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Lake Huron, Michigan water levels highest in 20 years

LAKE HURON—Lake Huron's water levels are the highest they've been at this time since 1997.

Derrick Beach of Environment and Climate Change Canada told The Expositor that while the lake has begun its seasonal decline, dropping four centimetres so far this month, the wet spring and summer contributed to a stay in this drop.

Mr. Beach explained that the current levels of 176.92 metres are 45 centimetres above the August average and 18 centimetres above this time last year while the beginning-of-September numbers saw Lake Huron at 44 centimetres

Island man and family escape Hurricane Irma, feel 'incredible lucky' to return to Canada safe from BVI home

TORTOLA, BRITISH VIRGIN ISLANDS—Nathan Wong, formerly of Spring Bay, spent the afternoon of September 6 huddled in a basement bathroom, sheltered under a wet mattress with his partner Mouzaya Dabboussy and their two young children, Zach and Noah, as Hurricane Irma raged outside, destroying the world around them. It would be six days until they were able to get from Tortola to the safety of Canada.

"The last big storm to hit the BVI was Marilyn in 1995, and that was a category 3 and not direct," Mr. Wong told The Expositor during a phone interview last Wednesday. "Tortola is such a small target, twelve by three miles, a 10th of the size of Manitoulin with three times the population. We never thought we would be in the eye of the storm. We were following the storm leading up to Wednesday, but we thought 'what are the chances it's going to hit us?' Even the day before, Mouzaya asked me to take down the bathroom mirror and store it away—the bathroom is completely gone now—we just had no idea."

When it was certain Irma was headed for Tortola, Nathan and his family sought shelter at their neighbour's home.

"John's (Bagalini) home was a lot more sturdier than ours and we took shelter at his home, in his basement," said Mr. Wong.

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Two-week reprieve for old Mindemoya school Council defers demolition vote for next meeting

CENTRAL MANITOULIN—The sand is running out for the historic old Mindemoya Old School building, but Central Manitoulin council has opted to give the hourglass another turn, albeit only for a couple of weeks until the next council meeting.

The recommendation for demolition came from the Property Committee meeting of September 12 and was originally moved by Councillor Alex Baran and Councillor Dale Scott and read: "that we recommend to council that after public consultation and no resulting proposals for viable repurposing, that staff is directed to develop an RFP (request for proposals) and advertise this fall for the demolition of the Mindemoya Old School to occur in the spring of 2018."

Councillor Derek Stephens moved the motion, seconded by Councillor Baron, accepting the Property Committee recommendation.

Councillor Stephens began the debate noting that

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Little Current Lions become official Jumpstart area partners

MANITOULIN—As though the Little Current Lions Club isn't busy enough with their many endeavours, they have decided to take on a new role, championing the youth of Manitoulin to get active in sports and are now the official area partners for the Canadian Tire Jumpstart program.

Previously held by an Espanola contact, the Little Current Lions Club is now the go-to organization for Jumpstart applications for all families on Manitoulin and Espanola.

Lion Mike Dubreuil, chair of the Active Youth Manitoulin committee as part of the Little Current Lions, explained that there are two ways to apply to Jumpstart: online or on paper. Those who require a form, and cannot do it online, are asked to contact Lion Mike who will then mail an application to the family who will then send it back to the club, which fills out the form electronically on that person's

There are two qualifications to be eligible for Jumpstart funding: an income assessment (using the Low Income Cut-Off (LICO) chart) and the previous year's T4 statement or three consecutive cheque stubs. The youth or youths must be between the ages

"If you can't provide these items, you can alternatively have a person such as a mayor, chief or coun-

cillor submit a letter on your behalf, stating your current financial situation," Lion Mike added.

If found eligible, the area Jumpstart program will pay up to \$150 per child per season (there are funds available for both summer and winter), as long as the

"So far we've helped 26 children this year," Lion Mike said.

'Just because it's now the Little Current Lions that is the official area Jumpstart partner does not mean that it's just for the youth of Little Current," Lion Mike explained. "Everyone, from all of Manitoulin's communities, and Espanola, are encouraged to apply." If the financial need criteria are met, and there are funds available to give, you will be eligible, he added.

He reminded parents that Jumpstart is not just for hockey; there are a whole host of sports that the fund covers (visit jumpstart.canadiantire.ca for the full list) and depending on the season. Jumpstart will cover either registration fees, equipment or travel.

For those interested in hockey, there are other options available to low income families too, such as The Big Play (up to \$500 per family), another Canadian Tire charity, or the Lace'Em Up Foundation for Kids (up to \$1,000 per family).

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by Michael Erskine TEHKUMMAH—The August 27 resignation of Tehkummah municipal councillor Laird Lee for health and family reasons put council under a deadline to find a suitable method of choosing his replacement. The first order of business was to declare the council seat vacant, which the council proceeded to do, but when it came to deciding how to proceed to fill the vacant seat, council rejected all possible options.

Once council had declared the seat vacant, they have 60 days to decide how they will fill that council seat according to the Municipal Act (unless the vacancy occurs within 90 days before voting day in the next general election, council must arrange to fill the empty

Clerk/treasurer Karen Gerard outlined the options available to council under the Municipal Act. In a nutshell, those options were to either appoint someone to fill the vacant seat for the remaining year of this council term (municipal elections take place on October 22, 2018) or to hold a by-election.

She noted that if council decided to fill the vacancy by appointment, they must appoint a person who is eligible to serve on the council or board and who is willing to accept the appointment. The legislation does not set out any other criteria. It is up to council to determine how they will decide who to appoint.

Ms. Gerard noted that there are different approaches to making appointments, including appointing the candidate who came second in the general election, inviting interested persons to apply for the position, or offering the appointment to a member of the community. The Municipal Act notes that sometimes councils want to put additional restrictions on appointees, such as requiring that an appointee agree not to run in the next general election. While a council or board may set this as a condition for appointment, there is nothing in provincial legislation that would prevent someone who was appointed from running in the next election.

If the position was to be advertised, council would go into closed session to discuss the merits of those who have applied to fill the vacancy to make their decision.

If the decision is to go with a byelection, it is the municipal clerk who is in charge of conducting it, specifically, council does not decide when nomination day or voting day will be. Those dates are determined by the clerk.

Nominations close at 2 pm nomination day. The clerk has leeway of 60 days to set the nomination day, the election takes place 45 days later.

The appointment process would take about 30 to 45 days, noted Ms. Gerard. The vacancy would be advertised until October 13 and the appointment taking effect November 11.

The election process would require setting a nomination date followed by a 45-day by-election campaign period.

"I can't support appointing the runner up in the last election because the difference between that person and the next on the list was one vote," said Councillor Paul Bowerman. "That would have triggered a recount." There was general acknowledgement of that around the council table.

Ms. Gerard had prepared motions for all options going forward and council first voted on a motion to appoint. Council then voted on a prepared motion to appoint a replacement in a recorded vote. Councillors Paul Bowerman and Ron Hierons voted against the motion, Councillor Lori Leeson and Reeve Eric Russell voted in favour. As the vote was tied, it was defeated.

Council was then left with the default option to hold a by-election, but the motion to hold a byelection also failed. In that recorded vote Councillor Bowerman and

Tehkummah Township 2017 budget estimate scaled back

TEHKUMMAH—The initial estimate of the tax increase facing this year's Tehkummah budget er to take than the first number out of the block. The town is also facing some serious issues deliberations set the town clerk treasurer back in her chair when she first saw the number. For any municipal official or politician, the prospect of a near-63 percent increase in the municipal budget is enough to engender heart palpitations, if not a more serious reaction.

"I couldn't believe it," said Clerk Treasurer Karen Gerard, "I really couldn't. I thought there had to be some mistake in the spreadsheet, so I went back to square one. Checked everything. All the formulas were correct.'

It turned out there was an error, but the tax increase was still over the top. The less heart stopping number was still unpalatable at best.

The bottom line was that the town was facing a \$1.8 million operating budget. To cope with the sudden increase after several years of zero percent increases in the budget, along with at least two years of steep deficits, the town council and staff had some serious pencil sharpening to do.

In the end, items were deferred to next year's budget (some \$190,000 in capital expenditures) and \$220,000 was drawn from the town's rapidly depleting reserves to soften the blow. Luckily, revenues were higher than anticipated by about \$220,000.

The bottom line was a five percent increase in the municipal mill rate. Still a hefty hike in light of the

many years of zero percent increases, but a lot easi-

The town is also facing some serious issues that will not prove easy to defer, including a health and safety issue at the fire hall where an exhaust system needs to be upgraded.

The budget was clearly and evidently on the minds of council members when they voted to send out requests for proposals (RFP) to perform a full financial review of the municipality's operations.

Council also voted to send out an RFP to provide auditing services to the municipality. The current auditors have been in place for several years.

Councillor Paul Bowerman said that he did not understand how the municipality's finances, reserves and deficits and banking account balances were possible and where the money was, and how it was possible to transfer thousands of dollars into reserve accounts when there was plainly no money in the bank accounts to match that amount.

'I don't understand and it makes me sick to my stomach," he lamented.

Also coming down the pipe in the coming days was the hearing on the town's dispute with a contractor over the bill for a local bridge—along with a potentially hefty bill should the town's position fail at the dock.

Costs for the financial review were estimated at between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

All we are saying, is give the Old School a chance

Manitoulin council's docket, and the cries of "guillotine" are ringing out across the court, but not from the gallery. The cheerleaders on this effort are quite plainly evident and are proceeding with what seems to be an unseemly haste.

The decision to demolish the historic Mindemoya Old School building is understandable, from a municipal council and staff perspective. It is a lot of work and expense to maintain a near-century old building, let alone to upgrade it. Without a shining white knight riding to the rescue with saddlebags laden with gold, prolonging the agony of the stately old stone edifice could be deemed cruel and unnecessary. After all, many longs hours of debate have been spent in making the decision.

So then, the decision well and truly set in the minds of those oh-socautious burghers in control of the public purse strings, the standard foils for dealing with the inevitable fallout were set in action, a public meeting complete with the proper and due wringing of hands and, of course, the listing in great flourish of the insurmountable costs of upgrading the building to soon-to-be implemented provincial accessibility standards, and then, of course, the invocation of that greatest of bugaboos, asbestos, is thrown in for good measure.

Mayor Richard Stephens is to be commended for leading the push back on the rush to send the Mindemoya Old School to stand before the wrecking ball—and Councillor Linda Farquhar for her support in his efforts. Mayor Stephens quite rightly pointed out that there is little financial reason to be in such a hurry. The cost, while not totally insignificant, is hardly onerous when it is considered that this is not

some ramshackle old wooden building facing demolition. This is one of the few remaining historical buildings in the community, indeed, it rivals many across the entire North.

It may be understandable why some council members might be long tired of this debate. There certainly comes a time to move on, but on the other hand, sometimes it may actually be time to get off the pot, at least for a while so that a proper job can be done to seek other solutions.

The question is rightly asked, and to this paper's mind at least not adequately answered, as to what efforts have been made to find a gal-

What options, other than expanded parking for the arena, have actually been considered to stay the historic building's execution where it will join the old bank and the creamery as faded memories in old museum photographs.

To too many people in the community it appears that the decision to do away with the Mindemoya Old School building has been rushed forward as a fait accompli, with little no serious or concerted effort made to find another solution. Those efforts should be reviewed at committee, along with some serious soul searching as to why this rush to the simple and easy solution would appear to an outside observer as having really been the only one ever seriously entertained by this council.

With such a solid and historic building to use as a base, some effort and thinking outside the box could find a solution that does not involve a rush to swing the wrecking ball.

A study in the etymological motive behind South Baymouth

To the Expositor:

As one of those citizens who has recently moved to the Island and is commonly referred to as, "you people," it is with much trepidation I broach the subject of toponymy. However, your recent editorial on the spelling of Wiikwemkoong and its subsequent change of name by ject of my own, home hamlet, South Baymouth.

Should someone show you a map of an island with two bays, and ask you to mark the location of a community called South Baymouth, you would most likely consider two locations. You would look at the mouths of the two bays and locate the community on the south side of one of them. It could be in either bay. North Baymouth would be sited on the north side of the bay mouth.

Let us suppose the two bays on the maps were named. One "North Bay," the other "South Bay." Even with this information, "South Baymouth" could still be located in either bay.

But now, if asked to locate "South Bay Mouth," one would be inclined to locate it at the mouth of South Bay. Even if the bays were unnamed, one would still be able to identify the likely location of a community

called South Bay Mouth. In fact, Southbay Mouth, would be descriptively more accurate than South Baymouth.

This interpretation of "South Bay Mouth," is also reflected in its pronunciation by local inhabitants. Ask most, the name of the community, and quite clearly, "South Bay Mouth," is pronounced with emphasis on as opposed to "South Baymouth" which come as two words. I'm not sure when the change took place. There's a "Brown's Shell South Bay Mouth" sign at the junction of Hwy. 6 and Sideroad 10, in Tehkummah, and some early tourist posters on the Chi-Cheemaun showed both spellings. My guess is, the die was cast once Canada Post made the decision.

I do think names are important, particularly where they reflect in some way, the etymological motive behind the naming of the place. However, I'd totally understand if the general consensus is that we have more pressing issues to address. Certainly, most people I discuss this with think I'm nuts.

Roberta Bondar brings environmental consciousness to MSS

M'CHIGEENG—The Manitoulin Secondary School (MSS) cafetorium was standing room only during a recent presentation by Canada's first woman (and the world's first neurologist) in space, Dr. Roberta Bondar.

The Roberta Bondar Foundation and Science North have formed a new partnership to celebrate the 25th anniversary of her historic journey into space entitled Earth Matters, a multi-city series of guest appearances focussed on "the trailblazing astronaut's love for this planet."

Manitoulin was the last stop on the seven-community tour and Dr. Bondar was visiting both MSS and the Wiikwemkoong High School to deliver an inspirational talk to students and members of the public. The presentations are part of the Ontario 150 anniversary celebrations and are helping to launch the photography-based Ontario 150 Bondar Challenge.

"My view from the spacecraft Discovery 25 years ago forever changed my view of Earth and it was on that flight that I committed to protect this magnificent planet," said Ms. Bondar. Her foundation is committed to connecting people to nature through photography in order to promote good health and protect the planet.

"(Talking to young students like those at MSS and Wiikwemkoong) is really important because we want to keep people committed to the natural world, because it has so many solutions for all of us," she said. "If we don't keep emphasizing it, it won't happen. I think that my presence allows people to understand there is a little bit of respect here going on—respect for that natural environment and respect for me, maybe they will change the way they look at the natural environment."

Dr. Bondar covered three basic messages in her presentation. The first was, as might be expected from Canada's first woman in space, about space and the importance of exploration. As part of that presentation was a short film on the ongoing exploration of the planet Mars.

The second portion of her presentation focussed on the Ontario 150 Bondar Challenge. The Challenge is based on one of the

tion on their website and social media channels, as well as on the Science North website at sciencenorth.ca. (More details on the Ontario 150 Bondar Challenge can be found online at therobertabondarfoundation org.)

Those submitting to the Ontario 150 Bondar Challenge will also be offered the opportunity to become a Bondar Environment champion via an online pledge. Signing the pledge will commit the signatories to Dr. Bondar's "Top 10 practices: reduce, reuse, recycle, repair, remake, refuse, restore, replace, remember your shopping bag and respect the earth."

"It is my hope that when people connect to nature through photography, they will love and respect the earth and work together to protect it so that we can enjoy a healthy life on a healthy planet," said Dr. Bondar.

The final part of the presentation was focussed on learning more about what was important to the students themselves and focussed on a question and answer session with the students.

Dr. Bondar discussed how she got into space. At the time of selection for the Canadian space program in December 1983, Dr. Bondar was assistant professor of neurology and director of the multiple sclerosis unit at the McMaster Medical Centre in Hamilton, doing both clinical work and research. Her field of research focussed in the nervous system and the inner ear balancing system, particularly as it relates to the functioning of the eye. This had immediate relevance to experiments being

planned for the first Canadian space flight. She also conducted research into blood flow in the brain during microgravity, lower body negative pressure and various pathological states.

It seemed intuitive that Dr. Bondar would have focused on STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) studies that are all the rage these days, and in which so many high profile successful women are

encouraging women, but this was not the focus of her talk.

"I am not a physicist," she explained. "I don't have the background to answer the questions that would come from that." Dr. Bondar, who holds five degrees, chose to be more authentic in her approach and to stick to the fields were she does have considerable expertise and insights to share.

The Science North connection was explained in a news release. "As part of Science North's mandate in serving Northern Ontario we are always looking for ways to extend our reach and bring science education to all communities in Northern Ontario," said Science North CEO Guy Labine. "We are delighted to partner with Dr. Bondar, who is such an inspiration to so many Canadians, in bringing her insights about our planet to Northern Ontario in such a unique way."

"Ontario's 150th anniversary is an opportunity for people to recognize and celebrate the incredible resources our province offers," said Eleanor McMahon, Ontario minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport in the same release. "Under the leadership of Dr. Bondar and Science North, Earth Matters and the Ontario 150 Bondar Challenge will engage and help people connect with our natural world in an inspiring and impactful way."

As for the students themselves, the looks of admiration and wonder in the eyes of the Girl Guides who chatted with Dr. Bondar following her presentation spoke volumes, as did the thunderous applause that followed her talk.

Turning off the 9-1-1

Provincial Ontario Police (OPP) has received more than 142,130 9-1-1 calls from January 1 to June 30, 2017 and 299,100 in 2016. In 2016, the OPP was able to confirm over 2,000 pocket dials however over 30,000 remained as unknown wireless calls.

Ontario's unintentional calls have decreased over the last few years, but more work needs to be done. OPP launching the #KnowWhenToCall ca mpaign this fall to further educate the public on unintentional calls including pocket dials to 9-1-1. They continue to urge the public not to call 9-1-1 unless it's an emergency, and not

to let children play with mobile phones or tablets.

Beginning Thursday. September 14, the OPP will use its social media platforms to launch a public education campaign to remind the public to be careful about unintentional or 'pocket dial' calls to Provincial Communications Centres and what to do if they accidentally call 9-1-1. Included in the campaign are posters, poster cards and short videos also available for use by schools and community partners to help get the message out. The campaign will run over a three-week period with the first release aimed at youth returning to school, followed by two more releases in the following weeks. The campaign products will be available to the media and public on OPP the webpage opp.ca under the 9-1-1 page.

Pocket dials happen when a mobile device carried in a pocket, purse, backpack or other piece of clothing accidentally activates the keypad, causing the emergency call. Many calls still occur when young children are given cell phones and smart phones to play with as toys. Even old, inactive devices with the SIM card removed can be used to dial 9-1-1.

For every unintentional call or pocket dial received, an emergency communicator must determine whether a real emergency exists and if police, fire or paramedics should be dispatched. With every unintentional received, precious seconds may be taken away from someone who really needs help.

If you place an unintentional 9-1-1 call, stay on the line to let the emergency operator know it was a pocket dial/unintentional call. Every 9-1-1 call is taken seriously. When a 9-1-1 caller doesn't respond, that could be a sign of trouble - a possibility an emergency responder can't ignore.

You can prevent pocket dials or unintentional 9-1-1 calls by:

· Using the keypad lock feature. Keypad locks, some of which can be programmed to activate automatically, prevent a

Fall boating: It takes a little bit more care ONTARIO—Boating in the fall offers colourful vistas, quiet anchorages and excellent fishing but it is not without its

challenges that necessitate self-sufficiency and taking some additional precautions to keep from running into

The Canadian Safe Boating Council (CSBC) wants to remind all boaters enjoying the fall season on the water to follow these tips to ensure that their excursions are both safe and enjoyable.

Before heading out, be sure to check the weather forecast. The mixing of warm and cold air can quickly spawn high winds and waves making it treacherous for small boats. Fog, too, is an issue at this time of year making visibility difficult. Should boaters find themselves in a fog bank, they should proceed slowly and sound their horn at regular intervals to alert other boaters of their presence.

Well into October, daytime temperatures can occasionally be balmy but dressing for the water temperature will help slow the onset of hypothermia should the unexpected happen and the boater find himself in the water. Accidental cold water immersion can be shocking, but they shouldn't panic. It may take a minute or so to get their breathing under control after the initial shock but they will have at least 10-15 minutes, even in very cold water, to affect selfrescue before they start to lose muscle control in their


arms and legs. This is where an approved lifejacket, either inflatable or inherently buoyant, is an essential part of a boater's wardrobe to keep them afloat after they can no longer swim.

In the fall, there are fewer boats on the water to offer assistance, if needed. Boaters should be sure to leave a float plan with a responsible person on shore who will know what to do if they're overdue. A marine radio or cell phone will allow them to call for assistance should the need arise. Having a few tools and spare parts aboard will also allow them to fix minor problems that might otherwise cause them to be stranded out on the water.

It's important that boaters ensure that their boat and engine are in good shape and mechanically sound. Ethanol-based fuel can allow water contamination in the tank. The use of a fuel additive prevents water in the fuel line from freezing which could cause the engine to chug to a halt. Fuel sold at marinas is Ethanol free. If the boat has portable fuel tanks, it's a good idea to have a spare on board as a reserve.

When boaters head out, they should be wary of reduced water levels that can result after a long, hot and dry summer season. Some of a boater's favourite shallow water



...continued from page 1 "Around noon we could hear the balcony rip off. The strongest winds were around 1 pm and the pressure didn't just blow out the windows, it ripped them and the doors out, frames and all. There was a spiral staircase down to the basement that we couldn't seal off and when the roof ripped off we ran to a small which was bathroom, through a bedroom in the basement. I pushed my son into the bathroom and looked back to see Mouzaya and our baby trying to get over an overturned couch, I ran back out to help her. We didn't know if the ceiling would hold up in the bathroom so we dragged a mattress in and placed it on an angle, huddling under it."

Mr. Bagalini, Mr. Wong and his family spent the next seven hours in the small bathroom waiting for the storm to pass. When they emerged they were exhausted and slept on the wet couches in the base-

"When we went outside the next morning and looked upon the destruction, there wasn't a leaf in sight," he said. "Trees that were three or four feet wide were broken in half. Most of the homes have concrete bases and wooden roofs and they were destroyed. There was debris everywhere. There was no cell signal, so we borrowed a car and went to town; we live four kilometres outside of the capital Road Town. Out of John's, mine and Mouzaya's phone, only one of us got a signal in Road Town and we were able to reach out to our parents in Canada and let them know we were okay.'

Mr. Wong said it took another four days for the (British) military to come and the situation becoming desperate.

"Everyone lost everything," he said. "There was no power—no electricity and no water—and people started looting in town just trying to get food and survive. We were lucky to be outside of town and also very fortunate because John is the owner of a restaurant and had a big deep freezer with chicken and had rice and a propane gas stove. He fed and housed us until we were able to leave on Tuesday (September 12). We were very fortunate."

Mr. Wong's family's home was destroyed. They salvaged what they could and set to getting their children off the island.

"We learned that the DFAIT (Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade) had no evacuation plan for Canadians," he explained. "The UK eventually flew in 300 military officers, around day three or four, which helped with the looting and crime, but they still hadn't organized the distribution of food

by the time we were able to leave. People were sleeping on the streets in town. There was garbage heaped up along the sides of the street like four-foot snow banks. People lost everything—no one got away with their stuff. People were driving around in smashed up cars—it was like a war zone. The hospital was full of people with big gashes, broken bones, impaled with pieces of

Back in Canada, Ms. Dabboussy's mom was reaching out to the Canadian government and DFAIT, trying to get her daughter and family back home. She was able to book flights from BVI to Puerto Rico to Ottawa, but the couple soon discovered the BVI airport was closed.

"There were huge catamarans in the middle of the road, the port was shut down and so was the airport—there were no commercial flights out, Mr. Wong. "The only thing you could do was charter a private plane if you had the money."

Mr. Wong and Ms. Dabboussy had both applied and been accepted to a mentorship program, Unite BVI, a non-profit organization founded by Richard Branson of Virgin and Larry Page of Google last year.

"We had the opportunity to network with a lot of people through the program," said Mr. Wong. "We started reaching out to people we had met and one of them, Kim, who works for Unite BVI, was able to arrange for two seats in emergency evac helicopter—we were incredibly lucky. The communication was sparse and we had to drive into town to send or receive messages.'

On Tuesday morning at 8 am, Mr. Wong and Ms. Dabboussy and their two young children boarded the helicopter, which took them to Puerto Rico. From there they were able to board their connecting flight with United Airlines to Ottawa.

"We were so lucky to get out," Mr. Wong stressed. "We would still be there if we hadn't been a part of that program and they paid for the helicopter. There are still so many Canadians down thereones who call BVI home and tourists who are stuck.

Mr. Wong and his sister Natasha Rueter (owner of the Black Butterfly and for-Jar in Little Current) grew up in Spring Bay. Their father moved to the BVI in 1995, and Mr. Wong spent the subsequent summers travelling to visit his dad.

"I knew since I was 17 that I wanted to move there," said Mr. Wong. "My dad was an entrepreneur and I knew I wanted to be as well. Tortola is like Manitoulin. I liked the small town life-knowing everyone and I liked the tropical weather."

After graduating from Carlton University with a bachelor of commerce and international business, Mr. Wong moved to Tortola in

He was introduced to Ms. Dabboussy, a realtor, through his sister Natasha and after a long distance relationship, she moved to Tortola and began their family. Mr. Wong owns a concrete business, which specializes in flooring, countertops and tile restoration.

"The ports aren't open in Tortola, and everything is shipped in," said Mr. Wong. "There will be months of cleaning up. It's just crazy. A lot of people, us included, underestimated storm."

For now Mr. Wong and his family are safe in Ottawa, but they lost their home and the majority of their possessions.

A Go Fund Me campaign has been started for the family, with any funds going directly towards rebuilding their small home and lives. To donate

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

...continued from page 1 the old Mindemoya School building has been an ongoing issue in the community, but that after public consultation there has been no solid proposition or proposal put forward by anyone to actually move a project forward. "I agree it is a beautiful building," he said, but noted that it will cost between \$500,000 and a million dollars to bring the building up to standard and that he did not think that "would be spending money

properly." 'I agree with a great deal Councillor what Stephens has said," provided Councillor Baran who, despite not being originally from the community, said he was sympathetic. "I understand the personal attachment to the structure, I can identify with that." The councillor noted that everyone has attachments to iconic buildings from their past. He also noted the historical value of the building to the community, but that he had to consider the practicality of keeping the building. "If we had all the money in the world I believe the whole council would line up (to

Councillor Baran then went on to list the deficiencies of the building including accessibility requirements the municipality will have to meet according to soon to be in force legislation. "We know from work at the Providence Bay Hall that an accessible bathroom will cost at least \$60,000," he said, "and this building will need three of

support keeping it).'

Councillor Baran concluded his remarks by saying "my obligation is to be as fiscally responsible as possible.

Councillor Ted Taylor noted his own close attachment to the building, "I went to Grade 1 in 1940," he said. "I attended school in just about every one of the classrooms in that building." But he also noted that "you can send good money after bad." Mr. Taylor noted a number of other buildings in the community that he has been sad to see go.

"The old creamery, I spent 14 years there, and the old bank, it's gone now too." Mr. Taylor pointed out that many old barns in the community have been torn down by local farmers. "If it is not making money, it gets torn down," he said.

Councillor Linda Farquhar came down on the other side of the debate, stating that she does not believe that the municipality has put sufficient effort into seeking out an alternative to simply tearing the old building down. "I think we should save it," she said. "It has historical value to the community. It was fully rented for a number of years and then, somehow, it was just let go. I really don't think that council has tried really hard to find someone—how many people have been approached? How many advertisements have we posted?"

Councillor Farquhar said "we should give it a bit more time. Have someone go in and access it. It would make a wonderful big complex or a museum.'

Mayor Richard Stephens stepped into the debate saying he could not let the motion go by without comment. He questioned the actual cost of keeping the building a while longer, noting that the cost of maintaining the building has been about \$5,200, which includes about \$1,700 for insurance and that the \$2,300 in maintenance costs largely for snow were

Mayor Stephens went on to point out that other halls in the community have far higher costs associated with them. "The hall in Prov is \$17,000, the one in Spring Bay is \$13,000 and Mindemoya's is \$23,000," he said. "Just using those as a comparison, it is a pretty small expense. We might be proceeding on this thing quickly." Mayor Stephens noted the building was constructed in 1921. "The next council would be presiding over its 100th anniversary." He went on to list the various incarnations the building has gone through, as school, municipal offices, community hall—"many wedding receptions were held there. There is a lot of history in a building that has been there for 100 years.

He suggested that a committee should be set up to try and find a solution to the issue.

Councillor Stephens noted that "it is a big decision and I would like to see more of council here for it." Councillor Dale Scott, who seconded the original recommendation at committee to demolish the building, and Councillor Patricia MacDonald were not in attendance at Thursday's council meeting. "I would find out if we could bring it back (to the next council meeting)."

Councillor Stephens then withdrew the motion, with the agreement of Councillor Baran.

"We could send it back to the Property Committee," suggested Mayor Stephens.

"That is where the recommendation came from,"

Stephens. "I would like to see it come back to coun-

Mayor Stephens suggested that the committee should discuss the demolition further, and that it should be considered for a longer period than the two weeks to the next council meeting.

After some further back and forth, and assurances from the clerk that it could be simply returned to council, rather than referred back to committee, a motion was put forward to delay decision on the fate of the Mindemoya Old School building until the next council meeting. In a recorded vote Councillor Stephen, Councillor Baran and Councillor Taylor voted to bring the recommendation back to the next council meeting, Mayor Stephens and Councillor Farquhar voted against the motion. It passed.

Local history activist Jan McQuay weighed in on the issue following the meeting. "Where there's a will there's a way," she said. "Look at the old wharf building in Gore Bay, now the Harbour Centre. One farsighted museum curator, Nicole Weppler, had a vision, found funding for renovations and saved the building."

Ms. McQuay called into question the timing of the move by council. "Threatening to demolish the building unless someone comes forward quickly with a plan that council likes is the wrong way to go about things," she suggested. "Why not actively search for alternatives? If it's beyond the scope of the EDO, why not hire someone like Mary Nelder to look into it? And give that person time instead of rushing to demolish it. When it's gone. there's no bringing it back. I don't think they've really tried. Schools have a special place in communities, and this well-built brick one has a certain imposing presence in keeping with the significant role it played in the lives of all the kids who grew up here for many decades.'

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



Island lawyer retires following regulatory meeting appearance

TORONTO—M'Chigeeng lawyer Susan Hare surrendered her licence to practice law effective August 15 following a regulatory meeting of the Law Society of Upper Canada held to "discuss" complaints filed with the society about her conduct in regard to Residential School survivor cases.

Ms. Hare maintains that her retirement was "already in the works" at the time of the hearing and was in no way a result of that hearing. "It's fake news," responded her husband Joe Hare when he answered the phone at the couple's home.

Ms. Hare maintained that she had a number of "disappearing clients," individuals who had contacted her office indicating that they wanted her to represent their interests, but that she had been unable to contact them following the initial calls.

"There were some elders up North who called my office," she said. "They said they had talked to me, but had talked to my secretary. Then they disappeared out onto the land." Ms. Hare eventually stopped trying to contact them, she said. The issue, she continued, was basically that the elders "didn't understand how things work."

Since she was intending to retire in any event, Ms. Hare said that she simply did not "want to fight with them" and instead just decided to "take the lump."

The Ontario Reports publication put out by the Law Society of Upper Canada explains in a preamble to the proceedings listed that a Regulatory Meeting comes about "in circumstances where

lawyer or paralegal conduct must be addressed but formal discipline proceedings are not warranted, the Law Society may authorize a Regulatory Meeting. At its conclusion, the Regulatory Meeting may be publically noted. It may be authorized in circumstances where the public would reasonably expect a Law Society response to the lawyer's or paralegal's conduct."

In Ms. Hare's case, the Ontario Reports article noted that "The lawyer was alleged to have failed to serve clients with applications to the Indian Residential Schools Adjudication Secretariat under the Independent Adjudication Process and to have failed to be honest and candid with clients regarding the status of their applications."

"Pursuant to the Law Society's policy on Regulatory Meetings, a discussion took place concerning the regulatory issues and applicable Rules of Professional Conduct. The lawyer acknowledged that she did not file application for compensation with the Indian Residential Schools

Adjudication Secretariat and that she did not submit required documentation necessary for the applications of some of her clients to be considered. She also acknowledged that she did not provide information with honesty and candour to some of her clients about the status of their applications.

"The members of the Proceedings Authorization Committee reminded the lawyer of her obligation to perform all functions in a timely and costeffective manner, and in particular, the requirement that lawyers recognize limitations in their ability to handle a matter or some aspect of it, and take steps to ensure the client is properly served. The committee also noted that the lawyer's duty of candour to her clients required her to inform her clients of information known to her that may affect the interests of the client in the matter.

"The members of the Proceedings Authorization Committee agreed that the discussion was useful. In addition to the Regulatory Meeting, the lawyer undertook to surrender her licence effective August 15, 2017."

The Ontario Reports notation indicated that counsel for the Law Society was Margaret Drent, while Ms. Hare was unrepresented and appeared before the Regulatory Meeting in person.

Ms. Hare was philosophical about the outcome. "It is what it is," she said. "It wasn't a disciplinary hearing, but they give it out anyway."

McLean's Mountain turbines undergo maintenance work

MCLEAN'S MOUNTAIN—Passersby of the McLean's Mountain Mountain Wind Farm of late may have noted some work being done to two of the turbines

According to Northland Power, GE Renewable Energy is currently completing scheduled maintenance at the McLean's Mountain Wind Farm. "This work has been planned in advance to ensure that the wind farm continues to operate safely and efficiently," Sarah Charuk, director of communications for Northland Power, told The Expositor. "The maintenance work involves replacing the bearings on certain turbine blades (on two of the turbines). We anticipate that the work will be completed by the end of September—providing the weather cooperates. Work will be halted when wind measurements exceed a pre-determined limit.'

We do not anticipate that this maintenance will significantly impact production at the wind farm; it was scheduled during a low-wind period to minimize any impact,"

Northeast Town at the table for cruise industry growth

ONTARIO—The Northeast Town, along with other Great Lake ports, attended a meeting with Deputy Minister of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS) Maureen Adamson to discuss a potential study of the growth of the cruise ship industry in Toronto recently.

'We presented a number of things to her to help support our case for the need of a study to look at the future growth of the cruise ship industry," Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin said, noting the meeting was attended by himself and a number of representatives of other Great Lake ports including Midland Mayor Gord McKay, who began the discussion.

"She (Deputy Minister Adamson) was very receptive to

the idea and there could be potential to look at the growth and possible funding through the MTCS for the study,' Mayor MacNevin added. "There will be more to come from this, but it's a good start."

Mayor McKay organized a conference call in August with Sault Ste. Marie, Thunder Bay, Parry Sound and the Northeast Town to discuss a study to look at potential expansion of the Great Lakes cruise ship industry. Mayor McKay also set up a meeting with Minister Eleanor McMahon of MTCS at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), which Mayor MacNevin attended and which led to the follow up meeting with Deputy Minister Adamson.

Make sure you train or get assistance with your new dog. Patience is key. Rescues have often been left in cages with strange sights and sounds. Give them time to acclimate. Focus on rewarding good behaviour, not just the bad.

Some good reasons to adopt are: you save a life; most animals through no fault of their own need a second chance; older pets can be more laid back, already trained and less energetic than a younger animal; adopting supports spaying and neutering in

turn helping the overpopulation crisis and they have the same amount of love to give, if not more.

Veterinarian Johanne Paquette of Island Animal Hospital and animal behaviourist Nancy Milburn provided information and advice to pet owners. A new addition this year was Julie Rochefort-Wood, curator and owner of Island Box. 

Intake 2 of the Rural Economic Development Program is open for applications

The Rural Economic Development (RED) program helps rural communities remove barriers to community economic development, through support for planning and implementation projects that benefit rural Ontario. The program is now open and will accept applications until September 29, 2017 at 5 pm (Eastern). As part of continuous improvement, several minor changes have been made to the RED program guidelines and application since the closure of the first intake: Additional details have been added to the guidelines to clarify eligible and ineligible project types, eligible and ineligible project costs, and submission requirements. New direction has been added to the application to assist with identifying required sections, while new functionality has been added to assist with the validation of cost entries and word counts. Applicants are required to read the RED guidelines before completing an application form, and are encouraged to download a new application from the RED program website. 


