Little Current will host newest refugee family

LITTLE CURRENT—A new family of refugees from Eritrea is about to call Manitoulin Island their new home and a group of volunteers has been working tirelessly to get ready for their

"Early in September 2015, the picture of the young Syrian boy on the beach impacted many of us on Manitoulin Island deeply," says Sarah Quackenbush, one of the volunteers who is helping to co-coordinate the refugees' arrival to Little Current. She adds that the push to support this family has been a major undertaking.

'With only three weeks' notice that this family was arriving to Manitoulin, it meant that a lot of work had to be done in a very short time," says volunteer Lianne Hovingh, who has taken a lead role to coordinate the latest arrival of Manitoulin's refugees. "Within a week, a house to rent was found and furnished. Churches across the Island have gathered all the necessary items for each room of the house.

Ms. Quackenbush posted a call for donations on the online Resilient Manitoulin group and, as Ms. Hovingh describes, "the response was overwhelming."
To help settle the family, volun-

teers have gathered a team of English as a Second Language (ESL) teachers to ensure that the family gets English language training every day. Further volunteers have agreed to help with personal finance, acting as a gobetween with the school, running social events, helping with gov-

BAY—Byron GORE Joseph Kagige of Hamilton was sentenced on September 28 at the Gore Bay courthouse for his role in the 2015 death of Wiikwemkoong's Percy Simon Jr. Mr. Kagige had pleaded guilty to aggravated assault.

In May 2015, Percy Simon Jr., who was living in Sudbury with his partner and their children, had returned home to Wiik-

John Diebolt traces his father's path from Juno Beach through France, low countries

TEHKUMMAH—We all have those things that we hope to accomplish before we shuffle off this mortal coil, our bucket list. For Big Lake's John Diebolt that list included a very special pilgrimage to the battlefields of Europe.

One of my bucket list dreams was to follow in my dad's footsteps across Europe as he served with the Scottish Essex," said Mr. Diebolt. "I was very fortunate as my friend Wayne Neal (a summer resident of Mindemoya) came across the war diary of the Scottish Essex in his research." Mr. Neal is a student of military history and the author of a number of books and articles on the subject.

Wayne is a good friend of ours and his father-in-law was the late Charlie Cadieux," said Mr. Diebolt. "Wayne is very knowledgeable about the Second World War."

The Scottish Essex Regiment was founded in 1885, then known as the 21st Essex Battalion of Infantry, the military unit went through several name changes including the 21st Battalion, Essex Fusiliers, the 21st Regiment Essex Fusiliers and the Essex Fusiliers, finally finding the title the regiment would bear until its disbandment in

During World War II the Scottish Essex Regiment was among the first Canadian units to see combat in the European theatre, taking part in the invasion of Dieppe. By the end of the Dieppe Raid, the Essex Scottish Regiment had suffered 121 fatal casualties, with many more wounded and captured. The Essex Scottish later participated in Operation Atlantic where it took severe casualties attempting to take the Verrières Ridge on July 21. By the war's end, the Essex Scottish Regiment had suffered over 550 war dead and its 2,500 casualties were the highest of any unit in the Canadian army during

the Second World War. Today the Scottish Essex and its battle honours have been amalgamated into the Essex

Another request for recount goes to Central councillors

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Following last week's recount that overturned the October 22 result of the Ward 2 election for municipal councillor that first saw candidate John Bisaillon winning by a two-vote margin over candidate Steve Shaffer and resulted in a complete reversal of the earlier result, with candidate Steve Shaffer winning the seat by the same two-vote margin, council will consider a request for yet another recount at its next council meet-

"I have sent a request for another recount of the ballots to (Central Manitoulin) CAO Ruth Frawley," said Mr. Bisaillon on Monday of this week. He had indicated following last week's recount that he was going to consider his options

until Monday. Mr. Bisaillon noted that this course of action has been suggested by a number of people who have approached him. "I don't think there is anything not on the up and up. To be clear, I don't believe there were any irregularities involved," he said. "But if the first count was wrong I think I would be more comfortable with another recount to be sure the second count was, in fact, accurate."

There was also a changed result in the recount in Ward 1 ordered by council last week. In the recount conducted on Monday, the tally for Ward 1 candidate Angela Johnston dropped by one vote to 179 votes and the tally for candidate David


Play set on Manitoulin to have May world premiere



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Island country musician Jeff Pyette inducted into hall of fame

SAULT STE. MARIE—Gore Bay's Jeff Pyette was inducted into the Northern Ontario Country Music Hall of Fame this past weekend at the annual Northern Ontario Country Music Association (NOCMA) awards weekend in Sault Ste.

"This was a moment I'd never forget," said Mr. Pyette on the day after the festivities concluded.

Mr. Pyette was inducted into the Hall of Fame alongside Yvan Nadeau and Frank Robbins from Cochrane and Nipissing districts, respectively.

'The focus on the North is great. There's so many people that really like classic country music and are coming from areas all over the North to see this," said Mr. Pyette.

NOCMA started in 1989 as the Country Club in Sault Ste. Marie. Two years

later, the Sault Ste. Marie and District Country Music Hall of Fame began. The collection does not currently have a permanent home.

In 1993, some of the original organizers registered the term 'The Great Northern Opry' to refer to local shows and dances. Every year, notable musicians are inducted into the Hall of Fame and the Great Northern Opry. As per usual, this year a busload of Island country music fans and friends of Mr. Pyette travelled to the Sault for the event.

Many supporters have donated to the organization throughout its existence to ensure its viability. NOCMA is unique as a music organization in that many of its inductees are not career musicians.

The festivities got underway last Friday with a Great Northern Opry Show and Dance that included the musical stylings of inductee Mr. Nadeau and the Bandidos along with guests from around

On Saturday evening, the 2018 NOC-MA Awards Show started at 6 pm and featured music by White Stallion and Friends. That band also played alongside the seven Great Northern Opry and Hall of Fame inductees.

This year's Great Northern Opry inductees and their districts are Vern Cheechoo, Cochrane; Mike Joseph, Cochrane; Don Gibbings, Nipissing; Earl Bell, Algoma; Cheryl Robbins, Nipissing; Marc Serre, Sudbury; and Darrin Johnson, inductee-at-large.

Mr. Pyette was the last inductee to perform during the awards show. He played a cover of 'One Horse Down' by Blackberry Smoke.

The occasion took place under the practiced hand of master of ceremonies Marcel Gauthier who introduced the guests of honour, kept the agenda moving forward and filled the downtime with the gentle banter for which the veteran Lion is known.

Lion President Bruce Burnett offered opening remarks welcoming everyone to the venue before the assembly was led in the singing of 'O Canada' by local volunteer Wendy Gauthier. Lion Alicia McCutcheon delivered the toasts to the Queen, Lionism and guests before the head table was introduced by Lion Gauthier.

Lion Laurie McCulligh delivered the invocation before the Lions and their guests settled into a delicious dinner of prime rib.

Sitting at the head table were the guest speaker, outgoing District Governor Steve Olsen and his wife, Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Mantha (who brought regrets from Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP Carol Hughes who had a previous engagement), Lion Gauthier and his wife Wendy and Lion President Burnett and his wife Rosemary.

Mr. Mantha was the first of the invited guests to speak following the dinner and he spoke at length about the important role that service groups such as the Lions Clubs across the riding play in making the world a better placea role from which he takes inspiration in his own role as a public

servant and individual and as representative of which Mr. Mantha invoked the Lion's motto "We

Outgoing District Governor Olsen was invited to speak of the importance of the Service Dog program, a special project focus of Lions Clubs and in particular the use of service dogs to support people who suffer from seizures. The seizure service dog program has a personal interest for Lion Olsen, he noted, as he has had his own experiences with seizures.

As a gift to the outgoing District Governor, the Little Current Lions presented him with a \$500 donation toward the service dog

Before becoming its own distinct program in 2001, Dog Guides for people with epilepsy were trained under the Service (formerly Special Skills) program. Since becoming a separate program, these dog guides have gained greater recognition for the incredible service they provide to their handlers, noted Lion Olsen.

Trained to assist individuals six years of age or older with epilepsy, Seizure Response Dog Guides are capable of activating an alert system or barking for help in the event of a seizure. Their ability to respond and react quickly makes them a trustworthy companion and provides their handlers with the confidence to live independently.

"They can even sense a seizure coming on before it happens," noted Lion Olsen. "The dogs will crawl under someone lying on the ground to keep their heads from banging on the ground and injuring themselves."

Little Current Mayor Al Mac-Nevin spoke about the important work that Lions and their supporting volunteers do in the community. He noted the many sides of Lion Gauthier, who has recently retired as a town councillor and the roles that Lion Gauthier has played as a volunteer, particularly as a master of ceremonies at so many of the events Mayor Mac-

Central Manitoulin against Hydro One Garlon use

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—A notice of motion expressing the municipality's opposition to the use of Garlon RTU and similar herbicides was brought forward to the council table in Central Manitoulin by outgoing Councillor Alex Baran after the motion failed to gain enough support at the committee level to be recommended to council.

Councillor Baran read out the preambles and body of the motion before offering his comments.

"It came from a delegation on the issue to whom we recommended a petition process," said Councillor Baran. "After culling through the names on the petition I recognized 174 as local," he continued. "Since then I have realized that there were a couple

Councillor Baran admitted that a presentation to council made by Hydro One last spring had left a positive impression that the use of Garlon RTU was efficient and safe, so he decided to do independent research on the material.

"I went to the company site and read the label," he said, noting that the warnings included admonitions to wear gloves when handling. This prompted him to look further into the material. "Most democratic countries have placed bans on this stuff," he

The motion was moved by Councillor Baran and seconded by Councillor Derek Stephens.

"Whereas Garlon RTU has been cited by its manufacturer, Dow Chemical, as toxic to fish and birds; and whereas Garlon RTU has failed OECD and EEC tests for ready biodegradability; and whereas 174 local residents of this municipality have signed a petition requesting the municipality to adopt a position opposing the use of Garlon RTU; be it resolved that the municipality declares its opposition to the use of Garlon RTU and other variants and similar herbicides in vegetation management on Hydro One rights of way within this municipal-

In the ensuing debate on the motion, Councillor Ted Taylor raised concerns on the impact the motion might have on the ferry operations and the work being done to control phragmites in Provi-

Councillor Patricia MacDonald noted that the herbicide is toxic to fish and expressed concerns that the length of time that it takes for the sub-...continued on page 23

Horse Club objects to suggestion of dog park in horse ring

LITTLE CURRENT—At a meeting of the Northeast Town council held October 16, Sylvia Moggy, representing the Manitoulin Horse Club, expressed her concerns about a proposed dog park at the Little Current horse ring, located on the rec centre

As was reported previously, council heard, for the second time in as many years, a deputation from John Royal encouraging council to consider the development of a dog park in Little Current. As part of the conversation, Mr. Royal gave three options to council: Sisson Park, the horse ring and Turner Park.

It was noted to Mr. Royal that council had already determined that Mountainside Estates (located behind the Manitoulin Flee Market) would be the best place for a dog park, but failing that would support the horse ring. It was agreed that a dog park would be supported by the municipality if it were volunteer-run and paid for, but the municipality would not take it on.

Following news of the potential for a horse ringturned dog park, Ms. Moggy asked to speak with council.

Ms. Moggy articulately outlined the Horse Club's concerns in several points: dogs digging holes means a safety concern to horses' sensitive body structure; the potential for horse/dog encounters and therefore the potential for unpredictable and dangerous situations; dogs are predators and their scent could mean horses, as prey animals, may become unpredictable and agitated; and the addition of a snow fence could mean the ring would no longer meet American Quarter Horse Association standards, as well as horse safety concerns. Ms. Moggy also noted to council that the fenced-in tennis courts could be an ideal temporary location for a dog park.

"Many people naively think that horses and dogs go together because some horse owners have dogs as well," she continued. "But horses and dogs must be very carefully socialized and acclimatized to each other so that they can co-exist safely. A horse that is unfamiliar with dogs may have unpredictable reactions to the presence of a dog.'

100 years since the War to End All Wars—when will we ever learn?

The First World War was the greatest calamity ever to strike humanity. The incredible power of technology had come to the game of princes and the result was such a massive and catastrophic loss of life and limb that people across the globe heaved a collective sigh of relief and bells rang out from places of worship across the length and breadth of 100 nations after 11 am on November 11, 1918. The War to End All Wars was finally over.

Such was the scale of the carnage that many believed that human beings must finally have learned the lesson that war in the modern age had finally become unthinkable. It wasn't.

Before the barbed wire had been coiled and put away and the minefields and surfeit of unused ordinance that burdened humanity sunk into the troughs of the deepest seas, even as the ink was still drying on the signatories to the Treaty of Versailles, the stage was being set to once more set the world on a course to global conflict and the resulting Second World War.

This was, of course, another massive global conflict that resulted in the loss of millions of lives, thanks to the intersection of modern technology and the monstrous concept of total war where the bulk of those losses were civilian.

Europe lay prostrate once again, its industries devastated beyond even the twisted imagination of a Danté. Humanity began to rebuild and, with the enlightened implementation of the Marshall Plan to rebuild those nations who so recently had been our deadliest enemies, we seemed to be once more on the brink of a lasting peace. So it came to

Yes there were still hundreds of thousands of (largely civilian) deaths to war with each passing year, but the nuclear Sword of Damocles that had been unsheathed over Hiroshima and Nagasaki brought the concept of mutually assured destruction (with the appropriate acronym MAD) to keep the world's major powers from once again unleashing total war. Like a Mexican standoff with grenades, there would be no winners, only losers.

Still we failed to learn. Global powers continued to duke

it out in the game of princes, but now they used proxy pawns,

carefully avoiding being drawn too far into direct conflict. Certainly there were the Korean War and the Vietnam War in which the US and China came in direct (if undeclared) blows, but the other nuclear superpower, the Soviet Union, held back from the brink. Millions of Korean and Vietnamese civilians paid the cost of those conflicts.

On November 11 we will honour those men and women who continue to stand upon the ramparts to defend our nation, our freedom and our democracy. This year, on November 11, we will especially recall the nearly 61,000 Canadians who were killed during the First World War (more if we count those who later succumbed to their wounds) and the further 172,000 who were maimed and wounded in that conflict when we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice.

But despite humanity's repeated failures to realize the dream encompassed in the articles of that Armistice, that dream where the human race will have finally put an end to war, we must never lose sight or hope that one day that dream will be realized. Let us fervently hope that dream will not be realized as we crawl out from under the rubble of global nuclear devastation. For if the lessons of the First World War, the Second World War, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, Desert Storm, the War in Afghanistan have taught us anything, it is that nothing is unthinkable to those who insist on playing the game of princes. The catch phrase of veterans of the past was "never

Canadians have proudly stood for generations as those who work for peace. We are, for the most part, proud of our efforts and our role in peacekeeping throughout the world. Let us not lose hope, let us not break faith with those who have put themselves in harm's way toward that dream, that goal of a humanity secure in peace and safe from the horrors and ravages of war.

Lest we forget.

It is time to set aside the trappings of the Doctrine of Discovery

Exposure to Indigenous values at a young age would do wonders to improve mutual respect

The recent kerfuffle at Manitoulin Secondary School in M'Chigeeng is definitely a disturbing indicator of a serious communication breakdown. It's obvious to me that even on Manitoulin Island, with its assortment of impressive First Nations communities, students are not learning their Canadian history, or being introduced to important Canadian aboriginal authors, like Margaret Laurence, Basil Johnston, Lee Maracle, Georges E. Sioui, Leanne Betasamosake Simpson, Tomson Highway, Marilyn Dumont, Joseph Boyden, Maria Campbell, Thomas King, Marie Clements, and on and on...

Unfortunately, too many non-aboriginal students do not respect their Indigenous school chums. They have absorbed from either parents, or US-dominated media, white-supremacist/self-important assumptions of cultural superiority. A recent poll discovered, despite pervasive Conservative racist anti-immigration opinions filtering up from south of the border, more than 75 percent of Canadians identify with accepting refugees forced out of their homelands by wars and consequences of global warming. Few Canadians realize the value of "inclusiveness" was not imported by European immigrants centuries ago, but learned from the original inhabitants of this land.

Enough with teaching that Euro-American delusional imperialist notion of the "Divine Right of Discovery." The myth of the virtuous battle by European colonists against the savage Native American tribes, also referred to as Manifest Destiny. First used in 1845, this term conveys the notion that European "pioneers" used to justify their ruthless colonial expansion throughout North America. Instead, Canadian students should be exposed to essential texts, like 'A Fair County: Telling Truths About Canada' by John Ralston Saul.

Saul argues that, "contemporary Canada has been deeply influenced and shaped by aboriginal ideas and the experience of both Francophone and Anglophone immigrants over the 250 years, from 1600 on, during which aboriginals were either the dominant force in Canada, or equal partners. He argues, that aboriginals are making a rapid comeback and their fundamental influence needs to be recognized in order for nonaboriginal Canadians to understand themselves." Canadians and humanity in general need to understand quickly that all of us are

natives of this planet. We all have a psychic connection to nature and to our ancestors of all species. Unfortunately, too many have been shamed into amnesia.

Recently, I have engaged in an ongoing debate in this paper in regards to what I consider a confusion of values perpetuated by a largely corporate controlled media and political apparatus, that perpetuates a neo-Liberal agenda. The broader issue is how this essentially linear thinking urban imperialist/materialist agenda, in pursuit of corporate profit defined as "progress," compares to the circular thinking rural egalitarian tribal spiritual agenda, concerned with the stewardship of the land and the people.

Another essential text on my list of important school books is 'Seeds of Peace: A Buddhist Vision For Renewing Society' by Thai author Sulak Sivaraksa. In his essay, 'Development As If People Mattered,' he contrasts the western materialist assumption, that the entire development of civilization proceeds from the realization of desires and accumulation of goods, to the Buddhist and similarly Indigenous spiritual notion, that it's the reduction of desires that constitutes development. "Perhaps a truly developed city would not be distinguished by a multitude of skyscrapers, but by the values attendant in its growth: simplicity, comfort and respect for the community of life around it.'

E. F. Schumacher, in his inspiring book 'Small is Beautiful,' states: "If we can avoid the extremes of bigness and greed, we may create a world in which industry and agriculture are meaningful and satisfying for all beings." He recognizes that, "more people in the west are realizing development is not purely material and are rejecting consumer culture. They are regaining respect for nature and re-connecting with their Indigenous soul, inspiring a shift in values from self-assertion and competition to cooperation and social justice, from expansion to conservation, from material acquisition to inner growth." Exposure to such Indigenous values at a young age would do wonders to improve mutual respect and non-violent interaction amongst our student popu-

ustin A. Hunt, the father of Kagawong's storied Aus Hunt, Canada's longest serving municipal politician, was born in 1895 and was raised in Kagawong, where he also attended school. The son of Oliver and Myra (Campbell) Hunt, the young Mr. Hunt moved to Sault Ste. Marie to seek his fortune, becoming a street car conductor and later operated steam engines and threshing machines

Mr. Hunt enlisted in the 227th Battalion, and with his experience with heavy machinery, it isn't surprising that he later transferred to the Mr. Hunt was on a train and headed to Amherst, Nova Scotia and a month later he was loaded aboard captured German vessel

bound for southern England. After further training, Mr. Hunt spent the rest of his war operating an x-ray machine—a job he continued to perform for two years after the war had end-

When he came home, Mr. Hunt became a storekeeper in his wife's parents' hotel, married Stella Hilliard and raised two sons, Austin and Jack. He passed in 1981 and is buried in the

True story of humanity in the face of conflict to be presented at Remembrance Day ceremony

KAGAWONG—December, 1943, a badly damaged American bomber struggles to stay aloft over wartime Germany. At the controls is 21 year-old Second Lieutenant Charlie Brown. Half of his crew are wounded or dead. Suddenly, a Messerschmidt fighter pulls up on the bomber's tail. German ace Franz Stigler is the pilot and with a simple the squeeze of a trigger he could have destroyed the young American

What follows, "is truly a story about humanity coming out in the face of conflict," stated Rick Nelson, curator of the Old Mill Heritage Centre Museum and a member of the Kagawong Cenotaph committee, as he provided a glimpse into the speech he will be delivering at the Remembrance Day ceremonies on November 11 at the Park Cen-

"My speech on Remembrance Day will be about the contents of a book, 'Higher Call,' that a member of the cenotaph committee, Peter Fletcher, gave me to read a year ago," said Mr. Nelson. "I was so moved, it was hard to read without getting emotional.'

"The German pilot was Franz Stigler and his job was to shoot down enemy bombers," said Mr. Nelson. "But in this case he spared an enemy bomber; the Allies' role was to fly over Germany and hit targets with bombs, but 2nd LT. Brown's plane had been hit by flak and he was hoping to get out of enemy territory and get back to England.'

Dianne Fraser, who is also on the cenotaph committee, twill be delivering a speech in tribute of nurse Edith Cavell. "Of course as part of the ceremony we will we will be focusing on the 100th anniversary of the ending of WW1. In my presentation I will be doing a tribute to nurse Edith Cavell, a British Nurse in World War 1 who was in Belgium when World War One started. She nursed many soldiers, whether they were British, German etc." Edith Cavell was accused of treason, found guilty by a court-martial, "and was executed because she was helping Allied soldiers.

"We will also be remembering Billings War 1 veterans at the service." said Ms. Fraser.

"After the Remembrance Day ceremonies everyone is invited to come to the Old Mill Heritage Centre Museum to see a CBC documentary on the book 'Higher Call'," continued Mr. Nelson. "The story is a true story of humanity in the face of battle."

Mr. Nelson pointed out the two pilots met again 50 years ago. "I will be explaining in my speech about their encounter in the air and how they met again 50 years later."

'Once I got the book and started reading it I couldn't put it down," said Mr. Nelson. "It made the top 10 New York Times best seller lists.

I'm surprised no one has made a movie out of it—it has all the elenents of a great story."

As part of the Remembrance Day service, the Irish Regiment Honour Guard will be returning again this year to take part in the wreath laying ceremony, said Mr. Nelson.

Questions abound about the sad saga of the Norisle

To the Expositor:

Now that the matter has been resolved, as a taxpayer who will be paying towards the costs involved with the Norisle legal action I would like some answers and transparency from both sides.

I have read that had it not been for the actions of the municipality, the Norisle would already be in dry dock at Sault Ste. Marie and the refit would be 50 percent complete. I ask then, why is it not there now? One can only conclude that either all of the necessary funding has been secured or at least enough to move the ship and begin a substantial portion of the work. It appeared the municipality wanted the Norisle gone. I ask, did the Norisle Society offer to purchase and remove the ship prior to commencing legal action or once discovery had begun? Surely the society could have avoided its own legal costs and have what it wanted. Everybody could have had what they wanted.

I also want full public disclosure of all facts from both sides. What agreement was made initially with the Society and the municipality? Why did the Society commence legal action seeking ownership of the Norisle through constructive trust? This would imply the society had title to the ship and it was unjustly taken. Am I to understand now that governments cannot be held to honour contracts by the

Would the Society make public documentation to show the taxpayers exactly what had been accomplished and the complete design, specifications and schedule for the planned work and when the ship would be back in service? I would be most curious to know what it would have looked

like when completed.

I would also like the society to publicly disclose what commitments it had for funding, through grants or private and public investment, how much was already received and how much had been spent and for what. If contracts were in place for the refit of the vessel and other for obligations the Society may have, has the municipality been indemnified against any further liability resulting from potential actions against the Society?

Finally, after all the efforts on the part of the Society, money raised and spent, the efforts of so many volunteers, why settle for a measly \$45,000, a mere drop in the bucket considering the magnitude of the venture

The Little Current Swing Bridge is more than just a bridge

Doesn't the world have enough big, modern, expensive bridges?

To the Expositor:

I'm afraid Manitoulin is heading towards a big loss, and I wonder if anyone else shares my concerns. It has to do with the swing bridge and the ideas that seem to be surfacing about its future.

The best destinations around the world all have their unique symbols. Toronto has the CN Tower. New York has the Statue of Liberty. San Francisco has the Golden Gate bridge. Venice has its gondolas. For more than a century, the swing bridge has been Manitoulin's own unique symbol, yet I hear talk about replacing it. This would be a huge mistake. Of course we all want reliable year-round access to the mainland. That goes without saying. The thing is, the swing bridge can be managed to provide this while also doing something no modern alternative can match. Maintaining the swing bridge is the only option that will preserve the main symbol of Manitoulin to the world. Replacing it with some modern alternative would be a big loss for our island.

When I hear people in authority using fuzzy phrases like "the bridge is nearing the end of its service life" and "we need a reliable link to the mainland," I know public opinion is being gently led in a direction that will make Mani-

toulin less distinct, less marketable and less unique. Public statements like these are all connotation and no meaning. Think about it for a minute. Does anyone really believe that the designers of our swing bridge made it to last for only a certain "service life" and no more? Of course not. Any practical person knows that every mechanical thing in the world can be repaired and maintained forever in top condition if the will exists. Anything that works as good as new is as good as new. Our swing bridge is no different. Government reports tell us that it's currently in very good condition, but of course it won't stay that way forever. Nothing does, not even a new bridge. If technical problems with the swing bridge loom on the horizon, fix them. If the bull gear gets worn, put in a new one. If the concrete piers out in the channel start to crumble, pour new ones. If the main bearing only has so many more years of service, install a fresh one. Would anyone say that the Empire State Building or the cathedrals of Europe are "nearing the ends of their service lives?" Of course not. These working icons will always be maintained because they're important for more than what they do. They're also important for what they represent. Our swing bridge is no different. It moves traffic, but it's also the most distinctive symbol we have to

show the world who we are. Nothing modern can compare.

No doubt, some people will raise the objection that the swing bridge is "too expensive to maintain. A new bridge will be cheaper," they say. Really? Show us the independently audited cost projections that prove how maintaining the bridge we've got will cost more than the massive amount of engineering, environmental studies, construction, maintenance and financing costs that a completely new bridge would demand.

I'm probably not the only one who feels that a centuryold Manitoulin icon is threatened. Doesn't the world already have enough big, modern, expensive bridges? Manitoulin is a great place precisely because it's not a big, modern, expensive place. Manitoulin's got roots and it remembers its past. Is there anyone else out there who says we need to keep the swing bridge in great condition because of what it represents as well as what it does? Now's the time to ensure we don't lose Manitoulin's most distinctive symbol.

Manitoulin Island and the new Great Lakes Islands Alliance

MADELINE ISLAND, WI— Natural beauty, abundant resources and water-based industries have attracted people for centuries to a life near the shorelines of the five Great Lakes. Some people have taken this urge a step further and chosen to live on islands in the Great Lakes. That is, they live on land masses that are completely surrounded by water and geographically separated from the mainland. This is the case with Manitoulin Island which has a rich history of at least 10,000 years of people exploring and living here.

Manitoulin is one of approximately 32,000 islands in the Great Lakes, the largest and most diverse collection of freshwater islands in the world. Although most are uninhabited, about 30 islands have a diverse mix of permanent residents, summer cottagers, and transient visitors.

As all permanent and summer residents of Manitoulin are aware, there is something special about the way of life, atmosphere, and the people who live here and the same is felt by the residents of other islands. These communities are culturally, socially, and ecologically rich and have deep connections to place and the natural world.

Although all island communities in the Great Lakes are distinct from one another in character and geography, they have in common many challenges to 'island living' including sustainable economic development, unemployment, aging populations, deteriorating infrastructure, invasive species, damaged and polluted ecosystems, changing water levels, safe drinking water, sewage treatment, and the preservation of history.

A new partnership called the Great Lakes Islands Alliance—shortened to GLIA—was formed in late 2017 to celebrate the uniqueness of these freshwater islands and to address some of their common challenges. GLIA brings together island res-

idents, advocates and leaders from across the Great Lakes who share the unique experience of living and working in these geographically isolated places.

GLIA is a network of volunteers consisting of individuals and organizations dedicated to emphasizing the special needs of islands. Its purpose is to encourage the building of relationships between Great Lakes islands, foster the exchange of information and help leverage resources to address challenges and embrace opportunities for the benefit of islands.

In a sense, GLIA acts collectively as a 'think tank' with members who address

island topics. In doing so it is hoped that all Great Lakes residents—namely islanders but also mainland decision-makers and the general public—will better understand the uniqueness of islands and will help ensure their islands remain as places where people choose to live, work and play.

The initiative for GLIA was spearheaded by Jon Allan of the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes, drawing inspiration from a network of islands off the coast of Maine in the US. There, a successful organization was spawned called the Island Institute which has a mandate to connect island residents with the resources to solve problems.

The first Summit or meeting of GLIA volunteers was held on Beaver Island in upper Lake Michigan in the fall of 2017. It was attended by Alicia McCutcheon, editor of The Manitoulin Expositor, and since then, there have been monthly conference calls including a small committee of Manitoulin representatives. The Beaver Island Summit spawned the idea of forming a long-lasting partnership between islands.

Since the first Summit, islanders continued to dis-

Suspended driver charged in Billings Township

As a result, a 47-year-old male of Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation has been charged with driving while under suspension, contrary to section 53(1) of the Highway Traffic Act.

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Gore Bay on January 10, 2019.

Traffic stop results in multiple charges

On Friday, November 2, an officer from the Manitoulin-Espanola detachment of the OPP was conducting traffic patrols of Highway 551 in Carnarvon Township.

At approximately 3:34 pm, the officer observed a violation and conducted a traffic stop. Alcohol was located within the vehicle.

As a result of an investigation, a 25-year-old man of M'Chigeeng First Nation was issued Provincial Offences Notices for: Speeding 1, 49 km/h over the posted limit, contrary to section 128 of the Highway traffic Act (HTA); drive motor vehicle - no licence, contrary to section 32(1) of the HTA; drive motor vehicle with open container of liquor, contrary to section 32(1) of the Liquor Licence Act; and fail to surrender insurance card, contrary to section 3(1) of the Compulsory Automobile Insurance Act.

Watch for deer on the roadways

The Manitoulin-Espanola Detachment of the OPP is urging all motorists not to veer for deer.

The OPP is reminding the motoring public to be alert and aware of their surroundings. Manitoulin-Espanola OPP has investigated multiple collisions involving deer over the past several weeks.

Deer-vehicle collision rates increase significantly 1.5 hours on either side of sunset and sunrise. Although there is often signage to warn motorists of higher deer-travelled areas, motorists need to be aware in all areas. Deer don't limit their activity to rural roads. The animals have been known to cross the busy roadways as well.

Some helpful hints to ensure a safe journey during this time of year are as follows:

Look all around, not just straight ahead. Deer will often run across the road from ditches and protected areas such as stream corridors and woodlots.

Where you see one deer, expect more. Deer often travel in herds.

Slow down. The slower you go, the more time you have to react should you encounter a deer.

Deer can move across roads at any time of the day or year but anticipate higher deer movements in the fall and around sunrise and sunset.

Watch for glowing eyes of deer at night.

Don't veer for deer. Should a deer run into the path of your vehicle, reduce your speed quickly, steer straight and stay in control.

Remove all distractions. Give yourself the best chance possible to see and predict where deer might go.

Buckle up. If you need to stop in a hurry, you want your body restrained to prevent unnecessary injury or possibly death

The Scott Woods Old Time Christmas Show will bring the "sweet harmonies of twin fiddles, smooth vocals and lots of traditional Christmas music, played in a traditional country, western swing and old time fiddle style."

Mr. Woods is recently returned from a tour of Germany, where he and his troupe were well received. "They are familiar with a lot of music from North America, but they are not so familiar with Canadian

With step dancing aplenty, and Mr. Woods' famed acrobatic antics with the fiddle (including somersaults and walking on a barrel while not skipping a note), the high energy show provides wholesome family humour and entertainment for all.

"There are six of us on the road," said Mr. Woods. He is joined onstage by his sister, Kendra (Woods) Norris, a multi-instrumentalist and no stranger to old time fiddling herself, having won the Canadian Duet Fiddle Championship title three times running with Scott and several solo wins in various classes (including the 2016 Canadian Open 19-55 division). Ms. Woods has recently retired from her day job as a teacher and can now dedicate herself full-time to the touring group.

Ms. Woods has a unique role in the troupe along with her musical stylings, her expressive face lets the audience know when Mr. Woods is pulling their legs or up to some other antic onstage. "Her face is very expressive," he said. "I might be going thermonuclear on the stage and there she is in the background hamming it up."

Also performing with Mr. Woods and his sister are Canadian Country Music Association Award winner and Guitar Player of the Year, Steve Piticco; bass player Peter Sisk and step dancer 14-year-old Leo Stock. Keeping the tempo lively will be drummer/vocalist Bill Carruthers.

Mr. Woods is a two-time winner of the Canadian Open Fiddle Contest, a two-time winner of the Canadian Grand Masters Fiddle Championship and Fiddle Entertainer of the Year. In August of 2018, he was presented with the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Canadian Grand Masters Fiddling Association. Mr. Woods, known affectionately as 'The Flippin' Fiddler,' tours extensively across Canada and the US every year raising funds for churches, charities and community service organizations.

But it is the love of the performance and the impact their music has on the people in the audience, not accolades pouring in, that keeps the band on its grueling tour schedule, notes Mr. Woods.

"We often see a couple in their 50 and 60s, even older, in the audience that look at each other and smile," he said. "You can tell they are being transported back in time by one of their favourite tunes."

try," said Mr. Pyette, adding that the song he chose was released in 2014. "It's on modern country radio but it sat well. It's one I've been playing a lot. The band was spot on and it broke up what we were doing."

He said he was a bit nervous leading into the event but managed to pull through.

"I got over my afternoon jitters at the last minute," said Mr. Pyette. "I've performed there before, but it was a bit more about me this time and I'm not quite used to the spotlight."

Getting all his thoughts out on stage was a challenging task for Mr. Pyette.

"I'm trying to bask in the glory and everything and in the back of my mind I'm just hoping I'm not going to lose it up there in front of so many people," he said. "There was a lot more I could have said but I was getting to the point where I was trying to dodge the subject to keep my composure. In the end I got to thank a few people individually and let them know how I felt."

Mr. Pyette received a few keepsakes from the event. MP Carol Hughes and MPP Mike Mantha both prepared a plaque for Mr. Pyette and he received another plaque from the Canadian Country Music Association acknowledging his contributions to the art form. "It was a super, super time. There was seating for 550 in the conference room and even the hallways had a lot of people," said Mr. Pyette. Most of his family was able to attend the ceremony, where friends and strangers alike cheered on Mr. Pyette.

"I was hoping I was going to represent the Island well and I was told by some stranger from North Bay, 'I think you just represented your jurisdiction as well as anybody can."

ernment paperwork and offering their friendship and hospitality to the family.

The initiative has a special significance for Siska Poenn, a volunteer who helped prepare the house and who will be one of the family's ESL teachers. When she was 12 years old, in 1969, she emigrated from the Netherlands to settle in

"It was a hot, humid day in Toronto, the trees were budding and no one spoke my language. We were picked up by two men, representatives of the Dutch community, and driven to Hamilton," says Ms. Poenn.

"One of the large Dutch Reformed churches in the area had prepared our new home in much the same way as we have done here, with donated furniture and household items—including a fully stocked fridge!'

Ms. Poenn says she is grateful for the many people who supported her family when they arrived, including her ESL teacher named Mrs. Brown.

"I'm happy to be able to help make the immigration experience easier for this new family," she says.

In June 2015, the United Nations Commission of Inquiry on Human Rights in Eritrea published its report that outlined the country's long history of torture, sexual abuse, indefinite military service and extensive surveillance to keep its citizens under control. The prison system is full of estimated tens of thousands of political prisoners.

The United Nations had estimated in 2014 that 357,406 Eritreans, or between six and 10 percent of the country's population, were living as refugees outside the country. There are many reported cases of refugees dying or being kidnapped as they tried to escape the country, and still further reports of refugees being killed before they could leave Eritrea. There exists a shoot-to-kill policy at border locations to prevent residents from leaving the country, a violation of the fundamental human right to life.

In February of 2016, the first of five sponsored Eritrean families arrived on Manitoulin. When they first arrived, some of the families were broken up as some children had to stay behind in refugee camps. The family that had settled in Manitowaning left behind their son, his wife and three grandchildren between six months and seven years

Ms. Hovingh partnered with an organization called World Renew to privately sponsor the remaining families left in the refugee camps. The family that arrives today, November 7, is the Manitowaning family's remaining children and grandchildren.

Sponsoring a family involves raising enough money to support them without government assistance for one year. It includes provisions for housing, English education, assistance in the health and education systems, cultural experiences and teaching everyday duties such as banking and grocery shopping among their communities.

'I just thought of my own children and what I would do if they were in the same situation," says Ms. Hovingh.

The original families that settled on Manitoulin two years ago have all relocated to other parts of the country. Three families have moved to Ottawa, one family is in Burnaby, B.C. and another family is in Kitchener. One individual has moved to Sault Ste. Marie.

Ms. Hovingh says she is thankful to the Island community who are eagerly coming together to welcome this family to their new home in Little Current.

"If you see them out and about in town, don't be shy. Feel free to say hi and welcome them to Manitoulin," she says.


increased by one to 113 votes. The tally for incumcouncillor Derek Stephens remained the same at 180 votes. The end result was that there was no change in the candidates elected.

There remains a single vacancy on council for Ward 3. Incumbent Councillor Linda Farquhar was acclaimed to her position, but no candidate stepped forward for the second councillor position.

It will be up to Central Manitoulin council to determine how that seat will be filled.

The seat must be filled unless a vacancy occurs within 90 days of a new election date.

According to the Municipal Elections Act, 1996 "requires an automatic recount only if the votes are tied. Your municipal council or school board may have a policy that sets out other reasons for an automatic recount. If you

feel there should be a recount, and the rules for an automatic recount don't apply, you can ask the municipal council or school board to order a recount. Any recounts must be ordered within 30 days after the clerk has declared the results of the election.

If you are an eligible voter, you can also apply to the Superior Court of Justice to ask a judge to order a recount. Recounts must be done the same way that the votes were originally counted, unless the recount is ordered by the court. For example, if the votes were counted by a vote tabulator,

they may not be counted by hand during the recount. If a recount is ordered by the court, the judge may order that the votes be counted in a different manner if the judge believes that the way the votes were counted the first time was an issue.'

Municipal councils may have a procedural bylaw in place that determines how vacancies are filled.

According to the regulations set out on the Municipal Affairs website, "a vacant seat can be filled either by appointing someone who is qualified or by holding a by-election. If a council or board decides to

fill a vacancy by appointment, they must appoint a person who is eligible to serve on the council or board and who is willing to accept the appointment. The legislation does not set out any other criteria. It is up to the council or board to determine how they will decide who to appoint. Different approaches include: appointing the candidate who came second in the regular election, inviting interested persons to apply for the position or offering the appointment to a member of the community. Sometimes councils or boards want to put additional restrictions on appointees, such as requiring that an appointee agrees not to run in the next regular election. While a council or board may set this as a condition for appointment, there is nothing in provincial legislation that would prevent someone who was appointed from running in the next

election.' As for Mr. Bisaillon, he said that he was going to see how things play out before deciding if, or how, he will proceed.

"It's a comedy but there's certainly a dramatic vein to the story," says playwright Kristen Da Silva.

All the characters have secrets they haven't been sharing with one another, and the big secret that drives the plot is that spoiler alert!—Glenda is sick.

"It's a story that came from my personal life. I lost an aunt to pancreatic cancer two Decembers ago," says Ms. Da Silva. "It came from watching my mom go through losing her sister and knowing she was going to die. They've been very close ever since my aunt was born.'

She says her mom and aunt lived in close quarters growing up, moved away during their lives and retired together in the same part of Ontario. A few years later, her aunt was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and had a year and a half to say goodbye to her friends and family and cope with her impending fate.

"I was inspired by my own grieving

process to write the story, the main theme being what it would be like to know that you didn't have as much time left as you thought. The idea of what that would feel like as a person dying, but also how it would change the relationships with the people you're closest to," says Ms. Da Silva.

The play's setting on Manitoulin Island is an integral part of the story. She says she knew it needed to be on an island because Beth needs to decide whether she stays or

"If it was set somewhere remote and difficult to get to, the decision to stay home or get treatment gets taken away," says Ms. Da Silva. Her first thought had been to set the play on Cape Breton, but decided on Manitoulin to make the story closer to home and more authentic to her experience.

She had been acting in a feature film that happened to be filming in Sudbury last summer. She had a few days off and visited Manitoulin for the first time.

"It was great, lovely to see and neat to be

Legion book celebrating Canadian veterans welcomes submissions

LITTLE CURRENT—The Royal Canadian Legion Ontario Command's Military Service Recognition Book (MSRB) is now available in its fifth edition but its future depends on submissions from the commu-

"Each year, the number has decreased and at present only 135 submissions have been received for next year's volume. There will be room for 600-700 entries thus we are concerned with having enough entries to justify another volume next year and that would be a shame," says Roy Eaton, MSRB chair for District H.

The MSRB is a book that features short biographies of veterans with ties to District H. Family and friends veterans can submit their stories free of charge to be included in the book.

Each spread is made up of one page of advertisements and one page of veteran biographies. For every page of advertising, three veterans can be featured.

"We use it as a fundraiser for the provincial command and to support veterans programs across the province," says Mr. Eaton. "Completing an application honours a loved one's service and, in addition, each volume provides funds to support current veterans in time of need."

MSRB program The began in Newfoundland and has since spread to all provinces except Quebec, mainly due to their French language, according to Ontario Command MSRB chair Ron Goebel.

Mr. Goebel writes in an email that the fundraising has greatly benefited the Legion but there are major challenges ahead.

"Although we are doing well financially, I wish I could say the same about the number of submissions that we have been receiving for our books. In fact, we are now in somewhat of a crisis regarding submissions," states Mr. Goebel.

According to his figures, District H has received 3,667 submissions to date, but the majority of those came during the first two years of the program. Each edition can hold about 700 biographies and, while the first five editions have been filled, there are only 135 biographies left to fit into next September's

The problem lies not in the number of stories to be told. Mr. Eaton says that although it is nearly impossible to determine the true number of veterans in Canada, well over one million Canadians are thought to have served in the Second World War alone.

"So many submissions were received in the first years that it took up to four years to publish all of them. This led to some people being discouraged, and each year the number of new submissions decreased," savs Mr Eaton.

These books are available free of charge to anyone who is interested in the individuals who have fought for Canada. Profits are garnered through selling advertisements within the book.

"During the past two months, monies from the program in the total of \$60,200 was donated for three various veteran transition programs," states Mr. Eaton.

three programs involve a support system for dealing with trauma and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), a service to help wounded, injured or disabled veterans recover and a group that offers adventures and peer support to help reduce the effects of stress.

Stories in the book come from friends, relatives and family members of those who have served, as well as veterans themselves. There is no charge to submit a story. Mr. Eaton says any submissions received soon are "virtually guaranteed" to be included in the sixth vol-

Story submissions can be dropped off at one's local Legion branch. The cut-off for the upcoming September edition is May 31, 2019. Branch 177 in Little Current is open from Tuesday to Saturday from 4 pm until

There is a submission form on the Ontario Command website that must be included when the story is dropped off at the Legion. Mr. Eaton encourages anyone interested in the program to contact Branch 177 after 4 pm between Tuesday and Saturday at 705-368-

Businesses interested in placing an advertisement in the province-wide book are requested to contact Ontario Command. This year's run was 15,000 copies distributed across Ontario.

ing about an altercation that had occurred at a home on Andrew Crescent. When police arrived, Mr. Simon's lifeless body was found outside. Following an investigation by the Wikwemikong Tribal Police, assisted by the Ontario Provincial Police North East Region Crime Unit, under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) Acting Detective Inspector Gilles Depratto, three individuals were charged, initially with second degree murder. Charges were later upgraded to first degree murder against Robert Travis Wemigwans and Tammy Trudeau, both of Wiikwemkoong, and Byron Kagige of

The other two accused were sentenced in

the spring of this year. Robert Travis Wemigwans of Wiikwemkoong pleaded not guilty to first degree murder but guilty to manslaughter. He was sentenced to 7.5 years less 4.5 years' credit for time served. Tammy Lou Elaine Trudeau, also of Wiikwemkoong, pleaded not guilty to manslaughter but guilty to assault causing bodily harm. Ms. Trudeau was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment less three months credit for time served, followed by two years' probation.

On September 28, Mr. Kagige was sentenced to 12 months' custody (he has already served 11 months of pre-sentencing custody), three years' probation, is prohibited from owning or using a firearm for 10 years and must submit a DNA sample.

able to go around and look at what the local architecture is like, what the homes look like, what kind of stores and restaurants are there. I got a sense of the feeling of the Island and the culture of it, well, as much as you can glean as an outsider looking in," says Ms. Da Silva.

She says even the swing bridge fit perfectly into her story line.

"I loved the concept of this bridge that swings once per hour and the road is out. So I wove that into the story and with that element the Island almost becomes a character itself," she says.

Manitoulin had been Glenda's late husband Mark's childhood home; when they married, he had strongly believed in staying where his loved ones were.

In addition to producing her own plays and teaching a high school class on playwriting, Ms. Da Silva serves as Theatre Orangeville's playwright-in-residence. The theatre's artistic director David Nairn says the theatre already hosted another of her plays, 'Sugar Road,' and he has nothing but praise for Ms. Da Silva.

She's probably one of the most talented up-and-coming new writers on the scene. She's amazing, her work is top-

notch." Mr. Nairn says a long-time Theatre Orangeville supporter is from Little Current and his wife is from Manitowan-

ing. He says the couple has spoken with him several times and they are convinced it will be a hit.

"It's very funny but it's going to pull at some heartstrings a bit," says Mr. Nairn. "People are seeing very real battles that they're going to understand."

Ms. Da Silva says she began writing 'Where You Are' in winter of 2017 but only had about two scenes completed by August when she visited the Island for the first time. Between August and December of that year, she wrote the rest of the play.

"I hope I've done justice to the lifestyle there. I hope they have positive feelings about the play. A lot of the themes around the location certainly give honour to how much people love the place they live," says Ms. Da Silva.

For Islanders who want to see the production's run, Ms. Da Silva says she hopes to get the play in other theatres after its first run, and adds that Theatre Sudbury would be a fitting place for it.

"I'd love to meet some of the folks from Manitoulin and get their thoughts on it. That'd be a neat experience," she

...continued from page 6 cuss what this partnership should look like. The calls are chaired by Matt Preisser of the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes located in Lansing, Michigan. Preisser is the co-ordinator of GLIA and played a key role in organizing the second Summit which was held on Madeline Island in lower Lake Superior in early October.

The Madeline Summit attracted 80 representatives from 13 islands including Jim Nies and his wife Sue and myself and my wife Marilyn. A highlight of the Madeline Summit was the unanimous approval of GLIA's Charter. There was agreement that the vision of GLIA was to support individual islands for current and future generations and to honour their distinct culture and characters while growing the collective impact of an interisland network.

The Madeline Summit also selected five members for a steering committee: Kristy Beyer of Drummond Island, Bob Anderson of Beaver Island, Michael Madeline Childers of Island, Mike Gora of Middle Bass Island myself of Manitoulin Island. Each will work with the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes and Northland College of Ashland, Wisconsin to help recruit new members, set priorities and address Great Lakes-wide issues.

It was an amazing experience for the Nieses, and my wife and I to interact with people from different islands and to hear about issues being faced by others. Each island brought samples of their literature and as did we for Manitoulin. For a brief summary on the Madeline Island Summit, see the Manitoulin Expositor Wednesday, October 10 on page 13.

During the early developmental stages of GLIA, there was some discussion as to whether or not Manitoulin Island was indeed an island because of the bridge at Little Current. However, the issue was settled when we described how residents and visitors arrive by the Chi-Cheemaun ferry, two airports, and a bridge that is functional for only 45 minutes each hour and open the rest of the time to allow passage of large ships.

Additional islands didn't exactly "fit the original mold." For example, Les Cheneaux Islands are a series of 36 small islands in Michigan waters of northern Lake Huron. Though none contain sizeable yearround populations, they see themselves as an island community and face many of the same threats as other larger island communities, particularly from the environmental front.

As a direct result of open discussion and improved awareness, the GLIA wanted to be inclusive and now welcomes all "island communities," however they may define themselves. The focus does remain on the peopled places, however there is recognition that

the other 31,970 or so uninhabited islands are special in their own right.

Parallel efforts to protect the ecological integrity of the many uninhabited islands are ongoing by federal, provincial, state, and local governments, Tribes, First Nations, land conservancies and others. The GLIA will be looking for ways to connect and support these other important initiatives.

A common topic of conversation among participants at the Summit was for each to describe their island and this became a highlight of our Madeline experience as we pointed out that Manitoulin was the largest island in the Alliance with a population of about 12,600 residents. While we knew little about islands such as Middle Bass, Beaver, and Washington, most of the participants knew little about Manitoulin.

Some islands such as Mackinac in Lake Michigan have a well-developed tourist industry while others such as Madeline are mainly covered by forests. Most participants were surprised to hear that Manitoulin has about 200 farms with the majority in calf and cattle production. However, the biggest surprise was the Chi-Cheemaun. Most were astounded that our ferry has a capacity of about 240 automobiles and a restaurant that hosts dinner cruises.

The four Manitoulin participants took pride in describing the swing bridge, the six First Nation reserves, geological features such as escarpments, alvars, and signs of glaciation, hiking trails, three golf courses, two breweries, and world-class fishing boating and hunting.

Other participants were amazed to hear about Country Fest, put on by a radio station that emphasizes Canadian country music keeps islanders informed of weather, roads and marine forecasts, Haweater Weekend (most had never heard the term Haweater), Woodland art, and quaint towns of Little Current, Gore Bay, Kagawong, Mindemoya, Wiikwemkoong and Manitowaning, each with a relaxing, country-style atmosphere.

We described winter activities such as snowshoeing, cross country skiing, curling, hockey, snow machining, and ice fishing. We also told of our good fortune in having two newspa-The Manitoulin pers. Expositor and the Manitoulin West Recorder that Islanders well keep informed of all issues and news.

Although everyone living on or visiting Manitoulin knows it is an island, it is easy to ignore that our island is part of one of the planet's most important aquatic ecosystems and that we play a key role in its health. The Summit provided all participants the opportunity to reflect on scope of the Great Lakes system and the role of their island in it.

Manitoulin Island is near the northeastern shore of Lake Huron which is one of five Great Lakes, the others being Lake Superior to our northwest, Michigan to our southwest and Erie and Ontario to our southeast. They all are dominant parts of the physical and cultural heritage of North America. Together, these vast inland freshwater seas span about 1,100 km from west to east and provide water for consumption, transportation, power, recreation and a host of ecological servic-

The Great Lakes comprise about 21 percent of the world's surface fresh water and 84 percent of North America's surface fresh water. They influence our weather and climate; without them, Ontario would receive so little rain and snow it would become an inland desert.

The Great Lakes basin (lake basins are the geographic land areas where all waters flow towards a lake or ocean, also referred to as drainage basin or watershed) encompasses large parts of both Canada and the United States. Nearly 25 percent of Canada's agricultural production and seven percent of American farm production is in this basin. It is populated by about 30 million people—roughly 30 percent of Canada's population and apply for funds to establish an Island Innovation Centre with people to address issues such as enhancing farm productivity, selecting future agricultural crops, aquaculture and increasing populations anglers.

Other issues that might be investigated at such a centre include invading species, the means to strengthen Indigenous knowledge and values, monitoring biodiversity, and implications for global climate change. The centre could co-ordinate the writing of books on Manitoulin history, flora, fauna and geology.

There were four breakout sessions at the Madeline Summit with in-depth discussions on sustainable energy, affordable housing, water levels in the Great

Lakes and economic development. I took part in the one on economic development while Jim Nies attended the one on water levels.

Items for discussion in a master plan could include development of resorts such as Carter Bay and Michael's Bay, infrastructure for growing communities, attracting green busideveloping nesses, broadband internet for all houses (we were reminded at the Summit that not having fast internet service per household is like not having running water), a new means of crossing the North Channel at Little Current, enhancing experiences for tourists and implications for establishing fast food restaurants such as Tim Hortons and

The two friends had talked about making the journey with a group of like-minded friends, but over the course of time several dropped out. "Wayne and I looked at each other and just decided to go," he laughed.

So began a journey that would prove to be an adventure containing an unexpected roller coaster of emotions for both of the friends. Each had their own reasons for undertaking the pilgrimage. Mr. Diebolt to better understand some of the most formative years of his father's youth and Mr. Neal wanted to seek out the places where the poet who wrote 'In Flanders Fields' had served and died.

For Mr. Diebolt, the journey would take him from the sands of Juno Beach, where his father had landed with the Scottish Essex Regiment, the community of Dieppe, and countless small battlefields amongst the hedgerows of Belgium, Holland and France.

Mr. Diebolt recalled the experience of walking along the sands of Juno Beach. "It was a very typical big beautiful sand beach," he said. But as he walked along those grains of sand after having visited the nearby war museum, Mr. Diebolt could sense the eyes of those young Canadian soldiers who stormed ashore looking over his shoulder

Later, he and Mr. Neal

would be walking among the gravestones of small immaculate cemeteries that stand close by to where the soldiers who fell in battle were interred. Mr. Diebolt was struck by what he saw engraved on many of those markers.

"A lot of people talk about young men going to war," said Mr. Diebolt. "But a lot of the soldiers buried here were in their 30s and even 40s." These would have been men, many of whom had families and children of their own back home who would have received a dreaded telegram or found their parent's name listed in the count of the dead or missing.

"We met a lot of really welcoming people wherever we went," recalled Mr. Diebolt. "As soon as they learned that you were Canadian they just couldn't do enough for you."

Now around 91 or so, Ms. Founeau recalled the day a Canadian tank commander who was headed towards a nearby battle that came to be known as the Falaise Gap saluted her from the top of his tank and tossed her a chocolate bar.

"We stayed at a lot of little bed and breakfasts in small villages," said Mr. Diebolt. It

"We stayed at a lot of little bed and breakfasts in small villages," said Mr. Diebolt. It was an opportunity to get to know a lot of people who lived their lives close to where the actual war took place. "We ate with them at their tables and learned a lot about the communities where they lived."

Mr. Diebolt's father never talked much about his war experiences. Most of those who served in combat share that characteristic. "Growing up, my dad never talked about what happened over there," he said. "There was just the odd thing he would

mention now and then." But in the last five or six years of his life he began to talk, recording on tape a number of his experiences.

One very striking reminiscence spoke volumes of the horror that he experienced as a member of one of Canada's most storied and devastated combat units. "He talked about walking across a field and the guy walking on one side of him fell, then the guy on the other side dropped, and he had to keep on going," he said. "He never saw them again, he never knew what happened to them, if they had died or were wounded and survived the war. That's how it was in those days."

The trail of his father's footsteps largely amounted to visiting a series of cemeteries.

"They tended to bury the dead close to where the battle took place," said Mr. Diebolt. "So there are all these small graveyards that follow where the Scottish Essex fought."

He recalled one very touching living monument during a visit to a battle site in Holland, coming across a solitary maple tree bearing a small plaque. "The people there had planted a maple and put a small plaque on it to remember those who fell there," he said. "We saw school children who go as part of their school work to visit the graves and learn about the history. I can't say enough about how well kept the Commonwealth War Graves keep the graves."

Mr. Neal also had a per-

sonal connection to the areas the duo visited. Having researched the lives and actions of Canadian Victoria Cross winners, especially Lt. Colonel David Henry Currie, who was awarded the Victoria Cross for his actions in command of a battle group of tanks from The South Alberta Regiment, artillery, and infantry of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada at St. Lambert-sur-Dives in France, during the final actions to close the Falaise Gap. His was the only Victoria Cross awarded to a Canadian soldier during the Normandy campaign (June 6, 1944 through to the end of August 1944) and the only VC ever awarded to a member of the Royal

Canadian Armoured Corps.
The then 32-year-old
Major Currie was in The
South Alberta Regiment
during the Battle of Falaise
between August 18–20,
1944. In command of a
small mixed force of
tanks, self-propelled
anti-tank guns and infantry,
they had been ordered to cut
off one of the Germans'
main escape routes.

After he led the attack on the village of St. Lambertsur-Dives and consolidated a position halfway inside it, his force repulsed repeated enemy attacks over the next day-and-a-half. Despite heavy casualties, Major Currie's small force destroyed seven enemy tanks, twelve 88 mm guns and 40 vehicles, which led to the deaths of 300 German soldiers, 500 wounded, and

2,100 captured. As a result, the remnants of two German armies were denied an escape route.

"My interest was Sergeant Jack Stollery," said Mr. Neal. Mr. Stollery was a reporter at a St. Thomas paper, where Mr. Neal hangs his hat when not on Manitoulin. Mr. Stollery, as a war photographer, actually took the famous photograph of Maj. Currie winning his Victory Cross.


"I knew Jack Stollery," said Mr. Neal. "He died very young, before he was 60 I think, but it was quite a heroic career he had. I knew Jack through the Rotary Club. He was very outgoing."

As to what induced his father to enlist, Mr. Diebolt noted that, like a lot of young men of the time it wasn't so much King and Country, although that was very much the spirit of the times, as it was an opportunity to escape the mundane. "My dad said he signed up because 'I was bored'," recalled Mr. Diebolt.

But after serving in a combat unit, the elder Mr. Diebolt definitely came back a changed man.

"He never talked about it, and as kids we knew not to ask." Despite coming from a very definite hunting tradition, the younger Mr. Diebolt recalled that "he never fired a rifle again when he came back."

But Mr. Diebolt recalls his father as a very even tempered and calm person.

Jon Allen, director of the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes, predicted that the work of GLIA may one day draw the world's attention to the Great Lakes Islands and that seasoned travellers will plan to visit. He argued that people who vacation around the world are attracted to the culture and experiences provided by islands. Most of these vacationers think only of saltwater islands such as those in the Caribbean or southeast Asia, but freshwater islands such as those in the Great Lakes will soon increase in attractiveness. It is up to us to determine our future.

Can Manitoulin handle an influx of international travellers who will arrive by car, air or cruise ship? Will we be able to provide them with recreational, cultural and educational experiences they have come to expect while visiting other areas of the planet? Already there is talk of the Great Lakes Islands developing a souvenir

'passport' that would be stamped as travellers visit the various islands. Could Manitoulin becoming a more popular tourist destination lead to our becoming a destination for conference organizers?

Most people who live on Manitoulin Island either permanently, seasonally, or visit for a few days experience an instant feeling of well-being when departing the Chi-Cheemaun or crossing the swing bridge. This is a common experience for people of other islands and likely is attributed to a feeling of being part of a close-knit rural community more connected to the natural environment than exists in urban areas.

Great Lakes islanders rejoice in experiencing less traffic, no major polluting industries and being among people who are friendly and readily engage in conversation. Islanders and visitors to islands readily experience being re-energized by walking in a natural forest within minutes

"Farmers would still be free to use whatever they want to on their property," he said. "This has no effect on them, we are only expressing our opposition to Hydro One using it on their right of ways." Councillor Baran also pointed out that the

Councillor Marcel Gauthier said he would not support the dog park in that location either.









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

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



A photo tour of the First World War-era cenotaphs on Manitoulin




Manitowaning

The Manitowaning World War One-era cenotaph is unique on Manitoulin, much grander than most. It is regional and displays the names of fallen warriors from Manitowaning/Assiginack, Wiikwemkoong, Sheguiandah, Tehkummah and one from Big Lake. It is located on Arthur Street, behind a stately iron fence, beside the Assiginack Museum.



Wiikwemkoong

This stone-based cross was built after the First World War by Wiikwemkoong stonemason Dominic Odjig, himself a returned man. The cross has on its front the names of fallen Wiikwemkoong soldiers. It is located on the top of the hill that leads into the village of Wiikwemkoong from the west side. That hill is appropriately named



Big Lake

This simple monument is located in the Big Lake cemetery in the hamlet and facing Highway 542. It lists the names of four fallen men from the Big Lake-Silver Bay area whose war graves are at or near the battles in which they died. These battles are also noted on the cenotaph.

Tales of the trenches inspired a young Wiikwemkoong man to enlist

on (Scotty) Odjig is Wiikwemkoong's last surviving veteran of the Second World War and his father, Dominic Odjig, enlisted to serve overseas in the First World War not once, but

"I don't remember all that much about my father's service," said Mr. Odjig, "I used to, but that was a long time ago. I do know that he joined up, was wounded and sent home and then signed up to go over again."

Mr. Odjig was present for the seminal battle for Vimy Ridge,

often cited as one of the formative moments in the creation of a Canadian national identity. "He was wounded in his leg and in his hand"

After Mr. Odjig returned to Wiikwemkoong with his British war bride, he served as that community's only policeman, a post he held for some 35-odd years. Married twice, Mr. Odjig fathered 10 children, four by his first wife, Don Odjig's mother, and the remainder with his second wife.

The son of a stonemason, Mr. Odjig was a strapping young man when he set out as a warrior in the War to End All Wars. He soon found the strength and skills he acquired at his father's side being put to work. "He was in the trenches for pretty much the entire war," said Don Odjig.

Unlike many veterans, the elder Mr. Odjig and his friends did talk quite a bit about their war experi-

ences, recalled his son. So inspired by those stories of life in the trenches, Don Odjig signed up to go into the Second World War as soon as he could. In fact, he actually signed up before he

"That is how I wound up changing my name to Fisher," he laughed. "I have changed it back to Odjig now, but I was too young to join when I went to enlist so I gave them the name Fisher. That way they couldn't trace me." The now Mr. Fisher joined the British Army, entering into the Airborne. "We didn't have trenches like in my father's day," he said.

After the war, the pension Mr. Odjig's father received from the military brought welcome funds into the family coffers. "It really was a godsend when the Depression of the 1930s hit," said Mr. Odjig. "That money came in really handy."

Campbell-Carnarvon

The WWI soldier atop this monument was installed to honour the fallen soldiers from the townships of Campbell and Carnarvon (Now part of Central Manitoulin). Its location on the Monument Road at Highway 542 between Mindemoya and Providence Bay framed the basis for the Manitoulin District Cenotaph that honours all of the Island's fallen sons.



Poplar

This cenotaph is unique in so many ways. It is located in the old community of Poplar at the intersection of Union and Poplar Road in Mills Township (now part of Burpee-Mills) south of Gore Bay. It unusually features an angel, rather than a military image, and the monument is flanked by two World War One field artillery guns that are said to have been gifted to the community of Poplar in recognition of the fact that its volunteer numbers a century ago were the highest in Canada in proportion to the community's population at



Little Current

The Little Current cenotaph and its neighboring band shell were erected in the heart of the downtown following the end of the First World War and their construction was at the urging of the Little Current Everywoman's Club. The cenotaph's location has been officially named Soldier Park, in honour of the figure atop the monument and, in a streetscaping endeavour several years ago, the monument and band shell became the focus of a well-used amphitheatre.

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
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Ron Anstice tells of veteran father's time in German POW camp

Tictor Anstice spent nine months of his life in a Frankfurt, Germany prisoner-of-war (POW) camp during the First World War.

"When the French and British attacked first in 1914, there was only eight in his regiment that survived," Victor's son Ron Anstice, of Tehkummah, told The Expositor.

Victor, born in Wedmore, England, served in the British army as a Lewis gunner in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment. The Lewis was a type of



machine gun that saw heavy use by fighters for the British Empire starting in the First World War. Ron said there was a small group left holding their position in France or Belgium when they ran out of ammunition and were charged by the Germans.

"One of the crew ran and they shot him. The other two guys, with my dad, held up their hands," said Ron.

The Germans took the

men to help bury their dead, after which Victor remained in the POW camp. Ron, said the British government did not know whether he was alive or dead. He said all the other prisoners received care packages from the Red Cross, but his father never received anything because he had been reported missing-in-action (MIA) for six months.

"He came to Canada in 1920 after the war," said Ron. "He was wounded with shrapnel but never got no pension."

Ron said his father ame to see Victor's broth er Sam in Snowville (just north of Tehkummah). He had planned to go through to Toronto but ended up settling on the Island, working on a farm and butchering. He served on council and was a tax collector for the township, purchasing the Anstice family farm adjacent to Tehkummah Village from the Smeltzer family in the


"He told a lot of stories. He had a lot of nightmares. He'd wake up in the middle of the night and ask, 'who goes there?"

"There were a lot of bad stories," said Ron, who grew up in Tehkummah with four siblings. "We always listened. He didn't tell many but he told a few.

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They answered the call from across the nation

Then Sally (Marshall) Stewart's father Hugh Stewart enlisted in the army he wasn't yet 18, so although the army recruiting officer handed over his shilling, it would be a little longer until he went into the killing fields of 1916 Europe.

"If kids lied about their age and they found out, they just kept them in England until they came of age before sending over the English Channel France," she said.

Hugh Stewart was a hero to his daughter, and in fact to more than a few of the blokes he served with overseas. But like many of the children of veterans, Ms. Stewart's knowledge of her father's service was only garnered in bits and drabs acquired over the years.

"I do know that there were a lot of young men who went west from Schreiber to Winnipeg to enlist," she said. "They all went out to Winnipeg and there were lots of guys.

Mr. Stewart's first job when he arrived in France was as a bicycle messenger, but as cosy a gig as that might suggest, it was no guarantee of safety in the maelstrom that was World War One. "He was gassed at Vimy." recalled Ms. Stewart. "My dad was 50 by the time I was born and he was 33 by the time he married my mom in 1922. I had three brothers, all older."

Mr. Stewart was working for the Canadian Pacific Railroad (CPR) when he joined up, and when he returned from the war, like a lot of returning soldiers, he took up where he left off at the CPR.

"Although my dad didn't talk much about the war he was a real hero to me, and not just to me either," recalled Ms. Stewart. "I used to travel to school from Schreiber on a CPR rail pass and there was this one conductor who was always really nice to me. I told my dad and he asked me if I had noticed the conductor's scar. I had, it was a

terrible scar."


It turns out the scar came from a wound that the conductor received at the front. "My dad said that he was lying on top of him when it happened," she said. "My dad told me he dragged him off to a safe place. It was just in conversation, not something he made a big deal of, but my dad saved that man's life. No wonder he was so nice to

"My dad was always a shining light to me," said Ms. Stewart. "My mom was one of those women who made my dad a hero. She

was much younger than he was and he was always a shining light as far as my mom was concerned too.'

Ms. Stewart's father did not come home unscathed either. "He was a mass of scar tissue from his neck all down his chest from the mustard gas," she said. "I don't think any of those boys that set out from Schreiber came home without some wound to remind them of the war."

But life went on. "My dad was a musician, he even had his own orchestra at one point. I think he might have just joined up



I am always on the search for new food to try and experiment with. The new food that I discovered and tried is called freekeh. It is an ancient grain which means it came before domesticated wheat and it became a mainstay of Middle Eastern and Mediterranean cuisine.

Freekeh is harvested young, when the durum wheat grain is still green, and roasted to remove the chaff and straw around it. You get a smoky, nutty flavour when you eat it. It is slightly chewy when cooked.

Freekeh is higher in protein and fibre than quinoa, two nutrients that can help you feel full for longer. It is low on the glycemic index but it is not gluten free.

Freekeh Salad

On the back of the box it explains how to cook freekeh. I didn't follow the directions because it would have meant that the end product was mush. The best way to cook it, is in the amount of water it suggests on the back of the package but when it is almost tender drain off the water, place the freekeh back in the pot, put the lid back on and let it sit for 10 minutes.

- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp grated ginger
- i tsp ground cumin
- 2 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and cut into 3/4 inch cubes
- 11/2 cups freekeh
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup unsweetened coconut (large flake) 4 Tbsp chopped fresh parsley or cilantro
- DRESSING:
- 8 Tbsp olive oil or sunflower seed oil
- Juice of 1 lemon or 4 Tbsp apple cider vinegar 2 Tbsp maple syrup or honey
- Salt and pepper to taste

1. Pre-heat the oven to 350°F. Place the cinnamon, ginger, cumin and oil in a small bowl and mix to combine. Place the butternut squash in a baking pan, pour the mixture over, and toss to coat. Bake in the oven for 30-35 minutes, uncovered, until the squash is tender.

2. Meanwhile, rinse the freekeh under running water and place in a large saucepan. Cover with 4 cups of water and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and cook for 15 minutes until tender. Drain any remaining water, and leave to cool slightly.

3. For the dressing, place all the ingredients in a bowl. Season to taste and mix. Add the squash, raisins, coconut, and fresh parsley to the freekeh. Mix lightly. Then pour over the dressing, and mix well. You may have to add some more vinegar or oil, salt and pepper.

the hill there; 23 of them got it," said Jeff. "Quite a few from the Island got that medal at the same time."

After the war, John came back to Manitoulin to work on the farm. There, he fell in love with the girl across the road, John Skippen's daughter Gertrude (Skippen). The two ran Marshall's Restaurant in Little Current; Jeff said it was located where the pharmacy now stands.

In that time, the couple also started their family which included Jeff, born in 1932. Despite the sense of honour that military service usually carries, Jeff said his father did not spend much time discussing his life in the army.


"My dad was very reluctant to talk about the experiences he went through," said Jeff, a common ideology among veterans, many of whom live with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

After the turmoils of wartime, Jeff's parents had begun to settle down. His dad was a "wonderful cook; he made the best pastries," according to Jeff. Business was doing well at the family restaurant and it would have taken a great force to disrupt the lives they had built.

"Then along came 1939," said Jeff. "My dad just couldn't stand it. He had to go back into the army."

go back into the army."

John was placed into the Veterans Guard of Canada,

a unit that served within Canada and oversaw services such as prisoner of war (POW) camps.

"My dad was stationed at the camp in Niagara-on-the-Lake, but got a transfer to the camp in Espanola," said Jeff. The mill in Espanola was converted into a POW camp in 1940.

"I had quite the time; I was just a youngster," said Jeff. "I'd go spend my holidays with my dad, stay in the barracks there and play games with the prisoners."

Jeff described getting a friend to buy baseballs and bats, which he brought to the POW camp to play baseball with the prisoners. "I still kept in touch with some after the war, after they were transferred back to Germany. Some even came back and settled around here," said Jeff.

During the war, the family's business proved too much for Jeff's mother to handle so she sold the restaurant and became a dietician. The military heritage of the family only began to grow from there.

Jeff said his oldest brother Jack fought in the U.S. Army, his second oldest brother Cyril Rosslin fought for the Canadian army and Jeff's sister Elizabeth Ann married Len

Woods who fought in the Second World War.

"All three went overseas and everyone came back. Mind you, my second oldest brother was not in too good of shape," said Jeff, his brother having sustained injuries while driving a


motorcycle for the army.

next. He joined the

Royal Canadian Navy in 1954, followed by his next-oldest brother Ralph who joined the

army's signal corps in 1955. "I saw the world through a porthole, as the saying goes," said Jeff. "I had a

father of Expositor publisher emeritus Rick McCutcheon, was a World War One veteran, sort of.

"He was born in 1893 so he certainly was of age when Canada joined the rest of the then-British Empire, declaring war on Germany," Mr. McCutcheon

Frank's older brother enlisted in 1915. His vounger brother was suffering from tuberculosis, the disease that eventually claimed his life.

That left Frank, and his aging father, to farm the 270acre family farm in the present-day City of Vaughan (then Vaughan Town-

ship), just south of the village of Nobleton. Their farm constituted the township's extreme northwest

Of course, when conscription was introduced in 1917, he was called up and, according to Rick McCutcheon, "he had to go before a board and explain the circumstances; that without him, the farm wouldn't be viable."

He did serve after that as a member of the Home Guard. That was how the members of the board handles his (and other similar) petitions. He told his son Rick that for the duration of the war, he reported periodically to the York County district armoury in Aurora

where he and other farm folks were drilled in marching and the use of weapons.

older brother returned at war's end, badly wounded and an RAF pilot officer and Frank McCutcheon continued farming to the end of his life, in 1960.

He did, however, volunteer at the beginning of the Second World War and once again began reporting to the Aurora armoury periodically for more marching and drilling.

Rick recalls him saying once how much he had enjoyed these two interruptions as a 'Soldier of the


Jeff said he is looking forward to this year's Remembrance Day ceremony.


