Over \$2 million in federal government funding announced for Manitoulin area

MANITOULIN-It was a whirlwind trip of the District of Manitoulin for Sudbury Liberal MP Paul Lefebvre last week as he brought good news funding announcements to the tune of over \$2 million on behalf of the Government of Canada.

On Thursday, MP Lefebyre attended the youth and elders' centre in Whitefish River First Nation (WRFN) to announce three Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program (CIP 150)

In a press release from the federal government, CIP 150 grants are "designed to leave a lasting legacy by supporting the rehabilitation or improvement of existing community infrastructure assets and facilities across the country that promote community and cultural benefits for the public." Fed-Nor is the agency responsible for delivering the CIP 150 program in Northern Ontario.

Dennis McGregor emceed the event that also saw boys from Shawanosowe School's Grade 5/6 class on hand to welcome the MP and give their thanks for a CIP 150

grant for \$88,000 that will rehabilitate the community's all-season recreational facility for both ice and ball hockey. This winter the outdoor rink will see a refurbished concrete slab surface, new rink boards and increased insulation and electric heat installed in to the adjoining change room.

MP Lefebvre noted the importance outdoor rinks played in his childhood, and now for his three children. He was gifted by the students with WRFN 'swag' such as a WRFN Bobcats scarf and car flag.

The MP also announced \$95,784 for Wikwemikong to upgrade children's playground equipment at three separate sites, in addition to completing a youth skate park at a fourth venue.

Sagamok Anishnawbek First Nation was also in attendance to hear about the \$100,000 in CIP 150 funding announced for expansion

Island officers receive Commissioner's letter and St. John's Award for lifesaving attempts

NORTH BAY—The North East Region of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) presented many awards to honour citizens and OPP members, both uniform and civilian, who have demonstrated acts of bravery, lifesaving, community service and exemplary performance of duty at an October 28 ceremony held in North Bay. Length of service was also recognized. The award recipients included several OPP members from the Manitoulin Island detachment.

Among those receiving awards were Constable Robert Manley, Constable Patricia Smith and Sergeant Michael Patterson, who received an OPP Commissioner's letter and St. John Award for their lifesaving attempts in the case of a drowning victim earlier

The OPP citation explains, "on June 29, 2016 the three officers responded to a report of a drowning victim on Tobacco Lake in Gordon Township. The woman was not a swimmer and had waded out into the water with a pool

noodle to keep afloat. After a few minutes, her friend observed her slumped over the noodle with her face in the water."

"A bystander rushed into the water and began to perform artificial resuscitation," reads the OPP citation. "Sergeant Patterson arrived on scene and entered the water. He brought the woman to shore and checked for a pulse before initiating CPR. Constable Smith relieved Sergeant Patterson of chest compressions (on the victim). Constable Manley located the ambulance and directed them to the scene before continuing chest compressions in the ambulance en route to the hospital.'

"Today, we honour the efforts of these officers when attempting to save the woman's life," said OPP Commissioner Vince Hawkes in making the presenta-

The awards were presented by the OPP commissioner and Superintendent Fern Chief Labelle.

"I am very proud of these officers and their level of professionalism during this tragic event," Manitoulin Detachment Commander Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb told The Expositor. "They made every possible effort to preserve life in their lifesaving attempts. After the stress of the initial response, the officers spent several hours assisting the victim's family and the Coroner's office. They were very deserving of this prestigious award."

During the ceremonies, police exemplary service medals for 20 years' service were presented to Sergeant Michael Patterson and Detective Constable Stephen Redmond.

A Police Exemplary Service Medal 1st Bar for 30 years' service was presented to former Manitoulin OPP officer Dan Esposto, Constable David Millette (retired) and current Manitoulin OPP Staff Sergeant-Detachment Commander Kevin Webb.

Strobe-like tower lights at Goat Island make the council agenda

GOAT ISLAND—Following the Sunday, October 23 hydro outage many people driving the Highway 6 corridor from Little Current to Sheguiandah will have noticed bright strobe-like lights that flash every second—white during the day and red at night attached to the hydro tower line at Goat Island.

The lights have received much unwanted attention with calls coming into the Northeast Town municipal office. So many, in fact, it was to be discussed at Tuesday evening's council meet-

The Expositor reached out to Hydro One to ask about the need for such lights, especially as the new lights flash more often than those seen on the wind turbines.

"The navigational lights on the tower line were installed to adhere to Transport Canada reg-

ulations," Nancy Clark, a Hydro One media spokesperson, told The Expositor. "These regulations specify the position and brightness of the lights to ensure that the tower line remains visible at a range sufficient to permit a pilot to take appropriate action to avoid the tower and line.'

"The Transport Canada requirements on this crossing is different than those for wind turbines," Ms. Clark continued. "The lights on this crossing flash at a 60/min rate as opposed to 40/min for other applications. The reason is to warn the floater planes early on that they are approaching a catenary (overhead wire) crossing and there are hanging wires on their path."

Ms. Clark urged those with questions regarding the regulations to contact Transport Canada, "as they are the regulating

President Trump? The sky is likely to remain in place

So the unthinkable has come to pass and the great unwashed (read disenfranchised working class whites) of the American electorate have won the day. Reality television has been catapulted into the most powerful office on the planet and the weeping, wailing and lamentations of the left have begun—along with a number of riots and clashes between supporters of the president-elect and those who oppose his election to the highest post in the land.

Although Hillary Clinton won the popular vote, the American electoral college is designed to make the contest for president one of regional victories, rather than overall preference of the nation. This is quite common in federal systems and seeks to place a balance on the tyranny of the majority, but when the two are mismatched, as is fairly often the case, dissatisfaction is loudly voiced by the losers along with petitions and vows to "do away with the electoral college," but don't hold your breath.

Right now the "losers" of America are revelling in a victory that took the ruling elite, the winners of the globalized economy and the gated community of the American Dream, completely by surprise. It is their day in the sun.

There will be plenty of analysis and soul searching taking place over the next four years, but that in itself is a very good thing. The US system was built to withstand the seismic shocks that occasionally come from democracy and, nuclear launch codes notwithstanding, there is little reason to believe that the world will not continue to turn after Donald Trump takes office. It just might be a little hotter is all.

For a region which seems to be in a state of near constant recession, Manitoulin may well be largely insulated from the broader effects of the economic fallout of a more protectionist US policy. Certainly local beef farmers may be looking askance to the implications that tighter borders will affect, and other agricultural exports could be impacted, but we will be unlikely to lose our major manufacturing plants as they move south—because we don't have any.

The more likely impact might be the boomeranging home of our expat children if the economic fallout from potential trade wars come to pass.

But our ancestors have weathered isolation, drought, the War of 1812, Fenian raids, the Great Depression, world wars, low water, high water, Liberal governments, Conservative governments, NDP governments, the Great Recession and a host of other calamities that were touted to end the world as we know it. We are still here.

Not that the potential for an even worse calamity is not just around the corner, but chances are we will not see that coming.

If the predicted tide of US refugees does come to pass, Island property values could see a dramatic rise and American pop singers may come to dominate the JUNO Awards (comedy is safe, we seem to be dominating that portion of American culture already), but in general life will go on much as it has for the past several generations.

The environment seems set to take a nasty hit, with Mr. Trump's avowed disavowal of climate change and antipathy toward the Environmental Protection Agency, but we have been hammering the environment and the atmosphere since the advent of steam power and another four years will likely not make that much of a difference to our fate—it will remain bad.

Anxiety is rising across the globe, fueled by the immediacy of social media and the hysteria of youth. But as those who have weathered the Cold War's Sword of Damocles can attest, most of that effort

As a human being, Mr. Trump will be under tremendous psychological pressure within his own psyche to do a good job—because he knows that in four years America will be judging him at the table, they won't hesitate to take a page from his book to declare "you're fired.

Trump's very unCanadian path to victory

onald Trump won with flagrant positions in sharp contrast to Canada's on the issues of immigration, social justice and free

His narrow win also represents a new low in American sympathy for immigrants and the poor.

Social science surveys in both the United States and Canada have found that sympathy for the disadvantaged peaked about 50 years ago. Think Lyndon Johnson's Great Society and his War on Poverty. Think Lester Pearson's medicare and his Canada Pension Plan. Since their time, caring for others has declined steadily in both countries

Nevertheless, current surveys show that Canadians strongly favour government support for new immigrants and widely welcome Syrian refugees, including Muslims.

Trump opposed taking in any Syrians at all. He pandered to prejudice against Muslims, against Latinos, and particularly against black people, who make up the largest single group to benefit from Obamacare. In doing so, Trump pandered to racists who don't want public dollars to help "those people" get health care.

Although universal medicare is perhaps Canada's greatest source of national pride, surveys have shown that we are largely indifferent to poverty. We also care less about helping Native people than about help-

The new Trudeau government is rising above public opinion in its plans to help aboriginal people. And it has helped the poor with a multi-billion-dollar new child benefit. (It has "done good works by stealth," however, portraying the child benefit more as help for the middle class than as a reduction in child poverty.)

On trade, we signed a new free trade deal with Europe at exactly the

same time that Trump was winning votes in decaying factory towns by promising to kill the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Mexico was his main trade target, along with China, but Canada will lose thousands of jobs if he abrogates the NAFTA treaty. We will lose even more in any trade war that he starts.

More than anything else, Trump attracted both rural residents and the rearguard in the rust belt because they haven't shared the wealth that came from free trade. It was pretty much the same story in rural and backwater England when Britain chose Brexit over free trade with the European Union. That was another close vote marred by lies and

We can't be complacent here. Our income inequality is severe, though not quite as bad as in the United States and England. Ignoring it could well bring a backlash that would threaten human values we Canadians hold dear.

Young people may rise to the challenge of distributing wealth more equally for the great good of all. Exit polls show that they were the only age group to vote against Trump. That age group had fervently supported Bernie Sanders. Perhaps Sanders would have done better than Trump with the working families who suffered after NAFTA

Women usually support social programs more than men do. But for whatever reason, exit polls said that the majority of white women (53 percent) voted for Trump, the misogynist. Some say they cared more about family income than gender.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Mr. Anglin has followed politics in Canada, Britain and the United States for the last 50 years. As a civil servant he met freauently over the years with American officials. Mr. and Mrs. Anglin live on Belle Baie Lane on Lake Manitou near Mindemoya.

civics but does it go further to include interactions that could produce a deep understanding and appreciation for the democratic process? I asked to be able to speak to my son's class during the election (as a candidate and as a mother) and was denied by the principal with the explanation that I would be "campaigning." Given that none of the students were of voting age I thought that was a lame explanation. Was I denied because of school policy or bias? Are students aware of the production of knowledge?

We have a duty to develop engaged citizens so family also have to participate. Talking about how families are affected by policy is only part of it. What is most troubling is that the character of Donald Trump is now literally on stage as being powerful. Obama said, "if you want to know what someone is going to do, look at what they have done." We can give Trump his success as a business person even though he has had financial failures. It is his reported misogyny, cultural intolerance and racially motivated "law-and-order" that is most troubling.

However, the sun came up warm and bright on Wednesday in Espanola. I have a heavy heart for sure. But, voters always have the last say. Sure, we can have a good cry over the results, but I have faith that good prevails and so should America.

Man found dead on cross-country trek still remains unidentified

ALBERT—There have been no updates in the case of the 57-year-old man who was travelling across Canada by bike and canoe found dead along the shore of Lake Huron, near Port Albert, Ontario last month.

"I have nothing new to report," Constable Jamie Stanley, community services officer with the Huron County OPP, told The Expositor on Monday. "We are still getting lots of tips and hopefully there is a break in the case soon, but

there has still been no positive ID."

The deceased was travelling from Alberta to London, Ontario, via bike and canoe. He identified himself as Mitchell Nelson to The Expositor during his time on the Island in Sep-

An OPP spokesperson observed to The Expositor that the point where Mr. Nelson's body was found on the Lake Huron shore was only about an hour's paddle north of Grand Bend.

The body was found on a

beach north of Port Albert on Saturday, October 15 by civilians. The police previously told The Expositor that a post mortem exam was conducted on Monday (October 17) on the body. The cause of death was undetermined, but there is no evidence to indicate foul play. A search was conducted for his canoe and bicycle, but they have yet to be locat-

Investigators initially identified the body by contact information found on the deceased leading them to a reporter from SooToday.

The name 'Mitchell Nelson' has been run through many databases, but has proven unsuccessful.

Billings councillor Tom Imrie tenders resignation after six years on council

by Sharon Jackson KAGAWONG—"I didn't have an agenda when I joined council," stated Tom Imrie when he threw his hat in the political ring. "I wanted to give something back to the community by finding out what the community wanted, then work to achieve those goals." Mr. Imrie tendered his resignation during the last meeting of Billings council.

"I joined council as an appointed member in 2008 as a result of another member resigning due to health issues," Mr. Imrie continued. "I served two years and was re-elected in 2010 and again in 2014, for a total of eight years."

Prior to joining council, stated Mr. Imrie, "I was extremely interested in the history of Kagawong and Billings Township so I volunteered for the museum board as council's represen-

tative. I was also appointed to the Library Board, and the Community Policing Committee Advisory (CPAC), later served on the Provincial Offences Act Board of Management, and was elected chair of that

"Along with other council members I participated in the development of a Strategic Plan, which provided some concrete direction based on community input, and resulted in the formation of, among other things, the Waterfront Improvement Committee," he said. "Mayor Hunt and I were the council representatives on the committee and I was elected chair. I served in that capacity for two years until the final committee recommendations were approved by council, the grant applications were submitted, and council assumed responsibility for the project through the committee of the whole. As of now, my understanding is we are in the second stage of the funding agencies approval process.

"During my service on the museum board we were given the opportunity to investigate the acquisition of the Kagawong lighthouse, and the board worked with council to develop a business plan to purchase the building and use it as a tourism destination," he added. "Several challenges were faced during the process including reluctance of some council members to invest in the property but as it stands now we are on track to finalize the purchase.'

"One of the takeaways from the strategic plan," stated Mr. Imrie, "was the community interest in establishing Kagawong as an arts and culture centre.

This coincided with the land side development that is included in the Waterfront Improvement Project. LAMBAC approached the township

about sponsoring an arts

Mr. Imrie was asked to be the township representative along with Councillor Hurcomb. "We worked with 4elements and for a year participated in The Art of Being Billings. The success of that project and the community interest that was generated proved to the 4elements board that Billings was an ideal place to stay. The former town office on Main St. beside the fire hall was vacant but sorely in need of renovations.'

Councillors Hurcomb and Imrie presented a business case to council demonstrating the benefits of having 4elements establish its offices in Kagawong and the potential income generation, job creation and tourism that would result. Further, improving the building would achieve our asset management goals.

Council approved the expenditure and 4elements found a home.

"When I joined council," said Mr. Imrie, "we were constantly under criticism for the management of the hydro generating station. Allegations of excessive water consumption were common and council worked with the owner to reduce complaints through monitoring and communication. Gradually the complaints diminished. We were presented with an opportunity to increase the township's revenue through the increased payment to the generator offered by the Green Energy Act. We now earn more and have fewer complaints.

The lack of revenue being generated by township owned buildings was evident when Mr. Imrie first joined council. "We actively

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



to its fitness centre.

"The Government of Canada recognizes the importance of supporting community infrastructure improvements and modernization in First Nations, organizations and municipalities," Mr. Lefebvre quoted the Honourable Navdeep Bains, Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development and Minister responsible for FedNor, as saying.

WRFN Chief Franklin Paibomsai commended the Liberal MP for coming to the community, noting that visits from politicians under federal Conservative rule were a rarity. The chief explained that under chief and council, there are three community priorities: wellness, education and economy.

"We have an ethical responsibility to invest in our young people," Chief Paibomsai said, adding that an investment in a safe environment to live and play in means successful, fit and smart future leaders.

Next it was on to the West End and the Split Rail Brewing Co. in Gore Bay where MP Lefebvre announced a further \$1.2 million in funding.

The LaCloche Manitoulin Business Assistance Corporation (LAMBAC) received \$960,000 through FedNor's Community Futures Program which will enable LAMBAC to provide small and medium-sized enterprises with access to capital and business counselling services for a three-year peri-

Sheshegwaning First Nation will receive \$100,000 from the CIP 150 program to add a garage bay to an existing heated building, enabling the community to store both of its fire trucks, as well as its EMS van. Currently, without a heated facility, water must be drained from the fire trucks during colder months to prevent it from freezing while parked. This heated facility will ensure all vehicles are ready to respond quickly to emergency situations.

In nearby Misery Bay, the Friends of Misery Bay are set to receive \$90,000 through a CIP 150 grant to complete

the design, construction and installation of high quality interactive exhibits at the park's visitor centre. This is the final phase of a five-phase interpretive plan for the park which began in 2010.

up the meeting.'

Mr. Thibeault had campaigned vigorously for a PET scanner for Sudbury while a member of the Federal NDP and had taken considerable flack from his former colleagues on the file when he became a member of the provincial Liber-

The MPP was quick to congratulate others for making the project a success, however. "Not only Sudbury rallying was behind this project, but communities from across the North really stepped up to make this happen," he said. "We had donations coming in from communities on the Island and from north of Timmins. People recognize the benefit of not having to travel to Toronto to get the tests.

That barrier of travel goes beyond mere inconvenience, noted Manitoulin Health Centre CEO Derek Graham. "When faced with that travel to take the test, a lot of people just choose not to make that journey,' he said. "But it goes bevond that. Studies have shown that with the closer proximity of that technology, more people on the periphery will get the test. From a health care perspective, it is a great thing and there is good reason to anticipate better clinical outcomes will come of this in the future."

Both Mr. Thibeault and Mr. Graham noted that the capital fundraising efforts of the special foundation (The Sam Bruno PET Scan Fund) have been outstand-

ing.
"The Sam Bruno PET Scan Fund has been

among the most visible campaign projects the Northern Cancer Foundation has been a part of," said Tannys Laughren, executive director of the Northern Cancer Foundation, in a news release noting the donations. "Today, these two very generous donations have made acquiring a PET scanner a reality for Sudbury." Mark Hartman, HSN

vice-president of regional cancer services and medical imaging, said the hospital will be seeking proposals for a scanner so it can properly build the space where the PET scanner will be located following the Tuesday, November 8 news conference at which the \$4.6 million in capital funding was announced to build the space. The news conference included a surprise announcement that two \$500,000 donations from anonymous donors had put the fund to purchase a PET-CT scanner over its \$3.5 million goal.

"I am pleased announce that Sudbury is getting a permanent PET scanner," said Dr. Eric Hoskins, Minister Health and Long-Term Care during the funding announcement in Sudbury. "MPP Glenn Thibeault has been a tremendous advocate for equitable access to high quality care in Sudbury and Northeastern Ontario, echoing the voices of his community at Queen's Park every day. The commitment and generosity of the community in Sudbury is truly inspir-

"What great news for our community. I want to recognize the Bruno family for working tirelessly over several years to bring this issue to the forefront," said Mr. Thibeault during the announcement. "We all know how important it is for patients in the North to have access to a PET scanner locally. By working with Minister Hoskins over

Ontario had already announced that it will cover operating costs for a permanent PET scanner at Health Sciences North in Sudbury last year. In that announcement the government committed to providing the hospital with up to \$1.6 million in operating funding for a permanent PET scanner once the community and the hospital have raised the necessary capital for a permanent PET scanner. As of November 8, that capital bar had been reached.

"A PET scan is a diagnostic test used in managing patient care for patients with certain cancers, heart disease and neurological diseases. Currently, patients in Northeastern Ontario have to travel to Toronto to have a PET scan. A PET scanner in Sudbury will reduce the travel burden on patients in Northeastern Ontario and perform up to 750 tests per year," noted the release.

The release goes on to note that "improving access to

PET scans in Northeastern Ontario is part of the government's plan to build a better Ontario through its Patients First: Action Plan for Health Care, which is providing patients with faster access to the right care, better home and community care, the information they need to stay healthy and a health care system that's sustainable for gen-

Before he lost his battle to cancer at 54, Sudbury native and accomplished salesman Sam Bruno lobbied the government for years to make PET scans free. After that success, Mr. Bruno shifted his focus to acquiring a machine for Northeastern Ontario, located in Sudbury. A foundation made up of seven community members: Cheryl Bruno, widow of Mr. Bruno; Frank Bruno, his brother; Lori Bouchard and Mary Hopkin, his sisters; Trisha Moore and Jody Third, step-daughters; Rita Beech, cousin; and Brenda Tessaro, a family friend.

Mr. Thibeault said he was confident that the first patients would be accessing the PET scanner by the end of next year.

The organizers are asking hunters to bring in their does, buck or fawns for the purpose of collecting data. All entries will be entered into a draw for each of the three categories of buck, doe and fawn and a \$100 cash prize will be awarded to a winner in each divi-

The contest will start on Tuesday, November 22 and run until Thursday, November 24 from 7 to 9 pm at White's Shell garage.

The MNRF and College Boreal are again partnering to conduct a deer check station.

"The check station, which has been operated every second year since 2006, will be open from Wednesday, November 23 to Saturday, November 26 from 9 am to 5 pm at the Espanola Mall parking lot," said Wayne Selinger of the MNRF. "The check station provides valuable data regarding the age/sex structure of the harvest and the condition of harvested animals. Hunters are encouraged to participate. There will also be a chronic wasting disease (CWD) sampling crew at the check station. The target sample size is 460 white-tails pooled across wildlife management units 36, 43 A (Manitoulin), 43 B (Manitoulin), 44 and 45.

"The deer population in Wildlife Management Unit (WMU) 43A is considered to be stable, with a slight population increase noted between 2010 and 2015," continued Mr. Selinger. "In WMU 43B populations have been slowly increasing since 2011. Winter 2016 was very mild which should have made for good fawn recruitment this year. Recognizing the need to balance deer abundance with agricultural impacts, antlerless tag allocations were increased from 250 to 400 tags in WMU 43A and from 3,500 to 4,500 tags

in WMU 43B for 2016."

There are also CWD depot stations set up on Manitoulin at Manitoulin Streams in Manitowaning and the

Bridal Veil Esso in Kagawong, which started during bow season on Manitoulin in early October.

The deer heads are placed into bags, labeled and placed into a freezer which will be picked up and sent to Guelph for sampling for CWD. When the hunter brings in the deer head they will fill out a form with information about where they harvested the deer and they will received a crest in

Larissa Nituch, senior wildlife research technician with the MNRF, said that the location of the CWD surveillance program varies each year based on a number of factors and was last held here in 2008.

"There is no evidence that CWD is present in Ontario or on Manitoulin, but it is an important program to

ensure that it isn't," said Ms. Nituch.
She told The Expositor on Monday that the heads on Manitoulin have not been collected yet, but will be following rifle season and tested for CWD.

uary 20, 2017, policy anaofficials, trade defence officials and an innumerable host of civil servants and businesses are scrambling to prepare for a very uncertain world.

An unabashed populist, Mr. Trump has made a great many promises and declarations on his way to the White House. While his central theme of "making America great again" resonated well with a large portion of the US electorate, the lack of any firm delineated stepping stones toward that goal accompanying is making that job a lot more difficult. Mr. Trump made a virtue out of that ambiguity when he proclaimed "No one is going to touch us, because I'm so unpredictable."

Mr. Trump tapped into a number of deeply held angsts in the American psyche in his march to victory, and now that the dust is beginning to settle, the rest of the world is trying to figure out how the presidentelect's protectionist, antiimmigration anti-Muslim tirades on the

campaign trail will actually play out in the "real" world.

While some of Mr. Trump's railings undoubtedly are setting off alarm klaxons throughout our national and provincial capitals, particularly in the realm of trade and defence, Mr. Trump's focus has been aimed at his southern border Canada was blessed with an absence of mention through most of the campaign. The reality is that the US is Canada's largest market, and we theirs, so any seismic change in US trade policy can have unintended consequences for that relationship. Canada is a trading nation, and although it has become one of the largest economies in the world, the US is also historically and currently a major trading nation.

To be fair, Mr. Trump has not so much repudiated trade as made the assertion that his experience as a hard nosed wheeler-dealer would allow him to renegotiate trade deals to America's benefit

He doesn't plan to do it on his own. The great delegator has made it known that he would replace "free trade" with "fair trade" and then gather together the 'smartest negotiators in them a country and renegotiate all foreign trade deals.

Mr. Trump has asserted that he would impose new taxes on many imports into the country and the numbers he has thrown about are indeed alarming, ranging from 32 percent to 35 percent.

A June report from Capital Economics stated, "We would view a Trump win as very bad for Canada's economy. If he doesn't push the US economy into recession by slashing public spendexports Canada's might end up as collateral damage in his push to increase protectionism."

But not everyone is running to the economic bunkers just yet. The Globe and Mail reports that TD economists Beata Caranci and Leslie Preston had weighed in saying "but, when it comes time to govern, [presidents] frequently implement much more pragmatic policies that attempt to level the playing rather rewrite history."

On the other hand, Mr. Trump hardly casts himself in the traditional image of a US president. If his policies are constrained by anything, it will likely be the power of the Republican held House of Congress and House of Representatives that will be the author (and if history is to be a judge, blamed for any shortcomings in implementation).

Another worrisome policy plank is his assertion that he would allow corporations a one-time window to transfer profits being much-reduced 10 percent tax. Since Canada's corporate tax rates are significantly less than those of our neighbours to the south, this could result in a large drain on the Canadian economy and a large drop in the value of the Canadian dollar. Estimates of the drain run between \$30 billion to \$38 billion. While that might not hit our dollar all that badly even in the short run, it could lay the smack down on business investment in the country and that spells trouble for job growth.

A bright spot on the horizon is Mr. Trump's pledge to rebuild America's aging infrastructure, focussing heavily on bridges and airports. He asserts that his negotiating skills will ensure that the cost will be one-third of the current cost of such projects.

Another plank of concern is Mr. Trump's vow to force America's allies, NATO members in particular, to pony up their fair share of the budget to maintain world peace. Canada is at the bottom of the list of contributors as a percentage of GDP, spending a mere one percent on defence. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has indicated little appetite for upping the defence budget line item.

While it might seem counterintuitive, Expositor's publisher Rick McCutcheon discovered on his fact finding mission to

Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan
on the eve of the election,
that Ms. Clinton was perceived by some as a bit of a
war hawk.

"There was a couple in a restaurant, he was originally from White River and his wife was from Sault, Michigan," recalled Mr. McCutcheon. "He had been an OPP officer before taking theology and becoming a minister."

The couple told him that they had been following Hillary Clinton for years and, with a son still in the military, flying Black Hawk helicopters in the world's hotspots, they felt she was the more likely to place him in harm's way.

In fact where familiarity seems to have insulated Canada's Justin Trudeau from the character-based attack ads of the Harper Conservatives, that same familiarity played heavily against Ms. Clinton.

In striking up a conversation with a 25ish young woman in a restaurant about her new tattoo, Mr. McCutcheon was told by the woman that she "really had no choice, because of all that email stuff with Clinton, it's pretty " Ms. Clinton had sketchy'.' built up a long history in government that her opponents were able to wield against her.

Guns is a big issue in that part of Michigan, with a lot of avid hunters in the "We met one woman who said she had never voted, at any level, in her life, and even though she tends to lean Democrat, she was going to be voting Trump, said Mr. McCutcheon. When asked why, she replied "it's the gun thing." Her husband and family enjoy hunting and she didn't want to take a chance on "them taking their guns away from them," because "you can't

be too careful."

In an odd sidebar, the woman offered up that her ex-husband isn't allowed to have any guns. "A bit of a mixed message there," offered Mr. McCutcheon.

Some of Mr. Trump's policy planks may actually benefit Canada. The aforementioned plan to build infrastructure could positively impact Canadian exports. Although there are many "buy local" or "buy US" provisions in government contracts these days, limiting markets for Canadian steel, it is hard to define a path to rebuilding infrastructure less expensively by utilizing only US products.

Western Canada may be taking hope in the revival of the Keystone pipeline, killed by President Barak Obama, but a project Mr. Trump has vowed to revive.

Much of the rest of the nation may be unsettled by Mr. Trump's view that climate change is a hoax perpetrated by the Chinese to hobble US industry. As a colliery he has also promised to help make coal king again and to rein in the Environmental Protection Agency—so much for breathing easy.

Mr. Trump has vowed to strengthen the US military so that it's "so big and so strong and so great" that "nobody's going to mess with us." Since the US already ponies up more on its military than the next 10 countries, that promise could be considered to already be a done deal.

Concurrent with that vow is the terrifying retreat from America's commitment to the NATO alliance. His repudiation of US assurances of defending any NATO member who is attacked is unnerving in the light of a resurgent Russian aggression towards its neighbours. The Baltic States are not resting easy these days, but Canada is a member of NATO and continues to maintain its commitment to friends and allies. The thought of dealing with that eventuality without our closest ally and neigbour is unsettling.

While Mr. Trump's vow to triple the current number of US immigration and custom enforcement officers might seem at first glance to be unsettling, perhaps if some of those new officers are stationed on the northern border transitioning the border might be quicker. This will probably be a relief to returning US citizens and snowbirds alike.

The temporary ban on most foreign Muslims entering the United States "until our country's representatives can figure out what is going on" is likely more global warming than much of a major change. Mr. Trump has already said that he would allow exceptions for dignitaries, business people, athletes and others who have proven themselves.

His plan to bar Syrian refugees from entering the country and kick out any who are already living in the US will likely prove challenging, the US is already heavily burdened with the chasing of economic illegals. Mr. Trump claims that wealthy Persian Gulf nations like Saudi Arabia should set up a heavily guarded safe zone in Syria—on their own dime of course.

Kagawong's Wayne Hunt is a professor of Politics and International Relations at Mount Allison University and has been a Visiting Scholar at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government, a Senior Research Associate at St. Antony's College, Oxford University and Visiting Fellow at the Centre for International Studies at the London School of Economics.

"My view is that the system is working as it should," said Mr. Hunt. "Trump represents something very old and very new. The very old part of the story is nationalism and restoring pride back to people who serve their country through institutions like the military. The new part of the story is his use of social media to put views out in an unfiltered way. Trump made a name for himself as a reality television star. Mainstream media gave all sorts of coverage to him because he was not part of the story, he WAS the story. He was different: he was not an oldline politician. But as presimaking significant changes are far

domestic affairs. His type

than

international institutions, like the UN, the IMF and even the EU, that have been in place since the end of the Second World War. Trump was in the UK when the Brexit vote came through and he declared himself to be an ardent fan of Brexit ("Brexit, plus, plus"). In that sense, commentators are right to say that he has cleared space for a number of populist politicians around the world who want to change the old rules of the game and gets things done directly. Think of Marine LePen in France, Rodrigo Duherte in the Phillipines, Victor Orban in Hungary and most of all, Putin in Russia. Thus there is talk of an end of liberalism."

Mr. Hunt notes that "all my students talk about is what his election means, and what it means to them." What is their consensus? "They are all scared."

Concerns centre on privacy rights and an unleashed NSA poking their noses into every facet of people's lives.

So are they right to be afraid? Not so fast.

"I think the system is a lot more resilient than people give it credit," he said. Mr. Hunt points out that Mr. Trump is a "reality television star who has been able to build himself up by saying all kinds of wild things on which he has never been called to account."

In fact, Mr. Hunt said that he sees a major silver lining in the election of the popdemagogue that appeals to the white working class, a group that has seen itself more and more marginalized in a world dominated by technocrats and east coast elites while their jobs are moved offshore in ever greater numbers. "They despise the way things are going, their jobs are at risk, divorce rates are climbing, they are far from happy," he said. "Regan was all about the positive, this guy is all about fear.'

But by playing to that demographic, Mr. Trump has provided white working class America with a place in the American story again. "As LBJ said, 'better to have them inside the tent pissing out," he said. "They see a game rigged against them, this election puts them back in the game."

But for Canada the storm clouds do look omi-

"Canada could get hit hard on this," he said. As a commodities-based economy, we have a lot to lose. China being hit with trade sanctions and tariffs means less demand for Canadian raw materials in that country and, as a heavily trade dependant nation, a global system where the intricate weave of commercial interactions and trade agreements is torn asunder is anything but good news.

But on a brighter side, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau is currently meeting with the managers of funds that control more than \$21 trillion dollars to convince them that Canada is a stable and dependable place to park their money. In a world where Mr. Trump is trumpeting his unpredictability, good old staid Canada could find new friends. "Right now America isn't looking like such a safe haven," noted Mr. Hunt.

The prime minister is also seeking to paint Canada as a player in the new economy, with more about knowledge-based industries and high technology than our traditional role as hewers and drawers.

For the rebels challenging Syria's Assad, the future does not look bright today. Mr. Trump has said that he would allow Russia to deal with the Islamic State in Syria and/or that he would work with the Russian president to wipe out shared enemies-and their relatives. Since Mr. Putin regards many of the groups fighting ISIL as fair game because they oppose Assad, Canadian troops working closely on the ground with the anti-ISIL rebels who also are challenging Assad (yes it's a secret that they are thereshhh) may have to watch their backs more closely.

A lot of Mr. Trump's plans will run full tilt into the wall of a congressional agenda guided by senators and representatives where a lot of his policies run counter to the business interests of the people who fund their very expensive campaigns.

It is easy to say you will "force Nabisco to once again make Oreos in the United States" or that you will bully Apple into making its "damn computers" and other products here, another thing to bully your way through a congress that holds the purse strings.

A large part of the US seems to be taking the stance of a Sault, Michigan bookstore owner, however, and studiously avoiding any political conversations. Although a chatty and voluble fellow, very proud of local history and what Mr. McCutcheon described as a "jolly old bookstore," the shopkeeper "deflected any questions I had about the election." The same stance was to be found in conversation with the receptionist at the local community newspaper. Sometimes it seems, in business particularly, discretion is the greater part of valor.

...continued from page 6 sought tenants and today all our buildings are occupied by successful businesses. We have even expanded through the use and rental of kiosks to add to the business community.'

Some major improvements to the Park Centre through renovations, improved insulation and the installation of geothermal heating and cooling were also made. The result is the increased use of the venue by a variety of renters.

Historically Billings Township was an agricultural community. Today many of the farms and dairies are hunt camps or vacant. Tourism has overtaken every other commercial activity as the primary economic driver for the township. "We have the top tourism destinations on Manitoulin and we rightfullv claim the title of Ontario's Prettiest Village," shared Mr. Imrie.

The Township is working with the private sector to encourage growth and development of businesses and create jobs.

"We attempted to estab-

lish a brewery in the township, but were thwarted by provincial bureaucracy rather than lack of community interest. Today the brewery is thriving and growing in a neighbouring town. Existing businesses and new businesses are encouraged and welcomed, with more to come.'

The Waterfront Improvement Project will enhance tourism through land art, signage, highlighting historic locations, develop an enhanced harbour with more and improved docking, as well as more business opportunities and more employment.

Given the fact that tourism including cycling and ecotourism is such an important economic driver for Billings and most of the Island, the lack of foresight by the province in failing to provide paved shoulders on Hwy 540 was a large disappointment for Mr. Imrie. "I know that historically we had lobbied the province for paved shoulders and some time in 2009 we received a letter from the Minister of Transport of the day that said when Hwy 540 was remediated paved shoulders would be added. Obviously that commitment was not kept. Poor judgement on the part of the province in my opinion."

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin explained that council has a policy of not making decisions on deputation requests until the following meeting, but noted that council has supported the Manor in the past and was sure that council would continue to support the long-term care home.

Councillor Paul Skippen commended Ms. Gauthier on helping to organize the gala.

Application consent

Council reviewed a planning application from James and Linda Ferguson to sever a plot of land to create two new lots. Mr. Williamson explained that the Manitoulin Planning Board was looking to council to see if they had any comments or concerns with the application.

Council discussed how it would make sense for the couple to rezone the property prior to it being severed and recommended that staff contact the proponents.

Council carried a motion that it had no concern with the application.

Declaration of poppy week

Councillor Dawn Orr put a motion on the table to proclaim October 28 to November 11 'Poppy Week,' seconded by Councillor Laurie Cook. The motion read: "Whereas the poppy has been widely recognized as a symbol of remembrance since it was first adopted in 1921; whereas, by wearing the poppy we demonstrate our gratitude to those who gave their lives for the freedom we enjoy; whereas the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 177, Little Current, has been honouring veterans in our area for over half a century through the distribution of poppies; therefore I, Al MacNevin, Northeast Town mayor, do hereby proclaim the days October 28 through to November 1 as Poppy Week and ask that all citizens pay tribute to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice in the name of freedom by wearing a poppy during this period."

The motion was carried.

Fixing Our Felines

Council reviewed a letter from Fixing Our Felines, a cat rescue group in Manitowaning.

The letter urges the Northeast Town council to support efforts in its own municipality to help cats, as they get many calls from members of the Northeast Town.

Councillor Cook suggested that council look into setting something up like the Central Manitoulin Animal Welfare Fund.

Councillor Michael Erskine pointed out that the Central Manitoulin Animal Welfare Fund was started by a Northeast Town community member. The Central Manitoulin Animal Welfare Fund is administered by Central Manitoulin, but is funded through donations and is for animals across Manitoulin

Councillor Erksine also noted that there are people in the Northeast Town who are currently involved in cat/animal rescue.

Library board The Northeast Town council carried a motion to accept the resignation of Little Current Library board member Dorothy Atchison with regret.

Councillor Cook, council's representative on the board, commented that the board is stabilized and looking for a new librarian and will be looking at recruiting a new board member.

Christmas dinner

Kelly Timmermans of Country 103 requested that council donate the use of the recreation hall and kitchen for a community Christmas meal. The meal would be provided to any community members who wish to attend, free of charge, or those who are able to could donate. Councillor Cook made a motion to donate the space, seconded by Councillor Erskine. Council carried the motion to donate the use of the hall and kitchen with a value of \$470.

Award nomination

Councillor Marcel Gauthier suggested that council nominate Island artists Ivan Wheale for the Premiers Award of Excellence in Art.

"The award is to recognize outstanding artists in Ontario," said Councillor Gauthier. "He is a great candidate for the award."

Council agreed that Mr. Wheale was a good candidate and carried a motion for him to be nominated. Councillor Gauthier volunteered to fill out the required nomination paperwork.

Budget

Town CAO Williamson walked council through some of the suggested changes to the 2017 municipal budget made by a councillor. He recomthat council mended review the suggested changes and that he would talk to the managers about them as well and then there could be a discussion at the next administration and finance meeting.

He also noted that there had been a suggestion to build a sidewalk on Hardbargain Road next year instead of Draper Street. He said that staff had suggested Draper Street because of the route children take to school, but if it was the will of council the




Manitoulin writers featured in new anthology

"There are 23 young kids on Draper Street," said Councillor Bill Koehler, stating that he felt it should not be changed. Councillor Paul Skippen agreed.

Mr. Williamson also brought to council's atten-

tion that since the new salt shed had been broken into two projects—the base this year and structure next year—the contractor had come forward and offered a \$6,000 deduction if the town decided to build it all this year. The committee made a recommendation to council that staff contact the contractor and have the entire

salt shed built this year, realizing the \$6,000 savings.

There were also discussions concerning the amount council was putting into reserves. In a recorded vote, committee carried a motion to recommend to council that staff look into putting an extra \$20,000 into reserves in the 2017 budget, bringing the contribution

to reserves up to \$100,000.

In the recorded vote, Councillors Laurie Cook, Bruce Wood, Marcel Gauthier, Dawn Orr and Melissa Peters voted in favour of the motion, while Councillors Paul Skippen and Bill Koehler and Mayor Mac-Nevin voted against it. Financial report

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin reviewed the accounts receivable with council. For water and sewer, she said that there were \$146,329.51 made in payments last month. She also noted that there were currently 37 accounts over \$400, of which 27 were due


to the billing due date of October 31, five individuals whose water/sewer had been disconnected, and in five cases, payment arrangements had been made.

For taxes, Ms. Wilkin said there were \$270,664.54 made is payments last month.



We will remember them

Birch Island vets honoured during annual Remembrance service

BIRCH ISLAND—Much of the Birch Island community braved the cold north wind to pay tribute to their warriors during the annual Remembrance Day ceremonies held at the Whitefish River First Nation (WRFN) Veterans' Memorial, which marked its 12th year.

Master of ceremonies Martha Shawanda welcomed all to the ceremony, introducing WRFN councillor Esther Osche.

"Thousands of aboriginal men and women enlisted in Canada's armed forces," she began. "Aboriginals served in units with other Canadians and in every theatre in which Canadian forces took part."

More than 500 (First Nations) servicemen lost their lives in foreign battlefields during the world wars with the number of casualties and injuries much higher, Ms. Osche told the large group. "How remarkable that the percentage of enlistments among the Anishinabek is fully equal to that among other sections of the community."

In World War I, Status Indians were prohibited from recruitment for fear of their war tactics and how Germany would respond, the councillor explained. "Despite being prohibited from recruitment, many dedicated aboriginal men had still enlisted," she said. "It is believed that some militia units were unaware of the prohibition or decided to ignore it for they were proud to be associated with their 'fellow subjects'."

When conscription came into place during the Great War there was no exemption for aboriginals. It wasn't until January 17, 1918, after much aboriginal lobbying, that the government passed an order that would exempt aboriginals from the Military Service Act. Nevertheless, enlistments among the aboriginal communities continued to reach large numbers

Ms. Osche shared some facts

about WWI: more than 4,000 aboriginals had enlisted for service; approximately 35 percent of all Status Indian males of military age had enlisted for service; and approximately 100 Anishinaabe men from isolated communities in Northern Ontario enlisted at the Thunder Bay recruitment office.

"Aboriginal soldiers were lauded as effective snipers and scouts; in battle, the skills of the Indian hunter and warrior came to the fore," Ms. Osche said. "Aboriginal soldiers were seen to be adaptable and patient, with keen observation powers, stamina and courage. Correspondingly, an aboriginal background sometimes placed aboriginal soldiers in the most hazardous jobs that the army had to offer."

"Aboriginal peoples, like all other Canadians, were called upon to make sacrifices and contribute to the national crusade," Ms. Osche continued, speaking of WWII.

"Aboriginal service personnel were among the casualties at Hong Kong and Dieppe, they fought in Italy and Sicily, served on convoy escorts in the Battle of the Atlantic and flew with bomber and fighter crews around the world. They landed with the 3rd Canadian Infantry Division on D-Day and fought through the campaigns in Normandy and Northwest Europe

Despite the high number of enlistments, as the War went on, more manpower was needed and once again conscription was put into place, Ms. Osche added. Just as in WWI, aboriginals had fought for their right to be able to choose to volunteer their enlistment. As of 1940, the government's final decision was that aboriginals would not be exempt from the Military Service Act.

On the home fronts, as had been the case in the First World War, women's service clubs and community groups donated and raised funds for the Red Cross and other war charities, Ms. Osche said. By the end of 1945, bands officially had donated \$23,596.71.

"For some aboriginal soldiers, military service was an adventure, an opportunity to demonstrate their loyalty to the King and Queen; for others it was a chance to perpetuate a warrior tradition," she added.

The Wikwemikong Singers drum group then sang a Flag Song followed by Tim McGregor reflecting on 'honouring our veterans,' not just on Remembrance Day, but each day.

Veteran Gerald McGregor then read In Flanders Fields followed by two minutes of silence.

As the names of Whitefish River First Nation's veterans were read aloud, wreaths were laid at the monument by friends and family.

The Wikwemikong Singers then struck up a Victory Song before Chief Franklin Paibomsai closed the service, noting that this was the 12th ceremony at the Cenotaph, noting that Violet McGregor was the driving force behind remembering their warriors in that way.

Denis Blake (Wikwemikong Tribal Police), Beverly Wright (West Manitoulin Legion Branch) and Fern Chamberland (The Veterans of Past Wars). Each was escorted by a member of the 348 Manitoulin Royal Canadian Sea Cadets.

Sea Cadet Miranda Mackay played The Last Post and Reveille on the bugle following laying of the wreaths and two minutes of silence.

Maureen Johnson recited 'In Flanders Fields' written by Lt Colonel John MacRae, MD who was with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corp.

Featured at the service was the military career of Garry L A Riebertz whose parents Dan and Fay make their home at Maple Point. Rick Nelson read a poem written while serving during one of his tours of duty in Afghanistan called 'The Price of Freedom.'

"I cannot speak for everyone. I can only speak for me

"Things can get better," he shared. The question to be asked is 'how did things get so bad?'

Local heroes such as Allan Tustian, now 97-years-old, "knew there was a chance he could die. There were smart people at head office," stated Mr. Nelson.

Cold War veteran Ron Young, while keeping a lookout for Russians, knew he had a job to do. He never questioned his orders, shared Mr. Nelson. "Leadership was key."

"Canada," stated Mr. Nelson, "has a fairly new leader in Justin Trudeau and the United States just elected a new president in Donald Trump. Democracy is not pretty sometimes. America has made their decision. It would be naive if Canada were to believe we are not affected by it." "War time leaders," concluded

"War time leaders," concluded Mr. Nelson, "come up with a game plan. Soldiers pay the ultimate price, and pray for peace. It is impossible to eliminate risk. They must see the big picture, the end game and pledge to do their best for us. Whatever the mission, they will do it."

Mr. Nelson turned the service back to Ms. Fraser who took a moment to inform those in attendance that the donations taken at the door go towards donation of the Cenotaph, poppy fund, Sea Cadet bursary, trip to Vimy Ridge, and band equipment.



It is the season where organizations are having Christmas cheer in dinners, baking tables, craft sales etc. The calls are put out for donations in "what can you contribute" in all sorts of categories. Baking is one on top of the list for requests. It is my favourite and I have a

system in place that is quick and also a bonus for my freezer. The main "ingredient" for me to make things easier is parchment paper. I line my baking dishes with it—I can't live without it. A hint to make it easier to work with when trying to fit it into your pan is to crumble it into a ball, put it under your kitchen tap and wet it thoroughly-squeeze it a bit and while still wet, unroll the parchment paper and place it in your pan.

The following recipes are quick and yummy



I always think when you bake one recipe, you are already in the mess, so bake two. You can donate the one and put the other one put in your freezer for the Christmas season. Leave the parchment paper bigger than the pan so when the baking is done, you can grab the edges and lift your masterpiece out, place on a cutting board and cut into squares using a big chefs knife. I used semisweet chocolate and unsweetened chocolate.

11/4 cups all-purpose flour

1/3 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1/4 tsp baking powder

3/4 cup butter

1 cup chopped pecans

TOPPING

1/2 cup corn syrup

1/3 cup granulated sugar

1/4 cup butter, melted

1 tbsp all-purpose flour

1 tsp vanilla

CHOCOLATE TOPPING

1 Tbsp butter

4 oz semisweet chocolate, melted (I used 2oz semisweet and 2oz unsweetened)

1. Preheat the oven 350°F. Place parchment paper in an 8inch square pan. If you are not using parchment paper grease the pan with butter.

2. In bowl, stir together flour, sugar, cocoa powder and baking powder. Using pastry blender, cut in butter until crumbly. If you don't have a pastry blender use your fingers until the butter is the size of large green peas.

3. Use your fingers or a large spoon and press into the 8-

> 4. In a bowl, whisk together corn syrup, sugar and melted butter until smooth; whisk in the eggs. Stir in flour, and vanilla. Pour over the base.

5. Bake in the oven for 35 to 40 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from oven and let cool for 10 minutes.

6. Melt the semisweet chocolate and add the butter; stirring until the butter is melted. Spread evenly over top. Let chocolate harden before cutting into bars.

Caramel Pecan Squares

If you like Turtles chocolates, you won't be able to resist these. For the topping I mixed unsweetened chocolate with semisweet. I omitted the part where you add a pecan half to each scored square because I ran out of time.

1 cup butter, softened

3/4 cup brown sugar

1 tsp vanilla

2 cups all-purpose flour

CARMEL FILLING

11/3 cups brown sugar

3/4 cup whipping cream

3/4 cup corn syrup

1/3 cup butter

1 1/2 cups chopped pecans

10 oz semisweet chocolate, chopped (I used 6 oz semisweet and 4 oz unsweetened)

1/4 cup butter

1/4 cup whipping cream

1 cup pecan halves

1. In bowl, beat butter, sugar and vanilla until creamy; blend in flour, 1/2 cup at a time. Pat into a lightly greased or parchment lined 15 x 10-inch jelly roll pan. Bake in 350°F oven for 18 to 22 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool in pan on rack.

2. In saucepan, cook sugar, cream, corn syrup and butter over medium-high heat, stirring often, for 10 to 12 minutes or until thickened and candy thermometer registers 230°F. Remove from heat; stir in pecans. Spread evenly over base. Let cool completely.

3. In top of double boiler over hot, not boiling, water, melt together chocolate, butter and cream, stirring occasionally. Spread evenly over filling. Let cool for 15 minutes. Score into 1 1/2-inch squares; press pecan half into each square. Refrigerate for 30 minutes or until set. Cut into

Speaking of light, Earl has the restaurant sparkling, and a huge snowman greeter. Lorrie gave me some reading material.


Lots of trucks, vehicles going by with four wheelers behind or in the back, lights in strange places. The hunters gather, I think!
