OPP posts \$50K reward for help in solving decade-old hit and run

Anthony (Antz) Mandamin died in roadside mishap on Sept. 16, 2006



WIKWEMIKONG-It was 10 years ago, on September 16, 2006, that Anthony 'Antz' Samuel Mandamin was struck and killed by a vehi-

cle in the early morning hours while he was walking the Kaboni Road, near the Odawa Valley Road, in Wikwemikong. Mr. Mandamin had just left a house party.

The driver of the unknown vehicle responsible for his death failed to remain at the scene. Mr. Mandamin was just 25-years-old and was described by his family as a gentle, light-spirited young man with a great sense of humour.

The Government of the Province of Ontario is offering a reward in the amount of \$50,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person(s) responsible for the death of Mr. Mandamin.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) are continuing their investigation under the direction of OPP Detective Inspector Gilles Depratto.

Detective Inspector Depratto told The Expositor that he and Wikwemikong Tribal Police Chief Gary Reid had been discussing the possibility of a reward and put a request into the office of OPP Commissioner Vince Hawkes. When the police have exhausted all leads, a reward is one way of making a public appeal for information, the detective added, noting the billboard along Wikwemikong Way which

Little Current Lions start 'Catch the Ace' progressive jackpot

LITTLE CURRENT-On September 1, the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) gave the nod for municipalities to grant 'chase the ace,' or in Ontario 'Catch the Ace,' lottery licences and the Little Current

Lions Club, with support of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch #177, was quick to jump on Canada's largest raffle craze.

Last year, news reports described a small Newfoundland town that sparked a huge frenzy. Attempting to raise \$5,000 to pay some of its parish bills, the Our Lady of Lourdes parish launched a 'Chase the Ace' lottery. Each Sunday, people would buy 50-50 tickets in a school gymnasium. At the end of the evening, the 50-50 winner was announced, but there was also a draw with the winner

getting 20 percent of the pot and getting a chance to cut a deck of cards in the hopes of drawing the ace of spades and winning an accumulated jackpot. Forty-four weeks later, the ace of spades was finally found, earning the winner \$329,000 and clearing all of the parish debts.

This new lottery caused a furor, and the Lions Club was quick to take note. After contacting the AGCO, the club learned that this kind of gambling was not permitted in the province; that was until September 1.

After weeks of meetings with municipal officials and the AGCO, the Lions Club was granted its licence last week and is excited to get started. The first Catch the

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Northeast Town expects to assume planning authority by new year

by Robin Burridge LITTLE CURRENT—Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin met with representatives of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) last week to discuss the transition of the municipality leaving the Manitoulin Planning Board (MPB) and becoming its own planning authority, a transition which is estimated to happen by January

2017.

"I met with the MMAH and they explained what we should expect and what the transition will look like," said Mayor MacNevin. "They said that we can expect to become our own planning authority by January 2017 and that the target for the ministry to be done reviewing our Official Plan (OP) is the end of the month. After the minister has reviewed the plan,

there is a 45 day period for appeals, but the MMAH said that they aren't expecting there to be any problems.

Mayor MacNevin said that the next step for the Northeast Town is to meet with the MPB to discuss the transition.

"I contacted the chair of the MPB, Ken Noland, previously about setting up a meeting, but they wanted to meet with the MMAH first, which they have now done," explained Mayor Mac-Nevin. "I have contacted him again and hopefully we can set up a meeting to discuss the transition process and plan."

As for what the makeup or process for review for planning applications will be once the Northeast Town becomes its own authority, Mayor MacNevin said that council has several options.

"I have spoken to other municipalities (that have their own planning board) and some are set up with a smaller committee made up of council members, others are composed of all of council and others have a planning advisory committee," he said. "We don't get a ton of applications, maybe six or seven a year, so it might be some-

thing that just council as a whole handles," said Mayor MacNevin. "The MMAH has also offered to host training sessions for council which will be held between now and the new year.

In 2015, the Northeast Town started the process of developing its own OP as part of its plan to leave the MPB.

In July of this year the North-east Town was granted permission to leave the MPB and establish its own planning authority, however, the municipality will stay a part of the MPB until its OP is approved.

LHIN and partners collaborate on first phase of non-urgent patient transfers

NORTH BAY—A patient-focused model to help get Northerners to and from their community hospital for non-urgent health care appointments at larger hospital referral centres will begin in the new year.

'Northerners want better coordinated care, especially when they are older and need to travel long distances from their home community hospital to a larger hospital for tests or specialist consults," says Louise Paquette, CEO, North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN). "After several years of hard work between the NE LHIN and area partners, this new model will help hospitals improve patient

flow while getting patients to and from hospitalbased medical appointments quickly and safely."

This made-in-the-North solution addresses a longstanding problem of patients being delayed at larger hospitals as they await a return trip by ambulance to their home community. Currently, across Northeastern Ontario, virtually all long-distance non-urgent patient transfers are done using ambulances, which often means a return ride isn't promptly available if the ambulance is called out to respond to an emer-

Rainbow District School Board defeats motion to outlaw teleconferences for in camera meetings

SUDBURY—A motion before the Rainbow District School Board (RDSB) board of trustees that would have meant that trustees had to attend in camera meetings in person was defeated at the board's Tuesday, September 13 strategic planning committee meeting held in Sudbury.

The motions "10.5: Board members who participate in an in camera meeting of a committee of the Board, including a Committee of the Whole Board, shall be physically present;" and "14.8: Members must be physically present to attend in camera meetings;" were both defeated after being opposed by both the Manitoulin trustee Larry Killens and First Nations trustee Grace Fox.

While the business cases for the motions were presented in camera, Mr. Killens read his business case into the record in the open meeting. Mr. Killens supplied his remarks to The Expositor.

Canada must act now to fund First Nation children at the same level as all Canadian children, Ontario regional chief

TORONTO—Ontario Regional Chief Isadore Day says last week's Canadian Human Rights Tribunal decision shines a glaring spotlight once again on a government system that neglects First Nation children and destroys families.

'First Nation children have been trapped in a vicious cycle of underfunding, poverty, despair and dysfunction since the days of the residential school system," said Ontario Regional Chief Day. "There are now more children in care, more children taken from their families, than at the height of the residential schools. It is time to move beyond words to action.'

For the second time this year, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal has issued a Second Compliance Order Against the Government of Canada on the First Nations child welfare case. In a decision released today, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal found that the Canadian Government (INAC) has not demonstrated compliance with the Tribunal's January 26, 2016 order finding Canada racially discriminates against over 163,000 First Nations children by providing flawed and inequitable child welfare services and failing to properly implement Jordan's Principle.

Since 2007, when the human rights complaint against Canada was first filed, the Chiefs of Ontario participated as an interested party due to the Canada-Ontario 1965 Indian Welfare Agreement, which enables the provision of provincial child welfare programs on-reserve. Ontario is reimbursed by Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada at a rate of 93 percent.

Cindy Blackstock, executive director of the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society, reported that she was profoundly disappointed that the federal government is failing to comply with repeated legal orders to end its racial discrimination against 163,000 First Nations children. She called on Ottawa to move from "empty rhetoric to meaningful action."

'This is not another federal budget line item that can be shuffled along until the year 2019. This cannot be another broken promise like the lifting of the two percent funding cap on basic services," said Ontario Regional Chief Day. "Both the federal and the Ontario governments must take this decision seriously and work with Ontario First Nations to improve conditions on reserves-not only because we now know that the law and the basic idea of

equality require it-but because it is the right thing to do if we are going to achieve a positive Nation to Nation relationship and have healthy future generations.'

The federal and provincial government must act now upon the first five recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, specifically "providing adequate resources to enable aboriginal communities and child-welfare organizations to keep aboriginal families together where it is safe to do so, and to keep children in culturally appropriate environments, regardless of where they reside.

'These are meant to be exciting times ahead for all peoples living in Canada-whether indigenous or non-indigenous. The CHRT once again shows us that the new government's promises are well founded in Canadian law, and the time is now to move forward together beyond words and into action." said Ontario Regional Chief Day. "All of the socio-economic determinants of health need to be addressed in order to build happy, healthy communities. Together, we will build a better country for all our children.'

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

It has been a banner year for resort and tourism operations across Manitoulin Island and the boost comes none too soon for many Island businesses that have been hammered by a perfect storm of bad news for nearly a decade.

The economic downturn in 2008 hit our American neighbours hard, much harder than it did here in much of Ontario and Canada in general, truth be told. But the fallout from the global recession hit the North pretty hard, particularly in regions where the tourism dollar plays a disproportionate role in the local economy.

As any business person on the Island can attest, the high season on Manitoulin is very, very short—six weeks at best, beginning shortly after the beginning of July and ending well before the end of August. During that short high season, the dollars that tourists inject into the local economy play a vital role in making peripheral businesses viable.

Although the jobs the tourism season creates in local resorts, food stands, restaurants, gift shops and marinas may be seasonal, those jobs play an important role in the rural and Northern quality of life. Those seasonal jobs allow students to earn the money they need for school and those jobs also boost the incomes of folks who might otherwise find themselves completely on the margins and having to depend on the bare bones social safety net-anyone who has looked beyond the political rhetoric of the government of the day, or been unfortunate enough to have had to depend on that so-called safety net,

quickly finds that net is both very porous and weak.

With the North American economies on the rebound, particularly south of the border, people are once again returning to Manitoulin Island and bringing with them some very welcome economic benefits

Even those whose livelihoods do not seem to be directly connected with the tourism industry benefit greatly, if indirectly, from those tourism dollars. The tax income from recreational properties and commercial businesses that depend on the tourism dollar help to offset the property taxes paid by local residents, their annual boost to the Island's population makes possible services that communities our size would never be able to sustain (to the satisfaction of government bean counters at least). Those services, particularly in health, play a large role in allowing residents to stay in their homes and communities rather than having to move to larger centres.

With the boost to the local economy provided by tourism dollars, grocery stores, service stations, and hardware stores are there when we need them, most staying in business all year round.

So a very heartfelt "thank you" goes out to our summer visitors, both tourist and resident, for helping to make Manitoulin Island a better place for all of us to live, work and play. We look forward to your return next season and we encourage you to bring your friends and family so they too can discover this jewel we call home.

Eagle feather presented by community to a very brave young man

AUNDECK OMNI KANING-For most of the five years since the accident that left Gabe Abotossaway paralyzed from the neck down, he has been laying in his bed-mostly just waiting to die. That's waiting, not wanting, even though much of those years were spent in excruciating pain. But despite the normal prognosis for people with his kind of injuries, despite the statistical odds, Gabe has survived.

But it hasn't been easy.

Many people believe that when a person is paralyzed by such an accident, unable to use their limbs, that everything is numb, a blank. Not so. There may not be any bodily control, but Gabe can assure you, there is plenty of pain.

It's easy to succumb to depression if you are locked in a prison made up of your own body. Your life is caught in stasis, largely unchanged from day-to-day while your friends move on with their lives, go to school, start careers, and begin to raise families of their own.

But Gabe is an engaging young man and while he still wrestles with the mental challenges of his situation he has met those challenges and has his eyes focussed on the future. He does have some important help in meeting his challenges, every couple of weeks a social worker comes to visit to assist him with building the mental tools he needs to cope and he has a very supportive family.

During the annual Aundeck Omni Kaning (AOK) Traditional Powwow, Gabe was presented with an eagle feather by his community. Chief Patsy Corbiere referenced Gabe's bravery during that presentation.

'He has a very special kind of courage, noted Chief Corbiere. "The community wanted to present him with the eagle feather and to let him know that we are behind him and his family."

"I wasn't expecting it," said Gabe of the presentation, "I actually didn't know they were going to do that."

This was actually the fourth eagle feather that Gabe has been gifted with since his accident and he said that he has been tremendously honoured to receive each and every one.

For those who don't know the significance of an eagle feather, it is usually referenced as the highest honour that can be bestowed upon an individual, the symbolic embodiment of the teachings of the Seven

Grandfathers and more. Those teachings are love, respect, bravery, honesty, humility, wisdom and truth. But the eagle feather also stretches from the head to the heart, a pathway along which the wisdom of those teachings travel to provide guidance and support to an individual as they make their way through life's trials and challenges. That is why it is so often given to those who are embarking on an important undertaking, why an eagle feather is so often given to those in the community who are becoming leaders—or so the elders have told me.

The eagle feathers, therefore, do not only

recognize bravery and great deeds, but act also as guides for following a good path.

Gabe has spent a fair bit of time over the past half decade playing video games, engaging his X-Box in virtual worlds and communities where his physical challenges are invisible. But after five years of basically just putting in time, Gabe is now making plans for the future.

"I am thinking about starting up a small business," he said. "Maybe an Internet café and gift store," his mother supplies, although the idea was one he came up with on his own.

Thanks to technology and some innovative interfaces, Gabe is able to manipulate the computer himself, so an online store will actually be well within his reach. He has some savings that he can invest in the venture and he said he is excited about exploring the possibilities.

But despite the connectivity the computer and Internet can provide, Gabe still finds himself isolated and well, frankly, lonely. It is hard, if not impossible, to imagine the impact that the isolation of quadriplegic paralysis has on a young man who was, and still is, so gregarious.

Asked if he had one message he would like to get out there, he doesn't hesitate, not so surprising for a guy with a lot of time to think about things.

"I am still me," he says with a steady gaze. "My mind is still here. I am still the same person, just a little different on the outside." Gabe said he would like to get more visitors. "Just drop on by," he says. His mother Beverly interjects "maybe call first." Mothers, what are you going to do? She is concerned that Gabe still has some bad days. Gabe doesn't seem to be as worried about that.

It is easy to understand why Gabe's friends might have a hard time making that call, or knocking on the door. It wasn't that easy for The Expositor, jaded veteran journalist and all that, to work up the courage to make the call. Questions and insecurities stand before you, self-doubt slowing your hand as it reaches for the telephone. 'How do I act? What do I say? What if I say the wrong thing?" these thoughts beset us, even when the person is essentially a stranger, let alone a friend we grew up with and still care about. So putting off making the call becomes the path of least resistance and time goes on, making that chasm of the unknown even deeper and adding in a gulf of guilt for not having called sooner, or stopped by. Our lives go on and thoughts fade

We know in our hearts that isn't right but summoning the courage seems to become more difficult with each passing day, and so the years grow.

Perhaps we could all use our own eagle feather, something to help us to build that pathway from our hearts to our minds that will allow us to muster the courage needed to pick up the phone and make that call.

Cruisers' Net guest speaker series explores the Children of Hope charity work

The award was something Ms. Goodyear downplayed somewhat in giving her presentation, but knowing a bit about the MSM helps put the scale of the work she and her compatriots have accomplished into perspective.

Meritorious Service Decorations (Civil Division) are presented to outstanding Canadians through the office of the Governor General "to recognize remarkable contributions in many different fields of endeavour, from advocacy initiatives and health care services, to research and humanitarian efforts.'

es," she recalled. On the one trip a number of the sandwiches became infested with ants. The clinics start at 7 am in the morning and the team sets out for the clinic at 5:30 in the morning. So great is the need for medical services that there are long lines of patients waiting to be seen.

Noontime came and there were still people waiting outside," she recalled. "About half of the sandwiches had ants, but about half didn't. We asked ourselves 'what are we going to do with the ones with all the ants'." One of their local advisors suggested they just leave them outside.

They divided the sandwiches in half and gave them to the people outside. "I gave half a sandwich to a young boy about 21-22 (all things are relative)," she said. "He split it into four and gave three of the pieces to the people around him—I froze. Here was one of the poorest of the poor giving to another poor person."

This was a theme she saw repeated constantly, every-where she turned in the country. "The children in the orphanage are fortunate, they receive meals every day," she said. "As they walked down a pathway separated from the outside by a fence, you could see them passing food to the children outside." The children inside the orphanage knew that they would get another opportunity to eat, unlike the children outside the walls. On another occasion she brought shoes for a young child, the shoes turned out to be too large for his small feet. "Do you think my friend could have them?" the child asked. "I said 'of course,' who am I to say no?" she said. "He will eventually get shoes, but his friend outside might only get to eat once a day and will remain barefoot. Most of the work being done by COHH is focussed on providing education and a better future for the children they work with. "We don't want them to be dependent on us." she said. The organization refurbishes laptops for the school and accepts donations of those that are no more than five-years-old. "Over 98 percent of our funds go to our programs," she said. "We are all volunteers. There are no paid staff." In an odd quirk of the system, however, the organization actually has to spend some funding, one dollar out of \$34, on administration in order to be able to maintain its charitable status. It takes about \$408 a year to sponsor one child in school, but smaller donations are gratefully accepted. Each donation over \$20 receives a tax receipt. "I really have a passion for people in Haiti," said Ms. Goodyear, who first visited that country in 1998 in order to assist in medical clinics and work in an orphanage. While she was there, Ms. Goodyear was struck by the immense need she saw all around her. Over the past 18 years she has been in a community about 15 miles north of the city of Port Au Prince. "In 2002 I took on the role of Canadian Coordinator of the Children of Hope Haiti (COHH).' Together with her four other committee members, Ms. Goodyear has taken on the challenge of helping to raise the next generation of Haitian leaders. "Children are Haiti's greatest resource," she said.

Over the intervening 12 years, COHH has continued to

develop, grow and expand to the present day, where the organization is involved in numerous projects including providing goats for rural families, distributing rice and beans and lanterns in tent cities, providing medical assistance in the form of clinics and family medical packs throughout various communities, working with sponsored schools, working in an orphanage, preparing land and assembling of two soccer fields in 2011 and a playground completed in January 2013.The mission statement of the organization is to meet the essential needs of the impoverished children of Haiti-"our goal is to provide physical, educational and emotional care for every child so that each one will become a responsible and productive citizen of Haiti."

Ms. Goodyear's dedication to the people, and especially the children, of Haiti might be best understood when she begins to talk about a typical trip to the village, an arduous journey that involves packing medical supplies and food up a steep mountain pathway through an arid countryside. The group has found that apple boxes (two 50-pound containers) loaded into hockey bags make great reusable packs for carrying the supplies—but they are not insect proof.

"We have to bring our own food, and because there is no refrigeration we bring peanut butter and jelly sandwich-

Seniors Information Fair hosted by Senior's Drop-in and OACAO held in Gore Bay

by Betty Bardswich GORE BAY—The Gore Bay Seniors Drop-In Centre teamed up with the Older Adult Centres' Association of Ontario (OACAO) September 1 to host an information fair at the town's community hall.

Welcomed by senior volunteer Lou Addison and Gore Bay Mayor Ron Lane, the event was held to provide information for senior adults concerning health, financial matters, aging safely and Crimestoppers.

OACAO Executive Director Sue Hesjedhl provided information on what the organization is all about and what it can do for seniors.

"Eight different communities are represented here today," she said. "We hold four of these seminars each year and OACAO board members are from all over Ontario. We are the voice of older adults and represent 200,000 adults throughout Ontario in eight regions across the province."

The first guest speaker at the information fair was Jocelyn Lalonde representing the Ministry of Finance with information titled 'Get your Money!' He began his presentation by speaking about Ontario Tax Credits. "There are a lot of tax credits and services for adults,' he told the audience. "Know the programs and how to apply for them. Most are income-based and are administered by the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). Fill out the forms and add Ontario forms to your main income tax form. There are benefits for everyone, for seniors and for seniors with disabilities. There is the Ontario Trillium Benefit and energy and tax credits such as the Ontario Sales Tax Benefit and the Ontario Energy Tax Credit to reduce the high cost of energy. There are medical expenses and a guide for that aspect can be ordered from the CRA.

Mr. Lalonde also spoke about the Tax Free Savings Account (TFSA) which does not affect one's income tax credits and the Registered Retirement Savings Plan which raises income and is therefore taxed on that income. As well, there are healthy homes credits for modifications, he

explained, that make a home safer such as stair lifts, grab bars, changing flooring to non-slippery products, raised toilets and walk-in tubs and showers as well as medical expenses such as canes and wheelchairs. A caregiver can also apply for these credits. There is a Homeowners Property Tax Grant of up to \$500 for seniors to help with the cost of property taxes and the Ontario Guaranteed Annual Income System and Drug Benefit Plan. Mr. Lalonde also talked about the Disability Tax Credit for which a person has to have a severe disability and the form for this saving must be completed by a physician and is usually good for five years. Josee Milijours was the next guest speaker with a topic titled 'Aging Safely in the New Millennium' and represented Elder Abuse Ontario, which is situated in Toronto but has offices in Sudbury and Thunder Bay. Elder abuse can take many

forms including financial, physical, sexual, psychological abuse or neglect. The organization was set up in 1992, but more money was put towards elder abuse in 2002 so that there would be more public education and the hiring of a Service Coordinator. Support people and volunteers who work with seniors can access The Tea and Talk Tool Kit to learn how to facilitate elder care and stop abuse. The Ontario association also works closely with ACE, the Advocacy Centre for the Elderly which is a legal clinic for low income seniors. The 10th anniversary of the worldwide Elder Abuse Awareness Day was held June 15.

The final speaker for the day was Deborah Rousseau, representing Crime Stoppers. In fighting crime, Ms. Rousseau said, "Finger printing, DNA and Crime Stoppers are three of the most important things we have." She went on to say that the organization's board of directors is comprised of 22 volunteers and it is not funded by the government, but rather relies on monies from the public, fundraising events and grants.

"We never take your name or phone number,' Ms. Rousseau added, "and there is no caller ID. A person will answer the phone 24/7 and will not take personal information. It is 100 percent completely anony mous. The reward is awarded through a third person." Crime Stoppers has been in Sudbury and area for 29 years and tips can be sent online or through texting. Several exhibitors were present for the information fair including Aging at Transportation, Home Alzheimer Society Sudbury-Manitoulin, Healthy Sciences North-Senior Mental Health Program, Manitoulin-North Shore Victim Services, Elder Abuse Ontario, Keep Sharp, the Canadian Red Cross, the **OPP**, Sudbury and District Health Unit, the Victoria Order of Nurses, Home Instead Senior Care, Robertson's IDA Drug Store and the Northeastern Manitoulin Family Health Team. The event was sponsored by the Ontario Seniors Sec-






While the jackpot will never get as big as the one in Newfoundland, upwards of \$50,000 cash prizes can be won.

Mr. Marion said that the library needs to update to a new system before the three remaining computers fail.

"To make matters worse, our server is nine years-old and, in my opinion, could fail any time," continued Mr. Marion. "When that happens, we will be immediately reduced to using just one computer at a time. This is just one more problem to add to the list. These small projects, which are not difficult to handle individually, have been allowed to pile up. For example, the printer for our microfilm reader no longer works, the library could use new carpets and the lease on our photocopier is up. We need to start engaging with our capital projects and dealing with them before our service becomes seriously impacted."

Over the next few years the province will be reducing funding for public libraries and especially grants, Mr. Marion explained. "Many of our services are paid for by the province." He said this reduction could mean the loss of magazine subscriptions and access to e-books.

"If the public wants to maintain the current level of library service, we will need the necessary funds to maintain our equipment, maintain our collections and pay our staff," he said.

Mr. Marion said he has met with town staff to discuss the need for more funding and plans on making a deputation to council.

"I don't have staff to run senior or children's programs," Mr. Marion told The Expositor. "Our staff have no benefits or sick days, which is a problem as well. I am also looking for sufficient funds to complete pressing capital projects and maintain services."

The Little Current Public Library, Billings Public Library, Central Manitoulin libraries (Providence Bay and Mindemoya) and Assiginack Public Library are all operated by boards. Budgets are created by the boards and operating funds are approved and provided by the municipalities, and part of those funds are used to pay staff. All four municipalities also maintain the municipal buildings that house the libraries.

According to the Ministry of Tourism Culture and Sport's 2014 Ontario Public Library Statistics the local operating funding for area municipalities include \$14,000 for Billings, \$59,835 for the Northeast Town, \$68,744 for Central Manitoulin (between the two libraries) and \$35,600 for Assiginack.

The Expositor called local municipalities to find out the municipal contributions to the libraries for 2016: Billings, \$15,000; Central Manitoulin (between the two libraries), \$78,902; Assiginack, \$36,685; and the Northeast Town \$64,937.

Northeast Town Mayor Al MacNevin said that Mr. Marion's conversation with town staff was "the first that I have heard that the library was in need of more funding."

"I will be attending the October library board meeting to find out more information about what the library needs," said Mr. MacNevin. "Last year they (the library board) asked for a six percent increase to their budget and council gave it to them. Their operating fund from the municipality was \$64,000, with an additional \$20,000 for the building—and we replaced the roof. I'm not sure where it is coming from that we don't want to support the

FASD event highlighted prevention with music and fun

are a group of entirely preventable birth defects that continue to wreak havoc in society and although the battle against Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) has made a lot of progress, there is still a long way to go. The FASD Awareness Day entertainment showcase hosted at Thunderbird Park by the Wikwemikong Health Centre's Children's Services (Naandwechige-Gamig)

harnessed the musical talents of a number of Anishinabe rising stars to shine light on the issue in an innovative September 9 event.

The free event followed the unveiling of a new high visibility FASD billboard on Wikwemikong Way whose winning design entry was created by Kira Dowdall. Ms. Dowdall used what she has learned about FASD during her high school years from presentations at conferences and displays to graphically depict what she thought being afflicted with FASD must be like. Ms. Dowdall is currently studying animation at Sault College. Runner ups in the billboard contest were Alissa Flamand, who came second. and Gordon Wemigwans, who came third.

The information campaign focusses on the importance of complete abstinence from alcohol in the critical first three weeks of conception, which presents some key challenges.

"If you are trying to become pregnant, it is really important," said Judy Black, program manager of the Children's Services Department. But it is also important to steer clear of alcohol throughout the pregnancy and beyond, which runs counter to the old medical advice that many health professionals grew up on. "It's true, we used to advise half a beer a day," she noted, but that advice has proven to be complete anathema with what is known about FASD today.

The FASD Awareness Day Entertainment Showcase was coordinated by FASD events coordinator Shanna Peltier, for whom the event was the culmination of her position. Throughout the evening, which ran from 6 pm to 9 pm, speakers such as Wikwemikong Health Centre director Mary Jo Wabuno, Amanda Mishibinijima, FASD worker in the high school and Anna Kaboni, Healthy Babies, Healthy Children Worker delivered messages between musical acts. The acts themselves were outstanding, beginning with Brittany Manitowabi, who was later joined onstage by JW Stevens. Pat Peltier brought his musical stylings accompanied by friends and Leah Belle closed out the individual performances. Headliners were the incredible Metis jigging



Falun Gong activists visit Manitoulin

by Michael Erskine LITTLE CURRENT—It sounds like something out of a futuristic sci-fi horror flick, an oppressive government uses an overblown pretext to imprison a large number of its population and then harvests their organs for use in transplants for fun and profit. It is simply too outrageous to ity coincided with increased prosecution and imprisonment of Falun Gong practitioners in China.

Two years ago, Anne-Tamara Lorre, the Canadian representative on human rights to the United Nations, raised the issue of organ harvesting in China saying, "We remain connificant source of revenue. The latest edition of the

Kilgour-Matas-Gutman reports estimate 60,000 to 100,000 transplants a year. None of these allegations have been proven in court, either domestically or through UN or US investigations. Chinese investigations have universally refuted the allegations. ed the practice with some tolerance, and even some support during the early 1980s and 90s.

A large number of the proffered reasons for the Chinese government's antipathy to Falun Gong do not stand up well to close scrutiny, but students of the historical methodology of the Chinese Communist

be believed, isn't it? Not according to a small group of determined Falun Gong activists who held an information protest in front of the Little Current Cenotaph September 7.

For Canadian citizens Hongyan Lu and her husband Jay Brauneisen the issue is deeply personal. "At the end of June I learned that my mother, who is a Falun Dafa practitioner in Shijiazhuang City, China, had been arrested along with nine other practitioners," said Ms. Lu. Her mother, she explained, had been visiting friends who are fellow travellers on the Falun Gong path when she was picked up in the sweep.

"When my mother was first abducted we were told she refused to offer up her identity," said Ms. Lu. "This is a strategy used to protect relatives and friends, but also made it much more difficult for us to find her." Even though Ms. Lu has relatives in the Chinese justice system (her uncle is a judge and a cousin is a police officer) she spent many worwondering weeks ried about her mother's fate. "They both tried and failed to gain access to my moth-er," she said. "This situation was scary for me as I feared she would disappear be killed for her and organs."

cerned that Falun Gong practitioners and other religious worshippers in China face persecution and reports that organ transplants take place without free and informed consent of the donor are troubling."

The Chinese government and medical establishment categorically deny the allegations of forced organ donation or that imprisoned donors have been targeted without informed consent. Following the release of the Kilgour report, China declared they abided by World Health Organization principles that prohibit the sale of human organs without written consent from donors and denounced the report.

The Chinese government maintains that 90 percent of China's organ transplant sources come from executed prisoners, with a rise in organ availability surging even as the number of executions has dropped 10 percent annually since 2002 and the number of potential executions falls far short of the number of transplants taking place. Only 130 people signed up to donate their organs between 2003 and 2009. Ms. Lu noted that cultural mores in China still run strongly against organ donation despite generations of government effort to eradicate superstition and religious opposition. "The body is not supposed to be desecrated," she noted. That ongoing cultural taboo, deeply engrained in the Chinese psyche, is a lens that also calls into question government assurances that all organs are willingly and freely given. There is a lot riding on the transplant industry. A heart or a liver can cost up to \$160,000, according to state-run hospital websites, making transplants a sigSo what is Falun Gong (Falun Dafa et al)? Party, particularly taking into account the Maoist

Based on an ancient Chinese spiritual practice combining meditation, exercise (think Tai Chi) and a moral philosophy that emphasizes truthfulness, compassion and forbearance and a detachment from attachments to the material world to achieve spiritual enlightenment. It also has a strong "moralistic" bent and some controversial views on race. Another odd aspect of the religion is the assertion by its leader that aliens have invaded the earth and are using television and technology to subvert the human race

into account the Maoist assertion that "China is governed through the mouth of the gun," know that the party is completely antithetical to any other potential power base rising to challenge the supremacy of the party (think Tianan-men Square). That historically has been reason enough to come down hard. With 10,000 members of Falun Gong coming together to protest the beginnings of a crackdown, that tendency would only have been exacerbated. With Canada seeking a

closer rapprochement with the Chinese economically, the human rights aspects of the Falun Gong allegations are likely to prove problematic for the Canadian government as activists such as Ms. Lu and her family seek to shine a light on the less savoury aspects of who Canada is seeking to do more business withand perhaps bring about pressure on China to loosen its grip on its media and religious freedoms. History, however, does not appear to be on their side.

First UCCM Anishinaabe Police Safety Symposium tacks proactive

M'CHIGEENG—"Slam it!" isn't the usual advice one might expect on how to deal with your \$14 drink when you need to go to the bathroom, but when Julie Lalonde of Draw the Line points out that most assaults come from someone known to the victim and the other options available (ie taking it with you into a gnarly bar bathroom), that simple option has kind of a practical ring to it.

Ms. Lalonde ('Engaging Ontarians in a dialogue about sexual violence') was one of three presenters who addressed the day-long UCCM Anishinaabe Police Safety Symposium (Naag-Doo-Wend-Debaah) on September 15, bringing practical advice and strategies on how to deal with the issues that commonly face people in the community. The other two presenters were social media maven Chris Vollum, who presented on Social Media Fitness, and Nookmis Roberta Oshkabewisens of PACT ('Preventing and Reducing the Trafficking of Women and Girls Through Community Planning').

Mr. Vollum concentrated on the positive uses of social media and how students and youth can use the various media to enhance their career potential and further their own goals in life, with the negative potential more inferred that explicit.

The grandmother presentation from Ms. Oshkabewisen dealt with a wide

range issues including Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls and the issue of human trafficking and how communities can come together help prevent trafficking and the forcing of young women into the sex

trade. "We are looking at increasing the partnerships in the communities," said Daughness organizer the UCCM Migwans, Anishinaabe Police social navigator (a civilian position with the UCCM). She noted that the symposium was aimed at "the commu-nity members in general" and that the topics chosen were based on the incidents and issues that police on the ground in the community see most often. Sexual assault ranks well near the top of those complaints.

"We need to get people educated," noted UCCM Anishnaabe Police Community Services Officer Sr.

photo by Michael Erskine Constable Murray Still. The officer had heard Mr. Vollum speak at a conference he attended earlier this year and liked what he heard. "He provides practical advice on how to use social media safely and sensibly.

What might make the "slam it" advice on drinks seem counterintuitive is the prevalence of alcohol in nearly all police calls for service or investigations. "It is probably around 96 percent," admitted Constable Still. But the approach of the speakers at the symposium isn't on stopping people from the activities that they engage in, but rather focussed on harm reduction with practical advice.

That might mean finishing your drink before you head to the bathroom, but it also means knowing your limit and staying well within those lines.

"We have all seen the girl

at 2 am who always seems to have lost her shoes and can't find her friends," said Ms. Lalonde. "She is the one sitting on the sidewalk crying with one shoe in her hand." Predators know how to spot the vulnerable, noted Ms. Lalonde and will swoop in to take advantage.

Much of Ms. Lalonde's focus in her presentations was on enlisting her audience in making unacceptable to take advantage of someone who is under the influence of drugs or alcohol. "That's not how we party at my place," she recites as a mantra.

She also noted that society gives far too much leeway, enabling behaviour that normally would never condone. "'He's a really great guy, but he turns creepy when he is drinking' is something you hear a lot," she said. "No, he's not creepy at parties, he's abusive to women. He just controls it better when he is sober."

She exhorted her audience to reflect on their own social circles. "If you would not want your sister hanging out with someone because of their attitude," she said. "why would you be friends with them?"

The UCCM Anishnaabe Police intend to make the safety symposium an annual event and expressed gratitude to the community host M'Chigeeng First Nation, cultural supports and police leadership that helped make the symposium possible, including Sgt. Heather Debassige, the presenters and the symposium's community part-ners, Manitoulin Family Resources, UCCMM Justice Program, Suicide Prevention Assist facilitators, M'Chigeeng Hub Centre, Manitoulin North Shore Victim Services, Lil Sisters, Kina Gbezhgomi Child and Family Services, Nooj-mowin Teg Health Centre, M'Chigeeng Mental Health, Probation and Parole,

Endaagdawaab-Jig Civilian Oversight Committee. Dreamer's Cove and the Ojibwe Cultural Foundation. Each of the community partners had a booth set up at the symposium.

The coordinating team for the symposium consisted of Ms. Migwans, Ann Ziegler and Sr. Constable Still.

...continued from page 3 that provision was grabbed up to support/alleviate one of the problems posed by amalgamations. Difficulty of reaching meetings so far away. Live streaming of meetings is commonplace, even in our board and the entire OPSBA world."

Although the object of the motions was not directly identified, Mr. Killens said that he was approached by members of the audience suggesting it was clearly aimed at him.

"There was a poll vote taken at my request and both motions were defeated by a five to four vote," said Mr. Killens. "Results of poll vote by name are available through board secretary, Mrs. H. Thirkill."

Mr. Killens made a spirited defence of trustees' ability to attend meetings by teleconference, particularly those coming from remote regions of the board, Manitoulin chief among them. He noted that First Nation trustee Ms. Fox also spoke in opposition to the motion, noting that she should not be forced to travel into a meeting if she was suffering from a cold.

Although the motions were defeated, Mr. Killens said that he was not celebrating it as a victory. "It makes me sad that it has to go this far," he said. "This should not be happening."

Mr. Killens, who had already been barred from certain in camera meetings of the board for nearly a year, said that he felt the motions were directed largely towards him. Mr. Killens spends part of the winter in Florida each year and the motion to require in person attendance at meetings would have impacted him significantly.

"Sure, I go to Florida for three months during the winter, but I have never missed a meeting," said Mr. Killens, referencing his status as a snowbird. He added that his telephone and email keep him in touch constituents with his throughout the winter months and insists that his trip south in no way hinders his effectiveness as a trustee.

But the trustee did not tackle the issue on a personal or out of country position, focussing instead on the general impact such a policy change would have on trustees from regions outside the City of Sudbury. The ability to teleconference into RDSB meetings, he asserts, was clearly put in place to alleviate some of the negative impacts of the amalgamation of the Manitoulin School Board into the RDSB.

"This may have been aimed at me, I can't say, but it isn't about me," he said. "This is about the people who elect a trustee to represent them being able to have representation from the person they elected at the board meetings, even if the weather doesn't cooperate."

As to the allegations against him that led to his exclusion from in camera meetings, Mr. Killens shared a letter from the Ontario Ombudsman.

That letter read, in part, "You complained that your removal from certain in camera discussions should have been dealt with under the code of conduct enforcement pro-

gency.

Non-urgent patient transfers are not new to the people of Manitoulin, as the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services board has offered this service from both Manitoulin Health Centre sites for over three years, thanks to a pilot project that saw retired ambulances refitted to become non-urgent transfer patient vehicles.

Fern Dominelli, DSB CAO, is pleased with the NE LHIN's announcement.

"It's great news," he told The Expositor. "We're looking forward to a permanent model, not just six-month extensions to the pilot project."

"If we're interested, we'll likely apply," he said, noting that the DSB would have to review the request for propos-

visions of the Education Act and the School Board policy." That letter noted that the Ombudsman's investigation had determined that "The agenda for the April 14, 2015 special in camera meeting did not indicate that a notice of a motion respecting you or your conduct would be considered."

The letter went on to say that "the chair told our office that the April 14, 2015 motion was prompted by your response to a confidential email sent to all trustees by the Director of Education a few days before the meeting. The chair stated that this response raised a red flag for her given past incidents in which you were involved. The chair therefore brought her concerns to the attention of board members at the April 14, 2015 meeting. She stated that, in bringing the motion, she was trying to protect the school board.

"With respect to the timing of the motion, the chair told our Office that the motion was brought on April 14, 2015, because there would not have been time to

address it under the code of conduct, as time was of the essence. She stated that no board members at the meeting suggested that the motion be deferred or reconsidered."

From the Ombudsman's Office letter, it is clear that the board's own procedures were not followed.

Further, when efforts were made to rectify matters, errors continued to dog the issue.

"In an effort to restore procedural fairness in the circumstances, you were given the opportunity to speak in camera to the April 14, 2015 motion during the July 5, 2016 meeting of the board of trustees,' noted the letter. "The motion was then voted on in open session by the board of trustees. The chair acknowledged to our office that the premature adjournment of the July 5, 2016 regular meeting, which resulted in no members of the public being

present for the vote, was an error."

In the final analysis, the Ombudsman's response was somewhat less than inspiring: "Our office has encouraged the school board to be vigilant in adhering to its obligations under the Act and its own policies and procedures."

Mr. Killens has a number of complaints and challenges to the board's actions remaining, including harassment, which is involving a dispute as to whether trustees are in point of fact "employees" of the board. Mr. Killens maintains that he should be considered as such and therefore protected from harassment the same as any other employee, the board, he maintains, does not accept that definition. That challenge has now drawn in the Canadian Revenue Agency, noted Mr. Killens.



als when it becomes available.

"We've been waiting for this (announcement) for awhile," the CAO added. "It's about right time, right place, right service," Mr. Dominelli said of the service, adding that the delivery of a patient should be based on that patient's condition, "not expediency."

The initial routes to be phased in were selected based on a number of factors including the readiness of the area providers. Starting in early 2017, dedicated multi-patient vehicles will operate to and from both Timmins and District Hospital and Health Sciences North in Sudbury, including: Elliot Lake to Espanola to Sudbury (165 km); Mindemoya to Little Current to Espanola to Sudbury (163 km); Kapuskasing to Smooth Rock Falls to Timmins (166 km); and Cochrane to Iroquois Falls to Matheson to Timmins (224 km).

The model is being put in place by the NE LHIN'S Non-Urgent Patient Transportation Leadership Working Group, which has worked to analyze the scope of the challenge, test pilots, like the DSB's, and develop a new model.

Next steps will focus on finalizing the plan between the LHIN, participating hospitals and Emergency Medical Services (EMS); selecting a transportation service provider; designing and establishing dedicated nonurgent patient waiting areas in Timmins and Sudbury; and setting up the central non-urgent patient transportation dispatch function for the region.

Northeast Town Council Notes

Monitoring report

The Northeast Town council reviewed the annual 2015 monitoring and operations report for the Northeast Town waste disposal site.

Town CAO Dave Williamson was pleased to point out to council that the report states the landfill's life span of 40 years has been expanded to 70 years due to diversion practices such as recycling.

Mr. Williamson also reviewed with council recommendations in the report for 2017. One recommendation was for the Smith property to be designated as a continuation zone for the landfill. "That was the town's intention when they purchased the Smith property and we are going through the process with the Ministry of Environment and will come to council for the zoning change in the near future," said Mr. Williamson. The other recommendation was to change the monthly sampling to quarterly.

Councillor Laurie Cook said that she would like to see council encourage more diversion programs. Councillor Michael Erskine agreed and inquired about composting.

Mr. Williamson explained that composting has been explored in the past at council's request but that the set up costs would be very high. He noted that town staff have been speaking with an individual in the private sector who is interested in picking up compost.

Council approved the report as presented.

Campground taxation

Council carried a motion forwarded to council from Renfrew-Nipissing-Pembroke MP Cheryl Gallant regarding small campgrounds that could be disqualified from the small business tax deduction because they have less than five year-round employees.

Prostate cancer

The Northeast Town council reviewed a letter from Prostate Cancer Canada requesting that the municipality carry a motion supporting Prostate Cancer Awareness Month.

"One in eight Canadian men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in their lifetime, which makes for 24,000 expected new cases in 2015," explains the letter to council. "Early detection saves lives. When detected early, the survival rate for prostate cancer is over 90 percent."

Council carried a motion declaring September Prostate Cancer Awareness Month.

pality currently takes three percent of the prize board of lotteries in the Northeast Town. The Little Current Lions Club and Little Current Legion are working on a lottery that would have a \$50,000 prize board and which would make the Northeast Town's three percent take \$15,000. Mr. Williamson recommended council amend the three percent take to include a cap of \$500, as to not disadvantage local groups.

Councillor Erskine said he agreed with the recommendation, as the money raised from most of the lotteries in the municipality go back into the community.

A motion was carried to amend the three percent municipal take on lottery prize boards to include a \$500 cap.

Planning board

Mr. Williamson and Mayor Al MacNevin discussed how staff would be working with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) in the upcoming weeks to develop a transition plan for the Northeast Town withdrawing from the Manitoulin Planning Board and establishing its own planning authority. They noted that they are still waiting on having the Northeast Town's Official Plan approved, but that it has gone to the minister's office for final review and approval.

Accounts receivable

Treasurer Sheryl Wilkin went over the accounts receivable with council. She noted that for water/sewer there was \$34,464.09 made in payments. She added that there were 24 accounts over \$400, five of which had been disconnected, two were due to penalty applied for August, eight account holders had made payment arrangements and nine account holders had received disconnection notices.

For taxes, Ms. Wilkin said there were \$375,169.88 made in payments, with the next due date September 30.



Grader repairs

There was much discussion on the topic of needed repairs to the Assiginack grader, which is currently out of commission. The estimated cost of repairs is \$60.000.

asked if that When amount will add years on to its life, roads superintendent Ron Cooper replied that no, it would just put them back at square one. He also noted that Assiginack operators put approximately 500 hours on the grader each year. The municipality is currently renting a grader and using it as minimally as possible to keep costs down.

"If we apply to Canada 150 and get 50 percent, let's face it, we won't be paying for it," Mayor Paul Moffatt said. "This municipality can't afford it.

Councillor Fields suggested using the Canada 150 Fund to apply for acoustic tiles for the arena.

CAO Alton Hobbs explained that as the community survey looking for suggestions for Canada 150 Fund applications did not include acoustic tiles, it probably isn't a good idea, with Councillor Fields agreeing.

Councillor Brenda Reid said she doubted the municipality could afford to apply for anything.

"It's like buying something on sale when you don't really need it," Councillor Fields added.

"We don't have the money, we can't bolster \$300,000,' the mayor said, referring to the Burns Wharf restoration. "We're still paying for ment: general, \$216,782.61; for members of council. payroll, \$49,807.66.

Bylaws

Council passed Bylaw 16-11 to exit the tax capping program for the commercial, industrial and multiresidential property classes for the year 2016 and for subsequent taxation years.

The council also passed Bylaw 16-12 regarding remuneration and expenses

Mr. Hobbs explained that there is no change to the remuneration, it is simply a 'dumbed down' version of the bylaw for the benefit of the government.

The mayor still receives a flat rate of \$750 per month with council members receiving \$450 a month.

Breakfasts can be such a disjointed affair. You either have time to sit and eat, or you wake up a bit late with no time and you are out the door running on empty. I believe breakfast is the most important meal of the day, it fires up your brain and stops binge, junk eating throughout the day. I have found two recipes that are quick and will make you feel much better if you are running out that door!

Creamy Overnight Oats

Coconut-derived ingredients are rich in lauric acid, a medium-chain fatty acid that may have antibacterial properties. Coconut meat and coconut products are also rich in antioxidants, which may have a protective effect against aging and disease. I am a big fan of anything to do with coconut, I use it whenever I can. The recipe calls for light coconut milk but I used the full fat, which made it more creamy. I upped the texture by adding pumpkin seeds, sunflower seeds, and hemp seeds. A total of one cup, which adds more protein, will make you less hungry between breakfast and lunch.

1 can (400ml) light coconut milk, plus more if needed

- 1 large ripe banana
- 3 large Medjool dates, pitted
- Small pinch of fine sea salt 1 cup Loon Song oats
- 3 Tbsp chia seeds

1 cup of a mixture of sunflower, hemp, and pumpkin seeds (optional)

1. In a blender or magic bullet, combine the coconut milk, banana, pitted dates, and salt. Blend until smooth.

2. Pour the coconut milk mixture into a medium-size

food storage container with a lid.

3. Stir the oats, chia seeds and mixture of the other seeds into the coconut milk mixture until thoroughly combined. Cover and refrigerate overnight. The oat mixture will thicken and soften.

4. If the mixture is too thick, thin it out with a bit of coconut milk or almond or water.

5. Portion the oats into a bowl and add fresh fruit of your choice or put some in a small container and pack it with you for a later breakfast or snack.

Green-Orange Smoothie

This is perfect drink for an early morning start or take along for a mid-morning snack. The full fat coconut milk will make the drink even smoother.

1 (400ml) can light coconut milk, chilled 1 1/4 cups orange juice (the best kind) 1 cup baby spinach or kale 3 Tbsp avocado (I just put in half of a whole avocado) 1/2 tsp pure vanilla extract 4 or 5 large pitted Medjool dates, to taste 6 ice cubes, or as needed

1. In a blender or magic-bullet, combine all the ingredients and blend until smooth. **spinach and avocado will add nutrient power

***if your dates are dry soak them in boiling water for 20 minutes before making the smoothie
