Northeast Town invites expressions of interest for seniors housing development

LITTLE CURRENT—The Northeast Town is inviting expressions of interest for the development of seniors residential housing on lands currently owned by the Northeast Town located on Water Street West. The 2.94 acres of land, adjacent to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor, was donated to the town this fall by Lily Fielding and her family.

The Manitoulin Centennial Manor board invited Dr. Roy Jeffery, who had presented an assisted living proposal to the board earlier this year, Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin, Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board CAO Fern Dominelli, VON Manager of Community Support Services Stephen Brushett and a representative from the North East Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) to its last board meeting to discuss Dr. Jeffery's proposal and assisted living in the community. No representative from the NE

LHIN was able to attend the meeting.

Dr. Jeffery had originally asked the Manor to donate a portion of its land for the development of an assisted living facility, but informed the Manor board at the meeting that he was no longer seeking the land since the town had received the donated 2.94

acres adjacent to the Manor. He said that he planned to submit a proposal for a not-for-profit assisted living facility to the Northeast Town's call for expressions of interest. In his original proposal to the board, Dr. Jeffery outlined possible shared or contracted services with the Manor such as

South Bay greenhouse project seeks to preserve sacred medicinal plants

SOUTH BAY—The skeleton of a new greenhouse has risen from the floor of a disused outdoor rink in South Bay as part of a project to revitalize and protect sacred medicine plants in the community. The greenhouse is the prototype for several such greenhouses the Wikwemikong Lands Department hopes to see rise in the various satellite communities.

The project is an initiative of the Those That Help Mother Earth Committee in conjunction with the Medicine Project.

"We have the frame up but we need to get the plastic on," said

Wikwemikong species at risk coordinator Theodore Flamand, who noted that the project has really excited the community. "We didn't realize it would take off so fast."

The original funding for efforts to protect medicinal plants came from an Environment Canada prevention stream, noted Mr. Flamand, and arose from the realization that many traditional medicinal plants were becoming harder to find in the bush, notably wild ginger.

"We held two informational meetings about the plants," said

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The Central Manitoulin Economic Development Committee entertained proposals for making the Mindemoya Old School viable as a community asset at its October 20 meeting, but council remains on track to turn off the heat come the end of October.

The Central Manitoulin Historical Society made a bid for the school to be turned into a seasonal cultural centre housing the museum, an art gallery and cultural activities rooms—but some members left feeling that their efforts largely fell on deaf ears.

Old Mill Heritage Centre in Kagawong to hold military exhibit to honour vets

New items on display this year from WWI, WWII and Korean War

KAGAWONG—The Old Mill Heritage Centre is once again hosting its annual military exhibit from November 1 to 11 featuring new unique items from WWI, WWII and the Korean War.

“This is our tenth year doing the military exhibit for Remembrance Day,” explained Old Mill Heritage Centre Curator Rick Nelson. “This is the third year since collector Christian Shoebridge has come on board and he has brought in a lot of amazing items again this year for the exhibit.”

The crown jewel of this year’s exhibit is Mr. Shoebridge’s Korean War era Jeep.

“There were only a small handful made and many didn’t come back after the war,” explained Mr. Shoebridge. “It is interestingly made by Ford for the Canadian Army. There are only about 500 left on the planet—I had to find three and piece them together to form one running, drivable unit. I even found an original amphibious trailer. This is really a unique piece of Canadian history and it turned out quite well. I used time period photos to get it correct, right down to the tires.”

Mr. Shoebridge has also brought back his WWII Harley Davidson motorcycle that was used by the Canadian Army. Since last year he has remilitarized it (the past owner had demilitarized it) and even recreated a patina to match what its condition

“We’re still in the process of setting the exhibit up and selecting items for display, but I can say there will be a lot of different pieces from last year,” shared Mr. Shoebridge. “I like to change it up each year—keep it interesting.”

There will be a collection of uniforms and field equipment on display. “A lot of the pieces are one of



Crystal Shawanda music video nominated for American Indian Film Institute Award Nov. 5

SAN FRANCISCO—The made-on-Manitoulin music video for Crystal Shawanda’s single ‘Pray Sister Pray’ has been nominated for ‘Best Music Video’ at the Friday, November 5 41st American Indian Film Institute Awards in San Francisco.

Directed by Debajehmujig Storytellers stalwarts Joe Osawabine and edited by Matthew Manitowabi, the music video interprets the story of a fictional missing and murdered indigenous woman through images paired with the music of Crystal Shawanda.

When a project is infused with passion, completion can be its own reward, but it is nice when others come to share that passion and recognize the importance of the story you are trying to tell. If there is a common element to the singer/songwriter and her video’s production team it is passion about the subject at the heart of the video’s focus.

“I’m just so thankful this video has been nominated, in the hopes it will continue to raise awareness, which was always its purpose, and our mission,” said Crystal, who is currently on tour promoting her new album ‘Fish Out of Water.’ “I’m also excited to see Joe and Matt’s work being recognized on a higher level; representing Debajehmujig, a group that doesn’t get the credit they deserve.”

Crystal is originally from Wikwemikong and has a longstanding friendship with Mr. Osawabine and when it came to sourcing the talent she trusted to bring her song to the screen, she quickly made the connection to Debajehmujig Storytellers and her friends back home.

“Hey sister did you hear, Billy Rose ain’t never been found. Went missing on the fourth of June, family hasn’t heard a sound,” that one line from ‘Pray Sister Pray’ speaks volumes of the pain felt by the families and friends of Canada’s Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls. The issue of more than 1,200 indigenous murdered and missing resonates through an entire nation on a very personal level. Beyond the losses and suffering, the issue serves to illustrate a systemic prejudice that continues to taint our nation’s relationship with its first peoples. Why the fictional Billy Rose of Pray Sister Pray, and the thousands of real women she represents, have never been found is a question a national inquiry is currently investigating.

“It’s pretty awesome actually,” said Mr. Osawabine when contacted about the nomination. While he is credited as director on the music video, Mr. Osawabine was reluctant to stand in the limelight alone. “Matthew and I pretty much co-directed and co-edited as well,” he said. “I got the director credit and he got the editing credit, but it was very much a team effort, and of course Crystal had final artistic control.”

But in the end Ms. Shawanda exercised a light hand on that control. “Ultimately she had the final say, but she basically said ‘you guys know what you are doing’,” he said. That confidence turned out to be well-placed. “When we did it, she liked everything.”

“It was very much a passion project,” admitted Mr. Osawabine. “Nobody made money off of this,” he said. “Everyone came out to be a part of it.”

“I am really proud of it,” said Mr. Manitowabi of the project and his involvement in it. The subject matter had a strong resonance for him. “It was something I went to sleep with and something I woke up to every morning,” he said. “Ideas would come in the night and I would get up and run to the computer.”

While this is Mr. Manitowabi’s first music video production, he is no stranger to film and editing or nomination to the American Indian Film Institute Awards. He was part of Shirley Cheechoo’s film ‘Moose River Crossing’ and is an alum of Ms. Cheechoo’s Weengushk Film Institute based in M’Chigeeng.

Mr. Manitowabi recalled the days of shooting the video and the unanticipated impact that process had on him.

“I remember when we were supposed to shoot a scene in March, and it was snowing, we thought we might have to cancel, but there were people who had answered the call to be in the video who were coming from really far away and some who had taken time off work

Ivan Wheale’s exhibit ‘Lake Huron Stillness’ opens Tuesday, November 1 at Artists on Elgin

SUDBURY—Manitoulin’s own Ivan Wheale is the November artist at Artists on Elgin in Sudbury with the show ‘Lake Huron Stillness,’ an exploration of Lake Huron in 10 oil paintings, from November 1 to 29.

“The title of the exhibition, ‘Lake Huron Stillness,’ represents the peace and solitude of Northern Ontario’s unique landscapes, specifically Lake Huron,” a press release from Artists on Elgin states. “Featuring wild landscapes, lakes, shorelines, rocks and driftwood, Mr. Wheale’s high realism captures the atmosphere, shape and texture of the local terrain.”

“Ivan Wheale is one of the most successful and recognizable artists in Northern Ontario,” the gallery press release continues. “He was born in Sunderland, England in 1934 and settled in Sudbury in 1957. Shortly after, Ivan moved to Manitoulin Island, where he still resides. Throughout his career, Ivan has held nearly 100 solo exhibitions and his work has been exhibited in over 60 group collections. His works hang in more than 40 public and corporate collections, including the Royal Collection and the Dean’s Collection at Windsor Castle, the Government of Ontario and the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa. His numerous accolades include an Honourary Degree LLD from Laurentian University, the Rotary International Paul Harris Award and awards from the Ontario Ministry of Culture, the Ontario Arts Council and the Canada Council.”

The opening reception for ‘Lake Huron Stillness’ takes place at Artists on Elgin, 168 Elgin Street, Sudbury, on Saturday, November 5 from 1 to 4 pm. The exhibition is on from November 1 to 29 with the gallery open from Monday to Saturday, 10 am to 5 pm.



Social media false comparisons distort social commentary

"How do you want to pay for that?" "Do you prefer the red or the blue suit?" It's an age-old sales trick that remains very much in use today. Change the dialogue from "do you want to buy this product" to "how do you want to pay for your purchase" or "which of these products are you going to buy?" Not buying is never put on offer. Such mental slights of word have their uses in overcoming the buyer's inertia, but when such tactics are used to create false comparisons they can become a cover for a wide range of negative human expression.

Racism, sexism, hate and bullying can all raise their head within a meme that might at first glance be viewed as legitimate expressions of preference—providing cover for people to express opinions or thoughts that might otherwise be unacceptable.

Open any Facebook page and the images will immediately leap off the screen. A sympathetic image, perhaps of a decorated war veteran sitting homeless on the streets begging from passersby or a ramshackle shanty in a Northern First Nations community without clean water or proper insulation, and the value balance question is posed: should this veteran have a home before some welfare recipient, should we be providing proper shelter to our First Nations communities before a refugee?

The questions suggest that more worthy recipients of our social weal exist than those who are currently receiving that benefice. The question provides a false value balance and the image is always either a fabrication or exaggeration of the social balance being proffered. In reality those questions act as a cover to elicit and legitimize racist or social prejudices, acting to reinforce those tendencies by providing a false legitimacy.

Of course homeless veterans should be housed. Of course Northern First Nations communities should have access to clean water and safe shelter. There is no question in any rational mind that these are important social goals for a society as wealthy and rich in resources as Canada.

But it isn't an either/or situation. The memes in question attempt to lay out a social value discourse by accessing prejudice, racism and worse and encourage people to share them based on the legitimacy of the proffered negative image.

There is no suggestion that both are laudable objectives. The under-

lying suggestion is that the second option should not be happening. Period. Because the first goal or objective is laudable and touches an emotionally charged core value, the other image is devalued and refuted through the manipulation of deep seated prejudice and preconceptions.

In the point and shoot, see and click world of the Internet, snap decisions are made with little consideration and the information that those decisions are being based on is more often than not based on falsehoods, exaggerations and misrepresentation.

Very few social media users bother to fact check the statements or images that are being presented to them. An image of a rough looking group of male refugees (read black people) announces that 12 recent refugees raped a 10-year-old girl in Nova Scotia (New Brunswick, Newfoundland or British Columbia will do) and asks the viewer to share the image so that others will be forewarned of the dangers of allowing those fleeing war and genocide into our country—and countless users will forward or share the image without considering that such an incident would be national and international news in every media outlet in the nation.

A quick check of Snopes would usually disavow the tale, but not always, as the sheer volume of specious content is actually beginning to overwhelm that organization's resources enabling it to call foul on misinformation. But if the outrageous claim isn't on the six o'clock news or the front pages of the Globe and Mail, the Toronto Star or cbc.ca, then the chances that it actually happened is exactly nil. Plainly put, such news sells papers and no newspaper today can afford to be part of any conspiracy to cover up a big story no matter what the rightwing/leftwing illuminati dictate.

We all have darker prejudices hidden in our psyche, and those prejudices make it less likely that we will question images or claims that fit our worldview—witness the outrageous lies that can pass unchallenged by partisan political supporters, yes we mean him—but we must make a greater effort than our predecessors to challenge and shine a light on those images or claims, even if doing so means we must challenge our most deeply held values. Because it is those very noble values that the unscrupulous will use to manipulate our actions and drag us all down a darker path.

Think before you click.

Low income "people in financial needs" left out of rebates

Those who pay for electricity in their rent left out of the equation

To the Expositor:

The Ontario Energy Board (OEB), Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP) hydro bill reduction just doesn't cut it for me and most likely tens, if not hundreds of thousands of peoples in financial needs (PIFINS). For those that are paying rent that has built-in or other costs included in their rental payments, we pay again for the wealthier. Specifically, in this particular case, rent paid in Ontario, including electricity. (As far as I know, no one gets Ontario hydro for free). Qualifications for reductions do not include those who need it most—PIFINS) struggling to pay tuition, put food on their tables, pay for diapers. I enjoy a paltry income of under \$15,000 per year, earned from many

years of blood, sweat and tears (BST). My rent (including hydro) represents 61 percent of monthly income.

Q: Where is the qualification for that probably familiar representation? A: doesn't exist or non applicable. My Landlord may qualify. I enjoy a relatively good relationship as a responsible tenant. I Don't begrudge my wealthy landlord his share of the wonderful socio-economic piece of this great province's pie. May I have my somewhat meager share of same please?

Margaret and William Robert (Bud) Dearing

The natural beauty of the Dearing home on Maple Point Road near Kagawong presents a stunning display as the writer pulls into the driveway. The back yard features an immaculate lawn with stately trees providing shade and shelter for the numerous birds, deer, chipmunks and foxes in the area. An inviting sauna, boasting detailed craftsmanship, adds to the ambience. A large garage filled with numerous 'toys' used to maintain the appeal of this destination lies to the side. "It was love at first sight when we inspected this home. It was perfect and we bought it right away."

A chipmunk peeks through the railing as we settle outside. He is joined by a hummingbird sipping nectar from a deck flower. "We really spend most of the day here. We love to be out with nature," Margaret offers. "We bought this home two years ago, when we came back to Manitoulin from Beamsville, Ontario."

The story begins: "I don't remember too much from my paternal grandfather, Bill Dearing. He died before my first birthday," Bud offers. "I remember my grandmother Mary Ellen (Ellie). She was a typical, wonderful grandmother." Bud shares that Ice Lake has always been and continues to be a pivotal part of his life. The Dearing ancestors originally came from Ireland in the 1840s. Maternal grandparents were Bob and Evelyn Brown from Ice Lake. Evelyn was born in Stoney Creek. She was also a delightful, cheery grandparent, and a good cook.

"I was born in Ice Lake on February 23, 1944 to Jim and Lizzie (nee Brown) Dearing. My brother called me his 'buddy' and eventually that was shortened to 'Bud.' I was always the 'baby' in the family, named after my grandfathers, Bill and Robert who just liked the names." Bud had two brothers, Gary and Danny.

"I spent much of my life in Ice Lake, despite moving to Toronto with my parents at one year of age, so dad could join the army during World War II. He was part of the military police that served in England. Meanwhile, mother sold Avon and looked after her three sons in Toronto." When dad got back from the war, he began his own taxi business located at Hwy 401 and Victoria Park Avenue.

"I remember swimming in the Don River and fishing in the Rouge River. I didn't like school all that much and it wasn't much of a surprise to my parents when I played hooky. I didn't have a good reason to skip school and getting the strap didn't seem to slow down the urge to break the rules." When Bud had a spare quarter, he would head for the local theatre and watch the show for 15 cents. That left enough for the bus to get home. If he had spent his dime on popcorn and ice cream instead, he walked home with his two older brothers, Gary and Danny.


"By the time I celebrated my tenth birthday in 1954, we were back on the Island, living on the 6th Line, or Nelson Road today. In 1957 I was attending the Pleasant Valley Public School and it was my job to light the fire in the morning." Bud jokingly adds that he was at the top of his grade, which consisted of four persons in this one-room school. "I played for the Ice Lake Muskrats and we won the championship once. We beat Meldrum Bay and Gore Bay."

Margaret was born on April 1, 1946 to Margaret and Clifford Sanders. She had four siblings, Clayton, Leona, Betty and Sharon. Leona and Betty live in Sudbury and both Clayton and Sharon have died. Clifford drove trucks for the City of Sudbury for 38 years while Margaret made dresses and took in boarders.

"I used to say that Col Sanders of Kentucky Chicken fame was our grandfather, and our claim to fame, but it wasn't true," Mar-



sisters drive the car.

Bud left school and Ice Lake to join the Canadian army two days after his 17th birthday. "I spent three years in the army. The first six months from February 1961 to September that year, Bud delivered the Toronto Star to corner stores and newspaper boxes and until he could get into the army officially. "I always wanted to be a part of the Canadian military. My dad had been in the army, and although he never talked much about it, I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

Basic training occurred north of London, Ontario at Camp Ipperwash. "In November of 1962 our regiment went to the Canadian base, Fort York outside of Soest, Germany. It was training for peace time." One of the events Bud participated in was the Honour Guard at Vimy Ridge. "One hundred of us paraded beside the war monument that day, November 11, 1963. Standing before these magnificent structures and gazing at all the names on the plaques was very emotional."

Bud's contingent also participated in the Niemagen Marche, which was held in Holland. Groups of 30 soldiers and civilians from all over the world strode 40 km a day for four days. These marches still go on today. "The Dutch loved the Canadians and we would occasionally be surprised with a bottle of beer or wine when we stopped for the day. One of my buddies from southern Ontario actually found his dad's gravestone at the Canadian War Cemetery. That was a powerful moment for him and for me."

"I attended the 50th reunion of the First Battalion of The Royal Canadian Regiment, one of about 100 people. I knew a few of the fellows." Today, there is even a Facebook page, 'Soest Army Brats' dedicated to this group of soldiers.

When Bud returned from Germany, he began to work at INCO. Before long, wedding plans were made for Margaret and Bud. They had known each other for a long time and were ready to take the next step. They tied the knot before 150 guests on a hot sunny June 25, 1966 at the Berean Baptist Church, in the west end of Sudbury. "The preacher had not kept track of the time and was late for the ceremony. Bud's grandmother was passing around her hanky to perspiring participants and the organist kept playing while waiting for the preacher." There is a photo still enjoyed today of Margaret's dad looking disdainfully at the tardy reverend.

The nuptial dinner was held at St. Paul's United Church on Regent St. and afterwards the bride's parents invited all 150 guests to their home for finger foods. The honeymoon took the newlyweds to Sault Ste. Marie and Flint, Michigan. "We enjoyed just being together, eating out and shopping."

Their apartment was on Larch St. so that Bud was close to his INCO job. "I earned \$2.38 an hour as a miner and three weeks after the wedding, we were on strike," Bud confirms. "Thankfully, that strike only lasted a few days. Three years later we were off five

garet claims, with a smile. "We lived in the west end where I went to Elm St. Public School and later Sheridan Technical High School." Favourite subjects were English, music and typing.

Margaret, whom Bud charmingly refers to as 'the boss,' first came to visit the Island when she was seven-years-old. "Bud and I have known each other most of our lives. Bud's uncle Clarence Brown boarded with our family and eventually he invited us to his home on Manitoulin."

In the summer, the family would also visit their older son

Clayton who worked in Thunder Bay. "One of my earliest memories is dad claiming we were going out west to see my brother who was 18 years older than me. I thought we were heading for the west coast." On road trips, Clifford would "spoil" his children by buying them ice cream and pop, treats most often denied at home. "On holidays, the sky was the limit."

During high school, Kresge's employed the young teen on Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays for 65 cents an hour. She enjoyed working with people in the Sudbury

department store. High School saw Margaret join the Blue Saints Marching Band, where she was part of the 'colour guard,' entitled to hold the flag at the front of the procession. She joined the Glee Club, participated in the girls' athletic association and played on the volleyball team.

"I was fortunate that my aunt Sadie gave me her black 1950 Austin that boasted a nifty brown leather interior and a stick shift. The Austin became my perfect ride to school at 16, in Grade 10." When she was feeling generous, Margaret would permit one of her



make a presentation," confirmed Central Manitoulin Mayor Richard Stephens, "but it was the same presentation that we heard at another committee meeting earlier. There were no decisions made."

The municipal council, facing escalating costs for maintenance and repair of the former school and later municipal building that had served as a business incubation and office centre since the creation of a new municipal office just down the road, had decided to give notice to the tenants of the building with the eye to, with reluctance being expressed by a number of council members, closing the building down.

"That is the eternal question," said Mayor Stephens, who is also a member of the Central Manitoulin Historical Society. "Is there a viable and financial alternative? From what we have seen so far there doesn't seem to be the funds available to do what needs to be done."

The mayor noted that the municipality's economic development officer had been searching diligently for funding that might bring about a

stay of execution for the building. "In the end she came up quite short," he said. "So at the moment everything is in limbo until the Historical Society can come up with a viable option."

Another party had come in to assess the building as a possible location for an assisted living facility. "In the end they decided to reject it after due consideration," said the mayor. "We will have to look at our own needs for the museum and all of the assets owned by the municipality."

Mayor Stephens refused to admit defeat, but acknowledged that there were significant challenges to overcome.

"We would all like to see the building put to good use," he said, "but it will have to be a plan that incorporates viability and fiscal prudence."

Marnie Bond is a Central Manitoulin taxpayer, albeit a seasonal residence—she lives in Little Current. Ms. Bond has attended a couple of meetings on the fate of the Old School and is a recent member of the Central Manitoulin Historical Society. She declined to comment as a member of the society, "I have only

recently joined," but spoke as a taxpayer of the municipality.

Ms. Bond said she was reluctant to challenge the municipal council over the building, but that she found some of the declared basis for their decision to mothball the building to be less than solid. "There were councillors who were saying that it would cost a million and a half dollars to renovate the building," she said. "I received the documentation from the municipal office and I don't see the numbers adding up to that much."

Ms. Bond said that the council was also including a lot of items that didn't need to be done immediately and basing some of their concerns on issues that were not well based in fact but rather fueled by speculation. She gave the example of the concerns expressed over asbestos in the building. "The report really doesn't show that to be a concern," she said. "I understand that there is some in the vermiculite in the ceiling insulation, and there is one pipe elbow that has been identified, but that could be boxed in. None of this has been identified as being of immediate con-

laundry, nursing and food, and said that he was still hopeful that the board would consider looking at this in the future after a more thorough proposal was developed.

"We would be looking at developing 10 units first and providing assisted living services, opposite to just seniors' housing," explained Dr. Jeffery. "We would look at developing more units down the road, up to 30 or three 10 unit buildings. It would all be dependent on funding, but if we were able to get the land for free it would make the units more affordable for the residents."

Manor Board Chair Paul Moffatt inquired about a comment a representative from the LHIN had previously made about the Island only having seven individuals who require assisted living.

Dr. Jeffery said that, "there seems to be a huge discrepancy between what I see on the Island and what they think is the case. I have three or four patients alone in the hospital right now that could benefit from assisted living."

Manor board members Wendy Gauthier and Pat MacDonald said they support the idea of an assisted living facility being developed on Manitoulin Island.

Ms. Gauthier added that if there were shared efficiencies between the Manor and the new facility that she would support exploring them in the future.

"The board is in support in general of your concept, Dr. Jeffery," said Mr. Moffatt. "We just need something concrete to look at."

Mr. Brushett discussed the current services offered on Manitoulin such as assisted living home care and meals on wheels and how they are accessed by a referral to the Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) by a health professional, family member or the individual themselves.

Mr. Brushett also said that he felt the seven individuals in need of assisted living that the LHIN noted was not accurate. He said that there were currently 10 individuals accessing services and one individual on a wait list.

Various people at the meeting discussed how perhaps the number of individuals accessing the assisted living services was low because many people are unaware of how to access the services.

There was also an overall consensus that representatives from the LHIN needed to be present for the discussion to see if there was a possibility for shared or contracted services between the Manor and an assisted living facility.

Mr. Dominelli said that he would work on setting up a future meeting with all the representatives in attendance plus the LHIN so that more discussion could occur and the LHIN could address some of the outstanding questions raised at the meeting, such as the possibility for the Manor to contract or share services with an assisted living facility.

Expressions of interest for the development of senior housing are to be completed and submitted to the town by 12 pm on Friday, December 2.

ening people (usually children) has, in the language of the Internet, gone viral. Purportedly first rising on the public radar earlier this year with sightings in South Carolina by children near an apartment complex, the fad appears to have taken on a life of its own and reports with varying levels of malevolence having taken place in over 20 states in the US and across Canada.

Tapping into the human primal fascination with all things scary, the creepy clown craze has caught on in a big way—leading to unnerving behaviour (in the case of clown-clad individuals attempting to lure children into wooded areas and other secluded places) and a number of arrests. Considering the US fascination (and ubiquity) of firearms it is amazing there have not yet been reports of shootings, but there has definitely been a violent backlash in some cases.

Caulrophobia is the clinical name for a fear of clowns, but that fear is most often more associated with the quality of the unknown that comes more from the anonymity provided by clown regalia than with the clowns or

their actions.

Mr. Turner thinks that may well be the case.

"I know a successful children's birthday party clown who arrives without makeup and in the first part of his performance the children watch him put on his makeup," he said. "After that, the children all seem fine with it."

Anyone who has experienced trying to capture a photograph of a young child on Santa's knee will be familiar with the abject terror that the big red jolly guy can evoke in the younger set.

"We have had lots of people at our shows over the years (who have expressed a terror of clowns) but after they come to watch the show and leave, it doesn't bother them," noted Mr. Turner. One theatre professional considered leaving the theatre when she discovered that Mump and Smoot were perfectly capable of an impromptu visit to the lighting booth overhead during the course of their act. "She was happier after having met us and by the second show she was fine," he recalled.

Much of the primal part of the equation comes from the power of the

mask, suggests Mr. Turner. "It can be used to hide what is going on or to reveal what is going on," he points out. "Ours is on the revealing side."

As to the act of slipping in and out of the shadows in clown makeup and costume to see people's reactions, Mr. Turner finds himself somewhat surprised by his own reaction. "I can totally get that," he said.

Still, at the end of the day, what is going on with creepy clowns is essentially one dimensional and, dare we say it, somewhat lame. "They are not clowns," emphasized Mr. Turner. "They are just idiots dressed up as clowns."

The media, both social and traditional, have fed the creepy clowns all out of proportion to their worth. There does seem to be something special about the clown image that captures the puerile too often evident in the media. "If we were talking about people dressing up in doctor's costumes and trying to lure people into the shadows, would we even be talking right now?" he asked. Doctors, after all, are at least as scary as clowns in real life interactions.

Missing, murdered inquiry expectations need to be adjusted, WRFN community circle hears

BIRCH ISLAND—After a few days spent together in ceremony and learning, families of missing and murdered indigenous women, girls and two-spirited people gathered one final time, this time with members of the public by their side, at what was termed a ‘pre-inquiry community circle,’ held at the Whitefish River Community Centre last Thursday night.

The meeting was designed to give the families of missing and murdered women and girls and the community at large a glimpse into what the inquiry might be like, what to expect and not to expect, and how to care for one another while the inquiry is happening.

Before the meeting began a pipe ceremony was held. As the smoke unfurled from the pipes the prayers of the people were heard, the intent of the ceremony to lighten the loads of the families so they might walk their path a little lighter, elder Roberta Oshkawbewisens explained.

Deputy Grand Chief of the Anishinabek Nation, Glen Hare, addressed the group first, saying it was over two years ago that the Chiefs of Ontario met with families in Thunder Bay and told the government that something needed to be done, “and we waited, and waited, and waited,” he said.

“The stories I heard were unbelievable,” the deputy grand chief added, sharing one story that happened while he was chief of the M’Chigeeng First Nation. A grandmother lost her daughter to an act of domestic violence, he said. “She was advised to have the casket closed, that’s how horrific it was. She said ‘no, I want everyone to see what he did to my baby.’”

Deputy grand Chief Hare told the group about the Who is She campaign, launched by the Union of Ontario Indians to share stories of the missing and murdered and raise funds for the families. To date, he said, \$64,000 will be used to hold another gathering for the families in the near future, sponsoring the families to get there.

He also urged First Nations communities to embrace the two-spirited and welcome them to be a part of the community. “We need to take a lead on that,” he added.

Dr. Janet Smylie spoke next. The soft spoken woman talked about the need to get to a place where the problem of violence and abuse is ended, but in the meantime dealing with the

accumulated hurt, grief and loss.

Dr. Smylie listed some of the symptoms of trauma: recurrent nightmares, flashing images and complete shutdown.

“If we don’t have the tools, these things can sneak up on us; the good news is that there’s lots of community resources, through ceremonies and medical staff,” Dr. Smylie said, noting the importance of self care.

“As families and communities, we need to be more attentive—we need to pull through this and come out stronger,” Dr. Smylie said.

Christie Belcourt, Espanola Métis artist and creator of the Walking with Our Sisters project, was also in attendance for the circle.

She was pleased to announce that Walking with Our Sisters will be in Sheguiandah next summer, and explained how the idea, posted on Facebook, suddenly saw her inundated with vamps (the tops of moccasins) from across the country and even the United States, each representing a missing or murdered indigenous woman, girl or two-spirited person.

When you attend an installment of Walking with Our Sisters, you will find a red carpet laid out throughout the room with the vamps placed alongside. When you enter the room you are asked to remove your shoes, walk and reflect.

“Girls,” Ms. Belcourt addressed the young women in the crowd, “you are the center of our world and we love you.” The artist encouraged the girls to volunteer with the project when it

comes to Manitoulin next year and become part of the ceremony.

“The inquiry is political,” Ms. Belcourt said. “It was pushed for by families for 30 to 40 years. Some people feel it won’t amount to anything because the government is in charge, but some feel a lot of hope for the outcome, and I think we need to hold on to that hope.”

“We have to have the bravery and courage to see what colonization and land disposition has done—violence, toward us and within our communities,” she continued. “The antidote for violence is love and compassion, and we need to extend that to each other, even if we’re tired or cranky. The inquiry will be hard on families.”

Dr. Kim Stanton, a lawyer at the Women’s Legal Education and Action Fund (LEAF), spoke on what to expect from the inquiry.

She explained that there is no information yet on how the inquiry’s five commissioners will interpret their mandate or how it will be executed, such as closed door, regional or based on an expert panel.

“There were 700 recommendations (in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission findings) and almost no implementation,” Dr. Stanton said.

“Good inquiries can, in the process, build public engagement, teach the public what is happening, our role, and acknowledge what has been done,” she added. “It’s important that it establish a history so no one can deny that history—the historical

...continued from page 3 to be there,” he said. “In the end we managed to make it work. We were driving out to a location in Kaboni when it really hit me. There were all these cars lined up, up and down the road. So many people had come out to be a part of it and they were from all over the place. Passion, yeah, that would be the way to describe it. It was great to see the support—you just knew you were part of something special.”

When the team shot the final scene in the Holy Cross ruins in the Village of Wikwemikong, the crowd of women in red dresses (the de facto emblem of the movement to recognize the plight of the missing and murdered indigenous women and girls) was overwhelming for everyone involved in the shoot.

The American Indian Film Institute (AIFI) “fosters understanding of the culture, traditions and contemporary issues of Native Americans” accord-

ing to its website. “The first American Indian Film Festival, presented in 1975 in Seattle was relocated in 1977 to San Francis-

co, where it found its permanent home. Today AIFI is the major Native American media and cultural art presenter in California

and its festival is the world’s oldest and best known exposition dedicated to Native Americans in cinema.”



a kind and tell a story," noted Mr. Shoebridge, who added that the description of the pieces and their history will be displayed with the items.

He told The Expositor that following WWI, there was a lot of concern about bringing diseases back to Canada, so a lot of the uniforms and equipment were burned.

Another new display will be items that soldiers brought back with them from WWII, representing what they saw and experienced during their time overseas.

Several medal sets will be on display, which Mr. Shoebridge has found over the past year, primarily from WWI.

Last year, Mr. Shoebridge loaned his copy Adolf Hitler's Mein Kampf, which was autographed to Hitler's lawyer. This year Mr. Shoebridge has found one of the first English translations of the book from 1938.

"It is a very dry book, but if you read between the lines it outlines what his plans were," said Mr. Shoebridge. "People didn't take him seriously outside of Germany, if they had or read the book it would have prevented a lot of what happened."

Also as part of this year's exhibit is a collection of edged weapons from as early as the Civil War from various countries.

"I've been doing a lot of research over the last year as well, and have tracked down some more information about some pieces in my collection or to find pieces to complete equipment," added Mr. Shoebridge. "It is just hard trying to determine what to include with the space we have."

For the collection of personal items from WWII Canadian soldiers, there will be a pairing of German personal items. "I




As part of the Billings Heritage Centre's military display there are numerous medals and wartime memorabilia on display.

think it is interesting for people to see what the issued equipment, rations etc. was for the Canadian versus the German soldiers," he said.

"There will be a lot of unpublished photos from both sides," continued Mr. Shoebridge. "These are people's personal photos from both sides—German and Canadian."

Mr. Shoebridge said that there will be many additional new items to the ones mentioned and that he hopes people from near and far come to view the exhibit.

"This exhibit gives us the opportunity to commemorate our veterans and honour their sacrifices," said Mr. Nelson. "You would normally have to travel to Ottawa to see similar items, but they will be right here on Manitoulin next month."

months. We had three kids by then and my strike pay was just \$15 a week."

Before the children, Margaret had been the manager at Paramount Discount, a financial institution that approved credit for individuals and organizations. "I found the work fulfilling." Their first child, Robert, was born in May of 1967, just after the family had purchased a home in New Sudbury. Jane joined the family in May of 1969 and Bill was born in October of 1973. By then, Margaret had decided to stay home to raise her three children.

During the long strike, Bud worked as a bricklayer with a company that was building an apartment complex. "I carried 10-inch blocks and pushed them up a ramp to the construction site to make extra money. My parents were farming and they kindly provided meat for our family. Our car rarely left the driveway, so we saved money on gas." Margaret babysat for other families to augment the family income. Robert was in school and Jane was in Kindergarten. Just Bill was home all day.

In October of 1974, the couple decided to move close to the old Manitoulin homestead on Nelson Road. "We bought grandfather Robert Brown's 200-acre farm in Ice Lake. This farm was just a mile and a half from the original homestead. Our house was a 1200 sq. ft. Halliday-type design, a bungalow with a finished basement that included a family room, three bedrooms and a big farm kitchen."

Chester Wilson did the roofing and the siding. "Chester was one of the good ones. He was kind and possessed a great sense of humour. The children loved him and referred to him as Grandpa Chet. He liked to hide money in his chair and then announce to the kids that he 'might have lost some coins in the chair.' The kids loved to hunt for the hidden treasure." Margaret adds. "Having healthy, happy kids and watching them grow, reaching milestones, was most enjoyable as a parent."

After Jane started Grade 1 on the Island, Margaret got work as a health care aide at the Manitoulin Lodge in Gore Bay. Cambrian College sent out staff to train the aides on site. Later, Margaret became the activity coordinator for the Lodge. Bud continued to work on construction jobs.

In 1984, the family took the kids to Wonderland in their Z-28 Chevrolet sports car. "The seating was a bit tight but Robert loved the car," Margaret explains. "At Wonderland, I endured the death-defying ride on the triple loop but I passed out before we got back to home base. My son thought I had died. I was sick for three days. Prior to the ride, I had convinced myself that 'I could do this,' manage the terrible height and the speed, but that didn't turn out to be the case." Margaret was still sick when they had to squeeze into the car to return home.

The Royal Winter Fair turned out to be a more relaxing trip. "The kids loved seeing the animals, the cows, sheep, goats and much more. It is such a big successful fair, even then. We stayed downtown in the

Chelsea Inn and had a great time." The family had a bigger car and nausea was not part of the action.

In 1985, the Dearing family moved to Beamsville in southern Ontario to be near the kids attending high school at Great Lakes Christian College. They bought an older, traditional home on the 'mountain,' as the higher part of the Niagara Escarpment is referred to in that area.

Margaret got a job at Bethesda. This company provided support to developmental and handicapped individuals in the Niagara area. "I recall taking Bethesda clients to the top of the CN tower. Since I don't like heights, the glass floor at the top was challenging. I was proud that I got through it without passing out." Margaret did fundraising for the group and earned an exciting trip. "I saw Fiddler on the Roof, live, in New York where it has been playing for 60 years."

Bud spent the next two decades working for Maple Lodge Farms, managing their chicken production. In 2014, the couple returned to Manitoulin and purchased their present home. "We love living here. We are the third owner of this perfect home in an idyllic location. Margaret Wilson, who referred us to you (this writer), was our neighbour in Ice Lake," Bud adds. "Today, brother Gary lives on Ice Lake. Brother Danny lived on Union Road before his death four years ago."

Associations the couple have been members of include The Niagara Victims Services and the Policing Committee. Bud helped to set up roadside displays for drivers that showed them the speed they were going with the hope that people would slow down in school zones. Money was raised for helmets for kids on bikes. Food drives were also held for the community.

Margaret has always been very hospitable, a people person. "I love having company. I love to cook and bake bread too." She makes it from scratch and she doesn't buy bread. In December, she makes festive pudding and the family's 50-year-old recipe for dark Christmas cake, loaded with fruit.

Bud is certainly a 'jack of all trades.' "I have just enough Scot in me to succeed at most tasks," he claims. "Yesterday, I helped make three batches of crab-apple jelly." Margaret adds, "he also knows how to clean and vacuum. Last year when I had knee surgery, he looked after me perfectly, here at home."

"If we have the chance, we would like to go back to Ireland. We were there 10 years ago for two weeks. It was so charming. The countryside was marvelous, and so green. There must have been at least 50 shades of green," she includes, smiling. "The people were abundantly friendly and they seemed to like Canadian tourists. They would take us to a location rather than trying to explain how to get there. We stayed at Bed and Breakfasts, stopping at four each afternoon. We were just lucky to find good places. A rented car got us through Northern Ireland. It was fun driving on the wrong side of the car in the wrong lane,

but we got used to it and even managed the familiar roundabouts that confused many of its entrants."

"We go to the Church of Christ in Ice Lake. My faith has always been important to me," Margaret shares. "We will stay here permanently now. No more moving. There are lots of friends in this area and our family visits often. We love all the seasons; each is special in its own way. Bud loves his baseball and hockey." Speaking of hockey, Bud adds, "Two years ago at the fish fry in Silver Water, I heard 'Hey Muskrat' called out by Randy Noble. I hadn't heard that since our high school years. I was thrilled that he remembered."

"Things have changed on the Island. Forty years ago, everybody had their name on a mailbox on the road and we all knew each other. Today there is more anonymity and people aren't always familiar with their neighbours. We are lucky because we know all ours. There is not a lot of traffic here. In the winter, a typical day would see three cars go by. There are more in the summer but the trees block the road from view."

"This last June was our 50th wedding

anniversary. We love to celebrate holidays with the family, our three children and eight grandchildren aged nine to 18 years. I have no regrets apart from having wanting to be an RN, but I am fine with that now. Happiness feeds from contentment. I can knit or read and be happy just to be here. The chickadees land on my shoulder and eat from my hand. Other birds come to the feeder and the deer come for their rations as well. I now realize what is really important in life. Life is glorious."

"In Beamsville, if you said hello to a stranger they would think you are a nut. Manitoulin offers a different way of life. People wave to each other driving and walking, waiting for folks to reach them. They would even cross the street to talk to an acquaintance. In the winter, if you hear a tractor at two in the morning, you know someone is in the ditch. They would leave their car and the keys in it and head home on the tractor. That's the way life is here. It's quiet and laid back, peaceful and serene. Nobody's in a hurry. That's what makes this island so special for both of us."



record is set."

Dr. Stanton said an inquiry has to be conducted in a way that people are being heard. "It should not be driven by lawyers, like myself," she continued.

Dr. Stanton said an inquiry needs the following attributes: commissioners with vision, courage and compassion, integrity, fair mindedness and a commitment to openness and transparency; a process that lends strength to its work, engages the broader community and creates knowledge and understanding through its very operations; has a clear media strategy; and creates social accountability.

"It's up to all of us to remind them of that on a regular basis," she said.

"There's no way this inquiry can investigate every case and we need to adjust our expectations," Dr. Stanton said. "We have to keep in mind that we can't expect everything we want from this inquiry. We need to hold them responsible, but take a longer view."

Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee said he was so glad to hear of the community circle, of families supporting each other and helping to lighten one another's burden.

"We're not leading the charge—we're here to support and help," the chief added. "My expectations of the inquiry are kind of low. What's going to be important is the support the families give each other."

Chief Madahbee said he's shocked when he watches American TV as the election looms. "I don't know how they put up with a man (Donald Trump) that talks so disrespectfully of a woman—we have to watch that in our community as well."

Mag Cywink, a Whitefish River First Nation band member, who spearheaded the community circle, is the sister of the late Sonya Nadine Mae, who was murdered in 1995, and a strong advocate of the families of the missing and murdered.

"My biggest concern is what came from the pre-inquiry meetings is that they wanted all national aboriginal organizations (such as the Union of Ontario Indians) to step back and let families lead," Ms. Cywink addressed the chiefs. "With the Who Is She campaign, families didn't even know about it."

Deputy Grand Chief Hare admitted that the campaign was also dropped on the leadership, who didn't know about until right before its launch.

"This is your initiative," he added.

Assessments of the building confirm that the edifice is essentially sound, a fact that Ms. Bond notes the council itself readily admits, at least in the case of the outer shell. “They told us that it needs to be completely gutted,” she said. But Ms. Bond noted that a third party report had indicated that much of the interior of the building was in fact in great shape as recent renovations had been conducted by tenants to meet their needs. “The electrical system has also been recently upgraded to a 400-amp service,” she said.

The most pressing issue is the need to replace the roof, noted Ms. Bond. “But they say that will take \$25,000 in shingles alone. We know that they could probably get a steel roof for the structure for something closer to \$15,000.” As to plumbing concerns, Ms. Bond said that there would likely be little need to make any major changes to the plumbing. “They say that will cost between \$50,000 and \$100,000, and yes it probably will, but if they left the old plumbing in place, just box it in, that would probably be a lot cheaper.”

The heating system is also a major potential cost, but Ms. Bond disputed the cost estimates in that line item as well. “That is probably the highest cost of anything,” she said. “Maybe \$250,000 to \$350,000, but I am tired of

hearing that it will cost a million and a half. When people hear that number they are ready to throw up their hands and give up. But it is not an accurate number. It is just a number that someone threw out there early on and it just keeps getting repeated.”

The Old School building has been in the community for generations, she noted, and many people consider it to be an asset worth keeping. Even though the high numbers associated with the cost have deterred some ratepayers, over 400 people have signed a petition to save the old structure.

Ms. Bond has heard some suggestion that a new building should be constructed at a cost of up to a million dollars. “That’s a million dollars for a new building when we have a perfectly good building that we could use, it doesn’t add up.”

She also pointed out that the municipality has two arenas and a number of community halls in place that do not come even close to recovering their costs. “Municipal services don’t usually have a cost recovery,” she said. “They are expected to be self sustaining.”

Ms. Bond said that she is dismayed at the lack of cultural opportunities in the municipality. “Central Manitoulin really doesn’t have anything,” she asserted. She remains convinced that there are in fact funds available to help make the project

work.

Although there has not been a major backlash to the council’s decision to shut down the building and potentially demolish the structure, Ms. Bond also noted that due to a September 28 front page headline ‘Museum proposed for Old School’ many people in the community believe the crisis has been averted and the school building saved. “Everyone kind of relaxed,” she said. “They believe it is going to be saved.”

But with the heating in the building soon to be shut off, that remains far from the case.

committee member Mary Ellen Flamand. "There was a lady from Environment Canada who came and gave a presentation."

There is a similar project underway at the Six Nations.

"We held some workshops with medicinal plants," noted Ms. Flamand. "We went out to collect seeds and now we have to have a place to store them."

The group hopes to have the South Bay greenhouse up and running by this coming January. In addition to the medicinal plants, the group also hopes to be able to raise herbs. "We want to fill it up with good things," said committee member Gail Shawande.

"This will do good for the community," said elder Teresa Shawanda. "It is positive for people in the community both young and old." One of the challenges facing those members of the community in harvesting plants that remain plentiful from the bush is a sim-

ple lack of knowledge as to what those plants look like. "Sometimes people have to wait until they flower to be able to tell what the plants are."

The loss of traditional knowledge brought about through the residential school system and its lega-

cy have come into play there as well.

"It is important to bring awareness and self-sufficiency to the community," noted Mr. Flamand, who pointed out that was a long term goal for the program. "That is our hope, especially with medicinal plants."

The project has been very much a community driven effort, to date, noted Ms. Flamand. The materials, wood, nails and plastic have been donated by people in the community. "Andy 'Duce' Manitowabi generously donated plastic for the covering, but we

need something a bit heavier," admitted Mr. Flamand. Fortunately, the proper type of plastic covering has been sourced, thanks to the assistance of biologist Judith Jones of Winter Spider Eco-Consulting.

"We even received a \$50 donation for the seed bank from an elder from Cape Croker who came to one of our workshops," noted Ms.

Flamand. "The elder was very supportive of what we are trying to do."

Actual clowns, the real deal, are serious professionals who spend years learning and honing their craft. It takes a lot more than a red nose and a bit of face paint a clown for to be. "We offer a 100-hour introductory course at the Manitoulin Conservatory for Creation and Performance (MCCP) (formerly The Clown Farm)," said Mr. Turner. "We have people who take a two-week course and then go out and try to put on a show." It is not a recipe for success. "There are people who can go out and clown naturally," he admits, "but most of us have to work hard at it. It takes self

examination, digging into self to find the centre of your creativity." Mr. Turner can point to concrete examples where, even with years of theatrical school training, attempting to successfully pull off a clown show after two weeks of courses has been a catastrophic flop.

That being said, Mr. Turner notes that it is a really unwise idea to put on a red nose and drive around scaring people. The power of anonymity can make people do stupid and silly things they would never consider without

that mask. "It is just something about that mask, the act of being anonymous that enhances those tendencies," he said. "You tend to do silly things you would never consider doing otherwise."

There is also a lot of power to be found in masks, something that does tap into our primal instincts. "Most cultures invest a lot into masks," he noted. His clown partner Michael Kennard has a vast mask collection, consisting of both masks they have created and those from around the world. Masks are a somewhat universal facet of most cultures and there is most often a power associated with the mask.

If the viewer knows that there is a familiar person behind the mask, the malevolence of the mask is muted. "It makes it an honest thing," he said.

Mr. Turner said that he suspects the people behind the creepy clown masks really do not understand the power inherent in the mask. "They haven't examined it," he suggests.

While Mump and Smoot do utilize "scary" in their performances, the audience is prepared for that, it is part of the deal when they attend the show.

"We have rules," he said. "There is an underlying understanding of the rules of engagement."

With the creepy clown phenomena, that social contract is nonexistent, there is no agreement in place between clown and audience of what the rules are and how things will unfold in the interaction. That can have terrible consequences.

"I read in the news a story about three guys who jumped out of a car and started beating the clown," he said. "It is amazing that no one has been shot."

Like most fads, Mr. Turner said he anticipates that the current creepy clown craze will run its course in a short period of time. "Maybe something good will come out of it," he quipped, "some kind of social movement."

He noted that currently there are many beneficial and benevolent clown organizations and activities that far outweigh the handful of creepy clown experiences, but

sadly get next to none of the media exposure. He cites the work of Clowns Without Borders, the adherents of the Patch Adams movement as examples.

Clowns Without Borders is an international non-profit organization which offers "resilience through laughter," aiming to "relieve the suffering of all persons, especially children, who live in areas of crisis including refugee camps, conflict zones and other situations of adversity" by partnering "with individuals and organizations to bring small teams of professional performing artists to share performances and workshops with children and their families in refugee camps, conflict zones, or with communities who have experienced trauma or crisis."

"Michael and I did a series of workshops in Israel at refugee camps in the Gaza in the 90s," he recalled. "Some of the kids were quite frightened. They had never seen a North American before and they thought we all looked like that."

As to what else is going on in the world, Mr. Turner said he was fascinated with what is going on in the American election. "I take strong offence when people refer to Trump as a clown," he said.

Thankfully, he notes, there is a growing supportive backlash to the creepy clown fad now coming from the professional clown community. "Clowns are starting to push back."



2TIM:2:25+26: "Opponents must be gently instructed, in the hope that God will grant them repentance leading them to a knowledge of the truth, and that they will come to their senses and escape from the trap of the Devil, who has taken them captive (with lies) to do his will." In JOHN 8:30-44 Jesus explains that Satan is the father of lies and that believing lies will put you in bondage to Satan and that knowing the truth can set you free. 





Assiginack Council Notes

Spiffy corner lot

Councillor Hugh Moggy noted a job well done on the corner lot at Queen and Arthur Streets, which will be transformed into a seniors' park by next spring. Mayor Paul Moffatt added that benches are on their way that will be installed with some people coming forward looking to sponsor the new benches.

Planning Board sans Northeast Town

After a review of the Manitoulin Planning Board minutes, Councillor Leslie Fields asked about the Northeast Town leaving the board by January.

"Will they have everything in place by January?" she asked.

"Do we know how this will affect our cost to the Planning Board yet?" she added.

"No, not yet," Mayor Moffatt responded.

Councillor Moggy asked if the Planning Board will be able to reduce staff as a cost saving measure.

"Not really," the mayor said. "There won't be the same amount of business."

"That's too bad," said Councillor Moggy.

Norisle surveys

Council received two quotes for marine surveys for the Norisle—one for interior, the other for exterior—as required by the municipality's insurance company.

"We have spent most of

the summer looking at what and where we might send the Norisle and the lowest common denominator for the insurance company has the requirement for surveys to confirm that the vessel is indeed seaworthy and can make any trip," a report to council states.

"We have found companies that will do these surveys and they have provided cost estimates for us," the report continues. The report noted that while it was not in the 2016 capital budget, it was recommended to do them for three reasons:

If the vessel is not seaworthy, the problem is much more difficult to address;

If the surveys are completed, the municipality might be able to get estimates for moving the vessel to a final destination and without these estimates, the municipality can't lobby the senior government levels for financial assistance; and

If the surveys are done now, Assiginack can lobby through the winter at the Ontario Good Roads/Rural Ontario Municipalities Association conference.

The motion to hire the two companies was carried.

McLean's Park, Outside the Box

Council reviewed a letter from Heather Thoma, Outside the Box program

coordinator with 4elements Living Arts, asking to place a drawing box on the McLean's Park trail.

The beautifully made wooden boxes will be attached to a tree with soft webbing straps, two to three kilometres into each trail. Each drawing box will be geocached and inside visitors will find art materials such as drawing paper, pencils, pens, trail maps and hiking and stretching information. Visitors will be invited to make a drawing to leave for a future visitor and to take the drawing that was left by the previous hiker.

The drawing boxes invite people to slow down, make a drawing, stop, breathe, stretch and observe before continuing along their walk.

Each box will be linked to geocaching.com so that the caches will be accessible to thousands of people. Each visitor will be encouraged to post a picture of themselves with the box and their drawing to the Outside the Box social media pages.

Council all told Ms. Thoma, who was in attendance, what a good idea it was and approved the drawing box for McLean's Park trail.

Accounts for payment

Council approved the following accounts for payment: general, \$136,954.89; and payroll, \$19,032.87.

OPP billing

Assiginack received its Ontario Provincial Police annual billing statement at \$23,294 monthly, which is a slight increase over last year.

Application to new grant

Assiginack will be applying to the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund (CWWF), a new fund announced in the 2016 federal budget that will invest up to \$569.6 million in Ontario for immediate improvements to water distribution and treatment infrastructure.

CWWF will provide municipalities with vital infrastructure funding to help accelerate short term investments to support the rehabilitation and modernization of drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and the planning and design of future facilities and upgrades to existing systems. All recipients receive a minimum of \$75,000.

She also stressed the home's need for more PSWs and that the home was advertising for vacant positions.

Financial report

He reported that the biggest issue was overspending in nursing last month, leading the home to be at a \$14,000 deficiency year to date, though the nursing element was now under control and he was anticipating that the home would break even by the end of the year.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Fire Department

Northeast Town Fire Chief Darren Bailey reported that there had been two calls for service in October so far. The first was on October 9 when the department responded to a possible propane leak on Draper Street East. The second was on October 17 when the department responded to a fire alarm at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre. Fire Chief Bailey also reported that the fire trucks and general equipment was in good working order.

Community services and public works

Reid Taylor presented council with the October community services report. In terms of the recreation centre, Mr. Taylor said that the ice schedule is in full swing and staff are busy prepping for upcoming events and completing maintenance, repair and painting tasks.

"This month at the recreation centre there are Skate Canada programs, Manitoulin Panther games and practices, Manitoulin Secondary School (boys) hockey games begin on Friday, Minor Hockey begins their season and user group programs have begun such as ballet, martial arts and fitness programs," said Mr. Taylor.

Mr. Taylor also reported that all the outdoor buildings are winterized and closed.

"Spider Bay Marina is

closed for the season, as is the port of Little Current," said Mr. Taylor. "All marine buildings are shut down and winterized and the port of Little Current docks are ready to be moved into Spider Bay for the winter. The museum closes at the end of the month."

Kevin Dunlop presented the public works report to council. He said that ditching and culvert replacement was underway and staff were spot grading on the roads where needed. Staff has also been working on Campbell Street construction. The landfill, he noted, is now open Tuesdays and Saturdays from 9 am to 3 pm.

"The base preparation is underway for the salt/sand shed for the Little Current yard," he added.

Building controls

Council reviewed a copy

of the building controls report for October. The report noted that there has been a total of 41 permits issued to date and at present there are another two applications that have been submitted and are under review. The total value of construction to date is \$3,858,698, with a total building permit revenue of \$48,995.61.

Zoning amendments

Council carried a motion to amend zoning bylaw No. 2002-31, permitting the site specific use of an animal hospital with no outdoor housing of animals or kennels within the subject property in a residential zone. The property, 30 Meredith Street East, will be the future home of The Island Animal Hospital. The proponent told council that they are excited to bring this service to Little

Current and hope to have the business open in the spring.

Council also carried a motion to amend zoning bylaw No. 2002-31, rezoning 35 Draper Street from residential to multiple family residential. Council discussed how there had been submissions with regards to this property and drainage concerns. Staff assured council that there is sufficient drainage in the area, but that drainage is not a zoning issue and that a site plan will be triggered under the change to multiple family residential.

Transfer payment agreement

Council carried a motion to grant staff permission to enter into a transfer payment agreement with the Ministry of Housing and Municipal Affairs to

receive \$17,284.31 to pay accumulated tax arrears incurred on First Nations' land in the municipality.

Fuel tender

Council accepted the fuel

tender from Manitoulin Fuels as staff identified it as lower overall than the bid from New North Fuels Inc.

Soil testing

Take soil samples from your fields (0-15 cm soil depth for basic soil tests and micronutrients, and 0-30 cm for nitrate nitrogen and sulphur) if you haven't done the soil tests for the last three years. Go for micronutrients tests, especially for zinc and boron, if you haven't tested your soils for micronutrients in the recent past. Remember sustaining crop yields with the application of NPK fertilizers alone isn't possible any more. You may wish to test alfalfa, soybean, canola and corn fields for nitrogen and sulphur too, as soon as the soil temperature comes to 10-14°C or below, so that you are able to discount some residual/or fixed N from these crops next spring. At low temperatures, there is no significant transformation/or losses of nutrients. For details on soil sampling and testing, refer to Agronomy

Guide for Field Crops (Section Soil Testing: www.omafra.gov.on.ca/english/crops/pub811/9soil.htm or Soil Fertility Guide. The economic and environmental benefits from a sound fertilizer program, based on soil tests, could be many times the cost of soil testing. If you don't have time for soil sampling yourself, look for someone providing custom soil sampling/testing services to producers in your area at a reasonable cost.

Manure testing

Fertilizers are one of the costliest inputs for crop production. Test manure for its nutrients content to decide on the right rates of manure and fertilizers application to minimize costs on nutrients application/and environmental impacts, and to obtain maximum economic yields. Fol-



The contractor, from the beginning of the work, has failed, dismally, in the area of traffic control. The crews don't exhibit any concept of the principles of traffic control. Their approach to such control is ludicrous! Allow an extra hour to reach your destination if you are travelling east on Hwy 17, to compensate for the unnecessary delay at this project.
