the power of theatre," said Mr. Nairn.


'Where You Are' is a one-set play, but its place on the front steps of Glenda and Suzanne's house was conducive to all the actions taking place within the story. Production manager and set designer Beckie Morris was able to pay close attention to the minute details and ensure everything was in its right place, including a garden arbour carved with the initials of Glenda

and her late husband Mark.

Lighting designer Wendy Lundgren also ensured that realistic colours shone through for the outdoor scene, including some subtle shadows of the sunlight streaming through leafy trees. Dan Palmieri served as sound designer and assistant technical director; Wendi Speck was the costume designer and Jory McLean took up the role of stage manager. Grace Batten was apprentice stage manager, Lisa Lahue was

technical director and Taylor Woermann was the opera house technician.

'Where You Are' is on stage at Theatre Orangeville until May 19. Ms. Da Silva said her play will then head on to further engagements with different companies in Orillia, Brampton and even Prince Edward Island. Her next production, 'Hurry Hard,' will premiere at Port Dover's Lighthouse Festival in July, located at the southerly tip of Highway 6.

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Tehkummah Council Notes

Delegation regarding Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act

Mr. Bowerman asked council if they had read over the act, to a negative response. He requested that whatever he did not cover in this presentation be put over to the following week.

Mr. Bowerman said some of the issues he presented on had been ongoing for 119 years and he was concerned about the older generations passing on and losing history. He went on to present about the options to preserve burial sites within the township, including discussions of work the township has done on area cemeteries dating back to 1948. He took issue with the township's past statements that it cannot work on the Michael's Bay town site when it had participated with Manitoulin Streams to rehabilitate the river on the town side.

Mr. Bowerman went over a number of policies within

the act regarding fencing, signage, markers and maintenance of burial grounds and cemeteries. He said all the former landowners of Michael's Bay have been aware of the burial sites in the area and requested Tehkummah form a cemetery care and maintenance committee that receives council funding to preserve its ancestral heritage.

Councillor Rick Gordon asked how many sites Mr. Bowerman was referencing in his discussions of unmarked burial sites and cemeteries. He listed the total as five in the Michael's Bay town site.

Clerk-administrator Roy Hardy said the landowners have the responsibility to preserve the burial sites on their property—in this case, the federal government. He said the township could change the zoning to heritage, to alert potential future buyers of the land to the possibility of archaeological remains being present.

He said the municipality is responsible for two cemeter-

ies—the children's cemetery and the one cemetery in Michael's Bay. The other burial sites were not located on municipal property.

Councillor Michael McKenzie asked Mr. Hardy how the township could pressure the landowners to mark the burial sites; Mr. Hardy said he had contacted the federal government for an update on their plans for the sites.

Previous minutes

Councillor McKenzie asked whether any financial information had been obtained from the 2018 Easter egg hunt. Mr. Hardy stated that he interpreted the motion from the last meeting to require financial information only for future years, not ones that had passed.

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Manitoulin schools celebrate music trust funding at concert

M'CHIGEENG—The Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) cafetorium was alive with the sound of music in early May as its walls were filled with bands and choirs from MSS, Charles C. McLean Public School, Central Manitoulin Public School (CMPS), neighbouring Lakeview School and Assiginack Public School (APS) who came together for a dynamic performance for the ages.

This concert was in celebration of the Joan Mantle Music Trust, a fund within the Rainbow District School Board that provides funding for schools to bolster their musical instrument collections. The trust has raised more than \$250,000 to date.

In September, for its ninth edition, the trust named MSS, CMPS and C.C. McLean as the recipients of \$3,000 each. The schools themselves matched part of the contributions, meaning each school received a \$4,000 music funding boost this year.

"We all benefit as well, because we get to hear the end product—we get to experience the beautiful music that the students are creating tonight," said Chris Theijismeijer, head of the MSS music program.

The MSS concert band, directed by Mr. Theijismeijer, was the first group to play in the concert. Their main repertoire was a medley of tunes from the Pirates of the Caribbean movies and another featuring music from the Barber of Seville.

It was evident that the drummer was excited to be there as the tempo was kept to a lively pace. In 'Barber of Seville,' they exhibited their wide dynamic range and explored triumphant fortes and tender pianissimos. Mr. Theijismeijer noted that the abundance of empty chairs on the stage was intentional, and that their purpose would be revealed for the grand finale.

Next up was the CMPS Grade 6/7 band, directed by Ann-Marie Scott. They played early-stage traditional band tunes 'Rolling Along,' 'Go Tell Aunt Rhodie' and 'Lightly Row.'

CMPS students followed up that performance with a showing by the school's Grade 7/8 band. They began with their own rendition of 'Lightly Row,' then continued on with 'Au Clair de la Lune' and 'London Bridge.'

C.C. McLean students took the next performance slot under the direction of Ray Scott. They began with 'Listen to our Sections,' and then 'Hot Cross Buns.' They seemed to be performing well despite their experience level—so well, in fact, that Mr. Scott announced that they had exceeded his expectations and were about to perform an extra song, 'March Steps,' that was not on the program.

Mr. Scott stayed on stage to direct the Assiginack Public School band. This band only meets in the

...continued from page 1 to the Society for the sum of \$2 within six months of the Norisle entering a refit drydock.

"This gives the Friends (Society) enough time to do what they wanted to do," said Mayor Dave Ham, a long-time proponent of the Norisle. He admitted that the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society hasn't had a meeting in almost five years.

Mayor Ham said he believes the Society's next step will be to revisit its budget to bring the Norisle up to certain standards,

noting its deteriorating hull. At one time, the mayor said there was talk of having the hull cut in half and the ship then 'stretched' to allow for more staterooms.

"The ultimate wish is to have her removed from the harbour sooner than later," he added. "It's got to be moved out of here."

What to do with the Norisle has been a contentious issue in the Assiginack community for a number of years.

The former mayor and council were sued by the Society after they ended

support for the group and sought ways to rid themselves of the vessel. The lawsuit wrapped up last year with a settlement in favour of the municipality.

Also last year, the then-council reached an agreement with the Tobermory Maritime Association for the Norisle, which was to be sunk and used as a dive site just outside of the Fathom Five Marine Park near Tobermory.

The Norisle was one of several hot button issues in last fall's municipal vote.

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CMPS Fish Club releases Chinook salmon into Kagawong River

MINDEMOYA—The second annual partnership between the Gore Bay Fish and Game Club's (GBFGC) microhatchery project and the Central Manitoulin Public School's Fish Club was an improved success.

This past fall the GBFGC, with a permit from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNR), netted male and female Chinook salmon in the Kagawong River. After harvesting the eggs and milt from the fresh-run fish, club members quickly made their way to Minde-moya to demonstrate how the eggs are most successfully fertilized with a large

feather and perfect water temperatures.

In nature, salmon success rates are extremely low from egg to fingerling-size fish. Even with successfully fertilized eggs, very few actually hatched and fewer made it out of the alevin stage when they are "sitting ducks" to all predators, unable to swim as they live off their huge egg-sack bellies. When these lucky ones started on their downhill trek to Lake Huron they are easy prey to herons, gulls, fishers, kingfishers, weasels, etc.

The Christmas break is always tough on the delicate hatch era of this project's fish. It seems to be right in the middle of the hatch that can include eggs

that hatch and don't actually drop out of their Scotty Box into the general population. There is also a problem at this time with eggs that do not hatch and start to contaminate the water. These extra nutrients, unfortunately, caused a bacterial growth that clogged the filter that declined the water quality that resulted in the loss of a few fish.

However, thanks to an amazing CMPS Fish Club personnel from this season, the miserly, viable percentage that made it from egg to creek was almost 50 percent! When one considers that even fertilized eggs have less than a five percent chance of making it out to the big water, the CMPS Fish Club released 96 salmon out of 200 eggs harvested. Their success was largely a result of huge weekly water volume exchanges and tank cleanings that resulted in crystal clear water. As a byproduct, Principal David Wiwchar's avocado tree has flourished with what the club has termed "poop water."

The CMPS Fish Club once again teamed up

with Lakeview School for a great salmon stocking experience that saw the fish released into the amazing Manitoulin Streams-rehabilitated M'Chigeeng creek. Many thanks to Grade 5 teacher Ramona Ense, Math Lead Meagan Middleton and Language teacher Eria Bebonang for facilitating the special

cooperation. The creek was surprisingly warmer than one might expect with our winter and the tiny salmon needed little acclimatization time before dipping into their cooler climate.

The success of these Chinooks' reintroduction into the North Channel could not have happened without a lot of help many people. First, the CMPS Fish Club had several strong weekly workers and others that filled in when help was needed. Thanks to: Lily Mack, Mya Balfe, Carson Stewart, Alison Hallett, Samantha McKenzie, Ava Corbiere, Scarlet Mohr, Rylan Carrick, Erin Spry and Adeline Gray.

Of course this endeavor would not have got to this stage without the tireless work of the GBFGC and the folks that assisted in the Chinook salmon egg collection, including: Ian Anderson, Chess Witty and Brian Barker of the Gore Bay Fish and Game as well as Brad Claridge and Ken Clark of Kagawong.

Mr. Anderson would also like to acknowledge the assistance of Dale Jordison of the Blue Jay hatchery for a donation of fish food

and Wayne Selinger of the MNR Sudbury office for their support of this project with a permit to take eggs and plant the fish.

Budget and tax rates bylaws

Council approved the 2019 budget and a two percent mil rate increase in taxes.

Roger's Creek bridge and boundary roads agreement

The previous boundary roads agreement with Assiginack had expired and Councillor McKenzie had been working with Assiginack's mayor to draft a new agreement before any work would be done at the site.

The plan was drafted with a 10-year renewal period, but Councillor McKenzie said he would prefer it to be renegotiated every term or every second term of council, otherwise it could easily be forgotten. Mr. Hardy agreed with having a regular review period.

Councillor Russell said he didn't understand why the townships needed an agreement because the Municipal Act stipulates a 50/50 sharing. Councillor McKenzie said it was important to help reduce confusions in the maintenance of the roads. Mr. Hardy clarified that the bills are indeed half-and-half, but clarification on which side is responsible for a given section is specified within the agreement.

Councillor McKenzie noted that there was a used Bailey bridge that could possibly be donated to the townships, pending engineering approval and required maintenance.

Council resolved to revise the agreement for a 10-year period and prepare its bylaw, including a four-year review of the agreement. Councillor Russell voted against because he felt an agreement was not

required.

Fire Chief's report

Council resolved to have the fire chief arrange for self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) bottle filling in Assiginack township, to apply for up to \$5,000 in funding through the Royal Canadian Legion's Ontario Command, enough to nearly cover six new handheld portable radios.

Marina rental space

Township staff reviewed its operating costs for the marina space that is normally rented out seasonally. Mr. Hardy recommended that council open tenders for the space, bearing in mind its operating costs as a reserve bid, and only accept tenders that arrive above the reserve bid, which council accepted. If no bids surpass the reserve amount, the space will remain unoccupied for summer 2019.

Proposed lumberjack heritage festival

Council supported in principle a proposed lumberjack heritage festival, with one goal of getting involved being that they could have input into the spending on the initiative. Council expressed interest in getting the Manitoulin Tourism Association to make a presentation to council and Mr. Hardy said by including heritage in the proposal, they may be able to access certain heritage funding to help support the event.

Township staff had identified some possible uses for the \$228,000 grant. The roads superintendent listed his top three priorities, in order, as being a plow/sander, having access to a bulldozer for the landfill and roughly 5.5 kilometres of road that could use gravel this year at a cost of up to \$40,000.

The fire chief identified getting a permanent propane generator for the

township office and fire hall, and Mr. Hardy recommended getting a portable generator that could be brought to a community centre or similar building that would provide shelter in an emergency.

Council honorariums

Councillor McKenzie made a formal motion based on his previous comments in the budget planning process that council's honorariums be cut in half, with the balance being sent to the town's reserves. He

was unable to secure a second order and the motion was lost.

Landfill update

Mr. Hardy said he had received an update about the landfill condition that stated it was in poor repair after the winter. There were concerns that an area not to be disturbed had been touched.

He said the roads superintendent had been provided with the design manual for the dump and notes from DST Engineering

about starting to form an outside berm around the area, and how best to fill the space. Mr. Hardy also asked DST to give a site visit with the roads superintendent and landfill staff to learn what else needs to be done since the effects of this winter.

Councillor McKenzie said that council had asked the landfill attendant two weekends prior to have the public leave their garbage at the base of the landfill because it was unsafe to enter the site, and that the roads crew would move it to the top.

Reeve David Jaggard asked when council had given that direction. Councillor McKenzie said it had been discussed at a meeting, but was unsure of whether a motion had been made.

"The issue here is that's not council's job. Council should not be doing that," said Mr. Hardy, noting that landfill procedures had to

follow the provincially approved manual which cannot be changed without informing the ministry.

Closed session

Council resolved out of closed session to direct Mr. Hardy to negotiate a five-year contract with Infrastructure Ontario for the lease of the Tehkummah patrol yard and speak with public works labourer candidates.

"It was difficult creating a bond with the Sudbury Junior A Wolves when she always had to have a dressing room by herself and she had to wait while the boys dressed," explained her grandmother. "Although she did create bonds with her defensive partner and the goalies, she really did not feel a part of the team."

"After much talking and eventually respecting her wishes, she has decide to

play for the Pee wee Panthers this year," said Ms. Corbiere. "I am a bit disappointed but that does not matter because my granddaughter is happy—happy that she will be with teammates who she has a bond with and that she will be once again reunited with her best friend Kallie as well as coaches Hughson and Best."

But that decision doesn't mean she is letting up. Z is still in spring hockey with Pro Development and she will be playing in New York and Massachusetts as well as at another aboriginal tournament in August.

The Pro Development experience helped give Z a strong idea of what lies ahead in top tier sports. "There's a lot of travelling," she laughed.

- Removal of all shrub-sized willow and poplar by the Municipality, including roots, along the foredune of the Habitat Enhancement Area, the East side of the Mindemoya River for the length of the boardwalk.
- Removal of identified trees by the Municipality in the Habitat Enhancement Area and the Activity Area, from the playground up to and including the area immediately on the East side of the Mindemoya River.

For your safety, please do not enter the site while work is being done.

These actions are expected to improve the area closest to the Mindemoya River for the enjoyment by visitors. At the same time, it is intended to enhance the protected habitat, the dune, for species at risk.

The Permit sets out conditions that allow the Municipality to conduct specific activities. Action by the general public is not permitted. Further actions are expected to take place in 2019.

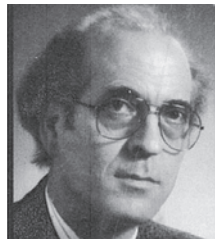

Why did the turtle cross the road? To get to the Shell Station! On a serious note, spring is here and turtles are on the move to nest, lay eggs and search for food. Some of Ontario's turtle species, such as the Blanding's turtle, may travel up to six km in

search of nesting habitat. In southern Ontario, one cannot travel more than 1.5 km without crossing a road, so turtles may have to cross several roads to reach their nesting sites. Female turtle may even create their nests on the shoulders of roads, which can then be destroyed during road maintenance, such as grading. How to help a turtle cross the road: if it's safe to do so then helping a turtle cross the road can be very beneficial for turtle conservation. You can be a turtle crossing guard by picking up a turtle and moving it in the direction it is going.

For most species, especially the smaller ones, you can grab them like a hamburger and pick them up. However, on a snapping turtle that is a danger zone for your hands as they can reach out and snap you. Instead, it's best to grab them by the back of their shell, tip them up like a wheel barrel, and walk them over to a safe spot.

Tips for successful grazing

Steve Kenyon runs Greener Pastures Ranching Ltd in Alberta. He has grazed stockers for years on rented land adapting to livestock, weather and other challenges as they come along. Steve spoke recently at a grazing workshop in Spring Bay. He simplifies grazing into four concepts: graze period, rest period, stock density and animal impact. These concepts are applied to a many small field or paddock system. Graze period is the amount of time spent in a single paddock. Animals are allowed enough time to graze each stem of grass once and then on to the next paddock. A bite of the early regrowth on a stem is over grazing and weakens the plant. The rest period is the amount of time the animals are not grazing a given paddock. This allows the plant time to store energy and begin new growth before animals are back to graze. Stock density is the number of grazing many animals on one field. A high stock density has benefits. It allows for more uniform manure and urine spreading. Nutrients from grazing are recycled through the animals. This helps the nutrient buildup in the soil. Many animals in a small area chew the vegetation in a uniform manner. The tasty plants are consumed as well as the not so palatable ones. With low animal density situations, the favourite plants are nipped over and over weakening the plant. The unattractive species are avoided, mature and go to seed. Overtime the seeds germinate and grow encouraging less palatable plants that crowd out the over grazed weakened desirable plants. Animal impact refers to the actions of many hooves on the plants and the soil. This action of breaking up the soil surface and trampling grass allows water and air to infiltrate the soil, encourages plant breakdown adding organic matter, improving manure penetration into the soil and contributes to seed to soil contact. All providing an ideal environment for plant growth. A thick stand of forage is able to take energy from the sun for healthy growth and rejuvenation.
