Court deadline looms over Robinson Huron annuities case

ROBINSON-HURON—The last time the Robinson Huron Treaty annuities were given a raise Alexander McKenzie was the second prime minister of Canada and Alexander Graham Bell had just made the first sound transmission—that was 1875 and the rise was to the princely sum of \$4. That \$4 would be roughly \$84.70 if adjusted for inflation in today's dollars.

The chiefs of the Robinson Huron Treaty have been trying to get the federal government to address the issue for ages through the Robinson Huron Treaty Annuities Claim. On September 25 the chiefs will begin their day in court, seeking to force the federal

The 13 bedroom facility will accommodate 17 individuals, with the shelter accepting both men and women in crisis, as well as youth over the age of 16.

"The shelter will be a safe haven for those in need of emergency residential safety and protection due to violence and abuse as well as foster courage within individuals to re-connect to wellness," Naandwechige-Gamig announced in a press release. "The facility will be accessible to all citizens living on Manitoulin

Island and abroad and will provide its programs and services based on Anishinaabe culture."

"CMHC (Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation) and Indigenous Northern Ontario Affairs Canada had a call for expressions of interest for funding for shelters on reserves last year," Wikwemikong Health Centre Director of Services Mary Jo Wabano explained to The Expositor. "We applied and got our notification that we had been success-

Hwy 540 entrance to Cup and Saucer trail deemed safe for traffic despite citizen concerns

Study recommends expanded parking

NORTHEAST TOWN—A report on the new Highway 540 Cup and Saucer Trail entrance, commissioned by the Northeast Town and prepared by Tranplan Associates, has been completed and approved by council.

While the traffic brief found that there were no issues with the new entrance, it did recommend that the 32 capacity parking lot be expanded to allow for 50 vehicles, including spaces for RVs/trailers. The news of the need to expand the parking lot will come to no surprise to Manitoulin residents who drove past the Highway 540 trail entrance this summer.

A video posted on Facebook in July by an Islander showing cars, trucks and RVs lining both sides of the highway by the trail entrance for what seems like endless kilometers garnered a lot of attention and comments, with many noting the danger the traffic posed and the need for an expanded parking lot.

"Based on the Ministry of Transportation (MTO) data, the site visit and traffic count was scheduled for a Sunday, mid-day," states the report. "The peak hour for Highway 540 and the site was recorded between 1:30 pm and 2:30 pm (21 vehicles entered and five exited) while 100 vehicles passed westbound and 200 vehicles passed eastbound along Highway 540. These volumes fall well below warranting a left turn storage lane or a right turn taper on Highway 540."

"The existing temporary parking lot has an approximate capacity of 32 vehicles," the report continues. "On the Sunday of the survey, the lot appeared to be at capacity between 2 pm and 2:30 pm. It is recommended that the permanent parking lot have capacity for at least 50 vehicles including spaces for at least 3-5 larger RVs/trailers."

The study also found that, "based on the low level of traffic on Highway 540, the modest volumes the Cup and Saucer parking lot is expected to generate and the available sightlines, it is our opinion that the temporary site is not creating any traffic problems and

WIIKWEMKOONG—No new information has been released following the autopsy of 85-year-old Jim Still of Little Current, who passed away in Little Current hospital on August 30 due to complications from an incident on Friday, August 25 at the Wik-

"The investigation is still active and Wikwemikong Tribal Police Chief Gary Reid told The Expositor Monday morning, informing this newspaper that he could not yet comment on the outwemikong Nursing Home, where Mr. Still come of the autopsy held at the Ontario Forensic Pathology Service in Sudbury.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police are continuing the investigation with the assistance of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Crime Unit from Sudbury and Forensic Identification Services under the direction of OPP Criminal Investigation Branch Detective Inspector Mark Zulinski.

Anyone with information regarding the incident should contact the OPP at 1-888-310-1122, the Wikwemikong Tribal Police at 705-859-3141 or by calling Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477. Tipsters may be eligible to receive a cash reward of up to \$2,000.

NIAGARA FALLS—Manitoulin's Kevin Rose has been appointed president of the Economic Developers Association of Canada (EDAC), Canada's national organization of economic developers. Mr. Rose, the owner-operator of Little Current's Harbour Vue Marina, is a longtime Island economic development professional and a passionate spokesperson for the field. He was the first Indigenous person to serve as vice-president of the EDAC and will now be the first First Nations person to head that organization.

"I have been involved in the EDAC for about seven years," noted Mr. Rose, who first became involved with the organization while working for Waubetek Business Development Corporation in

economic development. "I started the certification process with 35 other people," he recalled. "I am not sure how many

followed along behind me, but I went through the entire set of courses to get my designation."

The EDAC is Canada's national not-for-profit networking association for professional economic developers in the federal, provincial, municipal and private sec-

tors. The association offers its members professional development, networking opportunities and a comprehensive offering of resources, both on and offline.

"There is a lot of value added for economic development professionals in membership in the EDAC," he said, citing membership development as the prime motivator of the organization.

Mr. Rose said he is particularly excited to be leading the organization at this time in its development. "We have been moving in a national route," he said. Ont. seeks commentary on new curriculum, report cards

TORONTO—Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne and her education minister Mitzie Hunter visited Toronto's Lawrence Park Collegiate Institute on September 6 to announce the opening of public consultations on the province's proposed new curriculum and to provide details on the new report cards, both of which will be introduced into schools for the 2018-19 academic year.

"I have always believed that our work to build a fairer, more innovative Ontario starts in our publicly funded education system," said Premier Wynne in a release following the announcement. "We have great schools, but we always need to look for ways to make our children's schools even better. We need to give kids the variety of skills they'll need in a fast-changing world. This curriculum refresh will build on all the progress we've made and ensure we're giving students the skills, supports and opportunities to make their mark in their careers, their communities and the world.'

'In order for Ontario to continue to support student well-being and promote equity in our publicly funded education system, we must be positioned to meet the growing and ever-changing needs of all students today and in the future," said Ontario Minister of Education Mitzie Hunter. "We will work with all of our partners to ensure students have access to the most current and up-to-date curriculum possible,

from Kindergarten to Grade 12."

The proposed changes to the curriculum have met with positive responses from parent and science groups, as well as business leaders from across the province, but Rainbow District School Board Trustee Larry Killens is skeptical of the changes and their timing.

"I read very quickly the news release from Ms. Wynne," said Mr. Killens. "There are no solid details that I can see, however I will say as the trustee from the Manitoulin Island (and not speaking for the board), based on my experience for 20-plus years. I can see the Rainbow District School Board and I would go out on a limb and say other public school boards in Ontario have not been kept in the loop as well at all—unless the directors of education are keeping a secret. I suggest that highly unlikely and fatal to the level of trust if true.'

Mr. Killens challenged the premier's record on education. "How many times has Ms. Wynne and her ministers, improved, refreshed, redesigned and promised better?" he asked. "We in Rainbow Country, in most if not all EQAO scores, are lower than the provincial average."

He went on to note that "constant news articles of accommodation reviews mandating school closures happen too frequently. We now have basically a moratorium on accommodation reviews provincially," he

2017 taxes another burden for farmers

A lot of very unhappy farmers out there right now

To the Expositor:

The full impact of the latest property assessments delivered by MPAC (Municipal Property Assessment Corporation) and the final date of September 29, 2017 for taxes due in the municipality of NEMI (Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands), property owners of agricultural lands will bear the majority of tax increases over all classes of property such as residential, recreational, commercial and industrial. The farmers are already faced with high operating costs for fuel, seed, fertilizer, machinery and repairs, etc. and now add property taxes.

I own a small farm property of 170 acres and I have a 30 percent increase in my farm property assessment resulting in a 37 percent increase in my taxes from 2016. This tax increase is for the farmland and farm buildings, excluding the residence. I might be able to recoup some of this tax increase from a neighbouring farmer who rents my farm, but if I do I expect he will be a very unhappy farmer.

Concerns over the portrayal of Meldrum Bay to tourists

Meldrum Bay today is looking better than it has in years

To the Expositor:

Let me start by saying that although I'm not an Islander or landowner. I've been coming to Manitoulin for almost 30 years and there is nowhere else my wife and I would rather spend our holidays. We count the days until our next visit and have introduced a number of other families to the Island over the years, several of whom have made return trips themselves. It's a special, magical place for all kinds of reasons. So although I've held back my thoughts for years, feeling perhaps that I might be out of line to publicly voice my views about a place that was not my home, I can't hold back any longer-why can't the stakeholders of the Mississagi Lighthouse property get their act together?

No doubt the puzzle of who controls what aspect of the lighthouse is a confusing one: the federal government, Dawson and Robinson townships, the Manitoulin Tourism Association, Lafarge and what I assume to be a private landowner, with respect to the access road, all appear to have a stake in things. But from an outsider's perspective, it's hard to get a sense of who controls what and nobody I've ever spoken to has been able to provide a confident answer. Regardless of the intertwined relationships, I've always been bewildered as to why the simple upkeep and maintenance of this jewel appears to be beyond the ability (or caring) of those who have the power to do so.

On our recent holiday, my wife and I were thrilled to see the long overdue, excellent restoration work done to the lighthouse. For at least the last three summers, the tattered, leaky tarp covering the roof was a truly depressing sight to see upon pulling up to the campground. I'd hoped that the ancient septic bed may have received some of the same type of attention and been pumped and tuned up.

Sadly, this was not the case, and as usual, at least two flushes were required to clear any kind of volume, leaving you anxiously wondering if the next flush would send the whole mess spilling over the rim of the bowl. As with our last visit, two of the four showers were permanently out of order and for about a day, the water system completely broke down, a situation the campground manager Maddy Wagar and her assistant Hope rectified as soon as they could, not an easy task at such a remote site and even more difficult when plumbing is not something you are expert in.

I don't think it's a stretch to say basic strategic thinking would sug-

gest that if you'd like to draw tourists to the far West End of the Island, having something for them to see and do once there would be the way to go about it. Sadly, having the official 2017 Manitoulin Visitors Guide tell daytrippers that there is a restaurant at the lighthouse (prepared food has not been available there for three years now) and having MTA staff (reported in the "Friends and Neighbors section of the Recorder on August 18) telling Welcome Centre visitors that "there's nothing to see in Meldrum Bay, don't bother going there' certainly won t neip. Meldrum Bay today is looking better than it has in years—the store has reopened with enthusiastic new owners, the inn continues on as a reliable destination for those seeking quality food and accommodation, a new cell tower has brought reliable wireless communication and new diesel, gas and marine pumping facilities are slated to be installed at the marina this fall. It's time the lighthouse received a bit more love from those with the ability to make things happen. And I think the word "bit" is important, as I believe meaningful improvements could be done for much, much less than the \$400,000 dollars MTA Operations Manager Shelba Millette has said is the total of the unfunded wish list her organization has compiled.

Is a grassroots, community effort, involving all stakeholders who care about the property, an option? Chipping in time and resources? Often much can be accomplished, usually faster and sometimes better, by motivated individuals rather than by lumbering, bloated bureaucratic government channels. At the very least, the before mentioned plumbing issues need to be addressed immediately. As Ms. Millette herself has said. "Where there's a will, there's a way."

Maddy Wagar has done much with very little this summer and we, along with other Mississagi Lighthouse lovers, owe her our thanks. We hope to see her, or whoever ends up operating the site next year, receiving more support to make this historic and natural treasure shine. They and the many people who make the trip out to visit the lighthouse deserve better and so do the people of Manitoulin Island. Respectfully.

Thursday, September 14 marks the 135th Anniversary of the loss of the Asia

ne marine disaster led to another as first the Manitoulin caught fire on May 17, 1882 and was beached to reduce damage but with a loss of about 25 lives. Her successor on the route was the Asia which foundered in the almost hurricane of Thursday September 14, 1882, with a loss of over one hundred soles but miraculously, there were two survivors.

Melanchthon Simpson of St. Catharines built the 136-foot Asia in 1873 and she ran Windsor—Sarnia—Duluth for the North-West Transportation Co. of Sarnia. She was chartered by the Great Northern Transit Company to replace the Manitoulin on the Collingwood - Meaford - Owen Sound - Presqu'ile - French River - Sault Ste. Marie route that included intermediary ports.

Her final trip saw her depart Collingwood on September 13 at 5 pm and she departed from Owen Sound just after midnight on the 14th. Both Christie Morrison and Douglas Tinkiss boarded at Owen Sound. Christie was en route to the Sault to visit a sister and missed the Northern Belle's departure. Douglas and his Uncle James Hermon were heading back to Manitowaning on Manitoulin Island. The Steamboat Inspection Boards Chairman Report for 1882 described the wind that the Asia encountered late that morning as almost that of a hurricane for a short time and over a limited area.

To that date, the loss of the Asia represented the eighth greatest lost loss of human life on the Great Lakes and the largest loss on Georgian Bay. With no passenger manifest, the number actually lost remains unknown but various newspapers eventually put the number at 122 on a vessel



licenced to carry 49.

The survivors, 19-year-old Christie Ann Morrison and 16 year old Douglas Albert Tinkis, appeared to have survived because they took positions in the lifeboat at opposite ends and as the lifeboat flipped they were able to hold on with each rotation unlike the others with them, who were tossed out again and again.

The story of the loss of the Asia is well known, but little was said about the survivors once Captain P.A. Scott R.N., Chairman of the Board of Examiners of Masters & Mates, completed the Federal investigation. The hearing was held September 26-October 4, 1882 and concluded that as far as could be ascertained, the vessel was not in good ballast trim. A coroner's inquiry on September 20 was more damming, blaming various people including Captain Savage, the latter for heading out from Presqu'ile with a quickly dropping barometer.

Christie Ann Morrison was born on March 17, 1863 to a farming couple and lived in the Blind Line area near Bognor, southeast of Owen Sound. After the Asia incident, where she was deemed in the press to be a heroine, there was a report in the December 1, 1882 Paisley Advocate that she was to visit Bruce County to sell her photograph. This

souvenir photograph was taken in Dixon's Toronto photography and showed her dressed in black, holding a rope with a painted background of a seashore scene. Christie had long dark hair that hung almost to her elbows and the photograph angle emphasized that.

After her marriage on October 26, 1892 at the age of 29 to Albert Fleming, they resided on a farm at Kilsyth, southwest of Owen Sound. Their only child, a son, Clifford, was born in 1899. Christe passed away on August 18, 1937, aged 73 from coronary thrombosis and was buried in Owen Sound's Greenwood Cemetery on August 21. The family plot includes her husband, son Clifford and Clifford's wife. Christie and Albert had two grandchildren.

Douglas Albert Tinkis was born October 13, 1865 in Prescott. At the time Douglas and his Uncle stepped onto the Asia in Owen Sound, Douglas was working for his father, Jehiel, in Manitowaning as a merchant. In 1887 Douglas moved to Little Current where he established the Mansion House hotel with his brother. This hotel still stands today, renamed the Anchor Inn Hotel. Douglas never married

In 1900, Douglas had an attack of rheumatism that made him bed ridden for some weeks. A repeat attack in 1901 caused him to go to Toronto's Walker House for treatment but he got worse and his mother Angeline was called for. Shortly after her arrival, he was admitted to Grace Hospital where he passed away from a cerebral hemorrhage on October 4, aged 36. He was buried in Holy Trinity Cemetery, Howland Township, just outside of Little Current.

This author suggests the tombstones of Christie Morrison Fleming and Douglas Albert Tinkis need a small plaque affixed that says this is one of the two survivors of the loss of the Asia.

We know where the survivors now rest, but where does the Asia rest? Byng Inlet commercial fishermen have complained about catching their nets on unknown underwater objects. Could one of these be the Asia? Some believe it is and in 70 feet of water. Canadian Hydrographic Chart 2244, Alexander Passage to Beaverstone Bay notes water depths

of up to 229 feet. Given a lifeboat drifting southeasterly towards sight of the Byng Inlet light before a more southerly drift to Pointe au Baril, the Asia likely lies within this Chart, hidden for 135 years.

Northeast Town Council Notes

AOK roadwork

Town CAO Dave Williamson talked to council about a request from Pioneer Construction to do night work on a portion of Highway 540 by Aundeck Omni Kaning.

"The homeowners were notified by letter and I spoke to all but one personally to let them know our intentions and our reasoning," stated a letter from Pioneer Construction to the Northeast Town council. "All homeowners that I spoke to were in favour of the 24 hour operation."

Mr. Williamson explained that Pioneer Construction wants to work 24 hours a day on the project to finish it more quickly, which is why the homeowners affected were in favour of the proposal.

He added that council needed to comment as to whether they were okay with the proposal.

Council carried a motion stating that they had no concern with Pioneer Construction working 24 hour a day on the road project on Highway 540.

Automotive Materials Stewardship

Council reviewed a letter from Automotive Material Stewardship (AMS) about the start of the operation of an industry stewardship plan for the management of used oil filters, used oil containers, used antifreeze and its containers.

Mr. Williamson explained that Stewardship Ontario will no longer have any payment obligations to municipalities for the management of automotive materials and that it will now fall to AMS so the municipality needs to enter into an agreement with AMS in order to benefit.

Council carried a motion for the town to enter into an agreement with AMS.

Law and Order

Manitoulin OPP Labour Day Weekend wrap-up

During the Labour Day long weekend, Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers throughout the province focused on highway enforcement. The four causal factors for injury and/or death on OPP patrolled roadways are speeding, distracted driving, aggressive driving and the failure to wear and properly wear a seatbelt.

Manitoulin OPP laid the following charges over the Labour Day Weekend: 56 speeding charges; two seatbelt charges; two distracted driving charges; four Off Road Vehicle Act Offences; and nine other Highway Traffic Act charges.

Additionally, the Manitoulin OPP proactively responded to 15 hours of Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) Programs.

Zoning amendment

Council reviewed a zoning bylaw amendment for 15 Worthington Street. The owner, Bryan Parkinson, wanted to change the use of his property from 75 percent residential 25 percent commercial, to 100 percent residential.

Council carried a motion to amend the bylaw to allow Mr. Parkinson to make the entire building residential, noting that more seniors housing was needed in the community.

Terry Fox Run

Martha McClew, provincial director for the Terry Fox Foundation, sent a letter to council requesting

that the town grant Terry Fox Run organizers permission to use town areas (Low Island Park) and to solicit donations from local merchants.

The Northeast Town council carried a motion granting Terry Fox organizers to use municipal lands for the run.

Harbour View Road parking Anita Hull, a resident of

Anita Hull, a resident of Harbour View Road, wrote council regarding parking along the road during Manitoulin Country Fest.

"As a summer resident of Harbour View Road, I have just one concern regarding Country Fest," said Ms. Hull. "There were many vehicles parked on Harbour View Road, making it into a one lane road. This is concerning if EMS, the fire department or police have to access any homes or cottages in that area."

Mr. Williamson said he had spoken with the organizers of Manitoulin Country Fest about solutions and that they were looking into options.

Council directed staff to continue to work with the organizers to rectify the problem.

New library board member

Council carried a motion to appoint Paula Hooper to

the Little Current Library Board. In a letter to council, Ms. Hooper explained that she and her husband purchased a home and retired to Little Current in January 2016. She described herself as "an avid reader and life long learner who believes that public libraries play an essential role, particularly in smaller communities."

Financial reports

Town Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin reviewed the financial reports with council. For accounts receivable taxes, Ms. Wilkin reported that there were \$349,401.30 in payments in August. She noted that the next tax installment is due Septem-

ber 29.

For accounts receivable water/sewer, Ms. Wilkin reported that there were \$33,760.15 made in payments last month. She noted that there were 28 accounts over the \$400 limit at the time of the report, six due to penalty applied for August; in five cases arrangements had been made; and 17 account holders would be receiving disconnection letters.

Ms. Wilkin said that staff had been calling the account holders and working with them to arrange payments and that she hoped the efforts would reduce the amount of disconnection letters that would need to be mailed out.

Ontario releases safe and sensible framework to manage federal legalization of cannabis

ONTARIO—In response to the federal government's plan to legalize cannabis by July 2018, Ontario is committing to a safe and sensible framework to govern the lawful use and retail of recreational cannabis as a carefully controlled substance within the province.

Yasir Naqvi, Attorney General, Charles Sousa, Minister of Finance and Eric Hoskins, Minister of Health and Long-Term Care, announced Friday that legislation will be introduced later this fall, following the conclusion of province-wide consultations. Ontario's approach to the legalization of cannabis will be informed by the province's experience in managing tobacco and alcohol as well as practical lessons of other jurisdictions that have recently legalized cannabis, a press release from the government explains.

Key elements include: The proposed minimum age to use, purchase and possess recreational cannabis in Ontario will be 19. The use of recreational cannabis will be prohibited in public places and workplaces; The LCBO will oversee the legal retail of cannabis in Ontario through new

stand-alone cannabis stores and an online order service. This approach will ensure that there will be only one legal retail distributor for cannabis in Ontario and alcohol and cannabis are not sold alongside each other; Approximately 150 stand-alone stores will be opened by 2020, including 80 by July 1, 2019, servicing all regions of the province. Online distribution will be available across the province from July 2018 onward; Illicit cannabis dispensaries are not and will not be legal retailers. The province will pursue a coordinated and proactive enforcement strategy, working with municipalities, local police services, the OPP and the federal government to help shut down these illegal operations; and Ontario will prohibit individuals under the age of 19 from possessing or consuming recreational cannabis, which will allow police to confiscate small amounts of cannabis from people. province's The approach to protecting youth will focus on prevention, diversion, and harm reduction without unnecessarily bringing them into contact with the justice system.

The province will support young

people and vulnerable populations through the development of an integrated prevention and harm reduction approach that would promote awareness of cannabis-related health harms and help people make informed decisions about use. The approach will also include education, health and social service providers that work with, and educate, youth and young adults.

Decisions with respect to pricing and taxation will be made after further details are provided by the federal government. Final decisions will be informed by focusing on the objectives of discouraging consumption and eliminating the illegal market. In the lead up to federal legalization, to help ensure public awareness of this transition and the new measures that will take effect, the government will also undertake a public information campaign in coordination with the federal government.

Ontario intends to consult closely with municipalities, Indigenous communities, and stakeholders to determine additional details about the retail and distribution system.



Assiginack's Angry Antlers Vineyard eyes expansion

MANITOWANING—A friend once told Rick Krasowski that it was impossible to grow grapes for winemaking on Manitoulin Island; he saw this as a challenge that he could not refuse and, along with his wife Justice Louise Serré and her parents, bought some land on Manitoulin and started a vineyard. Today that vineyard, located in the High Falls area of Highway 6, is known as the Angry Antlers Vineyard.

Last Wednesday the hobby winemaker was a guest speaker at the Assiginack Horticultural monthly meeting. The Grade 7/8 Assiginack Public School teacher and grape grower was invited to share his knowledge of grape growing as well as the story of how he and his family got into the vineyard

In his presentation, Mr. Krasowski spoke of the research and preparation that went into starting a vineyard, including research into the effects of temperatures and weather conditions on grapes as well as possible diseases. Research included watching the weather over a five-year span in order to get a good sense of what

types of grapes would be best suited to the area. After this initial research, the family began experiwith different menting grapes, including six whites and six reds. Four of the varieties grew well and some of the most successful results came from two reds, a Frontenac as well as a Sabrevois from the Minnesota area, which Mr. Krasowski explains ripens quicker and is characterized as being "extremely hardy and very sweet (grapes), which make an excellent wine."

The vineyard, which is in its tenth year, got its name from the phenomena of


deer getting their antlers stuck in the wire fencing surrounding the grapes, which the deer would then rip out in an effort to get to the clover that was planted to help increase nitrogen levels. There are eight kilometres, or 5,000 vines over 48 rows and, according to Mr. Krasowski, can reasonably be expected to produce 12-20 tonnes of grapes, or in more relatable terms, 1,500 or more cases of wine. The vineyard, however, is not yet at the point where it's able to produce this much wine on its own but Mr. Krasowski expects that in the next phase they will acquire the equipment necery so that they may produce wine that can be sold on premise. In the meantime, the owners are exploring the possibility of greengrapes, grown growing a variety of fruit trees which they're keen to blend with their grapes to make new and interesting wines as well as experimentation with grafting in order to make new varieties of grapes.

It's a good thing Mr. Krasowski enjoys a challenge as there have been a number along the way and surely there will be more to come on his journey to being a wine producer, which he's clearly excited and passionate about. He's proud of the fact that the vineyard is a family-oriented organic vineyard and he's pleased to now be a full-time member of the community who calls Township Assiginack home.

The Assiginack Horticultural Society, which hosted the presentation, meets monthly on the first Wednesday of the month at Knox United Church in Manitowaning. The society is open to anyone interested in horticulture and welcomes new members to join them at any of their

meetings. They are responsible for the flower gardens at the museum as well as the community flower bar-

There were just over 20 Horticultural Society members at the presentation, many of whom mused that they weren't necessarily interested in growing their own wine grapes but had a fond appreciation for the

toulin Island October 23. In an open letter to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Indigenous Affairs Minister Carolyn Bennett the chiefs take the government to task over the doublespeak disconnect between the feds feel good pronouncements action on the ground.

"We are writing to express, in good faith but in no uncertain terms, our profound disappointment regarding the clear and disconnect complete between your government's enlightened words and hopeful statements and the actions of your government in dealing with our claim," write the chiefs on August 22, replying to a letter from the minister. "Your letter says: 'the Government of Canada places a high priority on renewing a nation-tonation relationship with

Indigenous peoples. We are committed to developing a partnership based on recognition of rights, respect and cooperation.' Yet, by its actions, your government is doing the exact opposite."

The chiefs challenge both the language and the tone of the government's representatives in the negotia tions, as well as the substance of their position on the negotiations.

"Unfortunately, not only have your officials rejected our overtures at reconciliation, your lawyers are advancing arguments and evidence in the litigation that can only be described as outdated, obsolete, ethnocentric, adversarial and inflammatory," write the chiefs. "Needless to say, they reflect attitudes that are contrary to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Report and the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples."

"There seems to be a real disconnect between the legal people at the treasury office and the other departments of the government," suggested Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier, one of the signatories of the let-

According to the Anishinaabek claim, "the 'Ojibwe' agreed to share their lands and resources with the newcomers—approximately 35,700 square miles of territory. The treaty territory covers the lands north of Lake Huron from Penetanguishene to beyond Sault Ste. Marie, up to the height of land. The Robinson Superior Treaty, signed on September 7, 1850, covers lands north of Lake Superior, from North of Sault Ste. Marie to Thunder Bay. The Robinson Treaty territories have yielded vast amounts of revenues from forestry, mining and other resource development activities over the years, yet the annuities remain at a mere \$4 per

Despite the obvious frustration evident in the chiefs' communications. they end their latest letter to the prime minister with an olive branch. "We can only hope that your words and Canada's announcement of its Principles Respecting the Government of Canada's Relationship with Indigenous Peoples and the need for a new liti-

gation strategy will combine to cause Canada to negotiate, rather than to litigate, a resolution of our treaty annuities claim. Only in this way can reconciliation truly be reached."

Wiikwemkoong community members, health care professionals and area dignitaries gathered last Wednesday in Wiikwemkoong to celebrate the official groundbreaking for a Wiikwemkoong shelter for victims of violence.

The ceremony began with an opening prayer from 12-year-old Brooklyn Pheasant, followed by an honour song by Roland Jacko and Stephen Peltier. Elder Robert Pheasant performed a blessing of the grounds and ancestors and led a pipe ceremony.

"This shelter has been a vision for this community for a long time," said Wiikwemkoong Chief Duke Peltier. "This project is truly a community effort."

Chief Peltier recognized the work and support Ms. Wabano and her staff, the Anishnabek Nation for lobbying on behalf of the community for the funding for the new shelter and Chief Isadore Day and the Chiefs of Ontario.

Wabano thanked everyone in attendance, stating, "without each and every one of you this wouldn't be happening."

'This is the first day, moving forward in a good way with support around us," said Ms. Wabano. "When people come knocking at the door (of the shelter) we will be able to wel-

come them and help children and families—give them a safe place and support them."

"I'm happy that I get to see that hard work come to fruition today," said Adrienne Peltier, social services director with the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI)." I'm pleased and honoured to be here."

"I'm happy to see that Wiikwemkoong got the funding and support for this new building," said Laureen Linklater-Pizzale, family well-being coordinator with the Anishinabek Nation. "When a family is in crisis, they will now have a safe space.

Noojmowin Teg Health Centre Executive Director Pam Williamson spoke of the importance of culture for treatment and healing.

"I appreciate the advocacy from the First Nation leaders with the provincial government for this project and others," said Ms. Williamson. "There is a lot of opportunity right now and we need to capitalize on

Ms. Williamson noted that Noojmowin Teg is

advocating for funding for forensic testing for victims of sexual assault and violence. "Right now victims have to travel to Sudbury for testing, but we would offer that locally," she said.

A letter was read from Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Michael Mantha who sent his regrets on not being able to attend the ceremony.

"Today on this very special occasion we join together in celebrating this groundbreaking, marks the beginning of construction of the shelter for Victims of Violence," wrote Mr. Mantha. "Once constructed, this new shelter will stand as a beacon to this community, serving as a safe haven for those who seek emergency assistance, safety and protection when facing violence and abuse at the hands of another."

"Over the course of many years, I have seen violence in our communisaid Elder Phyllis Williams. "I would do all that I could to help. This shelter will be a safe haven for those who wish to utilize it. We need to make a change in our lives for ourselves and those who are yet to be born.

The ceremony concluded with an honour song by Brandy Peltier and a ceremonial breaking of the ground, followed by a Wiikreception at the wemkoong Arena.

Work on the facility will begin shortly, with the project to be completed and accepting clients by the fall of 2018.

...continued from page 3 said. "If I recall, I have a CBC clip where I presented a motion to do just that (write the government to encourage a moratorium), our board chair stated, and I quote, 'This will not happen; not in my lifetime'."

As for the new report cards, "been there, done that, several times," said Mr. Killens. "Parent involvement? Been there, not done that. I have as a trustee asked to be at parent/teacher interview nights to share with parents, and thus be accountable and obtain first hand concerns from parents about their student's education and I have been refused access to the school.'

As for the new curriculum—"been there, constantly doing that and yet we still announce how we are failing our kids," he said. He pointed to mental health issues, which he characterized as "a hot button topic of huge proportions" as an example. "The Rainbow Board has made an effort with the limited resources they have, by hiring social workers and mental health workers," he said. "I think five in each area. How does that small number serve 13,000 students?" he asked.

But other voices are lauding the steps forward. "Students need a curriculum that focuses on building skills like problem solving and creative, critical thinking," said Bonnie Schmidt, president of Let's Talk Science and chair of the Canadian Leadership Taskforce on Education and Skills' Information and Communications Technology Council (ICTC). "We are pleased that the government is taking a proactive step by providing resources that will help students develop these essential skills and the characteristics needed to thrive in an increasingly interconnected world."

"People for Education is pleased that the Ministry of Education is moving toward a focus on the student competencies that are essential for success in

school and life," confirmed Annie Kidder, executive director of People for Education. "Our work with Ontario educators, scholars and policy-makers over the past four years has shown how critical these areas are for student learning and success—from Kindergarten right through to Grade 12, post-secondary education and employment. Embedding these transferable skills in the curriculum and updating the way we report to parents represent an exciting opportunity for Ontario to take a leading role in the global movement toward broader goals for education and broader measures of success in our schools.'

Business has also reacted well to the new approach to learning outlined in the announcement. "IBM Canada supports Ontario's work toward adding these transferable skill sets to the Kindergarten to Grade 12 curriculum," noted IBM Canada President Dino Trevisani. "As a leader in cloud and cognitive technologies, we aim to employ young people with these skills, paired with modern Science, Technology, Engineer-Arts and Math (STEAM) capabilities, to help us reshape this industry and create a better, brighter future for generations to come."

According the announcement, Ontario's updated school curriculum "will be developed through the public consultations with the goal of improving student achievement in core skills such as math and increasing emphasis on transferable life skills that can help students of all ages meet the changing demands of today and tomorrow. Communication, problemsolving, critical thinking. creativity and global citizenship are skills that will Ontario students thrive as they grow up in a changing, interconnected world. Beginning next school year, new report cards will better track a young person's development of these essential and transferable life skills.'

By consulting with students, parents, teachers and other partners, the province hopes to help students take full advantage of their education experience, notes the announcement. The plan is to accomplish that goal with a new curriculum that "better engages every aspect of a young person's interests and potential." The new curriculum also aims to "place an increased emphasis on equity and wellbeing, including the effects that physical activity, bullying and mental health can have on student success in and out of the classroom; update provincial assessment and reporting practices, including EQAO, to make sure they are culturally relevant, measure a wider range of learning and better reflect student well-being and equity; and enhance parents' access to information about how their children are doing in school."

RDSB Director of Education Norm Blaseg said that the RDSB has "nothing to share. The ministry has not shared any details with boards." Boards of Education, it appears, were caught off-guard by the announcement. Mr. Blaseg said that he remains hopeful that "the ministry will head the advice of boards before they make any dramatic changes.'

Mr. Killens has a theory: "An election is around the corner and any promise, any predictions, any new ideas," he said, prompt him to ask "Why now? Why not two and three years ago? I would encourage specifically those two persons, the premier and the minister to fix and put in place what you have now.'

The public consultation on student assessment will be conducted by the premier and the minister of education's six education advisors led by Dr. Carol Campbell. Those advisors include two new advisors Dr. Carl James, Jean Augustine chair in Education, Community and Diaspora, Faculty of Education at York University; Kahontakwas Diane Longboat, senior project manager guiding directions implementation at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, as well as a ceremoleader, educator, teacher of Indigenous spiritual ways and healer, and four current advisors who have been reappointed for an 18-month term. Those four are Dr. Campbell, associate professor of Leadership and Educational Change at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto (OISE), Dr. Jean Clinton, clinical professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster University; Dr. Michael Fullan, professor emeritus and former dean of the OISE at the University of Toronto; and Dr. Andy Hargreaves, the Thomas More Brennan Chair in the Lynch School of Education

at Boston College.

...continued from page 3 building a consensus on a consistent approach to the field on an international level. "There are unique needs in different areas," noted Mr. Rose. "The eventual goal is to see a professional designation like you have for chartered accountants.'

As for the economic development field as a career path, Mr. Rose said that it is immensely rewarding on many different levels and the demand in the field is strong. "I think it is an exceptional career path," he said. "Every good sized municipality has an economic development officer.'

Mr. Rose notes that there is not a great understanding of the field amongst something he would like to see change in the near term. "We need to get more youth involved," he said. "There is so much that is interesting in the field. It involves strategic thinking and planning, you have to have a good understanding of taxes

and be able to look ahead to chart a course for your organization that improve the economic opportunities in your community."

The EDAC assists economic development professionals through course offerings, networking, certification and scholarships.

...Manitowaning's John Caselton builds aquaculture research facility

ture operations seemed to always be looking for quality fingerlings with which to stock their cages.

Setting out to discover everything he could about the industry Mr. Caselton quickly discovered a lot of people in the industry keep their own research close to the chest. "It's a very competitive industry," he noted. But he soon also discovered that fish farming is definitely an industry with a bright future.

"We import a huge amount of the fish we eat,' he noted, which might come as quite a surprise when one considers the significant part of the Canadian economy that fishing and aquaculture plays. In 2015, the aquaculture industry generated over \$1 billion in GDP, generating close to \$3 billion in total economic activity and approximately 72,000 Canadians make their living directly from fishing and fishing-related activities.

Ergonomically makes huge sense as the feed conversion rates are exceedingly positive. Fish tend to have a feed conversion rate (FCR) ranging from almost one-to-one to one-and-a-half-to-one.

Chicken is at least 1.8 to one while pigs are 2.63 to one and lamb is a whopping 6.30 to one and cattle just slightly less at 6 to one. That means that for every six pounds of food consumed by a cattle beast it gains one pound. One to one is pretty attractive on a relative scale.

Mr. Caselton took The Expositor on a tour of his operation recently. He noted that contamination is one of the most dangerous issues faced by aquaculture operations. One of the first things that strikes an observer upon entering the Caselton Aquaculture tankhouse is that it is spotlessly clean. "Biohazards are something you are always on the alert for," he

The other major concern for aquaculture operations is escapees. Being located in a closed system on land rather than an open-water cage culture that issue is clearly not an issue—fish don't tend to walk away.

There are two large stainless steel tanks in the tankhouse. Mr. Caselton lifts the lid on the first to reveal a swirling school of fish. "These are wild trout," he explains. "That is why they are different sizes. Unlike the fish that are generally used in rainbow trout or other aquaculture operations, wild trout don't tend to grow at a uniform rate. But these trout serve another, might one even suggest sinister. purpose—they serve as the canaries in the fish pond.

"These are Ganaraska rainbow, they are very, very sensitive and tremendously difficult to raise," said Mr. Caselton, who purchased the stock from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF). The Ganaraska River is near Port Hope.

The sensitivity of these particular wild trout makes them just about perfect for Mr. Caselton's testing purposes. In another tank a school of brook trout swim languorously around. He is hoping to utilize these particular fish as breeding

Outside of the tank house, many meters away, are three outdoor ponds with a total of about 10 million gallons of water between them that Mr. Caselton has built under the close eye of the MNRF. The first feeds into his

tankhouse, at the voluminous rate of about .5 litres a minute (that's to feed a 4,000-litre tank system).


The water in each of the tanks swirls at a very carefully set rate. "Too slow and the fish become aggressive, too fast and they become too lean," he explains. "It's called the teacup effect." The effect is produced through the agency of a radial flow system.

Water from the tanks flow gently into a series of tanks designed by Mr. Caselton to hold KL media, a biofilter material that looks much like a wagonwheel pasta, tanks to remove solids from the water (fish poop and leftover feed) and tanks to deoxygenate the water and remove carbon dioxide.

On a nearby table sits a series of chemical bottles, most of which would be familiar to any serious home aquarium enthusiast. Mr. Caselton regularly for ammonia. nitrates, nitrites, dissolved oxygen, water temperature and pH.

Travelling out to the back 40, we stop at the two furthest ponds that stretch out to a treeline several hundred metres away.

"When I first moved here to the farm I was reluctant to put in an appearance, but in the ponds live literally thousands of smallmouth bass. "When I come out here early in the morning to feed them they are used to me and come pretty quickly," he said. It is late afternoon. "With the two of us here they may not come. They are very, very cautious.



Probably for good reason, they are among the most popular of eating fish. "They actually have thicker fillets than walleye," he

Casting a small handful of slow sinking feed pellets out in the water, we are soon rewarded with the sight of some respectablesized bass. "Those are the little ones, they tend to be a little more hungry," he said.

"There are six and seven pounders that come up in the morning. They don't move very fast.'

Mr. Caselton might be mistaken for a paranoid militiaman, given the number of closed circuit television cameras that festoon his property, including the tanks, bottoms of the fish ponds and trails around the property, "No," he laughs, "I just like to stay on top of things." Best not to try and slip in to cast a line or two when you don't think he is watching. He always is.

The aquaculturist pulls a cell phone from his pocket and taps a few codes in. Soon we are watching the fish in the tankhouse making their rounds of the tank, a tap or two more, and the fish in the ponds fill the screen, another tap, the

Island youth discovers passion for teaching during trip to Cambodia

CAMBODIA—Hanna Hutchinson of Sandfield has recently returned from a life-changing volunteer trip to Cambodia.

The Expositor caught up with the 18-year-old in between classes at her first week at the University of Ottawa where she is studying biology.

"I knew I wanted to volunteer this past summer and I thought it would be a good experience to do it abroad," Hanna explained. "I started looking online and found STAR Kampuchea, a Cambodian nonprofit and NPO (non-partisan organization); they connect individuals volunteers with organizations, schools etc. I wanted to teach, so they connected me with a school."

Hanna left for Cambodia on July 1, settling in in the capital city of Phnom Penh for her four-week stay.

"I lived in the STAR Kampuchea house along with 40 other volunteers and taught at a school privately funded by Austrians called CBF (Children for Better Future)," she said. "I was assigned a life skills class for 13- to 17-year-olds. They were mostly fluent in English so I primarily taught them science."

"It was amazing connecting with the students," shared Hanna. "My one class was only eight students so I got to really know them. Most of them were living alone or without family as they attended school

in the city."

One of Hanna's favourite memories of her time teaching was leading the class through an experiment of the chemical reaction of mixing baking soda and vinegar (the classic 'volcano' science experiment)

"They had never seen the reaction before and the looks on their faces were priceless," said Hanna. "We also made bottle rockets and the whole school came out to see them take off" When Hanna wasn't teaching, she spent the weekends getting to know the other volunteers in the STAR house and sightseeing

"The other volunteers were from all over the world," she said. "It was incredible and I made a lot of new friends that I'm staying in touch with."

Prior to her experience in

Cambodia, Hanna was certain she wanted to become a doctor, but now she is reconsidering her future.

"Cambodia made me realize that maybe I want to be a science teacher instead," said Hanna. "It opened my eyes to a whole world of opportunity."

Although Hanna's busy courseload will keep her occupied this fall, she is hoping to start a fundraising campaign for Children for Better Future.

"They are in need of more resources and I want to do all that I can to help," said Hanna. "I will be setting up something soon, but if people want to contact me for more information I can be reached through Facebook or email at hzhutchinson@gmail.com."

"Art Quilts International: Abstract and Geometric' includes 300 gorgeous art quilts, bursting with colour and excitement, capturing the work of 124 major quilt artists from 18 countries," added. "Quilt National is a biennial exhibition and this was the 20th year," said Ms. Martin. "It is one of the most important exhibitions internationally for art quilters. This is



...continued from page 12 feeder stations pop into view, again and we witness the sunlight dappling the clearing by Mr. Caselton's tree stand.

Almost entirely self taught, Mr. Caselton has become one of the most knowledgeable piscine scholars in the North. "It's a matter of focus," he explains.

His MNRF licence lists every single fish species that can be raised in Ontario. Mr. Caselton has networked with bass operations in New York that export tens of thousands of bass into the province, but his gaze is fixed much closer to home. "It's a matter of numbers," he explained. "Do I want to raise bass and ship them hundreds of kilometers south, or raise rainbow fingerlings that local operators tell me they will take as many as I can pro-

a balancing act It's indeed—bass at six dollars a pound on the hoof or fingerlings at a dollar an inch.



There are thousands of smallbouth bass being reared at the Caselton Aquaculture site.

"I plan to make money at this," smiles Mr. Caselton. "A lot of money."

Judging by his intense passion and the seriousness with which he conducts his research it is easy to believe he is right.

A long set of floater tanks lie at the entrance to the parking lot. They are scavenged from a local aquaculture operation, but Mr. Caselton sees energy savings. "Energy and feed are the two expenses," he notes. The floater tanks will be used to create a spillway that will make working with the fish a lot less energy intensive. As for the

Ontario communities onto the small screen and what developed was a 10-part short video series that visited big cities and small towns across Ontario to uncover what makes each of those places unique. The documentaries inside iconic community landmarks and meet the people who breathe life

into local culture." From Corsini's in Hamilton to the historic Regent Theatre in Picton, TVO viewers were offered the opportunity to discover the stories that make those main streets and communities special. The documentaries blend "playful animation with real voices and archival images to tell local tales.'

Main Street Ontario filmmaker Charles Kechabaw related how the proiect's mobile recording studio travelled across Ontario documenting those stories. After interviewing Manitoulin Publishing's Rick McCutcheon in 2012, Mr. Kechabaw and his team struck gold when Mr. McCutcheon described Debajehmujig and its own creation story as a potential subject. The rest is. well, oral history.

The series was well-situated on the TVO schedule, opening up for The Agenda. "It was a great lead-in for us," said Mr. Kechabaw.

As to the subject matter, Mr. Kechabaw was effusive in his description of the Debaj crew. "Ron (Berti) Joe (Osawahine) Bruce (Noakwegijig) were wonderful people to speak with," he said. "We were so lucky to be able to put together this story and highlight this organization."

The documentary project was more than just a job for the production team whose passion for their work was clearly evident as the conversation unfolded. "We want to inspire people to head back to downtown and remember why main street matters, how supporting small business can make a big difference in a community and what local pride really means to Canadians," said Mr. Kechabaw.

He explained the motivation that drives that passion. "The Tale of a

Town is a vehicle for public engagement and audience development, connecting people with their past through our innovative approach to the gathering and retelling of stories that has received critical acclaim for its high artistic merit and social relevance."

"Across Canada, countless main streets, along with the stories they hold, are in the midst of disappearance as old gives way to new, local gives way to global, diversity gives way to uniformity and life gives way to death," he said. "It is our hope that The Tale of a Town will save these 'almost lost stories' that reveal our past and inspire a bright future for our main streets in Canada."

The Tale of a Town— Canada is created and produced by FIXT POINT, a not-for-profit theatre and media company based in Toronto with a mandate to "inspire audiences to imagine change.'

FIXT POINT in turn is led by the husband and wife duo of Mr. Ketchabaw (managing director) and Lisa Marie DiLiberto (artistic director).

But Mr. Ketchabaw suggests that folks go even further. "People should go and engage with Debajehmu-

jig," he said. "Go to their Creation Centre and check out what they are doing

As for The Tale of the Town project and its investigation of the stories behind Ontario's vast and diverse communities, the project continues on.

"Our storygathering work will continue into 2017 and beyond with Living Archive, a future-facing project

that builds upon The Tale of a Town while expanding its scope," said Mr. Ketchabaw. "The Living Archive is a multi-platform project designed specifically to mark Canada's 150th anniversary that will travel Highway 11, Canada's longest road, actively engaging with thousands of Canadians and celebrating our diver-As we define sitv. what "community" means to us in 2017 and articulate our visions for the future for our communities, this participatory initiative will strive to give voice to how, together, we can create a more inclusive Canada in the future.'



OSCIA Soil Champion Nominations

Jean's Walk Part II

When the Mindemoya War Memorial Community Centre opened in 1952, the inspector announced, "There is nothing like it in the province!" On Sunday, August 27, this unique building was featured in a historical walk of the east portion of King St. led by volunteer guide Pat Costigan (third from the right) for the Central Manitoulin Historical Society. The walk was entitled 'Jean's Walk: An Historical Walking Tour Part II. The community centre's unique design was the creation of John Kelly, an architect who was also a summer resident on Manitoulin. Among its features is a roof extending 18 feet over the back wall, for the comfort of spectators watching baseball games from the bleachers behind the building. The 24 people on the tour would agree that Ms. Costigan brings history to life. But for people who missed the tours this year, or who are just curious about Mindemoya's beginnings, Ms. Costigan and Norma Hughson, also a volunteer, prepared two booklets for the Central Manitoulin Historical Society describing the buildings on both Jean's Walk Part I and Part



Mr. Deschamps explained that Mr. Batman started the campground back in 1967, designing it with larger, more private sites than other parks.


We are also celebrating our 10th year this year too, so we wanted to do something special to honour the park's founder," said Mr. Deschamps.






Providence Bay News and Notes

The last 5 years I have had a barter system in place with my brother-in-law Ron. Ron will grow me tomato plants, all heirloom, and give me directions on how each will grow, taste and colour. I in return will bake him my sourdough, whole grain, seedy bread that you can use as a weapon (that's how heavy it is). We are both grinning when we make the exchange.

Every year when I plant the tomatoes I say to myself, "remember—stake them and prune them." With good intentions I do so at the start of the summer, then as the rest of the gardening season is upon me the tomato plants are left to fend for themselves. The last 2 weeks I have been checking and noticed I have some huge pink ones and an over abundance of cherry tomatoes that are bursting with flavour. Now I need to cook with them!!!!

Tomato Salad with Feta, Olives and Mint

This salad is so easy and tasty and you get to use the cherry and large tomatoes. Do use the Kalamata olives—not the ones in the can that are thinly sliced, I can't remember what kind they are but to me they ruin pizzas and Greek salads. You can substitute the feta with goat or fresh mozzarella cheese.

6 ounces feta cheese

- $1/4\ cup\ chopped\ fresh\ mint$
- 4 large ripe tomatoes, cut into 1/4-inch slices Sea salt
- 1/2 pound cucumber, peeled, seeded, and cut into small dice
- 1/2 pound bite-size tomatoes (cherry, pear, grape) in assorted colors, halved
- 1/2 cup Kalamata olives (about 15), pitted and halved
- 1/4 olive oil
- 1/2 tsp grated lemon zest
- 4 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1. Crumble the feta into a small bowl, add the chopped mint and toss; set aside
- 2. Season the tomato slices with salt and then arrange them, overlapping slightly, on a serving platter. Sprinkle the cucumber over the tomato slices. Season the cherry tomatoes with salt and scatter them over the cucumber. Sprinkle the olives on top.
- 3. In a small bowl, whisk together the olive oil, lemon zest, and lemon juice. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Drizzle the vinaigrette over the salad.
- 4. To serve, scatter the feta over the salad, garnish with mint sprigs, and serve immediately.

Potato, Tomato, and Sausage Panfry

This is a very simple dish. Choose a good sausage with lots of flavour. Don't have sausage use boneless chicken breasts or thighs. Use a deep skillet or it will overflow onto your stove top.

- 2 large potatoes, sliced
- 1 tbsp sunflower seed oil
- 4 large sausages
- 1 red onion, cut into 8
- 1 Tbsp tomato paste
- 2/3 cup red wine 2/3 cup plum tomatoes
- 2 large tomatoes, cut into 8
- 1 cup broccoli flowerets 4 Tbsp chopped fresh basil
- Salt and pepper
- Thinly sliced fresh basil for garnish
- 1. Cook the sliced potatoes in a saucepan of boiling water for 7 minutes. Drain thoroughly and set aside.
- 2. Heat oil in a large skillet and add the sausages and cook for 5 minutes. Turn the sausages so they are brown on all sides.
- 3. Add the onion pieces to the pan and cook for 5 minutes stirring frequently.
- 4. Stir in the tomato paste, red wine, and the plum tomatoes and mix together. Add the tomato wedges, broccoli flowerets, and chopped basil to the panfry and mix carefully.
- 5. Add the parboiled potato slices to the pan. Cook the mixture for about 10 minutes making sure the sausages are completely cooked through. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- 6. Garnish the panfry with fresh basil and serve hot.
