Central council moves to begin grant hunt for new rink in Mindemoya

MINDEMOYA—Central Manitoulin council called a special meeting November 7 to approve the funding application for a new community arena.

Mayor Richard Stephens began by saying that the recommendation was to proceed with a multiuse complex to be built in Mindemoya. He thanked Councillor Angela Johnston for the great job done by the recreation committee, which she leads, but noted that the cost is more than what Tulloch Engineering's feasibility study had quoted, although the features are the same.

Tulloch Engineering has explained that the resulting multi-plex, if the government grant is approved, will "allow for continued growth during all seasons for the community's sports and recreation activities, educational training and a place to host large social gatherings and community events. Given the large scale of the proposed facility, the baseball diamonds will be located further north to ensure proper use and circulation on the site. In addition to these site alterations, the existing J.H. Burt Memorial Arena, farmers' market and Old School will need to be demolished for servicing the parking required for the facility." Ont. Northland ends Manitoulin bus service Friday

MANITOULIN—Islanders are dismayed to learn that the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission (ONTC) will cease its bus service on Manitoulin this Friday, November 15.

Members of the United Manitoulin Islands Transit (UMIT) committee tried their best to persuade ONTC to maintain transportation here until the new local bus system scheduled for March rolls out, but to no avail.

UMIT began a few years ago when the Sudbury branch of March of Dimes Canada (MODC) became concerned when some employees could not find reliable transportation to their workplace. They enlisted vocational rehabilitation specialist Guy Dumas to investigate transportation mat-

WIIKWEMKOONG—Mishkee Adzawin Enagadong (Medicine Life Keeper), whose English name is Josh Eshkawkogan, shared a story in last week's edition of The Manitoulin Expositor of the abuse he suffered as a boy at the hands of Brother Norman Hinton, a Jesuit who served n Wiikwemkoong in 1965 and then from 1966 to 1984. Brother Hinton is named as a sexual abuser in a

Island's very first fast food franchise, Tim Hortons, coming to Little Current

Council agrees to site plan on Manitowaning Road

LITTLE CURRENT—The long-rumoured Tim Hortons on Manitoulin Island is now confirmed after Northeast Town council approved the site plan for the property at 45 Manitowaning Road in Little Current that will host a 2,745 square foot fast food outlet, with shovels set to hit the ground in the spring.

"I didn't even know the meeting was happening, but it was a good (outcome), of course," said developer Jim McBane, who confirmed to The Expositor that the location will indeed be a Tim Hortons under the management of franchisee Denis Lefebvre.

Mr. McBane said all of the restaurants are built from corporate-approved templates and both the project management company and engineering company are also corporately chosen. He said

this restaurant was a fairly standard size for Tim Hortons, with other restaurant templates being both larger and smaller than this option.

Island sentiment has been quite divided on the issue in online forums, with one informal poll conducted by Great Lakes Country 103 finding 56 percent of respondents in favour of an Island Tims and 46 percent against.

Mr. McBane said he had heard about the online discussion second-hand through a friend who uses Facebook, which found a similar division in opinions. However, he said many of those comments have come from people without a direct stake in the outcome.

"A lot of the comments against the idea are people from out of

Northern highways safety bill defeated at Queen's Park

QUEEN'S PARK—A private member's bill that aimed to the improve safety of Northern Ontario highways was stopped in its tracks last week, as the Making Northern Ontario Highways Safer Act, 2019 was defeated upon second reading in the house.

The bill was sponsored by NDP MPP Guy Bourgouin who had presented the bill for second reading on Thursday, November 7.

Conservative MPPs Vic Fedeli of Nipissing, Ross Romano of Sault Ste. Marie and Greg Rickford of Kenora-Rainy River, Northern Ontario members who are all in Premier Doug Ford's cabinet, were absent for second reading of the bill Thursday. The bill was defeated 59-38.

"Shameful, absolutely shameful," said Mr. Bourgouin, who represents the Northern riding of Mushkegowuk-James Bay, following the defeat of his bill. "The Ford Conservative government has shamelessly put a price on the lives of people that tragical-

ly die and get injured on Northern Ontario highways every winter."

The bill proposed classifying the Northern highways the same as all 400 series highways and the Queen Elizabeth Way, where snow must be removed within eight hours of the end of a snowfall instead of the 16 hours now allowed by the specifications in the Northern road maintenance contracts. Mr. Bourgouin's bill would have bumped up Highways 11 and Highway 17 to Class 1 level in all of their sections, whether those highways are two or four lanes and would have eliminated vehicular traffic volume

Algoma Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha, who had sponsored a similar private member's bill in a previous legislative session, reacted with dismay over the defeat of his colleague's bill.

"(I am) very disappointed in the government in regards to once again denying the calls and answer-...continued on page 11

Williams. There are seven petroglyphs of paw prints on the side. The print of the bison/buffalo represents respect; wolf, humility; beaver, wisdom; eagle, love; bear, courage; turtle, truth; and the Spiritual Being or The Sabe represents hon-

The thunderbird design that ties the vehicle together is a symbol of protection, strength and new beginnings. It is seen as the messenger for the Creator and provides wisdom by which all Anishinaabe should live.

WTPS worked alongside Fuel Media in Sudbury for graphic design assistance, Beacon Tehkummah-based Images made final adjustments to make the design fit the vehicle and apply the wrap to the truck.

"We're glad to have been a part of the whole project," said Julie Pearson, co-owner and manager of Beacon Images alongside business partner Bob Pearson, "The design looks fantastic; their rebranding has gone well. It's just a real honour that they won and we were part of it."

Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund maintained for 2020

ONTARIO—Ontario municipalities, including those on Manitoulin Island learned that the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) is being maintained for 2020.

'It is reassuring to know that rural Northern Ontario funding is being maintained," stated Ken Noland, reeve of Burpee-Mills Township to the funding announcement made by the province.

On October 25, at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario fall Policy Forum, the Honourable Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs made several key announcements of interest to municipal governments across Ontario.

One of those being that Ontario's government is listening to municipalities and delivering on its commitment to maintain the structure of the OMPF for the 2020 municipal budget year.

Next year, the province will invest \$500 million in 389 municipalities across Ontario through the

OMPF. The program primarily supports Northern and rural communities. This funding can be used for local priorities, to support the specific needs of each community.

"Municipalities told us that they need information early to plan their budgets, and we listened. That's why we're announcing the allocations for the 2020 OMPF today, the earliest they have ever been announced," said Rod Phillips, Minister of Finance. "Today, we are confirming that building strong local partnerships with municipalities is an important part in our plan to build Ontario together." This news fulfills a commitment made by Premier Doug Ford during the AMO annual conference in August to maintain the structure of the OMPF program for

For 2020, the government is maintaining the OMPF structure as it was in 2019, while allowing for annual data updates and adjustments.

Politicians should not duck out on the difficult debates

When it comes to governing there are a lot of tough choices that have to be made. One of the great things about being on the opposition benches (and there aren't many) is that you are generally free to lambaste the government on any issue and decry the government's lack of action to resolve the issue, without actually having to put any skin in the game. Once you find yourself on the government side the game changes dramatically and far too often decisions must be made that are not going to be popular and might be in diametric opposition to what was said when your party was in the opposition benches.

This lends itself to the tactic for the opposition of proposing bills that will not pass muster in the realpolitik world of governing. Perhaps the cost will be too high (although opposition bills can't spend money, that's the government's sole prerogative), perhaps the issue is not as pressing as many others that the government has to deal with. Sometimes the issue being addressed by an opposition bill has been overblown and the bill will needlessly tie up resources or waste taxpayer money. Often, the beauty of a bill is much in the eye of the beholder.

This was the position the Northern Ontario Conservative cabinet and other MPPs members found themselves in this past week, as a mom and apple pie bill brought forward by the NDP opposition dealing with safety on Northern highways was defeated. North Bay's Vic Fedeli brought forward arguments as to why the NDP bill was a non-starter both before and after the debate. Problem is, he and the other

Northern cabinet ministers ducked both the debate and the vote.

Mr. Fedeli and his colleagues' points might well have been sound and solid. But instead of bringing those points to the floor of the legislature and into the debate where they belong, Mr. Fedeli, Ross Romano and Greg Rickford chose a coward's way out and simply didn't show up.

Now it is understandable that Mr. Fedeli didn't want to have his words thrown back at him from when he did show up in the legislature to lambaste the Liberal government on their decision to reduce highway requirements to save a mere \$36 million. But it is patently clear that on a level of scale, the cost of the NDP bill would have been enormous in comparison and might well have been better tackled with some more moderate changes to the regulations and maintenance contracts.

The absence of the Northern cabinet ministers becomes even more odious when viewed through the lens that the legislature has come off the longest break in living memory. That is not how the people of Northern Ontario should be served.

The people of Northern Ontario deserve better and our democracy deserves better than the cold dish we have been served by the current masters of Queen's Park. Mr. Fedeli and his colleagues would do well to remember that it is often not a scandal itself that brings down leaders, but rather the reaction of a leader to those scandals—be that cover-up or not showing up.

Ford environment minister ignores law of unintended consequence

Two Manitoulin asks ignored in proposed regulations

To the Expositor:

Regular readers of The Expositor and Recorder will be aware of a two year-long campaigns on Manitoulin to have the Minister of the Environment restrict use of pesticides for vegetation management along Rights of Way by Ontario utilities, the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) and Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF). We also asked the minister to restore to municipalities the authority to control spraying within their jurisdictions which was taken away in 2009.

Campaigners followed regular procedures. We collected signatures on petitions (two petitions together gathered well over 1,000 signatures). Michael Mantha presented the petitions to the Ontario Legislature and the minister. We even got a letter of acknowledgement from the minister.

In parallel, we had approached individual municipalities and, even though their authority had been taken away, they issued statements opposing this type of use of pesticides. We have also approached Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) but thus far, have not been scheduled on their agenda. All this brings us to the present day, when we discovered that the Ministry is proposing amendments to the Regulations administering the Pesticides Act.

The ministry published the following: "Proposal summary - We are proposing amendments to O. Reg. 63/09: General made under the Pesticides Act to reduce complexity and modernize pesticide management in Ontario while ensuring protection of human health and the environment. This proposal is related to proposed amendments to the Pesticides Act. This consultation closes at 11:59 pm on: December 12, 2019.

We have only had a short time to review the proposed regulations, but so far, we have found nothing which addresses our two "asks." In fact, quite the reverse. Here's another extract: "Ontario believes these adjustments will reduce complexity and modernize pesticide management in Ontario, a system developed in 1990, while ensuring protection of human health and the environment. Ensuring continued environmental protection is a key part of our Made-in-Ontario Environment Plan commitment to maintain a healthy environment" and "... As stated, Ontario remains committed to its cosmetic pesticides ban, including existing exceptions. Ontario believes this province-wide ban prevents a patchwork of varied municipal bans...After 10 years of experience with the cosmetic pesticide ban exemptions, a few existing requirements, such as the need for advertising in newspapers and hosting community meetings (which have had limited attendance) will be removed from some exempted uses, such as at golf courses. However, other public notification requirements will remain.

In summary, this smacks of classic "reduction of red tape" dear to the hearts of the Mike Harris/Doug Ford ideology—and instantly makes one word come to mind—Walkerton!

We will be submitting a response to the proposed regulatory changes. We hope other Islanders continue to support these efforts. We welcome input from folks who have experience with existing pesticides use. There is a group on Facebook Petition - To Change Ontario's Pesticide Act where you can post your experiences. With the support of the editors, we plan to post our draft response here prior to December 12.

Wiikwemkoong citizens who served honoured with 21-gun salute

WIIKWEMKOONG—A chilly day greeted the dozens of people who came to take part in a ceremony marking Aboriginal Veterans Day at the Wiikwemkoong cenotaph last Friday, November 8, at which the attendees paused to reflect on the significance of the day and give their thanks to the community's last-surviving World War II veteran, Scotty Fisher.

Wiikwemkoong band councillor Margaret (Tish) Manitowabi welcomed everyone on behalf of chief and council as the sun began to peek through the cloud cover and offer much-appreciated warmth. She referred to the names listed on the war memorial as a testament to the people who decided to fight for freedom.

"All of these people here didn't have to go, but they went for us,' she said.

Following a recitation of In Flanders Fields, Mr. Fisher's grandson read the story of the

veteran's life. He was 17 when he enlisted, having lied about his age and changing his last name in order to enlist. He signed up to become a paratrooper while in training at Shiloh, Manitoba.

On Christmas Day, 1944, he was sent overseas.

Maggie King-Roi spoke next and described the pin she created to honour First Nations, Inuit and Métis veterans who had to sacrifice a particularly large amount to serve in the armed forces.

They were equals on the battlefield as soldiers, but when they came home, equality didn't exist. They couldn't join the Legion,' said Ms. King-Roi. She added that they had to give up their Indian Status if they enlisted, and when they returned home it was not reinstated. They also were denied the right to vote.

"I didn't want anyone to forget," she said.

Mr. Fisher offered few words at the public ceremony, but the words he spoke seemed to resonate deeply with those gathered.

"Canada is the greatest place in the world and we're very proud," said Mr. Fisher.

Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha had come from Toronto to attend the Wiikwemkoong event and offered a few words on the occasion, followed by prepared remarks by Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes, which were read by Ms. Manitowabi because Ms. Hughes could not attend.

The people who served Canada from Wiikwemkoong were then honoured with a 21-gun salute by the Sergeant Charles Golden Silver Star Rifle Team, led by Richard Wayne Golden. Many of the members were wearing medicine pouches—the rifle team members were adopted into the community of Aundeck Omni Kaning at a ceremony last year, though Mr. Golden had already been welcomed into the community at an earlier gathering.

There was a heavy silence that hung between the three rounds of rifle blasts, offering a moment to pause and reflect on the sacrifices made by so many brave people so many years ago.

Following the salute, the community members were welcome to meet the uniformed individuals who helped conduct the ceremony, as well as Mr. Fisher. The community reconvened on Remembrance Day for another opportunity to remember the lives lost to the horrors of war, and to reflect that those sacrifices might one day be needed again.

Trial continues for trio charged in OPP union executive fraud

ORILLIA—The trial of former Little Current resident Martin Bain and two other former senior executive members of the Ontario Provincial Police Association (OPPA) continued at the Ontario Superior Court in Orillia on Tuesday, November 5 with all three accused vehemently denying the charges. Mr. Bain served as an OPP officer in Little Current for a number of years.

The three senior members of the OPPA, Karl Walsh of Bradford West Gwillimbury, James Christie of Midland and Mr. Bain, now of Oro-Medonte and formerly of Little Current are standing trial in Ontario Superior Court in Orillia.

A 2015 filed affidavit lists allegations of suspicious financial transactions including the purchase of a condominium in the Bahamas and a \$100,000 wire transfer to the Cayman Islands for a "high risk" investment.

The defendants maintain that, while "unorthodox," their purchase of a

travel agency five years ago (allegedly financed partially with union funds) was for the benefit of the membership. "We were looking forward to it coming to fruition," stated Mr. Bain during his testimony before the jury.

The prosecution has alleged that the trio tried to hide the purchase from other union board members, using their highranking positions to drive union business to the travel agency. Co-accused lawyer Andy McKay and businessman Francis Chantiam also bought shares in the travel agency at the heart of contention. Both have denied any wrongdoing.

Mr. Christie asserted that the OPPA had become the best in the province, having negotiated positive contracts and pension benefits for their 10,000 members, but asserted that there was a "gap in the complete package" stemming from a lack of a travel service offering good rates for both corporate and personal travel for not only the OPPA members and their families, but all first responders. Mr. Christie went on to say that it "made perfect sense."

The trio denied any attempt to conceal anything from the board, maintaining that they made the purchase on behalf of the OPPA, using in part their own funds which they anticipated being refunded once they had the approval of the full board. Both Mr. Christie and Mr. Bain maintained that they intended to present the plan to the full board in the spring once all due diligence was complet-

Prosecutor Robert Hubbard questioned Mr. Christie over a 2014 text indicating that a return was not anticipated before the next two to five years. Mr. Christie's reply was

that "it means what it says.'

Crown witness Klara Kozak, a third partner who was hired to run the agency, claimed in her testimony that Mr. Christie had suggested that the purchase should be kept "to ourselves." Mr. Christie denied that that conversation took place.

Challenged that the purchase would have been a tough sell to the rest of the board, Mr. Christie maintained that the three of the executives were the main executive decision makers for the board. Despite there being five other members of the board, Mr. Christie pointed out that this was how they had managed "other successful

tures" on behalf of the OPPA.

Mr. Bain and Mr. Christie characterized themselves as "out of the box thinkers" and while their methods might have seemed unorthodox and unconventional, maintained their actions were above board and that there was no attempt at deception.

The former union officials also described the impact the arrests had on their lives. Mr. Bain recalled the terror of facing the barrels of numerous guns when uniformed officers arrived at his home in 2015 bearing a search warrant.

Northeast Town council approves Tim Hortons site plan agreement

LITTLE CURRENT—At the Northeast Town's first November meeting, council approved a site plan agreement with Streetwise Holdings for a 2,745 square foot Tim Hortons franchise which will be located at 45 Manitowaning Road in Little Current.

Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson explained to council that the municipality has site plan control which means that the concerns town's addressed when it comes to such matters as traffic flow. buffer zones, layout and parking. Each department receives a copy of the site plan agreement and is asked to comment, he further noted.

'If approved by council it (the site plan agreement) then gets registered on title and the plan must be adhered to," Williamson added.

Mr. Williamson walked council through the plan, noting that the entry and exit point is from Manitowaning Road. He pointed to an area to the extreme right of the property that would be used for temporary snow storage and noted a loading zone. Drainage will tie into the Draper Street storm sewer system, he added.

Council approved the Streetwise Holdings site plan agreement with the caveat that an additional handicap parking spot be added.

There were a number of residents in the audience Monday night, eager to hear the news of the longrumoured Tim Hortons.

Terry and Myrna Aelick of Draper Street said they had no objections to the nearby Tim Hortons, nor did Bruce Burnett or Gary Green, who were also in attendance.

Zak Nicholls, who lives on Draper Street with his partner and four young children, said he did have concerns with the Tim Hortons that will be located directly across the street. He told The Expositor he felt frustrated with the inability to ask questions of council or to cite concerns until after the fact. He said he had been trying to find answers to rumoured franchise for quite some time but couldn't find answers because it was not yet public knowledge. He said he would still try, but felt it was a fait accompli.

"I have no problem at all with the business," he stressed, "but I'm disappointed that I can't do anything. What is this going to do to an area that's already busy?" he asking, pointing to Little Current Public School located just a short walk away.

Mr. Nicholls said he hoped, at the very least, council would move to place sidewalks on Draper Street.

"My concerns are with congestion and kids walking," Mr. Nicholls added.



...elder who suffered abuse from Wiikwemkoong clergy

from his childhood trauma to become a well-respected elder within his community who performs ceremonies and offers guidance

He agreed to speak with The Expositor and publicly share his story in the hopes that it may offer strength to others who have lived with similar trauma for decades. Mr. Eshkawkogan invited anyone who may be suffering to contact him for spiritual strength.

In last week's story, Mr. Eshkawkogan described how he began working in forestry and eventually got married. That marriage ended in divorce and he began experiencing

At that time, he was working near Ignace in Northern Ontario and had turned to alcohol as a temporary coping method for his mental illness. He realized that he needed a change in his life so he visited a seer in Sudbury who told Mr. Eshkawkogan that he needed to reconnect with the Anishinaabe way.

'She told me that I needed to come back to my grass roots level, to be with the elders. That's when I started my journey to where I am now, for understanding what was my purpose," said Mr. Eshkawkogan.

He returned to Wiikwemkoong and turned to elders for guidance. Mr. Eshkawkogan attended traditional ceremonies and eventually began to be mentored by an elder to lead ceremonies. He started helping with opening ceremonies and aided in sweat lodges. Before long, Mr. Eshkawkogan became a sweat lodge conductor and a pipe

But being surrounded by traditional healing was not enough to get him the answers he needed.

"I had all these tools in regards to (ceremonies), but I still didn't know what the meaning of spirituality was," said Mr.

It was then that he looked deeper within himself and found a way to heal, even though it was difficult.

'I started realizing that in order to move forward, what I needed to do was realize what took place in my own life stage at that child age. I had to let go of that," he said.

He began to think of his parents' internal struggles and what drove them to alcoholism, to their own pain and their eventual separation. While their individual problems certainly impacted Mr. Eshkawkogan's own life, he had to let them go because they were not his struggles to bear.

"Their mission with me was to bring me into this world and to take care of me until a certain age when I could look after myself," he said. "I'm pretty sure they did the best that they could do. It's like that with a lot of families, especially the First Nation communities, there's always that disconnection within families. But times have changed in regards to helping each other."

Learning to let go of the past was a powerful gift.

"That was one of the greatest things the Creator gave me, was to understand forgiveness. And to know that in order for me to move forward with that, I had to learn to forgive

myself at first," said Mr. Eshkawkogan. "And to be able to find the truth of me and the truth of what happened ... and acknowledging that that's what happened and it wasn't (my) fault."

He said his journey to redemption was difficult and that he understood why other victims may be afraid to acknowledge what happened to them, especially if they did not know the process to find their own answers.

"It's hard for some of our (community's) victims to move forward," said Mr. Eshkawkogan. "You have to start somewhere, and bringing the truth out is the first step of understanding, believing and acknowledging that incident.'

Father Epoch's body was buried in Wiikwemkoong several years before any of his crimes were ever reported to police. Mr. Eshkawkogan said he feels the grave site offers an opportunity.

"There's a reason why that person was buried in our cemetery, in our lands, and I think that's just to keep everything in check in regards to what really happened is true. So, as long as (Father Epoch) is there, the truth will always be opened up. That's my own perspective with it," he said.

Mr. Eshkawkogan's reconciliation process has led him to wonder if the abusers did the same before their deaths.

"Did (Brother Hinton) let go? Did he say sorry for anything before he died? Did he say sorry to himself before he died, or even just to the universe, to say 'I'm sorry for what I've done?" wondered Mr. Eshkawkogan.

In the past, discussions of the responsibility of these crimes have included blame on the Jesuits and the Diocese of Sault Ste. Marie for employing someone who was allegedly known to have been abusive, as well as the chief and council who allowed these men to practice in their community. Mr. Eshkawkogan said he has moved beyond casting blame and hatred, but that those groups still have

an important responsibility in this matter.

'Our people need a little more support," he said, "at least an acknowledgement that this happened, or this is how they're going to accept that."

Mr. Eshkawkogan said he could understand the difficulty of acknowledging past traumatic experiences.

Sharing a story is sometimes very hard for people that's gone through traumatization, in regards to their childhood," he said, adding that he hoped sharing his own experiences might give others the strength to begin their own

"I use my bundle to help people with their purpose, to be able to find their own balance, their own method of forgiveness and method of moving on, moving forward," said Mr. Eshkawkogan. "That was my destiny, I guess, in regards for helping people. Because I had to learn how to help myself."

Mr. Eshkawkogan encouraged anyone who has been affected by the Jesuits named in the current lawsuit to reach out to an elder, such as himself, to begin seeking spir-

"A lot of people still need help and that's my purpose, to do that. How you help is by giving empowerment to the people that are going through that emotional, mental stress, to give them the empowerment that they can change that. That's a gift that was presented to me by my pipe," he said.

Although some community members are reluctant to acknowledge that the problem exists, Mr. Eshkawkogan said he wished strength and courage for everyone affected

"I'm hoping my brothers and sisters will be able to open up their minds in regards for the knowledge that they carry within from their own incident, and to be able to share that in a good way so they can start healing, because it's a slow process," he said.

The Expositor will be following the new developments in this case as more information becomes available, as well as sharing stories and past records that bring context to the crimes of Father George Epoch, Brother Norman Hinton and Brother O'Meare from their time in Wiikwemkoong.

planning authorities, the MPB and the Northeast Town) and the Provincial Policy Statement at the provincial level. A zoning bylaw must conform to the Official Plan which in turn must meet provincial standards.

If there's an application process (for example, a request in a change of zoning from residential to commercial), residents in the surrounding area would be notified and asked to comment before a decision is made.

The Official Plan is intended to be an overarching plan for planning with an eye to the next 20 years, Ms. Carlisle

"It's a guideline, but every zoning bylaw has to conform," she reiterated.

The Northeast Town, which has its own planning authority, created its Official Plan three years ago through public consultation.

Last Tuesday night the Northeast Town council reviewed the Tim Hortons site plan. The town's CAO Dave Williamson explained that site plans

are meant to be looked at with a view of the impact on the area.

In this particular case, "restaurants are commercial and are clearly allowed," the CAO said.

When asked about the perceived lack of input on such a decision, Mr. Williamson reminded residents that the plans were developed at the public level and that the councillors, officials elected by the taxpayers, are there to be the voice of their community and make those decisions.

Hunters can exchange some meat for free butchering

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-Health Centre's Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing (Turtle Island Roots) program is preparing for the second year of its Harvest to Share program and organizer Courtney Kurek said she is looking forward to working with hunters to exchange butchering services for some of their meat.

"Harvest to Share is built to be reflective of the tradition of sharing the gifts of the harvest with the collective mindset that has shaped and sustained the Indigenous Peoples for years. The initiative relies on community connections to build awareness and interest in contributing to Harvest to Share," said Ms. Kurek, the Indigenous foods co-ordinator at Noojmowin Teg.

Harvest to Share is a program that allows hunters to donate 1/3 of their animals



exchange for one-third of the animal's meat. The meat is distributed to elders registered with the program or used for ceremonies

to the program. There is no preference on which parts of the animal are given away; that decision is made by the hunters and butcher. In exchange for the free meat, Turtle Island Roots will cover the full costs of butchering services. In addition to hunted game, the program also welcomes

fish, berries and other wild foods throughout the year.

"We use the meat for workshops and distribute it to households through a referral system. reached 2,000 people with the meat that was donated last year and we've just run out of meat so our freezers are pretty empty," said Ms.

good we went all of our stock and made room for our donations to come in shortly,' she said, adding that the program has already been promised parts of a moose and a deer at this time.

The program began when Noojmowin Teg's child nutrition program coordinator Cody Leeson received community feedback that he should include more traditional wild foods in his workshops.

Later, Noojmowin Teg received grant funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Local Poverty Reduction Fund that created projects which are today known as the Manitoulin Community Fresh Food Initiative and Turtle Island Roots.

"Mshiikenh Mnis Weniiing is a specialized branch within Local Food Manitoulin that focuses on revi-

ing the frustrations of Northern Ontarians," he said. "Extremely disappointed in the Northern MPPs from the Conservative government who were not present for discussion and the vote on this bill." He pointed out that while in opposition, those same members were very vocal over the lack of maintenance and the lack of snowplows.

In a statement released on Wednesday on the eve of the second reading of the bill, Mr. Fedeli said the government "recognizes that the winter months pose significant challenges for drivers. That's why we have some

of the highest winter maintenance standards in North America.'

Mr. Fedeli went on to say that the current winter service level on the two Northern Ontario highways "is based on the number of vehicles that use the highways in the winter, their proximity to cities and the fact that they are part of the Trans-Canada network.'

In opposition, Mr. Fedeli rose to castigate the Liberal government in 2014 for the "disgraceful" state of the winter road maintenance in the North. Mr. Fedeli had gone on to cite municipal resolutions calling on the provincial government to restore the level of

maintenance and adding that the municipalities "also want the Ministry of Transportation to undertake the evaluation and potential reclassification of all provincial highways to ensure adequate road maintenance and to ensure that contractors consistently maintain provincial highways to the standard that ensures continued public safety." At the time the Conservatives had claimed the Liberals had reduced maintenance levels to save \$36 million.

"It's funny how things have changed now that they are in government." remarked Mr. Mantha.

M'Chigeeng First Nation where her company, OneKwe Modern Fabrication, has operated for the past four years. Her recently completed 1,500 square foot shop is equipped for welded and computer-aided design (CAD) and computer numerical control (CNC) plasma cut metalwork and shaped wood, producing modern furniture, custom fabrication and sculptures.

Ms. Corbiere first became interested in creating metal/wood sculptures, furniture and other pieces when she was learning welding as a trade about six years ago. "I just started creating a few pieces of furniture and it seemed to keep going and going," she told Waubetek.

OneKwe's products range from living room-size tables and shelves to exterior signage, wall art and so much more. Ms. Corbiere just finished a 20-foot gate for a new home on Manitoulin as well as a couple of dining tables in the shop right now. Her work can be found at the McEwen School of Architecture in Sudbury, Canada 150, as well as in front of many local homes and businesses. A 14-foot concrete and metal sculpture at 4elements Living Art in Kagawong is most impressive.

"Tourists come to Manitoulin and they will purchase things and take them home," Ms. Corbiere said, demonstrating OneKwe's broad appeal.

Her advice for Indigenous entrepreneurs is to start small but to think big. "Set your business apart from others by being different," Ms. Corbiere told Waubetek. "Don't try and imitate another's, but offer something new to people, whether it be a product or service. Stick with your ideas and don't be afraid to make mistakes.'

This was Ms. Corbiere's first time to the Waubetek awards gala and she told The Expositor she was honoured to have been recognized. It's been a banner year for Ms. Corbiere with her first year in her new shop and being named as Youth Entrepreneur of the Year. She said she was humbled to have been listed along with some very talented people from across Waubetek's catchment area. "There are a lot of people who are very deserving of this award," she said.

Ms. Corbiere thanked Waubetek for the accolade and spoke highly of the business development corporation.

Over 20 years ago Ben Kanasawe and his son Peter started Buzwah Fisheries, located on the eastern side of Manitowaning Bay on the Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory. It was a modest beginning, raising rainbow trout with four 40x40-foot net pens.

"When we first started, we didn't have much equipment, we were doing everything by hand," Mr. Kanasawe told

Once he proved that he could make his idea work, more modern equipment such as fish counters, automatic feeders, underwater ROVs (remotely operated vehicles) and fish pumps were acquired. Soon Mr. Kanasawe was able to expand his operation to two sites of 16 50x50-foot net pens. The operation is now a significant area employer, with a staff of 18 looking after the fish seven days a week throughout the year.

Mr. Kanasawe has always been conscious of his environmental responsibilities and has done water quality testing since he started his business and, in 2015, the entrepreneur decided that his business should become certified for Best Aquaculture Practices (BAP). BAP is an international

third-party certification system that verifies environmentally and socially responsible processes under which farmed fish and crustaceans are produced. He continues to submit monthly water samples from Manitowaning Bay in order to ensure quality and undergoes inspections on his

"Buzwah Fisheries would have never gotten its start without the support of the Wiikwemkoong chief and council," he said. "Waubetek has always been there to lend a hand as well, whether it was workshops, networking or information resources.'

Mr. Kanaswe and Buzwah Fisheries are well-respected in the aquaculture industry so his closing advice, where he stresses perseverance, is well worth noting: "Whenever I had a setback over the years, each time I got up and pushed back harder. A setback is just an opportunity for you to learn from your mistakes and grow; so as long as you're working hard for what you want, you can't go wrong.

The Waubetek gala also featured Indigenous music artists the Red Man Singers, Niibishens Trudeau, Chief Guy Monague, Chief Scott McLeod and The Lohrwoods.



"Larry definitely deserves this award," said Mr. Lentir. "It's an honour to be selected for this induction. The Great Northern Opry originated 30 years ago to acknowledge Northern Ontario entertainers and

musicians that do not normally get this time of recognition in the country music business."

"With his many years in music and having grown up in a musical family, the (Manitoulin Island) committee felt it was fitting that he be the next musician from the Island to be inducted."

Mr. Karn said that following his nomination for induction, earlier this year, "I was trying to remember when I first got into music; I guess it was when I was 10 and got a guitar. My dad played the violin and mom played the piano and they had a band when I was growing up. Their idea of a party was to get everyone together and play music. They instilled music in me."

'We had a little band in high school," continued Mr. Karn, who added, "I've been around so long I have recordings on vinyl. In high school, our little band-which

included Randy and Keith Guy, Ted Delange and Ron Stringer-did a record-

ing."
"After that I played in a band with Barry Williamson, Jeff Pyette and a guy named Mike Passorelli. We played for a while, split up and moved on in our lives, getting married and having kids," continued Mr. Karn.

"I had seen Double Barrel play a couple of times, I remember

once they were in the Providence Bay arena and asked if I could sing with them. And I kept hinting for a while that I would like to play with them," he said, noting the band is made up of Jeff Gilmore, Jeff Pyette and Barry Williamson. "I don't know how many years I've been with the band-about five or six years now—and we're still going."

The band still practices once a week and play several shows each year.

As for the ride up in the bus to Sault Ste. Marie and those who travelled from Manitoulin to be at the induction, "I was amazed at the number of people that showed up. We had a bus full and we had a great time on the bus playing music and signing. There was another 50-60 more people that drove up on their own to be there. It was amazing.

Mr. Lentir added, "again this year we would like to thank everyone from the district for their tremendous support of the Northern Opry, who buy tickets and take the bus up to the Sault to support our honourees. We wouldn't be able to go on without this support."

...continued from page 8 system this year because there's a different look to the team. Once we get a hang of that, I think we're going to be real competitive."

Just as he had remarked last year, Mr. Meeker says the dynamic between the players is just as strong and connected as last year's team, something they could prove on the hours-long road trips to play games in Sudbury.

The defence of this year's team is shaping up to be a strong force and Mr. Meeker says he has six strong players in that position.

"I told the defence from day one that I want them to be offence-minded, to jump into the play whenever they can; I think we can do that this year. Some of our defensive players are good skaters and good puck handlers, and I want them to put pressure on the other teams," says Mr. Meeker.

At a recent east-west tournament, Mr. Meeker had the first chance to see the girls in action. They only had one practice before the showdown. Their first match was against Bishop Carter.

"They're one of our real competitors and are always right at the top with us. It was a really close, good game. They beat us 2-1 after a flukey goal at the end, but it was really even," he says.

The second game was against the titans on the Lo-Ellen team which ended in a big fall for the Mustangs of 7-0.

"It was obvious when we played them that they were good, even though they're missing four or five AA midget players. They're going to be really strong and I don't think they'll have much fun in this league," says Mr. Meeker.

The Mustangs have

recently faced down Espanola. Mr. Meeker describes them as a 'scrappy' team and, while his girls rarely get into kerfuffles, the times that they do are generally when playing Espanola. There was a brawl at the game that saw three girls with injuries and two that got ejected from the match.

"Nobody was hurt. Our girls threw a few punches but they kept their gloves on," says Mr. Meeker. It was a close game as well but ended in a 3-1 defeat for the Mustangs.

"Espanola had one really good player who I don't think they had last year. She scored two quick ones on us before we made the adjustments to shut her down," he says.

Espanola's goalie is known for being among the best in the league and despite the challenges of losing so many players and being down on the scoreboard, Mr. Meeker says his girls responded very well to the last-minute changes to deal with the circumstances, including playing shorthanded and double-shifting players.

"For us, we've got to work on getting goals every way we can—deflections, rebounds; we don't score a whole lot of end-toend rushes," says Mr. Meeker.

Although last year's powerhouse team is unlikely to be repeated at any point in the foreseeable future, Mr. Meeker says he is very optimistic about the prospects of this year's group.

"They're a smart bunch and they listen, so I think we're going to improve quite quickly," he says. "It's going to be really fun to watch how they improve and get better as the year goes on. For me, at least, that's the fun."

Mr. Meeker concludes by saying he is excited for what this season will bring.

"I don't think they're going to disappoint. It's going to be a fun year and, if anything, we've got the potential to improve even more than last year's team," he says. "We're going to beat teams with even more talent because we're going to be disciplined and play the system well. I've got a lot of confidence in them."

He began with consultations with a very large group of organizations, businesses and institutions, noting that there are over 1,020 of these on Manitoulin and that UMIT seeks to enable residents to access shopping and schools and to keep appointments. medical Some of the organization's constituents include KTEI, LAMBAC, First Nations, Health Sciences North, the

Tourism and others.

UMIT reached out to transportation consultants and hired Wally Beck to do a feasibility study pertaining to bus transit on Manitoulin. Mr. Beck is the president of Transit Consulting Network and has 43 years of experience in the field as well as 23 years of municipal experience.

Mr. Beck found that there

are many issues relating to

the lack of public transit. These include not being able to accept a job, being fired for missing time, that students cannot access tourist industry jobs during the summer or stay for afterschool programs, and hitchhiking does not guarantee that a worker will arrive at the job site on time. Mr. Beck also found that the biggest deterrent to securing employees for the food producer industry was reliable public transportation. Mr. Beck, along with Mr. Dumas, submitted an application for Ontario government funding grants under the municipality of Central Manitoulin. The Provincial Transportation Grant Program is an initiative of the Ministry of Transportation (MTO). This is a five-year program providing \$30 million in total funding to municipalities across the province to plan, implement and operate community transportation services in their community. UMIT was successful in securing the local transit grant of \$500,000 over five years but was denied the \$1.5 million grant for long distance travel as ONTC was already providing that service. In terms of other funding, Mr. Beck mentioned that revenue can be secured through such avenues as advertising on bus benches, transport of groceries and parcels and funds from the Ontario government's dedicated gas tax rebate. (This is for two cents per litre of gas and is based on 70 percent ridership and 30 percent population.) Figures cited show that Espanola received \$12,870 in gas rebate money for 2016while Cochrane received \$30,352 for the same period. Mr. Beck also told UMIT committee members recently that he believed the other government funds for

Islanders who took the ONTC buses were not happy with the long rides of almost three hours with two loops of Manitoulin done each day, connecting twice to Sudbury. The UMIT committee is looking at having two key hubs, Gore Bay and Mindemoya, but also travelling from Manitowaning into Little Current and using existing transportation vehicles such as taxis and the Angel Bus to get people to the main route stops such as M'Chigeeng.

As Barbara Bright of Kagawong had suggested at a West End transit meeting, perhaps there could be a direct route from Gore Bay to Little Current with feeder buses coming in from other areas to hook up with the main bus. This is what Mr. Beck's feasibility study had suggested.

Mr. Beck's study report had a key component of community engagement and this involved one-on-one interviews, research of existing transportations modes, an online survey and was also presented to the Manitoulin Municipal Association, the municipalities, the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) and also to Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territo-

The feasibility study had other key parts including the role reliable transportation can play for residents to age in place. It noted that public transit provides an opportunity to break the isolation barrier for seniors who have no means of moving about and it can also generate a sense of fulfillment for the mobility challenged and people with disabilities.

In September, UMIT met with Nathalie Lanthier, a development officer with the Ontario Co-operative Association (OCA). The mandate of this organization states that the OCA has been the leading association for economic, social and community development in Ontario. It achieves this by allowing co-operatives to consult and advance their interests and OCA supports their development. Ms. Lanthier spoke of the success of co-operatives in Ontario and suggested the multi-stakeholder model, which UMIT has agreed to. This business model gives UMIT access to grants and would be not-for-profit which would allow any profit to be reinvested in providing service. It would include the bus and taxi services and community organizations.

At the present time, Mr. Dumas is in consultation with AJ Bus Lines, the transit service provider for Manitoulin. ONTC was asked if they would provide bus service from Espanola to Little Current. They responded that on-demand service will be in place through taxi service and ONTC will ticket right through to the Little Current site, Mr. Dumas wants to ensure that bus transportation to Birch Island is also in place and will discuss this with the board of directors. He also reiterated that Gore Bay and Mindemoya are the starting points for transit and that UMIT will

have to look into the Wiikwemkoong situation for busing as this community was the highest user of the ONTC buses.

He is also working on UMIT bylaws with OCA and will file papers for incorporation as soon as the founding directors sign the necessary documents at the upcoming meeting November 21. The directors are Guy Dumas, Angel Bus coordinator Sandy Cook, KTEI student support counsellor Christine Sarbo, Wiikwemkoong representative Rose Shawanda and Mindemoya representative Betty Bardswich. Municipality of Central Manitoulin councillor Steve Shaffer remains on the UMIT committee.

Mr. Dumas has accepted the end of March rollout for the Island bus system, but is hoping to do a practice run in January.

...continued from page 1 be adjoined to the Mindemova War Memorial Community Hall and will provide accessibility to both.

The draft capital operating plan shown to council shows total project capital expenditures slated at \$15,185,908. The Central Manitoulin loan payment will be based on the principal amount of \$3,550,082 at a 3.07 percent amortized rate over 25 years. Operating costs have been figured at \$6 per square foot with the facility to be 45,000 square feet.

Councillor Dale Scott said he was concerned that the contingency cost was projected at 25 percent. Central Manitoulin municipal co-ordinator Brad Christanthat this amount should be

Council then discussed the cost of upgrading the existing arenas and the Old School with Councillor Steve Shaffer saying that engineering reports going back to 2015 for the Providence Bay arena and recently, the Mindemoya arena, show the combined totals are \$4.3 million for accessibility and structural upgrades. Mayor Stephens noted that the cost is the same amount for the municipality for the upgrades and for the new facility.

"How are we going to spend it?" he asked. "Brand new or patch the existing facilities?"

Councillor Shaffer

son responded by saying responded by saying he had wanted to know if the municipality could afford to run and maintain the new facility. He therefore went ahead to say that he wanted to put forward a motion to proceed with the grant submission.

Mayor Stephens then said, "Even if we do get approval of the funds, it's no guarantee that we are going to proceed," adding that council would do what is beneficial to the community. Councillor Derek Stephens took issue with this, saying, "I disagree. If we get the funds, I think we should proceed. Why would we not proceed?" adding that the multi-plex would last for the next 30 to 50 years and would improve the community.

Councillor Dale Scott noted that council could only afford to retrofit one arena, saying, "Funds would not have covered more than one arena.'

Council Al Tribinevicius asked if the NHL-size ice surface was the correct way to go as international arenas are larger and Mr. Christanson answered in the affirmative. The International Ice Hockey Federation is actually looking at moving its venues to NHLsize rinks, he explained.

Councillor Tribinevicius then said, "I am in favour of proceeding.'

The vote was called with Councillor Stephens asking for a recorded vote. Council voted unanimously to proceed with the application for the grant

for a Mindemoya multi-plex facility.

The Town of Gore Bay and the Northeast Town are also seeking funds through Infrastructure Canada's Investing in Canada Plan.

As reported by the Manitoulin West Recorder, Tulloch Engineering provided an estimate for renovations to the Gore Bay arena, and a new chiller, with a preliminary estimated cost of \$618,000. This would include repairs to the foundation walls and replacement of floor slabs, investigation into existing pier foundations, reinforcing the lobby roof framing including new roofing and structural upgrades and roof repair where damages at the ice resurfacer and refrigeration plant have been uncovered.

Gore Bay has received support for this project from neighbouring municipalities Billings, Gordon-Barrie and, council is hopeful, Burpee and Mills.

The Northeast Town is also applying in the hopes of receiving funds for a 60-x 50-foot addition to the recreation centre. The addition would house an indoor children's play area and exercise and walking area for senior citizens.

talizing and enhancing existing connections with the knowledge and nourishment that these food sources have to share," said Ms. Kurek.

Some initiatives within Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing in the past year have included ice fishing, wild edible walks and cooking demonstrations, maple syrup tours, staghorn sumac harvesting and a hunt camp in partnership with land-based recovery program Gwekwaadziwin Miikan.

Having a source of meat available for ceremonies and those who could not otherwise gather it on their own has proven to be invaluable on Manitoulin Island, according to

"We've been getting great feedback. People are really excited that they're receiving meat and we have elders in the community who say they haven't eaten moose and deer in 20 years because they're too old and have no family that could share their hunt. They're really grateful to be receiving this meat," she said.

Those looking to receive some of the harvested meat can get a referral through Ms. Kurek or a health professional. In addition to gathering food sources, Ms. Kurek said the program will be collecting hides. This is for a hopeful

future brain tanning workshop which is scheduled to be held over the winter.

"We just want to make sure the entire animal gets used and there's nothing going to waste, so if (hunters) want to drop off their hide they should contact us," said Ms.


MCFFI and Mshiikenh Mnis Wenjiing will soon be merging under a unified umbrella of "Local Food Manitoulin," a program that is designed to carry their work forward after the funding for the programs expires in 2020.

"Food is life and the Local Food Manitoulin movement is supporting people to harvest food from the forests, fields and freshwater and cultivate food sources at home and within the wider community," said Ms. Kurek.

The new website for the program, LocalFoodManitoulin.com, will be launching soon and will feature past and future events, a local food calendar and recipes.





I am a public speaker for the Threads of Life. In your honor and in your memory Brent, I tell your story, our story of our life without you, trying to raise increased awareness of the importance of coming home safe from the job.

What can we expect to see within our lifetimes?

Climate change is happening quickly enough that some of us alive today may see a very different world if we make it close to the end of the century. Even for folks who won't be around then, climate change will be a part of your life-indeed it is affecting us already.

We've all seen the headlines from around the world about heat waves, forest fires, flooding, crop failure, sea level rise, glacial melt and stronger hurricanes. People are dying as climate change exacerbates some problems and creates others anew. Sadly, these effects tend to worsen inequality since marginalized people are often more vulnerable.

While Manitoulin Island is probably better situated in terms of climate impacts than some parts of the world, we are by no means immune. Locals already noticed declines in certain fish species, while at the same time unwanted species like disease-bearing ticks are moving in. The latter is happening because of warmer winters, which could also cause more freezing rain, potentially leading to accidents. On average, we're expected to have less snow, but more precipitation on an annual basis. However, this





doesn't mean that there will be more water-evaporation likely will outstrip precipitation, leading to potential moisture stress in farmers' fields.

Some of these challenges can be managed if we plan properly in advance. Others may be more difficult to keep in check, such as increased risk for a major forest fire—Manitoulin is already long overdue. Fluctuating water levels may become the norm, rather than a slow-moving pseudocycle. While long-term it's more likely that the Great Lakes levels will go down, no climate models can predict this with certainty depending on where precipitation increased falls, we could also experience periods of higher lake levels. Heat waves and severe storms are also on the rise.

All of these are just the physical effects. The situation starts looking worse when considering the ripple effects we might feel, socially and economically, impacted areas such as our own should be ready to take in people leaving other places; as situations worsen mass migration may increase.


