

Three new faces to lead Manitoulin Island councils

MANITOULIN—The results are in: Manitoulin residents have elected a blend of new and incumbent representation, combining the steady hand of experience with the fresh ideas of a newlyminted councillor. The Island has three new heads of council in the townships of Assiginack, Billings and Tehkummah, and the mix of incumbent and new councillors is perfectly split at 24 each.

Assiginack

An upset occurred in the Township of Assiginack as former

reeve Dave Ham defeated incumbent Paul Moffat and three other candidates to take the seat at the head of the council table.

"Well I am flabbergasted," admitted the newly-elected Assiginack mayor when contacted by The Expositor with the election results. "I haven't heard what the results were yet," said Mr. Ham. "I really didn't have an idea what to expect with five different people running."

Mr. Ham is no novice to the political field, having previously served as both reeve and council-

He said that his priority would be to improve the quality of life in Assiginack. "We have to make Assiginack a better place to be," he said. "In my opinion the situation here has deteriorated in the last few years. We really have to bring it around."

In the end Mr. Ham won the mayor seat by a landslide, taking 329 votes. The other candidates received: Rodney Deforge 49 votes, incumbent Paul Moffat 143 votes,

Thursday meeting will determine Old School committee's prospects

Central residents urged to attend

MINDEMOYA—The regularly scheduled Mindemoya Old School Repurposing Committee (MOSRC) meeting was held on October 22 at the community hall. A standout feature at this session was a rebuttal from one member to the claims put forth by some council members concerning the extension of the committee's mandate to find new life for the building.

Some members of council and other community members have made their views clear in that they do not support any work being done on the school building and indeed, believe that it should be

Councillor Derek Stephens, while acknowledging a need for activities for seniors, has said, "Not in this building." Councillors Pat MacDonald and Ted Taylor have also spoken against the repurposing of the old school as well as Councillor Dale Scott who had also told council that there is interest in Central Manitoulin instead for a new complex with an arena, sports area and community hall. He did, however, vote in favour of extending the mandate at the recent finance/economic development committee meeting where the mandate extension was narrowly approved. The motion will now go to council for a yay or nay for the extended mandate at the October 25 meeting in council chambers.

MOSRC member Sam Bondi came fully prepared to rebut the claims put forth by council members concerning the extension of the mandate, starting with the criticism of the terms of reference for FedNor.

OWEN SOUND—With the 2018 sailing season now drawn to a close, the Owen Sound Transportation Company (OSTC) has compiled statistics for this year's runs of the Chi-Cheemaun ferry.

A total of 79,144 vehicles travelled on the Chi-Cheemaun between Tobermory and South Baymouth this year. In 2017 that number was 80,786, meaning a

decrease of 1,642 vehicles or just over a two percent reduction. The 2018 car count is close to the amount the ferry carried in 2016, which was 79,191.

The passenger count for 2018 capped at 199,896, or 3.3 percent less than 2017's 206,718 passengers. That equates to a difference of 6,822 passengers. The number of passengers in 2015 was 185,712 and in 2016 it rose to 203,174 pas-

Manor asset management plan supplied to Island municipalities

No immediate concerns for the facility's infrastructure

LITTLE CURRENT—The board of the Manitoulin Centennial Manor had the opportunity to review its much-anticipated engineer's report during its last monthly meeting October 18.

It was this report Island municipal representatives were hoping to see during a special meeting hosted by the board late last month, but had not been received from Extendicare engineers by that time. Extendicare is the company that manages the municipally-owned long-term care facility.

Keith Clement, Extendicare senior administrator, walked the board through the report by Extendicare's Director of Engineering, Daniel Woods.

"The home appears to be in good condition with few reasons for concern," Mr. Woods begins. "There have been some notable improvements and there are

some areas that should be considered for upgrade over the next few years."

Mr. Woods noted the new heating and cooling system, call-bell system and new ventilation equipment as major improvements that Manor has seen in

recent years. "There is some equipment that is old, but well maintained and operating well," the engineer continued. "There is no reason to suspect that this equipment will fail over the next 10 years, but there is a risk that changes to government regulations may require that it be replaced or upgraded to meet changing regulations." Mr. Woods lists those items as: the underground fuel storage tank; the 1967 Otis elevator; the 1967 Onan propane-fired generator; and the 1970s-era oil-fired boilers (that are in good condition, he noted). ...continued on page 11

A municipal council is only as good as its citizens

The dust has settled and the ballots counted in the Ontario municipal election 2018 and (hopefully) the people have spoken clearly in electing the chosen few who will guide our municipal governments forward through the next four years.

The future promises to be challenging, with a new government settled into Queen's Park sharpening its axe and eyeing up government spending, and captains steering the Island ships of state will need to be nimble if they are going to avoid the shoals. Most experienced council members have voiced concerns about the potential downloading onto municipal coffers those cuts are likely to entail. "We've been down this road before" being a common refrain.

Time in that regard will tell.

But today is a new day, and many municipal mayors, reeves and councillors will be taking their seats around council tables in a few short weeks, ready to roll up their sleeves and meet the challenges ahead.

It is not an easy thing to put yourself forward as a candidate, to offer your heart and soul on the altar of public service, so each and every one of those citizens who did step up to the job deserve our admiration and gratitude, even the ones with whom an individual elector does not agree with, or particularly like, and especially those who did not make the final cut.

Going forward, those candidates who were elected to their positions still need our support. There are decisions to be made in the coming years, some of which will be difficult and quite possibly unpopular. It is important that we recognize that the vast majority of those who have put their names forward do so with the very best of intentions and keep that fact foremost in our minds.

It is important that we engage with our elected officials. There is an old saying that "if you don't vote, you can't complain." But even if you do vote, remember that the people that have been elected are human beings and that they deserve to be treated with respect (even

those you did not personally vote for). More so, they will need your help and support to do the best job possible.

A mayor, reeve or council member is just one person, a human being who likely (but not necessarily) comes with one set of eyes and one pair of ears with which to see and hear the community around them. If you have an opinion on an issue facing your municipality, express that opinion, politely, to your elected representative. Your point of view may be valid, but it also may not have occurred to that elected official that a course of action would have the impact it does on their constituent. Let them know your concerns.

The recent outpouring of vitriol that social media seems to be encouraging and amplifying in this oh-so-digital age does little good, and too often much harm. Let us move forward in our communities with a positive attitude and an eye to building bridges and better lives for every one of our neighbours.

For those candidates who put their names forward and were not chosen, do not despair. Politics can be a brutal environment, but you can hold your head high for you are among those very few individuals who are actively trying to make your community a better place. Do not stop trying.

As for those who now sit on the municipal hot seat, use your senses (and sense) to weigh the merits of the decisions that lie before you through the lens of what is best for your entire community. Too often politicians only use the weight of political gain when deciding how to proceed, making what they know to be bad decisions because they know it will be popular with some segment of their friends.

Integrity, transparency and accountability are everyone's catchphrases, but strive to take those virtues beyond mere electoral platitudes and weave them into the very fabric of your service.

Remember that our national constitution is based on peace, order and good government, and let that be your guide for the next four years.

A clarification on the Norisle suit

If the township had not withdrawn their support the Norisle would be in Purvis's shipyard

To the Expositor:

The legal case between the Township of Assignack and the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society never did go to court for a ruling. Two weeks prior to going to court, the Township of Assignack approached the Society offering to settle, drop their counter claims and provide a cash reimbursement to the Society. Just prior to the Township's offer to settle, the Society learned of a ruling by the Supreme Court that courts cannot challenge the policy decisions or actions of a municipal council regardless of its resulting impact. Based on the Supreme Court decision, the Society agreed to accept the Township's offer to settle. Regrettably, the Township's mayor and supporting council members' actions of November 2015 to withdraw their support and not sign any grant applications resulted in the termination of the Norisle's restorations

project. The Society had been invited to apply for a number of multimillion dollar heritage grants that were made available by both federal and provincial governments to celebrate Canada's 150th birthday in 2017. If the Township had not withdrawn their support, the Norisle would be in Purvis's shipyard in Sault Ste. Marie and over half of the restoration work would have been completed by now. Also, the Township would not have needed to spend \$250,000 in Toronto lawyer's fees to defend their November 2015 decision to withdraw their support for the Norisle restoration project.

The Ford giveth and the Ford taketh away

To the Expositor:

Doug Ford campaigned on a promise to put money back into the pockets of hard working Ontarians. To prove it, he recently announced cutting the carbon tax on natural gas which should reduce home heating bills by \$80 per year. For the millions of Ontarians in urban areas, that's a bonus because they're on the natural gas grid. For hundreds of thousands of Ontarians in remote, rural and Indigenous areas whose heating options don't include inexpensive natural gas, it will be another cold winter of high fuel bills for expensive fossil fuels, or overpriced electricity.

For all of the electricity folly of successive Liberal governments, the Wynne Liberals did offer a glimmer of hope by announcing four community heating pilot projects through the GreenOn program. But GreenOn dollars came from cap and trade. Mr. Trudeau pushed cap and trade. Mr. Ford did not. GreenOn projects were dealt a death blow. The promising light for rural, remote and Indigenous communities was extinguished in the middle of a battle of The baby is nowhere to be found

The four GreenOn pilot projects would help homeowners to lower heating costs by assisting in the acquisition of safe, energy efficient, biomass burning appliances. This would also generate employment in the forest sector where many of these residents live. It would address the concerns about tragic deaths in remote Indigenous communities as a result of needless house fires. It would rejuvenate a lagging forest industry.

These four pilot projects, in Wawa, Sioux Lookout, Wikwemikoong and remote far north communities, partially funded and implemented, had success written all over them, and would have proven to be a made-in-Ontario answer to high heating costs in areas where inexpensive, biomass green energy is plentiful. These projects would have been held up as guiding standards for homeowners and communities in Ontario from Kitchener to Kanata, and from the Kawarthas to Kenora, to Kasabonika.

Throughout Europe governments develop efficient, green energy projects to generate combined heat and pow-

er to heat homes, drive industry and to reduce polluting carbon emissions. And in many cases, ironically, the biomass fuels to sustain these projects comes from Canada. Even U.S. states like Vermont and New Hampshire are way greener than Ontario in terms of biomass usage and government-led initiatives.

Maybe Greg Rickford, minister of Energy, Mines and Northern Development and minister of Indigenous Affairs and Jeff Yurek, minister of Natural Resources and Forestry, could remind Mr. Ford that there are hundreds of thousands of hard working Ontarians in rural, remote and Indigenous communities who would like to keep their hard-earned dollars. They just want to be able to heat their homes, keep the lights on and put food on the table. Ask the premier again how he planned to put those hard earned dollars back into their pockets.

Concerns raised over possibility of breast screening clinic closure

I am writing to express my concern over the possibility the breast screening assessment clinic in Sudbury may be

I am a breast cancer survivor and want you to know that I have nothing but the highest regard and respect for Dr. Brule and the other members in her team. It is thanks to her that I am living a healthy life today.

Having had breast cancer and the surgery that accompanies it, I have experienced the stress and the fear that accompanies it. I just can not believe you would think of doing anything to add to the trauma women are already experiencing. Are women's lives worth so little that you can put a price tag on them? Putting women's health at risk to cut the budget by \$270,000 is a huge mistake. There must be many other areas where cuts to the budget could be made without affecting the lives of so many people. Perhaps the cost of the administration should be re-exam-

They have such an excellent team of doctors in Sudbury, you should be doing everything possible to make things better for them rather than increasing their workload to the point of possibly losing them. These doctors are so

important to the women of this area. Please think seriously about what you are doing to them and the women of the North. This is a small savings when compared to the life of one woman, especially a young woman whose family would be devastated without her.

I sincerely hope you will reconsider your decision. This is not a saving, this is a serious mistake that will have devastating repercussions for the women of Northern Ontario.

Two options for lowering power costs in Ontario

A case for the condemnation of socialism

To the Expositor:

The October 4, 2018 edition of the Financial Post featured an article dealing with the issue of the high cost of electrical power in Ontario. The piece was written by Fraser Institute stalwarts Ross McKitrick, Elmira Aliakbari and Ashley Stedman. As the evidence and conclusions presented reflect well on the case made some weeks ago, it might be interesting to summarize the work.

Anyone paying electrical bills in the province will probably be familiar with the term global adjustment (GA). The Green Energy Act provides long term price guarantees at above market rates to renewable power generators. To fund these subsidized contracts Ontario attached an extra charge to the GA. Power prices have soared since 2009, not because power costs more to generate but because the GA has risen dramatically. Between 2008 and 2017, the GA grew from less that one cent per kilowatthour to about ten cents, accounting for the entire increase in Ontario electricity costs over that time. It is clear that the key to lowering power prices in Ontario is to reduce

The largest component of the GA funds subsidies paid to renewable energy sources (predominantly wind and solar) yet these sources provide only seven percent of Ontario's power. Mr. McKitrick and his associates have calculated that reducing the GA could bring down electrical power costs in the province approximately 24 percent. The logical step is to use legislative power to cancel the feed-in tariff subsidies.

Of course that would be the logical option. There are others, one of which has been supported in a number of submissions by others to this newspaper. I write of course about the Naomi Klein option. How would that all work and do we have any evidence as to the effectiveness of Klein economics?

To quote from an article written by James Kirchick in the LA Times, "In the form of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, the world has a petri dish in which to judge the sort of policies endorsed by Klein and others."

As Hugo Chavez came to power in Venezuela, Ms. Klein became a stout supporter of his economic policies. In 2004 she signed a petition headlined, 'We would vote for Hugo Chavez.' Three years later, she lauded Venezuela as a place where "citizens had renewed their faith in the power of democracy to improve their lives." In her 2007 book, 'The Shock Doctrine,' she portrayed capitalism as a sort of global conspiracy that instigates financial crises and exploits poor countries in the wake of natural disasters. Ms. Klein declared that Venezuela had been rendered immune to the "shocks" administered by free market fundamentalists thanks to Chavez's 21st Century Socialism, "which has created a zone of relative economic calm and

Here is a very brief summary of the conditions that exist in Venezuela today. Approximately 2.4 million people have voted with their feet and left the country since 2014. Colombia, Spain and the USA have received the majority of the economic refugees. I listened recently to a documentary looking at medical conditions. The hospitals have run out of drugs including antibiotics. Spare parts for hospital equipment are not available so items such as incubators and monitors are no longer functional. Even if they were, power cuts and the lack of running water makes things very difficult for the medical staff. Infant mortality

has increased by 30 percent and maternal mortality by 66 percent. Moving to the economics, GDP is expected to contract this year by 15 percent. The third straight year that the economy has contracted by double digits. Inflation in 2015 was 112 percent, last year it was 2,400 percent and by the end of this year predictions are that it will exceed a million percent. One interesting stat that I noticed indicated that the average person in the country has lost 17 pounds. Market shelving is bare. There is little food available. There are no stray dogs on the streets of Caracas. The same for cats and rats!

To return to James Kirchick, "The tragedy of Venezuela is the predictable result of what happens when a strongman wages, in Chavez's own words, 'economic war on the bourgeoisie owners,' cracks down on the media, prints money with reckless abandon and implements all manner of harebrained socialist schemes.'

Ms. Klein retweeted the following about Chavez following his death, "Yes, the Venezuelan president could be a strongman. But he leaves behind what might be called the most democratic country in the Western Hemisphere." Perhaps her version of democratic is how the term "democratic socialism" came to be. If there ever was an adulteration of epic proportions in the use of the work democratic, this has to be it! Socialism is exactly that, no amount of sugar coating will change the doctrine. The body count at the end of the twentieth century attributed to socialism was in the order of 100 million. The count continues.

New OCF program takes the stress out of learning Anishinabemowin

M'CHIGEENG—Trying to learn a language can be stressful, as formal classes, tests and questionnaires place a structured formality on the process. But a new lunchtime program at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF) in M'Chigeeng takes a completely different approach to learning Anishinaabemowin (Ojibwe), aiming to de-stress the experience with a formal and friendly atmosphere.

"Every Monday we have a language lunch," said OCF executive director Anong Beam. "A lot of places offered structured classes, this isn't about replacing that. Instead, what we are doing is in support of that."

By gathering in an informal and social setting, participants can discover the joys of communicating in the language most closely connected to the land. Not only are the lunchtime sessions free, lunch is also provided.

"It is a nutritious lunch too," said Ms. Beam.
"The concept is to rebuild the language structure by doing activities," she said. One of the more natural and common denominating activi-

ties is eating. "This allows people to experience

the language in a natural way."

Unlike structured lessons, the Anishinaabemowin lunch doesn't follow a structured lesson plan. "There are no handouts," said Ms. Beam. "You hear someone tell a joke in the language and everybody laughs."

But don't think that you will find yourself isolated when you attend the lunches, surrounded by people speaking in a language you only have a tangential familiarity (if any) with. "Not everything is in Ojibwe," said Ms. Beam. "There will be some explanation in English."

Over time, participants will begin to build the language memory. Much like muscle memory plays a critical role in the way a musician learns to play the piano, guitar or violin, or a craftsman develops their trade, the brain itself is a muscle in that repeated exposure and practice helps to make connections that foster greater understanding and fluency.

"When you see someone enjoying soup and they say 'gwetaamih minwaagamin' (really delicious) you pick it up on a different level," she

The language lunch program is completely free, although a freewill offering to help support the program is gratefully accepted it is not necessary. "It is open to younger and older people, those who have a bit of the language and want to increase their fluency or those who are completely new to the language," said Ms. Beam.

The Ojibwe Cultural Foundation is located in M'Chigeeng at Highway 551 (near the intersection with Highway 540).

WIIKWEMKOONG—The 46th running of the Wiky Road Race, the 10km championship for runners, walkers and Nordic pole walkers took place this past weekend in temperatures barely above zero, making for quite a chilly event.

After the race, lunch was served followed by a small awards ceremony, emceed by long time race organizer and supporter Henry Hoy. Awards were handed out to top race finishers as well as top finishers in each age category.

Aurel Fox, 24, of Wiikwemkoong was the top male finisher, finishing the 10 km course in a personal best time of 39:06 to earn the Expositor Trophy for top male finisher.

The Wikwemikong Board of Education Trophy for top female finisher was again awarded to 2017 winner 26-year-old Michelle Kennedy, who came back to reclaim her title in 45:09.

Fifteen-year-old Sierra Pangowish, who was the 2017 top high school female finisher, finished the course in 48:15 to again claim the top high school female finisher award.

Patrick Beaudry, with a finish time of 56:41, earned the top high school male finisher award.

Community Health Worker and first time Wiky Road Race organizer, Courtney Wassegijig, said she was pleased with the event and all the support that she received "especially from volunteers and staff members." She added that the race is "probably one of the longest running races in Northern Ontario" and hopes that runners and walkers alike continue to come out annually to participate in the event.

Ms. Kennedy, who was grateful that the weather was a little kinder than last year, says that the Wiky

Road Race is her "favourite race because the course itself has a downhill that just keeps going and going and never goes back up, there's food afterwards, it's only \$20 and everyone is so nice." She looks forward to returning in 2019 to reclaim her title for the hat trick.

Mr. Fox, who has run the race three times and is a first-time winner, was pleased with his results and described his race as "fantastic – a little bit cold and windy but still a good show." He said that he "enjoyed the fast and scenic course" and is looking forward to returning next year.





In council results, four councillors will be taking a seat at the 2018 council table: Christianna Jones with 389 votes, Rob Maguire with 466 votes, Dave McDowell with 347 votes and incumbent Hugh Moggy with 425 votes. Runners up were Keith Harfield with 129 votes, Jennifer Hooper with 315 votes, Bill Lafleur with 114 votes, Joyce O'Connor with 316 votes and Tom Pudas with 120 votes.

Billings

Ian Anderson earned a wide victory in Billings Township, scoring 399 votes compared to his competitors Barb Erskine and Margaret Tuomi, both tied at 203 votes.

"It's been a long campaign," said Mr. Anderson.
"I'm happy to have it over with and certainly pleased with the results."

Sharon Incumbent Alkenbrack will stay on council after earning 479 votes. Joining her at the table is Bryan Barker with 543 votes, Michael Hunt with 448 votes and Sharon Jackson with 469 votes. Michael Hunt is the son of outgoing mayor Aus Hunt, Canada's longest-serving politician. The elder Mr. Hunt spent 65 years in public office and will be retiring at age 92 upon the change of council.

Mr. Anderson said that with only one returning councillor, the learning curve will be steep. However, he added, everyone with whom he had spoken seemed eager to "get down to business."

"I'm sure that all the council and myself will make every effort to bring ourselves totally up to speed on all the issues and we'll set about prioritizing what needs to be dealt with first," said Mr. Anderson.

"I must congratulate all the folks that took the time, effort and expense to run for public office," he said. "Billings was so fortunate to have a really good slate of candidates."

Burpee Mills

Burpee and Mills will see Reeve Ken Noland at the helm for another term with his council of fellow incumbents Wayne Lloyd Bailey, Arthur Hayden and Pentti Pallonen. New to the Burpee and Mills council table for 2018 is Martin Ainslie.

Central Manitoulin

The Municipality of Central Manitoulin had a very tight race. In Ward 1 — Campbell, Angela Johnston and Derek Stephens tied with 180 votes each, earning each of them a seat on council. David Gilchrist received 112 votes, not enough to secure a seat.

The Ward 2 — Carnarvon race was even closer. Dale Scott and John Bisaillon earned their seats with 412 and 324 votes respectively. Steve Shaffer missed his seat by only two votes; his final tally was 322.

Mayor Richard Stephens and Ward 3 (Sandfield) councillor Linda Farquhar were both acclaimed to their positions. Ms. Farquhar is the only councillor for the two seats of Ward 3. A councillor will be appointed to the vacancy early into the new term of council.

Cockburn Island

Cockburn Island's council has also been acclaimed with Brenda Jones serving as mayor and Robert Brown, Glen Cressman, Evan Papineau and Scott Stewart serving as councillors.

Gore Bay

In Gore Bay, businessman Dan Osborne, a councillor on past terms of council, has been acclaimed as mayor. His council is made up of Kevin Woestenenk (incumbent), Aaron Wright, Paulie Nodecker, Patricia Bailey, Leanne Woestenenk and Ken Blodgett (incumbent), all acclaimed.

Gordon/Barrie Island

Gordon-Barrie Island's council was also acclaimed with incumbent Reeve Lee Hayden remaining in office. Reeve Hayden's council is as follows: John Turner, Marian Hester, John (Jack) Brady and Jack Bould (incumbent).

Killarney

Killarney saw some new faces elected to council, but incumbent Mayor Ginny Rook was returned to office with 274 votes to challenger Geoff Cosh's 253 votes. In Ward 1 the three elected councillors were Barbara Anne Haitse with 291 votes, incumbent Michael Reider with 265 votes and incumbent Nancy Wirtz with 262 votes. Incumbent Eileen Lewis went down to defeat with 77 votes. In Ward 2, the two elected councillors were newcomer John Dimitrijevic with 89 votes and incumbent Jim Rook with 153 votes. Incumbent Pierre Paquette was defeated garnering 55 votes.

Mayor Rook had gone to bed by the time The Expositor contacted her home following the release of the ballot count.

Northeast Town

In the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands (Northeast Town), incumbent Al MacNevin won with a majority over Melissa Peters, a councillor on this term of council.

"I'm very happy that I've managed to get re-elected," said Al MacNevin. "I've never actually run for mayor, as last election I was acclaimed."

Mayor MacNevin said he was pleased to be supported by "a good majority" of the

population.
"I'm looking forward to working with a new council," Mayor MacNevin added, "and I feel reassured that the community supports me and I am looking forward to the next four years."

Northeast Town Ward 1 candidate Laurie Cook was acclaimed while Ward 2 saw a close race between its four candidates vying for three seats at the table. Former Ontario Provincial Police constable Al Boyd saw the largest portion of votes with 412 followed by incumbent Michael Erskine and newcomer Barb Baker. Cody Leeson, the Northeast Town's youngest candidate, came in a close fourth with 319 votes.

In Ward 3, incumbent Bill Koehler came out on top with 107 votes to Sean O'Hare's 90 votes. This is a switch for Councillor Koehler, however, who spent years as a councillor for Ward 2.

Ward 4 saw an upset with Paul Skippen losing his place at the council table. The electorate favoured Jim Ferguson Jr. with 391 votes followed by incumbent Dawn Orr with 328 votes. Rounding out the rural councillors is incumbent Bruce Wood of Green Bay.

Tehkummah

In the Township of Tehkummah, David Jaggard won the reeve seat with 393 votes to challenger and outgoing councillor Ron Hierons' 97 votes. Mr. Jaggard said he welcomed the results.

"It was good to get a good percentage of the vote. I realize the people are behind me," he said.

Joining Mr. Jaggard at the council table are Rick Gordon with 263 votes, incumbent Lorie Leeson with 338 votes, incumbent Michael McKenzie with 353 votes and outgoing reeve Eric Russell with 269 votes.

"I'm very pleased with the people that were chosen and I think we're going to be able to work together well in the situation that we have. I think it'll be a good group to work with," said Mr. Jaggard.

Current councillor Paul Bowerman received a good contingent of community support, 133 votes, but walked away from this election without a council seat.

Karen Gerrard, former clerk-treasurer of Tehkummah, performed less favourably. She took home 86 votes.

Mr. Jaggard said his first priority as reeve will be to exercise better control over the township's meetings.

"That's the first thing, to get council meetings flowing more smoothly so we can get things done more quickly," he said.

Rainbow District School Board

Linda Erskine and Margaret Stringer were in competition for the trustee position. As of press time, complete results were not yet available but finalized polls provided enough evidence for The Expositor to project a victory for Margaret Stringer.

"I really appreciate the results. I have to say a big thank you to everyone who took the time to come out and vote," said Ms. Stringer. "I'm really looking forward to representing the students and parents of Manitoulin."

"I'm very pleased," she said. "I'm excited to be entrusted with this position."

The new term of council begins on December 1, 2018. Councillors and heads of council sit for a four-year term until the next municipal election.

laughed Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy (EBC) executive director Bob Barnett. The executive director did admit the largest hurdle has indeed been met. The EBC hopes to also establish a small stewardship fund to help maintain the property going forward and a few projects (such as possibly extending the parking lot) are on the radar as well. "This has been very good, excellent," said Mr. Barnett,

"This has been very good, excellent," said Mr. Barnett, noting that the final T to be crossed is the completion of the survey. "Not all of our projects have the sex appeal of the Cup and Saucer Trail (in Honora Bay) or Willisville Mountain," he admitted. "Most of the properties we secure are a lot less high profile."

Willisville Mountain was the subject of a number of paintings by Canada's famed Group of Seven, as well as providing the inspiration for countless works by less storied painters and photographers. The Cup and Saucer Trail, recently rescued by the EBC, is a premier tourism destination for the Island. Willisville Mountain was part of the property owned by mining giant Vale that included a quartzite quarry that has already consumed another small mountain.

Willisville Mountain is part of the LaCloche range that includes the oldest mountain range in the world and is home to numerous endangered and threatened species.

"So far it is excellent news," enthused Ted Cowan, a former head and board member of the EBC who has worked tirelessly alongside Mr. Barnett to raise the funds needed to secure Willisville Mountain.

The total money raised to date ranges somewhere between \$185,000 and \$195,000, noted Mr. Cowan, and the door is not closed on further donations.

Efforts have been relentless since the duo first sat down with officials from Vale to explore the possibility of EBC buying the property. "It was in November 2017 that we

kicked off the campaign," recalled Mr. Cowan. The first approach was to EBC members, an outreach that quickly raised the first \$40,000. An art sale (somewhat fittingly) at a church in Toronto raised another \$8,000, a reception and talk raised a further \$5,000. "We set up a webpage that brought in another \$63,000," said Mr. Cowan. Another \$30,000 was raised through the partnership with the Bay of Islands and McGregor Bay. "It is still bringing in a bit."

A night of music organized by Jon and Kerry Butler of Willisville also raised \$3,000. "I had never done anything like that before," admitted Mr. Cowan. "I kind of was resigned to it costing us a bit of money, but it went very well." JUNO award winning musician and conservationist Ian Tamblyn filled the Whitefish Falls community centre and donated his fees and the revenue from CD sales for the event.

Mr. Cowan noted that the most amazing coincidences and connections have come about through the fundraising for Willisville Mountain, pointing out just how many lives the mountain touches across a vast landscape.

Plans are to establish a stewardship council to oversee the mountain property that will include members of the nearby Whitefish River First Nation, which Mr. Cowan described as very supportive of the group's efforts. "We have a common interest to see the mountain preserved for future generations," he said.

"There is something magical about Willisville Mountain," agreed Mr. Barnett. "Something that touched deep inside both artists and ordinary people alike. Nobody walks away from the mountain untouched."

"The fundamental need for a feasibility study," he wrote, "is to answer those very questions raised by certain councillors. That is, is it financially feasible to repurpose the building? What type of uses might be feasible? Is there a better way to accomplish the objectives? Once a consultant has been chosen to carry out the study, a detailed discussion with the consultant must be carried out to clearly formulate the terms of reference we wish to pursue and these would be developed in light of the experience and expertise gained by the OSC (Old School Committee) thus far, guided by the expertise of the consultant and, of course, council's input. The OSC has worked long and hard to determine what some general categories of uses might be realistic and of need to the community. To terminate the OSC at this critical stage of their work, would be irresponsible and disrespectful of the work and effort of the OSC."

Mr. Bondi agreed that yes, council could just take over the FedNor grant, but questioned whether council would have the time, personpower, knowledge of the process thus far, or even the inclination to do so, and was concerned that such a move would even violate the terms of reference given to FedNor in the application. "It would make no sense," he added, "to dismiss a group of dedicated citizens who are willing to cooperate with council and work to see this project through and who have developed considerable knowledge of the community needs, the pro and cons of the facility, as well as the general process in which we are engaged."

The second item on Mr. Bondi's rebuttal list concerned claims by certain council members that the FedNor application terms of reference did not mention a seniors' centre.

"When the OSC was initially struck," Mr. Bondi said, "council did not specify in the mandate that the building was to be a seniors' centre of some kind, nor did the OSC start off with that intent. The possibility of a seniors' centre evolved as the OSC discussed, consulted and researched all kinds of possibilities. Some of these were dismissed as unrealistic, such as an assisted living facility, as the committee further researched into such uses. The possibility of a seniors' centre of some kind became more attractive and realistic as the committee learned more about the needs and desires of our community. Remember our community survey? However, the OSC did not stop there and limit repurposing to that one potential use. We wished to remain open to all feasible uses that might make the building financially selfsupporting, or close to it."

Mr. Bondi finished this

part of his rebuttal by writing in bold letters that the terms of reference in the grant application to Fed-Nor were intentionally crafted to give the committee the best chance of being approved for the grant, not to direct the eventual study in any particular direction.

The final point in the rebuttal statement concerns the matter of a hazardous materials study and insurance costs. Mr. Bondi stated that the need for the study is a non-issue as far as the work of the OSC is concerned and that such an analysis might well be necessary regardless of whether the building is renovated or demolished, so the issue of hazardous waste has no bearing on the work of the OSC.

As far as insurance costs for the Old School building are concerned, Mr. Bondi said that any potential insurance premiums would come into play only if the building is seen as being abandoned, unsupervised and prone to vandalism and or trespass. "This could be mitigated,"

he explained, "by informing the insurer that the building is, in fact, being regularly monitored, supervised and secured as they would for any community asset. Such arguments are 'red herrings' and have no merit."

Islanders are reminded that council meetings are open to the public and this important session takes place Thursday, October 25 at 7:30 pm in council chambers.

Ms. Schrempf says the two major contributing factors to the decrease are this year's high heat levels and the forest fires, particularly Parry Sound 33.

"What we find is if people in southern Ontario can't find cooler weather in Nothern Ontario, they stay home with their air conditioning turned on," she says.

Ms. Schrempf adds that the company had received a high volume of calls from people reluctant to drive up Highway 69 in case it would be closed, which did result in some new customers. However, many of the people trying to avoid the fire zone were travelling on weekends when the

ferry was already nearing capacity.

Of the 504 scheduled round-trips, 498 operated as planned. This year's service reliability figure stands at 98.8

Ms. Schrempf says three of the trips on Labour Day were cancelled due to mechanical problems, resulting in 506 vehicles and 1,304 potential passengers being lost.

The other three sailings were cancelled because of high wind conditions near the end of the sailing season, which Ms. Schrempf says left 542 vehicles and 1,571 passengers off the service.

Moving forward, OSTC will continue to promote its spe-

cialty cruises, such as the dinner cruises and its A Month of Sundays on-board entertainment during Sunday afternoon trips in July

"We added two additional dinner cruises this past season and we will maintain those for next year," says Ms. Schrempf, adding that the possibilities for new events are limited based on space and time. She says OSTC will begin promoting next year's artists as soon as they are finalized.

"We will hopefully regain what we lost this year, and possibly add another percentage to that (next year)," says Ms. Schrempf.

Mr. Woods goes on to list other items the Manor will eventually have to replace, but notes time and again the good shape the home's infrastructure is in, considering its

Included in the report is a list of 24 items for upgrade and a cost projection for the replacement or repair of those items. As an example, the Manor board can expect to replace bathroom flooring and drains in 2021 at a cost of \$3,000 and again in 2027 for another \$3,000. Another example is window replacement at a cost of \$6,800 yearly from 2019 to 2028 for a total of \$68,000.

Mr. Clement was quick to point out to the board that the items (and their projected costs) in the 'asset management plan' as asked for by the municipalities should not go above and beyond the annual municipal budget, meaning the board should not be required to go to the municipalities for a further ask beyond their annual contribution.

'The deficiencies are not that bad and in some cases, actually doable within the budget," he said. "We're not saying there may not be some items you'll have to go to the municipalities for, but most should fall into the normal operating budget.

As an example, Michelle Bond, Manor administrator, reminded the board that the Manor had applied to Trillium for a grant to replace the facility's aging windows, which would strike that from the budget completely.

It was also noted that flooring, which is listed on the asset management plan, does not factor in the current fundraising campaign to replace all the Manor's carpet with non-slip flooring.

"It's a guideline; it's a roadmap," Mr. Clement said. "It's an estimate based on what he saw, and not all the information that we have."

Gore Bay Manor representative Bill Baker brought up the West End municipalities' suggestion of seeking a loan for big expenditures rather than going to the municipalities with hat in hand.

Fundraising chair and board member Wendy Gauthier spoke to the many mentions the well-maintained equipment the Manor received in the report, saying it was a testament to the care taken by staff.

Manor board chair Paul Moffatt said the report will be viewed differently whether one is an optimist or a pes-





take that very action. In a letter from the chief and council dated October 16, 2018, the band administration outlines its current position on cannabis sales.

"In a council resolution last night, a formal letter from chief and council will be sent to the Ontario Cannabis Store (OCS) requesting that the OCS not deliver cannabis and related products to Wiikwemkoong until further notice," it states.

For Wiikwemkoong residents who want to order cannabis through the legal Ontario store, they will need to access their products off-reserve.

"Council encourages everyone to know the facts and health risks associated with recreational cannabis before making a decision on its use," the letter states, before adding that the administration and partner agencies will distribute information surrounding its future policies to the community.

Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier did not respond to requests for comment by press time.

Although the moratorium applies to deliveries from the OCS website, it includes a note that council may consider a physical retail outlet in the future.

First Nations do not have a deadline before which they must decide whether to permit or restrict physical storefronts. The first stores are expected to open as early as April 1, 2019.

In Whitefish River First Nation (WRFN), physical cannabis stores are banned until further notice, a decision made after a community member announced plans to open a store but had not consulted council.

Ogimaa Shining Turtle says he and council have not placed any restrictions on shipments from OCS. The First Nation can officially apply to the government to ban cannabis retail outlets, but Ogimaa Shining Turtle stresses that WRFN will not be taking any action on government regulations until the community can gather



the facts they need to make an informed decision.

Patsy Corbiere, Ogimaa-kwe of Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK), says her First Nation has not made a formal cannabis policy yet, adding that the decision will involve input from community members.

'We're going to be having community meetings and offering education," she says. AOK held its first forum on the issue last week and it was well-attended.

"We want to take our time on this," says Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere. "It's always been the talk within the community and we knew it was going to become legalized, but we want to take it slow and easy and better understand

Peter Nahwegahbow, AOK's capacity and resource development worker, has taken on the role of community educator about cannabis.

"Peter will be holding education sessions every two to three weeks, until a specific time when we're ready to do a referendum," says Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere.

She says a confounding factor is that the Non-Insured Health Benefits program (NIHB) provides support to "registered First Nations and recognized Inuit" for certain medical necessities. Medicinal cannabis is not covered under the program and for those who receive a prescription, Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere says there are concerns that the added costs could increase poverty within the community.

"Once they decide they're ready, we'll let everybody share their thoughts on it through a referendum," says Ogimaa-kwe Corbiere.

Other First Nations are more reserved in their outward efforts towards cannabis legalization. Bobbi-Sue, band manager of Zhiibaahaasing says council has yet to discuss its own policies and had no further comment. Sheguiandah First Nation Ogimaa Andrew Aguonie was also unable to provide comment besides his community not having a policy yet.

Sheshegwaning Ogimaa Dean Roy and M'Chigeeng Ogimaa-kwe Linda Debassige did not respond to requests for comment by press time.

The Expositor also contacted OCS to find out how many other reserves have enacted restrictions on cannabis deliveries. OCS spokesperson Daffyd Roderick said the store would be unable to provide comment by press time.

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A day in the life of a legislative page at Queen's Park

QUEEN'S PARK— Imagine having to memorize 124 MPP's ministries, ridings, names, faces and where members sit in the legislature... That's just part of what it takes to be an Ontario legislative page. On my first day at Queen's Park, my teacher asked the group of 22 pages how we were feeling. We all said, 'Nervous, scared, anxious, nauseous, stressed.' He told us we were not allowed to say any of those words again. Instead say "Excited," he told us. "Whenever you feel any of those emotions, just

Being out of my comfort zone was frightening, but I just channeled all my nerves into excitement. Living in a big city, working at Queen's Park, and making connections made the experience of being a legislative page challenging yet fulfilling.

say you are 'excited!""

I had some adjustments to make after liv-

tioning to living in the city of Toronto. I didn't even know how to order pizza! I had to worry about forgetting my keys to the apartment, which thankfully, never happened. I also learned how to use a fob, which is a small security hardware device to let me into my aunt's apartment building. Being in the city did have its perks as well. I could get bubble tea at four in the morning if I wanted, there is free wifi everywhere, and there's no pesky trees or fresh air to obstruct my view. Another advantage of living in the city was having access to public transportation. Public transit was a challenge because I'd only travelled the route to Queen's Park twice and was worried about missing my stop, getting off too early, going in the wrong direction, or getting mugged. I learned to ask for help and not panic.

Toronto was also fun. I went to the Eaton Centre, had access to a pool, saw attractions, went on a boat ride, went to a movie the-

atre, ate at a variety of restaurants and read at the Chapters. three-storev Learning to function in the city was a vital part of par-

ticipating in the program. Other than the subway, I also learned to navigate Queen's Park. The first time I had to deliver a document for an MPP was to the farthest point in Queen's Park—Whitney Block. I wasn't even sure how to get there. I learned that it was better to ask the security guards for directions than to wander around aimlessly trying to find my way. In the Legislative Chamber, it was definitely an asset to know where every MPP sat, their riding and their appearance since I had to regularly deliver official documents. I asked either my teacher Mr. G or the head of security, Mr. B. They both knew all of the answers to my questions and made my job more efficient. By the end of the program, I was very effective at all my page duties and hardly needed to ask for

The most challenging part of my day at Queen's Park was Question Period or oral questions. This part of the day was very busy because most members have to be in the Chamber for the entire hour. The pages had to continuously deliver water and documents. Pages are traditionally summoned in a surprising and rude way: by members snapping, frantically waving papers and occasionally whistling. Couldn't they just calmly raise their hands like we do in school? During oral questions, members fire rapid statements and questions, so pages need to be on their toes to collect the notes needed by the Hansard for recording. This one-hour went by very quickly, but other than that, the other eight hours were much slowerpaced. Being on the subway at 6 am for my onehour commute, and then coming home (on the late

draining but worth it.

Being in the Chamber is very different from watching the legislature on TV. Between side conversations, seeing many MPPs distracted by their phones, and little focus on the subject matter, the House reminded me of an intermediate classroom. Experiencing the legislature firsthand was certainly eyeopening.

My MPP Michael Mantha took me out to lunch during my term. We had a great meal in the dining hall and took some memorable photos. Using the time that I had with him I asked many questions. Like what he thought of the atmosphere in the Legislature. He said, "I choose to stay quiet instead of heckle, listening is the only way to learn." I think that maybe if everyone in the chamber tried to do the same, then our government could accomplish

From sitting on the dais, I can say that the Chamber wasn't always positive. Working together was not always on the members' minds. There were often jokes made to "lighten the mood," but most remarks are made at the other

once in a while there were some good lines that made it hard to keep a straight face. "Put some mustard on that bologna" is the best line I heard during my term. I find that it got the most heated when there are quick speeches because they were to the point with arguments and heckling breaking out. Those times were quickly settled when the Speaker called for order. Even though the Speaker stops yelling, the negative comments continue until a recess is called. The best

this was taking a quick break out of the chamber to cool off and calm down. The personalities seemed different when I talked to them outside the chamber and off-camera. For example, many MPPs act like they despise each other when speaking and debating, but in reality they are good friends, just with different points of view.

No matter what the circumstances or comments, the pages had to stay nonpartisan. It was a challenge for all the pages to not ...continued on page 22

looking to get started with this type of training, as well as a movement and mobility class that provides a lower-intensity workout suitable for participants of all ages.

"Our aging population has had nothing like this for them," says Ms. Graham. "We have a population of people not as active as they should be. For us to offer something from ages eight to 92 is really something."

Mr. Graham says the gym offers one-onone personal training classes. The classes cost \$30 per half-hour session, or a set of four for \$100.

The couple also offers open gym memberships at a price point that matches the town's prices for its gym. Ms. Graham says her facility can comfortably host 12 people but, if required, can hold over 20.

(The town gym) is functional and good and I'm glad we have it, but this is a more open space," she says.

Community is important for the Grahams-Ms. Graham is from Little Current and the two moved back to the Island from the Toronto area to raise their children in a safe environment.

"We want to keep it a family business and keep it local," says Mr. Graham. "We have a monthly draw for people who buy punch cards and the prize will be a gift card from a local business.

In the community mindset, the couple will be starting a kids program on November 1 for children aged eight to 13 years old. It is not designed to be a high intensity workout, but rather a way to get children to be active and focus on their speed, agility and

with and not realize they're exercising," says Ms. Graham.

Due to the expected demand, that program will be only available for pre-registration.

The couple says they cannot wait to see how their gym will grow and develop.

"I'm very, very excited for it. We've been planning for the better part of the year. It's something the community needs," says Ms.

Tehkummah Council Notes

RFQ results for winter sand and valve repairs

Interim clerk-treasurer Roy Hardy told council there had not been any quotes submitted through the request for quotations (RFQ) process for either of the above jobs. Roads superintendent Adam Bowerman began contacting companies for quotes and Mr. Hardy said the township received one offer through that process, a contract with Barrie Excavating worth \$23.73 per cubic metre of sand, plus HST.

Last year's winter sand cost \$21.68 per cubic metre, making this a 9.5 percent increase. Mr. Hardy said the price was within the budget, but just barely. Council approved the quotation and encouraged starting the process earlier in the year to afford more time to make the decision.

2005 pickup tender

The township sold its old pickup truck for \$120. Councillor Paul Bowerman said the township should make sure the radio, aerial and work light were removed before the sale.

Sawchuck Peach architects

Council discussed correspondence from Sawchuck Peach Associates — Architects regarding design work for a bathroom renovation at the community hall. The notice says the township's account is "seriously past due," and has a principal balance of \$3,842.

It adds that interest will begin to accumulate at a rate of one percent per month. By the end of October, interest payments will be close to \$40 per month.

Council disputed the validity of the bill over claims from multiple councillors that the work was not completed up to code. Mr. Hardy said the township could pay the bill now as to not be in a situation for any further action, or it could dispute the fees based on their concerns. Councillor Ron Hierons reminded council that although the bills looked expensive, "you'll spend that much fighting them," should

they decide to go to court over the matter, to which Councillor Lorie Leeson agreed.

Councillor Michael McKenzie suggested council write a letter to the architecture firm about the work not meeting code and adjust the price accordingly. Councillor Bowerman requested the township move into closed session before he would give his thoughts on the matter. At the end of the meeting, council motioned to follow up with the architects regarding the town's accounts.

Cycle route signs

Councillor Bowerman wanted to ensure the signs were placed in unambiguous areas after resident concerns that cyclists misread the signs and crossed onto private property.

Manitoulin Streams funding

In response to a letter from Manitoulin Streams requesting additional funding if possible, in light of its government funding cutbacks. Councillor McKenzie implored council to ensure its own needs were addressed before aiding others.

"At this time, I don't feel that it is possible for us to donate money to them. We've got to look after this township first, our taxpayers first," he said, noting that Manitoulin Streams has done good work in the community and has already received some funding from the township this year.

New drainage superindendent

The municipality has a new drainage superintendent, as the company hired for this purpose has placed a different individual in charge of Tehkummah. Because of the change, any drainage grants will have to be duplicated, one for the first half of the year until the personnel change and another for the period following the transition.

Municipal office flooding

Council received a complaint from Diana Pyette, Tehkummah postmaster, about the effects of this past spring's municipal office flooding on the post office. She described having to clear pools of water using a wet-vac and stated that, as of October 11, "the mats along the front wall are soaked.

She said the tiles are lifting and musty-smelling and should be dealt with before freeze-up. Ms. Pyette implored the township to reshape the parking lot and install a drain to keep water away from the building, in addition to piling snow in a better location. Mr. Hardy was directed to work with the roads superintendent to seek a solution.

Bank account

Mr. Hardy told council the township needed an interestbearing account at a chartered bank to receive funding from the Ontario Main Street Revitalization Initiatives. He presented them with a motion which was passed, conditional upon whether they could share the savings account use for OCIF funding.

5th Sideroad maintenance

Michael Walzak wrote to council saying his portion of the road has not been maintained and claimed it had been in the past. He requested the road be brought back up to municipal standards. Mr. Walzak stated he also requested snow plowing service so he can access his property year-round.

Councillor Bowerman said the road had not received winter maintenance in the past. Mr. Hardy said he would look into the town's responsibilities for the road and report back to the resident.

Eventually, we would have our own debates, but ours were more civilized. The pages all clicked as we shared this unique experience. At orientation, the pages exchanged contact information and many connected via Facetime to test each other on the MPP seating. After the first two weeks we went on a field trip, which was a bus and boat tour through Toronto. The trip gave us an opportunity to bond even more. The following week we enjoyed a fry fund, exploring the Queen's Park area, and just hanging out in the page quarters. Saying goodbye to my fellow pages was very hard. I hope we stay in touch and meet up in the future.

Coming into the program, I was very nervous and thought that the experience would be constant stress. Even though I had studied hard, I still didn't feel ready. At first I wasn't really sure how the legislature worked, but I

watching it first-hand throughout the weeks. For example. I thought that debates and statements would take the quickest amounts of time, but in reality they were the longest periods of speaking. After all I realized that to make a good point, it takes more than two and a half minutes. I also picked up some random facts. Orange Shirt Day was observed at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation on September 28

by Betty Bardswich M'CHIGEENG—Orange Shirt Day events were held at the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF) in M'Chigeeng on September

This day evolved from an event that happened at a residential school in British Columbia. Phyllis Webstad was slated to begin classes at this Mission school, and her grandmother took her to the store to pick out a brand new outfit for first day. Phyllis chose a bright, shiny orange shirt.

At the school, all the children were stripped and their clothes were taken away. The orange shirt was gone, never to be worn again.

Orange Shirt Day began in 2013, and events are held country-wide to foster education regarding Canada's residential schools.

According to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC), at least 3,200 Indigenous children died in residential schools. Record keeping was poor, however, and that number may well be more than 6,000. Disease was rampant in these overcrowded schools and included influenza, measles, tuberculosis and pneumonia. Teachers ill-equipped and poorly trained, and it is believed that one in five children suffered sexual abuse and many physical mistreatment.

Mary McGregor was the guest speaker at the OCF occasion, and she is a residential school survivor.

"I was raised by my grandparents in Wiky, Ms. McGregor said. "The girls' school burnt down. It was moved to Spanish. My mother went there. She was eight." Ms. McGregor went on to say that her family members were devout Catholics. "But only once a month," she added. "The other days they followed the traditional way." When it was time for Ms. McGregor to attend the Spanish school, her mother taught her two English words - toilet and water. "But I could count to 30 in English," she said. "My grandfather said to me, 'Don't ever forget who you are.' My grandparents supported education. They were told to sign a paper. Put your X here. They didn't know what they were signing."

Ms. McGregor went on to say that she believes that a priest brought her to the school. "My grandmother cut my hair to shoulder length," she explained. "They cut it even shorter. And they washed our hair in coal oil. We had a bath once a week. They scrubbed us with a scrubbing brush.' At this point, the type of

brush used on the residential school children was passed around. It is large and rough. Something that you would perhaps use to scrub your boat.

Ms. McGregor explained that the coal oil was used for lice, but she didn't have lice. "Our clothes were taken away. We had to wear a uniform. And we were given a number. My number was 308. I was there for three years. We had school in the morning. In the afternoon we did laundry, sewing, picking and bagging potatoes. Planting and weeding in the spring. I loved working in the dairy farm. I was familiar with this. My grandparents had farm animals. We did housekeeping. I think they were training us to be housekeepers for white people because we did so much cleaning."

Ms. McGregor went on to explain that the students were not allowed to speak in school. "If you did, you got smacked on your hands. We were also told that we could-


n't use our language."

were brought back by the RCMP and were severely punished. The girls got their hair shaved in the back, and the rest cut even more. They had to sit on the floor and have half a slice of bread and a cup of water for a week. They could not talk to us, and we couldn't talk to them. They were ostracized."

Everyone was taught the 10 Commandments, so Ms. McGregor used those for her confession. "I told the priest I committed adultery," she said. He asked her how many times she had committed this sin and she replied, "Ten times."

Ms. McGregor talked of some of the abuse that went on at the school. "I was 10-years-old," she said, "and working in the kitchen. My friend was washing dishes, and a nun poured in a pot of really hot water. I rushed her to the infirmary. Her hands







were bandaged, and I spoonfed her." One nun was crazy. 'We were told to always

read a library book when our assignments were finished. I did not hear the nun coming down the aisle. She banged my book either on top of my head or on my face. I remember the blood just spurted out. All over my desk and on the girl behind me. My nose would not stop bleeding. I ran to the infirmary."

Ms. Mcgregor was told to go back to her class but refused to do so until they put her in another class or sent her home. The nun was assigned to the Grade 9 and 10 class and was seen standing on top of the teacher's desk while the students sang Yankee Doodle.

"We were mentally, spiritually and physically abused," Ms. McGregor asserted. "We were told our parents were drunkards. You could not talk about your folks. Or drum. We sang hymns and learned French, English and Latin, but we could not speak our own language. We had a teacher, and she spoke Anishanabek, and we just loved her because she was one of us. We never went home for Christmas or for summer vacations." Ms. McGregor was in the St Joseph's Girls Residential School for three years. Some students stayed for 13 years.

Ms. McGregor taught for many years, and when she became a principal in 1975, the first thing she did was throw the strap in the garbage and take down the pictures of the Queen and the Archbishop and replace them with artwork done by the students.







The ride included a 10-minute stop at the Debajehmujig Storytellers for a spooky tale and a cup of hot chocolate and freshly-made scone.

On Sunday Assiginack hosted its annual Pumpkin Festival with fun and games for the whole family, culminating in everyone's favourite event, the pumpkin catapult.

In the hay bale toss (kids and adults tried their hand at tossing a hay bale to clear a set height, like high jump), Michael Quackenbush easily cleared six hay bales stacked on top of a hay wagon. No other challenger came close. In the kids' category Dennis Gulyas was named hay bale toss champion.

Children lined the tennis courts to see who could spit their pumpkin seed the farthest with this illustrious honour going to Jon Mende in the age nine and up category and Sebastian Mara in the 8 and under division.

For the first ever kids' bagel bake-off, Jon Mende placed second while Preston Dey came second. In the pumpkin muffin cooking contest, 17 and under, Connor Phillips took first place followed by Madison McCarville in second. In the adult division, Jackie Bryant took top honours with Janet McCarville coming in second place.



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AOK, United Chiefs and Councils honours missing persons

AUNDECK OMNI KAN-ING—Earlier this month. community members and concerned allies converged upon the Four Directions Complex in Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) to commemorate Mnidoo Mnising Missing Persons Awareness Day, a day to spread information and inspire action towards Canada's Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls, Boys and Men (MMIWGBM).

The morning's events began with a warning that there would be sensitive topics discussed throughout the day and elders were available for counselling if anyone needed support.

Elder Joe Laford of Sheshegwaning opened the ceremony as Elder Roberta Oshkabewisens performed a pipe ceremony. The room was treated to a welcome song by Ashley Keays of Pic River First Nation.

AOK Ogimaa Patsy Corbiere addressed the room.

"We've had a lot of issues with people going to cities where they have faced human trafficking and death," she said, "Community members never give up

She also criticized the cost of an inquiry into missing and murdered Indigenous people rather than investing to help on a community level.

"We already know the problems. There's no jobs and bad housing," she said. "We have a poverty problem and we need to address that.

Following her opening remarks, Wayne Trudeau took to the stage along with Elder Laford to share his personal story of loss. Elder Laford was present to support Mr. Trudeau as he shared his story.

Mr. Trudeau's brother Sean went missing in 2001 on a trip to Montreal with his friends. Two weeks had

passed, and Island police services still had no information about his whereabouts. A seer approached Mr. Trudeau and shared what she believed happened to his brother. Armed with the new information, Mr. Trudeau contacted local police again who told him the information was not enough on which to act.

"So I said, 'I am. I'm going to act on it. That means I'm going to Montreal.' And so the journey began," said Mr. Trudeau.

He said when he arrived at the police station in Montreal, the detective in charge of the case said he had checked the bar where Sean was last seen, their hotel and ATM surveillance footage but had no leads.

Mr. Trudeau went to speak with the bar owner in person who allegedly told him he was not aware of any police presence who had spoken with any of his staff. The further he investigated, the more troubled Trudeau said he

He said he spoke with local patrol officers who were not aware of his brother's disappearance. Mr. Trudeau said he looked further and allegedly could not find any missing person report for his brother.

Eventually, after creating posters and searching around the city tirelessly, police told him there was a body in the morgue that had been found in the riv-

"We knew right away it was him," said Mr. Trudeau. "We were told he would have been incinerated if we had gotten there any later."

He was able to positively identify his brother and get a small sense of closure to the incident. The original detective called the death a suicide, but Mr. Trudeau said the seer described his death as murder stemming from a robbery gone wrong.

Another of his brothers went missing for 10 days in Killarney in 1994. Mr. Trudeau said he had to conduct his own search that time too.

"The system had given up or done little and we

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

Following Mr. Trudeau's talk, Shelly Tuck of the OPP Missing Person Unit addressed the room.

"Thank you, Wayne, for sharing your story because that's why we're here," she began.

"We're here because of missing and murdered loved ones in this community and throughout Ontario. We shouldn't have to gather to talk about MMIWGBM."

She shared some statistics, including that as of September 24 there were 7,900 missing persons in Canada, with 1,751 of those being in Ontario. There were also 228 unidentified deceased persons in Ontario as of the same date.

Ms. Tuck acknowledged the bad relationships Indigenous persons have often had with police as well as the confusion over what jurisdiction should be contacted to report a missing person.

Two key points Ms. Tuck addressed were the shared database between the coroner and police services in Ontario and Canada. She said each party has access to the database for researching missing persons reports.

She also made it clear that there was no time limit
— minimum or maximum
— to report a missing person. It could be as little as a few hours or, in one instance she described, a 35-year-old cold case.

"Twenty-four hours is a really, really long time when someone goes missing," she said, referencing the popular misconception about having to wait 24 hours before reporting a missing person.

Following her presentation, Ms. Tuck fielded audience questions and elaborated on the services the OPP Missing Persons Unit provides. She encouraged family and community members to report missing persons as soon as any suspicions arise.

"You are not wasting our time, ever," she said.

Next up was Lindsey Lobb from the Canadian Centre for Child Protection (CCCP). She explained the services her organization provides including custom websites for every missing child that can easily be shared.

"That drives people back to a single point of contact

and we can update the information in real-time," said Ms. Lobb.

CCCP also acts as a bridge between families and police, especially when new investigators join the team. This saves families from having to re-explain the situation which can cause additional trauma.

For high-profile cases, CCCP can coordinate media requests and ensure the family is not overwhelmed with hosting interviews and press conferences.

CCCP has a community action plan based on working with Norway House Cree Nation in Northern Manitoba. The plan identifies community members who can offer support such as vehicle access or food prep.

"We can't do what we do without our connections in the communities," said Ms. Lobb.

In the afternoon, participants separated into breakout sessions on topics including the National Missing Persons DNA Program, preventing child sexual abuse, living with grief, cybersafety and indicators of human trafficking.

Following the evening feast, the remaining attendees gathered outside in a circle next to the tipi containing the sacred fire. Ms. Keays once again led the song. The group then walked around the Four Directions Complex to a travelling song and ended at an outside display of MMIWGBM on the ball-field fence.

Everyone gathered by the display smudged and was invited to make a tobacco offering into the sacred fire.

The vigil was a display of contrasts. Community members stood next to the display of their friends and relatives, quietly mourning their losses as the sky began to fill with the brilliant colours of an early autumn sunset. Children buzzed around the adjacent play structures, their laughter standing out in stark contrast to the muffled sobs from their older relatives.

As darkness crept ever closer, the vigil was drawn to a close and attendees parted ways. The day's events had concluded but their work to help MMI-WGBM across the country had a long way yet to go.



Outside along the ballfield fence hung photos and stories of a number of missing and murdered Indigenous individuals. The walking vigil around the property ended here with a time of quiet reflection. For many gathered, it provided an emotional end to a sombre day.


