**Central council repairing** Mindemoya arena, planning for new recreation centre

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—A motion to move ahead with \$30,000 in repairs to the Mindemoya arena was hotly debated in front of a standing room only audience gathered at the September 12 meeting of municipal coun-

At issue were a number of factors, including the cost of the repairs, the future of the Mindemoya arena, the placement of a new chiller unit and a proposal to proceed with the planning of a new recreational complex to be cited in Mindemoya.

First up on the docket was the acceptance of a structural inspection report on the J.H. Burt Memorial Arena conducted by Engineering

"It is a good report that outlines the do's and not's," said Mayor Richard Stephens, but he added that it was not highly detailed.

Councillor Derek Stephens

countered that the report was "not as detailed as I would have liked" but that the report was fairly detailed and "did steer us in the right direction as far as I could

# Council decides to maintain ownership of Wagg's Wood

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—Council moved to affirm that it would retain ownership of the greenspace known as Wagg's Wood and further, that the municipality move forward with investigating how to develop and preserve the property. The motion was moved by Councillor Angela Johnston and seconded by Councillor Al Tribinevicius.

"There was an offer to council for a 99-year lease on that property," said Councillor Derek Stephens. "What happened with that? Would this impact the status quo?"

"Even if the property were to be leased, we would still own the property," said CAO Ruth Frawley.

Councillor Steve Shaffer questioned the use of the word "greenspace" in the motion, asking if the current zoning

was residential hamlet.

"In the new Official Plan it is designated as 'open space'," said Mayor Richard Stephens. "It could still have a development plan, but that would need to accord with the Official Plan."

The motion then passed unopposed.

# Nature Conservancy okay with careful Cockburn Garlon use

COCKBURN ISLAND—Hydro One has announced that it will be applying herbicide along its right-of-way on Cockburn Island to control brush, with the spraying having begun earlier this week and running until the end of next week.

"On Cockburn Island, highly-trained technicians will be applying the product to select vegetation that could become hazardous and compromise system reliability and safety, largely along Hydro One corridors. Garlon is not applied near waterways and is contained to the site of application," read a statement from Hydro One spokesperson Richard Francella.

An ad placed in this newspaper starting last week stated that Hydro One was seeking to manage its non-compatible vegetation (woody brush) in the Township of Cockburn Island using brush saws, backpack sprayers containing Garlon RTU and off-road tracked vehicles that will minimize the brush's ability to regrow.

The ad also stated that crews

would make every effort to preserve 'compatible' low-growing vegetation to help reduce future maintenance. This time of year was chosen so crews could ensure the lines remain reliable in advance of the winter season.

Earlier this year, the Nature Conservancy of Canada purchased an additional 1,400 acres of land in the heart of Cockburn Island, bringing its sum of protected land on that island up to 26,514 acres (10,730 hectares). Its ownership of more than 60 percent of Cockburn Island is intended in part to protect one of the largest in-tact hardwood forest ecosystems in Ontario.

Although herbicide use might at first glance appear to conflict with the conservancy's efforts to keep the land pristine, the organization said it can actually complement its conservation work.

"We prefer that any invasive species like buckthorn is taken out. We actively take it out on our property and we hope they do as well," said Vince Deschamps, program director for Midwestern Ontario with the Nature Conser-

# MSS 50th-anniversary makeover well underway

M'CHIGEENG—The main-floor halls of Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) are in many ways unrecognizable due to a number of renovations that have either transformed or are in the process of transforming the 50-year-old school into a refreshed learning environment that reflects some modern trends.

"It's a two- to three-year renovation project and the first year has three or four phases. We're currently in phase three," said MSS principal Jamie Mohamed as he led The Expositor on a tour of some of his school's revamped spaces. The main office of the



The ongoing work is evident in places of the school but Mr. Mohamed said crews have diligently sealed off the work zones for the health and safety of staff and students.

school has switched places with the adjacent guidance office and received a face-lift as part of the proj-

The first stop on the tour sits immediately next to the main doors of the school, a bright gymnasium that has received all-new hardwood flooring, upgraded banner mounting infrastructure and a paint scheme that matches the school's scheme of black and gold. Even the lines on the gym floor speak to the school's colour scheme.

The centrepiece of the space is a massive mustang head, painted in a deep black and best viewed from the exercise space and balcony above the gym.

Out in the main hall lies a considerable amount of wood hoarding. This is where the third phase of the first-year project is taking place and the wood is serving as a safety barrier to protect the students and staff from the demolition taking place beyond.

This space undergoing construction is a three-part transparent room that is designed to enhance the student experience. The first room will be a designated space for smudging and holding small Anishinaabe ceremonies.

Behind it will be a large multipurpose community room that is up for the use of students, staff and community members. It will have a lounge-type feel and offer spaces to host meetings and presentations as well as being a place in which students can work on assignments.

To its rear will be a student resource centre that hosts staff members who are present to aid students with their academics.

Mr. Mohamed said the new three-part space will hopefully be completed by Christmas, in time for the school's annual awards night which takes place near the end of the calendar year. The awards night is typ...continued on page 18

# First Nations lead in tackling addictions and mental health issues

Addictions and the issues surrounding mental health and wellness do not recognize boundaries defined by race or religion, although it has been well established that some communities are more systemically challenged by root causes associated with those issues: poverty, isolation and discrimination.

But when it comes to proactively tackling addictions and mental health issues. First Nations communities and organizations are miles ahead of their non-Native counterparts, at least here on Manitoulin

While there may be good works taking place behind closed doors in other communities, much of that work seems to be focussed more on conversations and networking between agencies, rather than concrete proactive action. Occasionally the doors are opened and a report slips out into the wild, but little concrete action to stem the tide seems to be taking place.

One example that springs readily to mind is the placement of sharps or needle disposal sites. Although needles are being found in parks and pathways across the region, needle collection sites appear to be largely confined to First Nation communities—the need for such facilities is far more pervasive than that.

The recent pushback witnessed against the location of addictions facilities within communities may be playing a role, as NIMBYism combines with a three monkey approach to the issue to impede concrete action. Currently, those who are non-Native and attempting to battle addictions (often through no fault of their own, thanks to big pharma's opioid campaign) on Manitoulin have to travel to Little Current, or beyond, to receive treatment.

Thanks to the insightful and proactive leadership in the First Nations, most Natives in the same struggle can access such services within their own communities. Certainly there have been pockets of funding accessible to Indigenous communities as the nation seeks to reconcile and ameliorate historical wrongs associated with the residential and day school systems and a colonial system rife with instances of systemic racism—but as noted above, the opioid crisis is not limited to one defined community.

We are most certainly not suggesting that the distribution of resources to combat addictions and mental health issues is unfair, or that less should be applied in First Nations communities. Rather, we must, as a just and civil society, recognize that the issues of addictions and mental health must be tackled effectively and with determi-

This is not to be limited to just addictions. By raw numbers, Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder impacts more non-Native families than Native families, but the issue seems to be invisible to the non-Native community. The health services leadership in First Nations communities make sure the dangers of alcohol in pregnancy is front and centre and quite in your face. In non-Native communities it is still not uncommon to hear the advice to pregnant mothers from well-meaning older family members that a beer now and then can "help build your milk" or that all the negative fuss about having a few drinks is overblown. It isn't. It has clearly been established that there is no "safe" amount of alcohol during pregnancy.

The ravages and social damage caused by addictions and mental health issues impact all of society. There are pragmatic and cold blooded economic reasons that we should deal with these issues in an effective manner. The social cost is enormous, but so is the economic impact. No matter where you fall on the partisan political divide there are solid arguments to be made that we cannot sit idly by in the hopes that the current crisis will run its course.

We, as a society, should take a page from the Indigenous communities' playbook and get serious about tackling addictions and mental health. It is not only the right thing to do—when the balance sheet is tallied it becomes clear, we simply cannot afford the cost of inaction.

#### Humane societies deliver crucial animal wellness resources to pets in Wiikwemkoong

MANITOULIN-The Niagara SPCA and Humane Society and the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society recently teamed up to bring much-needed resources to animals in the community of Wiikwemkoong, performing 95 spay/neuter procedures and close to 200 animal wellness examinations during their visit.

The Niagara SPCA and Humane Society's Mobile Wellness Unit and the Ontario SPCA's Mobile Animal Wellness Services Unit were in the community on Manitoulin Island from September 9 to 11. The two state-of-the-art mobile units were stationed at the Wiikwemkoong arena for the three-day event where they offered wellness services side-byside with the Niagara SPCA and Humane Society, also providing spay/neuter surgeries.

The Niagara SPCA and Humane Society, which was formed last year when the Welland and District SPCA and the Niagara Falls Humane Society amalgamated, has a long history of working with the community of Wiikwemkoong. The Ontario SPCA was able to lend its support to double efforts in the community after launching its own mobile wellness trailer in June thanks to a grant provided by the Pet Valu family of stores through its Giving Back Project.

The mobile units have been travelling across the province this summer in a collaborative effort to reduce pet overpopulation and reach underserved pet owners

"We are pleased our friends from the Ontario SPCA are joining us this year on the Island as we work with our friends from (Wiikwemkoong) to provide spay/neuter and wellness services to the community," said John Greer, executive director of the Niagara SPCA and Humane Society. "Together we are making a difference in the lives of many animals. We are also making a difference in the communities we visit, as healthy animals make for healthier communities overall. It is great to see the impact we are having as we work together to reduce pet overpopulation and improve pet health.'

"We were honoured to be invited to the community to work alongside the Niagara SPCA and Humane Society," said Daryl Vaillancourt, chief of Humane Programs and Community Outreach at the Ontario SPCA and Humane Society. # Artist's latest works informed by Truth and Reconciliation

by Michael Erskine SOUTH BAYMOUTH—Artist Jane Woodbury is a self-identified transplanted Brit who grew up in Valley East, but she has always felt a deep affinity to Manitoulin Island, even working for The Expositor in the past for a bit (we won't go into how long ago that was) before moving onto a gig with the Debajehmujig Theatre Group under the legendary Larry E. Lewis, where she developed an even stronger attachment to Anishinaabe culture.

Ms. Woodbury's latest works have been strongly influenced by the findings and recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.

The artist describes her life as being infused with creativity from conception to the present. "My mother was an art teacher," she confides, sitting down with The Expositor at the South Bay Gallery to discuss her latest projects. "Mother started a recreation program in 1967 and was chair of the Valley East Recreation Committee. She taught arts and crafts for children and youth."

Ms. Woodbury has two degrees in the arts—a Fine Arts degree from London's Fanshawe College and, most recently, an honours degree in English from Laurentian University in 2005. "Yes, you could say that I am an advocate of lifelong learning," she laughs. She has become deeply involved in the Women in Art program in Thunder Bay and has studied women in popular culture, including film production. "It has expanded my knowledge so much," she said.

Although she started out her professional artistic career in the traditional forms of drawing, painting, printmaking and performance art, Ms. Woodbury's repertoire reflects her approach as something of a Renaissance

woman in art, including creations in exhibition art, conceptual art and performance art. "Don't try to pigeon-hole me," she laughs. Lately she has been turning her hand to sculpture—with a major show in the offing for 2020. "It's early stages just yet," she confides. "We are still working out the details."

Ms. Woodbury's work 'Church and Reconciliation' has been recently chosen as the Manitoulin Fine Arts Association entry in the Northern Ontario Arts Association juried show and the piece reflects her latest creative muse flowing from the TRC recommendations. The exhibit will tour Northern Ontario for one year.

'When the TRC report came out with its 94 calls to action I had begun work on a solo show," she said. The theme revolves around the two aspects of grief: personal loss and the loss of health and then the reactive depression to the social position you are in."

While at Debaj in 1989, she began building her knowledge of Anishinabe Culture, which she describes as "inspirational." Working with folks such as Carl Beam, who provided pottery workshops, and Maime Migwans, whose quillwork creations set the bar high.

"The new show's title is 'Sorry M'am'," she said. "It is an anagram of missing and murdered. The victim aspect of the missing and murdered affects all of us

"The TRC calls to action ignited my passion for doing a show that described how I felt as a 'settler',"

"This time last year I had just finished a film with (videographer) Warren Rudd that focussed on the families of three missing Tla-o-qui-aht hunters," she said.

There was a bit of a homecoming in exhibiting with the MFAA at the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah for Ms. Woodbury. "I was the first person to exhibit in the gallery there," she recalled. "I remember saying to Linda Kelly, the curator at the time, that the light in what became the gallery space was wonderful.'

Ms. Woodbury recently presented a plan for an art facility to the Central Manitoulin Old School Repurposing Committee that included an art gallery and space for workshops, individual studios and arts and crafts sessions, all spearheaded by seniors. This year she has worked on the big head sign for the Central Manitoulin Community Garden.

One of the pieces completed for her new show illustrates the connection to the TRC calls to action and the commission findings. Entitled 'Alberta,' the piece utilizes the image of a murdered Indigenous woman, 20-year-old Alannah Jemima Cardinal, along with roses and barbed wire. "The piece uses the provincial flower and then expands upon it," said Ms. Woodbury. Ms. Cardinal went missing on July 16, 2016 in the Goodfish Lake area, located about 185 kilometres northeast of Edmonton.

Ms. Woodbury is cautious in her work to avoid appropriation or misusing cultural and sacred images. "It's not illegal," she notes, "but it is definitely not cool."

She hopes her work will provide something of a bridge in the cultural divide between cultures, the Indigenous and the settler.

train in North Dakota due to safety reasons. "There is a lot of mining, oil well activity in that area and the roads are filled with big trucks," explained Mr. Duquette. "So we took a train from Glacier National Park and jumped out in Minot, North Dakota.'

"We have travelled 3,600 kilometres on our bikes," said Ms. Duquette. "We travel around 50 to 60 kilometres a day. Our bikes are very heavy.'

How do their children react to this regimen? "They are not tired," laughed Ms. Duquette. "When we stop for the day they are up jumping around the playgrounds, going swimming and staying very busy.'



vancy of Canada.

"Given the remoteness of the island, it's almost preferable that they would go in and spray like that, rather than bringing in heavy machinery. Because then the invasive species risk is higher because seeds from other sites on the island or other islands can lead to the introduction of garlic mustard, buckthorn, phragmites or other toxic invasive species that spread quickly," he added.

Although the ad stated that Hydro One would be using off-road tracked vehicles, Mr. Deschamps said he understood that the transmission line right of way is quite wide and mostly has an established trail for off-road vehicles. Therefore, they would not have to cross through any pristine sites.

"Hydro One has always been a good neighbour. We always look forward to working with them and all our neighbours on Cockburn Island. All the projects are vetted through the community. The Cockburn Island Sports and Conservation Club are incredible partners with us, as are the residents. We keep looking forward to doing what we do together in joint success," said Mr. Deschamps.

Several Manitoulin municipalities have previously objected to entities such as Hydro One and the Ontario

Ministry of Transportation (MTO) using herbicides such as Garlon and ClearView, including Assiginack, Tehkummah and Central Manitoulin. Others, such as the Northeast Town, Billings and M'Chigeeng have cleared its usage in past applications.

A group of Manitoulin residents has been vocal against the use of these such herbicides, a group that includes Little Current's Zak Nicholls. When contacted by The Expositor he said his main concerns were whether any work would be done at the Manitoulin-based Wolsey Lake feeder station because he was unsure that Cockburn Island was connected to that station. He was still waiting on contact from Hydro One to address that question by press time.

He also said he has asked Hydro One to provide a schedule of upcoming spraying on its rights of way, but never received a response.

Careful pesticide use has proven to be effective and relatively safe in other brush control projects, such as the Manitoulin Phragmites Project which uses the measured application of Roundup Weathermax to control the aggressive and extremely invasive phragmites plant in an effort to manage the species and cause a net benefit for the Island.

Hydro One is required to follow provincial and federal guidelines that apply to the application of herbicides.

...continued from page 1 served in Canada's navy during wartime and those who are in it today. He collaborated with author Wayne Neal on a memoir about his wartime experiences, 'Allan Tustian and the Battle of the Atlantic,' complete with historical photos, about his life

He started his naval career in 1941 and was honourably discharged on October 1, 1945. Mr. Tustian was originally in the army but became a member of the navy in 1942, which is where he wanted to be. Along with the training in torpedoes and gunnery that all naval personnel take, Mr. Tustian, when asked what specialty he would like to take, chose radio directional finding. He explained that this is the radar used to find ships on the surface. Later, he also took the training for the increasingly crucial sonar, necessary for finding the enemy submarines that played havoc on supply ships from Canada and the United States to Britain.

Mr. Tustian certainly saw a lot of water during his time in the navy. He served on the Arctic, Atlantic and Pacific oceans, as well as the Mediterranean Sea and his ships were Her Majesty's Canadian Ships (HMCS) St. Francis, Timmins and Waskesiu, in order a destroyer, corvette

and frigate. He was present for the Battle of the Atlantic, which lasted almost six years. It not only included the Atlantic Ocean, but many other spots including the Arctic Ocean, the Labrador Sea and the Gulf St. Lawrence. This action saw the death of just over 72,000 sailors and merchant seaman. Mr. Tustian was also present for D-Day, the Allied Invasion of Europe, which led to the defeat of the Germans and the end of the war. The naval veteran saw a staggering 43 convoys across the North Atlantic.

Mr. Tustian returned home to Manitoulin and settled on Treasure Island where he met his wife Alma and where his children were raised. Over the years, he worked for naval veterans and was actively involved in the construction of the Manitoulin District Cenotaph Park and the naval merchant marine monument. He was also a part of the construction of the naval monument in Memorial Park in Sudbury.

"I joined in '93," Mr. Ranich said of the MNSN-VA. "Allan was a well-spoken gentleman with lots of wartime stories to tell us. He always had us in stitches, but he also told you of the rough times. He was also instrumental in the formation of the Manitoulin Sea Cadet Corps. He said, 'if Sudbury can have it, why can't we?" And probably unknown to a lot of people, Mr. Tustian was responsible for the formation of the Island's first allfemale hockey team. And if one is wondering about the longevity of this man, perhaps it is because, as Marilyn put it, he went swimming twice a day from May 24 until September 30. He also went ice and rod fishing until he turned 97 and also golfed until three years

lor Steve Shaffer and seconded by Councillor Al Tribinevicius passed.

The next motion dealing with the arena was a recommendation from the Property Committee that the town's municipal supervisor utilize the report recommendations regarding snow removal from the roof as outlined in the inspection report.

"I think we were looking for an indication of how to instruct our staff to proceed," said Mayor Stephens. "This gives us the information on how to go ahead."

The motion, moved by Councillor Tribinevicius and seconded by Councillor Shaffer, passed.

Council then moved onto one of the key motions regarding the fate of the arena, a motion by Steve Shaffer and Linda Farquhar on a recommendation from the Property Committee to proceed immediately with the repairs to the J.H. Burt Memorial Arena recommended by the Tulloch Engineering report. Those repairs totalling \$30,000 were: repair roof leak (to be carried out by staff); clean and paint the arch frame bases, including applying preservative to the bases (\$4,000); reinforce the roof beam at the ice resurfacer room (the largest item estimated at \$20,000); point cracks in masonry at refrigeration and ice resurfacer rooms (\$1,000); clean and point masonry at east wall near south end and west wall (\$2,500); and repair roof at valley flashing (\$2,500).

"I wasn't in favour of this motion last time and I am not in favour of it now," said Councillor Stephens. "At some point we have to bite the bullet. This is just a short term fix. The foundations are starting to go. This is just throwing good money after bad—at some point we have to start looking after our aging infrastructure.'

'I must respectfully disagree with my fellow councillor," said Councillor Shaffer. He went on to point out that the Mindemoya arena is a "critical piece of infrastructure" and that to close the arena at this point would be "a disservice to our youth. Councillor Stephens is correct in that there is no guarantee, but \$30,000 is not something that will break council's back.'

Councillor Angela Johnston noted that "I generally agreed with most of (Councillor Stephens') facts." She noted that although the Providence Bay ice surface is slightly smaller, the arena itself is in better shape, but then went on to say that she would support the motion, this time, but she is "drawing a line in the sand. This is it, no more throwing money at a building we are going to replace." She went on to note that the community would eventually be moving to one complex, whether renovated or new, but that community members were concerned that there was not enough notice provided. "From my point of view, this is notice."

"I agree with Steve, everything he says," said Councillor Farquhar. "We can be of service to our taxpayers or we can accumulate money in our account. Tulloch didn't say (the arena) was going to give out in a year—they said they would come back in five years. We can assume it is safe or they would be saying they would be coming back next

Mayor Stephens said that he was not going to offer an opinion at this time, but went on to say that "we are not investing in a building, we are investing in our community. A building that is not only for our children but for many parents as well. The arena in Mindemoya is the one that has been used the most." In the end, he said, "we will follow the will of the community.'


Councillor Shaffer called for a recorded vote. Councillor Stephens cast the only negative vote, with Councillors Johnston, Farquhar, Shaffer, Tribinevicius and Mayor Stephens voting in favour of the motion to proceed with

The decision generated applause from those attending the meeting in the audience.

A motion to revisit the decision to replace the chiller in the Providence Bay arena instead of the Mindemoya facility engendered a lively debate, with Councillor Shaffer maintaining that the original motion was procedurally

dren's Peace Prize is awarded annually to a child who "fights courageously for children's rights."

According to the website of KidsRights, the award's founder, the nominees of 2019 "demonstrate that children are changemakers." The winner of this year's award will be announced on September 30.

KidsRights works with children to create a world in which their rights are guaranteed and they are enabled to realize their great potential. KidsRights said that it's organization is "convinced that realizing children's rights more effectively calls for the perspective, experience and authority of children themselves.

That is the reason KidsRights first established the International Children's Peace Prize. According to the organization "Each year's winner has, in his or her own way, demonstrated "tremendous commitment to combating problems that millions of children face. KidsRights believes that children who make a difference in the world

should be recognized, awarded and motivated in their incredible effort to improve children's rights."

Autumn's citation reads that she "is an Indigenous girl and a passionate water ambassador. They blocked the highways. She has also been invited to World Water Day to be a keynote speaker at the UN where she told world leaders to "Warrior Up" for water and for the plan-

chiller in Providence Bay was valid. "It was done and said and it is there," he said. "We are not going to go back and change history. Unless Angela (Councillor Johnston), Derek (Councillor Stephens) or Al (Councillor Tribinevicius) put the motion on the table for discussion.' Stephens was referring to a procedural policy that requires one of the councillors who voted in favour of the originally passed motion to bring it back for Councillor discussion. Shaffer and Councillor Dale Scott were not present for the original motion.

The three councillors declined to bring the motion back. Councillor Johnston said that "in hindsight, I wish we had never purchased it (the chiller originally purchased for the Mindemoya arena that is now slated for the Providence Bay arena)." Councillor Tribinevicius noted that once the repairs were completed on the Mindemova arena, both it and the Providence Bay arena would be fully functioning.

'The good and the bad of it is that both will be open this winter," said Mayor Stephens. He then asked when the chiller would be installed and if the town had received it yet.

CAO Ruth Frawley noted that the chiller would arrive in "about a week" and that both current chillers are roughly the same age, "20 or 21 years."

Councillor Shaffer noted that during the capital budget debate it was decided to purchase one chiller this year and the second the next budget cycle. "The arena that is used the most is the most logical service area," he said, going on to once again assert that the motion to move the chiller to Providence Bay was "made improperly."

Discussion then moved on to the acceptance of the Recreation Centre Feasibility Committee Report and further that the municipality develop plans for a new recreation centre in Mindemoya, moved by committee chair Councillor Johnston and seconded by Councillor Stephens. Councillor Stephens commended Councillor Johnston and her committee for the work they accomplished

on the concept. "It is the first time (the feasibility of building a new modern recreation centre) has got out to com-

mittee," he said. "Support is there for the facility and Mindemoya is the logical location with water and sewer."

Councillor Stephens went on to say "I am not a proponent of grants" and suggesting that the current provincial atmosphere is not likely to be conducive to providing grants for facili-

"I do think the committee did a good job," said Councillor Shaffer. "I will support the motion but I would have preferred if we had supported it in principle. There are still a lot of unanswered questions.

"One step at a time," said Mayor Stephens, who also went on the thank Councillor Johnston and her committee.

Councillor Farquhar said that she too was unhappy with the wording of the motion, but that the committee had done an outstanding job. She suggested that there should be a public meeting about the issue. Councillor Tribinevicius also thanked Councillor Councillor Stephens, Johnston. "A new adding that he did not sports/community centre will be good for Mindemoya in the future," he said.

"There is a lot that remains to be done, the municipal development plan, financial plan, organizational timing, location we know there is an awful lot of work around questions, but it is a major step in the direction," said Mayor Stephens.

Council then passed a motion from Councillor Tribinevicius, seconded by Councillor Stephens, that followed a recommendation from the Finance and Administration Committee to apply to the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program: Community, Culand Recreation Stream.

Since municipal staff do not have the available time and resources to complete the application, the preparation of the application would go to the municipal engineering firm, Tulloch Engineering, and will cost \$25,000 between

the first round they would automatically be in the running during the second round.

Councillor Shaffer suggested the motion should be split into two separate motions for clarity. Mayor Stephens agreed and the motion was passed as two separate items, one proceeding with the application and the second assigning the work to Tulloch.

Councillor Tribinevicius expressed the hope that Councillor Johnston and her committee would continue to work on the file, a sentiment endorsed by Mayor Stephens. Councillor Johnston said that she could not speak for the whole committee, but that she would be "happy to provide input."

# Robinson-Huron gathering, arts festival join forces for event

### Wiikwemkoong Arts and Music Festival ignites 'Burning Man' tribute

WIIKWEMKOONG—The

Wiikwemkoong Arts and
Music Festival (WAMF)
proved to be a popular pair-

Wiikwemkoong Arts and Music Festival (WAMF) proved to be a popular pairing of events judging by the healthy turnout to the joint celebrations held this past weekend at Thunderbird Park and the Thunderdome Arena in Wiikwemkoong.

Thursday evening marked the beginning of the RHTG schedule with a comedy show at the Thunderdome Arena that included hometown talents Lena Recollet and Stephanie Pangowish. Ms. Pangowish also emceed the music festival and interspersed a number of jokes between acts for the benefit of her fans and those who couldn't attend the Thursday show.

Each morning of the RHTG began with a sunrise ceremony and prayer followed by breakfast. Friday also featured opening ceremonies, including the lighting of the sacred fire, a welcoming song and introductions of the key players of the gathering.

The Robinson-Huron Treaty of 1850 includes individuals now residing in 21 First Nations in Ontario including the seven in the District of Manitoulin. It set up reserves, entrenched hunting and fishing rights and established treaty annuity payments.

In September 2014, the 21 First Nations began legal action against Canada and Ontario for long-standing treaty violations. The treaty annuity had been frozen at \$4 since 1874 and the First Nations won the case last December where a judge ruled that the amounts should have risen over time.

Ontario has appealed that ruling and, for the time being, not much has changed. The Robinson-Huron Treaty legal team offered an update to beneficiaries Saturday afternoon as to what the next steps would be. Most of the discussions were protected under solicitor-client privilege but the team did announce the next stage of trial will be starting soon.

Stage two of the three phases in the trial involves setting the liability of the province and country. This

will take place from October 15 to 25 in Sudbury and it will be open to the public.

The third and final stage will deal with the final compensation that will be owed to First Nations. These dates are set for April 5 to June 30, 2021.

A highlight of the meeting for many gathered was a keynote by University of Toronto professor Heidi Bohaker, delivered on Saturday morning.

Ms. Bohaker has done considerable research and teaching in the field of Anishinaabe political history near the Great Lakes. She has also focused on Native American writing, communication systems and material culture as sources for history, treaty relationships, federal government policies toward Indigenous peoples in Canada and digital history.

The discussion also explored how Anishinaabe used doodems leaders (clans) to form alliances when making councils. A series of marriages and alliances between council fires had interacted to create a linked system of interdependency between doodshared which ems governance roles, leading to a stable, flexible and effective system.

There was a portion on the importance of the gift economy, the role of women in historic governance structures and how new models changed the role of those women under the umbrella of the Indian Act.

After her talk, she fielded a question-and-answers session where attendees asked questions ranging from the repatriation of Indigenous artifacts to the Anishinaabe understanding of the worth

the WAMF in the evening were tough to beat. Friday evening saw acoustic musician Leslie Neshkiwe open the list of performers, a list that included Wiikwemkoong favourites Elijah and the Back Burners, the Wiky Three and Pat Peltier.

On Saturday, Leland Bell and Dave Miner began with some Anishinaabe-themed music, followed by Keegan Jacko who played some originals and covers such as a mashup of contemporary songs that began with the year's hottest country rap crossover, 'Old Town Road.'

Guelph-based "forward-looking folk" duo Tragedy Ann went up next and deftly switched back and forth between instruments including guitar, accordion and ukulele.

Brothers Wilde took over the stage next, bringing their high-energy act that netted them the 2019 International New Country Duo of the Year award from the North American Country Music Association. By now, the attendance numbers were growing as the headlining acts drew ever closer.

An extra addition to the lineup came after the brothers when MC Sage had a brief feature. He performed a slam poetry ode in tribute to Manitoulin Island and Rainbow Lodge, of which he is currently a resident undergoing treatment.

When Crystal Shawanda began singing after MC Sage, all eyes were fixed on the impassioned notes ringing from her vocal chords above the masterful jams being laid down by the other musicians on stage.

At the end of her set, the grounds lighting shut off and a group of four performers from Debajehmujig Storytellers walked in front ...continued on page 21

She also has knowledge in digital humanities which highlights best practices for using new technologies alongside Great Lakes First Nations in order to reconnect Indigenous people to their cultural heritage when artifacts are stored in museums and archives worldwide.

Ms. Bohaker is currently studying pre-confederation treaties from 1763 to 1815 and the importance of wampum during treaty negotiations in this region.

Her talk was called Rebuilding the Nation: Histories of Anishinaabe Governance through Alliance. It explored evidence that Anishinaabe law and governance has remained effective and adapted to change as needed over time. This, until the Indian Act mandated band council governance in 1876



decision on what form those programs and supports will take will be up to the community itself, noted Ogimaa Duke Peltier.

Ogimaa Peltier went on to outline some of the intensive lobbying efforts and history that went into bringing the healing lodge into reality. "This facility will go forward with the recommendations from a 1995 report on how to deal with family violence," he said. "I don't think I need to go into the issues faced by the community at that time, but we see the physical facility our leadership has

"essentially out of the blue during an August 12 conference call. The first thing they said was 'we have \$5.9 million to construct a healing lodge."

Ogimaa Peltier recalled the barely contained excitement expressed by Ngwaagan Gamig Recovery Centre Executive Director Rolanda Manitowabi. "She couldn't wait to tell her staff," he said. "I told her 'yes, you can tell your staff and you can share the news with our community.' Whatever services we need in the community; you can find in this facility."

Bill Assinewai, Wiik-

Kennedy spoke for the committee, which included Darren Trudeau Peltier, Hank Mandamin, James Manitowabi, Gordie Odjig and Stuart Assinewai. "I am all excited right now," she said. "Happy and excited." She recalled how she returned to the community in 1995 to begin working on Aboriginal Health and Healing, but was dismayed at the title she was given: sexual abuse co-ordinator. "I didn't like the title," she said. "They said 'how about family violence co-ordinator?' I didn't like that title either. They said, 'well why don't you get some people together and

Hare spoke at length in Anishinabemowin before switching to English for the benefit of those who do not know the language. He expressed the excitement expressed by the chiefs of the Anishinabek when they learned that the healing lodge would be built in one of the Anishinabek Nation communities.

Federal NDP candidate Carol Hughes was introduced as the incumbent MP for Algoma-Manitoulin-

The prospect of a Manitoulin Tim Hortons is among the most divisive issues

among Islanders, well up in the ranks alongside the fate of the swing bridge.

Within two days, the post had amassed well over 300 comments from people who were either for, against, or relatively impartial to the whole concept. By the end of the week, the comment total far surpassed 400.

The Expositor searched a number of job posting websites, including the in-house Tim Hortons site, and no job postings surfaced for anywhere on Manitoulin Island. One posting on job site Indeed had a job available in 'Greater Sudbury' but did not specify a more discrete region.

Based on past comments made by the Ontario Ministry of Transportation

(MTO) and motions made by Northeast Town council, the location the employee allegedly mentioned of "by The Beer Store" may cast doubt on the employee's alleged story.

MTO has completed a traffic study at the location next to The Beer Store. It stated that any development in that space would require roadway upgrades costing upwards of \$500,000. MTO would require a third traffic lane with a tapered turning lane, an environmental study and another engineering study in order to give it its blessing to proceed.

However, another property in Little Current is also slated for development, with the triangular plot at the corner of Manitowaning Road Shutterstock and Blake Street also expected to hold a new business in the future. Land owner Jim McBane of Streetwise Holdings Inc.

Kapuskasing and she expressed her pleasure at being able "to play a small part in bringing that funding to you."

Ms. Hughes noted the lateral damage caused to families by addictions and violence. "It affects families, it affects communities," she said.

Chuck Peltier, business development and lease property manager at Enaadmaagehjik (Wikwemikong Development Commission) spoke on behalf of Nikki Manitowabi and relayed how proud the organization is to have played a part in the planning for the project.

Finally, Ngwaagan Gamig president Chris Johnson came to the microphone to offer his thoughts. "I am really proud of

how far I have come," he said, referencing his youth growing up in Toronto. "I had nowhere to go," he said. "Then I came here, then I met all of the wonderful people here and discovered so much positivism in the community-and it's growing."

Following the speeches, community members gathered for a celebratory feast catered by Hiawatha Catering.

Ogimaa Peltier noted that the band will be consulting the community on programing and services and that the plans for the building originally submitted for the funding application will be fully costed before the shovels actually go into the ground. "We only have so much money," he said. "We have to make sure we get the best use out of it for the community."



# Human Rights Tribunal ruling a step towards justice for First Nations children and families: Anishinabek Nation

ANISHINABEK NATION—Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare says that the recent Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) ruling ordering the federal government to pay compensation to First Nation children, youth and families is a step forward towards justice for Anishinabek children and their families.

"Our youth are the future - they need to be supported within their communities and their families. In this era of truth and reconciliation, Canada must step forward and fulfill their obligation to the many First Nation children and families who suffered and continue to suffer because of colonization, racism and discrimination," Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare in a press release. "Equal access to the funding need-

ed for essential prevention services, like counselling and housing, was not provided to prevent the unnecessary removal of our children from their homes or to help our families before their children were taken. While in out-of-home care. some of our children lost their families forever and some have even lost their lives. Nothing can undo this pain and suffering experienced by our children and families.'

The recent CHRT ruling is the latest ruling in a historic human rights case

Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada and the Assembly of First Nations. In 2016, the CHRT found the federal government willfully and recklessly discriminating against First Nations through the inequitable funding of child and family services and through failure to fully implement Jordan's Principle. Canada was immediately ordered to cease its discriminatory conduct. "Every First Nation child

filed in 2007 by the First

"Every First Nation child who was needlessly taken into out-of-home care receiving the maximum compensation amount allowed under the Canadian Human Rights Act is a step towards justice for our children and families," Grand Council Chief Glen Hare adds.

The CHRT has ordered Canada to provide \$40,000 in compensation to the victims of its discriminatory practices. The ruling applies to all First Nation children who were unnecessarily placed into care from January 1, 2006, to a date that is to be determined by the CHRT. Parents or guardians of children who were unnecessarily placed into out-of-home care may also be eligible for compensation. A culturally informed, child-focused process is to be put into place to determine eligibility and individual compensation.

acknowledged that development discussions were underway, though he stopped short of identifying what the property may hold.

"I have entertained numerous businesses from out of town for that property. Nothing is in writing yet with any one of them, although I am working more closely with two of them. A final decision and/or agreement has not been made yet," said Mr. McBane, whose holding company has owned the property for the past six to seven years.

"I'm not saying it's Tim Hortons at all. Even if it was, it

"I'm not saying it's Tim Hortons at all. Even if it was, it wouldn't be my place to announce it—it would be Tim Hortons or any company who would have to announce it," he said. "If something does happen and I get permission from whomever is involved, I will share that whenever it comes."

Based on the feedback on the viral Facebook post, roughly 72 percent of respondents who expressed an opinion on a Tim Hortons locating on Manitoulin felt negatively about the prospect. Some 28 percent who expressed a definite opinion were in favour of the idea. Many more comments were either back-and-forth discussions or satirical takes on the debate.

The Expositor could not make contact with Espanola, McKerrow and Blind River Tim Hortons franchise owner Denis Lefebvre by press time. He had previously signed an agreement with Island developer Rob Sheppard for the property closer to the swing bridge before MTO released its list of road redesign stipulations.









ically held in the cafetorium, the next space to have received an overhaul.

Its stage has been painted flat black and the skirt at the front of the stage is being redone with new fabric.

The cafetorium has also embraced more of a lounge feel and includes conventional tables and chairs (no more bench table seating units), curved couches with coffee tables and higher bar-style tables and chairs. All of the chairs in the space also follow the MSS colour palette—black, gray and gold—and the tabletops are a lightcoloured wood finish. The couches add a splash of colour with earth tones of light green and light blue.

'We're incorporating a lot of colours that we found through consultation with the community, staff and students," said Mr. Mohamed. "The wood, green and blue ties into the idea of connectedness with the Earth.

The curtains have been cleaned and fire-treated. There are also two flat-screen televisions mounted midway up the two side walls that are currently being used to show a visual slideshow of the morning announcements. A singular television in the library also shows this feed.

The renovations on the main floor spill out into all of

"The whole main floor has been painted. All the ceiling tiles came down (the old four-by-two tiles have been replaced with square two-by-two tiles), all the infrastructure has been redone—the old plumbing is out and replacements have been installed," said Mr. Mohamed.

Along with the infrastructure is a new PA intercom system and phones in each class, a new bell system, an allnew fire system and an all-new lockdown system. Both have a visual and audible component to them so their warnings can be heeded by more students with accessibility needs.

Lockers have been repainted in a uniform shade of blue and many have actually been removed from the ground floor. Mr. Mohamed said this was because the school's intended capacity of 1,000 students vastly outnumbers its current enrolment of just over 400 students.

The former locker spaces are being used in a variety of ways. Some have been turned into wood-finish bench areas and one will be used as a display case for works produced in the inquiry-based learning project room (commonly known as a 'maker space').

A staff room has been redone and a second accessible water bottle fill station has been installed on the main floor. There is also a brand-new all-gender, accessible washroom on the main floor. The school's power plant and wiring was redone last summer and all lights in the renovation zone have been converted to energy-saving LEDs.

The library, with its old location being gutted for the three-part room, has moved to a new home in the north part of the school. It has all-new flooring, similar seating to the cafetorium and, like the caf, a new projector and screen which is tensioned so it will not flex or blow in a draft and distort a presentation.

Finally, to the rear of the school, two new student leadership rooms are expected to reach completion imminently. They share a vestibule with a kitchen and one of the inner rooms will be for the school's Anishinaabe Three Fires Confederacy group while its neighbour will be a space for the school's parliament.

Mr. Mohamed said he has been hearing positive feedback from students who are relishing the fresh look of the

"Students are very excited about mainly the caf and the gym. They're excited to be able to show (the gym) off when we have teams visiting," he said.

Consultations with stakeholders netted suggestions of additions such as switching the guidance and main offices and the addition of a student leadership space, things Mr. Mohamed said contributed to the project being somewhat behind schedule. However, he praised the quality of work and noted attention to small details such as sealing off seams in the construction hoarding to prevent dust from leaking into the main school area.

'We're very happy with the quality of work from all the contractors," he said.

The renovation project began near the beginning of the last school year when Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) approached the school to build off its existing electrical infrastructure work from that summer.

"Any time you have things that are new it gives the opportunity to shift the culture and put the school in a direction where everyone feels inclusive and cared for,' said Mr. Mohamed. "Then the kids want to be here and engage in all the things we have to offer, from academics to extra-curricular activities.'

On the day The Expositor toured the renovation progress, the entrance sign read 'every day is a new beginning.' It was a fitting message for MSS as it enters its 50th year of existence and gets freshened up to continue serving its feeder communities for decades more.







# Mnaamodzawin language, culture camp has strong second year

ING—Mnaamodzawin Health Services has run its innovative language and culture camp for the second year now, offering an opportunity for its staff to improve their skills in Anishinaabemowin and work on teambuilding at the same time.

"It's all-around language immersion, so the games we were playing were not that important (in themselves), but the games were translated into the language and they had to use the language to take part in the game," said Mnaamodzawin Health Services executive director Craig Abotossaway.

For two days, staff members convened at the powwow grounds in Aundeck Omni Kaning for the camp. Last year's event was three days in length, but based on feedback and the mentally taxing nature of language learning, it was scaled back

Mr. Abotossaway said this camp is a crucial part of building the skills that



Each activity featured a dedicated elder who was present to help answer questions and encourage the growth of the employees' language skill sets. At this station, the workers learned basic phrases in the language.

are required to make a major impact in the communities health providers

Mnaamodzawin "Whv came into fruition 20-plus years ago was to provide culturally based health services that meet the needs of First Nations communities on the Island," said Mr. Abotossaway.

"Language plays a pivotal role in that, respect for purpose and service delivery. It applies the Seven Grandfather Teachings as its guide to shape how it interacts with its five First Nation client communities.

"Language retention and cultural competencies are built-in policies Mnaamodzawin (which state) that staff need to be progressing in those areas because they're health service providers that work only with First Nations communities," said Mr. Abotossaway.

To foster that continual growth, the health centre offers Anishinaabemowin classes every two weeks during the lunch hour and might host a one-day refresher event mid-way through the year.

The centre's policy to continually develop language and cultural knowledge is entrenched in its professional development plan. It places the responsibility for these outcomes on the employees themselves. They are implored to seek

out reading material and online courses on their own time to continually be building up their strengths in these areas.

At the camp, the staff broke up into three groups that circulated to the various stations. Two stations would be hosting games and a third would involve a cultural teaching session. One of the game stations featured Anishinaabedarts—whatever mowin number the players hit,



As with any profession, ongoing education is important in the veterinary field as there are always new developments and updates. This article is inspired by my recent attendance at an international bee conference, and thus learning something completely new as it pertains to the veterinary world. Bring on apitherapy.

Apitherapy: the definition being the use of products derived from bees as medicine, including honey. propolis, pollen, royal jelly and venom. As in a prior article, it had been discussed that the use of honey, either unpasteurized or the highly coveted Manuka honey, was excellent in wound care as it had antibacterial and tissue regenerative properties. At our clinic, we have had some wonderful success using a commercially made medical Manuka honey (Medihoney) in the treatment of superficial wounds, and the same results achieved recently using unpasteurized local honey (in a bull nonetheless!). Again, this

anecdotal success has been documented by other veterinarians and doctors in other countries, and by our

own teaching college, the Ontario Veterinary College.

What is new, however, is the addition of propolis, pollen, royal jelly and venom. I will start with propo-

Propolis is a sticky resin that bees collect from tree buds and bark. It is what bees use to line the insides of their colonies to seal up any cracks or crevices to keep their home airtight. It is what I joke as being 'bee glue.' The amazing thing about propolis, as I learned, is that it has numerous actions including being an antibacterial, antiviral, antioxidant, anti-fungal, anti-inflammatory immunostimulant compound. Wow! As such, I learned how two separate veterinarians in both France and Italy were using a combination of honey and propolis products to treat an array of illnesses such as chronic ear infections, eve ulcers, allergies and oral infections.

Pollen was also men-



tioned at this conference. Pollen, the male seed of a plant, is the primary source of dietary protein for bees. Bees collect pollen to make "beebread" by mixing it with honey or with nectar and adding enzymes that prevent the pollen from germinating. It has become a popular energy-enhancing nutritional supplement because it is about 25 percent protein and contains all the essential amino acids and vitamins and minerals as needed by humans, except Vitamin B12. Pollen is a good source of enzymes and also has high anti-oxidant activity. Pollen has been documented into being used as a desensitization treatment, similar to allergy 'shots,' and may aid in the management of environmental allergies.

Royal jelly is a milky substance that worker female bees produce from glands in their head. They feed this substance to their larva and for those larva that selectively receive extra feedings, these become

difference queens—the between a normal worker female bee and a queen bee is four or five years of longevity and an ability to lay and produce fertile eggs. One can see why then royal ielly has become a popular supplement, especially in China, to consume for the hopes of a longer, healthier life. In fact, the Chinese have selectively bred for a bee that produces a high amount of royal jelly, dubbed "the Royal Jelly Bee."

While there is still much to be learned about royal jelly, there are many recent studies from Europe and Asia which show how useful it can be. A Japanese study found that royal jelly has an anti-fatigue effect in exercising mice. In China and Russia, royal jelly was effective in treating chronic viral and bacterial infections, anorexvaricose ia. veins, and stomach

ulcers. During a flu epidemic

in Yugoslavia, it was noted that those who consumed royal jelly daily were less likely to get the flu. Royal jelly also helps promote collagen synthesis and is beginning to be found in many topical dermatologic products. Last on the list, bee ven-

om, or 'the sting,' Bee-venom therapy has been used treating conditions including arthritis and multiple sclerosis. The theory behind the treatment is that bee stings cause inflammation leading to an antiinflammatory response by the immune system. On a personal note, this last one makes me a little nervous as I know at one point or another most veterinarians have had emergency calls of a dog or cat that develops hives or facial swelling or

even life threatening respiratory difficulties after being accidentally stung by a winged insect. I also know how much variation can occur between a human's reaction to a sting as I hardly react to a sting when I work with my bees and my husband puffs right up.

All in all, I learned that

much more is to be learned

about this science. It seems that other countries have much more experience in this field than we do in North America where we rely more on Western Medicine and the pharmaceutical companies. I did learn one thing in particular however and the take home message is that the bee is an amazing creature and we humans and animals can only continue to benefit as long as we take care of the environment of the bees so that they may continue to share their gifts with us. 

Baking gluten free without lots of sugar can be challenging. Texture and taste is a big change from using regular flour and processed white sugar but very adaptable. The following recipe works and tastes great.

#### **Date Sweetened Pumpkin Bread**

I switched the pumpkin to unsweetened applesauce. I made this recipe two times. The first time I used sorghum flour and the second time the coconut flour. They both worked. The loaf is much softer in texture (than using regular flour) so it cuts much better when it is cooled completely in the fridge. Use parchment paper because it is much easier to lift out the loaf, from the pan, to let it cool.

1/2 cup almond or coconut milk

1 cup pitted dates (I use the Parnoosh because they are softer)

- 11/2 cups pumpkin puree or applesauce
- 11/2 cups almond flour

- 1/2 cup coconut flour
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp ginger
- 1/2 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla

1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Line the loaf pan with parchment paper. If the parchment paper is stiff, a trick: I will take the cut piece and hold it under my kitchen tap until it is wet. I then squish it, to get rid of the extra water, and then place it in the loaf pan. Much easier to work with and the parchment paper will lie in the pan instead of trying to pop out! It won't effect your

- 2. Heat the milk until warm and then add the dates. Let them soak for about five min-
- 3. In a food processor, blend pumpkin with dates and milk until well blended. Set
- 4. In a large bowl, mix flours, dry spices, baking soda, and salt.
- 5. In a small bowl, whisk eggs and vanilla. Add the pumpkin-date mixture and mix gently together. Add the wet mixture to the dry ingredients, stirring gently.
- 6. Pour into prepared pan and bake for 45 to 50 minutes or until set in the centre.
- 7. Remove from oven and cool completely before slicing.

\*This loaf is not very sweet. If you must, spread slices with honey or maple syrup.

# Fourteen kilometres of Killarney's Hartley Bay Road to be rehabilitated for improved safety

KILLARNEY—Last month, Marc Serré, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Rural Economic Development, the Honourable Bernadette Jordan, Minister of Rural Economic Development and Member of Parliament for Nickel Belt announced funding for the rehabilitation of 14 kilometres of Hartley Bay Road in Killarney.

The project will include the realignment of an estimated 175 metres of road to remove blind curves, replacement of three culverts, installation of approximately 550 feet of guardrail, and posting of additional safety signs along sharp curves.

The rehabilitation of Hartley Bay Road will improve road conditions and driver safety, and ensure the longevity of the road.

The Government of Canada is investing over \$1.3 million in this project through the Rural and Northern Communities Stream. Infrastructure Government of The Ontario is contributing over \$762,000 and the Municipality of Killarney is providing over \$398,000 towards this project.

The Killarney region has already received nearly \$370,000 in federal infrastructure investments since 2016 which has allowed the municipality

to undertake road, landfill and waste water infrastructure projects that have positively benefited the area.

"Improving transportation infrastructure helps ensure that Canadians have more time to spend with their families," Mr. Serré said. "Once complete, the Hartley Bay Road rehabilitation will result in a safer and more efficient roadway for residents and visitors. This investment will help stimulate economic development for local businesses and enhance tourism so that many more can safely visit the beautiful Nickel Belt - Greater Sudbury region!"

"The municipality is pleased to be the recipient of an Investing in Canada Infrastructure Grant that will be used to improve Hartley Bay Road in Ward 2, and to address safety concerns for our residents, tourists and local businesses," Virginia Rook, mayor of the Municipality of Killarney.






