M'Chigeeng election is overturned by appeals committee

New elections to be set for chief and council

M'CHIGEENG—The M'Chigeeng First Nation chief and council are facing a return to the hustings following an October 2 meeting of the band's appeals committee where it was decided to overturn the results of the September 9 band elections following an appeal letter filed on September 21. From now until sometime in December when a new election will be held, M'Chigeeng First Nation is without a chief and council at the helm.

"I would like to encourage everyone to be patient and supportive during this process," wrote Ogimaa Linda Debassige in an announcement following the appeals committee decision that effectively removed her from her position. "There is no need for mudslinging or any type of lateral violence at this time. Now is the time to stay strong and supportive of this process that M'Chigeeng is now going through."

Ogimaa Debassige stressed that in matters relating to the election, Isadore Bebamash, chair of the appeals committee, is the official spokesperson.

She went on to comment, however, that she had met with the senior managers and received commitments that all operations would continue uninterrupted. "I believe and have the utmost confidence that the managers have the capacity, knowledge and experience to ensure that the operations will continue through this time,' she wrote. "It is important that our laws be respected and adhered to. As a strong First Nation we can get through this together." Ogimaa Debassige concluded by acknowledging the work of the appeals committee and the difficult decisions that sometimes have to be made. "We will get through this."

Ogimaa Debassige had been acting as band manager while the selection process was underway, but now for the interim Les Corbiere will be acting as band rep. She noted that band managers have 20-plus years of experience and that they have the authorizations they need to keep things upright on the ship of state in the interim.

Canada offers compensation to 'Sixties Scoop' survivors

OTTAWA—Crown-Indigenous Affairs Minister Carolyn Bennett announced Friday morning that an "agreement in principle" has been reached with the legal team representing survivors of the Sixties Scoop, Indigenous children who had been wrested from their families, communities and culture across Canada by child services agencies, and placed in non-Indigenous homes, largely during the 1960s.

"They have lived their lives not being able to be proud Indigenous people," Minister Bennett said of the survivors in making the announcement. "They have lived their lives not having secure personal cultural identity. That was robbed away. Someone thought that a non-Indigenous family somewhere else in the world was going to do a better job."

The children involved in the Sixties Scoop were placed with homes across Canada, and sometimes even overseas and a number of survivors who now live in communities spread across the world were in attendance for the

announcement.

As part of the settlement, the government has set aside \$750 million for individual compensation and another \$50 million for the establishment of a ...continued on page 11

Three police officers attended the scene, but the individual had left the building by the time the officers arrived. According to an OPP spokesperson, the individual has been contacted and cautioned to not attend the municipal offices again.

Former Sheguiandah First Nation chief blocks band office

Orville Aguonie protests alleged conflicts of community electoral personnel

SHEGUIANDAH—Former Sheguiandah chief (and current nominee in the upcoming November 22 election) Orville Aguonie blockaded the Sheguiandah First Nation band offices on Wednesday, October 4, using a half-ton truck and a car to block the doors into the building.

Sitting in a gazebo behind the band office, Mr. Aguonie said that he had taken the action "due to a major conflict of interest by current Chief Andrew Aguonie and one of his staff (Cindy Behm)."

Mr. Aguonie claimed that Chief Aguonie and two of the band councillors had chosen Ms. Behm (the band's lands administrator) to be the electoral returning officer for the November 22 election.

"Not only does Cindy Behm's appointment constitute a major conflict of interest, due to the employee/employer relationship that exists, but she also has a vested interest in the outcome of the election," alleged Mr. Aguonie, speaking publically outside the band offices. "Ms. Behm's

Robinson Huron annuities case sees first day in court

THUNDER BAY—The opening volleys in a court challenge of the \$4 annuity payments related to the Robinson Huron Treaty have been served in a Thunder Bay courtroom and Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier's initial impression was positive.

"At least from the sense that the hard work and research that has been undertaken by all our councils has finally been heard in court," he said. "It is a starting

The Huron Robinson chiefs' legal counsel presented their position in a "very well thought out manner and brought our arguments in with all of the relevant case law," added Ogimaa Peltier.

"That includes our own oral history of what the understanding was and how it was to be operational-

Much of the government's position is based on an earlier court case which they say settled the matter back in the 1800s, but the Anishinaabe point out that there was a fundamental natural justice flaw in that decision.

"We were not represented. There were no Anishinaabe present in the court," noted Ogimaa Peltier. "The two Crowns, the province and the federal representatives were there, but we were not involved." Since the decision had a fundamental impact on the lives of the Anishinaabe and the terms of their nations agreements with the Crown, that lack of representation would be inconceivable today.

According to the Anishinaabek claim, "the 'Ojibwe' agreed to share their lands and resources with the newcomers-approximately 35,700 square miles of territory. The treaty territory covers the lands north of Lake Huron from Penetanguishene to beyond Sault Ste. Marie, up to the height of land. The Robinson Superior Treaty, signed on September 7, 1850, covers lands north of Lake Superior, from North of Sault Ste. Marie to Thunder Bay. The Robinson Treaty territories have yielded vast amounts of revenues from forestry, mining and other resource development activities over the years, yet the annuities

Northeast Town council accepts \$20,000 reserve reimbursement from Island planning board

MANITOULIN—The Northeast Town has accepted an offer from the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) for \$20,000 from the board's

"An offer came in through our lawyer last night that the MPB would give us \$20,000 of the board's reserves," said Mayor Al MacNevin. "We were asking for \$30,000, but council decided that instead of spending more money on legal fees, we would accept the offer—it's a good compromise.'

As The Expositor previously reported, Northeast Town council directed staff to seek legal advice to get its perceived \$30,000 (of the approximately \$90,000) share back from the MPB reserves since leaving the board and establishing its own planning authority last year.

In March, the MPB carried a motion that the reserves would remain the property of the board.

At the MPB's April meeting, a motion was put forward by Richard Stephens and seconded by Ian Anderson to give \$15,000 to the Northeast

Northeast Town staff present first draft of 2018 budget

Proposed budget includes 2.5 percent increase in the levy

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town council was presented with the first draft of the 2018 municipal budget by staff last Thursday night, reflecting a 2.5 percent increase in the levy (the amount needed to cover town operations).

"The original budget we had to bring to council had a proposed 3.68 percent increase to the levy, however we received notice that policing costs for 2018 will be down \$70,000," explained town CAO Dave Williamson. "Taking that into account, we now have a very tight budget that reflects a 2.5 percent increase, or an additional \$107,945.83 that we need to raise (through taxes)."

Mr. Williamson reviewed the proposed capital budget, which includ-

Under transportation services, the proposed capital project is to finish the connecting link portion of Highway 6 from the swing bridge to the Beer Store at a cost of \$260,000, with \$247,000 to come from a grant and \$13,000 to come from the town's working capital reserve (the project is conditional on receiving funding).

The proposed surface treatments, all to be funded by the Gas Tax refund, include: in Little Current, Campbell Street West at a cost of \$15.000: Cockburn Street, at a cost of \$20.000; in Sheguiandah, Bay Street, \$22,000; in Honora, Gaida's Side Road, \$18,000; North Channel Drive, \$30,000; Green Bay Road (lift and resurface/grade raise), \$35,000; and Limekin Road (lift and resurface), \$32,000.

The budgeted drain is the Meredith Drain at a cost of \$60,000 to come from the working capital reserve. For sidewalks for 2018, staff proposed the repair of the downtown sidewalks at a cost of \$8,200, reflected in the budget. Mr. Williamson noted that the bricks need to be leveled and, if not fixed, could become a liability issue.


"No matter what the question, what the issue, what the challenge is, education is the answer," said Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee following the introduction of Bill C-61. "This historic agreement will set the stage for a brighter and stronger future for our children communities.'

The Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement Bill has been introduced into Parliament to pass as

federal legislation giving the Education Agreement the force of law. The Anishinabek hope that the Bill will be passed quickly to meet the target effective date for the Anishinabek Education System (AES) open its doors on April 1, 2018.

Anishinabek The Nation Agreement (ANEA) is a self-government agreement between Canada and 23 Anishinabek First Nations that recognizes First Nation control over Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 Education onreserve. The ANEA will provide reliable funding to operate the stand-alone AES, a new education system parallel to the Ontario education system, where Participating First Nations (PFNs) have full

Gamesmanship is no substitute for real policy planks

There is nothing new about the spectre of gamesmanship and misrepresentation of an opponent's statements; "putting a different spin on it" is the modern catchphrase for the activity. One can see the practice at play in the writings of Rome's Julius Caesar on his campaign in Gaul or the full on fabrications of the emperors who followed him (one even claiming a successful invasion of Britain when all evidence points to that worthy never having set a foot across the channel).

In the age of Facebook and "alternate facts" the trend to "spin' seems to have ascended to new and dizzying heights (albeit without the faking of full on invasions of foreign countries taking place...yet), but it is little wonder that the common individual has largely turned its back on the political elites represented by organized partisan politics.

Instead of presenting solid policy positions that will improve the lot of the common serf who spends most of their days trudging in drudgery with the increasingly vain hope of keeping the lights on, heat flowing and gruel on the table, we are presented with oneupmanship and sideshows that serve no meaningful purpose outside of scoring a few partisan points with that party's base or herding the unwary into their fold.

But there is a cautionary note here for the practitioners of "clickbait" misrepresentation of their political opponents' positions and off-hand utterances. Once drawn into the narrative, reasonable people, and many of those are the people who actually still vote these days, will react badly when they realize they have been had. Governing is too important an occupation to willfully waste credibility on frivolous sidebars

It is tremendously difficult not to be drawn into dwelling on the frivolous, especially when the mechanics of elections, those backroom cadres who inhabit the shadows of all political parties, are able to point to studies that show the tactic is effective. "Keep the negative narrative going," is a common admonition. The more hours, days and weeks that a negative impression can be fostered in the not-so-attentive public mind the better their own candidate's chances when they enter the lists and attempt to unseat the incumbent government.

It is tempting to simply cry "a pox on all your houses" and turn our backs on the democratic process, after all, we all have busy lives with more important things to do than engage in sandbox level politics. But we must resist that temptation. Too much depends on peace, order and good government to abdicate our responsibilities as active members of a democratic nation—no matter how flawed the current state of affairs might be.

Each and every reasonable person should set aside any partisan blinkers they may normally wear, if any, and let their representatives at all levels of government know that enough is enough. Get off of the monkey bars and get on with the business of government.

Central Manitoulin expresses dissatisfaction with MTO work

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The agenda items were completed and Central Manitoulin council members were about to entertain a motion to adjourn when Councillor Derek Stephens apologized for missing a matter referenced in the minutes presented to council from the September 5 Road Committee meeting.

The passage Councillor Stephens was referencing read: "That we direct staff to write to the Ministry of Transportation regarding the Municipality's displeasure with the paving that was don on Highway 542 west of Mindemoya this August, in which none of the aprons of the interesting municipal roads were paved as committed to in previous years, creating safety concerns for the municipality and fur-

ther that there appears to have not been any patching of roadway defects before paving was carried out, creating a very unsatisfactory road surface.'

The highways around our community are a mess." said Councillor Stephens. "That is what I have been hearing about constantly in the community."

Councillor Stephens noted that there were a lot of promises made that simply were not, to his mind, followed through on.

"I don't disagree with what Councillor Stephens is saying," admitted Clerk Ruth Frawley. She noted that the motion from the Roads Committee did not come forward as a motion to council as it was not put as a recommendation to council, but rather a direction to

"It is all I have been hearing," said Councillor Stephens, "that the road work sucks." He suggested that a lot of the municipality's own gravel sideroads were actually in better shape than the MTO's highways. "I am very upset with the work the MTO did here," said Councillor Stephens. He alleged that it appeared that the road was not repaired and leveled prior to repaying and that commitments to pave crossroad intersections was not followed through upon

Following procedural discussion it was determined that the letter to the MTO should come from council as a whole, rather than simply a letter from staff.

Islands unite

Manitoulin takes part in initial Great Lakes Islands Summit

BEAVER ISLAND, MI—Two representatives from Manitoulin Island, and this newspaper, attended the first-ever Islands Summit themed 'Laying the Foundation for a Great Lakes Islands Coalition,' and left the two-day conference hosted by Beaver Island and the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes with a renewed sense of pride in Manitoulin and our Great Lakes home.

"It was a wonderful two days spent on Beaver Island, in quite literally the middle of Lake Michigan," said Expositor publisher Alicia McCutcheon, who attended the Islands Summit with her mother, Julia McCutcheon.

There were over 70 attendees representing 11 Great Lakes islands. Facilitating the event were representatives of The Island Institute, based in Maine; the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes and the Beaver Island community.

Maine's The Island Institute started in 1983 to provide forestry and conservation services to landowners on Maine islands but has grown to support and maintain the year-round communities on these Maine islands, the Institute's website states. "That work has evolved over the years and now encompasses six work areas: community development, economic development, education, energy, marine resources and media." It boasts a staff of 50 and has an annual operating budget of over \$5.5 million and has branched out to help other islands across the United States.

Brandon Hofstedt of Michigan's Northland College Center for Rural Communities presented a summary of island data and the value of indicators. He noted that approximately 21,000 people populate all the Great Lakes islands year-round with their collective population growing to 50,000 seasonally. These islands also attract over two million visitors a year and have an estimated \$200 to \$400 million economic impact on the Great Lakes region, he told the group assembled at the Central Michigan University biological research station.

Mr. Hofstedt said that with the islands coming from both sides of the border, plus their combined economic clout, an island coalition could make for a good lobbying presence.

Karen Burns of The Island Institute spoke to the group regarding its role and its Island Fellows program. A fellow is chosen and becomes part of an island community for a one- or two-year stint and helps that island build capacity; bolster its emergency training, work with historical societies; or "gather energy around volunteer recruitment." Island Fellows are tasked with integrating into the community at every level.

This year there are nine Island Fellows spread across Maine and Michigan, Ms. Burns explained, introducing Beaver Island's fellow Stefanie Burchill.

"Each of the islands had a chance to stand up and give a quick five-minute overview of their island," Ms. McCutcheon explained. "Five minutes didn't seem nearly long enough to explain Manitoulin, but we made it work," she laughed.

"Manitoulin is wildly different from the other Great Lakes islands," she added, "and that became evident very quickly, but we all share a passion for the particular island we call home and we all want the best for our people"

Islands Summit were Beaver Island, Lake Michigan (USA), population 584; Mackinac Island, Lake Michigan (USA), population 481; Drummond Island, Lake Huron (USA), population 1,126; Harsens Island, Lake Michigan (USA), population 1,145; Neebish Island, St. Mary's River (USA), population 89; South Bass Island and Middle Bass Island, Lake Erie (USA), population 625; Pelee Island, Lake Erie (Canada), population 171; Manitoulin Island, Lake Huron (Canada), population 13,048; Madeline Island, Lake Superior (USA), population 261; and Washington Island, Lake Michigan (USA), population 843.

"Manitoulin's population is far, far greater than all of the islands and we are also bridged, which seemed to be slightly contentious for some people in attendance," Ms. McCutcheon noted. "My mother and I pointed out that the bridge does swing and that while having the swing bridge in Little Current is all well and good for the people of Little Current and surrounding areas, it doesn't mean the people of, say Meldrum Bay or Western Manitoulin, may feel any less isolated."

All the other islands have ferry services, some year-round and some not. Many rely on charter flight services. Some have schools, varying from up to Grade

8 or to Grade 12, while some islands do not even have a grocery store or a gas station, the McCutcheons explained.

"All of the islands spoke of their frustration with broadband service and all of them spoke of the importance of tourism to their economy," Ms. McCutcheon added. "Manitoulin is the only island that does not rely solely on tourism for its economy."

"The Summit made us feel incredibly thankful to live on Manitoulin," Ms. McCutcheon said. "I'm sure all of the islands are equally beautiful and special, but we are so fortunate to live in a place that boasts an excellent healthcare system, school system, a vibrant island economy, and even paved roads, as well as our unique shared culture."

"In our closing remarks at the Islands Summit I noted that while many of the islands began their spiel by noting the spiritual and territorial importance of their islands to the First Nations or Tribes of the area, the lack of Indigenous representation on Beaver Island was slightly unsettling," Ms. McCutcheon said. "I spoke to the fact that the Great Lakes First Nations people are the stewards of the land and water here and the importance of having their voice represented at the table. It obviously had an affect on some of the islands as we had many people come up to us afterwards to thank us for bringing it up, noting that they would make more of an effort on their own islands, moving forward, at inclu-

When broken into groups, the islands were asked to write down their challenges and successes on topics and various McCutcheons say they were able to note many Island successes, including in health, Manitoulin's ability to attract and maintain healthcare professionals, which has even been noted by the national press, community paramedicine and the non-urgent patient transfer vehicles as unique pilot programs that could be adopted by other island communities; for environment, the success of Manitoulin Streams and spinoffs such as the invasive species intern; and for tourism, the push toward ecotourism and the First Nations leading the way in that regard, an abundant arts scene "and so much more. We really do have a lot to be proud of here.'

Ms. McCutcheon said they also came away with the thought that was first noted by Jim Nies, a summer resident of Kagawong, that perhaps Manitoulin does not think of itself as an island enough.

"The people of the other Great

Lakes islands wear many hats from tourism operator to paramedic to teacher, in some cases, Ms. McCutcheon said. "Having small populations and being isolated has made them come together and find solutions to problems. It was observed to me before I left for the conference how Manitoulin is comprised of many silos, our seven municipalities, six First Nations and one unorganized township and oftentimes we do not work together nearly enough. Things like waste disposal and composting, even what to do with old cars, is amplified on islands and Mr. Nies is right—we should be thinking more like an island, especially when it comes to our environment and being good stewards of the land.'

Matt Preisser of the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes explained that his boss, Jon Allan, became aware of The Island Institute and thought how the Great Lakes islands, specifically those in Michigan, could benefit from just such a model and thus began a relationship between the Michigan Office and the group in Maine which eventually led to an exchange between Beaver Island community members to the Maine islands thanks to a grant through the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes.

"We realized that (Great Lakes islands) have a very unique set of challenges and mainland decision makers have no clue as to what those challenges are and also that the other islands really don't communicate much with one another," Mr. Preisser said.

Mr. Preisser says his office sees itself as a "leader in Great Lakes management" and decided to call a meeting and "see who showed up; have islanders meet other islanders and if there was a value to having something like a coalition then we would help to facilitate it"

It was Beaver Island that suggested reaching out to the other islands and, not itself having the capacity to do so, the Michigan Office of the Great Lakes kindly agreed to help them take that task on.

"We're pretty confident that it was a good idea," Mr. Preisser said of the Islands Summit.

He noted that one of the islanders brought up the fact that an islands coalition could also work as a preventative measure. If one island had an issue or tried something that failed, another island could learn from those mistakes. "That could be a really great function before it happens," he said.

Moving forward, Mr. Preisser admitted to having much work ahead of him in terms of summarizing the many shared ideas that came out of the summit and will be putting forward regular communication via emails between the islands and creating a charter for an islands coalition leading up to the fall of 2018 and the next summit, which will be hosted by Madeline Island in Lake Superior.

The McCutcheons say it was a worthwhile trip to Beaver Island, commenting on the gracious hosts of that island, and the hopes for a relationship with the islands through the creation of a coalition in the future that could aid in lobbying all levels of government on both sides of the border regarding the health of the lakes, and its people.

"I feel that Manitoulin should be represented in this movement," Ms. McCutcheon added. "We aren't sure what the next steps will be, but we need to be at the table."

Farm properties bearing large percentage of tax burden, Federation of Agriculture

PROVIDENCE BAY—The Manitoulin North Shore Federation of Agriculture is one of 52 county federations of the Ontario Farm Association which encompasses 38,000 members in this province.

Late last month, members met at the community hall in Providence Bay to hold its Annual General Meeting.

Alan Emiry of Massey is the president of this Northern federation and he was the host for this meeting with an agenda that included the passing of minutes, the financial report, elections and guest speakers.

Mary Scott, manager of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association, was the first to speak at the meeting and outlined programs that are available to farmers as well as workshops that will be held in the coming weeks. She told the members that there is still funding available until December 15 for the Species at Risk Farm Incentive Program (SARFIP) and funding would also be retroactive to last April. She also talked about other projects under SARFIP that would include fencing, rotational grazing, fencing to keep livestock from water's edge, native tree and grassland planting, solar energy, block planting and in kind labour. Funding is also available to hire someone to get rid of species at risk.

Ms. Scott then explained that there are five workshops offered by the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association that she will hold this winter. These free workshops as well as webinars are part of Growing Forward 2 (GF2) to assist farm businesses in identifying strengths and weaknesses in five different areas with a goal to positively influence the farm's profitability, productivity and sustainability. The date, time and place of these workshops will be in the Island newspapers.

The workshops to be offered include traceability, which is a one-and-ahalf-day workshop to help one gain a competitive advantage and improve your bottom line by implementing a traceability system that effectively uses the information to gain value through reduced costs, improved profit margins and increased market poten-

tial The Food Safety Workshop is a two-day in-class session to help one formalize their food safety program while the biosecurity meeting is a one-day in-class, commodity-specific workshop to help one enhance their biosecurity protocols. The Environmental Farm Plan (EFP) workshop is to help one develop an appropriate action plan to improve he environmental sustainability of one's farm business. It too is a two-day inclass sitting.

Growing Your Farm Profits (GYFP) is the final workshop offered and the participants are to meet with the workshop leader on a one-on-one basis after attending a two-day, in-class seminar. This session provides an opportunity to learn practical methods to organize, prioritize and simplify the steps to achieve financial sustainability of the farm business.

Brian Bell, OMAFRA agriculture development advisor, was the next speaker and he outlined the task of putting together a bench line production of how one manages their assets. To this end, there is a survey of 99 questions is to be answered with a \$50 incentive to those who participate.

Mr. Bell also spoke of the Heritage Fund which fits into farming growth plans

and LAMBAC, which is interested in talking to people regarding tile management, and explaining that there is money available for clearing land and for tile drainage.

was the federal/provincial/territorial Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) program, a \$3 billion five-year investment to strengthen the agri-food sector in Canada and which begins April 2018. The CAP focus will be on science, research and innovation, markets and trade, environmental sustainability and climate change, added agriculture and agrifood processing, public trust and risk management.

Mr. Bell also passed on the information that the Beef Farmers of Ontario will be holding a session on October 5 at the Pinewood Motor Inn in Espanola.

The next speaker was Mark Kunkel, the Northern

Another topic of interest as the federal/provinal/territorial Canadian gricultural Partnership CAP) program, a \$3 billion ve-year investment to rengthen the agri-food OFA and a dairy farmer in Powassan. He spoke of the Great Northern Caucus which met to discuss Northern affairs and has a presence at the conferences.

He also talked of wildlife and damage to crops and especially mentioned sandhill cranes. "Our goal," he said, "is to get enough data to go to the government."

Mr. Kunkel gave an update on the Northern Ontario Farm Innovation Alliance (NOFIA) about the field trials on yellow barley. He said that at one time about 80 percent of this barley would go to beer companies such as Molson and the 20 percent going to craft breweries. "That has completely changed," he said,

with the numbers flipped the other way.

Mr. Kunkel also talked about livestock disposal, and studies including on land clearing and the dairy industry.

"The fact sheets will be out in February," he said. "Make sure all data, good or bad, comes back to us." He also mentioned the frustration with wildlife damage claims where one has to take pictures, submit the claim and one is then told to go back and take more pictures. The emphasis is for farmers to take lots of pictures of the diseased animal.

Of special concern to Island farmers is the amount of tax on their

...continued from page 1 municipality," said Mr. Gillespie. "The litigation will be very expensive and it is the defendant's view that the taxpayers of Assiginack should not have to pay the costs."

"We have been through the process of discoveries," continued Mr. Gillespie. "As a result of the process, it has become clear, in the township's view, that there is little if not any merit to the steamship society's claim. We feel the case should be dismissed now without a trial, and we believe that there is sufficient information to allow the court to do that."

Mr. Gillespie said that the township has already incurred costs associated with the claim. Based on the schedule, it would be roughly \$125,000.

Dave Ham, chair of the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society, said he was surprised by the estimated costs of the legal proceedings, but was unable to comment

"The case is in the courts so I cannot comment," said John Coulter, director of restoration for the Society, regarding the claim.

When asked about the potential litigations costs to the town, Mr. Coulter responded, "We didn't bring this upon ourselves."

"We made the claim because of the actions of the township," said Mr. Coulter. "If the township hadn't taken action (to sell the Norisle), the ship would be dry docked and on its way to being restored."

The Township of Assiginack entered into discussions with the Tobermory Maritime Association (TMA) last year to sell the S.S. Norisle to the TMA, to be sunk and used as a dive site in Tobermory.

The Steamship Society responded by launching a lawsuit against the municipality claiming \$10 million in damages in addition to an order declaring that the Society is the owner of the Norisle by way of constructive trust. They also claimed \$250,000 for aggravated, punitive and/or exemplary damages; an interim order restraining the town from disposing of the Norisle until the matter has been tried; an interim order compelling the township to continue to provide status quo administrative tasks including providing all risk insurance; to maintain its current accessible dockages, road access and

snow removal, utilities service and ongoing maintenance at its expense until this matter is tried; full indemnity costs of this proceeding plus all applicable taxes; and "such further and other relief as to this honourable court may seem just," according to the Statement of Claim.

As well the claim goes on to accuse Assiginack of breaching a joint venture agreement between the town and the Society, a breach of fiduciary duty, unjust enrichment and constructive trust, negligence and damages.

A court date has not yet been set, but Mr. Gillespie said the two parties are looking at a date in December of this year or January 2018.

position with Sheguiandah First Nation is not funded by any government agencies and her continued employment hinges on who is elected chief and council."

Although Mr. Aguonie vowed to keep up his blockade until the appointment of the electoral officer was rescinded "by Andrew Aguonie and Indigenous Affairs," he closed down his blockade around 7 pm Wednesday evening.

UCCM Anishinaabe Police Service officers were on hand "to keep the peace" during the protest action, but did not intervene. Band nominations that were supposed to take place at the band office on Wednesday were moved to the Sheguiandah Health Centre.

Chief Aguonie was in Toronto taking part in an Ontario Works conference during the blockade.

"I was talking to Rodney (Nahwegahbow) from the UCCM Police and he told me it was just supposed to be a

one-day protest," said Chief Aguonie when he returned. "It was peaceful and wrapped up by 7 pm."

Chief Aguonie was adamant that the band council did not intend to rescind Ms. Behm's appointment. "No, no," he said. "Council is still agreeing to keep her in place. Anyone who is not in agreement can appeal the election, of course."

Chief Aguonie said operations at the band are continuing as normal and there were no disruptions in service anticipated. "We are continuing to move forward as a community," he said.

...continued from page 1 committee was complex, with many historical decisions playing a role, but essentially the controversy stems from a decision to grandfather in a previous membership list when the original custom membership code was created, the so-called "status quo" list, rather than to limit electors and eligible nominees to the list being compiled from those who had reapplied to be recognized as

members of the band under

tne custom coae. A notice from the appeals committee posted on the M'Chigeeng First Nation website announced that the committee had accepted "as consensus, the validity of the appeal letter that the election was in contravention of the elections code." Further, that the status quo list used for the 2017 M'Chigeeng First Nation elections "does not comply with the M'Chigeeng First Nation Custom Election Code 2005."

The appeals committee offered as its rationale for the decision that, according to the custom election code, Membership Register means the official list of names and addresses of members maintained by the M'Chigeeng First Nation; a member is eligible to vote if the member is listed on the membership

register; only an eligible member may be nominated as a candidate; if satisfied that an election is not conducted in a manner consistent with this code or the regulations, an election appeal committee may declare a contravention; if satisfied that the contravention materially affected the outcome of the election, the election appeal committee may, in addition to a declaration, make such further orders as it considers appropriate; order a new lection including an election for one or more positions, and give directions to the electoral officer for the conduct of that election; and in this section, "administrator" means the entity acting under the administration agreement between Indian and Northern Affairs and Enkamigak Community Inc.'

The committee also referenced an April 29 band meeting resolution that read "whereas M'Chigeeng First Nation chief and council recognizes their duty in failing to maintain a M'Chigeeng First Nation membership register in accordance with the membership code" and an April 13 memo to Chief Linda Debassige from Scott Jacobs, verifier under the Lands Management Act, Lands Advisor Board and an August 4, 2015 report to chief and council from the law firm of Weaver-Simmons that read "many of the people in this category have been accorded the same privileges and benefits as other members, including participation in elections, in referendums to amend the code and other social housing and education related programs and services. It raised expectations of continued eligibility for programs and services and yet, the law is clear—that membership codes must be followed

The appeals committee concludes the announcement by ordering a re-election using the M'Chigeeng First Nation membership code list. The announcement was signed by chair Isadore Bebamash and members Renee Corbiere, Rochelle Debassige, Terry Debassige and Molly Migwans.

The referenced letter from the Scott Jacobs, the appointed lands verifier for M'Chigeeng First Nation, noted that according to the custom election code, all members must be compliant with the membership code and those who wish to vote in the election had to follow the proper process outlined in the code to become members. Names can be added to the list up to the day of the election but individuals must provide proof of membership (usually in the form of a letter from the M'Chigeeng First Nation membership office).

"In conclusion, the Membership Code is the current law of M'Chigeeng First Nation," writes Mr. Jacobs. "The Land Code is developed by members as the fundamental law for the governance of reserve lands and resources Members will vote to ratify the Land Code based on the Community Ratification Process Use of the " Quo" list may allow individuals who are not eligible to be members to participate in a process that is restricted to members.

Based on the appeal letter, whose author has not yet been disclosed, and its deliberations, the appeals committee made the decision to overturn the election results and order a new election, probably some time in December.

Although the day-to-day operations of the band will continue reasonably uninterrupted, there were many online commentators who expressed concern and dismay, with some noting that their program funding applications require band resolutions of support, and that those applications loom well before the new elections can take place.'

Under public works, the replacement of the 2005 snowplow was proposed at a cost of \$260,000, with \$223,000 to come from the working capital reserve and \$37,000 from the 2018 budget. A new sand dome in Sheguiandah was also listed at a cost of \$350,000, but is conditional on the full amount accessed through a grant.

For environmental services, the replacement of the cast iron water main in Little Current is listed at a cost of \$250,000, with the full amount to come from the Little Current water plant reserve, and the Little Current sewage lagoon upgrade at a cost of \$3,000,000, funded on the condition of the town receiving a \$1,000,000 grant, in addition to \$250,000 to come from reserves and a \$2,000,000 loan.

For recreational and cultural services the proposed projects include: a new pickup truck for community services at a cost of \$30,000, reflected in the budget; ice plant upgrades at the recreation centre with a \$200,000 price tag, conditional on the town receiving a \$180,000 grant and \$20,000 to come out of the working capital reserve; dehumidifier replacement at the arena and curling club, costing \$100,000, conditional on the municipality receiving a \$50,000 grant, and \$50,000 to come from the working capital reserve; arena and curling club light upgrades at a cost of \$25,000, with the project conditional on receiving \$12,500 in funding, and the remainder to come from the town; dock revitalization of Piers 3, 5, and 6 at Spider Bay Marina at a cost of \$400,000, with the project conditional on receiving \$200,000 in funding, and the remaining \$200,000 to come out of the Spider Bay Marina reserves; a clean up of the island shorelines in Ward 1, requested by residents, at a cost of \$10,000 which would be fully conditional on receiving the full funding amount; for the fire department, auto extrication equipment upgrades to e-draulics, a cost of \$46,000, with \$30,000 conditional on funding, and the remaining \$16,000 to come from the budget; and sewer back-up protection at station No. 1 in Little Current at a cost of \$12,000 to the

There were also proposed upgrades to the ball field (field B) and the soccer field at Low Island Park at a cost of \$35,000. Mr. Williamson explained that the upgrades to the baseball field would include fencing, a yellow fence guard,

The project would be conditional on a donation from the

allocate funds from the Ross Blum account (\$9,000). Mr. Williamson informed council that the Ross Blum account was created in memoriam for the late Mr. Blum to support kids community hockey and that it has sat unused for sev-

Mr. Williamson said that there is also an additional \$7,000 in a baseball reserve that could be used towards the

As well, the proposed capital budget listed a new floor at the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah, and an upgrade to the painted cement floor in the exhibit area at a cost of \$13,000 to the town.

Councillor Laurie Cook said that she felt that the museum project should be moved to the 'other priorities' list attached to the budget and only be completed if the project received 100 percent of the funding to cover the costs.

Mr. Williamson directed council's attention to the 'other priorities' sheet, noting that the projects listed are important, but the funds are not currently available in the 2018 budget to complete.

These projects include: a building façade improvement to the town office at a cost of \$40,000; a speed indicator sign at a cost of \$6,000, a sidewalk for Hardbargain Road at a cost of \$118,000; the replacement of the 2003 public works backhoe at a cost of \$140,000; a community garden initiative at a cost of \$14,000, a parking lot flex beam for Low Island Park, \$16,000; marketing of the archaeological site at the museum, \$3,145; and a bridge at the old OPP boathouse property (where the boathouse was removed, leaving a gap in the dock), \$75,000.

Also included on the list was the implementation of a new integrated library system at the Little Current Public Library. Mr. Williamson explained that the library board is requesting that the \$22,135 cost be paid for with \$2,135 of grant money, and \$10,000 from the library reserves and \$10,000 from the town's working capital reserves. He informed council that there are sufficient funds in the library reserves to cover the costs (\$36,000) and staff would recommend moving the project to the capital budget if the board would agree that \$20,000 to be used from the library reserve for the project.

He said that as the reserves currently sit, there would be only \$76,122 left if the proposed budget was to remain as presented and the budgeted addition to the reserves for 2018 remained at \$112,735.

Council was asked to review the budget and bring any

...continued from page 1 foundation dedicated to reconciliation initiatives.

Lead plaintiff in the class-action suit is 53-year-old Marcia Brown Martel, chief of the Beaver House First Nation in Temagami, north of North Bay. She was taken from her home in 1967 at the age of four and spent years in foster care where she lost contact with her language and cultural identity.

"Today is one of those days that will be marked in history," said Chief Martel in a video statement following the announcement. "It will be marked down for our children and grandchildren that today, Canada has recognized the culture of peoples."

Chief Martel noted that this recognition "is huge," setting in place the fundamental principle that "people's cultural identities matter."

Chief Martel said that she sees the establishment of the foundation as the most important portion of the settlement, as it is "the surety to our future generations" that this kind of thing will "never, ever allow this to happen in Canada again."

Chief Martel noted that the process of reconciliation is far from over, but that the settlement agreement is another step in the right direction.

"Canada is a new place, a new place today," said Chief Martel. "What a

...continued from page 6 properties. Assessments have increased 30 percent for the past four years while residential increases are minimal or have decreased. The OFA Service Representative for Manitoulin and the North Shore, Neil Tarlton, spoke of how farm property is bearing a far larger percent of the tax burden in municipalities. asked by The Expositor if meetings had been held in Central Manitoulin with the mayor and council he replied in the affirmative but acknowledged that little progress had been What farmers would like to see is that residential taxes go up a small amount and farm taxes come down and that would receive the same tax dollars, he said. Mr. Tarlton also outlined the way to appeal taxes on farm property by going to the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation at MPAC.ca to submit a Request for Reconsideration (RfR) and also to visit aboutmyfarm.ca to see how your property was assessed and to compare it to others in your area.

Elections were held at this meeting starting with directors for the Manitoulin North Shore Federation of Agriculture being Nathaniel Wood, Steve Mailloux and Sandy Yore.

But amidst the accolades, not all were quite as ebullient

"On behalf of the Chiefs of Ontario, I congratulate Chief Marcia Brown Martel, who was the lead plaintiff in this long and painful journey towards justice on behalf of the estimated 20,000 Sixties Scoop survivors," said Chiefs of Ontario Grand Chief in Isadore Day "While announcement. today is a major victory, no amount of money can truly compensate for being taken away from your family as a child."

Wiikwemkoong band member and Sixties Scoop survivor Gloria Eshkibok woke up to the news on Friday and her initial response to the news was "grateful, happy Thanksgiving," but she noted she was "still taking it all in, I am listening to the CBC news on the radio about it. I am seeing on the Sixties Scoop page comments that some people are not satisfied. I'm still taking it in."

She said that she understands the frustration being expressed by those who feel shortchanged in the settlement, pointing to the way the legal system in Canada is one "where we are set up to lose" and that the bitterness caused by the government's tactics in court and the process of a cultural genocide still reverberates in Canadian society. "We cannot be sureties for each other, and a lot of us have had criminal charges," she said. "We are not criminals." Healing historic wrongs will not happen overnight or be completely wiped by any sum of money, Ms. Eshkibok observed.

"After having to take the fight to the Supreme Court, what does \$50,000 do to repair the impact," agreed Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee, himself a Sixties Scoop survivor. "No family has not been impacted, directly or indirectly. Action is more important than words."

Grand Council Chief Madahbee said that, although there has been an apology by the Children's Aid Society, "going forward there are still a number of issues."

Grand Council Chief Madahbee said it was incumbent upon the federal and provincial governments to provide more than words. "I think they still have to prove themselves," he said.

When it comes to individual impacts, the settlement details indicate that if there are more than 20,000 claimants, each will receive a payout of \$25,000 but if there are fewer than 20,000 each claimant will receive up to a maximum of \$50,000. In the earlier residential school settlement, the number of applicants far outstripped the government's initial estimates.

The government is putting aside an additional \$75 million for legal fees and Minister Bennett said the government has secured a commitment from lawyers that they wouldn't go back to survivors demanding more money, thus avoiding what happened in the Indian residential school settlement where many students faced huge legal bills from their lawyers after receiving compensation.

This settlement follows on a decision in February by an Ontario Superior Court judge who found that the federal government failed to prevent onreserve children from losing their Indigenous identity after they were forcibly taken from their homes in the Sixties Scoop. That decision was the culmination of an eight-year court battle. This settlement is expect-

This settlement is expected to end 18 related active lawsuits across Canada. The class-action suit had originally sought \$1.3 billion on behalf of 16,000 Indigenous survivors in Ontario alone.

Chief Martel said this is not the end of the process but rather a "plateau," noting that "there is still much more healing to do."

50 Million Tree Program offers site visits to landowners

MANITOULIN—Want to see more wildlife on your land? Since 2007, Forests Ontario has been helping landowners to attract more "nature" to their land with the 50 Million Tree Program. Over the life of this program, more than 22 million trees have been planted on private land, and most landowners have cited the attraction of wildlife as their prime reason for signing up with the program. Landowners with a minimum of 2.5 acres (one hectare) of plantable land may be eligible for this generous tree planting incentive program.

"Many trees provide pollen and nectar for bees and other pollinators early in the spring before fruit trees and plants flower," says Forests Ontario Green Leader, Karin Tomosky. "Adding trees to my land was beneficial for my

bees, and trees are also important because they provide homes for nesting birds and animals"

Animals large and small can benefit from the presence of trees, which provide a potential food source, as well as protection from predators and severe weather. As well, forested riparian (shoreline) areas are important for their combination of improving water quality, reducing streambank erosion and providing cover to a host of land and aquatic creatures

Through the 50 Million Tree Program, landowners are able to access funding support of up to 75 percent of total $\frac{1}{2}$

planting costs as well as ongoing forest management assistance. A local planting partner, an experienced forestry professional, will work with you to create a plan that suits your property's unique needs and help improve the value of your land.

Fall is prime time for the planting partners to visit landowners to evaluate their properties for the 50 Million Tree Program. Interested landowners should act now to set up a site visit. This allows time for site preparation before trees are planted in the spring.

control over the delivery of educational programs and services and how to best allocate education funding.

After the ANEA takes effect, certain provisions of the Indian Act that deal with education will no longer apply to the 23 PFNs. The decision-making power over education will rest in the hands of the First Nations under the AES. The ANEA sets out a process for other Anishinabek First Nations and other First Nations in Ontario to join the AES in the future should they choose to do so.

In moving forward with the ANEA with Canada, the 23 PFNs chose to be a party to the complementary Master Education Agreement (MEA) with Ontario. The provincial agreement creates a new relationship between the Anishinabek First Nations and Ontario that supports Anishinabek student success and wellbeing in the AES and the provincially-funded education system.

The ANEA with Canada and the MEA with Ontario were signed by the respective parties at an historic signing ceremony on August 16, 2017.

M'CHIGEENG—The

Anishinaabe interpretation of the four stages of life was the focus of a September 26 presentation at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF) in M'Chigeeng.

Elder Josh Eshkawkogan of the Thunderbird clan and Keeper of the Medicines was the guest speaker and the topic was 'the four stages of life.' The event was held in the healing room at the OCF complete with fire and tobacco for people to put on it to honour not only the teaching, but also the fire.

Mr. Eshkawkogan began his talk by saying the topic was about life itself, the four hills of life and how we came to be who we are.

"The first stage was very enjoyable," Mr. Eshkawkogan said, "the first contact of our parents. We have so much joy in our mother's womb. In the early days, a woman who was carrying was treated very well and she was very active. And our first contact was at nine months and the most important thing was love."

The first six months," Mr. Eshkawkogan went on to say, "is reaction to noise. The parents keep the children to themselves. That stage is very important and can be difficult for some children. And the first two vears are very important for the family to be close to the child. The first two years are about learning and showing the child how much they are loved and we have to understand our

responsibilities. There are a lot of single moms and fathers so the constraints are already there. The child has to have a sense of identity." To this end, there is a naming ceremony for children and the name is based on what was happening the day they were born. Perhaps it rained or the elder doing the naming was near a lake or river and such. Many times the young boys would receive names of animals and plants. The naming ceremony also makes sure that the Great Spirit will recognize the person when they pass on. It is very important that the child understands the purpose of this rite.'

This stage of life means there is a lot of care needed. "This is where the uncles and aunties come in," Mr. Eshkawkogan explained. "To connect with the child with respect. It is very important for the extended family to give that respect to the child. It is all about

photo by Betty Bardswich teachings so the child understands. It is very important at this first hill to tell children they are

loved.' Mr. Eshkawkogan then moved on to stage two in a person's life, saying that there are challenges to what is in front of the children. "They are moving into a different type of school and we have to be very cautious about the environment the child is entering," he noted. "There is alcohol and drug abuse at this stage. Things have drastically changed. We have to be like a deer, always looking and knowing what is going on around them. There are more people falling down at this second hill. We have to teach our young men and women about responsibility. We have to go back in our teachings about respect and honour. Young women have to have respect for themselves. We need more dialogue. Kids need to understand that they have people

lot of confused kids. Sixteen-year-old fathers and fourteen-year-old pregnant girls. You have to be very conscious of what is going on in those children's mind."


The third hill or stage in life is adulthood and Mr. Eshkawkogan started by saying that there is too much free will at this point and people don't know what is right or wrong. This part of life, from age 18 to 45 is the most difficult as there are so many temptations and disconnections. "It is very important to know how to meet the challenges. For example, the Missing and Murdered Women. There is some reason why they left home, why they left the community. And at age 25 there are still some people living with their parents, there are drugs and alcohol and a lack of motivation. Things are changing so fast we have to know how to adapt. There are young people today who don't know where are going. Some adults may take a longer time than others to figure out what they want to do and will try different careers. It is very important for those in adulthood to gather all they can about life. What is life? What is it all about?"

The fourth hill is not as steep as the first hill. This is a time for a person to learn about his culture and if a teaching doesn't work for you to pass on it. Mr. Eshkawkogan then asked become an elder? I only perceive myself as a teacher. It is how they perceive me in what I do. For a person in hardship, it is good to know that there is someone to go to for advice, for help. I always make sure that someone is there to help them. And the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. We don't even know what we should be called? Anishinabek? First Nation? Indigenous? How do we move forward? Colonialism and dictatorship. We have to look beyond that. We need to have an open mind. We can talk about reconcili-

forward. With the prayer, 'Help me to let go of those things I don't need.' And don't wait to be asked to do something. Just do it.

Mr. Eshkawkogan is one of many speakers at the OCF every Tuesday. Upcoming events, starting October 3 include women's bundle teachings, a Sisters in Spirit gathering and men's bundle teachings. Workshops at the OCF include beaded Pride rings, leather roses, introduction to clay, moccasin making, quill wrapping and gauntlet making.



...continued from page 15 acting, improv, beading and painting during my internship with Debaj," Mr. Corbiere told The Expositor. "It has been a great experience. For this project, I wanted to paint and I represented each of the Four Kingdoms with separate paintings and then did a final piece incorporating them all.'

"When all Four Kingdoms reside with each other, it gives us the beauty we

see every day," he noted. "The Four Kingdoms is creation, and us as humans, one of our greatest gifts is to enjoy creation."

Sheila Trudeau, also from Wiikwemkoong, explored teachings she had learned from Debaj and the heritage of her family, going back generations, through a land-based interactive piece.

"I originally envisioned a painting," she shared. "The women (made of hay) repback generations and are connected through a cord representing an umbilical cord. What happened going back generations has a ripple effect and effected my grandfather (a carved statue of a woman made by Ms. Trudeau's grandfather) and today's generation."

At the centre of the connected statues is a house with a mat. Ms. Trudeau lifted the mat and used a broom to swept words laid on the ground under the mat, representing intergenerational traumas, which have been "swept under the

resent my family going rug" by society. A bucket of water symbolically pours water onto the words under the mat, washing away negative elements in hopes of a positive change.

> "The water represents positive aspects such as art, talking, sharing and forgiveness which will lead to healing and help us move forward," said Mr. Trudeau.

> Kady Peltier attempted to create a "tranquil space" with her installation. Leaves cascade from the ceiling as a projection of the Four Kingdoms plays in the background and a small fountain brings forth the

sound of serenity.

"I wanted to create a calm space where people could relax and reflect on nature and the Four Kingdoms,' said Ms. Peltier.

Dance Machine was set up throughout the festival with artist Lee Su-Feh encouraging the interactive exploration of the kinetic sculpture that can be transformed into multiple configurations by the actions and movements of the bodies within it. Created out of 64 pieces of bamboo suspended from a central copper disk, batteryopera.com notes the sculpture "can be

moved independently by artists and audience members to create an immersive experience."

'We invite people to explore and engage with the piece and each other," said Ms. Lee Su-Feh.
