Assiginack planning for Norisle lawsuit, setting funds aside

\$170,000 spent so far

by Alicia McCutcheon MANITOWANING—Dealing with the S.S. Norisle Steamship

Society's law suit, Assiginack council passed a resolution at its last regular



meeting to create a new legal defense fees reserve fund and bolstering it with over \$90,000 in funds from other community reserves. At least one municipal project was cancelled in the process

At the October 17 meeting, council passed resolution No. 282-20-17 "that whereas the estimates required for the current vear were set when the tax rates were confirmed via Bylaw 17-17 on the 4th day of July 2017; and whereas our legal expenses are anticipated to increase significantly due to the current lawsuit regarding the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society; and whereas this situation has been reviewed with our municipal auditors and budget reallocations agreed upon; now therefore be it resolve that we transfer \$100,000 allocated to the landfill capital expansion to our legal expenses account and transfer \$21,711.52 from the Microfit Payments Reserve; \$23,389.47 from the Nelson Street Reserve; \$10,388.62 from the Township Lots Reserve; 356 15 from the Tax Sales Proceeds Reserve to a new Legal Defense Fees Reserve."

CAO Alton Hobbs noted that when the budget was set earlier this year, \$50,000 was set aside for legal and professional expenses, but due to the lawsuit levelled against them by the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society, that \$50,000 has quickly turned into \$170,000.

Rather than run a deficit, the CAO said, it was decided to pull from various coffers as the municipality is sure it will be seeing more legal fees. "We are prepared to go to \$220,000 (in legal fees) before year's end," Mr. Hobbs said.

As a result, Mr. Hobbs added, the construction of a composting pad at the landfill will be put on hold until at least the spring.

On advice from their lawyer, members of the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society declined to

At the Central Manitoulin Finance and Economic Development committee (FED) meeting last week, the committee discussed the terms of reference for

the committee and its members.

"Before we talk about the composition of the committee I did some footwork and put together a suggested terms of reference for the committee," said FED committee chair (Councillor) Alex Baran. The committee name was suggested as the Mindemoya Old School Repurposing Committee (MOSRC), he told the committee

MANITOULIN—The Manitoulin Drug Strategy Committee is seeking community input in the further development of a drug strategy for Manitoulin.

"Substance misuse affects everyone," states a press release from the Manitoulin Drug Strategy Committee. "From the challenges of keeping prescription medications away from children and teens; to alcohol misuse in home and communities; to dependence following treatment for pain and accidental poisonings-substance misuse affects all of society. While anyone can become part of the problem, everyone is part of the solution.

The Manitoulin Drug Strategy committee is asking you to get involved.'

"The Drug Strategy seeks to find ways to work in collaboration to promote health and prevent substance misuse, restore and maintain community safety and advocate for services and support for people living with addictions and their loved-ones," the release continues.

Co-chair of the Manitoulin Drug Strategy Committee Mark Forsythe explained that the committee is working on developing an Island-wide strategy and is seeking community

Tehkummah clerk, councillor exit council meeting they deem as illegal

TEHKUMMAH—The

Tehkummah council chambers were again filled to capacity last Tuesday night, October 17, for an emergency meeting called by the reeve that was declared "illegal" shortly thereafter, dissolving into a free-for-all with community members hurling accusations and some members of council passing judgment, almost all of which was aimed at Clerk-Treasurer Karen Gerrard.

The crowd began to assemble at 6:30 pm with more chairs brought in from the nearby fire

hall to fit the growing crowd.

"I'm resigning tonight," Councillor Paul Bowerman mumbled as he made his way into the room. "I can't take this bullshit anymore," he added, head in hands.

The meeting was called by the reeve to deal with the issue of the municipal files, which had been removed from the municipal offices the Sunday before by Ms. Gerrard to a 'secure location,' as per a procedural bylaw. Until that time, the municipality's documents had been stored on-site, but not in a secure fashion. The move also caused the reeve to close the municipal offices on Monday, October 16 and Tuesday, October 17.

Reeve Eric Russell called the meeting to order shortly after 7

WIIKWEMKOONG—On October 17, 1997, after about a decade of planning, researching, and negotiating with what was then the Department of Indian Affairs, the Wasse Abin Wikwemikong High School officially opened its doors and welcomed its first class of students. Last week, on Friday, October 20, the special occasion was marked with a 20th anniversary celebration. The community celebration brought community leaders, members and current high school staff and students together with early stakeholders and proponents, including band councillors of the day, advocates, the first principal and first-year teachers and students.

The celebration, and reunion of sorts, featured a trip down "Memory Lane"—a gallery of memorabilia, with photos, yearbooks, art and awards from the early days of the school up to recent accomplishments and endeavours including those of the robotics team, the business program, the dance program and the annual Rezfest.

Special guests invited to speak about the school were Dr. Lorraine Frost and Dr. Ron Common who were instrumental in the research required to demonstrate the need for a high school in Wiikwemkoong as well as writing grant proposals for the funding required to build the school; the then Director of Education, Grace Fox; the school's first ever

Free treatment to quite smoking being offered to Island residents

GORE BAY—The Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) is hosting a free Smoking Treatment for Ontario Patients (STOP) program workshop in Gore Bay today, Wednesday, October 25.

"The workshop offered in partnership with the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health," explains a press release from the SDHU. "The STOP program is a province-wide initiative that delivers researchbased, cost-free smoking cessation support to eligible Ontario smokers who wish to quit smoking.

Eligible participants will attend the one-time group education session and receive five weeks of free nicotine patches.

"This will help double their chances of quitting smoking," notes the release. "The education session provides information on the proper use of nicotine replacement therapy and on how to develop a quit plan."

Those interested should contact the SDHU Tobacco Information Line at 705-522-3433 or 1-866-522-3433 (Mondays to Fridays from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm) to see if they qualify and register.

A workshop will be held today, Wednesday, October 25, in Gore Bay at 5:30 pm. The location of the workshop will be supplied upon registration.

New date set for M'Chigeeng First Nation election

M'CHIGEENG—M'Chigeeng Electoral Officer Dan Simon confirmed that nominations are now being accepted for the re-election of chief and council following the overturning of the previous September 9 election results.

'The last day for nominations will be Saturday, November 4 from 6 pm to 8 pm," said Mr. Simon. "Only registered voters can nominate or run for office. If someone is unsure of their registration status, they can check with the band office at 705-377-5362."

Only registered band members are eligible to vote in the December 16 election as well.

Mr. Simon posted the timeline for the election, noting the registered band list was set on October 6. "Mailed notices to off-reserve members went out on October 10 out to all of the members we have addresses for," he noted. "We have about 600 addresses of off-reserve band members.

The electoral officer compiled the voters list on October 13.

The nomination meeting will take place November 4, mailed ballots will be sent to off-reserve members on November 15 and the advance poll will take place on December 9, with the final voting day being December 16.

"As long as people contact me

before the election, I can still register them on the voters' list." said Mr. Simon, "but they have to be on the list of registered band mem-

Assiginack continues to distance itself from Burns Wharf Theatre Players

by Alicia McCutcheon ASSIGINACK—Following an in-camera session at its September 18 meeting, Assiginack council passed a resolution that further distanced itself from the Burns Wharf Theatre Players in its quest to see the Burns Wharf Theatre renovated to meet accessibility and fire codes, enabling the waterfront theatre to be used once again for its popular summer programming.

Following the in-camera discussion, council reconvened in open session and passed a motion, No. 250-17-17, moved by Councillor Leslie Fields and seconded by Councillor Brenda Reid, "that whereas we have concerns about the FedNor application we have been asked to approve on behalf of the Burns Wharf Theatre Players and; whereas this application alone will not achieve the desired aim of the Committee and the Township; now therefore that we invite the Burns Wharf Theatre Players to a future meeting to discuss council's desires to see the Burns Wharf Theatre Players become an incorporated legal entity, able to make its own applications, that this entity enter into a detailed agreement with the Township for care and control of the theatre and its ongoing operations and that upon completion of this agreement, we enter into a long-term lease with the Players of the theatre building."

At an earlier September meeting, council also repealed a resolution, 211-15-17, to put forward a funding application to FedNor on the Burns Wharf Theatre Players' behalf, citing concerns of "inaccuracies" in

The Players declined to comment on the most recent resolution, but did say they hoped to continue to work with council on the project.

Get vaccinated and protect yourself and others from the flu

by Robin BurridgeMANITOULIN—Flu season is here and various clinics and pharmacies across Manitoulin are once again offering the influenza vaccine free of

"Getting an annual flu vaccine is the first and best way to protect yourself and your family from the flu," states a press release from the Centre for Disease Control and Prevention. "Flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, and missed work and school due to flu, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations."

"Getting the flu vaccine plays an important role in not only your health, but those around you," explained Manitoulin Health Centre Chief of Staff Dr. Stephen Cooper. "The people who die from the flu are the vulnerable, the elderly and children. The flu shot protects your family and friends. In the wintertime people are indoors more and in close proximity to each other, which puts individuals at a higher risk of getting sick. If you are sick you should stay home—prevent the spread of the virus.

According to the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MHLTC). on average in Canada, the chance of developing influenza in any given year is one in six. The flu vaccine is offered for free to all residents of Ontario.

The majority of pharmacies on Manitoulin are offering walk-in clinics during regular business hours, just be sure to bring your health card. The pharmacies offering walk-in flu shots include: Little Current Guardian Pharmacy, Edgewater PharmaChoice, the Manitowaning Guardian Pharmacy, Central Pharmacy in Gore Bay, Robertson's IDA Drug Store in Gore Bay and Guardian Mindemoya Medical Pharmacy.

We need made in the North solutions to economic woes

Kudos to the folks at FedNor and LAMBAC for reaching out to stakeholders in communities both large and small across Northern Ontario, seeking input on what direction and policies the government agency should pursue in the near-term future as they seek to improve the economic development of the North. It is a tack that more government agencies should track if the serious issues that face the Northern Ontario economy are to be met successfully.

There is an old adage that one can't see the forest for the trees, and it has certainly seemed to have been the go to approach of governments of all stripes over the years—that paternal air that the government knows what is best for us. But if you want to know what's going on near the roots of the matter when it comes to a forest, you might well be advised to check in with a few lumber jacks on the ground and, these days at least, a few of the environmentalists chained to the few remaining old growth jewels.

Of course the problems facing the North are hardly new and generally well-known by all of the players, but it is in finding innovative solutions to the challenges facing this region in these times of revolutionary change taking place in the global economy that such consultations will pan the gold.

Manitoulin Island can be viewed as a microcosm of Northern Ontario, with a small population spread across a huge geographic landscape that a handful of larger communities tend to dominate, while tiny hamlets slowly shrink with each passing generation. Transportation is a major issue that requires innovative solutions, and indeed such solutions are being pursued by organizations such as the March of Dimes, that is looking to think outside the box by bringing together First Nations and non-Native communities in a collaborative effort to meet the challenge. When travelling from one Island community to another is a \$100 decision, most people will defer that travel unless such a journey is critical. This does none of our communities any good whatsoever and a great deal of harm.

This is not to disparage the taxi companies that provide the transportation, they are providing a great service through their efforts, but those resources are highly limited by the economies of scale, and while one person travels from Little Current to Wiikwemkoong others cannot book a timely ride from home to a doctor's appointment a few blocks away.

Issues such as finding affordable rental housing for workers who provide vital labour for nascent industries and small businesses, getting workers to the worksite without it costing the whole day's wages to get there, moving product that 'last mile' that entails costs far out of proportion to the distance. These challenges have solutions, they just wait to be discovered, and when they are, governments need to step up to facilitate their development until they are sustainable on their own merits.

But we can't just sit back, complain and expect the federal and provincial governments to solve the issues facing our communities in the North. Local governments and communities have to step up to do their own part in making our communities more economically viable and sustainable. The first step along that path is that each of us must start by working better together and becoming more mutually supportive of each of our strengths.

Longstanding rivalries have a great place in sports, but not so much when it comes to creating a mutually beneficial economic environment and a tide that will lift all of our boats. We must move beyond viewing economic opportunities as a zero-sum game where if one of us benefits the others lose.

On an individual level, we must each of us begin to more seriously explore the local availability of goods and services to be found within our own communities close to home—a broader application of the popular eat local movement if you like.

There is also an unfortunate trend for shoppers to rarely look westward when heading out to shop, too often assuming that better deals are to be found to the east. That isn't always the case and when money moves around the Island a few rounds before wandering across the bridge (or ferry) it multiplies under the basic laws of economics to improve the overall economy.

Many of the solutions to our challenges lie under our very noses, if we should only find time and energy to look. We will soon discover that it is in all of our best interests.

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Gary Bryan

Gary, born with an urge to fish, a great sense of humour and a slight mischievous streak as a youngster, now still spends his daylight hours working hard in the construction industry. "I have been so busy; I've been waiting all summer to go fishing with a buddy of mine and now it's September and we still haven't been out. It's crazy! I use all day getting jobs done." After dark, Gary Bryan comes home exhausted to his Spring Bay abode.

"My mother's family is from Scotland and my dad is from the same area. Maternal grandmother Jane Gordon was adopted so the history stops there. I do remember Grandfather Oakes. He became the janitor for the school house in Providence Bay and he liked a good joke. One Hallowe'en he moved the outhouse back four feet and covered the opening with sand. When the tricksters came to turn over the outhouse, they fell into the quagmire and likely decided not to trick grandfather again."

"Another time, he took the ladder and climbed up on the schoolhouse roof and secured the bell ringer to avoid the tolling of the bell that often occurred at Hallowe'en. Sometimes in the summer, he would perch on the roof, which happened to be metal, just to keep the kids at bay and the school safe." It was likely his responsibility to fix any damage that occurred.

Paternal grandparents Robert and Mabel (Hewett) Bryan lived on the Island and had purchased the farm that became the Orford's later. The farm was eventually sold, as none of the sons wanted to farm and the family daughter was away at school.

Gary was first-born to Jean (Oakes) and Roy Henry Bryan on July 31, 1947. He was given the second name 'Robert' after both his grandfathers. Other siblings were Dale, Jane, Terry and Bonnie. Dad, Roy Henry, at 19, had started a six-year stint overseas. He came back from Europe in 1946 and married Jean. Like many, he didn't talk much about the war, apart from the camaraderie and about the friends he had made, like the English soldier from Elliot Lake, a regular visitor after the war.

The first house the family owned was moved from the dock into town over the ice with a team of horses. Roy Henry also did carpentry work on the dock at South Baymouth in the 1940s. He owned a sawmill and built cottages as well. "When I got older, I worked with dad on many of these projects, including maintenance for the ferry dock." Mother Jean worked in Providence Bay, at Reid's, a small general store that included shoes and clothing.

'We were all taught to swim at a young age. I remember dad teaching me to navigate the length of the dock before he would leave me alone in the water. It took a while but I eventually mastered it. Going to the lake alone was a milestone for me. Another recollection was catching minnows to sell to fishermen. Dad was licenced to use a 'seine' a 25-foot net to catch the 'shiner' minnows for bigger game fish. The perch loved them. I used to help with that task.

'We had a big tank with a homemade aerator that held the minnows. Dad would deliver them to all the nearby camps. One time we had a bonanza of minnows in our net. We spent the next day giving away as many as we could so they wouldn't perish and go 'belly-up' in our tank. Some gave us money for them but many were given away free that day."

"Grandfather Oakes would drive his old truck slowly down the back roads while my brother and I would stand on the side rails, jump off when we saw a beer bottle and run back to the

moving truck, throw it in and jump back on. We got to know where all the local 'off-map drinking spots' were. Each bottle was worth two cents at the store. Once we found a big stash of 'full' beer bottles that someone had hidden for later use. They must have been disappointed when they came back for their booty.

Grade 1 teacher, Mrs. McDermid, a relative of Murray's, was our teacher. "I remember she didn't change much over the years." Reading was Gary's favourite subject in the two room-school in Providence Bay. "By the time I was in Grade 4, I had read every book in the school library. I especially enjoyed the old classics."


"Back then, it was easy to get into trouble. Once, I was punished for eating leeks in school. We knew the wild leeks were quite strong when chewed raw and we knew the teacher would be offended by the pungent smell. If we were annoyed with the teacher, we would bring in the leeks and she would get out the strap. While one of us was being punished, the rest of us wheezed, in response, trying to boost the degree of foul leek odour. Sometimes we were naughty."

Gary describes the trick they played on the teacher they had in Grades 5 and 6. "He wore a fedora and he would go around the building each day, checking things out. A small group of us would sneak around to the south side of the building and take pot shots at his hat, trying to knock it off. We knew it was his last year there, so we felt safe. I don't think he ever saw who was trying to dislocate his hat.'

Saturday nights, rural folk often headed for town to lay in groceries. Their kids came too so they could indulge in apple fights with the town youth in the horseshoe pit. Participants like Sandy Denovan and George Gordon would join Gary and his brother to fight for power with a stash of

wild apples. Sometimes the kids from out of town would bring in heavy hitters from afar to influence the outcome just a little. This created a 'little' resentment that could be worked out later in another match.

When a storm hit town, it was always followed by a gathering of neat stuff on the shoreline. "Some of us would walk the beaches and rocks to look for objects lost from boats off shore. One time, after a particularly bad storm, we found hatch covers, ropes, suitcases and other items. It took four trips to get it all back home. Grandfather Oakes, the entrepreneur, offered all four of us \$20 each for all the finds. If you searched, you could also find enough coal to fill a pail. All this treasure-seeking often kept us out of trouble. If we were home too long, we would get a job assigned or we would get into mischief. The choices were 'walk the shoreline' or 'get into trouble.' We found exploring was more fun, more productive and easier on our rear ends."

"Movies were offered for 25 cents on Friday nights when a Gore Bay resident came to the Orange Hall. Another quarter bought you pop and chips. It was usually a fun night, although I didn't like the scary movies much." Television came along in the 1950s and Gary recalls enjoying the Ed Sullivan Show or Bonanza at the Fullford's home. He also remembers watching the

McDermid. Murray could hit the ball further than anyone, starting from home plate, right across the yard and well into a distant yard. He did have a brief time with the Dodgers team in New York, until an injury at home held him back. He was on top of a moving truck holding down building supplies when the truck hit a bump and the wind caught the material and pulled him off the truck onto the road. It took a long time for him to recover but he wasn't able to go back to the major leagues."

McColemans are distant relatives on my grandfather's side. Their old homestead is the white house that is just behind ours here. I remember people saying, you had a cold house if you married a McColeman. The woodstove was the only heat there. They would put all their clothing near it at night so they could step into warm duds in the morning. Later, the McColemans had the property on Square Bay, the site of another saw mill. "As a youngster, I saw half a dozen log booms in Providence Bay. The trees were bigger back then."

"I remember little Jane running away from home when she was about four. She was upset because she had not been included in the activities of her older brothers Dale and Gary. She had found a suitable bag for her belongings. Dad decided to humour her and give her three

heavy books she should read to help her in the big world. He placed them in her bag and she was off on her adventure." Luckily, the heavy bag necessitated the curtailing of an extensive getaway and she was soon back home.

"About the time I was in Grade 9 we moved to Haileybury where dad had found work. I caught up with my schoolwork and got my driver's licence in Haileybury. Strangely, I was never stopped by the police before I got my licence but I was detained three times after I got the official licence. Our next stop was Cobalt so dad could refurbish old buildings. I would help him on the weekends. We were still living in Cobalt but I was working in Sudbury with my brother Dale when a tornado hit in 1970. Dad was working at the CIL plant and he saw his neighbour's car lift up and fly over his car and come down on another car beside his. The tornado also cut a wide swath through the trees which littered the countryside like scattered toothpicks."

"I dropped out of school after three weeks of Grade 11. There was a job for me in Lynn Lake, Manitoba where my friend from Haileybury, Larry Cook, was waiting for me. Together we worked at open pit mining in northern Manitoba." After a year or so, Gary moved back to Manitoulin and did some construction work with Calvin Pearson. He learned how to drive the big toys: dump trucks, loaders, bulldozers and other equipment.

'I had a friend in the union and he called one day asking if I wanted a three-day job helping to top off the big stack in Sudbury. The stack was about 18 inches short, just missing one layer and a steel cap. I jumped at the chance because I had always wanted to work on that landmark," Gary explains. "My second day on the job, a big wind came up and we were all at the top. It seems the stack was built to sustain a sixfoot movement in any direction. With the power off, we were kept busy adding powder and water to keep the surface soft for the next layer of super-strength cement. Our moving platform was anchored by the rebar rods that were narrowing as we moved up. These rods, later covered in cement, provided strength to the huge chimney.'

"We were fine in the wind but one worker on the ground was hit by a chunk of concrete which smashed all the bones in his foot. Another worker in the bosun's chair was banged around on the building and his knees were raw when we got the power back on and got him down. He was shaking when he climbed off and he always wore knee pads after that. I hear today that they can't decide whether to take the big stack down or leave it for a tourist attraction. It was built to sustain a heavy wind and it had been tested several times, in high winds, passing the test each time; it seems a shame to tear it down."

Gary met Jane Bush in 1987 at Prescott's restaurant in Providence Bay. Jane explains that she had managed a craft store for a large company in Toronto. "I liked the city, but life brought me to the Island with my first husband and two children, Jason, and Melissa who is now a Williamson. After I settled here and got work, I wanted to stay, even on my own. Gary had also gone through a first relationship and he has a daughter on the Island, Daughness Migwans.'

"We married in our vard here in Spring Bay. A big tent was erected and it was a lovely day on August 12, 1995. Harold Case, from the Slash, married us. Family and close friends attended the ceremony and a dinner was held at the Bayside Restaurant in Providence Bay. Afterwards we had a get-

UCCM Police assist in human trafficking outreach through Operation Northern Spotlight

ORILLIA—Members of police services throughout Ontario, including Manitoulin's United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) Anishaabe Police Service, were able to ensure the safety of six people who had been working in the sex trade and were in exploitive situations, including two under the age of 16. Additionally, 12 people were charged with 21 offences as part of Operation Northern Spotlight, a coordinated, national effort to end human trafficking.

During Operation Northern Spotlight, police meet with individuals suspected of being in exploitive situations. They

are provided contacts and information for community-based support agencies and are offered both immediate and future police assistance to leave the exploitation. The program is not intended to engage those who are not being exploited.

Over a seven-day period, 46 police services across Ontario were involved and 12 people were charged with 21 offences. A total of 331 police officers, support staff and victim services engaged 198 people, as part of a joint effort coordinated by the Ontario Provincial Police. It was part of an international operation led by the US Federal Bureau of Investigations

(FBI), RCMP and involved police services from Thailand, Indonesia, Philippines, Cambodia and the United Kingdom.

Charges include: advertise another person's sexual services; possession of property obtained by crime; receive material benefit from sexual services; keeping a common bawdy house; procuring material benefit; trafficking in persons; prohibited weapon; procuring a person under 18 years of age; and receive a material benefit under 18 years of age.

Forty-five Ontario police services participated in this year's Operation Northern Spotlight.

"Human trafficking is

deplorable crime that police organizations and threatens the safety, livelihood and dignity of those who are being exploited and abused," Deputy Commissioner Rick Barnum, OPP Investigations and Organized Crime. "This is a complex issue that affects some of the most vulnerable people in our society and does not recognize jurisdictional boundaries. It is our duty to act decisively and effectively to recognize and protect these people from exploitation and it is imperative that we have a concentrated effort amongst all our partners to be effective".

"Operation Northern Spotlight is possible because of the multiple

victim service agencies working in partnership to stop human trafficking," Inspector Tina Chalk, Electronic Crime Section, Anti-Human Trafficking Investigation Coordination Team. Our effort to assist people who are being exploited is our ongoing commitment."

UCCM Anishaabe Police Service Chief of Police Nahwegahbow Rodney told The Expositor that his police service was invited to participate in early September.

"Our resources are small, but we approach it with a team approach," Police Chief Nahwegahbow said.

Detective Ed Simon was actively involved in Operation Northern Spotlight. helping to transcribe the events of one of the victims, known as 'gathering evidence.'

"It's good for us as a small police organization to contribute," he added. "We've been actively involved in Northern Spotlight since 2014," he added, noting that due to the opiate crisis there is an increased risk of human trafficking occurring. The UCCM Police also felt that it was important to help in order to address and help prevent the conditions that lead to tragedy of missing and murdered indigenous women.

Traffic stop leads to crack cocaine seizure

On October 21, members of the UCCM Anishnaabe Police Service conducted a traffic stop on Highway 540 west of Little Current. As a result of the stop and search of the vehicle, a substance suspected to be crack cocaine was located inside of the vehicle and was seized with a street value of \$2,000.

Charged with possession for the purpose of trafficking is a 38-year-old female of M'Chigeeng First Nation and a 23year-old female from the Sudbury area. Both were released on a promise to appear for the Ontario Court of justice in Gore Bav.

Third annual Tour de Rez promotes cycling in Wiikwemkoong



Northern Ontario Party leader visits Manitoulin

MANITOULIN—The leader of the new Northern Ontario Party (NOP), Trevor Holliday, and a group of party executive was on a tour of Northern Ontario ridings that saw him drop by Manitoulin—with stops at Low Island in Little Current and also in Mindemoya to meet, greet and recruit new members to the party that seeks to "begin the process" of creating a new province out of Ontario's North

"We are focussed on Northern issues that affect the longevity, wellbeing, economy manufacturing and future generations of Northern Ontario," said Mr. Holliday. With all the issues that are being overlooked by the Legislature of Ontario, our party feels that a different approach needs to be taken to ensure Northern Ontario is no longer treated as a colony.'

Mr. Holliday had the typical merchandise of a political party on hand, including hats, T-shirts and fridge magnets, but it was the party's platform that he was hoping would resonate with people and encourage them to sign up for the

Although the response to his tour had been largely positive, Mr. Holliday admits that engaging folks on matters political on these hot sunny days reminiscent of early spring has been a bit of a challenge. A party pamphlet focusses attention on the dismal electoral participation, providing statistics and exhorting that "we are the party you have been waiting for."

Among the platform planks of NOP is the creation of a standalone province out of Northern Ontario, "with the same rights and privileges as all other Canadian provinces," but Mr. Holliday noted that the party is about a lot more than that ultimate goal.

The first nine of 37 items on the party's platform focus on electricity prices and distribution. The platform advocates a single 24-hour a day price for electricity for residential service; the amalgamation of all of the province's energy companies with a single energy board, cancellation

of the electricity market in the province, reviewing all current contracts, encouraging people to live off the grid in remote communities, assisting Indigenous communities to produce and operate power in their communities and eliminating taxes and delivery charges on residential hydro.

The other 31 items on the platform list cover a wide range of issues, from health to transportation, in varying degrees of detail. The NOP platform can be found in detail on the party's website at northernontarioparty.org/platform.html.

principal, Chuck Searle; and the current principal, Mick Staruck.

Ms. Fox spoke of how the chief and council of the day wanted to see the community's high school students brought back to the community to be educated in their own school and the need to have an environment where students were able to be themselves and where their culture and language could be a part of their daily learning experience. She recounted the challenges faced including difficult negotiations with the Department of Indian Affairs and struggles with the Manitoulin Board of Education, which stood to lose tuition fees if students were removed from Manitoulin Secondary School.

Despite these difficult negotiations, the Wikwemikong Board of Education was eventually granted the authority to educate their high school students and immediately started an alternative school in the basement of the band office, which Ms. Fox recounted with fondness and a bit of levity telling the audience how some students would answer the phone "alter-NATIVE school." She also spoke about how, "for the first time, the students had some freedom—freedom to be who they are, freedom to walk the hallways, freedom to go outside, freedom to speak their language" which she was happy to witness.

The alternative school faced its own challenges in the first year including the discovery, in the spring of its first academic year, that the school didn't have credits and the students were not going to receive credit on their Ontario School Record. After a long process of negotiating and lobbying the superintendent of education, the alternative school was able to grant students the credits for the classes they took. The alternative school flourished and, as the curriculum expanded and enrolment increased, the school was moved to the community hall until chief and council successfully obtained permission to build the high school.

In closing, Ms. Fox fondly recalled how she came back to Wiikwemkoong a couple of years after the high school opened and how proud she felt "to see the massive building, the many programs that were being offered, and the highly specialized people that were taking control" of the school and how proud she feels when she hears others "talking about how well the students are doing and how they thrive in their own environment, amongst their own people, culture, language and everything that goes with our being, as Anishinaabe people." She ended with the assertion that "there was no better decision than for Wikwemikong to build their own school."

Two of the night's special guest speakers, Dr. Ron Common and Dr. Lorraine Frost, who were key proponents for the school and played a major role in writing the proposal to get funding to build the school, provided some insight into their involvement in bringing a high school to Wiikwemkoong

Dr. Common, who is currently president of Sault College, gave a brief history and background on the decision to pursue a high school for Wiikwemkoong, which he noted began 30 years ago when there was only the Junior School, Pontiac School and a nursery school operating in a house, which wholly amounted to a Department of Indian Affairs schools system that was remotely run out of Sudbury.

The then chief and council decided to pursue a band operated school system which they had to do through lengthy and challenging negotiations with the Department of Indian Affairs. Eventually they succeeded in being granted authority and the Wikwemikong Board of Education and its policies was created as well as a new hub centre for the nursery school aged children. Once the Hub Centre, Junior School and Pontiac School were in place to educate the young ones to Grade 8, the next thing was to build a high school.

Dr. Frost, currently a professor in the School of Education at Nippising University, talked about the research required as part of the process of getting a high school and the requirement to demonstrate a need for a high school in the community. Research included a lot of data collection and analysis in order to support the case. The data, over the 10-year period of the 1970s, revealed a disturbing trend at Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) of directing First Nations students into the lower academic streams, with only one First Nations student graduating out of the academic stream; and perhaps even more disturbing was the overrepresentation of First Nations students in the high suspension and expulsion rates of that school—almost all suspensions and expulsions were First Nations students despite their only being a small percentage of the students in the school.

Dr. Frost said that there was "not much difficulty demonstrating that the needs of the students of this community were not being met in the provincial school system" and that "the students of Wikwemikong needed their own high school so they could have their own teachers teaching them" which was important given that MSS didn't have any Indigenous teachers on staff despite that being one of the things the band had been asking for. She stressed the importance that having a school in the community would play, including the sense of belonging that comes with being in one's own community, as well as not having to deal with the long daily commute and, perhaps most importantly, the benefits that come with having "Indigenous teachers who can bring Indigenous culture, language, history etc. to the classroom."

Chuck Searle, Wikwemikong High School's very first principal, took the stage next and, in a very inspirational and moving speech, like all the speakers before him, he emphasized the importance of having a high school in the community in order to better reinforce the importance of the Anishinaabe culture and language, which is so deeply imbedded in the life of the school today.

Mr. Searle described the activity of getting the school ready for students "20 summers ago" from the work of the construction team to the school's maintenance staff who worked diligently to keep things clean under the constant construction conditions, the administration staff's role in registering students and answering calls as well as the teaching staff's preparations in setting up courses and lesson plans.

He painted a picture of the school's opening day beginning with a sunrise ceremony and smudging of each and every room of the building, which he described as necessary for "purifying each of the rooms from any negativity and imbuing each with a positive energy" the success of which he continues "is seen in the advances of the school today."

He mused that seeing the awards of today's winning sports teams gave him pause to look back to the first year boys' basketball team which "began the season with a 1-0 winning streak" but conceded that the leaderboard was not "good to us as we went on in the season." He explained however that "what the leader board did not show was the positive energy of our players, their resolve not to give up, and their belief in themselves, and in their team" and as a nod to the school motto, he highlighted the team's "determination to soar with the eagles."

In a moving close to his speech, Mr. Searle poetically recounted the opening day as a beautiful fall day in which "one of the eldest members of Wikwemikong, together with the youngest student of Wikwemikong High School parted the deerskin banner, symbolically freeing the school, its staff, and its students to soar to face life's challenges collectively" and that, "by respecting one another, and by believing in ourselves we truly will embrace life and soar with eagles."

From the first principal to the current principal, the stage was given over to Mick Staruck, who was the evening's final speaker. Mr. Staruck began with a witty version of the story of his transition to Wikwemikong High School from Pikangikum First Nation, where he was the school's principal. He then spoke about the school today, with obvious pride, highlighting its success.

The school, he explained, began with one Grade 9 class and, in each of its initial four years, grew by one grade until there were Grades 9-12. He attributes student input as well as the "tremendous talents of teaching staff" for the continually expanding and evolving curriculum, which has grown to include an Anishinaabemowin Language and Culture program which hosts the Annual New Year's Eve powwow and often sends student presenters to the annual Anishinaabemowin Teg conference; arts programs in dance and fashion; a robotics program that now mentors other schools; and a business program which has taken students from coast to coast and won entrepreneur competitions. The athletics department has also evolved from that first boys' basketball team to include track and field, golf, wrestling, archery, badminton and lacrosse to name only a few, all of which require committed teachers who spend hundreds of hours coaching. There is also an assortment of music programs including the entrepreneur music program that helped originate Rezfest, the annual music festival.

Mr. Staruck's pride in the school is evident and, in particular, he expressed the pride he feels in the students of Wikwemikong High School, who he said he feels "blessed and fortunate" for having known and acknowledges what he attributes as the part they have played in molding him into the person he is today.

The guests at the celebration included a former student who returned to become a teacher at the school. Clifton Wassengeso, a student in the original Grade 9 class, who returned to the high school nine years ago to become the physical education teacher attended the event to reconnect with former teachers and to celebrate the school which he attributes as allowing him "to learn in a safe, comfortable environment" and which he now hopes he can contribute to making a "unique place to learn and have fun" for students while getting their education. Mr. Wassengeso attributes being able to go to a high school in his own community as beneficial for a number of reasons and, in particular, he recalls the sense of pride he felt in having a school in his First Nations community, which he continues to feel as a teacher and works to pass on to his students.

Speaking with Fay Zoccole, the new Wikwemikong Board of Education Director of Education and the celebration's MC, after the event, it became even more clear that among the many reasons to be proud of Wikwemikong High School, the teaching staff in particular are to be com-

M'CHIGEENG— Kenjgewin Teg Educational Institute (KTEI) hosted its 15th Annual Career Fair this past week and the bustling crowds of youth milling through the booths seeking information on potential career choices was nothing short of impressive—it seems practice really does make perfect.

"It was good," said KTEI's Brian Bisson, organizer of the event. "We had over 240 youth taking part in six workshops throughout the day and a record number of post secondary institutions and employers for them to talk to one-on-one.'

Among those giving workshops on careers were Ontario Hydro, Mnaamodzawin Health Services, The Manitoulin Expositor and the Ministry of Natural Resources (with two workshops).

"We started out small," said Mr. Bisson, "but we have been growing every year and this is our 15th year. "We have to thank the schools for participating, Little Current Public School, Assiginack Public School, Central Manitoulin Public School and Manitoulin Secondary School, we even had a school from Sagamok First Nation come all the way down from the North

"The kids have been really great," said Tracy Jacko, University of Toronto recruitment officer for First Nations House. She attends events like these over several months each year. It's amazing at such an early age they are thinking ahead to what career they want to pursue. I don't think I had any idea what I wanted to do even in high school.'

They continue to receive ongoing professional development and training attaining additional qualifications that their teacher toward licences. Ms. Zoccole says, with great pride, that the teachers are "very highly qualified and are happy" teaching in Wiikwemkoong noting that some of them have been here for almost as long at the high school and some have been here their whole careers.

Ms. Zoccole also explains that the Wikwemikong education system provides "200 percent education" meaning that, in addition to getting what students need according to the Ministry of Education, they are also learning their ways. As an example, she explains, if a student is learning about waterways, they are taught what the Ministry of Education wants them to know and they are also taught "what water means to us and our stories" as teachers weave traditional knowledge and stories into everything that is taught. Teachers are encouraged to use Indigenous content as much as possible allowing the curriculum to become more relevant to Indige-

Despite all the reasons to celebrate the high school, Ms. Zoccole does however concede that some parents still opt to have their children educated elsewhere and that, among some people, the school, and reserve schooling in general, is thought to be sub-standard. She doesn't understand why people think this way about the Wiikwemkoong schools which she believes provides good quality education. She maintains that there have been great strides to improve the curriculum over the years and points to the offering of literacy and match coaches as good examples of how the school is working to improve student success. She wants to hear parents' concerns and says she is open to thinking outside of the box in order to keep community members in the school.

Jillian Peltier, school's guidance counsellor and one of the key organizers of the anniversary celebration, echoes the Director of Education's sentiment about the quality of education provided by the school. Ms. Peltier, who has been with the school since it's second year, explains that the school is inspected by the Ministry of Education every other

year and that it has rigorous standards and criteria to meet in order to continue granting credits and that 'all of the staff work hard to make sure that we're meeting those requirements.

Both Ms. Peltier and Ms. Zoccole, and likely most of the attendees at the celebration, believe that having a high school in the community is important for student success because it allows students to be surrounded by their culture and their language, providing a comfortable, safe, and supportive environment to learn in. Mr. Searle agrees that this model of education which emphasizes language and culture will help to embed heritage and traditions in students and help them to become proud of who they are and what they're able to accomplish.

Certainly, Ms. Zoccole "the community wants their children to know about their history, their language, and culture and we are supporting that." She explains that students come to (Wikwemikong High School) and feel that they belongthat they can see this school is theirs, that it's got their stories" and because some of their parents have also been students here, there's a history and a sto-

ry here for them. That history and story was celebrated at the 20th anniversary celebration and, everyone in attendance at the celebration, looks forward to that history continuing until such time that they can come together again to share more stories of the school's and its students'

successes.

through a survey.

"The committee has launched an online survey to find out what you think is needed to take action against substance misuse on Manitoulin Island," said Mr. Forsythe. "We want the Island community to get involved and will be encouraging participation in the survey during National Addictions Awareness Week in November."

The Manitoulin Drug Strategy is a group of individuals and agencies working together on a plan to address substance use on Manitoulin.

"The plan will focus on increasing four key directions; Health promotion and education to prevent the misuse of substances is key to developing a community commitment to reducing the harms associated with substance misuse," explains the press release. "The more we know about substance misuse, the better prepared we will be to act. Community safety, working with enforcement and justice will encourage people to form a community of care in which we are each responsible for the other. Collaboration and cooperation are building blocks for community development and engagement. Communities working and acting together will ensure that we will all feel included and services and support includes efforts in the areas of harm reduction, treatment and advocacy. As people in need find a caring community to support them on their journey, they will find ways to get well."

members. It was also proposed that the MOSRC shall be an ad hoc committee formed by the authority of Central Manitoulin council and that its working period shall be for the duration of its mandate which shall end September 30, 2018.

"It was my understanding the committee mandate was to have a proposal to council as of December 31, 2018," said Mayor Richard Stephens.

It was pointed out by Councillor Derek Stephens that it wouldn't be the current Central Manitoulin council members in place by then.

"I'm rather fond of the earlier completion; anything after September 30 (2018) is too late for a decision to be made on the proposal by this council," said Councillor Pat MacDonald.

Ted Williamson, a local resident who is seeking to be on the committee said, "what is wrong with the proposal going to the next council? Council is council whether it is the current members on a new slate. Administration has their notes. The proposal should be ready by the end of September, but to get funds and find businesses or groups that will consider leasing space (in the building) is going to take time."

Councillor Stephens has served as a councillor with five different councils. "What is a priority for one council may not be for another council. I can understand what Pat (MacDonald) is saying."

Councillor MacDonald pointed out, "I'm not sure how the legislation works when we have to make a decision on finances involving the proposal and the legislation on council having to make any type of decision concerning finances on this. I don't think we can make any financial decisions in September or October, until after the new council is elected."

"What this will have to be is a viable proposal, with meat on the bones," said Councillor Baran.

Councillor Dale Scott suggested, "from one council to the next there is lots of spillover. And financial consideration on projects or plans go from one council to the next. I don't know what the big concern is. The new council would be brought up to speed quickly."

"But we can't pass on an ad hoc committee to the next council. The committee's work has to be done by the end of this council," said Councillor Stephens.

Mayor Stephens felt there is no difference between an ad hoc committee and subcommittee of FED. He suggested changing the term ad hoc committee to sub-committee. "I agree with Dale the municipal council will be here

pm with Councillor Ron Hierons asking for an immediate adjournment as it was an "illegal meeting" due to a lack of notice.

Clerk-treasurer Karen Gerrard agreed with Councillor Hierons, saying it was indeed an illegal meeting and that she would not partake in an illegal activity and stated firmly, "no clerk, no meeting."

Ms. Gerrard then took the floor and read from a prepared speech that follows here:

"The recent events that have transpired since October 9 has created much confusion, much anxiety and most of all a very unhealthy workplace," Ms. Gerrard began. "These actions have left employees caught between following direction from their immediate supervisor and/or following direction from individual council members."

"This certainly leaves much ill effects on all counts and needs to be cleared up as soon as possible.

"I am certainly not opposed to council scheduling meetings or emergency meetings, as long as council, and individual members of council, abide by the established by-laws, practices and procedures that are respectful and professional.

"I believe and hope that it is recognized by members of council that these specific events are certainly not reflective of our agreed bylaws and processes. I am certainly more than prepared to respond to any matters that may be of concern to some individuals.

"In the authorities that have been delegated to me, I have always been available to respond to inquiries from members of council, staff or members of the public in a respectful, tactful and professional fashion. This certainly is not the case in the way these circumstances

whether it's this or the next council. This council can still review the proposal. I'd like to see the committee given any benefit of the doubt (to help get the job done)."

Mr. Williamson indicated that the committee could have a proposal ready at the end of September.

He told the committee, "let's say we come up with a binding proposal and we're waiting for the ink to dry and that comes after September 30. We're not asking for any funds, except maybe for a small amount to cover some special people to come in and provide expert help."

Even if the council can't make any major decision on finances after this time, "this council can still receive a report/proposal and have an opinion on it," said Councillor Baran.

And it was pointed out the committee under the terms of reference would have no spending authority other than spending requests approved by council.

It was suggested the committee would have a maximum of seven members, including the mayor, at least one councillor and up to five other members of the public.

"The mayor is ex-officio and is on all committees but may not always have a vote," said Mayor Stephens.

"So make the composition include two councillors and leave the mayor as ex-officio," suggested Councillor Baran. Councillor Linda Farquhar presented a list of people who could sit on the committee. The list included Ted Williamson, Sam Bondi, Joanne Smith, Jan McQuay and others.

"I'm glad to see a business person on the committeethat's a good contribution," said Councillor Baran.

"I think it would be a good idea to have two councillors on the committee," said Councillor MacDonald.

The discussion then focused on who would be the council members on the committee. Linda Farquhar said she would be interested.

"I have a problem with councillors on this historical society sitting on this committee. They have a pecuniary interest when sitting on both committees," said Councillor Stephens.

"The historical society is entirely volunteer," said Ms. McQuay.

"But get council money," said Councillor Stephens.

"About \$1,500 a year," said Ms. McQuay. "Councillor Farquhar's option on the building isn't necessarily formed by her sitting on the historical society," said Councillor Baran. "Linda is a sufficiently individual thinker to be able to do the job well," he added.

Councillor Baran was asked if he would be willing to stand on the committee. "Yes, I would be."

Although the list of names is only at proposal stage until considered by council at its meeting this week, Ted Williamson, Richard Stephens, Jan McQuay, Joanne Smith, Sam Bondi, Linda Farquhar and Alex Baran will be considered. It was noted as well that a couple of other residents on the list would be asked as well, prior to council making its final decision this week.

"Given these unfortunate circumstances, the members of this council have left me with no other alternative but to lodge a formal complaint with the Ministry of Labour with regards to making our workplace unsafe and unhealthy for all employ-

"I certainly no longer feel safe working in my workplace, as over the past year, my staff and I have been threatened, harassed, bullied and intimidated by certain members of this council and by some members of the public. I have not pursued legal action in the hopes that the behaviour would stop.

"The last few days prove to all that these behaviours continue to escalate where staff, including myself, feel demeaned and intimidated, and feel our jobs threatened, which is not acceptable.

"I would like to request a 'without prejudice' meeting of council, all staff and the Health and Safety Coordinator, with possibly a representative from the Ministry of Labour present, which is open to the public, to review the events that have led to the reeve closing the municipal office to the workers and to the public, and to the calling of special or emergency meetings without reasons stated, especially in doing so contrary to the specific rules and regulation that govern how these proceedings should be scheduled.

"The actions taken by the reeve, with or without the support of individual members of council, has left many questions unanswered and the public is

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- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- There are two kinds of alarms. Ionization smoke alarms are quicker to warn about flaming fires. Photoelectric alarms are quicker to warn about smoldering fires. It is best to use both types of alarms in the home.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

might be true, "we need a council that works together."

A woman in the audience questioned why council would have hired Ms. Gerrard without having done a background check. "It's all your fault," she told council.

"We feel like there's nothing we can do," another person said.

"I think everyone needs to resign," someone added. The audience then began to call for Ms. Gerrard's dismissal with accusations then levelled at Councillor Ron Hierons for helping the clerk-treasurer to move the files

from the municipal office.

Councillor Leeson recounted the story of seeing Ms. Gerrard's vehicle at the municipal office that fateful Sunday with more calls for dismissal erupting from the group

"We all know there's a clique here," Councillor Leeson said. "You guys aren't blind; you can all see who's in cahoots with who."

"You know who's trying to cause trouble," she added. "They think they're fooling us but they're not."

"And that's what makes me angry!" someone yelled in response.

It was pointed out that Councillor Hierons had been in possession of the speech read by Ms. Gerrard, an observation made by a citizen who had been seated behind him in the chambers before he left. Another said that one other person in the room had a copy of the letter too, pointing out Jim Fawcett. The group then set its sights on Mr. Fawcett, calling on him to explain why he had a copy of the address. Mr. Fawcett said he would gladly hand it over to anyone wishing to see it, even suggesting copies be made, but still the angry calls for 'why?' still rang out.

"Because he's in the clique, that's why," Reeve Russell

The Expositor contacted the Ministry of Municipal Affairs concerning a number of topics that were raised, including emergency meetings. According to the Municipal Act, 2001, Section 240 b) "upon receipt of a petition of the majority of the members of council, the clerk shall call a special meeting for the purpose and at the time mentioned in the petition." Tehkummah does not have a procedural bylaw in place for any further stipulations regarding emergency meetings.

"If any person believes that a meeting was closed improperly, or did not adhere to the local procedure bylaw, they may wish to make a complaint to their local meeting investigator," said Lee Alderson, communications branch, Ministry of Municipal Affairs. "Once local processes are exhausted, or if your municipality has not appointed a meeting investigator, the Ontario Ombudsman may conduct an investigation."

By a shear twist of fate, Gary was diagnosed with cancer two days after the ceremony. "I went through the chemo and am still around to talk about it, 22 years later." Gary went right back to work driving the big equipment, a job he


In the winter, their home was heated with a wood stove and some winter mornings Gary would opt to sleep in if he didn't have to get up early. "I would check the fire and if there was enough wood in the house, I would go back to sleep." For inspiration to finish cleaning pursuits, Jane liked to imagine that the Queen was coming over. "It helped me focus on the task." Jane also did a series of jobs at various establishments including, restaurants, the local antique store. Oscar and Ursula Hettmann's cottages, and Moni's 'Art For You Gallery' on the main street of Gore Bay. "Moni had lots of interesting stuff. We became friends over time, but now she has moved back to Germany, her original home."

Gary's siblings have moved on. Dale went out west and worked in open pit mining for a time. Bonnie (McFarlane) of Providence Bay, became the family historian. Jane married Louie Gordon and lives in Little Current. She worked at the hospital, also for the Legion and now works at the Manor. Terry spent time in Gravelbourg, Saskatchewan in social services. They helped out when needed and volunteered with garden work, played baseball, and participated in community projects that were part of the curriculum. These tasks helped to promote a more well-rounded community. Today, there is less interaction and people are focused on social media. I feel we have lost something."

The family down south was visited a few times and we have three beautiful grandchildren now." Like most of us, Gary and Jane want to stay in their own place, self-sufficient and happy. "The key is to do what you like to do. The only regret I have is that I should have stayed in school longer. I was good at

math and a technical school would have been a bonus but I started to work and then I was caught up in that direction.'

Gary boasts that Jane knows all the names of the flowers outside and she confirms that she enjoys working with plants. "At one time, I wanted to be in theatre arts," she offers. "In high-school we were given a budget and I went out, bought the make-up and we used it for the actors of our 'Bye Bye Birdie' production. After high school, I wanted to do makeup for the actors, do art restoration or teach art history, but I chose a different direction too.

"We just love the Manitoulin. It is so laid back and we know people from one end of the Island to the other," Gary adds. Jane holds, with a smile, "I never forget a face but I might not remember a name." Gary tells us it is a terrific place for fishing, catching rainbows in the spring, bass in the summer and perch in the fall and winter. "This Island is a great place to live and it is the place I grew up in. We can't wait to get back if we are away."





Assiginack Pumpkin Festival celebrates the beauty of orange

teenagers are not usually very easily impressed, but judging from the startled reactions and more than a few screams elicited during the Assiginack Pumpkin Festival's Haunted Ride, a lasting impression was made.

Organizers of the event admitted that the Haunted Ride "blew all expectations right out the window." The indications that the ride was going to be an outstanding success began earlier on Saturday evening, when the magician known as Manitou Magic entertained 100 people with his act as a warmup before the ride.

The ride itself began setting out at 7 pm, taking participants on a 20-minute exciting trek through the streets of Manitowaning while seated on a wagon filled with hay bales that riders used as seats. There were 19 scare stations along the way manned by a scary group of 60 volunteers whose sole focus was to keep the Haunted Ride participants on the very edge of their hay bales.

coordinator Jackie Event White said she was delighted at the "amazing community spirit" on all sides that helped make the event an outstanding success. "There were 350 people who went out on the rides in a two-and-ahalf-hour period," she said. "We were just blown away, we expected maybe 100 to 150 people. The lineup was just amazing, it wound all the way out the arena."

On Sunday at noon, magician Stefano Presenza entertained a large crowd in the gazebo sponsored by Cambrian Insurance, while a host of children's games took place in the tennis court enclosure, numerous vendors were on hand to ply their wares and the five teams taking part in the pumpkin catapult competition were setting up their pumpkin launching systems.

Knox United Church hosted a great lunch on Sunday, helping to fuel an action packed day.

There were plenty of upsets during the weekend, including two young cooks who "stole" the top prizes in the pumpkin baking competition right out from beneath the noses of their considerably more experienced opponents. Grandmas beware, there are some new kids on the block. Connor Phillips' pumpkin loaf placed first and Brenda Newman came in second, while Connor's younger brother Lane secured

Of the five teams who entered the festival's final event, the pumpkin catapult contest, most were returning veterans, but it was the new team captained by Dave Eade and Mitch Harasym that won by a good chunk of a country mile. The winning entry was engineered by Mr. Eade and powered by massive elastic bands winched down a long heavy wooden frame. It's a good thing the bands weren't pulled to full power during the competition as the second shot from the machine easily cleared about a quarter kilometer (250 metres), a fully charged pumpkin might have quite literally have left the park entirely.

Mr. Eade might almost be considered a bit of a ringer, what with that mechanical engineering degree (and a year of co-op) from the University of Toronto. "It wasn't all that complicated a calculation from an engineering standpoint as much as it was a time constraint," said Mr. Eade. "We really only had about two weeks to pull it all together."

When it came to the launch, the pull was only 90 percent of the

"We also didn't have it at full 40 degrees, a lot of people think it's 45 degrees, and if it fired up past the atmosphere it would be, but it isn't going to go that high," Mr. Eade smiled. There were a number of discoveries in the single test shot that meant a bit of a sleepless night correcting the design, he admited.

As to why the team went with an elastic band powered unit rather than the more common trebuchet design, which uses a massive counterweight to propel the launch arm toward the target, Mr. Eade said it was again a matter of time. "The trebuchet would have been less expensive, but the calculations are a lot more difficult to work out."

An effective trigger mechanism is also more challenging for the trebuchet design, he said.

So what is the technical name for the final design of the Harasym Team's machine? "It's a slingshot." laughed Mr. Eade. It's really not much different than one of those kid's slingshots you see hanging out of Dennis the Menace's back pocket. "Just a lot

Any comments by onlooking kibitzers about how a simpler design being better as the design team struggled with last minute adjustments fell silent after the team's jaw dropping single shot streaked across the field to secure the \$500 prize.

The Harasym-Eade catapult was built for Mr. Harasym's nephew Landen, a cancer survivor who was celebrating his 12th birthday during the competition. The beaming younger Harasym was fully engaged as part of the team that assembled the behemoth pumpkin launcher into place.

The previous pumpkin hurling contest winners, the Deforge family (ably assisted by members of the Debajehmujig Storytellers

crew), were magnanimous in defeat, but vowed to return to the top of the podium next year.

It won't be an easy feat, as the chief engineer on the winning contraption, Mr. Eade, was already taking notes of what needed to be adjusted to improve on the firing mechanism.

'We haven't really been working on it all that long," noted Mr. Eade. "It's been about a month. We only had a chance to partially fire it last night before we brought here." The contest has been a great learning experience for all involved.

The Assiginack Pumpkin Festival was blessed with outstanding weather, with the originally called-for rain making no appearance whatsoever so that the events took place with unseasonably warm weather and under clear skies

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
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4elements Living Arts celebrates 15 years with book launch

KAGAWONG—Time flies when you are making art. For Kagawong-based 4elements Living Arts the past 15 years have been a bustling hive of artistic activity that has seen over \$1.5 million in funding come to Manitoulin Island to support arts and cultural programming in local communities. The land-based arts organization launched the first of two publications recently with 'Learning the Land: Creative Community Engagements, a history of 4elements Living Arts and its programs with engagements for educators and community members.

Sophie Edwards, executive director of 4elements, is the lead author of the publication, with long time director Heather Thoma contributing.

"This book focusses on the 15 years we have been working on community arts projects and serves as a resource for community organizations both on- and off-Island," noted Ms. Edwards.

The book is packed with photos and descriptions of the lands-based arts programs and projects that have been the hallmark of 4elements Living Arts over the past decade and a half. The idea for the book came about as the organization reflected on its accomplishments.

We realized that we had done all this amazing stuff, but the information and

knowledge, the corporate memory, was all locked up in our heads," said Ms.

Edwards. "We thought it would be a good idea to get it out and onto paper where it could do other arts educators and community arts facilitators some good.

Working in an arts

setting brings with it a lot of

unique challenges in a very challenging field. "Urban arts organizations face a lot of challenges, but they also have access to a lot of funding opportunities, foundations and granting programs that are not as accessible to rural organizations such as ours," noted Ms. Edwards, pointing to Sudbury's Myth and Mirrors that receives some municipal funding and Toronto's Jumblies Theatre that has its own foundation to help provide support.

Despite the challenges faced by 4elements Living Arts, it has punched high above its weight to the benefit of the Island, in many

"When we started out, a lot of people didn't understand what land-based art was," said Ms. Edwards. "I think a lot of people now have a pretty good idea.'

"For more than a decade 4elements Living Arts has been a leader in culture development on Manitoulin Island and is one of the few organizations whose activities link communities with one another," said Dr. Gayle Broad, director of research at the Nordik Institute, whose organization worked with 4elements.

"4e has been an active and positive cultural force in our community and in

Manitoulin Island since its inception many years ago," said Billings Councillor Barb Erskine in one testimonial contained in the book. "Kagawong has benefited tremendously from the arts and culture profile that comes with the close affiliation between our community and this organization. We are very fortunate that 4e can call Kagawong home.'

A survey of elementary school students conducted before and after they took part in the 4elements's River School summer program, an innovative meld of science and art, showed a 50 percent increase in engagement with the Kagawong River and its ecology. "That kind of engagement increase has huge implications for stewardship," not-Edwards. Ms. A second book is due to be published sometime in December and will focus more on early land-based learning, aimed towards providing a resource for childhood educators, early childhood educators and teachers of art at an early age. "It will be for those working with the three- to six-year-old set," said Ms. Edwards.

Among the marks that

4elements Living Arts has a legacy on the landscape of Manitoulin Island is a permanent art collection that has been installed along the Kagawong River, including unique carved boulders created by Anishinaabe artist Michael Belmore.

Take advantage of the fall season

Fall is not only a good time for introspection, but also to lay a sound foundation for the next crop season. Some of the other important tasks that you could do in the fall are as follows:

1. Soil testing: Take soil samples from your fields (0-15 cm soil depth for basic soil tests and micronutrients, and 0-30 cm for nitrate nitrogen and sulphur); if you haven't done the soil tests for the last 3 years. Go for micronutrients (zinc, manganese, copper and boron) tests, if you haven't tested your soils for micronutrients in the recent past. Remember sustaining crop yields with the application of NPK fertilizers alone isn't possible any more. You may wish to test alfalfa, soybean and corn fields for nitrogen and sulphur too, as soon as the soil temperature comes to 10-14°C or below, so that you are able to discount some residual/or fixed N from these crops next spring. At low temperatures, there is no significant transformation/or losses of nutrients. For details on soil sampling and testing, refer to Soil Fertility Guide

(www.omafra.gov.on.ca/english/crops/pu b611/pub611.pdf). The economic and environmental benefits from a sound fertilizer program, based on soil tests, could be many times the cost of soil testing. If you don't have time for soil sampling yourself, look for someone providing custom soil sampling/testing services at a reasonable cost.

2. Manure testing: Fertilizers are one of the costliest inputs for crop production. Test manure for its nutrients content: to decide on the right rates of manure and fertilizers application to minimize costs on nutrients application/and environmental impacts, and to obtain maximum economic yields. http://www.omafra.gov.on.ca/english/nm/





Daffodil Terrace serves as a home away from home for those undergoing cancer treatments

SUDBURY-Located next to the Northeast Cancer Centre (NECC), the Daffodil Terrace Lodge provides accommodations primarily to registered out-patients of the Northeast Cancer Centre at Health Sciences North (HSN), and so much more.

"The Lodge strives to be your home away from home while you are receiving treatment," a press release from the Daffodil Lodge Terrace states. "The Lodge is a warm and friendly environment that provides you with access to a number of amenities to ensure a comfortable stay.

Patients are able to stay at the Daffodil Lodge: if they are registered with the NECC and have a scheduled visit with oncologists or consultants at the centre; live more than 40 kilometres (25 miles) away from the Lodge; and are able to manage the activities of daily living including (but not limited to) washing, dressing, and medication manage-

Rooms can be booked in advance by calling 1-800-465-6343, a nightly fee of \$10 applies to all patients

Patients who live 200 km and beyond (one-way) from the Lodge may be eligible for an accommodation allowance of \$100 per treatment trip through the Northern Health Travel Grant (NHTG).

Patient's requiring assistance with daily living activities or who are 16 years of age or under, or who would normally live in a nursing home, may require an authorized fulltime guest (escort) to accompany them at the Lodge. Medically-required escorts do not pay for their stay. Please contact the Lodge staff for more information regarding eli-

The Lodge will also provide accommodation to family members and close friends of NECC patients and oncology in-patients. Such accommodation will only be provided if space is available. NECC patients will receive priority assignment. Family members and close friend rates are \$45 for single and \$65 for double occupancy.

The Daffodil Terrace Lodge also offers the following pro-

The Look Good Feel Better Program is offered twice a month at 6:30 pm to avoid interfering with patient appointments. The Program is dedicated to helping women manage the appearance-related effects of cancer and its treatment. At the heart of the Program is a complimentary two-hour beauty workshop lead by a team of volunteer beauty experts, who help women take charge of how they look and feel during treatment – from how to choose a wig or tie a headscarf, to recreating the look of lost eyebrows or lashes. The finer points about hair, make-up and skin care are just the beginning. Look Good Feel Better is about a whole lot more.

Wig Room: Items are free and recycled. Local patients can access the wig room, and hats and wigs are donated daily. The Look Good Feel Better Program offers a wig demonstration during their sessions.

Craft Program: Offered every Wednesday within the Lodge by volunteers. Patients are given the opportunity to create something to help take their minds off treatment. Craft items are donated to the Lodge. There can be a small cost for certain craft supplies, such as leather goods

The Lodge offers Tai Chi, a program facilitated by Dr. Tai Yeung with sessions every Tuesday at 4:30 pm. Tai Chi has been practised in China for hundreds of years. With its gentle and continuous movements, Tai Chi reduces stress and anxiety and brings harmony to the mind and body. It is a gentle way to improve one's well-being.

The Northern Cancer Foundation's Angels in Pink Breast screening van brings Lodge patients to the grocery store once a week on Tuesdays. Sometimes when patients travel from afar it is too far to transport food items that require refrigeration. This facilitated shopping trip provides patients with the opportunity to purchase the vital nourishment they require during treatment.

Prosthetics and bras are available at the Lodge for patients who have had a mastectomy (sizes are limited). Many women do not receive the funding to cover these costs -these items are free of charge, most of the items are donated to the Lodge once a woman has had breast recon-

The Lodge relies on donations from the Northern Cancer Foundation to purchase items that will add value to the patient during their stay. Most recently, 22 new electronic beds were purchased for one floor at the Lodge.

Donations for the Lodge are accepted by the Northern Cancer Foundation. The Northern Cancer Foundation's vision is to advance and make a difference in cancer outcomes and experiences through the support of research and patient care in Northeastern Ontario.
