## LCBO names three Island communities: Providence Bay, Wiiky, South Baymouth for convenience store beer and wine sales

MANITOULIN—The LCBO has recently released a list of 302 communities in Ontario that are welcome to participate in a request for proposal (RFP) process of bringing an LCBO convenience outlet to an existing retail business within their area, including three on Manitoulin Island.

A press release announcing the RFP describes it as being part of the Ford government's plan to "deliver more choice and convenience for consumers." Of the 302 communities listed, the LCBO plans to green-light roughly 200 outlets by the coming spring.

Manitoulin Island communities given the go-ahead to apply for an outlet are Providence Bay, South Baymouth and Wiikwemkoong.

"Personally, I don't mind because a lot of people are inquiring. We're not licenced here and are plan-

ning to get licenced and I will definitely speak with my business partner Vera," said Insesa Taibert, proprietor of the Huron Sands Motel and Restaurant in Providence Bay.

"I think for the people in Providence Bay, it would be good—or for the visitors and tourists. I just like when people get what they want; if we don't have something I feel bad."

The Expositor contacted Carl's Trading Post in South Baymouth to assess its interest in hosting an LCBO convenience outlet.

"I've got mixed views about that. I spent half my life pulling people out of ditches because of alcohol; I'm not a promoter of it," said Gary Brown, a co-owner of Carl's Trading Post. He acknowledged that it would boost business but that its location was curi-

Late priest served in community many years, described as prolific Canadian sex offender



WIKWEMKOONG—Jesuit Father George Epoch and Brother O'Meare sexually abused dozens of children when they were stationed in Wiikwemkoong and these crimes have formed the basis for a pending class action lawsuit filed on behalf of victims from that community.

"I want this to be as painless for these people as possible," said Michael Troy, an associate of Merchant Law Group LLP in British Columbia who is on the team representing the victims. He is joined by Chris Simoes, also of Merchant Law Group LLP but based in Toronto.

Father Epoch first served in Wiikwemkoong in 1960. He was seen as a literal Godsend by many in the community who viewed him as a kind, generous man who

worked to support families and especially children in the community.

His obituary also reflected that impression. Father Epoch died in Toronto on September 30, 1986 at the age of 66, some years before the first allegations of abuse emerged publicly. He is buried in Wiikwemkoong at the Holy Cross Mission cemetery.

The Epoch name became national news last summer when CBC News published a story about a class action launched against the Roman Catholic Arch-

MANITOULIN—After about 10 years of declining numbers, monarch butterflies on Manitoulin Island, and elsewhere in North America, were much more common in 2019.

Starting in mid-May, there were reports of northward flying monarchs being found along our southern shores from Misery Bay to Wiikwemkoong.

My wife Marilyn and I watched a few rather ragged and tired individuals arrive on shore at Providence Bay in mid-May. Within a few days of feeding on the sugary nectar of spring flowers, they would have mated and spread about the Island looking for young shoots of milkweed on which to lay their eggs. Once the eggs were laid, the adults died.

From June to early August, there were monarch caterpillars on milkweed in most parts of the Island. Some of these caterpillars may have turned into chrysalises and then adults, early enough to produce

a second generation of monarchs; however, in most cases, there is just one generation on Manitoulin.

The monarchs that arrived on the Island in the spring are not the ones that overwintered in Mexico but rather the grandchildren or great grandchildren of the overwintering population.

That is, two or three generations of monarchs are produced along the route from Mexico to Manitoulin, and in all cases, the adults die after living for about one month.

On August 31, we watched about 100 monarchs in a feeding frenzy in a patch of goldenrod alongside roads near Lonely Bay west of Providence Bay. These monarchs were feeding on nectar which they then turned into fats, their source of energy for the long flight south.

We captured 30 adults near Lonely Bay and placed

The issue of the transmission of Alberta crude oil to ports and refineries on Canada's Pacific and Atlantic regions is a complicated one that has drawn a great deal of emotional response from communities and provinces that

either vigorously support or equally vigorously oppose the initiative.

The people and the province of Alberta feel the prosperity of their province is at stake if more of their primary natural resource cannot be shipped and sold to refineries and consumers.

The province of Quebec has opposed the idea of an "energy east" pipeline that would traverse its territory. The province of British Columbia does not support a new westbound pipeline that would carry more product to the

coast. Many First Nations communities in British Columbia oppose any new pipeline going through their territories. Others support the project.

In addition, many Canadians oppose any expansion of the fossil fuel industry and feel that support for green energy initiatives is the only alternative to climate change and other natural concerns.

**If your party is successful and forms the next Government of Canada, what measures will it take, if any, to reconcile these competing interests?**

## Korea vet Red Butler honoured by War Pensioners

LITTLE CURRENT—At a recent War Pensioners of Canada (WPC) meeting, area members had the chance to honour one of their own, Korean War veteran Red Butler as a special member, recognizing his service to the Commonwealth.

WPC members Wayne Golden and Colin Pick shared with *The Expositor* that they felt that Mr. Butler has not received the recognition he most sorely deserved.

As has been reported previously by this newspaper, Mr. Butler was lucky to have survived the Korean War. In fact, so sure was his unit of his demise, a telegram had been sent to his loved ones announcing his death.

"There were about 28 of us on the outpost when we were overrun," Mr. Butler told *The Expositor* in a 2013 article. "I got caught between the lines."

Mr. Butler was part of the 2nd platoon A company of the 2nd Royal Canadian Regiment which fought to hold the 'Songkok' outpost from repeated Communist attacks. With only 28 men, Mr. Butler and the rest of the platoon managed to hold out for 10 hours against hundreds of Chinese attackers and thwart a major communist offensive.

"Mr. Butler had laid down covering fire from his Bren gun emplacement to allow his teammate on the gun to escape," *The Expositor* article states. "When the other soldier looked back, it was just in time to see several grenades explode in front of Mr. Butler's position."

"The grenades landed against the sandbags in front of me and I got blown back. The next day, when light broke and they pulled back, I made my

**Voting in the federal election has already begun**

Democracy isn't easy. Sometimes it just isn't fun having to weigh all of the options, paying attention to the many nuances of each candidate's campaign and their party's platform to come up with a decision on who to vote for—so some people opt to just give the whole thing a miss and don't bother to exercise their franchise.

So many of our ancestors paid for the right to vote with their life's blood, literally, that to eschew that right, especially for so frivolous a reason that it takes a little effort, seems like little short of a betrayal.

Much of the political advertising activity that is happening in the world today is aimed at disheartening voters—suppressing the vote of the economically and socially disenfranchised of society at a time when their actual enfranchisement, the right to vote, is the surest route to meeting the challenges of our society.

There are disagreements among the leading contenders in this election on how to solve those challenges. The Conservatives have their concepts, the Liberals theirs, the New Democrats have their own policies and paths to solutions, the newer Green and People's Party of Canada also have put forward detailed policy proposals. The challenge is not, as some might suggest, that there are no choices, but to find the choice that most clearly delineates your personal values.

If, at the end of the day you cannot decide on a candidate to support, you can reject your ballot. Although there is no formal declined ballot in federal elections, such as there are in Ontario where there were 31,000 such "none of the above" choices made two election cycles ago, your ballot will be listed as "spoiled." That is still a better message to send to the "powers that be" than the apathy of not turning up at the

polls.

Some will suggest strategic voting, and that is a valid consideration under the first past the post system we use to select our representatives, but whatever strategy one uses to select their ballot choice it is imperative to the health of the nation that our electors vote.

Youth, the poor, Indigenous and the marginalized tend not to vote, and that is why so many of the political parties might feel safe in offering little more than lip service to the issues impacting those communities. Shake that complacency by voting.

For those whose minds are already made up as to who to vote for there are already polling stations available. The advance poll on Manitoulin is located in Little Current at 28 Water Street and that office is open from 9 am to 9 pm Monday to Friday, from 9 am to 6 pm on Saturday and from noon to 4 pm on Sunday. (As an aside as of Monday, the polling station still needs three people for the Little Current site, so if you are over 16, breathing and have some time on your hands for a paid gig, call 866-271-6185 and press 1 to be connected.)

The official advance polls will open on Thanksgiving Weekend, October 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14, 9 am to 9 pm. Those polls will take place at the Central Manitoulin Town Hall in Mindemoya and the Gore Bay Town Hall, otherwise, you can avail yourself of the Little Current office until 6 pm on October 15.

Whomsoever you should decide to cast a ballot for in this election, take up the pencil in memory of those who took up arms to ensure your right and freedom to choose. Taken together, your vote truly does count.

**Government response leaves Island feeling like Rodney Dangerfield**

*We don't get no respect*

**To the Expositor:**

"I don't get no respect" – Rodney Dangerfield.  
Over the last two years, a group of concerned Manitoulin residents have worked hard hoping to get both public and municipal and provincial government support for reduction (or elimination) of pesticide use by public utilities and provincial ministries on Manitoulin Island.

We know we have public support based upon the hundreds of signatures people gave us for two petitions to the Ministry of the Environment. Our local MPP Michael Mantha carried these to Queen's Park and presented them to the Minister of the Environment of the day (there have been four incumbents in the last two years!). Ministerial responses can best be described as perfunctory, so aside from Mike Mantha's efforts, not much respect shown by the Ontario government!

Cockburn Island (just off the West End of Manitoulin) was in the news last week. Hydro One published a statutory notice announcing it was doing vegetation management on its rights of way on Cockburn, including spraying of an herbicide (triclopyr) after brush cutting. At least they had the political sensitivity to approach the main landowner on Cockburn, Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) in the spring to inform NCC that they wanted to do this work. NCC asked them to hold off because it was bird nesting season. A wise call in hindsight, because over the weekend, a scientific survey was published that found North America has lost three billion birds from the bird population since 1970. There are many causes speculated but certainly pesticide use is a major suspect. Remember what happened to peregrine falcons when DDT was

in broad use a few decades ago? We are strongly opposed to standard operating practices by organizations like Hydro One where pesticides have been incorporated into them. It is becoming clear, worldwide, that overuse of such products is having a negative impact on the world in which we all live. We don't think utilities and Ontario ministries are given us much respect, yet!

Support from individual Manitoulin councils to push back on this use has been a positive influence. As a group, we hope to meet with Manitoulin Municipal Association (MMA) in the near future to ask for support in the form of some island wide statement of position on pesticide use.

So why the Rodney Dangerfield reference? Over the weekend, news emerged that US Vice President Mike Pence visited Mackinac Island, just across the border from Cockburn and Manitoulin Islands and an island Manitoulin has a long association with. Mackinac is famous as a place where cars have been banned for a century, but this didn't deter the vice-president. He ordered up an eight-vehicle motorcade and did a "drive" across the island. The move was described by one person as 'sacrilege.'

I'm guessing Mackinac Islanders are feeling a little like Rodney Dangerfield this week! Let's hope our upper tiers of government, and public utilities, show our concerns about pesticide use a little more respect!

**Arthur John Reynolds  
'Rennie' Mastin**

This remarkable, talented international lawyer's roots are firmly entrenched on Manitoulin Island, his home base for his "growing up" years, and later during his professional years as well.

Hockey was his life in the early years, until he chose a different career path. He has spent many professional years working in Iran in international legal affairs and had additional projects in other Middle Eastern countries. He had a deep comprehension of their legal issues and requirements and any contracts that involved these Eastern countries were assigned to Rennie Mastin, LL.B. He leaves a legacy of these large Middle East contracts, the donation of the Debajehmujig Creation Centre, as well as the Mastin family's valuable antiques and war memorabilia. This assortment includes a gun collection amassed by his grandfather, John. These are all now housed in Ottawa in the 'John Reynolds Collection' at the Canada War Museum.

"My mother, Blossom (aka Katherine) Reynolds, of Irish stock, was born in Manitowaning in 1904. She was always interested in worldly activities. Her father, John, had run away from home at age 11 and had worked at any job he could find, including sailing Great Lake Freighters. Manitoulin was a gateway to the west, so John wound up on the first port after Owen Sound, Manitowaning. His first wife, Clara, and her baby died in childbirth. Second wife Catherine Glass is my Grandmother." Little Katherine Blossom would take flowers to the first boat that would arrive in Manitowaning each spring. The Easter Egg hunt that her mother Catherine began is still being held yearly in Manitowaning.

John always fancied himself as a shoe cobbler; he made good shoes, but he and Hugh Wright McLaughlin started a general store. Unfortunately, the business went bankrupt and the building burned down several times. It was replaced with a stone building which housed a successful grocery store, and several generations and decades later, the Debajehmujig Creation Centre. John was also Assiginack's reeve for a term.

After Katherine Blossom finished school at 15, she spent a year in Owen Sound with friends who boated provisions to Manitoulin. Toronto was next. She studied German to become a foreign correspondent and attended teachers' college (Normal School) there. When her dad became ill, she returned to the Island to help run the store. Katherine's dad John died a few years later, in 1924, after amassing a formidable collection of historic artifacts dating from the late 1500s. These would later be properly stored in the war museum in Ottawa.


"My dad, Arthur (Art), was born in Gore Bay in 1898. At 15, he lied about his age to fight in WWI. He spent over three years as a machine gunman. He felt deep remorse after an incident that involved his killing a whole group of Germans with his machine gun. He knew if they found him alone he would have been killed. He returned with shrapnel in his shoulder, about the time the Treaty of Versailles was signed."

"Father made his living playing hockey and baseball on professional teams, supported by the mill in Espanola. He had been offered a \$2,800 contract, including expenses, for professional hockey with the Toronto St. Pats, which three years later, became the Toronto Maple Leafs. He felt 28 was too old and refused the offer."

Katherine met Art Mastin in Manitowaning after she noticed a young good-looking man staying at the Queen's Hotel for the opening of the then-new Irving store.

He had tossed a coin to establish his staying or leaving. He stayed. Katherine purposely ran her car into a ditch to inspire both his gallantry and his attention. The ploy worked well and ultimately led to their elopement, sealed in a Sheguiandah church, with two old maids as witnesses. Daughters Helen Margot and Catherine Anne were born first and were joined by brother Rennie on September 4, 1943.

During the depression, local folk came to the store, crying, and Arthur would give them credit. Art did a multitude of extra jobs for his family, including a mail-run over the ice. A 'chimney-sweep' named Mr. Leveque, who had lost his fortune in the fur business, became a friend. Mr. Leveque recommended that Art purchase the creamery in Manitowaning in time for the economic recovery. "Eventually dad gave in and tried to raise the money for a down-payment. Finally, in 1940, he consulted a bootlegger in Little Current and got his deposit in brown paper bags and bought the creamery." He was by then also operating his late father-in-law's business that included both groceries and clothing. It is the stone-facaded storefront with stained glass front windows that now is the working home of the Debajehmujig Theatre Group and is now called Debajehmujig Creation Centre.

"Dad felt it was important to include 'critical integration' of supplies and services to optimize profitability. He was ahead of his time, but it was too hard to keep up. He bought a transport company that delivered to Sudbury in 1950. He also started a verbal partnership with Dave Sim to start a pig farm and use the extra buttermilk to feed the pigs, which got huge. For recreation, he liked harness racing, popular on the Island and in many places throughout Ontario and Michigan."

"Mother had a cousin, a ballerina, Aunt Helen who lived in Chicago. Aunt Helen did something special for us. My first memory at age five was pulling up to the Gore Bay airport with my mother. There was a DC-3 sitting there. I was frightened, apparently amusing the pilot with my colourful language. We flew to New York and stayed first in Helen's dark apartment. Then back on the plane to Florida. Once there, we were ensconced in the Flamingo Hotel where a big yacht was sitting at the nearby dock. It had a captain, two sailors and a butler. For the next month, we

toured the Florida Keys and were treated like royalty on this lavish boat. They even let me drive it. In time, we came back to the reality of everyday life in Manitowaning."

"When I was 11, my mother who loved travelling, decided to go on a European Tour with me and Viola, wife of Manitowaning Doctor Moody. We got on a big ship. A young professor taught me about Europe with just a map. We toured Europe by bus. Germany was humming, nine years after the war ended. Jackhammers were rebuilding bombed cities. Italy, by contrast was quiet; nothing that interested an active 11-year-old boy."

"At 13, I was working in the creamery, spending my summers in the delivery truck meeting some of the farmers. It was just natural that I would work and help." The creamery was a successful venture in eastern Manitoulin. Wagg's supplied the West End. Pigs and butter got to the lucrative Toronto Market by transport, which returned with needed supplies.

"After public school, I went to high school in Manitowaning. High school held 31 kids from Grades 9 to 12. After Grade 10, my parents wanted me in a private school, but I stayed with my cohort, partly to stay with friends and partly because I was playing a lot of hockey at the time, half my time in Wiky and half in Manitowaning. Don Fisher was my coach in Wiky and my dad, the manager for two years. Stuart Shawanda was the top player."

"At 16, I stayed with my uncle and his wife in Thorold to play hockey for the Thorold Juveniles. When a scout visited here, for the price of a soda, I signed a C-form; an emotive experience and a distinct honour. I didn't tell my parents. Then at 17, dad was impressed that I was invited to the Jr. Canadian's Hockey Camp with Scotty Bowman, the most winningest, popular coach at the time. I had heard on the radio that

he had come to Thorold just to see me and I felt I had betrayed him because of my C-form. Signing that form meant I was classified as a professional player and could not play for any university teams in the USA or Canada."

"I did go to the Jr. Habs hockey camp and was met in Ottawa by Scotty who showed me his bankroll and said, 'help yourself.' I was shy, so took just two twenties for expenses. My first cousin had convinced me that should I pursue this line of work, I would wind up making \$20,000, get injured, and have no teeth by the time I was 30." So, after that week Rennie returned to Thorold. He also had compelling offers from Dartmouth and Cornell Universities, but to no avail. "The coach at Cornell tried unsuccessfully, over two seasons, to get me released from the C-form."

Finishing high school became the next goal. At 18, the Chicago Blackhawks head coach, of the same farm team that had seen players like Bobby Hull, tried to recruit Rennie for their farm team and get him into McMaster University. St. Lawrence University in New York (near Cornwall), which rented their own planes, approached him as well. "Little did I know how that C-form would affect my life."

Rennie took economics and philosophy at Western for three years and played Jr. Hockey. "During one game, I had played well, but in the dying minutes of the third period there was a tragic turn. I accidentally hit the eye of an opposing team member with my stick. He lost his eyesight for life and I was devastated. I left hockey for a year." After Western, Rennie was off to Toronto for law school. The day he wrote his final exam, he ran into some former team members who had joined the WHA (World Hockey Association) and were earning in excess of \$100,000 a year. This compared to \$12,500 Rennie would make in his first year and practicing law.

"I started with the new Sud-

bury law firm, Desmarais, Keenan and dealt with all major aspects of the law. I was introduced to a young secretary, Edith Lynne Kiley, 19, originally from Creighton Mine, the second of eight children. It was her first job too. It seemed that fate was on our side." Lynne was assigned to the new articling student and the rest was history. Rennie headed back to Toronto to article for McCarthy and McCarthy, the largest law firm in the country. "I finished my bar exams and married Lynne in 1972." They had three children, Rennie, Ryan and Jonathan.

In the early 1970s, Rennie met some people who had building experience in Sudbury. The city was going through a construction boom and there were lots of liens to deal with for the lawyers. Meanwhile, Lynne enrolled at Laurentian University to get a degree in history with a focus on Russian Studies.

In June 1976, the family moved to Montreal where Rennie would work for an accounting firm. One year later, he moved to the Verchere Gauthier Law Firm which acted for the Swiss Bank Corporation. Rennie became aware of international issues. He was specifically interested in tax law, including domestic and international trusts. This company regularly dealt with organizations in Iran and the Arab Countries.

In 1978, Rennie found himself entrenched in the first-class section of a 747, drinking champagne, heading for Iran to deal with a \$225 million housing contract involving the southern oil fields of Iran. "I got to know the people and a new culture. The president of the company in Iran had a relationship with the Shah of Iran's niece, Simine, who was head of protocol for the court, so I got to know her well." She helped Rennie understand the nature and complexities of the political system. "We continued to be friends until she died a few years ago in Los Angeles." At one point Rennie was so well-versed in Iranian activities, he wanted Lynne and their son to move there.

The firm opened an office in Toronto on the 64th floor of the First Canadian Place in 1978. Rennie was the representative for the Montreal company and others joined. That same year, Rennie took his mother on a trip to Kuwait and Egypt. "I soon realized that she had two mickeys of vodka in her suitcase. We arrived at a vast space in the airport, marble counters and uniformed men with lots of time to check us through. I told her that they would fire me and send me home, or lock me up perhaps, if she didn't get rid of the vodka" because of the strict prohibition against alcohol consumption in these Muslim nations.

"She ran to the washroom and tried to do that, but a cleaning lady was there watching her, so she put one mickey under each arm and came back out, walking slowly and rather stiffly. I was sweating but I watched her charm the airport staff, while maintaining a very prim and proper countenance. As she approached the guards, they smiled at her and passed her through without a search. She had an adventurous soul."

Some years later, the revolution in 1979 indicated that the reign of the Shah of Iran was ending. The USA was no longer supporting him, and he had developed prostate cancer. Shooting in the street had begun. His supporters seized all his assets, weapons and \$23 billion. Rennie coordinated an effort to send the Shah to Canada with Pierre Trudeau's agreement. "Henry Kissinger, US Secretary of State and National Security Advisor also became involved and instead, a cancer operation was scheduled for the Shah in Pana-

# Mistrial declared in 2017 Wiiky home invasion assault case

GORE BAY—The trial for two Toronto area men in the May 2017 attack of a Wiikwemkoong man has been declared a mistrial and a new date will be set.

As was reported previ-

ously, on May 9, 2017 at approximately 12:32 am, Wikwemikong Tribal Police responded to a vicious attack in the area of Mshaaboos Lane in Wiikwemkoong.

Four suspects, who fled the scene but were arrested a short time later by the United Chiefs and Councils of Manitoulin (UCCM) Anishnaabe Police, were charged in 2017.

The victim of the attack was sent to Health Sciences North with serious injuries following the Bayview Heights home invasion.

Angela Filazzola, a 25-year-old female from Scarborough, was charged with possession for the purposes of trafficking, trafficking in a controlled substance and conspiracy to traffic a controlled substance. Ms. Filazzola is currently missing and a warrant has been issued

for her arrest.

Taun Dixon-Johnson, a 28-year-old male from Toronto, is charged with two counts of aggravated assault (endanger life and wounding) and assault with a weapon. The initial charges of attempted murder and drug trafficking have been dropped against

him.

Shamar Shaw, a 25-year-old male from Pickering, has also been charged with two counts of aggravated assault (endanger life and wounding) and assault with a weapon. The charges of attempted murder and drug trafficking were also dropped against

Mr. Shaw.

Billie-Jean Mills, a 24-year-old female from Sudbury, was charged with possession for the purposes of trafficking, trafficking in a controlled substance, conspiracy to traffic a controlled substance and failing to comply with a probation order (three counts). Ms. Mills has been released from prison due to time-served.

The trial for Mr. Shaw and Mr. Dixon-Johnson was slated to begin on September 16 and was declared a mistrial the following day, September 17. The Expositor will update the story when a date for the new trial becomes available.

# Spirit of Terry Fox alive and well at Kagawong's first-ever event

KAGAWONG—It was raining when Terry Fox Run volunteer Sharon Jackson woke up on Sunday, September 15. Following her initial dismay she remembered that, "Terry ran in the rain. We can do it too." And they did. Kagawong's first Terry Fox Run boasted 51 participants and raised \$1,498 for the Terry Fox Foundation. Fortunately, the rain ended before the event started.

The all ages, non-competitive run, walk or bike course began at the Old Mill Heritage Centre and Municipal Office at the Kagawong waterfront. There were one, two, five and 10 kilometre options that all began at the Old Mill, led up Graham hill to Newburn Road and back again, with volunteers in place along the way offering support.

First time run organizer Tanya Connell welcomed participants, telling the group, "39 years ago, after 143 days and 3,339 miles, Terry was forced to stop running outside of Thunder Bay, Ontario. Before

returning to BC for treatment Terry said, 'I'm going to do my very best. I'll fight. I promise I won't give up.'"

"He never did," she continued, "and neither have you. We are so grateful for the faith you have in the work of the Foundation. So much has changed since Terry's run in 1980 yet the drive for significant results in our cancer research projects is just as strong as ever. And with the recent announcement of \$150 million federal government funding for the new Marathon of Hope Cancer Centres Network we are renewed in our dedication to bringing precision medicine to every Canadian diagnosed with cancer."

Most participants wore a sticker with a name on it to show who they were running for. "Everyone knows someone," said Ms. Jackson. "A family member, a friend, a neighbour, who either has or had cancer."

Runners included Cathy, an Island visitor from

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# Manitoulin Island paramedics ride for fallen brethren

OTTAWA—A contingent of 10 Manitoulin-area paramedics and medical professionals recently took part in the annual Ontario Paramedic Ride, a four-day bicycle ride from Toronto to Ottawa raising money for the Canadian Paramedic Memorial Foundation.

“The reason for the ride is honouring our fallen, paying tribute and raising awareness. Because of those things, it sort of makes the distance easier because of the of the reason you’re doing it. It brings the community of paramedics together,” said Alie Thompson, a primary care paramedic with Manitoulin-Sudbury District Services Board Paramedic Services.

The roughly 40,000 paramedics in Canada are four times more likely than the average Canadian to have issues with their mental or physical health and are more vulnerable to negative mental spaces such as suicidal thoughts, according to the Mental Health Commission of Canada. Paramedics are often called to attend scenes of human casualties and have to treat victims in extreme situations.

Their line of work also means they undertake long hours, shift work, higher physical and psychological stressors and are frequently exposed to contagious or infectious diseases. Numerous paramedics have fallen in the line of duty or as a result of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD); the names of those who have passed while on the job or in training since 1980 are listed at the Paramedic Ride website.

When asked whether that issue has impacted her directly, Ms. Thompson’s response spoke plainly to

the extent of the issue. “I don’t think you could ask that to anyone in the profession and not have the answer ‘yes,’” she said. “It’s a daily occurrence for us to struggle with those kinds of calls. That’s why I think it’s such a big deal. I’ve been lucky but I’ve had a lot of support. I’ve also had lots of co-workers ... who’ve struggled with PTSD or who couldn’t return to work.”

Over four days, the riders travelled the distance from Toronto to Ottawa, riding as many as 170 kilometres per day. When the Ontario ride arrived in Ottawa, they joined forces with the Quebec ride for the final trip to the finish line. More than 400 cyclists were in the final group.

Paramedic Jennifer Legacy Hamilton took part in her fifth ride this year and said she was happy to have more people from her home service attending.

“This year was our

biggest turnout from our service which was nice to see. I also came out uninjured this year,” Ms. Legacy Hamilton said with a chuckle. Last year, her wheel jammed and she was thrown off her bike on the first day of travel. She ended up off work for some time following the incident.

Ms. Legacy Hamilton said that although she has never had to attend any call that has impacted her to the point that she needed to take off work, she also knows many co-workers who have struggled deeply with these issues in the past. However, she said that these tough situations are tied to the work of a first responder.

“It just comes with the territory,” she said.

The ultimate goal for the fundraising is the National Commemorative Paramedic Monument Project, an Ottawa-area installation that will recognize “the

dedication and sacrifice of our fallen paramedics and be a place for family, friends and colleagues to mourn and remember.”

Ms. Thompson stressed that even though the ride is over for this year, donations are still appreciated toward the project. She said the family members of those who have fallen are active supporters of the memorial and often take part in the ride.

“It’s just knowing you’re there to support them and working on giving them a place to go and remember, pay tribute to everyone,” she said.

Mississauga, who has participated in several runs over the years. She found out about the run and decided to join in. “My sister just received treatment for breast cancer,” she said.

Ms. Connell was amazed to receive a personal phone call from one of Terry Fox’s brothers in British Columbia. “It was pretty incredible,” she said. “I was not expecting that at all. He thanked us for continuing the tradition and wished us luck.”

Terry Fox lost his right leg to cancer at age 17. He wanted to help raise money to find a cure for cancer so he decided to run across Canada to ask for help. He ran 5,000 kms to train before he even started his Marathon of Hope. Terry Fox started his run in St. John’s, Newfoundland but had to stop in Thunder Bay after cancer returned in his lungs. In all he ran 5,373 km through six provinces over 143 days. He died in June 1981 but not before he learned that Canadians had raised \$24 million for cancer research—his goal from the start. The Terry Fox

Run is held every September throughout Canada and has raised over \$750 million for cancer research to date.

Ms. Connell acknowledged Joanna Rosenbaum for organizing the run in Little Current for the past number of years. “This year she passed the torch on to us,” Ms. Connell said, noting that as of 2017, the Little Current run had raised \$85,754.55 since 1982.

She also acknowledged and thanked her “incredible team of devoted volunteers.” In addition to Ms. Connell and Ms. Jackson, volunteers included Rob

Seifried, Landon Seifried, Brian Parker, Kayleigh Harrietha, Dustin Harrietha and Craig Jackson. Sponsors included Bridal Veil

Variety and Esso who donated ice for the run and also hosted the Billings Volunteer Fire Department who raised additional funds with a boot drive. The \$1,498 raised included in person and online donations, the fire department boot drive and t-shirt sales.

diocese of Halifax-Yarmouth, with Father Epoch being the central figure in that case.

While Father Epoch has been named as an abuser in this region in the past, Brother O'Meara's name has not previously surfaced in abuse claims against the Jesuits.

This new Wiikwemkoong lawsuit has been in the works for the past two years and has recently been filed as a class action. Its current list of roughly 30 claimants does not include anyone who has previously been a part of other abuse settlements with the Jesuits. Only Wiikwemkoong band members are eligible to be represented in this case.

The following defendants are listed in the lawsuit: "The Jesuit fathers of Upper Canada (A.K.A. English Canada province), the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation of the Diocese of Sault Ste. Marie, the Roman Catholic Bishop of Sault Ste. Marie, the estate of Father George Epoch and the estate of Brother O'Meara."

Many of the victims attended Indian Day Schools in their home community which led them to cross paths with Father Epoch in Wiikwemkoong's Holy Cross Mission.

"The claims centre not around the school but in the various churches, church houses and the rectories," said Mr. Troy.

Mr. Troy said he is not actively seeking out victims to join the lawsuit and anyone who has stepped forward has done so voluntarily.

"I have no intention of phoning people looking for a claim. When you come forward it is up to you, if you ever come forward," he said. "People think they can bury it ... many would never admit to being assaulted by a priest or a worker, of any gender. They took it to their graves."

This new lawsuit is designed to help victims get the support they need to process what happened to them at such a vulnerable age. Mr. Troy said he was currently in negotiations with the opposing solicitors.

Victims have two main courses of action in their healing journey: they can turn to community elders and traditional techniques to help heal their trauma or they can hire the professional services of a psychologist or psychiatrist. It's likely that some will choose both options.

This falls into the realm of "future care" as part of the possible settlement, something Mr. Troy said was among his highest priorities.

"I'm determined that future care money will be provided. Thirty, 40 years later, people are still hurting," he said, adding that what victims choose to do with their settlement money is entirely their choice.

Mr. Troy said the abuse has deeply impacted numerous community members for decades.

"We have outside people who have never been back to Wiikwemkoong," he said. "I don't know if they'll ever go back, to be honest."

The Expositor reached out to Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Sault Ste.

Marie. Both expressed that this lawsuit was in too early of a stage for them to make comments. The Jesuits of Canada did not respond to requests for comment by press deadline Monday.

The Expositor will be following the developments in this case as more information becomes available, as well as sharing stories and past records that bring context to the crimes of Father George Epoch and Brother O'Meara from their time in Wiikwemkoong.

ous given the close proximity of Ward's General Store in Tehkummah that already serves as an LCBO convenience outlet. It is 10 kilometres away.

"We work with Ward's in Tehkummah and I think it'd hurt their business," said Robert Brown, the other half of the Carl's ownership. "We've lost two gas stations in the area. When there's too many people selling one product, nobody makes any money. That's the problem with having a lot of retail outlets."

Robert Brown added that the seasonal nature of South Baymouth would place a lot of strain on any year-round business such as an LCBO convenience outlet.

"As far as selling alcohol in South Baymouth in the off-season, you can forget it because there's no customers. That's my business perspective. When the ferry's running, you'd probably do quite well," he said.

Wiikwemkoong Ogimaa Duke Peltier was unable to provide comment to The Expositor by press time Monday but he did acknowledge that he had not heard of the program before being

contacted for interviews by this newspaper and CBC Sudbury.

Surprise was a common thread shared between all of the people The Expositor contacted on this topic. Aside from publishing the list, the LCBO appeared to not have contacted any possible host businesses directly to inform them that they were welcome to apply.

Businesses are eligible for the convenience outlet program if they do not primarily identify as a pharmacy or restaurant, if they are at least five kilometres from an existing LCBO or Beer Store outlet, they are at least five kilometres from the intersection named in the list of communities (meaning businesses as far from town as Manitoulin Meat Boss at Dryden's

Corner could be considered in the Providence Bay application, for example), the LCBO outlet will take up less than half of the overall operational area of the business and the space can hold 80 feet of shelving and a four foot square seasonal beverage area as well as a 100-square-foot area separate from the main retail zone to store empty container returns.

The five-kilometre provision is measured as-the-crow-flies, though if a proposed outlet is within the five-kilometre radius, the LCBO said it would consider the length of the shortest driving route, effectively shrinking the minimum distance requirement.

Any businesses wishing to put their name forward must email their application to the LCBO by October 8 at 2 pm and ensure they meet all of the eligibility requirements including a personal history assessment and background check.

When measuring the driving distances from the main intersection listed in the eligible community directory, Providence Bay is 11 km from its nearest LCBO outlet, South Baymouth is 10 kilometres away and Wiikwemkoong is 15 kilometres away.

to the boom and bust of the oil industry. As well, to enable renewable electricity to flow across provincial and territorial boundaries, we will implement a national electrical grid strategy, including building connections between eastern Manitoba and western Ontario, and upgrading connections between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. This will be paid for with money now allocated for expanding the Trans Mountain pipeline, and create thousands of jobs nation-wide. We will also create jobs through retrofitting all buildings in Canada to be more energy efficient, a task which will employ thousands of skilled Canadians.

This transition will benefit Algo-

ma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasung by refocusing Natural Resources Canada away from oil and gas (which have dominated the Departments attention) towards industries which are more environmentally sustainable. We will renew the National Forest Strategy abandoned under the Harper government, and highlight the role of forests in removing carbon from the atmosphere and the need to retain the integrity of forest ecosystems. more pipelines. A sustained decline in global crude oil price outlooks, a consequent global reduction in fossil fuel investment coupled with the loud, urgent demands of climate change, make big, expensive oil projects, such as oil sands expansion, increasingly unattractive to shareholders and lenders. The oil patch has less and less interest in funding expensive, energy-intensive bitumen projects. Add to that the march toward greener technology and the return on investment for multi-billion projects becomes vastly less certain than it was in the past.

New Democrats won't continue down the path of Liberal and Conservative governments that chose to spend public money on oil and gas subsidies. Canada currently spends \$3.3 billion per year, more per capita than any other G7 country, on oil and gas subsidies. 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# Kenjgewin Teg celebrates grand opening of trade school

 M'CHIGEENG—Kenjgewin Teg (KT) president Stephanie Roy deftly wielded a set of bolt cutters to cut the chain for the grand opening of the school's new Anishinabek Skills and Innovation Research Centre and celebrating another step forward for the organization.

Beverly Roy acted as master of ceremonies for the grand opening and introduced two key cultural components of the ceremony: drumming by Martin Panamick, a student of the Trades Fundamentals Program, and elder Josh Eshkawkogan, who delivered the Ngo Dwe Waangizid (constitution) in Anishinaabemowin "to start us off in a good way."

"Boozhoo, it gives me great pleasure to officially open our brand new Anishinabek Skills and Innovation Research Centre," said Ms. Roy. "Today is the culmination of work that started in the spring of 2016 when we received our first funding proposal approval." Ms. Roy noted that construction of this phase began in 2017, a part two grand opening adding to that of the main facility that opened in 2011.

"We here on Manitoulin, along with many of our community partners, started discussing a trades centre around 2007, at that time it was called an Apprentice and Trades Strategy," she recalled. "It was little more than a vision and a dream for us here on Manitoulin, envisioning that one day we will support and launch trades people to enter trades and become certified through our access pathway training opportuni-

ties—and 10 years later, here we are. This capital expansion to KT will serve to provide the trades and apprenticeship skills training for Mniidoo Mnising to support new career opportunities for the new mobile Indigenous workforce."

The new facility will add 9,000 square feet to the existing 16,000 square feet, she noted. "This space adds functionality and improves the quality as it is a specialized training facility built to meet the projected and growing industry needs in the trades sector, including resource development, small business, tourism and cultural growth," said Ms. Roy.

While the centre will provide educational resources that are lacking on Manitoulin, it will also help to ensure that, when it comes to doing research on Indigenous peoples going forward, "no more research

about us, without us," said Ms. Roy. "We will play an integral role in research in the North."

The new Anishinabek Skills and Innovation Research Centre includes a pre-trades space which includes a suite of courses including electrical, plumbing and carpentry, a fully outfitted welding space and a technology classroom space. "A theory-based classroom located adjacent to the workshops will provide a flexible space for learning and various other activities," said Ms. Roy. "Along with these trades spaces, an informal café/lounge located at the main entry provides a gathering space for students and a cultural welcome for visitors and members of the community."

In addition to the new training building, other features include an out-

Andrew Scheer has a six-point plan to get projects built: 1. Cancel the carbon tax; 2. Repeal Bill C-69, the No-More Pipelines Bill; 3. End the ban on shipping traffic in British Columbia.; 4. Establish clear time lines and get Indigenous consultations right up front; 5. Ban foreign-funded advocacy groups from disrupting our approvals process; and 6. Assert federal jurisdiction when necessary.

The fact is Canada has more than enough oil – not only to displace imports from Iran, Venezuela and Saudi Arabia – but to put an end to all foreign imports once and for all.

An Andrew Scheer government will develop a dedicated, coast-to-coast right-of-way specifically set aside for energy infrastructure projects. Rather than have industry submit complicated route proposals for every new transmission line and pipeline project, we could have a single corridor – planned up front and in full consultation with the provinces and with Indigenous Canadians who would share in the prosperity that it would provide. adverse effects for the environment. We can also not deny what our natural resources contribute, not just to the Canadian economy and life experience, but to the global economy and way of life.

It is unlikely that Canada and other countries will move away from fossil fuels dependency in the next few decades. As residents in Northern Ontario we know the challenges to moving fossil fuels by truck and train given that Gogama experienced a train derailment which resulted in the 2015 oil spill. We also know that the movement of product by truck is increasingly dangerous for us on our roads so moving crude oil by means other than pipelines are not necessarily the answer.

It is a fact that the Liberal government invested in pipelines in an effort to improve access to foreign markets. It is also a fact that Alberta's primary natural resource industries employ over 660,000 people, pays over \$5 billion in taxes each year and invests an average \$53 billion in capital to the industry per year. In addition, royalties from the oil and gas industry pay for important services such as

education, health care and infrastructure. Of course, it is also a fact that dependence on fossil fuels is contributing to climate change. Therein lies the competing interests at the heart of this question. So, just as there are multifaceted arguments there are multifaceted solutions.

# ...Last of summer's monarch butterflies wing way south across Lake Huron

them in a screened cage on the back seat of our car and returned to Batman's Campground near Sheguiandah.

The next day we held a public tagging and release at the campground. We placed each tagged monarch on the finger of a camper and within a few seconds, the monarch took off into the trees.

Watching a monarch on their finger thrilled campers of all ages, leaving them in awe that an insect weighing no more than a paperclip could fly to Mexico.

The release was an emotional experience for some campers who feel butterflies represent fairies and their appearance a connection with lost loved ones. Three young campers had recently lost their grandfather and for them, his soul took flight in the body of the monarch.

The people of Mexico welcome our monarchs to their mountains in late October as part of a multi-day holiday called the Dia de Muertos, or Day of the Dead where friends and families gather to remember those who have died and to help support their spiritual journey.

On September 7, Marilyn and I visited South Baymouth where several hundred monarchs were feeding on local flowers. We captured 20 and shared the tagging and release of 10 with local residents.

The next day, on September 8, not a single monarch could be found. All had left early that morning once the sun warmed their bodies.

We then tagged and released several of our remaining monarchs just as the Chi-Cheemaun was leaving port. To our amusement it appeared that some of the tagged butterflies were chasing after the ferry and we could imagine them yelling out 'Wait for me.'

Likewise, no monarchs were found in Providence Bay the same day; apparently all had headed south over the bay that morning.

It was cold and rainy on Manitoulin on Friday, but on Saturday, September 14, we drove to Providence Bay where again, no monarchs were found. However, to our surprise, we did find some flying from flower to flower along Lake Huron Road, where we could hear waves crashing ashore on the nearby bay. We caught and tagged another 21 adults.

Is it possible these freshly emerged adults can detect the nearby shoreline of Lake Huron? Do they know that they are about to attempt the longest flight across water of all North American monarchs?

These adult monarchs are appearing late in the season; however, if it remains warm for another week, hopefully some will make it across Lake Huron and refuel in Michigan. After all, their parents successfully made the flight in the opposite direction a few months ago.

It will be an exciting day when a tagged Manitoulin monarch is found in Mexico proving that our monarchs successfully fly over 4,000 km to avoid winter conditions.

In the meantime, Manitoulin residents could plant

milkweed seeds in their gardens this fall. With a little luck, monarchs arriving in 2020 will find new shoots and residents will be contributing to our understanding of the world's most amazing natural wonder.

way back to our lines," Mr. Butler said. "I stayed through the night playing possum."

When Mr. Butler wandered into the kitchen back at the base, he created quite a sensation, the article continues. "The gunner

was there and his jaw just dropped," he said. "The guy said to me, 'I just reported you killed in action.'"

Mr. Butler did not get off unscathed, although his wounds were not fatal by any means. "I got something on my backside," he said. "Some minor shrapnel, nothing that would stop me."

"In Korea, Red was left to protect the withdrawal of his platoon," WPC member Wayne Golden told The Expositor. "A Chinese grenade went off after he was left to hold the line when the Chinese attacked. When the grenade went off it stunned him; he was left for dead. The 'Brenner'

who left him there was decorated, but Red wasn't."

Following the retreat, 28 were left alive, Mr. Butler being one of them, WPC President Colin Pick added. "We wanted to see that Red was acknowledged in some way."

During a special ceremony at Elliot's Restaurant in Little Current for Mr. Butler, a British Commonwealth veteran service star was pinned to Mr. Butler's chest—a commemorative medal struck to recognize veterans' service within any British and Commonwealth forces.

(Moggy) have done and I want to thank you all very, very much for all of the work you have done."

"She has been a great active member of this community," said Assiginack councillor and museum board member Hugh Moggy. "Jean, we really appreciate everything that you have done and we hope that people will come and go, visit, and that this museum will be in Assiginack forever."

Mr. Moggy introduced Assiginack historian (former long time museum curator and chairman of the historical society since the 1970s) David Smith, who provided some of the history of the museum and the pivotal role played by Ms. McLennan.

The laughter and banter between Mr. Smith and Ms. McLennan were indicative of their long association, friendship and shared passion. "Whenever I made a motion, I could always on Jean to second it," said Mr. Smith. "Then somebody would always raise the question 'where will the money come from?' but Jean would always say, 'don't worry, the money will be there.'"

"It was wonderful that in the 1950s, people like Jean had the foresight to decide to start collecting artifacts because at that time people were beginning to come in and buying up antiques and such," continued Mr. Smith. "People were even throwing things into the dump, because who wanted that old clock or crock, there was something wonderful and new to replace it." It was those collections that formed the basis of the museum's incredibly diverse and representative collection today. "People like her and Roy Fields would go around with a wagon and get people to donate those items to the museum."

Mr. Smith recalled the growth of the museum from its small one-room beginnings and recalled some of the antics that came about with the acquisition of the artifacts.

"Jean spearheaded the movement that began in the 1950s and 60s to go to Michael's Bay to collect the

records of the different stores and businesses and ensure their survival to this day," he said. Thanks to those efforts many of those invaluable historical records of Manitoulin's early years have been archived and preserved in the museum's collections.

"She set a great example for everybody else in this community today," said Mr. Smith. "It is wonderful to honour her today with the gift of this bench that will sit on the museum grounds so that everyone can see and be reminded of the work she has done."

"I am so thankful," said Ms. McLennan, who immediately went on to recall the contributions of other members of the community, and some of the challenges put forward by others who did not share the committee's vision or faith. "There were five women, along with George Bishop, who made this possible. They were Mrs. Moody,

Blossom Mastin, Sarah Leeson, myself and Angela McCutcheon," she recalled. "We five women worked ourselves to death."

Ms. McLennan also had high praise for Mr. Smith and his efforts. "If it weren't for David there wouldn't be a building here today," she said.

As for the bench, she announced that she could not be more pleased. "This bench is just beautiful," she said.

These days Ms. McLennan is somewhat challenged in her efforts by the loss of her sight, but it hasn't cooled any of her ardour of this community development activist for moving projects forward. "I am working on getting the funding we need to fix the (Burn's Wharf) theatre now," she said. "The town has given us \$60,000, but it is going to take a lot more than that to do the job. We are going to get there."

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

## Indigo's Adopt a School program pairs Junior School with Eaton Centre store

WIKWEMKOONG—Wikwemkoong's Junior School has been partnered with the Indigo bookstore in Toronto's Eaton Centre through the Indigo Love of Reading Foundation's Adopt a School program, which seeks to raise one book for every student.

Wikwemikong Junior School principal Harold Fox said he first received an email about the Indigo Love of Reading Foundation through an email.

"It said 'follow this click' and that's what I did," he tells The Expositor with a laugh.

Mr. Fox says Junior School students are always being encouraged to read. In fact, the school even has a Stanley Cup Reading Madness challenge that's held annually during the Stanley Cup playoffs. "A lifelong love of reading and educational success is possible for every Canadian child," says Heather Reisman, chair of the Indigo Love of Reading Foundation. "However, we face a significant challenge with the funding of public elementary school libraries across Canada where small or nonexistent library budgets are the reality. The burden is unfairly falling on our teachers who are

putting their hands into their own pockets to buy books and educational resources for their classrooms. We as a country need to do better to ensure that all students become engaged readers."

 door learning area located across from the new facilities, adding to the depth of practical training offered, said Ms. Roy, who noted that the site "has been designed to accommodate future growth and expansion of the Anishinabek Skills, Innovation and Research Centre and is centred around hands on learning."

The flexible 21st Century technology classroom provides different furnishing and learning zones within the classroom including barrier-free accessibility

M'Chigeeng First Nation." Ms. Roy also noted a contribution by FedNor for non-construction items such as furnishings and equipment of \$611,556.

"Our leadership from Manitoulin, especially M'Chigeeng First Nation, who provided the water/sewer infrastructure and Aundeck Omni Kaning, Sheguiandah and Shesheganwaning, who respond willingly and have provided their support in many government meetings," she said.



ma. The Shah was concerned that he might die on the table, since he was no longer supported by the USA, so left Panama and went to the Bahamas instead. Egypt took him in, and the Shah died there later, of cancer."

Meanwhile the revolution was on. Rennie recalls being in a bar with another Canadian in downtown Tehran when a commotion outside forced them to leave for the airport rather suddenly. Manoucher Etminan, a friend, had taken off the unpopular royal plates on a fast Italian car, but they didn't get far. "The car was blocked at an intersection by men with machine guns, which soon spit out a hail of bullets. My companion from Welland, Ontario was wondering what the pinging noises were. I yelled at him to get down, those were real bullets. Somehow, we managed to get out of that difficult situation with help from our manager and the Shah's sister, who knew where we were staying. Eventually we got to Toronto again and we helped Manoucher and his daughter to emigrate to Canada. He ultimately built his own successful bakery, Manoucher's Bread. His Persian-inspired breads are still sold across Canada, and on airlines like British Airways."

A year later, Rennie was getting strange calls in Toronto. "It seems Ryan O'Neil, the actor who was nearby, somehow heard about this mystery and came up to see me. Ryan was dating Simine's daughter. He told me the husband of the Shah's sister had been calling and he wanted me to go to Los Angeles immediately. In LA, I found the Shah's elderly mother propped up on pillows within a steeply perched castle with a moat. She was safe there from the anger of Iranian students in Los Angeles. She wanted me to help her with some funds."

"Simine, along with the Shah's mother and many other Iranians now made their homes in Los Angeles. Simine had earned money for her work in negotiating the housing contract and she left Iran on the last plane out of Tehran, with her money. I had often been in the Middle East when things had been going wrong and I tried to help as much as I could."

A steady flow of Middle Eastern contracts came to Rennie. After a few years, the new Iranian regime asked Rennie to set up the largest onshore drilling contract in world history at the time. He arranged a successful contract with a Calgary company. In all, this Sudbury lawyer made about 150 visits to the Middle East and 200 trips to Europe.

Back home, Lynne felt privileged to become acquainted with the Anishinabe world on the Island. On Manitoulin, she met and interacted with local Indigenous people that shopped at Mastin's, the family store that Rennie and his family also managed in addition to his international legal affairs. Their outlook on life and their values became a revelation that added meaning to her own life. When Rennie and Lynne's sons were old enough, they were encouraged to play for Wiky teams too. After having been exposed only to 'cowboys and Indians' on television, their eyes were opened by the reality of Native life; these were great people." As an adult, Rennie often drove into Wiky on a Sunday to visit friends and elders. "I enjoyed chatting with and learning from them."

Lynne was busy, helping where she was needed, but always being a mother and wife first. She became a Director for the Ontario College of Teachers, helped her husband run his legal practice and other tasks as needed. In 1975 Lynne accompanied her husband, visiting several Soviet republics. Seeing life in these places helped her realize she had a good life on Manitoulin: the warm ambience, the Anishnabe culture and the comfortable routine of the family business. The Lake Manitou cottage also became a focal point. Sadly, Lynne died in 2010 of colon cancer.

Her obituary said: "Whether it was being the primary caregiver to her mother-in-law, managing the family businesses, serving on the Board of Directors of the Ontario College of Teachers, or running her husband's legal practice, Lynne somehow always managed to do all that was asked of her, and to do it in accordance with the exceptionally high standards that she set for herself. She had also, frequently, helped ladies negotiate the legal and health systems in her own community."

Oldest son Jonathan is an artist. Rennie Jr. is a lawyer and president of the Canadian Media Producers Association. Ryan is in security.

Rennie has no regrets apart from having signed the C-form as a youth. "When I look back on my life, I am still a true Islander at heart. My life so far has been a wonderful adventure; a rewarding job where I met so many interesting people from different countries and regimes. At the same time, I was sharing my life with an amazing lady and three great children. Through it all, we always had our retreat, the family cottage on Lake Manitou, our refuge in the storm. Manitoulin established my roots, and I will always cherish that."
