WHITEFISH RIVER FIRST NATION—Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation David Zimmer was joined by Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Pat Madahbee and Whitefish River First Nation Ogimaa Shining Turtle at Shawanosowe School in a celebration marking Treaty Recognition Week through the official launch of two new school books that explain treaties to elementary students.

The two books 'Alex Shares his Wampum Belt' and

'Dakota Talks about Treaties' complement the popular 'We Are All Treaty People' teachers' kit that is currently being used by over 2,000 English schools and 1,000 French schools across Ontario.

Shawanosowe Principal Chervl Miller Martin was master of ceremonies for the event and introduced each of the dignitaries in turn. The celebrations began with a drum song performed by the school's students.

Debajehmujig Theatre wins Ontario Premier's 2017 Award for the Arts

TORONTO-Wiikwemkoong's Debajehmujig Storytellers were finalists for a Premier's Award for Excellence in the Arts in the Arts Organization category in both 2007 and 2014, but third time proved lucky this year for the lands-based theatre group, as they took top honours for 2017.

"We were up against some pretty heavy hitters," said Debaj Artistic Director Joe Osawabine. "But I had a premonition that we might be the ones this year."

The other finalists in the category included Hillside Festival of Guelph, for music; Toronto's International Festival of Authors, for literature (finalists in 2013, 2014 and 2016); Liaison of Independent Filmmakers of Toronto (LIFT), for media arts; Toronto's Theatre Centre, for theatre and Toronto's Young People's Theatre (finalists in 2015).

"It was pretty cool," said Mr. Osawabine, "and an honour. There was some very tough competition, any of us could have won." Mr. Osawabine noted that he had some sound grounds to consider this might be their year going in. "Last year, TNO (from Sudbury) was in its third nomination and they won, the year before the winner was also in its third nomination. Manitoulin Centennial Manor launches third annual Tree of Lights fundraiser

MANITOULIN—The third annual Manitoulin Centennial Manor Tree of Lights (TOL) campaign has launched and donation cards are available across the Island.

The TOL was started two years ago as a way to raise funds for the long-term care facility. Islanders can purchase individual lights on a special tree, which is erected in front of the Manor, for \$10 in memory of a loved one, in celebration of a person or organization, as a gift or simply in support of the home.


As the lights are sold, making up each strand of 100, the tree will slowly begin to be lit with the goal to sell and light up 1,500 lights on the tree and the star at the top, marking the achievement of the \$15,000 fundraising goal.

"This year our goal is raising \$15,000 towards the installation of ceiling patient lifts at the Manor," explained TOL organizer Wendy Gauthier. "These devices will enable the comfortable and safe transfer of patients from their wheelchair to bed. We have raised \$48,276 to date of the \$75,000 goal, and are hoping that the TOL fundraiser will help us get closer to our goal."

Ms. Gauthier noted that the tree is positioned so that the residents can watch the progress of the tree lighting.

'The Wikwemikong Greenhouse for Change' project named finalist in Aviva Community Fund

WIIKWMKOONG—Focus Forward for Indigenous Youth, on behalf of a partnership between the Wikwemikong Employment office and Wikwemikong High School, has been named one of the finalists for \$50,000 in funding from the Aviva Community Fund to build a greenhouse.

"Focus Forward for Indigenous Youth has offices in Toronto and Kingston," explained Althea Wishloff, the team leader for the Toronto office. "Our vision is to improve the quality of life for Indigenous people. We meet with communities and look at their needs and projects that haven't gotten done due to a lack of resources and help them find funding and bring projects to fruition."

Ms. Wishloff said that through meeting with the Wikwemikong Employment office, a need was identified to develop a community greenhouse and a project was developed, 'The Wikwemikong Greenhouse for Change.'

The Wikwemikong Greenhouse for Change project will support educational goals for students in the community ages 14 to 19, while creating a community-led sustainable food source.

"Building a greenhouse is a value-added approach to community capacity development that



will be community owned and led," explains the Focus Forward project description. "Students at the high school will develop skills in construction, while also learning how to work together to fight 'food security,' the idea that many remote communities lack access to fresh foods and hone limited agricultural knowledge."

The proposed greenhouse will be built by Wikwemikong High School students in the construction/tech program, earning the participating students credits.

"Students will build the greenhouse in the summer of 2018, earning school credits," said Ms. Wishloff.

"Once constructed, this greenhouse will provide the Wikwemikong High School the opportunity to launch an innovative green industries agricultural program that teaches students the benefits and challenges of

Remembrance Day recalls the sacrifices of ordinary people

November 11 is a brief moment in time to honour those Canadians who laid their lives on the line, and in so doing sacrificed everything for the sake of those they left

Our ceremonies tend to be dominated by the memories of those who served in the larger conflicts of the 20th Century, the two world wars that bookended the greatest generation, and to a lesser extent those who saw service in the Korean War at the behest of the nascent dream that was the United Nations-intent on stemming the aggression that had too often in the recent past sent the globe spinning into the maelstrom of global conflict. But although the sheer volume of the number of sacrifices laid at the altar of freedom in those wars is almost inconceivable to us today, thankfully unmatched in recent memory, on an individual level they are no greater a sacrifice than those who have fallen in the service of their nation in peacekeeping missions around the globe since, be it in the dusty vales of Afghanistan or the green hills of Cyprus. For those

families left behind, the pain of that sacrifice and their loss is every bit as real and tragic, despite not being shared by thousands of their countrymen.

Death in the service of your country is a terrible thing and that sacrifice remains unmatched for the friends and

families of the fallen. On an individual scale, that loss is monumen-

As we join the dwindling ranks of the remaining veterans of global conflicts, those last remnants of "The Greatest Generation," let us also pause to also remember those whose sacrifice is so terribly recent. Let us also remember those who have returned from foreign lands maimed in body or mind and unable to return to those ordinary lives they once held dear.

Once the poppies have been removed from lapels, and aged warriors have laid their medals to rest in dresser drawers, let us not forget until next November 11. Let each of us demand that

those who govern our nation also remember the sacrifices that have been made, not just on one day of the year, but for every day thereafter. Too many of our veterans have been let slide into despair and suicide because we have not demanded that they receive the care and support their sac-

In the days, weeks and years that follow November 11 let us continue to remember the sacrifices that have been made and demand the government step up to meet the needs of our veterans. Yes, it will cost—but that invoice will be paid in mere money, not in blood.

Lest we forget.

MS MacKay is planning on attending HMCS Ontario again next year, this time for the sixweek drill and command instructor course. "You learn to be more in charge," she said. "It qualifies you to be guard commander." She agrees that she is a bit of a "take charge" kind of person.

"It has all been pretty fun," said LS Goddard of joining the cadet corps. "The first few days it takes some getting used to, but it becomes a lot of fun."

Staff Cadet Petty Officer 1st Class Miranda MacKay was at RMC, aka HMCS Ontario, as a staff member. "It's kind of like a camp counsellor," she smiled. "This was my fourth year there. I was teaching drill and command, a six week course and with the kids 24/7 as their counsellor."

It was a paid gig. "I got \$88 a day, seven days a week," she said. This will probably be her last season, however. "It was pretty stressful," she admits. But that isn't the reason she is changing her summer plans, PO1 MacKay plans to pursue a career in nursing.

As part of the Manitoulin cadet's orienteering team that also consisted of Dana Beauchamp and Morgan O'Brian,

the Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps came in third during the recent competitions in Sudbury. "There were probably 200 cadets there," she said. "I did pretty well in the individual category as well. I think I came in third because I was right behind the girl who came in second (they only award first and second place)." The team will be competing in the next level of competition in Barrie.

In orienteering, you are given a map with a set of coordinates and you are scored on the number of check points you attain within a one-hour timeframe.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Nick

Harper was deployed with the ORCAS, the old naval ships, and went to the Tall Ships Program run by the SALTs organization. He is applying for tall ships this March Break. He got the opportunity to travel to the naval base in Esquimault, BC where he helped crew the two-masted tall ships Pacific Grace and Pacific Swift. "The SALTs is a Christian organization," said PO2 Wood. "Which was great because you didn't have to be in uniform."

PO2 Quentis Wood was deployed and spent the summer in Quadra where he studied as a shipwright, fibreglassing boats.

"It is the most elite course of the sea cadets you can get," he noted. "It used to be maritime engineering, but they got rid of that years ago."

PO2 Wood was one of the group of cadets that had an opportunity to pilot the Le Grand Heron out of the Port of Little Current this fall. "We thought we would just be along as observers," he said, "but we actually got to steer the ship."

There are five different trades that cadets can go into, the cadets noted, including sailing, seamanship, music, drill and command and physical fitness instructor.

PO2 Harper is planning on going to college to become a hunting and fishing guide. "I can help people find a lot of good fishing spots," he smiled. "I was also part of the rifle range team—it's been winning every year since I joined cadets." Coincidence? We think not. The Manitoulin team has won the competition for the past seven years. "One year we lost it, but we got it back the next year," he said. "Manitoulin is really good for shooters," agreed PO2 Wood.

Like a lot of cadets, PO2 Wood has his eye on going to school at RMC. "If I can get through school without any debt that would be pretty good," he grinned. He intends to take weaponry officer. While that might at first blush seem like a non-civilian career path, PO2 Wood notes "that is the classification that eventually leads to captaining a ship."

Leading Seaman Dayna Beauchamp (14) was also a member of the range team and Leading Seaman Morgan O'Brian (13) will be trying out this year.

LS Beauchamp went to camp this past summer, taking general training. "There were a lot of new things to learn, but you also make a lot of good friends. It showed us a lot of what cadets is all about."

LS O'Brian enjoyed the orienteering competition. "It was fun," she said, "but some people get lost in the bush. There were people following me and every time I looked back I could see them. I led one group around in circles," she grinned. Although charting a path by map and compass was challenging, especially since her initial training on reading the compass was conducted indoors, she was up for the challenge.

LS Beauchamp holds down three jobs in addition to going to school, so there are not a lot of additional experiences she can fit into her schedule.

LS O'Brian said that she thought band "was amazing."

LS Beauchamp is planning a career in the military, while LS O'Brian is contemplating a career in law enforcement, but she has a plan for cadets going forward. "As a cadet officer you can get into a good college with a scholarship."

PO2 Samuel Clayton (15) will be taking up intermediate sailing. He has already completed two years of sailing "just for the fun of it." He is hoping to go into the navy as an electrical engineer "or an engineer of some sort." He enjoys cadets because "you get to meet new people, get to learn how

to lead and think about your future. Cadets learn to know what they want and this is a good place to get into the trades. They teach you a lot of respect for people." The opportunity to win awards for outstanding performance don't hurt either, he notes. "They look really good on your resume."

PO2 Abbie Harper took intermediate musician in Kingston. Does she have a favourite instrument? "Yeah, trumpet," she supplies without hesitation. "I actually learned how to play a bit before." She made a lot of friends while at camp and, in this age of digital communication, they all still stay in touch. PO2 Harper also has her eye on the opportunity for scholarships. "You can get up to \$2,000," she grins, and the pay for cadet trainers isn't too shabby a summer job either. "POs get from \$85 to \$100 a day. I can't wait."

Learning to work with a lot of different people is also a very valuable skill to acquire. "That was so much fun," she said. "The instructors here make it really interesting too. You aren't stuck inside all the time. Getting outside and doing stuff is a lot of fun."

Three charged with drug-related charges in Wiikwemkoong

On Wednesday, November 1, members of the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service arrested three subjects in the village of Wiikwemkoong after an investigation relating to the offence of possession for the purpose of trafficking a controlled substance.

As a result of the investigation, police seized a quantity of cocaine, crack cocaine, cannabis, cash and drug-related paraphernalia. The estimated street value of the seizure is over \$6,000.

A 23-year-old male of Ajax, a 22-year-old male of Wiikwemkoong and a 27-year-old female of M'Chigeeng were arrested and charged with one count each for possession for the purpose of trafficking and one count each of possession of property obtained by crime under \$5,000.

All persons were remanded into custody and were to appear in Gore Bay on Friday, November 3 to answer to the charges.

This investigation is part of ongoing initiatives by members of the Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service, UCCM Anishinaabe Police Service and Manitoulin OPP to address the increase in crime and drug-related activity.

Matthew will be competing in the 400, 800 and 1,500 metre races, Kelsey in the 200 metre race and 400 metre relay and shot put and Mark will be running the 100 metre race and competing in shot put and javelin.

In addition to Ms. Anning, MSO softball coach Sandra Graham has been selected to coach the Ontario baseball team at the National Games.

"As well, MSO athlete Yuri Clayton will be competing as part of Team Ontario for five pin bowling at the National Games which will be held in May on Prince Edward Island," said Ms. Anning.

Mr. Featherstone, Mr. Bedard, Ms. Mellan and Mr. Dokum all qualified for the National Games at the Ontario Special Olympic Summer Games held in 2017 in Peel. Ontario. Mr. Clayton qualified for Nationals at the Ontario Special Olympic Games held in Guelph last year.

The MSO athletes garnered 24 medals from the Ontario Summer Games held this past July—17 gold and six silver medals.

Sheshegwaning student's art featured in calendar



creating a community-led sustainable food source," the project description continues. "The program intends to open enrollment for fall 2018. The capacity of the community will be further enhanced through the efforts of the employment office, by ensuring the greenhouse can be utilized free of charge by all community members."

Focus Forward plans to use innovative building techniques and technologies such as biomass and solar which is why they are seeking funding for the project.

"The funds would be used for building materials, engineers to help with the design and hire contractors and other trade professionals to help with the educational element and supervision of the building project," added Ms. Wishloff.


The partnership identified that there are issues facing Indigenous students, noting the under-funding of onreserve schools, lack of resources and culturally appropriate curriculum in their reasons behind the project and applying to Aviva funding under the 'community resilience' category.

"These directly correlate to issues affecting the quality of life for Indigenous youth, such as alarmingly high rates of suicide, drug and alcohol abuse, and high rates of incarceration," noted the Focus Forward application. "Focus Forward is attempting to address some of these challenges through the Wikwemikong Greenhouse for Change project. We plan to achieve: an increased sense of hope and inspiration among Indigenous youth; opportunities to develop hands-on skills,

Increased knowledge of solutions in solving 'food security'; advanced knowledge and skills necessary to pursue a career in trades and/or agriculture; and increased availability of healthy foods for the entire community."

Focus Forward said it believes the project will help motivate youth in the community to pursue their dreams and graduate from high school by providing students with hands-on and employable skills.

"It will also improve intergenerational relationships," the application continues. "Both the building and educational components of the project will involve numerous community members, creating an important opportunity to reverse some of the negative effects of the residential school system on kinship and community relations. As well, it will provide affordable access to healthy and nutritious foods. The project has the potential to overcome challenges that affect Indigenous communities, such as diabetes and obesity, through agricultural educa-

tion programming and an abundance of fresh produce options."

Focus Forward's mission is to collaborate with Indigenous communities across Canada to improve the overall quality of life by empowering their youth through applied focus programs that give back to the community.

"The Aviva Community Fund helps passionate people like you make positive change in your community," states the Aviva website. "For eight years, we've been putting our money where our business is, investing in charitable community initiatives across Canada, protecting the people and things you love, supporting the causes you care about most, and strengthening your local community. To us at Aviva, this is just good thinking. We're so proud to have provided more than \$7.5 million in project funding to date, and we can't wait to donate another \$1+ million this year."

"The project being selected as a finalist is really a testament to the projects focus on sustainability," said Ms. Wishloff. "The projects selected for funding will be announced by Aviva on Tuesday, December 5."



"Majorie and I got to go to the VIP event beforehand where we mixed with the bigwigs," laughed Mr. Osawabine. "There were a lot of amazing people there. It was an amazing honour to be a part of it all and to be recognized for excellence in the arts."

Individually, the 2017 Artist Award went to Kent Monkman of Demorestville, for visual arts and the Emerging Artist Award went to Toronto's Brian Rideout for visual arts. Finalists in the Artist Award category included d'bi.young anitafrika of Queensville for theatre; IAIN BAXTER& of Windmultidisciplinary, (finalist in 2013 and 2014); Charmaine Toronto's Headley for dance; Sudbury's David Lickley for media arts and Toronto's Claudia Moore for dance.

...continued from page 1 the Ministry of Government and Consumer Services. "The Coroner's Office advised the ministry on May 25, 2017 that two Indigenous skulls were discovered on land owned by the Municipality of Central Manitoulin. The Registrar contacted the municipality, which was made aware that the land owner must take whatever steps are necessary to preserve the site, the human remains and any artifacts until a final disposition is made in accordance with the FBC-SA (Funeral, Burial and Cremation Services Act, 2002). The Ministry understands that the Municipality of Central Manitoulin is now in the process of retaining the services of a licenced archaeologist to carry out a burial site

investigation."
Central Manitoulin has confirmed that the municipality is working on their end of the regulatory requirements. "At the moment I am getting quotes of carrying out the required studies that the Registrar of graves requires from us," replied Clerk Ruth Frawley.

"There were two skulls found, with one being fragmented," noted Scott Fairgrieve, chair of the department of forensic science at Laurentian University and a consulting forensic anthropologist following the discovery. "The second skull was found at the same time as the first, during the investigation that was carried out at the site. What happened was the first skull was found by a local resident in Mindemoya on the (ground) surface in clear

view (near Thorne Street near Wagg's Wood and Central Manitoulin Public School). We searched the area along with the OPP officers and also near rock outcrops where the second skull fragment was below leaves. It was just metres from the first skull."

"They were both dated at around the same time, about 800 years ago," said Mr. Fairgrieve, adding that "they were definitely both First Nations, although during the precontact area. We have carried out tests to age both skulls: it is hard to give exact dates, but using very wide conservative estimates (based on varying aging methods used) for the first skull found his age was between 20-60 years at the time of death.'

"The second (fragmented skull) was at least 20 years of age at death," said Mr. Fairgrieve. He pointed out no artifacts or relics were found with the skulls and that no cause of death could be determined for either

"For the first skull through dental aging we found that it had a defect in the skull at the top and inside, an enlarged tissue over the brain. But it wouldn't have affected this person's life at all," explained Mr. Fairgrieve. "The second skull was clean." As for the first skull, "the condition of the teeth shows evidence of dental attrition (a wearing down of teeth due to diet),"continued Mr. Fairgrieve. "It (skull) has some exposure to bleaching, being on the ground surface and uncovered. Both skulls had evidence of scavenging having been done by rodents and carnivores and could have both been moved a long distance before they were discov-

At the time of the discovery the OPP contacted the closest neighbouring First Nations community, M'Chigeeng First Nation, and Chief Linda Debassige came out with an elder to hold a traditional ceremony.

Mr. Fairgrieve went on to note that the location where the two skulls were found is "definitely not burial grounds. Both skulls could have been carried hundreds of meters due to carnivores and rodents having moved them."



Ogimaa Shining Turtle welcomed everyone to the community and noted the important influence that the late South African president and prisoner of conscience Nelson Mandela had on his own life when he chose education over violence as the means to overcoming apartheid in his country. "He said 'education is a powerful tool, with it you can change the world'," recalled Ogimaa Shining Turtle.

Author Kelly Crawford, a citizen of M'Chigeeng First Nation, is the current Education Team Leader overseeing Kindergarten to Grade 12 at Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute, is a faculty liaison with Queens University, and the new education director at the Anishinabek Education System, the newly created Native school board in Ontario. Ms. Crawford is also the author of the 'We Are All Treaty People' teachers' resource.

Ms. Crawford stepped away from the microphone to more closely interact with the students and took them through a short discussion of the treaty relationship.

"The government has made a commitment that all students will learn about the treaties," she said. "I want to encourage you to learn as much as you can about treaties and to talk to one another about the treaties."

Illustrator Donald Chretien, from the Nipissing First Nation who now lives in Newmarket, spoke to the students about his own life experience with drawing, a passion that has enveloped him since he was himself in elementary school. "Try drawing as much as you can," he admonished. "I myself find it very relaxing." Mr. Chretien's work is featured on the Olympic medals given out at the Vancouver games and he is no stranger to Manitoulin Island, having worked with Debajehmujig Storytellers in the past.

"It is important for all people in Canada to learn about the land and

Grand Chief Madahbee recalled that it was the warriors from this territory, the Anishinabe, who rallied to the call of Tecumseh and repelled the American invaders of the War of 1812. "Otherwise, you might be calling Trump president today, instead of having your own chief Shining Turtle.'

"Everyone in Ontario shares the benefits and obligations of treaties," said Minister Zimmer. "We also share a responsibility to understand the relationships these agreements created. That's why we're continuing to work with Indigenous partners through Ontario's Treaty Strategy to raise awareness of these relationships during Treaties Recognition Week and year-round.'

"The peaceful settlement of Canada was made possible by the agreement of Indigenous peoples to share their territories and resources with newcomers, notea Maurice Switzer of the Mississaugas of Alderville First Nation and Living Library presenter in his official statement. "But those legal and sacred covenants have not always been honoured by government. That's why I share my perspective and knowledge of treaties as a speaker at Living Library

Manitoulin District Cenotaph is a committee's labour of love

SPRING BAY—The Manitoulin District Cenotaph, which pays tribute to all of Manitoulin's war dead, like any structure, requires upkeep as the years march on and it's thanks to a small committee of people and the hard work of two individuals, in

particular, that keep the cenotaph in tip-top shape.

Most recently, the cenotaph saw a facelift to its grounds thanks to generous donations and a grant from the Veterans

Affairs Canada's partnership program. This meant the committee was able to purchase interlocking block to replace the old blocks that were starting to lift and heave at the main memorial, Merchant Marine Memorial and at the Youth in Partnership with Veterans Memorial.

"We're now in the process of redoing the bathrooms," said committee member Linda Bowerman, who leads the charge in all of the cenotaph's endeavours and is helped by husband Ron at every turn. "So far we've painted, we're getting the floor fixed and we are getting new toilets, sinks and tops put in too," she said, noting the well water has corroded the taps in the cenotaph bathrooms that are open to the public from the Victoria Day long weekend until Thanksgiving. Bond's Plumbing takes care of the opening and closing down of the washrooms free of charge.

Bruce Witty of Witty's Monuments is currently working on replacing the main plaque on the Merchant Memorial (the one with the ship on it). "The writing has faded and it's so small you couldn't read it," Ms. Bowerman explained.

In 2016, all of the lettering was redone on the main monument, a huge task, and in 2015 volunteers from the Legion Branch #177 put a new roof on the public restroom.

Ms. Bowerman explained that, thanks to many donations that came pouring in for the interlocking block project, some money was left over which allowed for further upgrades to the cenotaph, such as the restroom project.

'We've also been very fortunate that donations have come in through in memoriam funds," she added.

The Municipality of Central Manitoulin pays for the grass cutting and the cenotaph's hydro, which is a help, Ms. Bow-

The flags that line the main memorial (that represent Canada and her wartime allies) also have to be replaced every two years, which comes at a cost of about \$900.

Each year, the Campbell Horticultural Society donates \$100 to the District Cenotaph which Ms. Bowerman turns into 100 red and white geraniums. She buys them early to get a good deal, places them all on a piece of plywood then husband Ron hauls them in and out of their Sheguiandah garage until the flowers become acclimatized and Ms. Bowerman can plant them. She goes every second week to check on the flowers and the donation box which brings in enough funds each season to pay for a caretaker to see the washrooms cleaned once a week.

"It's important to me because I have an uncle whose name is up there—Norman S. Lockeyer—my mom's younger brother,' Ms. Bowerman said of the reason behind her devotion. Her uncle was killed in France.

"I got involved at first because I was involved with the women's memorial," she continued. This monument, located across

from the District Cenotaph in Veterans' Memorial Gardens, is a tribute to all of the Manitoulin women who served in the First and Second World Wars.

'Through that project I met so many wonderful people, veterans who became friends.

Ms. Bowerman listed the people on the District Cenotaph committee: Jim Corrigan, Allan Tustian, Jeff Marshall and Donna Foster.

"There are no young people that want to get involved," she lamented.

"Ron always says, if all the townships even just set aside \$50 a year in their budgets for perpetual care of the cenotaph, we wouldn't have to worry so much about fundraising," Ms. Bowerman added.
"It's a work in progress," she said of the

cenotaph.

Master Seaman Cosby's 12-year career with the navy started with Sea Cadets

by Robin Burridge VICTORIA, BC—Master Seaman Jeremy Cosby grew up just outside of Little Current, attending Little Current Public School and then Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS).

He joined the Manitoulin Sea Cadets as a youth, which encouraged him to join the Royal Canadian Navy at 18 years of age after graduating from MSS.

"I wasn't sure what I wanted to do after high school," Master Seaman Cosby told The Expositor, "but I knew I didn't want to spend a bundle on school when I wasn't sure. I had enjoyed being a Sea Cadet and decided to sign up for a trade with the navy. I went to the recruiting office in Sudbury and joined."

Master Seaman Cosby was posted to Esquimalt, BC, where he has remained and where he was trained as an electrical technician.



"I like the navy," said the 30-yearold. "As an electrical technician I'm responsible for the operation of a ship's electrical power generation systems, lighting, electrical equip-ment like the control system.'

He is currently stationed on HMCS Calgary where he has been for the last two years.

In 2009, Master Seaman Cosby was deployed on HMCS Winnipeg on an anti-piracy mission NATO in the Gulf of Aden. The Gulf ping lane crossed by an average of 20,000 ships a year, making it a

The HMCS Winnipeg was one of five NATO warships that was patrolling off the Somali coast on an antipiracy mission, joined by the United States, China and Russia which was carrying out similar operations.

In 2012, he was stationed on HMCS Regina and a part of the counter-terrorism mission in the Gulf of Oman, a strait that con-

nects the Arabian Sea with the Strait of Hormuz which runs to the Persian Gulf and boarders Pakistan and Iran. Oman on the south and the United Arab Emirates on the west.

"As an electrical technician, my role in the missions is to keep the ship moving forward," said Master Seaman Cosby. "I can't really talk about the details of the missions.

The dwindling ranks of veterans and lack of interest by newer generations has seen many branches across the country close and threatened to take the Little Current branch too as membership shrank and debt built.





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Corporal McGregor saw the world as a young man in the military

by Alicia McCutcheon ISLAND—Gerry BIRCH McGregor was only 17years-old when he first decided to join the military—so young he had to get his parents' blessing—a result of a recent recruitment effort in his home

community of Birch Island. "I joined in 1983, in May, and was gone by June, right after school," Corporal McGregor told The Expositor. "The recruiters came here; they called it the Youth Temporary Employment Program, which was 10 months."

At 17, Corporal McGregor headed for Wainwright, Alberta for six months of basic training with the Princess Patricia's

Canadian Light Infantry. While there, the young soldier met other recruits from Wiikwemkoong and Sheshegwaning.

"After the 10 months I was ready to come home," he admits.

Corporal McGregor had been moved to Calgary near the end of his training and had been taking a machine gun course when his unit there was deployed to Cyprus. He asked if there was any chance of being sent to Cyprus if he officially joined the army. He was told 'yes,' and so stayed on. Soon after, Corporal McGregor, now 18, was shipped off to the Mediterranean.

"I spent four months in Cyprus—it was my first time overseas," he said. On the way to deployment, Cor-

While stationed in the Mediterranean, the Canadian forces helped the United Nations (UN) to patrol the buffer zones that ran through the capital of Nicosia as well as manning observation posts in and around the city.

"Cyprus was an experience," Corporal McGregor said of his time there. "Two different countries (Greece and Turkey) stuck on an island, and you're stuck in the middle while they're trying to start a war.'

He said the shifts were 12 hours on and 12 hours off for weeks at a time. The long days, coupled with the heat, made for an exhausting time.

"There was no relief at night either," he added.

Before a shift started the soldiers were expected have their boots spit-shined, their uniform ironed their hats starched.

A year later Corporal McGregor was posted to Germany, now age 19, for the next three years with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Second Battalion. "I bought my first car there," Corporal McGregor grinned. "A

In Germany, Corporal McGregor was there as part of Canada's North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) contingent.

From 1988 to 1992, Corporal McGregor was posted to the Canadian Airborne Reg-

"I was picked to go to England to get my British parachute wings," he said proud-ly, noting that each country has its own style of jump. While in England, Corporal McGregor got to stay with the palace guards behind Buckingham Palace.

"I also got my American wings," he added. "I trained with the 82nd Airborne Division and the US



room. Together the rooms have a capacity of 85. We have dual monitors in the main room and one in the smaller meeting room that can all play the same program," said Mr. Fawcett. "We use it for music, videos, pictures and for presentations. We have an upgraded phone system as well using the Internet that allows people who can't make the meeting to listen from home.'

"The smaller meeting room is also used by our Anishinaabemowin language group," Ms. Fawcett said. "Our Sunday meeting is half in Anishinaabemowin and half in English. Our group is also working on translating projects such as pamphlets in Anishinaabemowin, videos and items for the website. The Jehovah's Witnesses website is available in 120 languages and we are responsi-Anishinaabemowin."

The Kingdom Hall is always open to the public,

ness is located at 51 Wilson Street. The open house will be held on Friday, November 10 from 4 to 8 pm and on Saturday, November 11 from 10 am to 2 pm.

Faith Healing

Faith healing works on the principles of faith. It does not work when certain principles of faith are not met. Those principles are 1) you must speak words that are in agreement with God's words (law). 2) You must meditate on God's word (what the bible says about healing) and 3) you must obey God's law (word). JOSH 1:8 says: "These words of the law shall not depart from your mouth (that means you must confess them or vocally agree to them) you shall meditate on them, that you may do them for then you shall have good success.

To meditate means to think about what God really wants you to do. And the third point doing it (obedience) without obedience faith does not work for disobedience is unbelief. These three principles apply to every aspect of faith. If you want healing you have to find out what God (in the bible) says on the subject. EX. 15:26 say: "Yahweh made a statue and a rule saying: If you will listen and obey to Yahweh and keep my commandments (all 10) and do what is right I (Yahweh) will put none of the diseases upon you.....for I am Yahweh who heals you." These are the first two principles of faith healing 1) you have to recognize that Yahweh (Jesus Christ) is the healer and 2) obedience to God's commandments. PS. 103 says: "Bless the Lord (praise Yahweh) oh my soul and all that is within me bless His holy name and forget not all his benefits, who forgives all your iniquities (that are confessed and repented of) and who heals all your diseases." Please note it says all not some. And the forgiving (confession and repentance of sin) proceeds the healing. God does the blessing we do the praising and we can thank God for healing, for when we praise and thank God for healing we show with our mouth and action that we really believe what God says about it.

IS. 53: 3-5 say: "He (Jesus Christ) was wounded for our iniquities and by his stripes we are healed." Just like Jesus suffered and died on the cross for our sins so he paid also the price for our healing. Corporal McGregor has 50 jumps under his belt. "I could have had more, but I spent two summers on the rifle team." Being a good Birch Island boy, and the son of Jim and Georgina McGregor, he was also on the hockey team and even played a n exhibition game in England.

of 1992 and came back home to work at the family's J&G Marina, then later at the community's public works department. Corporal McGregor has also acted as a band councillor for the past 17 years.

"I appreciate what I've done and where I live," he reflected. "I try not to take it for granted how lucky we are. I've seen how other people live and they aren't as fortunate as

Corporal McGregor said he's also kept that sense of discipline from his time with the armed forces, as well as the concept of respect for elders and respect for authority.

He said he has a great deal of respect and honour for all those who died in the military in all previous conflicts, recalling a fellow parachutist who jumped just before him from a plane and whose parachute didn't open. He landed

near his comrade's lifeless body, knowing it could have just as easily been him. Corporal McGregor also lost four friends from his unit who were killed in a car accident. "That was hard on the guys," he explained. "Seeing a military funeral and the 21-gun salute when they're

lowering the casket, that's really hard.' Corporal McGregor is a regular presenter at the Whitefish River First Nation Remembrance Day services, which

he says is an honour.

The veteran said he was a mere 130 lbs when he joined the military and remembered a couple of guys from his community telling him he'd never make it through basic training. "That stayed in my mind and I stuck it out," Corporal McGregor said. "Basic training was probably the hardest thing I've done, but I wouldn't trade it for the world, the places I've seen, the people I've met.'





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Manitoulin remembers

Fate and the draft put Blair Sullivan in a US uniform

by Michael Erskine PROVIDENCE BAY—Blair Sullivan had signed up to join the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Christmas holidays of 1942, but before June 1, 1943 when he was to travel to the recruiting station in Windsor, a draft notice appeared in the mail at his parent's Madison County, Indiana home informing him he had been drafted by the US Army and was to report for basic training in a field artillery battalion at Camp Roberts, California.

"Needless to say I found myself in the US Army doing basic training on the very day I was supposed to report to the RCAF," he laughed when interviewed about his wartime experiences by The Expositor.

Mr. Sullivan had wound up in the US because his father, an accomplished mechanic, had been offered a job with the manufacturing plant that General

Motors had to repatriate from Saskatchewan to Indiana after the start of the war due to the US Neutrality Act. When the plant, loaded

onto numerous flatbed cars was hauled back across the border, Mr. Sullivan's father and his familv followed the job. At that time, early in the war, the United States was a neutral country in the fray, unlike Canada which had declared war on Germany a week after the United Kingdom made the same move in August 1939. By the time young Blair Sullivan had moved with his family to Wisconsin, the Japanese had attacked the US ships in the Hawaiian port of Pearl Harbor and the US had joined the war against Germany and Japan.

At the end of basic training at Camp Roberts, Mr. (now Private) Sullivan was told to report to an office where he, along with six other high scorers selected from amongst the 500-man battalion were interviewed by a Lieutenant Colonel. "He gave us three options," recalled Mr. Sullivan.

"Firstly, we could remain with the unit and ship out to some place in the Pacific, secondly transfer to Fort Still, Oklahoma and go through officer train-

ing school to graduate as a 2nd Lieutenant in the field artillery or, thirdly, transfer to Stanford University and enter an army specialized training program as a pre-engineering student."

The decision didn't take long. "I told him my decision, saluted and left to register for the transfer to Stanford," he laughed.

His battalion left for the Pacific Theatre shortly after, where they took part in the battle for Bougainville. He received a letter from a buddy who told him how the battalion was "badly mauled by the Japanese."

"Some of the landing craft had gone aground offshore and were easy targets for the Japanese guns on shore," he said. The Japanese were eventually defeated at a heavy cost.

Mr. Sullivan enjoyed a much different life at Stanford "but it wasn't to last for long," he said ruefully. "In early September, our group was notified that changes were coming. We were to list our interest in transferring to another school. I listed Indiana University as my first choice (close to his family and the girlfriend Lillian

who was later to become his wife of 65 years) and was really surprised that I was chosen to go

He spent the next little while ensconced in an "academic grind," but with the aid of some extra fuel rationing stamps and most weekends free, it wasn't so very bad. But things were heating up in Europe and Mr. Sullivan soon found himself assigned to the survey and forward recon squad of the 516th field artillery battalion training for the field at the Camp Shelby range.

His squad leader was a socalled 90-day wonder, a 2nd Lt.

Goodyear (yes, one of "the" Goodyears of tire fame) who was a recent graduate of Princeton who had been in the army all of 90 days before his arrival at Camp Shelby. Most of the rest of the officer contingent were graduates of officer training schools, but the battalion commander was a Lt. Col. Sol Bloodworth, a West Point graduate and regular army through and through.

The next few weeks were a blur of forced marches, rifle range work and hand-to-hand combat training. There was no mistaking it, their unit was headed into the thick of it. Training was no piece of cake. As recon scouts for the battalion's 12 Long Tom artillery pieces, they found themselves wading through streams and bogs to set up sight lines. Mr. Sullivan's exuberant leap across one stream not only landed him in the cold water, but he found himself face to face with the open mouth of a very angry and venomous water moccasin snake.

"With a great leap, and by thrashing about I escaped the snake and rushed from the

scene," he recalled. "My buddies, some several hundred yards away, were laughing their heads

In early July, the 500 men of the 516th battalion embarked for the war in Europe aboard the four-stacked 49,000 ton Cunard liner Aquitania, a sister ship of the Titanic, along with 20,000 troops and 600 army nurses packed on its 12 decks.

The Aquitania was one of the fastest ships afloat, but it spent much of its time zigzagging to avoid German U-boats, safely arriving nine days later at the Firth of Clyde in total darkness.

As they travelled to their jumpoff port aboard troop trains, children who had been evacuated from other parts of England to escape the blitz lined the streets with shouts of "gum chum." Thanks to a ship-board briefing. the soldiers of the 516th had stocked up on sticks of gum for the occasion.

As they waited two months for their deployment, ensconced at their Broadstone golf course and country club mess hall (the ninehole course made a great sighting range for artillery gun crews), it was not unusual to hear the drone of German aircraft or VI buzz bombs overhead. "They appeared to have little accuracy," recalled Mr. Sullivan.

But eventually the men of the 516th battalion and its 12 155mm Long Tom guns found themselves aboard 33 LSTs (landing ship, tank) bound for the north shore of the River Seine and the French city of Rouen.

The next morning the battalion suffered its first casualty. "The bottom of our LST had some of our 155s chained to the hull," he said. "Several of the gun crewmen were playing cards on blankets when a sudden lurch of the

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Oh, dem' achy bones

"Winter is coming." Some of you may immediately think of knights, White Walkers and dragons as in 'Game of Thrones.' For the majority of us, however, those three words conjure thoughts of stiff legs, stilted gaits, and the season's fashion of Stanfields' long

johns. Achy joints are not just limited to we bipeds but also to our furred family quadrupeds. In this two-part article, part one will focus on the anatomy of a joint (I can hear some groaning) and part two will discuss the treatments and products to manage joint pain (less

A pet doesn't have to be a senior citizen to require joint care supplements, pain medication or physical therapy. Degenerative arthritis can result from an injury or can be the result of genetics/joint conformation.

If your pet is stiff, has poor range of motion in a joint, difficulties jumping up on the bed or into litter boxes, then you will need some education about joint care options and an understanding of what is happening in your pet's joints.

The joints we are concerned with when we talk about degenerative arthritis are synovial joints. They consist of two bones and a fibrous capsule holding the two bones together. The two bones surfaces are covered with slippery cartilage that must be able to glide across each other with minimal friction no matter what the patient's activity level is, and they must continue to be able to glide easily in this way repeatedly throughout the patient's life.


Prevention of the progression of arthritis is all about maintaining the normal

structures of the joint. In many cases, this involves providing the biochemical components of these structures as nutritional supplements.

Joint structure No 1: The cartilage.

Articular cartilage surfaces of the joint are the caps on the ends of the bone. These are the smooth surfaces that must glide across each other. Cartilage is made up of cartilage cells called chondrocytes suspended in a cartilage matrix (think of fruit suspended in Jell-O). The matrix, which represents 95 percent of the cartilage, consists of collagen and proteoglycans. Collagen is the tough support protein that act as the steel girders of the body, holding everything from bone to skin in the shape it is meant to

Proteoglycan is not a word familiar to the general public but since most joint nutritional supplements relate to it, it is important to know what it is. Proteoglycans are the materials surrounding the collagen fibers. They consist of a long core protein molecules with glycosaminoglycans, or GAGs, growing off their sides like bristles on a hair brush.



I am always gathering information and piling. I have a pile for the following: new recipes to try, new cookbooks to read, articles and books on health, gardening magazines and catalogues and finally just books (new authors, stories) that will transport you to a different place. One article that I just finished reading is called "Sugar addiction: till death do us part," starting with the sentence "Is sugar the new tobacco? It's beginning to look that way, especially when it comes to addiction." The book I am half way through is called 'Fat Chance the Hidden Truth about Sugar, Obesity and Disease' written by Dr. Robert Lustig. One of the sentences in his introduction is "Food matters. Unfortunately, food now matters even more than it should. Food is beyond necessity; it's also a commodity, and it has been reformulated to be an addictive substance.

The book is excellent. Everyone should read it especially parents with children. A great Christmas present.

When we cook from scratch and use real food we will all be in a better place. Nobody gives us health. We must earn it with discipline, diet (real food) and exercise!

Banana Muffins (gluten and sugar free)

This recipe has no added sugars except if you use regular chocolate chips. I bought a package of semi-sweet chocolate chips from the Paris Health Food Store. They are from the company Krisda and they use Stevia as a sweetener. I didn't have coconut flour so the 1/2 cup became a mixture of spelt, almond and Quinoa flour. The mixture will be runny but will bake up firm.

- 2 1/2 cups mashed bananas
- 1/2 cup sunflower seed butter or nut butter (do not use regular peanut butter)
- 4 Tbsp melted coconut oil
- 1/2 cup unsweetened coconut flakes
- 1/2 cup coconut flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 3/4 cup chocolate chips or chopped nuts (optional)

Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease or line with paper cups a 12-cup muffin pan.

Mix wet ingredients together, including bananas and sunflower seed butter. Add the remaining dry ingredients and mix well. Add the chocolate chips and or nuts.

Spoon into greased muffin pan and bake for 25-30 min-



These hair brush bristles consist of keratin sulphate (which is made in the body from a biochemical called glucosamine) and chondroitin sulphate, both of which are included in many popular over-the-counter joint supplements. The core proteins carrying their bristles connect to a central GAG called hyaluronan, which is also used in joint support products. These GAG bristles allow the proteoglycan molecule to soak up water like a little sponge. It is this

characteristic that allows the cartilage to be soft like a mattress, yet slippery when the two bones of the joint move across each other.

Chondrocytes are the cells that actually secrete the cartilage matrix. While the cells represent only a small portion of the cartilage (five percent), they must remain healthy so as to produce new matrix when the old matrix is damaged.

Joint structure No. 2 : The Joint Capsule or Synovial Membrane

This is the capsule that encloses the joint. The capsule has an outer tough, fibrous layer and an inner layer that secretes joint fluid, a fluid that provides both nutrition and lubrication to the enclosed joint. The joint capsule

must keep unwanted proteins and biochemicals out of the joint and only let the desired nutrients inside. After all, the joint must be kept smooth and the lubricants pure if they are to maintain the joint throughout the patient's entire lifetime. The joint capsule has two types of cells: Type A Synoviocytes and Type B Synoviocytes. The Type A cells are all about removing impurities and cleaning up debris. Type B cells produce Hyaluronan (mentioned above), an important lubricant in the joint.

When there is an injury or simply poor conformation, the cartilage becomes roughened and can chip, flake off, or even wear down. The joint capsule becomes inflamed and thickened and no longer functions normally.

In providing treatment, our goal is to alleviate the pain and inflammation and provide the biochemical building blocks that allow the joint to heal itself.

This will be discussed next time in part 2.


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Island ploughing competitor qualifies for next year's international event

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

...continued from page 1A ship broke one of the chains." A track broke free from one of the guns and severed the leg of one of the gun crew. Despite the medical officer's best efforts, the injury proved

Once landed, the men of the 516th faced a disheartening first day as liberators. "As we entered a small village, we were angered to see some of the villagers spitting at us," he recalled. "Had we come to overthrow the Germans or were these people satisfied with the German occupation? We never knew the answer."

So began the steady march across Fortress Europe. "All along the roads, in towns and fields, we saw the ravages of warmany dead horses and destroyed vehicles," he said. His unit was to see a lot of death in the coming months.

The 516th arrived just in time to greet the December 16 German counterattack known to history as The Battle of the Bulge. The battle lasted until December 25 and through that time buzz bombs, the dreaded German rockets, flew over the village of St. Thrond where they were emplaced. "Several landed near our location and caused the barn we were living in to shake," he said. "We counted out bless-

Close calls were plentiful enough. As Christmas Day was being celebrated with a delightfully well-timed mail jeep delivery, complete with a Christmas cake from home that they placed on a truck hood, a Messerschmitt 109 (German fighter plane) put in an appearance, sending everyone scrambling for cover as its guns straffed the courtyard. Luckily, on that occasion the cake was the only

There were plenty of

casualties on both sides as the battalion continued its drive into Germany.

"I recall one blond haired soldier (one of several German bodies lying frozen) just a few yards in the open to the north of our underground home," he recalled. 'It appeared that before he died he had taken from his pocket several pictures of his family and friends.'

There were moments of levity, including a few liberated bottles of wine, and following the cessation of hostilities, the battalion got to take in a performance by the legendary Jack Benny, including Ingrid Bergman, Larry Adler and Martha Tilton.

Mr. Sullivan was wound-

ed in the hip when mortar rounds rained down on the destroyed barn where the recon squad was setting up their base. "I was headed down the stairs when it hit and I blacked out.'

His injured hip was worked on after the war, but it is still causing him a great deal of pain.

His return to America was fairly soon after the war. Men were repatriated on a point system that was based, in part, on the number of days they spent in combat. Mr. Sullivan had a large number of points amassed by the time the Germans had sur-

rendered. As they entered New

York harbour, fireboats

water cannon on the ship in an exuberant (although somewhat less than appreciated) display of enthu-

siasm. He underwent a rigorous series of medical exams before he was mustered out-more than the other members of his unit. "I asked what that was all about," he recalled. The doctors informed him that, as the only Canadian in the 500-man 516th Battalion, they were making sure that he could not sue the USA in the future. As it turns out, Mr. Sullivan has few complaints about the way the US has compensated him for his service. "I get a pension every month for my hip and my ears," he said.

Mr. Sullivan returned home to Indiana, where he married his wife Lillian (with whom he enjoyed 65 happy years of marriage). She was a public school health nurse and he spent the next 30 years as a high school biology teacher before returning to his family's roots on Manitoulin Island.

You have to look hard, very hard, at the ribbons that festoon the breast of Mr. Sullivan's Legion jacket, to see the two tiny bronze stars pinned to the

European theatre campaign ribbon.

That's not one, but two bronze stars recog-

nizing his combat experience and heroism.


The bronze star is awarded to "any person who, while serving in any capacity in or with the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, or Coast Guard of the United States, after 6 December 1941, distinguishes, or has distinguished, herself or himself by heroic or meritorious achievement or service, not involving participation in aerial flight—(a) while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States; (b) while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force; or (c) while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party."

Mr. Sullivan exemplifies those so-very ordinary extraordinary individuals who stepped up to serve their country (or countries in the case of many dual citizens) in its time of extreme peril, returning to home and hearth, bearing scars visible and invisible as reminders of those most terrible of days.

A more complete story of Mr. Sullivan's life and times, along with greater detail of his military experiences can be found at the Central Manitoulin museum in Mindemoya.

Lest we forget.

Livestock identification

Cattle and sheep farmers are required to identify all animals as they leave the farm with a radio frequency identification (RFID) tag. It has been an encouraged practice since about 2000 and mandatory for cattle since 2010. It is more recent for sheep farmers. It is expected mandatory identification will be in place for goat farmers in 2018. Tags are usually purchased by farmers and inserted before an animal

leaves home. However there are designated "tagging sites" where animals can be tagged for a fee. Animals must go directly to these sites from home. Tagging sites are generally livestock auction facilities including Keady, Brussels, OLEX, Cookstown, Hoards Station, etc. Tags are registered in the farmer's name. The goal is the protection of animal health, public health and food safety. For example, on occasion BSE has been identified with individual animals and

traced back to source herd. Using RFID tags all animals in contact with the diseased animal in its lifetime can be located and quarantined. As well, the ability to age verify animals with the use of RFID tags has reopened trade markets since the major BSE outbreak in 2003. Tags can be purchased locally through local agribusiness locations or directly through Canadian Cattle Identification Agency (CCIA).
