Two Tehkummah ladies achieve, celebrate, combined two century mark

Congratulations Jean McCauley and Audrey Williamson

TEHKUMMAH—There are landmark birthdays celebrated throughout life, but turning 100 is one that still tends to be pretty rare. Two Tehkummah women were recently feted by their community for reaching that landmark this year.

Audrey Williamson and Jean McCauley are familiar figures in the Tehkummah community as both remain very active despite having witnessed more than 100 years.

"They are very lovely ladies," said Tehkummah Reeve Eric Russell. "I spent time as a kid hanging around with Audrey's son Grant. They lived on the farm and I have great memories of fresh apple pie."

Mr. Russell also went to school with Ms. McCauley's late son Peter. "I went to school with Pete and her daughter Susan. I didn't know the other children well, but I have gotten to know them since."

Mr. Russell noted that both women still attend church regularly and play cribbage in the Tehkummah Triangle Seniors' Hall. "They are both good people, from start to finish," he said.

Seems that may well be the duo's secret to longevity and good health.

The Expositor contacted both of the dynamic centenarians seeking the secret to their long and active lives.

"I just brought it along from day to day, nothing special," laughed Ms. Williamson.

Ms. Williamson had a challenging early life, her mother died when she was two. "My father gave up housekeeping, sold the farm and we moved in with my grandparents," she recalled. "My father never set up housekeeping again." When she was nine, her grandmother passed away and Ms. Williamson was sent to live with her two aunts in the US for three years. "When I was 12 or so I moved back and lived with my aunt and uncle," she said. When she was 12, her aunt died in childbirth, leaving behind a 13-month old and another baby.

"When I was 15 I quit school," she recalled. "It was too hard walking back and forth to school." As the only woman in the household, much of the housekeeping duties in raising a family fell to her. This was 1930 and the times meant a whole other world from what we know today.

"I have seen a lot of changes over the years," admitted Ms. Williamson, "from horse and buggy to the Model T to all the nice cars since."

Although she has seen a lot of changes over the years, she said that she thinks most of them have been for the better.

Ms. Williamson was married in 1937 and shared the next 72 years with her husband. He passed away in 2010. Today, she lives with her son and daughter-in-law. "They take pretty good care of me," she said.

"I don't go to euchre anymore," said Ms. Williamson, "I find 10 games to be a bit much these days, but I do go to cribbage Wednesday afternoons." Then there is UCW day, and most Sundays there is church. "I keep pretty busy," she admits, "but not as busy as Jean."

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Manitoulin Help Centre calls for food and funds as demand for assistance rises to almost 800 families

MANITOULIN—Manitoulin families are now more than ever requiring on the needs of the Manitoulin Food Bank, just as food banks across Ontario are seeing a rise in their use—over 335,000 people and one third of them children—largely due to a lack of full-time employment and rising electricity rates.

As of press time Monday, the call for Manitoulin Food Bank Christmas hampers had so far reached 770—up from the previous year's record of 557 hampers delivered, and this before the start of December.

According to a Monday press release from the Ontario Association of Food Banks, the 2016 Hunger Report states that, "despite improvements in the economy, food bank use remains seven percent higher than prerecession numbers, and illustrates how staggering hydro prices and lack of quality employment are contributing to increased hunger in Ontario."

"Despite reports of economic recovery, food banks continue to see disturbingly high levels of use and need," says Carolyn Stewart, executive director, Ontario Association of Food Banks, in a press release. "This is a direct reflection of the type of employment available to Ontarians, insufficient social assistance, and the dramatic increase in cost of living, particularly related to housing and

The 2016 Hunger Report shows hat while many Ontarians have

gone back to work, fewer have access to secure, full-time employment that allows them to afford their most basic necessities on an ongoing basis. It is stated that one in three part-time workers would like to be working full-time, but are having trouble finding these opportunities. The report also includes a feature on Ontario's rising hydro prices and the added stress that increased hydro costs are putting on low-income fami-

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Four DSB paramedics on leave for PTSD stress under new rules

ESPANOLA—Since provincial legislation launched in April concerning presumptive (automatic) workmen's compensation for first responders diagnosed with post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), four Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board (DSB) paramedics are currently not working, all diagnosed with PTSD, and this number is expected to rise.

With this number of cases also comes a hefty hit to the DSB's Workmen's Safety and Insurance Board bill.

"It was April 1 legislation and we've already got four," Fern Dominelli, DSB CAO, told the board during its November meeting last week. "Are there more out there? Likely one for sure, that we know of."

"We're hearing that, with PTSD, they normally don't go back to work," Mr. Dominelli added.

"It's a new and evolving issue," added Chief of Emergency Medical Services Michael MacIsaac, noting that paramedics are taught to try and be resilient in the job, be aware of their own mental health and that of their coworkers. "Everyone's trigger is different."

Mr. Dominelli suggested that a person's resiliency to trauma should be tested at the college lev-

MANITOULIN—This deer hunting rifle season on Manitoulin, Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) conservation officers (COs) laid a total of 52 charges, down slightly over last year.

'We contacted 350 hunters (checking licences and speaking with hunters) and laid 52 charges and issued 53 warnings," said MNRF Supervisor Dave Scarlett.

The breakdown for the charges were: 25 hunting big game without a licence; two transporting deer without the seal attached; five unlawfully possessing a firearm at night; two failure to immediately attach seal; two having liquor in open container; four unlawfully possess another person's seal; two unlawfully having a loaded firearm in conveyance;

Speak no ill of dead, unless America dislikes them

The Twitterverse was abuzz and somewhat apoplectic (in an altright kind of way) following a recent statement of condolence expressed by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau upon news of the passage of one of the 20th Century's giants, former Cuban dictator Fidel Castro, at the age of 90.

In case you missed the actual statement in the avalanche of fallout from right wing commentators, Prime Minister Trudeau said: "It is with deep sorrow that I learned today of the death of Cuba's longest serving president. Fidel Castro was a larger than life leader who served his people for almost half a century. A legendary revolutionary and orator, Mr. Castro made significant improvements to the education and healthcare of his island nation. While a controversial figure, both Mr. Castro's supporters and detractors recognized his tremendous dedication and love for the Cuban people who had a deep and lasting affection for 'el Comandante.' I know my father was very proud to call him a friend and I had the opportunity to meet Fidel when my father passed away. It was also a real honour to meet his three sons and his brother President Raúl Castro during my recent visit to Cuba. On behalf of all Canadians, Sophie and I offer our deepest condolences to the family, friends and many, many supporters of Mr. Castro. We join the people of Cuba today in mourning the loss of this remarkable leader.

This led the acting leader of the opposition to demand the prime minister issue a retraction and an apology. Perhaps preferring something more in keeping with US president-elect Donald Trump's condemnation of the Cuban leader as a "brutal dictator that deprived his people of the freedom they so richly deserve."

Fidel Castro, like his predecessor strongman, dictator and Mafia darling Fulgencio Batista, undoubtedly ruled his country with an iron fist. In a game of chicken played with succeeding US presidents least once, but unlike the widely despised Batista, no popular revolution ever came even close to unseating him.

Mr. Castro, for all his shortcomings, clearly loved his country and as the prime minister pointed out, built a medical and educational infrastructure that has not only benefitted his own country, but many other third world countries. He was indisputably a giant figure on the international stage. With a country the fraction of the size of America, or even South Africa, Mr. Castro stood up to the white supremacist regimes that oppressed Africa's black majority.

Mr. Castro was a Trudeau family friend—it was former Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau who, thumbing his nose at the US administration, built close diplomatic ties with Cuba and charted an independent course for Canada. Generations of Canadians have, as a result, been able to enjoy a winter vacation alternative to Florida, as well as fine Cuban cigars.

While Prime Minister Trudeau may have been less circumspect in his statement than foreign affairs bureaucrats would have approved—it is difficult to find that much to argue with in the text of his statement and it was certainly an unusually heartfelt expression of condolence to the people of a nation with whom Canada has always enjoyed good relations with.

Leaders of nations do not usually greet the death of other leaders with glee or condemnation and, although US President Barak Obama's statement was slightly more circumspect, it was far closer to that of Prime Minister Trudeau than that of Donald Trump. Both Prime Minister Trudeau and president-elect Trump have promised to do politics differently—their statements on the passing of Fidel Castro gives a hint of just how different those ways will prove to be.

William Bowerman Sr. remembers a trip to Michael's Bay

Michael's Bay Historical archives brings another fond reminiscence of ghost town

To the Expositor:

The first time I saw Michael's Bay I was eight. At that time we lived at the five corners. Archie Lockheart, who worked in Michael's Bay, boarded and spent weekends with us. My mother washed and mended his clothes. If he didn't have a ride back to the village he had to walk, so my brother and I were to drive him to the 'new house,' a boarding house at the intersection of the Michael's Bay and Government Road. We took him all the way instead, even though we weren't supposed to go that far. It was a rare event when we got away from home and we were determined to make the most of it.

The road was excellent, hard packed as a city street. The air crisp and clear and the snow had that peculiar squeak by which one knows that it is very cold. We had no bells on our horse, which resulted in our meeting Robert Sims Sr. and his sleigh on the long narrow 'S bridge' that traversed a swamp and creek which flows from Cranberry Lake into the Manitou River. Mr. Sims was quite incensed that we had no bells to serve as a warning. We passed safely and went into town, which, to our country boy eyes seemed quite a place. After looking it over, we headed for home. That hard-packed road impressed me. There was lots of traffic over it, loads of logs going to the river, skid ways and freighting of supplies from Manitowaning for the lumber camp. It was travelled too by the people of the surrounding area as Michael's Bay was the trading

centre for them. I used the word 'trading' as cold cash was not so plentiful in those days and most of the dealing was done by barter. Farmers took their produce such as grain, hay, butter and eggs to exchange for sugar, tea, flour and tobacco. Not so much flour was traded as most grew wheat and had it ground into flour at the grist mill. After the deal was made there might be a few cents left to buy a swatch of calico for the wife or a bag of candy for the kids. Many of the farmers with their horses worked for the lumber company in the winter. They charged their purchases and this was deducted from their wages paid in the spring. Fishermen from South Baymouth sometimes took their catch there to exchange for the necessities of life. They came by boat, when the weather permitted, or by the eighth line road. This road was also used by people from the Slash and those coming in from Hilly Grove and Manitowaning. Two creeks crossed it, the Blue Jay and Black Creek both spanned by bridges long since gone. Hugh Gallagher's mill was located on the Blue Jay and the Hilson lumber camp was on this

"I start each day reading the bible, citing two special sections, Romans 1:16 and 10:9. We are so blessed. Music has also been a part of my life since I was a babv. I grew up with my father's fiddle and family 'sing-a-longs' and we have carried on this tradition. We love to share our music." Mary's love of cooking parallels her love of song. Mary Elizabeth was born to Alice (nee Lane) and Archie Rowe on February 3, 1943 in Gore Bay during a storm. "I was the first girl after three boys, Wilmer, Harold and Tim. Nancy was born later. My mother and I had to spend three weeks at my paternal aunt Violet Panton's house until we could safely return home."


Brother Harold has compiled a history of the Rowe family from 1842 to 2006. Referring to Mary, he states, "she was spoiled early but recovered to grow up and take after her mother in a lot of ways.' Maternal grandparents are Elizabeth (nee Greenman) and Charles Lane. The Lane name was wellknown on Barrie Island and Gore Bay. John and his brother Lawrence Lane were mayors in Gore Bay, in the 1960s and early 1970s (for John) and through the 1980s and early 1990s (for Larry). John's son Ron is mayor today.

Harold's book explained that the Rowe family, notably William Alfred, Mary's great-great-grandfather, emigrated from England to Peterborough, Ontario, in 1842 at age 51. His son, great-grandfather William John, was 12 when they left England. He married Harriet Ackley and lived on a farm on McLean's Mountain just outside Little Current. He transported mail to Manitowaning. Their son Timothy became a baker in Little Current and Gore Bay and grandfather to Mary. Timothy's first wife died in childbirth and his second wife Mary Magdalene McColeman gave birth to six chil-

Mary's family moved to Gore Bay when she was just threeyears-old. Her dad provided janitorial services for the local school. This included keeping the school's fire fueled with coal or wood. He would return home blackened by the coal. During the holidays, the whole family was conscripted to help. Parents and siblings would arrive at the school to do a major cleaning. In his spare time, Archie also built homes in town and did carpentry work. Alice worked full time at the local turkey eviscerating plant and she took in foster children. "The foster children were a blessing but it was hard to say goodbye

when they left."

Mary shares some early memories. "On Friday afternoons at school, my favourite teacher Mrs. Long, who also gave me piano lessons, would play the piano and we would sing with her. That was a lot of fun. Afterwards, coming home from school, my friends and I would be enchanted by the delicious aroma of freshly baked bread. My mother Alice would make 10 to 15 loaves at a time. She and her sister would compete at the local fairs, taking turns bringing home first or second place ribbons for their breads. Alice did a lot of knitting too."

Picnics with the family in the old Model 'A' included transporting a big pot to make fresh cornon-the-cob over the open fire. "We all looked forward to that. One time, we were packed into the car, heading for our picnic site when rain began to pour down in buckets. Jerusalem Hill was far from our Perivale farm. The roof of the Model A started to leak badly. The corn pot did double duty and caught the rain but excess water contributed to our lack of braking power. We came down the very steep hill to the highway at an unsettling pace, and shot out on Hwy 540. Luckily, the road was clear but we decided to avoid further calamities and limped back home to boil our corn on the stove."

As a teen. Mary worked for the Northernaire Lodge at Evansville for \$50 a month and at Treasure Island Resort at Mindemoya. "I was sitting in the girls' cabin after work at the Northernaire Lodge

when the dock boy came in and asked if somebody could help him. He was trying to put an engine into a Model A car he was restoring." Mary was the only girl who agreed to help. That was how she met her future husband, Joe Middleton. "Joe was a hard worker. He couldn't cook but he could play his guitar well and he often entertained the guests in the evenings with his music.'

Joseph Watts Middleton was born on June 25, 1942. His family had originated in England. He did not particularly like school; preferring to look out the window rather than watch the teacher, but he completed Grade 8. After school, Joe went to Sheridan College where he got his Class 'A' Mechanic's License. He got work at the old White Rose station in Gore Bay, owned by Harry Witty and later Stu Burns. Manitoulin Livestock trucks needed a lot of fixing. He was making a handsome \$43 a week.

After Grade 12, Mary worked in North Bay, helping her older brother Wilmer, a pharmacist, but she missed Gore Bay and she missed Joe. After two years, she moved back home to finish Grade 13, and see Joe. After she graduated, she became a telephone operator running the Gore Bay Telephone Company switchboard for \$28 a week. "We just had to work day shifts which entailed a full day of 'number please' and switching the cords to link callers. Sometimes it could get very hectic when too many calls came in close together. The night shift was handled by a man who tried to sleep there despite the potential of a lot

of interrupted sleep."

Joe and Mary were wed on December 4, 1965 at the Gordon United Church, across from where Pat Noble Lumber is located. That church has been torn down now. The reception was in the United Church Hall in Gore Bay. "For our honeymoon, we headed north in falling snow, to Wawa. We checked into a local motel. When we woke, our car was

"We hadn't noticed the winter 'no parking' signs that allowed clear access for the snowplows. Our vehicle had been towed. The motel owner sent us to the police station where it took \$20 to get our car back. That was a hefty price for newlyweds in 1965. We continued our honeymoon, travelled to see my brother Wilmer in North Bay and then returned home.'

Mary continued her work as a telephone operator and Joe went back to the garage. "Our combined income of \$71 a week allowed us to eat out once a week at Marv's Restaurant in Gore Bay where the Island Pantry was located until recently. "We were living high on the hog" Mary claims, smiling. "These days, our money doesn't seem to go as far."

The couple had five children, Bruce, Tim, Christie, Mary-Jo and Jamie. They all lived in Gore Bay until 1988 when they bought the 200-acre farm where Mary and Joe live now. A beautiful small, stone house sat to the right. Two bedrooms and a wood stove made the stone abode cozy. It offered extra space for visitors, but it's mostly used for storage now. In the year 2000, a new home was built near the old one.

When the kids were younger, the family enjoyed going camping with them. Janet Head, near Gore Bay was a favourite destination.

as was Santa's Village in Bracebridge. "Every spring, we make maple syrup with them at the sugar shack in the bush. We make enough to gift to family and friends."

When her youngest was in school, Mary took on some babysitting for Dr. McRae and Dr. Hamilton. "I like to help them. Two days a week, I cook and iron shirts and blouses. I make extra meals so they have something to eat when they come home after a long day at the clinic on days I am not there. Apple pies and rolls are popular and can be easily frozen. Sometimes they serve meals to guests also." One can only assume they like Mary's cooking.

Cooking remained a mainstay for the Gore Bay resident. 'You're Doing It Wrong' was fittingly named by author, granddaughter Damaris. It boasts many popular recipes established by Mary and her predecessors. The candid title is Mary's favourite comment when her grandchildren attempt to create one of the recipes. The grandchildren all know their grandmother loves them and this is just her way of ensuring traditional cooking methods are car-

Police investigate aggravated assault in Mindemoya

In the early evening of Friday, November 18, members of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were dispatched to an altercation at Meadowview Apartments in Mindemoya. Upon arrival, police entered the residence and found one male bleeding as the result of a puncture wound.

A 33-year-old male from Aundeck Omni Kaning was transported to hospital where he remains and is being treated for non-life threatening injuries.

The OPP North East Region Crime Unit and the **OPP** Forensic Identification Services Unit (FISU) attend-

ed the scene.

As a result of the investigation, a 28-year-old female from Mindemoya has been charged with aggravated assault contrary to section 268 of the Criminal Code of Canada. A 30-year-old male from M'Chigeeng First Nation has been charged with assault, contrary to section 266 of the Criminal Code of Canada.

Both charged persons were held in custody pending bail hearings at the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on November 28, 2016.

The investigation is continuing.

Is taking the "high" road a safe alternative to drinking and driving?

Last year, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) investigated 65 road collisions in which a drugimpaired driver was found to be the primary cause of

the crash. So far this year (2016), the same factor was behind 59 such collisions on OPP-patrolled roads. Tragically, 35 people have died so this vear alcohol/drug-related crashes, which has the total number of road deaths in this causal category over the last 10 years nearing the 650 mark.

With its annual Festive Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) campaign getting underway this week, the OPP is determined to dispel the myth that driving while high on drugs cannot be detected by police and is a safe alternative to driving under the influence of alcohol.

Through the OPP Drug

tools needed to detect drugimpaired drivers-something they hope no driver gives them a reason to use during the holidays. Over the coming weeks, the OPP hopes to conduct a successful campaign in which every single driver they pull over in a Festive RIDE Stop is a sober, drug-free driver.

"The solution to ending impaired-related deaths is a simple one," said **OPP Deputy Commissioner** Brad Blair, Provincial Commander. Traffic Safety and Operational Support. "Never drive if you are impaired by alcohol or drugs and know that you are doing the right thing by calling 9-1-1 to report an impaired driver. By working together, we can positively influence driver behaviour in an effort to make sober, drugfree driving a social norm

during the holidays and throughout the year.'

This year's Festive R.I.D.E. Campaign reminds us that we all have a role to play in preventing impaired driving," added David Orazietti, Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services. "As we get together with family and friends this holiday season, plan ahead. Arrange for a designated driver and if you see someone you think is impaired, arrange a ride for them or suggest alternate arrangements. These simple steps can go a long way to keeping our families, friends, and roads safe every day of the year."

As of October 2, 2016, Ontario legislation carries penalties for drug-impaired driving that match those already in place for alcoholimpaired drivers.

Illegal drugs are not the only drugs that can impair one's ability to drive and result in you losing your licence.

A Warn Range Suspension can be issued to drivers whose Blood Alcohol Concentration falls within the 0.05 to 0.08 range.

Library update

Little Current Public Library board chair Ned Martin made a deputation to the Northeast Town council, addressing questions raised by council over comments made from the recently resigned library

Mindemoya skull remains remain a mystery for now

SUDBURY—A moss-covered skull discovered on a leafstrewn path by nature photographer Jamie Pyette last spring remains a mystery as those involved in unravelling its provenance await carbon dating results.

The skull find was initially investigated by the Manitoulin OPP, with the assistance of the crime scene specialists from Sudbury, before anthropologist Dr. Scott I. Fairgrieve of Laurentian University's Department of Forensic Science and consultant retired forensic botanist Dr. Gerard Courtin went over the scene of the discovery.

Contacted by The Expositor, Dr. Fairgrieve noted that "the cranial remains were sent down to Toronto after the recovery on Manitoulin for carbon testing in order to get an idea of the date." Dr. Fairgrieve noted that he had not yet received those results and that, in any case, full disclosure of the results would be released through the coroner—in this case Dr. Shelagh McRae of Gore Bay.

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

Councillor Marcel Gauthier agreed with Councillor Erskine, saying that it was a good thing for council to donate to.

Council carried a motion to donate \$200.

Pride Paws

The Northeast Town council discussed a proposed pilot project from Judy (Blue) Fisher of Pride Paws.

"Over the last three years we (Pride Paws, a Little Current rescue group headed by Ms. Fisher) have been able to help over 358 cats and dogs," said Ms. Fisher. Our group has no formal funding so we function on local donations and by using our own money for our rescue efforts. In the Northeast Town there is an issue with feral cats that often have FIV (feline immunodeficiency virus). This disease is the equivalent of HIV in cats. The feral cats are spreading the disease to domestic cats which is posing a major problem in our communi-

Ms. Fisher proposed a shared cost pilot project in which the cost of testing for FIV, spaying and neutering feral cats in the Northeast Town would be split between the town, Pride Paws and a Island vet—\$1,500 each.

Councillor Bill Koehler and Councillor Laurie Cook both said that they thought it was a good idea and recognized the growing number of feral cats in the community and the problems it poses.

Councillor Melissa Peters said she would like to see a budget set up for the pilot project.

Council passed a motion to take part in the pilot, subject to the approval of the budget.

Donations

Council carried a motion to donate \$200 to the Manitoulin North Shore Victim Services curling funspiel on November 26 at the Espanola Curling Club.

Council also carried a motion to donate \$200 to the Manitoulin Family Resources' Help Centre and Food Bank 2016 Christmas food basket campaign.

Bridge light

Council discussed the new bright lights on the towers at Goat Island that Hydro One installed during the recent power outage. Mayor Al MacNevin said a number of residents have expressed concerns with the light and that they find it distracting.

Council directed staff to contact Hydro One to enquire as to the reason for the new light and if there was a way to mediate the impact on surrounding residents.

Planning board

The Northeast Town received a letter from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) notifying the municipality that the appeal time for the town's Official Plan (OP) had ended and that there had been no appeals and that the Northeast Town OP is now officially approved.

Council carried a motion

to be forwarded to the Manitoulin Planning Board

(MPB) stating that they should receive one-third of the MPB's reserves upon their leave from the board in January.

Representatives of council had already discussed the reserves with the MPB, but council decided to carry a motion to make an official request.

Fire department

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey presented council with his November report. reported that the department responded to a small bush fire on White's Point Road on October 21, a house fire on Bidwell Road on October 23, a fire alarm at the Hydro One building on October 31, a chimney fire that turned out not to be a chimney fire on Dupont Street on November 4, a car fire in Sheguiandah on November 5 and a fire alarm at Little Current Public School that was called off en route.

He said that there had been 48 calls for service to date and that fire apparatus and equipment was in good working condition.

Public works and community services

Reid Taylor presented the community services report to council. He said that the ice schedule had been busy at the recreation centre. "Staff are prepping for upcoming events and completing maintenance, repair and painting tasks," said Mr. Taylor.

He also noted that the Skate Canada Program is continuing at the recreation centre and that Manitoulin Panthers are having their games on Sundays, and the Manitoulin Secondary School boys' team plays on Fridays. Mr. Taylor said that a holiday event calendar would be going out in the mail.

"All buildings are winterized and closed," continued Mr. Taylor. "Buildings will be monitored over the winter and Christmas decorating has begun. The Santa Claus Parade will be held on Saturday, December 3."

He added that Spider Bay Marina is closed for the season, as is the Port of Little Current and all the marina buildings are shut down and have been winterized.

Public works manager Gary May reported that the roads were to be graded before the freeze up and patching was being done where needed. He also noted that the brusher would be in the area in the next couple weeks.

He said that the landfill operations were going well and that the equipment was ready for winter operations and signs are on order to replace weathered ones on connecting link highways.

...continued from page 1 lies and individuals relying on social assistance.

"Over the past 10 years, the cost of hydro has risen over 100 percent in this province and yet social assistance has remained relatively stagnant," Ms. Stewart continues. "Hydro increases are simply too much for the average Ontarian household, let alone for those on social assistance, living on a limited pension, or even working full-time on minimum wage."

Nancy McDermid, program coordinator for the Manitoulin Help Centre and Manitoulin Food Bank, couldn't agree more with the 2016 Hunger Report.

"The number one thing people say is that they are having a hard time meeting their electricity and utility bills," she told The Exposi-

Year round, the Food Bank averages 110 hampers each month, servicing 313 individuals, 131 of them children. "And that's growing exponentially because every month we're seeing new clients," Ms. McDermid added.

As the need grows, especially at Christmastime, so does the amount of food.

"We continue to receive an amazing amount of support from individuals and churches contributing to the agency—the 'stuff a cruiser' event initiated by the UCCM Police and United Chiefs and Councils of

Mnidoo Mnising agencies under the leadership of Maamwi Naadaamaadaa, as well as many businesses and community leadership who organize their own methods of support to our campaign," said Marnie Brown, executive director of Manitoulin Family Resources, which runs the Help Centre and Food Bank. "Without the financial contributions of all of those and many, many more, as well as supportive funding through District Services Board, the coordinator's position funded by the United Way, and the intern's position funded by the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation. none of this would be possible."

The Food bank has also

received help from Barney's Bargain Barn and have just confirmed a 'stuff the bus' food drive through the Manitoulin Rainbow Board elementary schools, with the bus generously donated by Brown's Busing of South Baymouth.

Ms. McDermid encouraged people to give generously to the Food bank this Christmas, either through monetary donations or through the donation of food items. Food can be dropped off on December 19 and 23 at the Mindemoya Missionary Church to be used in the Christmas hampers.

"With the increase in hampers, we will also need an increase in volunteers," Ms. McDermid urged.

Volunteer roles at the

church include setting up the groceries as they are delivered from Dean's Valu-Mart and Island Foodland (this year there will be two deliveries because of the increase) and filling the hamper orders. Strong volunteers may also be asked to help load the hampers into delivery vehicles (think bags of potatoes). Volunteers are needed from December 19 to 23.

"It's a very heartwarming campaign, but it's a double-edged sword," Ms. McDermid added. "It's nice that people are being helped, but scary that this many people need the help."



Mike Bedard, and MHC Chief of Staff Dr. Stephen Cooper talked about the perspective of the medical staff. We also talked about both personal and corporate responsibilities to elevate suffering."

"The board felt it had both a legal responsibility and a duty to service the community and directed MHC management to develop policies, procedures and a framework for MAiD," said Mr. Graham. "The board is very attune and sensitive to the issue and understands that there may be different view points on the MAiD, but determined that it is the duty of MHC to provide the service to the community."

"The professional staff met on October 22 to discuss MAiD," states a report to the board from the MHC medical staff. "The group heard presentations from individual physicians and allied health providers. At the end of the discussion there was consensus among the group that MAiD should be available to Manitoulin residents on the Island. The professional staff were of the opinion that because of the intimate nature of MAiD that is was reasonable that at least one of the eligibility reviews and the MAiD procedure should be provided by a local clinician. Though there was no individual that was willing to step forward to commit to providing MAiD procedure at this time, it was clear from the discussion that one of the pro-

fessional staff at MHC would be willing to provide MAiD procedures at the MHC facilities if MHC chooses to offer the service. The professional staff were respectful of physicians who choose to conscientiously object to MAiD and would accept effective referrals."

"Professional staff did request support in reviewing eligibility of patients requesting MAiD from an expert," continued the report. "Primarily to ensure the patients have the opportunity of expert opinion, but also to have an expert review the documentation to ensure it meets provincial/college requirements for MAiD. The professional staff request that until the procedure becomes routine and familiar that MAiD be performed in the hospital setting, primarily because clinicians felt more comfortable in the hospital setting where they have more control of the procedure and are supported by the policy, procedures and structure of the hospital environment."

Mr. Graham said that the board's motion and the physicians support is a first step in MAiD at MHC.

"Management will report back to the board once the policies, procedures and framework are developed," said Mr. Graham. "I can't give you a time frame right now for when it will be completed, but it is high on our priority list and a large body of knowledge for us to draw on—we feel well supported in developing this framework."

As a partner, Cambrian College may also be granted delegated access to restricted materials within the collection and may nominate representatives to occupy one of the two partner seats on the Governing Circle. Rick Ouellet, director of Cambrian's Wabnode Centre for Aboriginal Services, will be responsible for implementing the partnership at Cambrian in the coming years. He said he is humbled and honoured to serve on the NCTR's Governing Circle. In this role, Mr. Ouellet will provide strategic assistance to the NCTR and support the implementation of its community outreach initia-

Speaking about the new partnership, Mr. Ouellet explained that "the vibrant, dynamic, and exceptional community of indigenous students at Cambrian are the inspiration and the

motivation driving our partnership with the NCTR. By fulfilling our commitments, we will increase opportunities for indigenous learners and broaden understanding through truth and reconciliation initiatives within the college community and our wider networks." Mr. Ouellet made his comments from British Columbia, where he will today receive his PhD from the University of British Columbia.

Upon his return, Mr. Ouellet and his colleagues will continue to implement plans to fulfil the NCTR partnership commitments. For example, during the 2016-17 academic year, Cambrian will provide educational opportunities and experiences for all faculty and staff and will develop opportunities for students to focus on indigenous culture, traditions and learning perspectives as part of their studies.

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Father Tony Baranowski S.J. enjoys serving Manitoulin

M'CHIGEENG—There is a new priest providing services at M'Chigeeng's Church of the Immaculate and Conception Church of Our Lady of Canada in Mindemoya, although he is no stranger to the Island or Northern Ontario having served here earlier in his career during the 1980s.

Father Tony Baranowski S.J. (Society of Jesus or Jesuit) was born and raised in Warsaw, Poland where he lived until 1977, but even while serving for 25 years in the African country of Zambia from 1989 to 2014, he would come back to Canada every couple of years to visit his brother who lives in the town of Simcoe.

While he was very happy in Zambia, where he worked in both urban and rural settings, medical issues brought him back to Canada in 2014. From 2014 to January 2015. Father Tony, as he is known on the Island, served in Hamilton, before moving to the Jesuit enclave at Anderson Lake just outside Espanola and taking up the mantle at the Island churches.

Father Baranowski literally grew up in the shadow

was Jesuit," he noted, and Warsaw is home to the major shrine of one of Poland's patron saints Saint Andrew Bobola. Saint Andrew Bobola, S.J. was a Polish missionary and martyr of the Society of Jesus who is known as the Apostle of Lithuania and the "hunter of souls." He was tortured and killed by invading Cossack warriors in 1657. The story of the fate of the saint's remains reads like an espionage novel—being finally exchanged by the Soviets for the church's assistance during a Russian famine—and provided inspiration to young Poles growing up in the church.

He pointed to the pioneers of the church in North America and Central Europe, who brought their deep faith and inspired conversion through their actions and the way they lived their lives. "We owe a lot to those pioneer trailblazers," he said. That inspiration led him to his service in Africa.

Father Baranowski received his calling after coming to Canada and he said that he is particularly taken with serving in the priesthood in a "cycle of life" capacity through the sacraments, from baptism, confirmation through to the sacrament of the sick (formerly referred to as extreme unction or last rites) and burial.

NOSM and IISD Experimental Lakes Area announce research collaboration

SUDBURY—Environmental research programs at Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) and IISD Experimental Lakes Area (IISD-ELA) have taken a leap forward with the establishment of a research collaboration agreement that will see scientists from both organizations working together on new studies related to environmental health.

For decades, scientists at IISD-ELA have maintained a research infrastructure for tracking changes in aquatic biosystems resulting from climate change, nutrient loading, pollutants, invasive species, and many other alterations in

the environment. The facility, the only one of its kind in the world, has been researching whole-lake ecosystems since the 1960s.

Researchers at the Northern Ontario School of Medicine are studying similar changes, from the point of view of impact on human health. example, For researchers are studying the impact nutrient loading has on cyanobacteria (also called blue-green algae), and developing better ways to detect cyanobacteria blooms. Cyanobacteria is known to be harmful to humans, and represents a significant health risk to the people of Northern Ontario. Every summer, many beaches and water sources are identified by Public Health Officials as being contaminated, which results in the issuing of water advisories. The problem is increasing every year in part because of global warming.

"The Northern Ontario School of Medicine understands that the health of the people of Northern Ontario in inextricably linked to the health of the environment," said Dr. Penny Moody-Corbett, NOSM's Associate Dean of Research. "The work to be performed with IISD-ELA will enable scientists to advance our understanding of health risks associated

with environmental change. It is essential we develop new tools to address the continually changing pressures our environment is experiencing, and the likely impacts on human health."

Matthew McCandless, IISD-ELA executive director, is also excited about the potential of the new collaboration. "IISD-ELA has an international reputation for excellence in environmental research. Working with NOSM will allow us to apply a specific focus on human health to several of the studies we are undertaking."

Mr. McCandless is also looking forward to the

learning opportunities the agreement will create. "IISD-ELA is dedicated to the training a new generation of scientists with the skills to understand the impact environmental change will have, beyond

our current measures. This agreement will enable educational opportunities in new disciplines with tremendous potential impact on the health of Northern Ontarians and beyond."

Put your breast foot forward when it comes to your health

MANITOULIN—October was National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and The Expositor spoke with Jo-Anne Thibodeau Audette of the Canadian Cancer Society about what women should be doing to stay healthy and happy.

"If you are over the age of 50, you should be getting screened every two years if the (mammogram) comes back normal," said Ms. Thibodeau Audette, Canadian Cancer Society Screening Saves Lives Coordinator. "Those who are under the age of 50 and don't have a history should still know their breast—know what's normal—and report anything that isn't normal to their health care professional. If there is a history of breast cancer in your family you need to talk to your health care professional about your next steps."

According to the Canadian Cancer Society, breast cancer is the most

common cancer among Canadian women and the second leading cause of death from cancer in Canadian women. In 2016 it was estimated that 25,700 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer. On average, 70 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer every day.

Ms. Thibodeau Audette who resides in Aundeck Omni Kaning, attends a lot of events on Manitoulin promoting early screening for breast cancer. She said that today's breast cancer incident rates for First Nation's women are surpassing the rest of the population as many "tend to wait until there is a problem before talking to their doctor. We're trying to change this and encourage early screening."

Ms. Thibodeau Audette also promotes screening and early detection for cervical and colon cancer among First Nation communities on Manitoulin Island to increase screening rates for under/never screened communities.



Central Manitoulin council finally passes trailer bylaw

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—After several years of discussion and false starts, Central Manitoulin municipal council has finally passed Zoning Bylaw Amendment 2016-07, but not without some last minute protests from Councillor Derek Stephens. The amendment will curtail the use of house trailers on private property in the municipality.

"I am still in opposition to this bylaw," said Councillor Stephens during the November 10 meeting of council. "This should have been put in tax bill so that people know this is happening.

Councillor Stephens cited the bylaw for being too draconian for a rural area and he maintained that there should have been some provision for people to licence trailers on their land. "People in the public liked that idea; they would still be able to use their property.'

Councillor Stephens went on to reiterate that the general public has not been well apprised of the impact of the bylaw. "This bylaw hasn't been put to the public," he said. 'It should have been (proposed) in the summer when people who will be impacted by it are here. "Is it on the website?" asked Mayor Richard Stephens.

"I posted as per the bylaw," replied municipal building official Raymond McPherson, who was in attendance at the meeting.

"We just did what the Planning Board does," confirmed CAO Ruth Frawley.

"This was put out to the Island public," said Councillor Stephens, noting that without a broader publication, property owners who live off-Island in the off-season would not be likely to have heard. "People don't know what was going on," he said.

"I believe that people have a responsibility to stay informed," said Councillor Alex Baran.

"This will only be enforced by complaint," interjected Councillor Patricia MacDonald. "This will not be a witch

"By written complaint," confirmed Ms. Frawley. On a recorded vote only Councillor Stephens voted against the motion.

"I will vote in favour," said Mayor Stephens. "I think we have had ample discussion on this bylaw. It is carried.'

Area men share their journey at 'I am Warrior' event

by Johnathan TongeBIRH ISLAND—Something

very unusual took place last Thursday. Something almost unheard of. Men shared their feelings. Although the large table of the Whitefish River First Nation council chambers was filled, near total silence was observed, as one by one, five men shared the stories of their lives—their struggles and their tri-

This unique night was part of a program called I am Warrior, which was organized by Mnaamodzawin Health Services. Coordinator for the program, Craig Abotossaway, said the program is part of Men's Health Month. He said the word 'Warrior' in the name is not meant to represent a fighter but rather a strong and healthy male figure. "It's about being a better father, a better husband, a better man and a role mod-

Five men put forward examples of that warrior as they told the room of their troubled histories. Lance Panamick of Sheshegwaning spoke about growing up in an alcoholic home; about his parents physically fighting over him or about waking up to a stranger asking him to watch TV with her. Then about his own substance abuse later on in life. From having black eyes, he had no memory of to his wife and kids leaving him multiple times.



While travelling back from Standing Rock, the couple paused at each waterway to unroll the medicine bundle they had been gifted with during the M'Chigeeng Water Walk to offer those medicines and to hold ceremonies for the

The Water Walk in M'Chigeeng was also apolitical as such. "It wasn't a rally, or a protest, or anything like that," stressed Ms. Debassige. "This was about honouring the water.

Honour it they did, with four eagle staffs taking part, a host of youth and elders from all across Manitoulin and beyond taking part in the walks and cere-

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out at Otter Lake in M'Chigeeng and wound its way through the community to end up at the M'Chigeeng beach on West Bay, across from Manitoulin Secondary At the beginning and

the end of the walk, ceremonies were conducted with offerings of medicines to the waters. The medicine bundle carried on the walk was constructed of red broadcloth and contained semmaa (tobacco) and traditional foods such as moose meat, wild rice, beans and corn with which to feed the water

"It was wonderful to see so many people, elders from so many communities across the Island, and people from every ethnicity coming together to honour the water," said Mr. Pruchnicki.

"M'Chigeeng is my home community," said Ms. Debassige, "but there were a lot of people there that I didn't even know. They were there to honour and help protect the

Following the ceremony, the couple packed up and

headed down the road, destination Standing Rock. They brought with them messages of encouragement and solidarity for the people standing up against the corporate machine that they believe threaten the water with the pipeline that will cross the Missouri River and threaten the water supply of the Sioux Nation. They also brought a medicine bundle containing medicines to offer ceremonies to the waters they met along their journey.

When they arrived in Standing Rock, things were peaceful. "We didn't have any sense of fear," noted Mr. Pruchnicki. "In fact, everything was very positive and loving, even when we went as close to the front line as we could without being arrested."

Asked if the recent US election had any reaction in the protest camp, the couple was adamant. "We didn't hear anything about politics," they both stressed. In fact, they were admonished by one of the local elders at Standing Rock to avoid commenting on the broader politics, to stay focussed on the plight of the water and the matter at hand, to not

The colleges have committed to collaborate through the Indigenous Student Performance Success Program for the next five years.



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
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








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In our household we have this understanding that if you really want to eat something (that I don't like) you have to cook it. So over the past few years John cooks liver if he wants to eat it.

Growing up, in both of our households, we had to eat liver because when you butchered a beef you didn't waste anything, so liver was on the menu. When that liver was gone, you went to the meat market and bought more because No. 1: liver is really good for you; and No. 2, it was one of the cheapest meats to buy and in John's family of nine you really had to stretch the dollar. My mother's version of cooking liver (it came in all sizes and thickness) was to dip it in plain flour and then fry until it was shoe leather! John's mother recipe was a bit more up-scaled, she had fried onions to go with it.

Over time John has researched and found liver recipes that make the product more palatable. (I think the challenge for him is to see me eat it-enough ketchup might make it work!) The other night John did have the magic touch—a new liver recipe with "hardly" any ketchup, that was tender, juicy and vummy.

Beef liver with fig, bacon and caramelized onion

When John is in the kitchen cooking I leave. I have a hard time keeping quiet on "how" he follows the recipe to the exact amount and actual ingredients. I use recipes as a guide and if I don't have an ingredient I use something else which in the end does change the recipe. John is stuck with "we don't have figs, white balsamic vinegar, fresh sage or arrowroot flour," instead he ended up using dates, regular balsamic vinegar, dried sage, and all-purpose flour. It

375g beef liver, sliced The juice of 1 large lemon

2 tsp arrowroot flour 1/2 tsp sea salt

1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper

4 slices smoked Max Burt bacon, cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1/4 tsp sea salt 1/2 tsp freshly ground

pepper 2 large onions, sliced 200g fresh mushrooms,

sliced 4 dried figs, chopped

2 sprigs fresh sage, chopped

2 Tbsp white balsamic vinegar

1/4 cup water

In a non-reactive sealable container, marinate the beef liver in lemon juice for at least 8 hours (or up to 24 hours). Yes, that's in the refrigerator!

In a cold, large heavy skillet (cast iron preferred) set over medium heat, cook the bacon until nice and

While the bacon is cooking, rinse the beef liver slices under running water and pat them dry.

In a shallow bowl or plate, combine the arrowroot flour, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly with a

When bacon is nice and crispy, remove it to a plate with a slotted spoon, and set aside. Pour the bacon fat into a small bowl but leave about 2 tablespoons in the pan. Put the skillet back over high heat.

When the pan is really nice and hot, add the liver slices and sear for about 45 seconds to a minute per side, just long enough for them to get a beautiful dark brown and crispy exterior. You might have to work in batches, depending on the size of your skillet.

Remove the liver to a plate, cover loosely to keep it warm while you work on the onion compote. Put your pan back over the heat source and lower heat to medium-high; add about half the remaining bacon fat and throw the sliced onions right in (I also added three large cloves of garlic).

Let the onions caramelize for about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. When the onions have taken a nice golden coloration, add the remaining bacon fat and the sliced mushrooms. Continue cooking for 2-3 minutes, the mushrooms become soft and slightly golden.

Add figs (or dates), salt, pepper, vinegar and water and cook for another minute or so, until liquid is completely evaporated.


Stir in fresh sage, kill the heat and place liver slices on top of the onion com-

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

ried on.

"We had cows, sheep, chicken, turkeys, and pigs on the farm. Joe liked pigs. He felt they were the smartest animals of all, pooping only in one corner of their stall. We always had a big sow so we could raise pigs to sell. We stopped raising sheep. The wolves would kill them. They didn't eat them, just killed them and they didn't take the lame animals, they preferred the strongest. We had 12 at one point but too inspects and repairs paper mills and dams. He has his own consulting firm, 'Acts'. Bruce is a heavy equipment operator for Randy Noble. Christie is an office administrator for the Sudbury District Health Unit. Mary-Jo Harper is a nurse in Mindemoya and Jamie drives heavy equipment in the oil fields out west."

Joe spent his last 20 working years as a mechanic for La Farge until his retirement in 2007, at age 65. These days, at Christmas, Mary and Joe assemble food

after she developed hives from cat dander. Two more \$500 cats joined the family after the grand-kids found a nest of three in the barn. One died, the other two, females, had to be fixed. We keep them in the basement in the winter and they are outside much of the summer. All three cats will follow Joe down the laneway. It is quite comical to see them marching after him, like faithful puppies."

The 'Kids' Bible Club' was one association Mary and a friend ran in the mid 1980s in Gore Bay. She enjoyed familiarizing youngsters with the bible. "In my spare time, I also collected plates, and salt pepper shakers. Twelve decorative plates adorn the top of the kitchen cabinets. "We were married here; my daughter was married in this one. Each one has special significance.'

Manitowaning says bittersweet goodbye to Eritrean family

by Robin BurridgeMANITOWANING—The community of Manitowaning said goodbye and offered well wishes on Saturday night to the Beyene family that captured its heart in the brief nine months since they arrived in Canada and settled in the Manitoulin community.

"Saturday night went really well," said Lianne Hovingh, a volunteer who worked closely with the family, of the community party held Saturday night for the Beyene family at the Assigniack Curling Club. "It was very nice and well attended. It was a lot of fun, but bittersweet for a lot of people. The Beyene family will be missed. It was bittersweet for them too. I know that there will be more opportunities for them in Kitchener and they are like family, we want what is best for them. They have promised to come back

'Back in September of 2015, the image of the young boy washed up on the beach affected many on Manitoulin," said Sarah Quackenbush, a volunteer with the Manitoulin Refuge Committee. "Community members and churches immediately started asking what we could do to help. Five groups of individuals were quickly formed to request a refugee family to sponsor. A partnership with Mennonite Central Committee meant that in a short few months, families were arriving to Manitoulin. Houses were set up with donations from numerous individuals from the Island, volunteers got ready to support the (Eritrean) families in every way they could, the schools worked to welcome the new students and we all eagerly awaited the families arrival.

The Beyene family arrived on March 15 of this year and quickly became a part of the community of Manitowaning. The family includes mother Haile, father Letekidan, their 21-year-old daughter Rahwa, 19-year-old son Sttagos, 17-year-old son Bahalibi, 12-year-old Essay and nine-yearold grandson Fanuel.

"Their children made fast friends and could often be found riding bikes and playing soccer and now hockey with their peers,' continued Ms. Quackenbush. "The children of Manitowaning eagerly welcomed their new classmates and have been a great example to us adults on how 'when we have more than enough, we build longer tables, not higher fences.' A common remark from the parents of Manitowaning is how the Beyene children have changed the lives of their own children and in turn their whole families.

"The sponsors of the Beyene family will all tell you what a joy it has been to come alongside of this family and offer them friendship port, Ms. Quackenbush shared. "Countless hours go into a refugee sponsorship from setting up a house, getting government paperwork done, ESL classes, driving to appointments, and arguably, most importantly, just visiting and sitting with them, offering friendship. There has been a handful of volunteers in Manitowaning that have made it a consistent priority to regularly take time from their own busy schedules to include the Beyene family. Without the volunteers and the hours they have devoted, the sponsorship would not have been so successful."

The core group of Manitowaning volunteers included Christine Gulyas, Tamara Smith, Olvie Li Barb and Keith Flaherty, Mark Kuntsi (who faithfully came three times a week to help with ESL), Yana Bauer, Steven and Rhonda Bondi, Dave and Suzanne Smith and Leslie Fields and Pat Novak (who also helped with ESL), Linda Teague and Lianne Hovingh.

with them," said Ms. Hovingh of herself and the other volunteers involved with the Beyene family. "All the children settled into Manitoulin Secondary School or Assignack Public School well and quickly. They developed good friendships quickly too. Manitowaning was especially great for Essay and Fanuel—they were able to play outside, ride their bikes around and enjoy living in a small community. They enjoyed playing soccer at school and in an Island league and just started hockeywhich they love."

Ms. Hovingh said that the family approached their sponsors about wanting to move off-Island due to a lack of jobs and transportation. Though it was sad news, Ms. Hovingh and the other volunteers understood and were able to get in touch through friends with a couple in Kitchener who have been helping refugees for over 30 years.

The Manitoulin group will continue to support the family for the rest of the year (until next March) in any way they can, but the Kitchener couple will now be helping the Beyene family settle in to their new home.

"They (the Beyene family) said they were excited about Kitchener, but now that the time has come (they leave this weekend), they have a heaviness in their stomachs," said Ms. Hovingh. "They have expressed that Manitowaning was a perfect place for them to catch their breath and begin their new life in Canada.

"Manitowaning was good," said Mr. Beyene. "It was a good community with kind people. I heard that Canadians were nice, but living here I have seen it with my own eyes. I like this place, but I need a job and we need transportation."

"I'm coming back to visit," said Essay. "I've made good friends and

I like Canada so far. I also really like hockey."

Ethan Dey, a friend of Essay, said he will miss his new friend. "We started talking at school and just became fast friends," said Ethan. "We like playing hockey together, soccer and just hanging out. We have also been teaching each other our languages. I'm sad he's leaving, but we are going to definitely keep in touch.

"The departure of the Beyene family is certainly bittersweet," said Ms. Quackenbush. "On one hand, we feel very proud that they are in a position where they have settled into life in Canada, where they feel comfortable moving to the larger city of Kitchener. We certainly understand their desire for a cultural community, greater ESL opportunities for their teenagers and to be closer to their Orthodox Church, but we will miss them terribly. The children of Manitowaning will miss their new friends and the sponsors as well as other community members will certainly feel heartache when they depart. The Beyene family has brought so much joy to everyone they have been in contact with. We are so privileged to have known them and to continue to be in contact with them as they move to their new home.'

The Eritrean family, a grandmother and her grandson, that were living in Gore Bay left for Kitchener earlier this fall. In Mindemoya, the sponsors are still awaiting their family's arrival parents and their six children who range in age from a baby to 13years-old.

Ms. Quackenbush said that in starting the sponsorships of the five Eritrean families the Manitoulin Refuge Committee never saw it as a goal to keep the families here on Manitoulin permanently. "These families simply needed a group of people who would be willing to support them as they found their own footing in the country of Canada," she said. "Once the families received the support to get through the early stages of living in a new country, they are now able to pursue their own desires and dreams. We think that is a success."

Little Current Library News

On Thursday afternoon, November 24, a Come and Go party was held at the Town Library for Jake Marion, the outgoing CEO. Many well wishers came and stayed, enjoying refreshments served by board member Maureen Armstrong, and the helpful library staff.

Ned Martin, library board chair, gave the thank you on behalf of all who have appreciated Mr. Marion's generous service over the last eleven months. He explained how lucky the library was to get a person of his education and experience to come to our community. Jake holds a Masters Degree in Library Science and came to us from Sudbury, Ottawa and Yellowknife with high recommendations. Ned Martin outlined Jake's accomplishments during his short tenure. These included: greatly increasing the number of graphic novels, bringing in more teen patrons; expanding the DVD collection to fill an entire section, increasing circulation; getting children's area painted and reorganized; supervising larger roster of summer students hired using grant money; summer hours increased by

redeployment of staff; Library Outreach continued to include collaboration with CNIB; building bridges with many other area libraries; a possible partnering with Sheguiandah library was begun; fundraising was done through a big book sale in July, and the less popular; enforcing of late fees; and free shelving was obtained to better feature magazines.

Ned concluded, "Jake volunteered many hours over and above his regular work week. It shows the difference one person can make in a community."

Donna Wolfe, a volunteer who manages the English as a Second Language program, also spoke with emotion. "The English program for our refugees could not have happened without Jake's generosity. He fired up my enthusiasm! He was here on his own time to open the library for our teachers and students." The language lessons for the Island's refugee families take place at NEMI Public Library.

Many lined up to say "Goodbye and good luck" to Jake, including longtime patrons Sandy McGillivray, Edith Gar-

rette; volunteers Ellie Miller, Veronika Bingaman, John Savage; ESL teachers, and newcomers from Eritrea. "He made a lot of friends in a short time," commented patron Dave Sylvester.

Meanwhile, the library board has established a transition staffing plan which will ensure continued good service during the hiring process to find his successor. Board member Mike Easton observed, "Realistically, it's going to be very difficult to attract someone with similar background, because currently it's a part-time position, and there's no money for a better salary."

Winter hours are again in effect and posted on the doors. Various activities continue throughout the week at the library. It's a great place to play a game of cards or Scrabble, do some knitting or just browse through a book. NEMI Public Library has its usual warm welcome for you on those chilly days ahead.

Growing Local access to capital workshop

On December 8 from 6:30 - 9:30 pm, Cambrian College, Little Current there will be a 'Where is the money?' workshop. Join representatives from the Northern Ontario Heritage Foundation (NOHFC), LAMBAC and the Sustainable New Agri-Food Products and Productivity Program (SNAPP) to learn about grants and loans available for new and expanding agri-food businesses in the Manitoulin/LaCloche region. Anyone interested in applying to the SNAPP program is urged to attend this session. Please see below for more information on SNAPP SNAPP Information: In partnership with the Northeast Community Network, Eat Local Sudbury and Cloverbelt Local Food Co-operative, the Rural Agri-Innovation Network (RAIN) will be coordinating a multi-year funding program for farm and food businesses in Northern Ontario. The Sustainable New Agri-Food Products and Productivity Program (SNAPP) will provide a grant up to \$5,000 at 75 percent cost share to purchase equipment for eligible activities. Collaborations of three or more

entities can be eligible for up to \$15,000 at 75 percent cost share. Program goals include stimulating the development and expansion of the agriculture and food sector in northern Ontario, addressing challenges specific to Northern Ontario agri-food production and promoting value-added processing and innovative production and processing practices that increase scalability, profitability, and competitiveness.
