Farmers demand wolf bounty back following loss of sheep to coyotes

MANITOULIN—Howland farmers Lynn Bond and Gary May lost six of their sheep this fall to coyotes, prompting the couple and their neighbours to seek the coyote bounty brought back to the

municipality.

"We had the flock in a 10 acre field off the Green Bush Road," explained Ms. Bond. "Every morning I go to check on the flock, which is guarded by two lamas, following my bus run. I

had the sheep trained to come when I whistle, but on the morning of September 14 only seven of the sheep came to me."

When Ms. Bond went looking for the rest of the flock, she found them dead and ran home to call the municipal wildlife compensation evaluator, Jack Wood.

Despite the field being fenced in, Mr. Wood told Ms. Bond and Mr. May that a coyote, and most likely one with young pups, had gotten through and separated the four sheep and two lambs. "Based on what they ate and the kills, Mr. Wood said it was likely an adult and four or five pups," said Ms. Bond. "They ate one and started on another and just left the rest dead. I was really upset. I had them all named. I got compensated, but it's not the same. I don't know the new ... continued on page 10

Island turned out to be very important to Carol Hughes' campaign for re-election with voters giving the NDP incumbent almost half of her plurality between second place Liberal candidate Heather Wilson.

Five thousand, five hundred and fifty-four votes were cast on Manitoulin and Birch Island with the following breakdown: 2,649 for Carol Hughes, NDP; 128 in favour of Cal Orok, Green; 1,116 cast for André Robichaud, Conservative; and 1,661 for Heather Wilson, Liberal. The difference between Ms. Hughes' and Ms. Wilson's vote on Manitoulin is 988. Throughout the riding of Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing (AMK), Ms. Hughes won the seat with 16,516 votes to Ms. Wilson's 14,374—a difference of 2,142 votes.

The majority of Manitoulin's 33 polls voted in favour of Ms. Hughes while Little Current Poll No. 91, Big Lake-Sandfield, 169, Minde-

Espanola and District Credit Union members to vote on Northern merger

MANITOULIN-The Espanola and District Credit Union (EDCU) held an open house in Little Current last week, together with the senior staff of the Northern Credit Union, to share the plans of the merger between the two credit unions and the news that without it, the EDCU's future is grim.

Jim Gilpin, chair of the EDCU board, gave opening remarks on behalf of the board, telling the group of largely employees and board members that the merger will be a positive thing for members and employees.

Lindsay Liske, EDCU CEO, told the audience that there is a large

shift starting within the credit union system. "Banks and other credit unions are becoming more aggressive," he said, noting the decreased margins being seen and even pointing to the large layoffs announced by TD Canada Trust. In 2009, there were 186 credit unions in Ontario and by 2014 there were only 117, this due largely to mergers.

Money is going out at a low interest rate and it's those margins that keep the branches going and employees paid, Mr. Liske added. He also pointed to an aging membership, a lack of advertising dollars and the stiff competition from the "free of bricks and mortar" institutions like PC or ING Direct. Northern, he added, has the means to deal with all of this, extolling the virtues of Northern's \$1 billion in assets. In fact, he shared, the EDCU had picked up a new major client that week because of the news of the proposed merger. Currently, the EDCU can give a commercial loan up to \$560,000—Northern can give a commercial loan topping \$12 million.

"It's currently costing \$110,000 a vear just to run the banking system," Mr. Liske continued. "It's getting prohibitive to offer extra services.'

Old Mill Heritage Centre Military Display hosts thousands of items



KAGAWONG-The Old Mill Heritage Centre is bringing the past alive for a new generation with its annual Military Display, slated to begin on November $\overline{1}$.

We are really excited about this year's Military Display," said Old Mill Heritage Centre Curator Rick Nelson. "This is the largest display of items from the WWII period we have ever had. There are lots more than we had last year.'

Among the displays will be a vintage WWII Harley Davidson motorcycle on loan from collector Christian Shoebridge. The 1943 Harley Davidson will be joined by a #19 radio set from a Sherman tank, an autographed copy of 'Mein kampf' that came from the Hans Frank library. Mr. Frank was Hitler's lawyer and it was rumored that the copy was a gift from Hitler to Mr. Frank. Included in the display is a complete collection of every gun the Canadian forces used during the Second World War, a set of surveying equipment for making trench maps during the First World War, a large display of medal groupings along with lots of original photos, paintings and documents that have never been shown.

In an exclusive for the museum, those photographs include an autographed photo of General

Bernard Montgomery, explained Mr. Nelson, adding that "we will line the walls with them."

There will also be a large bayonet and edged weapon display, a Boer War exhibit, a gas mask exhibit covering a century of use plus many more Nazi artifacts and mannequins than last year.

The display will take place from November 1 to the 11, from noon to 4 pm. The November 11 opening will follow the Remembrance Day ceremonies in Kagawong. Admission is free.

Flu shot season has arrived

MANITOULIN-The dreaded flu season is here and it's time to review what we can do to avoid contracting and spreading the flu virus. According to the Ontario government (www. ontario.ca/page/flu-

facts), "seasonal flu activity can begin as early as October and continue

as late as May. Peak flu season is in a 10 to 16 week period that usually starts in December. Between 10 percent and 20 percent of the popula-tion will get the flu each year."

What is the flu?

The flu, short for influenza, is an infection of the upper airway that is caused by an influenza virus.

Influenza spreads easily through coughing, sneezing, or having faceto-face contact. Touching tiny droplets from a cough or a sneeze on another person or object and then touching your own eyes, mouth or nose before washing your hands can result in infection.

Symptoms include fever, muscle aches and extreme fatigue and are more serious than the comparatively lesser symptoms of a cold.

The risk of complications from the flu include pneumonia and is greater for seniors 65 years and older, very young children, women in the second half of their pregnancy and people who have certain chronic health conditions or weakened immune systems. If you develop flulike symptoms and you have a condition that puts you at higher risk of complications, consult your health care provider.

Flu prevention

There are many choices available when it comes to making decisions about our health. Many people find relief through a wide range of medical and non-medical practices such as mainstream medicine, naturopathy, homeopathy, aboriginal medicine and traditional Chinese medicine, to name a few.

First Nation voter turnout hits record highs across the nation

CANADA—Somewhere along his spirit journey the late great Tom Peltier of Wikemikong is doubtlessly smiling down upon the results of the 2015 election. The longtime First Nation political activist, senior bureaucrat and member of both the Lester B. Pearson and Pierre Elliott Trudeau prime ministers' offices could often be found in possession of a cloth bag filled with charts and figures identifying those electoral districts where the First Nation vote held the balance of power, should they chose to exercise their franchise. The nearly 70 percent increase in the number of First Nations electors who cast their ballots in the 2015 federal election fulfills one of his long-held dreams.

Mr. Peltier firmly believed that the path to adding the clout necessary to encourage the political will needed to deal with First Nation issues lay in the ballot box and increasing voter turnout amongst the First Nations. Increasing that turnout, especially

amongst First Nation youth, the fastest growing demographic in the country, was one of the many projects Mr. Peltier was working on when he began his spirit journey

He would have appreciated the irony of Assembly of First Nations Chief Perry Belgarde (who admitted that he himself had not voted in previous federal elections) proclaiming a list of 51 ridings identified as 'swing ridings' where the First Nation vote could decide the difference. Mr. Peltier's list matched Mr. Belgarde's, with the caveat of some modified boundaries, but until this election, First Nation leadership had been ambivalent, if not outright hostile, to participating in federal elections.

National chiefs of the Assembly of First Nations, such as Georges Erasmus and Ovide Mercredi, also questioned the utility of voting in their time. The AFN and other First Nation leadership's stance on participation was not arrived at lightly nor out of

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

Justin must now walk the talk of Real Change promises

The dust has begun to settle and Canada is becoming used to the notion that the fellow his opponents dismissed publicly as the man with "nice hair" is now our prime minister and, by the way, presiding over an enormous majority government.

That is the person the country began to call simply "Justin," in a familiar way, as the campaign wore on.

Clearly, his positive campaign charmed more voters than did the promises made by the other two main national parties, but starting right about now, "Justin" will be put to the test to start making good on those election commitments, at least on enough of them to make a noticeable difference to voters.

He promised to follow through with the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) on residential schools. There were a lot of recommendations that came out of Chief Commissioner Murray Sinclair's findings, so implementing them all would be a tall order.

But the education of Canadians, in our school systems (including those of First Nations ancestry, those descended from European pioneers and those new and relatively new Canadians with their heritage stemming from Asia, Africa, the Caribbean and Central and South America) in the history of Canada's First Nations peoples' relationships with the governors and governments of our country during the past 250 years is something that must be ongoing and Justin is in the perfect place at the perfect time to initiate and to make this renewal of that relationship an important part of both his own and his government's legacy.

Island artist, playwright and film director Dr. Shirley Cheechoo has just been named Chancellor of Brock University in St. Catharines and, in her inaugural remarks when she was installed in this position, Dr. Cheechoo stated that it was her intent to encourage Brock to develop an important centre for aboriginal studies.

In the first days following the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, M'Chigeeng elder Grace Fox, who sits as a trustee on the Rainbow District School Board, is a former Director of Education with the Wikwemikong Board of Education and is herself a residential school survivor, in an exclusive interview with this newspaper called for a national Aboriginal Education Institute whose role it would be to develop curriculum on aboriginal issues (including the residential school period) that could be used by school boards in the fulfillment of that most important recommendation of the TRC.

No doubt Dr. Cheechoo's and Ms. Fox's expectations are being echoed nationally, so this is an important topic in which the new prime minister can involve himself and, in so doing, fulfill the implied expectation that with the TRC and its recommendations there will be tangible outcomes, other than just the TRC exercise in and of itself.

Justin and his new government also campaigned on changing the federal election balloting process to one that is deemed more representative of the popular vote. It is not unusual for such a proposed change to be fairly quickly forgotten in the event the party promising change wins a majority government, as the Liberals just have done.

The Ontario provincial Liberals, when Dalton McGuinty was premier, promised to investigate alternative balloting systems and indeed convened a Citizens' Assembly on Electoral Reform with delegates from every riding in addition to youth delegates. This group dutifully met for over a year, selected an option called Mixed Member Proportional as their preferred option to the traditional first past the post system of selecting majority (or minority) government and then put the option to a referendum for Ontarians to consider for change. The problem was, the governing Ontario Liberals, in their majority position, did not appear to support the change the Citizens' Assembly proposed and in consequence, when voters went to the polls in the October 2007 provincial election, and were asked to also select a possible alternative method of balloting for the next election to come along, the government had done virtually nothing to clarify and explain a new and relatively complex alternative and so the vote for change failed largely because people weren't clear what they would be voting for with the new system and so voted for the status quo.

If Justin and the Liberal government are to be true to their election promise, they definitely should not take a page from former Ontario Premier McGuinty's playbook.

If we are to consider alternatives to electing governments (and there are several other than the one Ontarians rejected several years ago) then they should make an honest and open undertaking and do their best to explain clearly to Canadians the merits of each of the alternatives.

(In the case of the Ontario referendum by way of example, the person assigned to "explain" the Mixed Member Proportional option in our Algoma-Manitoulin riding was given limited car allowance, minimal equipment and could only make presentations when she was sought out so it became very clear that the government was not invested in change of this kind.)

Justin and the new Liberal government, having promised the possibility of change, even though they now have elected a significant majority government, must be true to their word and sincerely give Canadians options to consider, with full explanations.

These are only two examples, drawn from their campaign, of what the Liberals promised Canadians.

It is a good thing that the prime minister elect will himself be attending next month's United Nations-sponsored climate change summit and that he has invited the other national party leaders and the provincial and territorial leaders to attend with him. This is an exemplary gesture of how seriously this government sees this issue.

Hopefully, action on the TRC recommendations (at least some of them) and the promise to investigate the electoral process will also soon follow from the Prime Minister's Office, as we anticipate this new government will be true to its promises.

Manitoulin's best kept secret park is outed

Blue Jay Creek Park remains a jewel to be discovered

To the Expositor:

On Manitoulin we have a secret park of 600 acres in Tehkummah Township given to Ontario by the Hindman family.

Blue Jay Creek Park contains some of the largest raised beach and swale system on Manitoulin Island. Upland willow thickets are found at the beaches higher elevations. The forest cover is a mixture of cedar, spruce, and pine, and the extensive wetlands in the area include cedar, black spruce, and black ash swamp forest, open and tree bogs, treed fens and riparian marshes. The park also includes a portion of Blue Jay Creek.

Location: The park is located 12 kilometres from the town of Tehkummah. The southwest boundary, however, follows the high water mark of Michael's Bay. It is accessible by using King Street in Michael's Bay and crossing Manitou River when the water is low. The park offers a variety of recreational settings suitable for canoeing, hunting, fishing, nature appreciation and exploration. Snowmobile and all-terrain vehicle (ATV) use may occur on tertiary roads in the area. Future management planning will review all uses, including snowmobile and ATV use, to ensure that park features and values are protected, and to assess the potential for these uses to conflict with other uses. A meeting was held with government officials to discuss having a nature trail.

A meeting was held with Ontario government officials regarding Blue Jay Park and it was agreed to go ahead for a nature trail for tourists and the public to appreciate.

Bill and Mary Caesar

The heart-warming and freeflowing optimism that is characteristic of Bill Caesar colours his interpretation of events and enhances the shared experience for the listener. Bill has spent much of his life illuminating icons of Manitoulin's history, such as the numerous fossils that line the shores and the beloved swing bridge which recently celebrated its 100th anniversary. This event was enriched by a book Bill authored, 'Bridging the Centuries,' for which his son wrote the poetic narrative. Other works include: 'Manitoulin Fossils', 'Northern Crafts,' and 'Mani-toulin Shipwrecks.' These books have been published and well-sold to history buffs on and off the Island. Bill taught at MSS prior to their retirement, heading the guidance department for many years and both he and his wife Mary, also a teacher, have shared their knowledge and their love of teaching with others who have been lucky enough to cross their paths.

Bill's family hailed from the Cameron and Campbell clan of Northern Ireland. In 1850, the family came to the farmland of Gaspé, along the northern St. Lawrence in Quebec. Maternal grandfather George Pidgeon graduated from the University of Montreal in 'religious studies' and his work established him as a family hero. His education had been sponsored by his aunt and uncle, the Montgomery family of PEI. Years later, a member of their family, Lucy Maud Montgomery, wrote the beloved 'Anne of Green Gables.

In 1936, George Pidgeon became the first Moderator of the newlyformed United Church in Canada. He was a kind, gentle man who lived to be 99 years old. He was delivering wonderful sermons at the Bloor St. United Church well in to his 90s despite being blind the last 10 years of his life.

"Dad was a Rhodes Scholar with a Doctorate in Chemistry. He had a left leaning persuasion and had been tempted to join the forces in Spain fighting against General Franco, but he was dissuaded by his parents from a likely death." Cameron later moved to Canada, settling in Sarnia where he had a job in the chemical valley there. Cameron Caesar had met his wife Helen at her Muskoka cottage. "The cottage had been in the family since 1930. There was no road, no hydro at the time, only water access. It was paradise to us." Bill was born to Cameron and Helen (nee Pidgeon) Caesar on June 5, 1942 in Sarnia. A brother George and two sisters, Mary and Eleanor, completed the family. "I remember my mum reading to me from Arthur Ransome's 'Swal-lows and Amazons' series," Bill explains. "A canoe trip with my dad to Temagami and Algonquin Park stands out too." "Years later, we traded a paddle for a sail and toured the North Channel, starting in the early 1960s, stopping in Little Current for ice cream. We sailed many parts of the world but always came back to the North Channel. My dad felt that this was the most



beautiful part of the world. It included Fraser Bay, the Portage Couvert west of Killarney where the Voyageurs paddled their canoes, and the smooth rock of the Benjamin Islands."

School was 'a bit of a drag' for a boy with dyslexia, a perceptual disorder, not fully understood at the time. It was often seen in above-average students. Acting out to compensate for reading problems could become a distraction for the class. Bill was also colour-blind for the blue-green part of the spectrum. "One day, in Grade 1, I decided I didn't like the hat Mrs. Hext was wearing. It was a flowery explosion that met its early demise when I flushed it down the toilet. Unfortunately, this was the only toilet and it was plugged all day. Mrs. Hext was so angry she decided to call the police if nobody owned up to the dastardly deed. At that point, I had to admit that I was the culprit and she was not happy with me then or ever after."

Bill was very glad to get out of public school. After high school Bill attended the Waterloo Lutheran University (now Wilfred Laurier University) and in 1965 graduated with a degree in psychology. As Bill was graduating, he read about Louis Leakey and the anthropological work he was doing in Tanzania. Louis and his wife Mary were famous for their part of the discovery of the 3.2 million year old 'Lucy' fossil remains. "I was keenly interested in fossils so I wrote to him and asked him if I could join him in doing some of his research. I was floored when he wrote back saying 'yes.' I saved my pennies, got on a tramp steamer and travelled 12 days to England with 600 partying university youths. It was a thrilling ride complete with stormy seas and a huge Canadian anti-sub plane that passed overhead and made me proud to be a Canadian."

Unfortunately, Mr. Leakey did not show up for the meeting. Bill was not discouraged by this setback. "The Beatles were all the rage there and I got a job in a hospital transferring live and dead bodies to their assigned locations." His brother George and a friend came to England to spend some time with Bill. "We got a good deal on a 25-foot 'Folk' boat for \$3,000 in communist Poland where they loved the Canadian dollar. It had a Volvo diesel engine, four beds and a lot of mahogany to shine.'

That May, the boys spent four months travelling in their sailboat, Paranoia, through East Germany, Poland and the Scandinavian countries. "During that time, we paid only \$10 for bunker diesel fuel because we were under sail most of the time. We used road maps because we had no nautical charts and consequently wound up on a few rocks. Wonderful people helped us." One German man gave them the royal treatment. He had attended school with Bill's dad before being inducted into the German army in 1939. "My dad had supported the family after his friend had been captured in Russia."

Mary's grandfather Gibson had gone to Germany before the First World War to coach a rowing team. Her father and his brother were born in Germany. When war broke out, Mary's grandmother took the two boys and returned to Putney, England. Her grandmother opened a fishmonger's shop and eventually her grandfather came back home. Both grandparents died quite young in the late 1940s, he of heart disease and she of cancer. Mary was just three at the time and her brother Charles was seven. "My maternal grandfather, Ernest Easton, was broken in the trenches of WWI. He had a 'hard mongers' store, (hardware store)" she shares, "but he also died of cancer at a young age".

Mary was born on March 27, 1944 to Jack and Nancy Gwendolyn (nee Gibson) Arno. Her father was away during the war and her mother did her best to keep the family safe. Clothes had to be mended and re-mended. With food rationing, even a spoiled jar of jam was a big deal. Races to shelter in bomb shelters at night were the norm. "The doodle-bug bombs, the V-1 and V-2 bombs, were so plentiful at the end of the war, and they were scary," Mary confirms. "After the war, many unexploded bombs had to be detonated. It was frightening to come across a bomb that could be live but I don't remember anyone being injured."

A CONTRACT OF A

teaching physical education as a career which she honed with public (private) school courses later, funded partially by her grandparents who believed girls should have the same opportunities as boys. Mary coached a lot of younger students at the school. In her last year, when her dad was sick, the funds ran out but the school let her stay because they were so happy with her work. Next came Dartford College of Physical Education for a teaching certificate. "Looking back, I had a happy childhood even though times were tough for us. My dad succumbed to heart disease at 59. My mother lived to be 89.'

Mary recalls her first meeting with Bill at the Rectory Secondary School, a non-academic school that hosted 'real kids from real families.' "Here was this handsome Canadian man who had his own motorcycle. He fit well into the young staff at the school and had a good personality to boot." Both had previous attachments but the new relationship soon took precedence despite a natural British reticence. Bill smiles as he recalls that first year when school lunches saved he and his brother from starvation.

The following spring, Bill asked his sister Mary to chaperone when the new couple decided to take a boat trip. They recalled a stormy crossing back to England with the boat well-heeled so the washroom was unattainable. Mary went below to make sandwiches and brought them up to the cockpit. Bill asked her for some mustard and salt. At that moment a huge wave hit the boat and submerged the sailors and the sandwiches. Mary quipped, was helped by a Dutch Jewish family. "The father had a big barge. He kept us afloat and towed us to shore. Mary and sister, Mary, returned to England. Sister Mary swore she would never sail again on anything smaller than the Queen Mary."

The Dutch father told Bill he would take care of Paranoia. Bill was to return in a few months. "When I got back the following spring, the motor was fixed, the boat painted and the wood varnished." Canadians had helped the Dutch and to Bill's amazement, the man would not take money from a Canadian.

The following year, Bill was homesick for Canada and he hoped his sweetheart would consider moving. It was a hard decision for Mary to leave her home but she wanted to be with Bill. The couple were wed in the old Anglican Church in Richmond on April 5, 1969. Bill's brother George and his sister Mary attended. "My mother made my dress," Mary adds. "Devon was the honeymoon capital. It was beautiful but everyone else there was on their honeymoon too."

Soon, the Paranoia was sold and airline tickets to Canada purchased. "My mum had spotted this ad for teachers needed for the new high school on Manitoulin

and I got the job before we left." Bill holds, "Prospective teachers and principals from all over Ontario would meet at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto once a year. It was much like a cattle auction, in my opinion. Luckily I missed that. That first year at MSS (1969-70) was such an incredible year. Most kids were excited to be there, especially those, it seemed, from the distant corners of the Island."

Mary got a job at MSS too. "It was a dream job," she confirms. "The kids made it marvelous. I loved

teaching the girls' basketball, track and field, and volleyball which was new to her and also to most of the kids. That first year, Manitoulin teams swept the Northern finals in track and field and cross-country competitions."

had two and sixpence between us, so I decided do get teaching jobs. I went into town and was told that I had the job if I could find the school." Bill found the school and he also found pretty Mary Gibson who was running a sailing club at the school.

It was stressful negotiating the English Channel beset with huge boats that were not particularly mindful of a small sailboat. Their radar didn't pick up Paranoia's wooden hull. After some close calls, the young men moored further up the Thames River, in Teddington where they had facilities for small boats. "My brother and I

"My dad was a rower and he umpired a lot of regattas on the Thames. I remember handing out programs for the races at the riverfront. Once I presented a bouquet of flowers to the mayor." Mary went to a private (here, public) school, St. Paul's Girl's School in London. Her school had a swimming pool and proper sports facilities which hosted net ball and lacrosse. Mary starred in physical education.

This skill helped her choose

"Well now we just need the mustard." That was a defining moment for Bill. "I knew I had met the lady I wanted to spend the rest of my life with."

"During that trip, I took some photos of a German destroyer, only to find their guns rotating to point right at us. When they began to shoot, we absolutely panicked until we realized they were shooting above us, at a distant target." Paranoia's diesel engine broke down near Holland. Bill

Bill was told not to take his wife into the woods because morels would drop out of the trees and attack him. He had bought a .410 shotgun before he realized they were talking about mushrooms. Bill taught regular classes and he shared guidance counselling with Roy Eaton, whom he soon admired. "The guidance staff made working in that department an absolutely amazing experience," he emphasizes. "I also enjoyed the sense of humour of the Anishinabe kids and found strength in the mix of cultures at the school." That first year also saw an unspeakable tragedy on Hwy 6 (then Hwy 68) when two car-loads of kids collided on a hill between Manitowaning and

"The Ministry of Transportation issued an encroachment permit to the town to allow construction of a detour, but it was not to be implemented until a traffic plan was approved by the ministry," explained Gordan Rennie, MTO regional issues and media advisor. "The plan submitted did not meet MTO standards as the speed limit on the highway cannot be lowered without an Ontario Regulation change, which would take several months.'

Northeast Town CAO David Williamson explained that a delay dur-

ing this time of year is not acceptable as all highway roadwork must be paved, as per ministry standards, with asphalt plants soon to shut down due to the imminent cold weather.

"This now gives us the time to do it right," Mr. Williamson said, adding

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


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Island Cross Country

Reggie Leach, the Riverton Rifle, releases biography

Book gives readers intimate look into his life and the man behind the jersey

by Robin Burridge **RIVERTON**—Retired NHL player Reggie Leach released his biography this past weekend, 'The Riverton Rifle: My Story-Straight Shooting on Hockey and on Life,' in his home town of Riverton, Manitoba, surrounded by family and his biggest supporters

Mr. Leach was drafted third overall by the Boston Bruins in the 1970 NHL amateur draft, playing 13 seasons in the NHL with the Boston Bruins, California Golden Seals, Detroit Red Wings, and the Philadelphia Flyers, winning the Stanley Cup with the Flyers in 1975.

Most famously, Mr. Leach was one of the few players to win the Conn Smythe Trophy as the most valuable player of the Stanley Cup playoffs in 1976, as a player on the losing team. During that season he also set a record for most goals scored in a single playoff season with 19 goals.

Mr. Leach retired from the NHL in 1984 and began 'Shoot to Score Hockey' with his son Jamie Leach, also a retired NHL player.

"I've been tossing the idea around (of writing a book) for a lot of years," Mr. Leach, who resides with his wife Dawn in Audeck Omni Kaning First Nation, told The Expositor last week.

He was finally pushed to write the book after being encouraged by a friend, and was connected with Grey Stone Publishing in Vancouver who expressed interest in the prospect.

"That was 15 months ago and it's been a lot of work," said Mr. Leach. "The hardest part was going back so many years and talking to people in my hometown, making sure I get everything right. I also worked with a great ghostwriter out of Toronto to help me tell my story. My wife Dawn really helped out a lot too. She knew how to pull stuff out of me—it was a lot of fun working together. After we got it all written it was a lot of back and forth with the publishers. It was a relief when it was finally all finished."

"The story follows me from growing up in my home town (Riverton) and goes from decade to decade from my years with the Bombers (the Flin Flon Bombers, MJHL) to my NHL years. The book is a lot of hockey stories, but its main focus is about the life choices people make," said Mr. Leach referencing his struggles with alcoholism and his almost 30 year sobriety. "You read too many books where people blame everyone else for their mistakes, but I

focus on the fact that whatever choices I made. made them. Good or bad, you need to own your choices.' The book


also integrates Mr. Leach's Ojibwe roots, and the Seven Grandfather Teachings

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

files from Tom Sasvari LAKE MINDEMOYA—The United Fish and Game Clubs of Manitoulin (UFGCM) is still awaiting a decision from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) regarding an application the club submitted for a proposed walleye hatchery on Lake Min-demoya, and will likely be waiting a few years as the MNRF told the club at a recent meeting that it will be deferring any decisions regarding stocking the lake until reviewing the results of the 2017 Fall Walleye Index Netting (FWIN) survey.

"An application has been received and we are still in discussions with the club,' commented MNRF biologist with the Sudbury district office Wayne Selinger regarding the UFGCM's

walleye hatchery. "Given that decisions regarding stocking Lake Mindemoya have been deferred pending the results of the 2017 netting survey, we are uncertain as to whether the club should invest significant time and money in a new facility if the only intent for the facility is to stock Lake Mindemoya. We are encouraging investment in the existing Kagawong facility to increase capacity there. Having said this, approval of an additional walleve culture facility on the Island is not necessarily linked to a decision regarding Lake Mindemova. There are other lakes on the Island to be stocked including Lakes Kagawong, Silver and Tobacco.'

Mr. Selinger After reviewed the results of the most recent walleye survey

UFGCM expressed that they would like the next Lake Mindemova FWIN to be carried out in 2016 because of the time it takes to complete and review the survey results.

UFGCM Chair Jim Sloss said that the MNRF report shows "that they had two year classes (walleye) that were failures and they want more data to see if this trend continues, (and if so) that they would have to consider stocking fall fingerlings because the lake is so big, and while we don't disagree with that, we feel the need is there now."

Despite the clubs' wishes, Mr. Selinger said that the MNRF is "not committed at this point to do the survey in 2016.'

"We will consider what the club has requested and consider the revisited timSelinger. "The problem I see is by doing the survey in 2016 it would mean getting information earlier, but there would be one year less data. We don't want to rush in 2016 so we have four full years of data.'

"MNRF has evaluated the status of walleye populations in Lake Mindemoya five times since 1997 using the FWIN protocol," said Mr. Selinger. "Walleye pop-ulation dynamics have been irreversibly altered in Lake Mindemoya over this time period as a direct result of the introduction of invasive species (zebra mussels and rainbow smelt). Walleye abundance has declined significantly since 1997 due in part to reductions in primary productivity and zooplankton abundance owing to zebra mussels. Juvenile walleye feed primarily on

survival can be expected in response to food limitations caused by zebra mussels."

"More recently, rainbow smelt were introduced to the ecosystem, at some point between 2005 and 2009 and the abundance of smelt has increased dramatically since 2009," continued Mr. Selinger. "Smelt affect walleye population dynamics in two ways: smelt are a readily available, high energy food source and their presence has increased walleye growth, condition and survival; and, smelt have been blamed for recruitment failure in a variety of species including walleye as a result of competition for available zooplankton and predation on early life stages. Walleye recruitment in Lake Mindemoya is weaker and more sporadic presently than it has been in the past.'

"However, walleye are still recruiting naturally to the population in the presence of smelt as evidenced by a strong 2010 year class and a lesser 2011 year explained class.' Mr. Selinger. "Despite an 80 percent reduction in abundance, at the current level of productivity, the populacompares still tion favourably against provincial benchmarks for expected biomass and sustainable

"The new reality for Lake Mindemoya is simply fewer bigger walleye," stated Mr. Selinger. "Carrying capacity has been reduced by zebra mussels and walleve are growing faster and earlier maturing in response to the presence of smelt. Unfortunately, such changes are irreversible.'

Mr. Selinger said, "some lakes invaded by smelt do end up requiring supplemental or put-grow-take stocking; however, the best course of action at the present time for Lake Mindemoya is to continue monitoring for natural recruitment. We plan to complete another FWIN survey in October 2017 in order to stay on a four-year cycle. Optimistically, we will see continued natural recruitment in the years ahead.'

Mr. Selinger summarized that, "It's all about invasives, zebra mussels have had an impact on the production of the lake and the smelt can interfere with fish recruitment as well. If by 2017 there is no tangible recruitment, we will be all on board with stocking.'

The campaign launched this summer with the goal to raise \$100,000 to replace the ailing nurses call bell system which is the communication system between the nurse's desk, the residents' rooms and common areas. When assistance is required by a resident, the bell is rung and the nurses on the desk respond.

... continued from page 1 said Chancellor Cheechoo in her first message to the incoming students at Brock. "Stop anyone in the halls and say 'hello'. You are the stranger if you don't," she admonished. "There are many who would like to walk with you and who may need a friend. If you are not new here, give a friendly welcome with an outstretched hand. On behalf of the University, I wish you all an enjoyable time together as you make this journey with us."

There were a number of challenges to be met as Dr. Cheechoo prepared to mount the stage to be installed in her historic role, one of which was the matter of regalia.

"They had to alter the robes," she said. "When I first put them on, they were so big! They were made for a man." Once the ceremonial robes were tailored to fit, Dr. Cheechoo's attention turned to the matter of the headgear. "I told them there was no way I was wearing that hat," she laughed. The chancellor's headgear is designed on a medieval European model, as is the custom, hardly a fitting historical context in which to start her tenure.

"I came home wondering how I was going to deal with that," she said. Then her mind turned to her mother, the late Lillian Cheechoo, and the crown she had created for her daughter when Dr. Cheechoo had become Ms. Canadian Native Princess.

"The crown and banner for the Canadian Native Princess had been stolen before I was crowned," she recalled. "My mother made me a crown to wear. That crown represents her teachings to me." It was also a way for her mother to be there with her on this momentous occasion.

It was Ms. Cheechoo's brother, Ben Cheechoo, who works in governance for the Niski Aski Nation, who

placed the headgear on the brow of the new chancellor during the ceremonies.

"I put an eagle feather with it," said Chancellor Cheechoo. "That feather represents what I hope to do at Brock."

That goal, she explained, is to "help Brock develop a First Nation history curriculum that can be taught in schools."

"I come from a background where when we spoke, our voices were not heard," said Ms. Cheechoo in her first convocation address as chancellor. "Today, we still feel marginalized, excluded and devalued."

Chancellor Cheechoo shared some of her story in that speech, of how she has struggled throughout her life. In her twenties, Chancellor Cheechoo found art, going on to become a worldfamous filmmaker, writer and visual artist.

"Healing is the first step on the road to empowerment," she told the convocation. "I took this position to make a difference and I worked hard to move beyond old racial wounds." The chancellor said that

forgetting the past is not the way forward, pointing to one of the recommendations out of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Report, which stressed the need for more education about aboriginal people.

"My hope is that Brock takes a leadership role," said Chancellor Cheechoo. "Canadians should know about the first people of this country and I wear this eagle feather to symbolize the beginning of First Nation history in the classrooms."

Outgoing Chancellor Ned Goodman gave Dr. Cheechoo a high-five following her speech to the convocation. "I wish you all the things that come well with the role you have taken on," Mr. Goodman said during his own convocation address. "They are all related to young people and that's the nice part of being involved in a good university."

Mr. Goodman said that he was especially honoured that Dr. Cheechoo's first official duty as chancellor was to present him with an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. Back home, Dr. Cheechoo can be found hard at work at the Weengushk Film Institute in M'Chigeeng where her focus is on inspiring a new generation of aboriginal filmmakers and artists.

"This honour has already helped to open many doors for me as an educator," she said. "It is helping Weengushk and it is helping with the youth."

A large contingent of family members, friends and colleagues travelled to St. Catherines to help Dr. Cheechoo celebrate the historic occasion, including M'Chigeeng Chief Linda Debassige and friend and Audrey colleague Wemigwans of Debajehmujig Storytellers, the organization Dr. Cheechoo founded more than 30 years ago.

"It was amazing," said Ms. Wemigwans. "We were all so proud of her."

Dr. Cheechoo's many accomplishments in education and the arts were recognized by Laurentian University in 1995 with an Honourary Doctorate of Letters in 1995, her husband and fellow artist Blake Debassige was honoured with an Honourary Doctorate of Laws at the same ceremony.



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

Plan. Sustainable community development demands a community-based process. The planning exercise they used included many opportunities for community consultation on issues of social, environmental, cultural and spiritual well-being, as well as economic progress.

A stakeholder consultation took place with seven focus groups taking part. With a total of 91 participants, they represented boaters and non boaters alike along with business owners and farmers market vendors among others.

The Sustainability Plan 2012-2017, now in its third year, is right on track. The action strategy included 'apply for grants and hire a consulting firm to develop an implementation study for the harbour,' and Members of the public were provided with a series of four architect's drawings: the present marina configuration, Alternate 1 (floating docks), Alternate 2 (permanent break wall) and the consultant's "preferred" concept showing the marina and waterfront (Alternate 1 marina and Concept A waterfront).

'implement as soon as funding can be obtained.'

Members of the Waterfront Improvement Committee, which includes members of council (including the mayor), led by Chair Tom Imrie, were available to provide information to those who may not have prior background on the proposed plans.

Drawings depicting the present marina, along with Alternate 1 (featuring a grouping of floating docks) and Alternate 2 (featuring a permanent break wall) were on display for public viewing. There was also a pair of waterfront drawings showing Concept A (restaurant and showers as two buildings) and Concept B (restaurant and showers as one building) available for consideration and comment. A sixth and final drawing showing the 'preferred plans:' Alternate 1 and Concept A was shown.

When Ray Spangler of C2S Engineering was asked by a concerned resident what type of septic system

"I want to push for a bounty like there was before," continued Ms. Bond. "I've spoken to my neighbours too and they feel the coyotes are out of control and a bounty would encourage trappers and help with the population. I've heard the municipality used to have a \$50 bounty and I think this would make a huge difference."

Ms. Bond and Mr. May's neighbour Chris Roszel said he stopped farming sheep after the issues he had with coyotes a few years ago.

"I got out of sheep two years ago," said Mr. Roszel. "I had to quit because the coyotes wouldn't leave them alone. They were killing day and night. The fence wouldn't keep them out so we started putting them in the barn at night, but they were smart and as soon as we let them out, they would hunt them during the day."

"I think a bounty would help a great deal," added Mr. Roszel. "It would encourage trappers if it was brought back."

Al Rolston, who owns a 600-acre farm in Sheguiandah, said he has also been seeing a lot of coyotes.

"There have been more wolves and coyotes than ever," said Mr. Rolston. "I've seen 10-15 this year so far."

Mr. Rolston said that some of his cattle have been losing calves and he has been told this could be

because the bred cows are stressed out.

"I think bringing the bounty back would definitely make a difference," Mr. Rolston said. "It's a chore going out and getting the coyotes or wolves, but if people were compensated, it would make a difference. It would be a good thing for farmers and landowners."

The Expositor spoke to Northeast Town CAO Dave Williamson about the municipal bounty and how it could be brought back if the need/desire was present.

"Since I've been with the town, there hasn't been a bounty, but my understanding was there was a bounty in the past for coyotes (or wolves). People would bring them to the municipal office and an employee

Generally, Mr. Anderson said, Manitoulin has a healthy coyote population but some areas are higher then others and the population fluctuates on what they eat.

"If the deer population increases, the coyote population does as well," Mr. Anderson explained. "They eat everything from mice to deer. They even eat newborn calves, which seems to be more common currently, but I'm not sure why. With sheep, once the coyote realizes how easy they are to catch and kill, it can become a real problem."

To make a difference in the population, Mr. Anderson said there would have to be great trapping pressure Island-wide because if you manage to get a population down in one area, coyotes from a neighbouring territory will simply move in.


"Bounties on wolves and coyote were pretty much across North American in areas where the species existed," said Mr. Anderson. "I think in about the mid 1970s it ceased, with the reasoning that it just wasn't reducing the populations—they didn't think it was effective—and it had been in place in Ontario for 75 or 80 years."

The Manitoulin Municipal Wolf Bounty, a cooperative effort, lasted well beyond that time.

Longtime Assiginack reeve and current Assiginack Councillor Hugh Moggy explained that the cooperative was a Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) initiative.

"If a farmer shot a wolf, or coyote, it was mostly coyotes, they would come to Assiginack and have to prove that they trapped it or shot it in a specific Island municipality and then money would come from that municipality," said Mr. Moggy, explaining that Assiginack operated the program for the MMA. "It operated up until the early '80s."

The Expositor contacted the MNRF, inquiring about the history of the coyote bounty in Ontario, and Manitoulin specifically, and if it could be brought back on Manitoulin if there was a desire (both from residents and a municipality(s)), but had not received a response as of press time.

moya, 170 and Gore Bay, 180, all voted in favour of the Liberal Party's Heather Wilson. Only one of the Island's polls, 136 Meldrum Bay, saw the majority of votes for the Conservative Party's André Robichaud. Mindemoya Poll No. 171 had a split of 67 for Mr. Robichaud and 67 for Ms. Hughes while Howland No. 94 had an almost three-way tie between the top three parties. Spring Bay Poll No. 175 was also a close race with 90 votes in favour of Ms. Hughes and 89 for Mr. Robichaud and the Conservatives.

Voter turnout in AMK followed national trends, with 41,535 votes cast on October 19 compared to 36,277 cast in the 2011 election—a substantial difference of 5,258 votes.

The biggest and only winner in this election in terms of gain was the Liberal Party's Ms. Wilson with 8,736 votes, up from 5,375 votes for the party in 2011. The rest of the parties lost votes in the riding: Ms. Hughes lost 2,231 votes; the Conservatives lost 1,123; while the Green Party also suffered a reduction of 285 votes.

...continued from page 9 would be installed, he described a bio-filtration system and potential options for its location.

Rodger Todhunter, who has area roots having been raised in Willisville, is a landscape artist and responsible for creating boardwalks and landscaping designs for the proposed waterfront improvement proposal. The drawings, created by Sudbury based firm C2S Engineering, feature a boardwalk that begins at the (existing) Aus Hunt Marina, and winds its way along the 'improved waterfront,' past the (CSA approved) playground, connecting it to the small craft harbour. Tom Hluchan, a marine engineer, took The Expositor on a visual tour through a series of drawings, highlighting the benefits of the consultant's preferred option for the waterfront improvement project. Alternate 1 depicts a grouping of floating docks which actually creates fish habitat as they can go

underneath it, "taking advantage of the shade they offer."

Alternate 2 shows a permanent breakwall that would be an extension from the small craft harbour, creating an 'S' shaped pattern. This option, stated Mr. Hluchan, is expensive and not eco-friendly. There are currently 52 slips at the marina. Alternate 1 would add an additional 64 slips for total of 116.Architect Dennis Castellan of Castellan James and Partners in Sudbury shared that while designing the proposed buildings for the waterfront, they took the size and scale of the buildings, space between them and how to connect the street and water into consideration to enhance the 'visual experience.' Bruce Fountain, marketing benefits consultant, stated that whatever plans the Township decides to move forward with "has to make economic sense and not burden the taxpayer." The character and charm of the village is appreciated

by Mr. Fountain and one of his responsibilities is to identify gaps such as a grocery store and seasonal restaurant.

Mr. Fountain feels the Township should be cautious if a decision is made to consider a year round McDonald echoed Councillor Imrie's statement, sharing that those who may oppose the project are under the assumption that the money will come from the taxpayers. This, she shared, would not be the case as the town-

He noted that last year, the EDCU made \$250,000 and projections for next year come in at around \$210,000. Mr. Liske warned that he only expects the EDCU to be financially viable for another two years, maybe three, without the merger.

"There are trade-offs," he said. The prime rate will go from four percent to 4.75 percent and there will be \$7 yearly dues for the banking system paid by each member, something the EDCU covers currently. However, no staff will lose their jobs and no branches will close. On top of higher lending limits, Northern also offers a wealth management team and a 'deposit anywhere' feature (taking a photo of a cheque with your mobile device and uploading it to the financial institution). They also plan to have a contact centre, live online chat function and 'anytime, anywhere, any device' banking.

With the merger, the former EDCU catchment area would have one board member on the Northern board for a three-year term with 16 delegates, eight of whom are voting delegates. Branch members elect the

delegates at the branch annual meeting (also new). Each branch is entitled to one vote for each 500 members but no branch shall be entitled to less than two votes. Delegates can also be youth delegates (13 and

up). "We can survive for a few more years, but not after that," Mr. Liske said.

A merger with Northern Credit Union offers a great deal of security, he reiterated, noting the always-present fear of the end of operations of Domtar in Espanola and what it would mean for the EDCU. A merger would keep the branches safe from harm should such an event occur.

Northern Credit Union also offers expertise on agriculture financing, which would be of benefit to the people of Manitoulin, he added.

Al Suraci, president and CEO of Northern, also spoke, explaining that this has been a two-year process of studying one another and getting to know each other in order to ensure a good fit. "It's also a fit geographically," he added, pointing to a map of Northern's 30 branches surrounding Manitoulin. Including ones to the south in the Grey-Bruce region.

It is his vision to see Northern Credit Union branches stretching across the North between the Manitoba and the Quebec borders.

"I believe it is a natural fit and the time is right," Mr. Suraci said. "Capital is king."

'You've been doing just enough—serving members, keeping the regulator at bay, but I think it's visionary that the board has come to terms with the fact that it may not be sustainable in three years' time," he added.

Mr. Suraci boasted that in 21 years, they have never closed a branch, but have continued to open them.

"It's been a collaborative, cooperative process," the president and CEO continued. "It's taken longer than usual, but we've gotten to know one another too.3

Mr. Liske also listed the EDCU's importance to the Manitoulin community in terms of support, naming donations to the tune of \$15,000 to the Mindemoya hospital, \$5,000 to the Manitoulin Centennial Manor, \$5,000 to the Diabetes Association, \$1,500 toward the hospital bed campaign and a soon-to-be-announced donation to the Manor's call bell system campaign.

The vote for the merger will be held Thursday, November 5 at the Knights of Columbus Hall at 6:30 pm in Espanola. Advanced polls will also be held at both of the Manitoulin branches: Monday, November 2, Mindemoya branch, 11 am to 2 pm; Tuesday, November 3, Little Current branch, 11 am to 2 pm; and Wednesday, November 4, Espanola branch, 11 am to 2 pm. It is important to note that a two-third majority vote is needed by the membership to see this merger move ahead for December. Mr. Liske and Elizabeth McQuarrie, credit manager, will be on hand at each of the advanced polls to answer any questions from the members.

"I can't emphasize enough the importance of this merger—it's important for members that there is still a financial institution, for staff, that they still have jobs. We have a guarantee for a minimum of two years right now," Mr. Liske said in his parting speech. "We have to rely on that legacy that's in front of us."

... The sleeping giant awaken as First Nations vote sets records

The reasoning was largely based on a "nationalist perspective" which holds that First Nations are sovereign entities, with a right to self-determination that pre-dates Canada. This perspective rejects Canadian legal and economic orders as "fundamentally violent" and "truncating the practices of nationhood.'

The nationalist approach has dominated the First Nations history and reflects the no-vote sentiment of yore. Some would suggest that the new pro-vote push may be indicative of changing political values, but that assessment might be premature.

"I myself have only voted for the second time in a federal election this time round," noted Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee. "I have only voted once or twice in provincial elections either. When I have voted, I held my nose—each time was a strategic vote to get rid of an adversary that was causing a lot of harm to our people."

Across Canada First organizations, Nations band councils and friendship centres, conducted well attended rallies and information sessions intended to "rock the vote." "We put a lot of resources out there across the country," said Chief Madahbee. "I think the results are pretty evident."

Among the 51 swing ridings identified by the AFN, 24 were won by the Liberals (including 17 gains), while there were nine wins registered for the Conservatives. 16 wins for the NDP and two wins for the Bloc Québécois.

Across the nation the First Nation tallies were at historic highs. In the riding of Kenora, which includes 40 First Nations in Northern Ontario, voting on the reserves was up 73 percent, that is almost 3,000 voters. At least four of those First Nations ran out of ballots and either used photocopies or waited for more to be brought in. A significant number of First Nation polling stations in southern Ontario also reportedly came up short in the number of ballots on hand. It was a telling indication of the passion felt by many of those voters that they did not simply leave, but stuck around and waited until the issue was resolved.

The giant may not go back to sleep anytime soon, however. The majority of Nations First individuals now live in urban centres and espouse reasons to vote unrelated to the traditional issues of treaty rights and land

titles. This might also be seen in how the traditional First Nation issues such as jurisdictional

concerns, land restitution and treaty federalism, were largely absent from the debate, replaced perhaps by what could be characterized as more prosaic concerns such as water quality and education.

the First Although Nations vote seems to have largely mirrored that across the country in terms of partisan choice, it would be an all too common mistake to view First Nations voters as a amorphous cohesive block.

Although the right to vote was fully extended to First Nations people relatively recently in 1960, attempts to include aboriginal voters stretches almost back to Confederation. The first real attempt to convince First Nations peoples to vote was led by Prime Minister John A. Macdonald in 1885 when he spearheaded the Electoral Franchise Act, which applied to Indians in Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes. This was hardly extended in a spirit of benefice or enlightenment however, as so-called "civilization" was requirement to vote. First Nations people were not forced to renounce status or treaty rights through the Electoral Franchise Act,

but they were obligated to hold property in fee simple and demonstrate that they had improved that property. The Electoral Franchise Act, along with the "Indian" franchise was repealed in 1898.

Sixty years later, it was Conservative another Minister, Prime John Diefenbaker, who extended the franchise to status Indians as an adjunct to his ground-breaking Bill of Rights.

And like Macdonald, Diefenbaker had an underlying civilizing impulse, in his case, hoping First Nations peoples would consider themselves individuals within Canada.

The 1885 legislation was met by First Nations members with strong antipathy, with fears of imposed Canacitizenship dian and the 1960 law sparking protests across the country to protect First Nation sovereignty.

Although the official tally of First Nation voting across the nation, or on Manitoulin, has not yet been released, initial numbers do indicate that Island First Nations followed closely on the national trend.

Preliminary and unofficial comparisons to the 2011 results, where possible, show that Birch Island (Whitefish River First Nation) jumped from 184 votes cast in 2011 to 246 votes in 2015[.] Aundeck Omni Kaning jumped from 115 to 140; Wikwemikong jumped from 612 to 990 and M'Chigeeng jumped from 315 to 386, bringing the increase in Manitoulin Island First Nation votes to 66 percent. In the rest of the Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing riding, Constance Lake saw a jump to 223 votes from 152, Pic Mobart climbed to 116 from 71 in 2011. Sagamok was at 422 votes to 213, and Serpent River was at 213 votes


from 208 in 2011, with a rise in participation of nearly 71 percent.

In terms of the partisan breakdown of the vote in Manitoulin District's First Nations, Carol Hughes and the NDP received 1,456 votes to Liberal Heather Wilson's 604 (accounting for 852 of Ms. Hughes' 988 vote plurality on the Island) and Conservative André Robichaud's 34 votes. In the rest of the Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing riding the breakdown was closer between the two main protagonists, with Carol Hughes and the NDP receiving a combined 413 votes from the First Nations of Constance Lake, Pic Mobart, Sagamok, Serpent River and Mississagi River to Liberal Heather Wilson's 403 and Conservative André Robichaud's 36 votes. The Greens pulled a total of 23 votes in those polls.

In the White River polls, in which it is unclear at press time whether the vote was primarily First Nation or made up of a mixture of communities, Ms. Hughes polled 88 votes to Ms. Wilson's 115, putting the Liberal slightly ahead in the overall off-Island First Nation count. The Greens polled 11 votes and the Conservatives polled 23 votes.

Of course these numbers do not reflect the very large and important off-reserve Native vote. It is important to recall that the majority of Canada's indigenous population now live in urban centres. There is no way to calculate either the turnout or the

partisan breakdown of that vote.

down through generations, including eating cloves of raw garlic, homemade chicken soup, drinking elderberry extract, green tea or tea of fresh ginger or ginseng, gargling with salt water or having a hot rum toddy before getting into bed with a hot water bottle.

Basic recommendations we can all carry out during this season to reduce the risk and spread of infection include:

Wash hands regularly with soap and water, dispose used tissues in the waste basket or garbage; cough and sneeze into a shirt sleeve rather than in hands; stay home when ill and rest; get some exercise to boost the immune sysyear Ontario's flu shot program prevents 30,000 emergency room visits and 200,000 doctor's office visits."

According to Justeen Mansouriam-Christakos of the Communicable Diseases Team of the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) in Mindemoya, "getting an influenza vaccine is the best protection against the flu and spreading it to others who may not be able to be vaccinated for various medical and nonmedical reasons.'

The SDHU receives all vaccines for the region and distributes them to health teams, pharmacies, doctors and clinics all over the Island. This year, the flu vaccine will be available for distribution on October 21 from the SDHU. The closest offices are in Mindemoya and Espanola, and they administer flu shots there by appointment only. They will hold a Community Flu Clinic in Mindemoya on November 10.





Now and Then: Bill and Mary Caesar

South Baymouth. "It was hard to take 700 kids past the caskets but it offered some closure for the students."

The Caesar's first home was a two-room cabin belonging to Harry and Lyle Coventry on Big Lake. "In the winter there was so much snow, it was exciting to see a car go by every four hours or so. Our telephone had two short rings and one long ring on the party line. Everyone knew everyone else's business."

Mary met the local doctor when she couldn't straighten her neck. A small dose of culture-shock may have been the instigator. "Dr. Bailey joked that I should be strung up from the halyard and that would cure me. He realized that time would bring healing." The culture shock also was eased by annual visits from Mary's mother. Living near the Thames, Mrs. Gibson was amazed that you could see your own feet in the water here. She also thought Manitoulin very remote, affectionately calling it 'Kookoo Cloud' land.

After four years on Manitoulin, Bill and Mary returned to England but found the job situation less than ideal. "We returned to Manitoulin, bought a cottage and began to convert it into a home. We were the first permanent residents at White's Point." A daughter, Michelle, and later a son, Michael, were born to complete the family. "We did a lot with the kids. We enjoyed watching them grow and reach new stages in life." The couple also

raised golden retrievers and Irish setters for a few years.

Just before Christmas in 1974, Mary realized the house was on fire. "I called Bill at the school, then ran out with Michelle, two Irish setters and one cat. "Bill and the new fire truck arrived within 10 minutes. Much of the house was saved." Bill saw the silver lining. "The fire took the top of the house off, so now we had a chance to insulate the area more extensively."

Bill retired from the high school 14 years ago. "We both loved our roles at MSS," Bill offers. "Mary raised our children, supplytaught for 17 years and also worked at the public school library." The couple has travelled extensively. "We have been to England often, to Yugoslavia. Italy and to Turkey where we heard someone call 'Mary' in the midst of an Arab market. It turned out to be Marion Henry from Little Current! What a surprise! On September 11, 2001 (911), we were in the sky above Istanbul. We had to land right away. We stayed in a guest house, terrified the Americans might take on retaliatory measures. An Englishspeaking youth kept us informed about the news." Michelle and Michael

both work in Ottawa. "Michelle took teachertraining in Roehampton, England. Her husband Colin is a high school teacher of physical education. They have two sons, Riley and Jeffery. Our son Michael is really a poet at heart. He took a business degree at Wilfred Laurier University and then journalism at Cambrian. He loves to comand now writes pose speeches for the Governor General."

Bill has been on both the Manitoulin Health Centre and the Centennial Museum boards. He was part of the Lighthouse Restoration Association attempting to maintain 12 lighthouses in the Manitoulin and Killarney areas. He is working on a pictorial review of our Manitoulin heritage. His strengths have been his positive nature, and his ability to excite kids and build rapport with them as а teacher.'

"My favourite season is spring. I have a passion for roses and perennials," Mary tells us. "When the snow melts, we often travelled to England." Bill adds, "I love to write books about our local history and I have hobbies that can be done year-round." He displays a beautiful 'hooker' board for coats or implements featuring railway spikes bent into hooks.

"Manitoulin does take you back in time. Some of the kids I taught in the 1970s are grandparents now. My advice to them is to stay positive and never give up on your dreams. People may leave to work elsewhere but they tend to come back

I would love to see the Island build a tunnel across the channel and leave the bridge in place. This can be done in sections now and seems to be quite safe. We need more cycle paths too."

People love to visit here. Yesterday 189 Road Scholars (an educational travel organization for adults) from Massachusetts and California visited M'Chigeeng. "Sometimes in the winter you miss a little of city life, but we have a lot here to be thankful for." Mary adds. "One student told me that when you cross that bridge, you feel safe." Bill adds, "Manitoulin is the place to come home to. You're coming into paradise. We live across from Strawberry Island and enjoy a wetland area second to none. Fishing is still great. There is a mixture of ages and cultures here. There really is no other place like this in the world."



Prolific and Passionate: Eric Walters Visits Manitoulin Secondary

M'CHIGEENG—I am halfway into writing my own novel, and I started last year. And here I was standing in front of a man who has written over 100 books and has 10 more coming out this year. Wow!

On Monday, September 14, Eric Walters, the renowned Canadian author, gave a presentation at Manitoulin Secondary School. During the two one-hour presentations, Eric Walters kept the audience captivated by being animated and intense. Clearly benefitting from his previous teaching experience, he knew how to keep the young adults engaged as he shared his many stories.

According to his website, Eric Walters started writing in 1993 by writing the novel Stand Your Ground for his Grade 5 class. Before becoming a teacher, Eric was a social worker. He worked in a few different settings, including private practice, mental health treatment, and in an emergency department for 18 years. He drew on these many experiences to connect to readers. Mr. Walters has won over 100 literary awards, but he is most proud of the Children's Choice Awards he has won.

Mr. Walters started his presentation by choosing two volunteers to make into characters in an imaginary book, giving us a glimpse into his creative process. Dustin McKenzie and I became two characters, and Mr. Walters made a story out of us. In 2007, Eric Walters and his son travelled to Kenya for the first time to visit a family friend. It was in the market of Kikima, Kenya where Walters met Mutuku. Mr. Walters found out that Mutuku was one of 500 orphans in the Mbooni Region of rural Kenya. Mr. Walters became a Kamba Elder in the Mbooni region and a local hero. The Rolling Hills Residence is home to 55 orphans, but the Creation of Hope started with one orphan, then four and now the Creation of Hope supports over 400 orphaned and impoverished children in Mbooni.

Several of Eric Walters' books were inspired by his African experiences including: Alexandria of Africa, Just Deserts, Between Heaven and Earth, Walking Home, My Name is Blessing, and The Matatu. All of these books were inspired by real experiences and characters. In fact, at times Mr. Walters travelled the path of his characters to experience first-hand some of his characters' struggles.

A curious student asked with which character Mr. Walters most connected. He had to think about it before for a short moment before answering: "I connected most with Baraka." The book called My Name is Blessing is about a small boy named Muthini (this means suffering in Swahili) who was born with a physical disability. This boy lives with his grandmother, and eight cousins, in a small home. Mr. Walters sponsored this boy. He now goes by the name Baraka which means "blessing." This true story clearly continues to inspire the author.

Another true story that continues to inspire Mr. Walters is also one of his best known books. Run is about a boy who runs with Terry Fox in the Marathon of Hope. This inspirational story helps young readers connect with the Terry Fox story. I asked him what the book Run means to him. Mr. Walters gave a simple smile and said, "Terry is one of my personal heroes, and I have never even thought about taking a penny from that book. Every cent made from this book goes to the Terry Fox Foundation and to finding a cure for cancer.'

Mr. Walters has written 101 books, and he said he has anoth-

er 10 new books coming out this year. How does a writer produce up to eight books a year? Mr. Walters says that he is always writing more than one book: "There are always several stories flying through my head." Tell Me Why took him eight months to write, but he said, "Without the other stories being written at the same time, it would have been longer."

"Everything inspires me to write. Everything I see, and everyone I talk to is something new that becomes a part of a story. I am constantly writing. I write before I go to bed, at the breakfast table, and even in my tent during a sandstorm in the middle of the Sahara Desert."

Eric Walters' presentation provided an inside view to the issues of rural Kenya and made it clear that every small action is making a difference. When Mr. Walters was finished, he received a round of applause from MSS English students, Writer's Craft students, as well as visiting students from Lakeview Public School and Wikwemikong High School. As he was leaving the school, Mr. Walters checked his phone. There was a missed call from the Governor General's Office giving him details about receiving the Order of Canada, which recognizes "outstanding achievement, dedication to the community and service to the nation.'

He clearly is deserving of this honour for his many contributions to children's literacy and international development. As a bonus, he may have encouraged a few members of the MSS audience to become readers or maybe even activists.


Movemember luncheon to shine a light on prostate cancer

"Last year we held a Dress for the Cause event

that was quite successful," said organizer Gail Gjos of Sheguiandah. "This year the thought was that we would focus on the gentlemen—fair's fair. That is what prompted us."

All profits from the event will be going to prostate cancer research, noted Ms. Gjos, and the cost of the luncheon includes a Movember Tshirt. "The colours of the



I can never decide which is better to use-an upright freezer or a chest freezer. I have a chest freezer and my organizational skills are "out the window" in this one. I go to my mothers and one of my yearly jobs is to defrost her upright freezer and reorganize (throwing out outdated food) which is easy because everything goes on a shelf in front of you. The only complaint I have with that system is you can't pile in enough food—whole chickens, half a pork or a quarter beef, homemade bread etc. So then I am back to a chest freezer, and the usual problems is "I have pork spareribs in here somewhere" and away I go rooting and moving things to find them! Perseverance paid off and voila, I found them. With the spareribs in hand I tried the following recipe, with a few changes. Yummy.

Tender Pork Spare Ribs

The recipe called for fajita seasoning but I only had taco seasoning on hand so I used it instead (you can make your own fajita seasoning). I switched the brown sugar to coconut sugar and just used a regular sweet paprika. I didn't trim the fat from the spareribs because where do you start and stop and besides quite a bit of the fat gets cooked off.

2 racks pork spareribs, fat trimmed

- 1 cup brown sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup fajita seasoning
- 1 cup beer
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 Tbsp honey or maple syrup 3 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 Tbsp prepared Dijon mustard

1. Mix the brown sugar, fajita seasoning, and paprika in a bowl. Rub both sides of the pork spareribs with the brown sugar mixture. Place the spareribs in a 9x13-inch baking pan; cover and refrigerate overnight.

2. Preheat an oven to 300°F. Whisk together the beer, garlic, honey, Worcestershire sauce, and mustard in a bowl. Set aside.

3. Use a cookie sheet with the edge on it and depending on the number of ribs, you may need two of them. I then cut parchment paper to fit the pan (don't have the paper hang over the edge, cut as close as you can to the lip) or use tin foil. Place the ribs on the sheet and add the beer mixture. Completely and tightly cover the ribs with tin foil to make a seal.

4. Bake in the preheated oven until the ribs are very tender, 3 to 4 hours. Bring them out, uncover them and turn the oven up to 375° . Baste them with the liquid from the sheet and put them back in the oven for another 20 minutes to crisp them up or broil them for 10 minutes (but watch closely).

I had some soft apples to make a crumble for dessert. Quick, easy and healthy. I didn't use the butter or canola oil but switched to coconut oil which I melted first.

5 cups apples, peeled and sliced 1/3 cup sugar or coconut sugar or maple syrup or honey Combine all ingredients in a large bowl and set aside.

2/3 cup spelt flour or whole-wheat

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup large flaked rolled oats (not instant) Loon Song is the best oats out there

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar or coconut sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

1 Tbsp butter

1 Tbsp oil

3 Tbsp frozen orange juice concentrate

1 Tbsp sunflower seeds or chopped walnuts or almonds

1. Preheat oven to $350^\circ\mathrm{F}.$ Spray or line an 8-by-8 inch baking pan with parchment paper.

2. Place the apple mixture in the prepared pan.

3. Make the topping by mixing all the ingredients together in a bowl, starting with the flour and adding each ingredient in order. When all is together blend with your fingers to make sure all the dry ingredients are moistened and the butter is blended in.

4. Bake in oven for 40 minutes or until the fruit is bubbly and tender and the topping is lightly browned.

5. Serve warm with ice cream or yogurt.

Wikwemikong science team places third at engineering meet

by Alicia McCutcheon HAMILTON—The students of Wikwemikong High School have once again proved themselves to be science powerhouses on the high school stage as they recently took a third place finish at the McMaster Engineering and Science Olympics held earlier this month.

Students Reynold Assiniwe, Raven Manitowabi, Eugenie Eshkawkogan, Annie Wemigwans and teacher, Chris Mara, gathered to share their story of success and a weekend of science and engineering with The Expositor.

On October 8 the Wikwemikong High School Science Olympics team competed against 54 high schools and over 1,300 students—the only school from Northern Ontario to attend and the only all First Nations school.

"We took third place in the Canada arm build," Mr. Mara began.

The students explained that they were given 100 straws and tasked with trying to make the longest arm that would hold a 100-gram weight while the arm was held off the edge of a table.

"It seemed to be unique," Reynold said of their design. "It blew away the competition in that heat," Mr. Mara added.

"It looked like a canoe and a (construction) crane mixed together," Raven explained. "It was the shape of a canoe but the inside is supported by the shape of a crane."

The arm was 85 centimetres in length and easily held the 100-gram weight for over 10 seconds.

"It was, like, solid," Reynold enthused.

"The judges were very impressed and clapping," Raven said.

"And they were surprised to see the weight get dropped," Reynold added, saying the weight was not "gently placed" like the rest of the teams did.

"And they finished (the build) with five minutes to spare," their teacher said.

Following the McMaster competition, the team packed up and headed to North Bay for Space Week where they, also members of the Wikwemikong High School Robotics Team, had been invited as guests of the North Bay robotics team.

Mr. Mara explained that as a member of the United

NOHFC Tile drainage and land clearing program meetings

These meetings will be held to develop consortium No. 2. for submission of an NOHFC application for tiling and land clearing projects. If interested in tiling or land clearing, consider attending one of these meetings: November 2, 7:30 pm at the Service Ontario Office, 25 Meredith Street in Gore Bay and November 4, 7:30 pm, at the Spring Bay Hall, 92 Hwy 542 in Spring Bay. NOHFC is accepting applications for regional land clearing and/or tile drainage projects under the Strategic Economic Infrastructure Program: (http://nohfc.ca/en/pro-

grams/strategic-economic-infrastructure-program). Who is eligible? The applicant would be a not-for-profit, agricultural or community organization that will develop/submit funding applications and administer approved funding on behalf of NOHFC. The applicant would work within its region to build a consortium of producers interested in undertaking land clearing/tile drainage

projects. What is eligible?

Land clearing and/or tile drainage contractor costs (materials and labour) and the project management/administration fees of the service provider are eligible for support. The land can be already in production or be new acreage. Funding: NOHFC will fund 50 per cent of land clearing and/or tile drainage contractor costs to a maximum of \$500 per acre and 100 per cent of the project management/administration fees, which is calculated as 10 percent of the contractor costs to а maximum of \$50 per acre.

Funding is in the form of a conditional contribution. General guidelines: The individual producers must make cash contributions of at least 10 percent of the contractor costs (materials and labour) specific to their individual acreage. Growing Forward 2 applications

Growing Forward 2 is accepting another round applications from of November 16 to December 7. You might have a food safety project for your produce operation that could be eligible for funding. Consider sending in an application if you are looking to improve food safety for your fruit and/or vegetable farm. You may be eligible if you have a project that will contribute to: Your operation being ready to obtain an audit to a national or international food safety program; Laboratory documentation validating your cleaning and sanitation procedures and/or acceptable water quality and/or acceptable pathogen levels in compost; Building upgrades that prevent food safety

risks from occurring (e.g., shatterproof lighting, cleanable surfaces, air curtain to separate incompatible areas); Equipment that will immediately reduce a food safety risk (e.g. bin washer, knife sanitizer, automated sanitation chemical dispenser, water treatment equipment). Growing Forward 2 has established projects that food address safety through worker practices. pest control, pre and postharvest water, soil amendments and cleaning and sanitizing as the highest priority.




