Six people hospitalized for treatment

SHESHEGWANING—The community of Sheshegwaning First Nation is still dealing with the outbreak of blastomycosis, a rare infection that is caused by breathing in the fungus blastomyces dermatitidis, that hit the community earlier this month.

Sheshegwaning Chief Dean Roy explained, "as far as I know all the people who had been diagnosed with (blastomycosis) have now come home. Six went into the hospital," he said, noting, "two were discharged (on September 12) and the others came home on the 14th and are back in the community.'

"There are other people currently under investigation for blastomycosis. So far, six children and one adult are diagnosed and being treated for blasto; of these, six are confirmed and one suspected. But all have been released and all are now on medication," explained Chief Roy.

The infection has also been confirmed to have taken the life of at least two dogs in the com-

Within the past three years, two Manitoulin people have died from blastomycosis infections. Over the past 20 years, numerous pets have have been infected, both dogs and cats, with varying

rates of successful treatment.

In the spring of 2016, The Expositor organized a community information night to explain how blastomycosis can be contracted, how to avoid infection and symptoms arising from

Central debates Carter Bay development

Seeks ruling on status of 10'X 10' structures

CARTER BAY—The Carter Bay property, with its iconic sand dunes and pristine desolate shores, has long been a source of controversy confounding Central Manitoulin staff and municipal councillors and in that regard little has changed in recent times. Currently, the fate of a small building constructed on one of the lots in the property remains up in the air while council sorts out information on what can, and cannot, be done on a lot in the unregistered subdivision.

A large group of Carter Bay property owners had come to present delegations to a Central Manitoulin council meeting opposing any building in the sensitive area and demanding that the town enforce its own bylaws and reinstate an order to demolish the

"No, we didn't come to a resolution on it yet," said Mayor Richard Stephens. "We discussed it a bit at Thursday's Finance and Administration committee meeting, but there is still some information that we feel we need clarified before we proceed to any decision on the matter.'

The status of the property is not clear in the minds of the council members, noted the mayor. "That property was originally set up as a subdivision with lots and channels, but it was never regis-

MANITOULIN—A beautiful tree planting ceremony of an oak sapling and a red maple, a symbol of Canada, was held September 17 at the Manitoulin District Cenotaph. The event was hosted by the cenotaph committee consisting of Jim Corrigan, Linda Bowerman, Jeff Marshall, Alan Tustian and Donna Foster, and was held to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Vimy Ridge battle and Canada's 150th

Ms. Bowerman, the secretary-treasurer of the committee, welcomed guests and introduced Chaplain Diane Musgrove for an opening prayer and singer Kieran Harper, accompanied by her mom Angela Harper, on guitar, for the singing of the national anthem.

Ms. Bowerman then gave a history of the Vimy Oaks Legacy saying, "the Battle of Vimy Ridge in northern France, April 9 to April 12, 1917, is considered to be one of the defining events in the history of our nation. Where Allied troops had struggled and failed, the Canadians overcame great odds and eventually captured the Ridge at a cost of some 10,600 casualties. After the battle, Lieutenant Leslie Miller of Scarborough, serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, gathered up a handful of acorns from a partially buried English oak on the Ridge. He sent the acorns home to his family with instructions to plant them. In 1919, Lieutenant Miller returned. was

Shopping locally helps keep our towns alive

breadth of this vast nation cannot help but be struck by the incredible number of small ghost towns that pepper the countryside, legacies of the days when hotels would spring up one horse and buggy ride apart, or located at an appropriate railway depot location for the railroads then being built, soon to be followed by general stores, banks and the other commercial enterprises that service what was then largely an agrarian society.

Within a couple of hour's drive, one comes across a larger town that has flourished on the lifeblood of less fortunate communities. Thus the ebb and flow of urban development marches on, creating winners and losers in a survival of the fittest (or luckiest). Small towns have slowly strangled as customers ventured to larger centres where they can find the cheaper products and greater variety that economies of scale allow.

The trend accelerates almost of its own accord, building with an exponential speed, until local customers don't even consider looking in their backyards for the products and services they need. This trend has been remarked upon by many older residents who can recall the days when movie theatres, grocery stores, hardware stores, shoe stores, pharmacies and a plethora of other goods and services could be found not only in today's communities like Wiikwemkoong, Mindemoya, M'Chigeeng, Manitowaning, Gore Bay and Little Current, but also in many of those tiny communities that now boast little, if any, commercial activity.

Great kudos must go out to those entrepreneurs who have chosen to buck that trend, chosing to set up shop, literally, in the remaining commercial centres of Manitoulin Island. That includes long time captains of commerce like the Bondi family, who have built an impressive chain of enterprises in communities that span the Island, and relative newcomers to the scene such as the Rozells, who celebrated their first year of business as The Edgewater Pharmacy in downtown Little Current this past weekend, as well as established "new" businesses like the Manitoulin Physio Centre in M'Chigeeng that is celebrating a decade of success or Wiikwemkoong's Andy's which grew from the little gas station that could into a linchpin of Island commerce.

The list of those who have had confidence in serving our communities goes on and on.

But now these business people who have revitalized and repurposed our business centres are coming under a new pressure and threat from beyond Manitoulin's shores. Like the advent of the automobile, the coming of the Internet is threatening brick and mortar, mom and pop, enterprises like nothing that has been seen before, as customers click to order the products they want and wait for the delivery truck to appear at their door.

It is already challenging to be a retail operation in a rural area with a large, nearby city whose businesses can work on tighter margins than smaller volume family businesses. But not all is without hope. The popular Manitoulin Trade Fair has done a great service in building awareness of what is available in the way of products and services close to home and the Eat Local movement is also encouraging people to take a look around them to discover the gems we have within.

We can each do our part by not automatically assuming that a better deal can be had a click or an hour-and-a-half of gas consumption away and by taking a good look at what is on offer through the businesses of our friends and neighbours. It is like so much in life—you either use or risk losing them.

Small local businesses have so very much to offer in the way of expertise and personal service, and quite often on offer for little more than what is on the price tags at the big box stores a gas tank full of traffic hassle away.

Shop local and help our communities thrive.

This talented, recognized artist lives in an idvllic location on Manitoulin's Lake Mindemoya. The place where she exhibits her life's work each summer is called Periwinkle Studio, and true to the name, the ample-sized atelier, built by her husband, is surrounded with an acre of periwinkle. This enchanting green carpet adds to the colloquial charm. Rochelle's art has been proudly displayed in many other galleries and shows, including our own Perivale Gallery, The La Cloche Art Show, the Northern Ontario Art Association (NOAA) exhibition, the St. Thomas Art Gallery, and the Robert Long Watercolour Show in Destin, Florida. In 1999, she was the featured watercolour artist at The St. Thomas Appreciation of the Arts. Rochelle is also

the recipient of numerous awards and a former member of the Botanical Artists Association of Canada.

Rochelle was born on July 12, 1937 to Charles and Irene (Palmateer) Cadieux. Her mother had admired an actress named Rochelle Hudson so she named her daughter after this talented performer. Rochelle spent her early years in Stouffville, a small town of 900. Paternal great-grandfather Joseph of Normandy, France had arrived to Stouffville after becoming a French translator first in Quebec and later Ontario. "I remember him as a distinguished gentleman who sent me a ten-dollar bill when I was 10." Grandfather Cyrelle, son of Joseph, started a horse and cart delivery business. He, and his son after him, carried freight and mail from the Canadian National Railway to local homes and businesses

When she was three, Rochelle moved to Manitoulin with her parents so her dad could work for Wagg's Creamery. Her mother Irene was a little homesick at first but she came to love the Island. Irene's grandfather, Enos Lundy, had been a lighthouse keeper at Michael's Bay on Manitoulin. Madame Cadieux was further convinced with a litany of positive testimonials about Minde-

It was in 1941 that Rochelle's Charles left for war. "I was fourand-a-half and my little brother Paul was just three-weeks-old. I saw my mother crying as he was leaving and I said to her, 'Mommy, don't cry: he'll be back.' Somehow. I knew." Another early memory was the Rock Garden Terrace. "The owner, an American woman, had an amazing garden that extended down to the lake. We visited every June. I was impressed and decided I would live on that side of the lake one day."

Irene and her children lived in Mindemoya, on dad's war pay, in a very small house with no running water, no indoor toilet and no electricity. "We had to chop wood daily and carry drinking water from Nevill's Garage." There was a cistern for wash water in the basement. The milk sat on the window sill in the winter: in summer, the ice house cooled spoilable items. "I learned to cook on a wood stove

and bathe in a small square tin tub. As the girl, I got the tub first and the males came last. In the winter, we melted snow; in the summer, we swam. Mother would take us in the wagon to the Ketchankookem Trail where we could swim on the private beach. Later, with the help of her friends, Irene added some space and siding to the house, including a porch." came home from

Charles Europe in 1946 decorated with many medals and a humility about the war experience. "They tried to make heroes out of us but we were scared much of the time and we just did what we had to do to protect our country," he claimed. "I didn't know my dad when he came home; he was different. As a sergeant, he liked to bark out orders. We weren't used to that, but we had to obey. After dad returned we got electricity, a bathroom with running water, lights, a furnace and a fridge. Dad added a garage with a playroom on top. We loved to play store there.

"In later years, I always wondered how women got through the war years alone. They persisted but were never recognized for their contribution. I did chores for my mother, helped with the garden and went to the store for food each day. Perhaps that's what other families did too," Rochelle muses. "We had a big garden. The summer and after dad got home, we started to sell vegetables in Mindemoya. That year I got a bike and figure skates for my birthday. That was very special and skating at the arena became a favourite pastime.'

Sister Sherry was born nine months after the war ended. Michelle and Pierre were added to the family years later when Rochelle was 21 and in nurses' training. The family addition that year was Michelle and Pierre two years after that. "When I was 14, we opened Cadieux Clothing and moved to a space above the store. We bought our first vehicle, a halfton truck.'

"I remember my Grade 1 teacher Winnie Cox when she announced one day, 'We are going to draw a rabbit.' Apparently, my bunny impressed her because she held it up. That day I realized I had a talent. It was my first inkling that I could draw." While brother Paul was off with the boys fishing, Rochelle spent her spare time studying plants, leaves, lines and shapes. "At that time, I didn't realize that process part of being an artist."

Rochelle's first paintings were on Masonite with oil paints she got for Christmas. "I remember getting permission to watch local artist Joe Hodgins, the owner of Treasure Island, paint. He realized I was serious about art." Another hobby was collecting bugs and butterflies that were positioned on wax with a suitable background that Rochelle painted. She won a prize at the Provi-

dence Bay Fair. "In Grade 11, I had Miss Conisten who taught Ancient History. I was so impressed with Nefertiti, a powerful woman in her time in ancient Egypt. I learned about Hadrian's Wall, the Wall of China, Pompeii and the Roman Coliseum, all fascinating places that I saw later in life when Wayne took me there. One year, I found a bust of Nefertiti on a sale table in Florida and I just had to have her. She symbolized strength and independence to me. She now sits

on my art table."

Grade 13 in Mindemoya found Rochelle the only girl in a class of nine boys. She finished her year in Little Current where there was one other girl to befriend. She stayed with the Boyters, the postmaster family of Little Current. "As a youngster, I only wanted to be a nurse. Florence Nightingale had impressed me when she cured her sick dog. I had a dog and I wanted to make sure I would be able to make him well too."

Marilyn McCutcheon, a nurse at Wellesley Hospital in Toronto, impressed the young lass too. "She was from Mindemoya and, at 18, I fell into her footsteps. I took nursing training at Wellesley Hospital, a popular training location in Toronto." The course lasted two years and was followed by a year of interning at minimum wage

In 1960, while she took another year of training at Western University, Rochelle met a very handsome man who played varsity football. "We met at the fall fair after a friend had showed me a booklet issued by the university. Wayne, the captain of the football team, was on the cover. I told her that I could never meet such a handsome man." It was not long before she met that handsome man in the school cafeteria.

She told him all about Manitoulin, her enthusiasm evoking a quest for a date from Wayne for the upcoming football weekend at Western. She agreed to go. Then he offered her a smoke. She took it and began to cough. "You don't smoke, do you?" he asked. "No, I was trying to impress you," she said. Wayne responded, "if you are trying to impress me, don't smoke." After the long weekend Wayne met his new friend at the train and took ner nome. That was the start of their romance. Rochelle was soon the envy of many young ladies who had also had their eye on Wayne Neal. "Looking back, I was not really confident with men until I met Wavne." she shares.

"I remember the first time I brought Wayne to Manitoulin after our engagement in late March. It was Easter and a blinding snowstorm hit. We had borrowed Wayne's father's car to make the trip." Wayne could see nothing but snow for miles and the roads were curving and dangerous. By the time they got to Mindemoya, it was dark and visibility was zero. "Where in the hell are you taking me?" he finally blurted out to his betrothed. Rochelle accepted his frustration with confidence because she knew it was only an introduction to a wonderful place, seen at its worst in the dark of a late-winter snowstorm.

The couple was married on

June 10, 1961 in the United Church in Mindemoya. Lorene Smith played the organ. Wayne's and Rochelle's sisters were attendants. Michelle was just twoyears-old. There was a dinner followed later by sandwiches and coffee. "The flowers, orchids and lily of the valley for me, cost \$80 and came out of the \$100 we had for the honeymoon. This left \$20 for our little get-away to Sault Ste. Marie for two relaxing days of watching the freighters pass by."

After the honeymoon, the newlyweds came back to Manitoulin, then headed to St. Thomas, Wayne's home town. Rochelle worked as a community nurse, and Wayne taught history in high school. He also coached sports teams for the physical education program. He became the head of the history department, then moved on to vice-principal, then principal of the school and later Superintendent of Education for St. Thomas.

The couple has two sons, Murray and Andrew. Murray has an MBA and works on Bay Street in Toronto as a chief financial officer of Scotia McLeod Securities. Andrew also has his MBA and he is a pharmaceutical representative for Astra-Seneca Pharmaceutical Company. "We have four grandsons and one granddaughter." Murray's son Brendan is in his third year at the University of Toronto where he is taking specialized computer science. Second son Ryan is 13 and goes to a private school in the city. He is a good pianist and a talented hockey player. Son Andrew lives in Calgary and his son Conor, 16, is very athletic too. Daughter Emma loves horse-back riding and son Jack, 10, is a good goalie. "We visited them earlier this spring.

Although working after marriage was frowned on by the older generation, namely Wayne's dad, Rochelle's hubby felt that would be fine. Working part-time, she could spend more time with the kids and still enjoy her career. When Andrew was three, Rochelle started into full-time nursing again. There was a high demand for this profession. "I loved community nursing and helped set up and coordinate a pre-natal program and curricula for other courses. I enjoyed the teaching aspect and much of the work was done in private homes.'

Rochelle transferred to home care nursing under the Community Care Access Centre for the area. She was promoted from case manager to assistant director of patient services (home care) and palliative care for the organization, overseeing a staff of 65. She retired at age 58. Meanwhile, Wayne had become Superintendent of Education for St. Thomas and he also became mayor of the city. His extensive community work included setting up a Big Brothers' Association. Despite this hectic schedule, Wayne was also a big help with his own fami-

The Neals did a lot of travelling with the kids. Wayne's high school travelling teams, canoeing in Algonquin, back-packing in the Rockies, excursions to forts and battleships, everywhere in North America. "We saw it all." The family always had a dog, including two tov poodles. Now sweet 17year-old Maggie, who is deaf, lives with the couple. "Our pets were always a close part of our family. I still cheer for all the rescued dogs I see on Manitoulin Pet Rescue.'

When family circumstances

called her back to Manitoulin, Rochelle knew what she needed to do. Her mother suffered with Alzheimer's. The Neals bought a farm house in Rockville. She helped take care of her mum as her dad needed help. Finally, mum was admitted to the Lodge in Gore Bay, not long before she died.

'When Michelle became ill, I kept a promise to my mum made long ago, to care for her." Rochelle stayed with friends Rose and John Diebolt for a year and then lived with Rosemary and Dwayne Thompson. "I got to know my sister quite well. I remember going with her to the surgeon and the first thing he said to her was 'I am so glad you brought someone with you.' I knew I needed to be strong because she needed surgery right

sharing stories, painting, driving around and moving forward before she died. It's been seven years now, but some strong family love happened first. Regretfully too, my brother Paul left us three years ago and Sherry's daughter passed away at age 35. All our family members died of cancer." In later years, dad Charles married again, to Irene Tann, and they lived in Mindemova.

"In 1995, we made the decision to live on the Island each summer. We bought this old cottage on the same side of the lake as the Rock Garden Terrace that I have admired since I was a child. This place had the view and it is peaceful and quiet, a perfect summer get-away.

Favourite seasons are spring with all the trilliums, as well as fall with the splendid colours that abound. "I can't wait to get here in the spring to enjoy the trilliums and the Periwinkle that blankets the ground and surrounds the studio. Wayne learned carpentry skills from family and friends. He built me the studio so that my watercolours would not cover our kitchen table. I love it in here." Wayne also cuts the matts to help Rochelle with the framing.

"Art has been a focus for much of my life, starting as a youngster." The writer is shown a painting of a deer in the woods and is remined of her own first painting of a deer at the same age. Rochelle's artistic pursuits attained a new level after the kids had grown and she retired. "Each year, we spend two months in Florida where I do group-painting with an artist named Robert Long. Up to that point, I had never done watercolours and he urged me to 'just start painting' the first time I joined their group.'

On Manitoulin, Rochelle worked with Christie Pearson Anderson, Linda Williamson and Judy Martin to get the Manitoulin Fine Arts Association up and running. "It started in Gore Bay with an art and quilting group and grew to include other forms of art. I worked on some NOAA shows as well." Rochelle is also a member of art associations in London and St. Thomas. Up until recently she was also a member of the Botanical Artists of Canada.

"Gardening is another favourite pastime and I still love to walk in the woods," she said. "I fell two weeks ago and was reminded of my age by my husband. I am 80 but I feel like 39. I do love doing meaningful stuff, see-



To date, since 1981, the Little Current Terry Fox Run has raised \$85,277.


Prior to this year's run, Ms. Rosenbaum thanked the many volunteers this year including the Manitoulin Amateur Radio Club.

"Terry's Marathon of Hope took place in 1980 with the simple objective of informing Canadians of the importance of finding a cure for cancer," stated a press release from the Terry Fox Foundation. "With fierce determination, he ran an average of 42 kilometres (26 miles) every day for 143 days. Terry was forced to end his run on September 1, 1980 when the cancer spread to his lungs. By February 1, 1981, Terry's dream of raising \$1 for every Canadian was realized – the Terry Fox Marathon of Hope fund totaled \$24.17 million. Terry died in June 1981. In 1980, his Marathon of Hope inspired a country and launched the annual The Terry Fox Run in his honour. Now in its fourth decade, these events continue to motivate people here in Canada and around the world, raising much needed funds for cancer research.'

Missouri woman seeks to be first to circumnavigate all the Great Lakes in one season

LITTLE CURRENT—Traci Lynn Martin hails from Kansas, Missouri (not Kansas City, Kansas she admonishes), which is a long way from the big water of the likes of Lake Superior or Lake Huron, but the competitive surf ski paddler has set her sights on being the first person to circumnavigate all of the Great Lakes in one season—and looking at the schedule, she is quite likely to pull it off.


Ms. Martin stopped by the North Channel dock of Roy and Margaret Eaton and she and her logistical support driver and co-ordinator Marv Kuziel joined the Little Current couple at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre for dinner last Monday evening, where The Expositor caught up with them.

"Two men have tried before but failed," she said. "No woman has ever attempted it." Ms. Martin has already completed the rounds of Lake Superior and Lake Michigan, making her the first to complete those lakes in a surf ski (a type of sea-going racing kayak). She has clocked exactly 2,530 miles so far (impressive, but it sounds so much more so as 4,071.64 kilometers, tease the Canadians at the table).

When her journey is complete, she will have completed 4,000 to 5,000 miles (6437.376 and 8046.72 kilometers, respectively), depending on the route she takes. "I originally thought it would be 5,800 miles (9334.195 kilometers)," she admitted, with a number of spots she would have liked to have paddled through, "but it is more important to finish off all five legs.'

"A surf ski is similar to a kayak," she explains, "except that the paddler sits atop the vessel rather than inside it. A surf ski is typically longer than a kayak, with a deeper cockpit. Despite its typical instability, a surf ski (with an experienced paddler) is a very effective craft for paddling in big surf and waves. Surf Skis were created in Australia."

Ms. Martin started out on her odyssey on March 9, slipping into ice-filled waters in a wet suit and pushing her way through the slush and ice flows of early spring breakup, towing her kayak behind her. "It's okay if

she pulls it herself," noted Mr. Kuziel, who was allowed to break a trail through the ice ahead of her, but not allowed to touch the kayak itself. She plans to finish her journey into the Guiness World Book of Records (as the longest documented nonstop voyage by kayak) by December 31. "Actually, I am hoping to finish before that so I can spend Christmas with family and friends," she said.

Currently, according to Guinness World Records, the longest solo journey by a surf ski is by Gerhard Moolman (South Africa) when he covered a distance of 3,822 miles (6,152 km) on a surf ski between Hout Bay, South Africa, and Lamu, Kenya, from 20 April to 23 October 2002.

Ms. Martin's face is wind burnt and sun scorched, the backs of her hands are red and frankly look quite painful. She suffers from rheumatoid arthritis and had to cut short her paddling the day before due to a

So why is the American nurse and competitive paddler undertaking this ordeal, a challenge that has defeated two men before her? Is it the bragging rights? No.

"I work as a nurse," she said. "A lot of

people who come into the hospital have given up on life. But you have to get up, you have to do it. They say to me 'I hurt too bad.' I do understand, but you can't. No matter what illness you have, you cannot give up. You have to keep doing the things that you love. You will find life is better if you keep doing those things you love doing. But whatever you do, don't give up on life. Ms. Martin has a message.

Where on her journey so far has she loved what she is doing the most? She doesn't hesitate. "The Apostle Islands, paddling through the sea caves," she said. "Pukaskwa National Park on the Canadian side. The North Channel has been very special, Sleeping Bear was very spiritual.'

The sculptures include: 'The Globe' by Hooman Mehdizadehjafari, a laser-cut steel sphere on a pedestal which will be located at the picnic area near the entrance to the east side of the Kagawong River Trail; 'Great Lakes Trees' by Kathryn Corbiere, two jack pine trees and one Great Lakes tree which will be located at Sandy Beach off of Maple Drive; 'White Tail Deer' by Robert Cram, a highly polished bronze that will patina over time, located at the west side of the Kagawong River Trail downriver of the blue footbridge; a sculpture by KWEST, Matt McNaught, which will be located near the entrance of the Kagawong River Trail by the tennis courts; 'Ascend/Transcend' by Ted Fullerton, three cold cast, resin figures on steel lifts, located on the Park Centre Lawn; 'Drum Circle' by Quinn Smallboy, a welded steel drum, on the Kagawong downtown lawn near chess set; and the Community Sculpture Project with Cree architect Jake Chakasim.

...continued from page 3 also as a home for Benjamin and Mary Bock and their family.'

In 1897, the building became a post office and Mr. Bock served as postmaster from August 1, 1897 until February 2, 1903. "The post office was originally called Cavemount but renamed Spring Bay Post Office on November 1, 1897," Ms. Fraser added.

By 1990, the log building was owned by Mr. Bock's great grandson, Harold Tracy. He and his wife Mary Jo donated the building to the (then) Kagawong Historical Society. "Volunteers disassembled it and relocated it to the Village of Kagawong

at a location behind Manitoulin Chocolate Works,' she added. "In the summer of 2008, it was moved to its present location became part of the Old Mill Heritage Centre.'

Ms. Fraser, on behalf of the board, thanked its predecessor, the Kagwong Historical Society, for all of the work they accomplished "in preserving Billings Township and Manitoulin histo-

Billings Mayor Austin Hunt told the audience that the building, which he had a sneak peek at, "has been delightfully restored."

The mayor said he recalled when the municipality first received the former post office from the Tracy farm, joking that he thought it may have contained chickens at some point due to the number of feathers it contained, nor did it have a roof.

"I hope that when you look at it you'll be happy with what we've done, Mayor Hunt said.

Lisa Corbiere-Addison, a member of the Ontario Trillium Grant Review Team, was on hand to give her congratulations.

"I would like to congratulate the Township of Billings on receiving a \$16,000 Ontario 150 Community Capital Program grant from the Government of Ontario," Ms. Corbiere-Ms. Corbiere-Addison said.

"Since your request for

funding was to repair and preserve the Post Office Museum, the Government of Ontario could see the benefit in upgrading and reinforcing the building's interior and exterior as well as improving wheelchair accessibility.'

"The great thing about this renovation is that it will ensure the continuation of welcoming some 4,000 visitors and local residents annually," added.

MPPMike Mantha acknowledged the workmanship and heritage contained in buildings such as the Post Office Museum. Having such heritage, he added, is a reflection on the leadership of a community.

"The south may have their 'Hurricane' (referencing long-time former Mississauga mayor Hazel McCallion), but we'll keep our Wizard of Aus!" he laughed.

The Old Mill Heritage Centre and Post Office Museum is open Wednesday to Sunday from 11 am to 4 pm. Be sure to check out the Lester B. Pearson display while you still can, on now until Thanksgiving Weekend.

ough Chinese Baptist Church that purchased the farm property in 2002.'

In January 2014, a group of volunteers, the Vimy Oaks Legacy Corporation, decided to repatriate offspring of these descendent oaks back to Vimy Ridge, whose oak trees had all been destroyed in the First World War. These Vimy oak saplings will be planted in the Vimy Foundation Centennial Park, adjacent to the Canadian national Vimy Memorial site, as part of centennial commemorations in France in 2017 and 2018.

The non-profit Vimy Oaks Legacy Corporation has undertaken to offer Vimy oak saplings grown in Canada for sale to qualifying organizations and individuals to be planted at commemorative sites throughout Canada to honour the soldiers who fought at Vimy Ridge and other battles during the First World War.



...continued from page 1 demoya Old School's imminent demise.

"When one travels to Europe, much of the United States, South America or even some spots in Canada," wrote former student Lynn Quesnel in a missive to The Expositor, "some of the most interesting and visited sites are those with some sort of historical significance. In Collingwood, where we spend part of the year, an old hotel that was in disrepair and had a very bad reputation, has been restored. Again, a couple of young entrepreneurs saw the potential in the beautiful old structure. Now it houses galleries, shops and a café. It is an extremely popular spot that draws people from all over." The Quesnels went on to question the rush to demolish the historical structure and called for a rallying effort to convince council to pause before pushing the demolition button.

Among the photographs and memories that have come "over the transom," in newspaper parlance, is the following excerpt supplied to The Expositor and taken from page 13 of the first Manitoulin Continuation School Year Book, circa June 1923: "Returning to the Manitoulin after several years' absence, I decided that I should like to visit Mindemoya. I had been informed that with the coming of the railroad (to Little Current), the village had quickly grown into a town, and consequently, I was anxious to see it myself.

"As I passed along the road, the first thing that attracted my attention was the changed appearance of the school, instead of a onestory building, there was a fine two-story, eight-roomed school. The next thing was the school grounds. They now occupied about eight acres and as my eyes glanced across them I saw beds of flowers and vegetables, a basketball field, a football field and, last but not least, a baseball diamond. Looking over the sights nearer at hand I noticed the beautiful fences and walks.

"I made my way into the school and was met by a member of the staff who conducted me around and showed me the features of the building. In the hall there was a tablet with the the staff since the school was built, at the head of the list were the names of Messrs. Purdy, Foran and Pierce.

"After looking around the public school rooms which were on the first floor, I was taken upstairs, where the four High School rooms were located. There were three classrooms and a science room. I was told that there were now one hundred and thirty-five students in attendance and that all the boys took agriculture in lieu of science. Before leaving the upper rooms, I asked about the ventilation facilities and was told that they were now controlled by a secret electric wire to the boiler room. Then I made my way out but took a look at the Community Hall, which was now turned into a gymnasium with complete equipment.

I went away happy that I had been able to recall so many familiar scenes and my thoughts turned to a line of poetry, 'And the thoughts of men are widened with the process of the suns'.

Since the history of Min-Consolidated demova School is closely tied to the development of the educational system in the Mindemoya area we will begin with a brief outline of the history of education in this

The late Douglas Lanktree compiled a history of the building of the Mindemoya Old School with the assistance of an original article by Marvin Clarke, school records and assistance by Mike Smith and Mary Ann McCutcheon.

"The first settlers in this area of Carnarvon Township, the Vincers, McDon-Galbraiths alds. and Elliotts arrived in 1872-73. They were joined in 1874 by the Hodgsons, Kings and Caddells in 1876 to establish a thriving pioneer community.

"School Section No. 1, Carnarvon, was organized in the year 1876 and a log school house was built to the north of the main intersection in 1877. This building burned and was replaced by another log building about 1880. As the population increased and the school became crowded an agitation was begun in 1893 to have the section divided with the dividing line being the twentieth sideroad which runs north and south through the town of Mindemoya. This proposal was turned down by Carnarvon council and a new frame building was built just west of the main intersection of the town.

"By 1918 the population to hire a second teacher and consider expansion. Again there was a movement to divide the school section and build two schools. This time the movement was more successful. Council divided the school section, and two sets of trustees were elected with Mr. David Wyman acting as secretary

for both boards. Plans were made for the building of two schools, one in the east and the other in the west end of the section.

"At this time a counter movement was established by some of the more progressive ratepayers with a plan to establish a Consolidated School comprising sections one and four to serve all pupils from grade one to grade twelve. This plan proved to be popular since it encompassed the improvement ofhigh school education whereas previously some pupils took Grades 9 and 10 in the elementary school and others went to Owen Sound, Sault Ste. Marie etc. for further education.

"Plans were made, debentures were issued and the Consolidated school was built, reportedly the first and certainly one of the first Consolidated Schools in Ontario where more than one school section was served and pupils from grades one to twelve were educated in the same build-

ing.
"The (then-new Mindemoya) school opened in 1921 and one of the informants for this article, Mike Smith, being a bright ambitious young lad at that time, was the first student to enter the building on the morning of the day that it opened.

"With the opening of the Consolidated School, another first in the Province of Ontario became necessary. The first school buses to operate under contract were established to bring the pupils from the far corners of the joint sections. One of the contracts went to Finn McDermid who brought in the pupils from the west end of the section in a canvas covered wagon in summer and a canvas covered sleigh in winter, both drawn by horses. The second contract went to crat with a fringed top in summer and the covered sleigh in winter to bring in the east end pupils.'

Pat Costigan and Norma Hughson, along with other present and past members of the Central Manitoulin Historical Society, compiled an extensive list of historical nuggets, which were then forwarded on to The Expositor by Lynn Quesnel.

The Mindemoya Consolidated School was completed in 1922 by Charters and Brown, a construction firm from Sault Ste. Marie.

"In its first year of operation, the new school housed 35 to 40 high school level students.

The new school building originally served dual purposes. The rooms on the right were the public school while the rooms on the left comprised the continuation school (aka high school). A large recreation room was situated on the east side and on the west side, separated by the furnace room, was a hot lunch room, while on the right side there was a storage or supply room, according to an introduction in Central Manitoulin Councillor Linda Farquhar's 1959 yearbook.

Each classroom had a cloakroom for outdoor clothing and the classroom windows were (and are) very large, which kept the rooms bright and reduced the need for artificial lighting. Likely there was many a daydream as students gazed out onto the fields outside on a sunny day.

Half of the basement of the Mindemoya Old School served as a community

"My 89-year-old mother (Nola Haner) remembers playing badminton in the basement," recalled one contributor. "She also remembers that after the war, a victory garden was planted and tended by students, with the school custodian taking over in the summer while the students were away."

The first school buses or vans were sleighs drawn by teams of horses in the winter and covered wagons in the summer, as evidenced by a photograph supplied by a contributor.

school fair was a very big event every year and once the arena next door was built, it was used to house the fair. The last of those school fairs was held in 1969, but then less than a decade later, Central Manitoulin Public School revived the school fair and it is, once again, a very big event for the Mindemoya community, complete with a parade through the streets from the school to the arena.

The playground was huge and included quite a lot of mixed forests. In the spring a favourite trick for the older boys was apparently secretly eating leeks at recess so the teacher would send them home because of the resulting odour.

In wintertime part of the schoolyard was used to play broomball and for skating.

By 1944, the heating system was updated and in the enrollment increased so much that the community hall in the basement was made into two more classrooms, one for Grade 7 and 8 and another to expand the Continuation School. By 1959 Central Manitoulin High School had been built, so the whole Old School became dedicated to the elementary level students.

In 1969 Manitoulin Secondary School was built in what was then called West Bay (now M'Chigeeng) and the Mindemoya Old School became the junior public school for Grades 1 to 4 and the old high school housed Grades 5, 8 and Kindergarten. When all the elementary grades moved to the senior school, the municipality took over ownership of the Mindemoya Old school and it housed the municipal offices and library and a plaque by the front door, placed there by the Canada Council, indicates the building honours the memory of long-time Carnarvon Reeve and businessman Farquhar Anglin.

When then Reeve Tom Farquhar envisioned a new municipal building, part of the selling point was that the rental of the office space in the Mindemoya Old School building would offset the cost of the new building.

The building went on to be used for a variety of purposes such as dental offices, government offices, toy library, law office, health unit, among other things. The last tenant was a lawyer who made extensive renovations to her unit before being asked to vacate earlier this year.

Now the Mindemoya Old School lies silent and dark, without hydro or heating, waiting for its fate to be decided by the Central Manitoulin council at its September 28 meeting.

Northeast Town council about the project and a partnership with Noojmowin Teg and they (the municipality) offered us this land. Now, Phase 1 is almost compete and we have created something for the community."

Mr. Tilson spoke about how Phase 1 included the 100 square-foot all-season greenhouse and community garden, but that they would like to develop the space further in the

The five-year project plan includes: two 1,200 sq/ft greenhouses for food production and municipal composting in 2018; a large 5,000-10,000 sq/ft greenhouse for scaled commercial production and aquaculture in 2019; and a food hub including a commercial kitchen and cold storage facil-

ities, spin out businesses such as a plant nursery, styrocrete construction, cidery, mushroom production and local recycling in 2020-2021.

Mr. Hamalainen spoke about the challenge of designing and building an all-season greenhouse.

"It was a really interesting challenge figuring out how to build an all-season greenhouse in an affordable and sustainable way," said Mr. Hamalainen.

He and Mr. Tilson spoke about how they were able to create insulation by using styrofoam from the landfill and shredding it and mixing it with concrete. Noojmowin Teg Health Centre Executive Director Pam

Williamson spoke about the history of the project and the

...continued from page 1 gious from person to person, or from animal to person

Activities which disturb damp soil or rotting wood, such as digging or raking, may release the fungus into the air. The fungus is found in moist acidic soil in parts of Northern Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Quebec as well as other areas around the Great Lakes and Mississippi Valley.

Although this is a rare infection, it is important to know how to reduce exposure to the fungus when working in moist soil area, such as under the house, cottage, porch, or shed. Simple precautions include wearing work gloves, proper footwear, long pants, long-sleeved shirts, and a disposable NIOSH N100 approved HEPA filter dust mask.

The symptoms of blastomycosis can be similar to those of influenza or pneu-

monia. "If you have a persistent cough, muscle aches, joint pain, tiredness, chills, low-grade fever, skin sores or unexplained weight loss, let your health care provider know that you may have been exposed to the fungus that causes blastomycosis," said Rylan Yade, an environmental support officer at the SDHU. "They will want to know if you have been in a high-risk area and in contact with moist soil." People typically become sick between 21 and 100 days after being exposed to the fungus. If the infection is left untreated, blastomycosis may be fatal."

An email from Health Canada, which is working with the community on blasto, states, "in response to several cases of blastomycosis in Sheshegwaning First Nation, a Health Canada Environmental Health Officer (EHO) visited the community on September 13. The EHO met with the community leadership and provided information about blastomycosis, including signs and symptoms and how the disease can be acquired, through a well-attended community presentation.

"A public health investigation has been initiated to collect information with the objective of learning more about this disease and if whether a source of exposure can be determined. As blastomycosis is an uncommon illness, the findings of this investigation may contribute to a better understanding of the disease."

Chief Roy indicated, "I had called in an environmental health officer (through Health Canada) to investigate and to have a community information session on how the infection is contracted and provide information on what blastomycosis is and how it can be prevented."

'We have not determined at this time what might have caused the spike in occurrences," stated Chief Roy. "But as part of the investigation, they (Health Canada) will be trying to find commonalities between those affected to determine a cause. We live in the endemic region for blastomycosis (where it is most prevalent), and it's not always possible to avoid exposure to this organism. This disease is actually rare, and hard to catch. You have to be in contact with the soil and breathe in the spores, and it is not passed on from person to person or from an animal to a person."

"The reason I wanted to call in the EHO team is

that the community was in a state of panic and were looking for answers," said Chief Roy. "Things are a little calmer in the community right now. The focus is on education and prevention."

Chief Roy noted that for

those persons identified with having blastomycosis "even though they are responding well to treatment, it is a long road ahead. They will have to be on medication for six months."

tered as such," he explained. "Even though it was drawn up, and the maps and diagrams are very pretty and detailed, it was never properly registered."

In order to circumvent the challenge of the consolidation of the property, a previous owner had come up with an innovative, if problematic, solution. "They checker boarded it," he said.

The mayor explained that two property lots with the same owner would normally be consolidated into a single parcel of land. The previous owners used separate companies in which to hold the adjacent lots, thereby ensuring they would be kept as separate pieces of land.

"Now my understanding is that the new owner has put all of the lots under the same company," said the mayor. "That would merge those individual lots into one large parcel."

There are still over 100 owners of individual lots within the overall boundaries of the larger Carter Bay properties and a large number of those owners, along with the current owner of the larger parcel Carter Bay Properties LLC (aka former Little Current resident Michael Bailey), have opposed any development. But another group of property owners have built structures, most of them out of sight (out of mind), in apparent contravention of the town's long standing policy of not allowing development: building permits are not issued by the municipality for any construction at Carter Bay.

"We have to determine what that word 'development' means," said

Mayor Stephens.

There are two parts to the issue, according to the mayor.

"The first is that the building we are currently talking about, the owner claims is 10 foot by 10 foot, so is under the 100 square feet size where you don't need to get a building permit," he said. "So is a 100 square-foot building really 'development'? Two, it falls down to a bit of interpretation and so we are seeking Ministry (of Municipal Affairs and Housing) direction on the matter."

As to the other "hidden" structures that have so far been off the radar: "We have heard rumours of that sort of thing," said the mayor. "I think that when the Manitoulin Planning Board's overhead system is in place a lot of those places will be picked up."

Dr. Stinson learned about the study from Dr. Michelle Evason who did a talk on lyme disease at a conference he attended earlier this year, stressing the need for more information about where dogs are contracting lyme disease and how to prevent it. The study's goal is to gather data on where ticks are in Canada and how to prevent the disease, as well as how to better manage the problem.

The study is being conducted by Dr. Scott Weese and Dr. Michelle Evason of the Department of Pathobiology at the University of Guelph.

"The purpose of the study is to enroll pet owners and their puppies (seven months of age or younger) that will be followed for evaluation of exposure to ticks carrying Borrelia Burdoferi (the cause of lyme disease) and their possible development of signs of illness due to lyme disease," the consent form to participate in the research study states. "This is part of a larger long-term (lifetime) lyme disease and canine health study.'

The study will involve drawing blood from the

participating puppy at the age of seven months (or less) and repeated every 6-12 months. The puppy owner will also be asked to complete an electronic or telephone questionnaire on the puppy at six-month intervals over the course of the study (three years). Commitment to the initial phase (three years) does not commit participants to the later phases of the study, but it is hoped that, long-term, the puppies and their owners will participate throughout the dog's life. Participating in the study is free for the owner: they are simply responsible for bringing the puppy in for the blood tests and filling out the questionnaires. As well, if a tick is found

on the puppy, the owners are asked to submit it for testing.

Symptoms of lyme disease in canines include: fever, loss of appetite, reduced energy, lameness and generalized stiffness, discomfort or pain.

While none of the puppies enrolled in the study have tested positive for lyme disease, Scott Veterinary Services has seen numerous cases this year.

"My practice on Manitoulin has had seven cases of canine lyme disease this year," he said. This is in addition to the six cases that The Expositor reported last year between the Island Animal Hospital and Scott Veterinary Services

"We will be doing blood tests on the dogs at the six month check-in, which for many will be around December of this year or January 2018," Dr. Stinson explained. "We will be looking for seroconvert—if they have been in contact with the disease."

Dr. Stinson said he has seen a large growth in the number of ticks and as a result has added the lyme disease vaccination as part of their core vaccinations.

"We want to make the public aware that ticks and lyme disease are here," he added. "We have been disappointed with the (Sudbury and District) Health Unit response."

The study is still taking more puppies. If you have a puppy seven months old or younger, you can contact Scott Veterinary Services in Mindemoya for more information or to join the study.

Pastor Paul recently moved to Manitoulin from Cochrane, but officially started at the Little Current and Sheguiandah United Churches on July 1 of this year.


He is no stranger to Northern Ontario, growing up in Kirkland Lake.

"I didn't start in the ministry right away," explained Pastor Paul. "I worked for Northland Telecommunications for 24 years as a telecommunications tech. The job took me all over—I spent a lot of time in Timmins, but also Moosonee, Hearst and Swastika."

"In 2009 I finally decided that I wanted to serve the church and ministry," Pastor Paul continued. "I asked the church (the United Church of Canada) and started the discernment process. A group was formed to help me identify if this was my calling. After a year and a half they made the decision based on my philosophies and my faith focus and decided that my interests and skills would be suited to becoming a minister."

Pastor Paul started the Designated Lay Ministry Program (DLM), a three-year work-study program that trains individuals to be a minister as they work.

Pastor Paul. "It was a fulltime job, so I quite my job at Northland—I just felt called to work in the ministry."

Pastor Paul worked at St. Paul's United Church in Cochrane as he completed the DLM program, which included online distance education courses as well as twice a year extensive twoweek sessions in Saskatchewan.

"I completed the course in the fall of 2016 and was the minister at St. Paul's until earlier this year," he said, noting that he had to leave due to budget restraints and the church no longer being able to have a full-time minister. "I needed a full-time ministry position and applied to Manitoulin."

Pastor Paul was offered the position at the Little Current United Church Pastoral Charge and accepted. "I was really impressed with the congregation, the people and the area " he shared

Since starting at the pastoral charge in July, Pastor Paul said he felt that the both the congregations and community have been very welcoming.

"Little Current, and Manitoulin in general, is a very friendly place," he said. "People are often willing to stop and chat and the church has gone out of its way to be accommodating, as I wasn't able to move to Manitoulin right away. I went to the meetings ahead of time and we were thrilled when they asked us to hold the social at the end. We had a number of volunteers from the church who helped with the barbecue. We were really impressed with the gathering and hope to host it again next year.'

Pastor Paul also plans to bring technology to the pulpit, incorporating Power-Point into the Sunday service.

"With PowerPoint I can project the hymns up on to the screen," he explained. "Rather than people holding a book and singing into their book, they can look up and project. It also allows me to incorporate a lot of extras like video clips, pictures or songs. I find that it sets a different mood and really enhances the service. I did it at St. Paul's and it was well received."

The new pastor has also introduced an open door day on Wednesdays from 1:30 pm until 5 pm. "It is open to anyone who wants to come in and sit, meditate, pray or even knit," Pastor Paul said. "I also try to keep regular office hours Mondays to Fridays from 9 am to 5 pm."

The Little Current United Church (LCUC) is located on Robinson Street in Little Current, with Sunday worship from 10 am to 11 am.

There will be a Saint Francis of Assisi pet blessing at LCUC this Sunday, October 1 at the 10 am service which is open to the congregation and community. People are invited to bring their pets (caged) or a photo of their pet.

If world-wide repentance, especially by "The Harlot: Babylon The Great", also known as USA) has not occurred, then on Sept. 23, 2017 there will be signs in the sun, moon, stars, & Earth, signalling the start of End Times by a unique celestial alignment in the Constellation Virgo, attracting attention from many (ie. similar to the Star of Bethlehem for the Three Wisemen). [Ed.: This has already occurred, as predicted]

Soon after the **Sept. 23 2017** sign, there will be a 7 yr. interim peace agreement proposed for Israel and the Middle East, where Israel will be forced to give up some of its lands so as to achieve peace. This peace agreement will violate God's Covenant with Israel for the lands that God promised will belong to Israel forever. All or most world governments, religions, media, NGO's and other groups will support the peace deal, saying **'land for peace'**, "**peace'** and "**peace and security'**. The deal will include permitting Israel to immediately rebuild the Third Temple in Jerusalem, and re-start daily offerings and animal sacrifices to God. The status of the city Jerusalem will remain in dispute for this interim peace agreement.

God's hand has interceded to prevent nuclear war for many decades. When mankind dares to violate God's Covenant with Israel via this "land for peace" deal, God will remove his steadying hand, and nuclear war will no longer be prevented by God. According to human nature, without God's help, the risks of nuclear war are huge. There are between 15,000 to 23,000 nuclear bombs and ICBM's that exist today; most of which will be used during WW III. WW III will last 60 minutes, and will kill about 2.5 Billion people in all NATO countries, Russia, China, N. Korea, and Middle East via nuclear weapons, chemical, and/or biological weapons. Super-EMP (Electro-Magnetic Pulse, 4 times stronger than a regular EMP) weapons will likely be used during WW III. US and other NATO militaries claim to be adequately shielded from a regular EMP weapon, but no shielding exists for any civil infrastructure systems. While an EMP nuclear device won't kill anybody directly, experts suggest 90% of people will be dead within 10 years of an EMP attack due to loss of all electrical electronic systems that modern society relies upon (eg. EMP destroys all electrical/electronic systems, resulting in NO electricity, drinking water, heating & air conditioning, sewage, refrigeration, food distribution, grocery stores, fuel production & distribution, Internet, phones, TV, radios, etc.).

You must pay close attention to world news. When you hear "land for peace", "peace and security", and see the signing of the Interim Peace Accord, get ready to flee for your life. WW III is likely to occur immediately after the signing of the peace accord, or likely within 40 days thereafter. Before WW III starts, God's angels will call His chosen people to flee to safety. Major roads and gas stations may be blocked by traffic jams created by others fleeing, so you must flee long before this event, or be self-reliant and continuously prepared to flee on a moments notice. I believe that Manitoulin Island, Ontario, Canada is one of the safest places in North America to which people can flee (or continue to live).

Hide in remote or rural areas that are at least 35 km. distant (radius for 50% chance of 3rd degree burns from nuclear airburst), or if ground burst, radioactive fallout zone will be 30 km - 185 km wide by 200 - 800 km. downwind of each nuclear target. I suggest you identify a specific safe place right now, well in advance. I also suggest you buy & store emergency supplies (eg. Battery/crank/solar AM/FM/SW radio & flashlight, batteries, food, water, medications, etc.; see EMO's Build an Emergency Survival Kit, sufficient for between 3 days to 3.5 yr. supply (essentials), plus Potassium iodide (KI) tablets (Iosat, ThyroSafe, or equiv.), coveralls, gloves, boots, and respirator for protection from nuclear fallout &/or biological weapons.

Un-Sealed people who are still alive after WW III will be stunned, grief-filled, angered, depressed, and abandoned (ie. every individual is on their own, to survive the best they can). There will likely be little or no government-led rescue efforts. You're on your own, or helped by (or helping) neighbours & friends. After WW III, the Earth's 10 regional leaders will quickly delegate (or abdicate) their authority to a "One World Government" that controls everything on Earth, including all remaining nukes (so as to prevent another nuclear war). The One World Government will be run by USA, Russia, China, and the EU. Each of these leaders will plan to rule sequentially for 7 years each, rotating back into power again every 28 years. The first Council Leader (ie. our first Totalitarian World-wide Dictator) will be the Anti-Christ. The other three Council Members will never get a chance to govern due to what the Anti-Christ does in the first 7 years of his rule during the End Times.

During the first 3.5 years of Anti-Christ's reign, he will persecute Jews and un-Sealed Christians more and more, and implement the "Mark of the Beast" system, where nobody can buy or sell anything without this Mark. If you decide to take the Mark, your decision will be irrevocable. Jesus and His army will then return to Earth, and will battle triumphantly against the devil and his disciples in the War of Armageddon. The defeated devil is thrown into the lake of fire & will be tormented forever. Jesus will reap all evil humans, collecting them to a remote valley near Jerusalem where Jesus will crush them in God's winepress of wrath. The old Heaven & Earth will pass away (ie. Super Nova?), and all of God's good people will peacefully live with God and Jesus in the new Heaven and Earth forever more.






throw: \$12,000. teacher makeover; \$15,000, afternoon sports/ games; \$18,000, hypnotist. In order to partici-

It was a day of trying out new recipes. Here are two new ones that I will put in my file and keep on using.

Black Bean Cupcakes

Yes, they do taste delicious. Don't panic when you mix them and go "boy are they runny." They will bake up firm and light. I kept the frosting simple. By making it ahead and letting it solidify you can add a tsp. to the cupcake when it comes out of the oven and it will melt to a nice glaze when it cools.

- 1 can of black beans, rinsed and drained
- 6 large eggs
- 1 Tbsp vanilla 1/2 tsp sea salt
- 6 Tbsp melted coconut oil
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup maple syrup or agave syrup
- 5 Tbsp cocoa powder
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 Tbsp water

ICING:

- 1/3 cup cacao powder
- 1/4 coconut oil
- 1/4 cup maple syrup

Melt the coconut oil and mix in the maple syrup and cacao powder. Let it sit to thicken for spreading.

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350F. Spray a muffin tin with cooking spray or insert paper muffin cups.
- 2. Place the first six ingredients into a bowl, and blend in a food processor, then transfer to a large bowl.
- 3. In a separate bowl, blend all dry ingredients together well. When the dry ingredients are mixed, add to bean mixture. Add the remaining water. Mix until well-com-
- 4. Carefully fill the muffin cups to 2/3 full. Bake for 25-30 minutes. The cupcakes should be done when an inserted fork comes out clean.
- 5. Bring the cupcakes out and let sit on a rack. Add the tsp of icing and let the cupcakes cool.

Falafel

Instead of using cooked chickpeas (which most falafel recipes call for), I soaked them. The texture was crunchy and a little dry, but easy to fix with more sauce. I found that using cooked chickpeas they are too soft to hold together in the pan. In deep-frying you can use cooked chickpeas but then you are eating a "grease bomb".

- 1 cup dried chickpeas
- 1 cup packed fresh parsley plus 1/2 cup chopped fresh cilantro
 - 1/2 cup chopped red onion
 - 3 cloves garlic
 - 1 Tbsp oil 2 Tbsp lemon juice
 - 1 Tbsp ground cumin
 - 1/2 tsp salt
 - 1. Soak the chickpeas in cold water for 24 hours
- 2. Drain the chickpeas and transfer to a food processor. Add the parsley, onion, garlic, oil, lemon juice, cumin and salt. Process until finely and evenly ground. Shape into 12 patties, about 2 Tbsp each.
- 3. Heat 2 Tbsp oil in a skillet over medium heat. Cook the falafel until golden brown, 3 to 5 minutes. Turn and cook until golden on the other side.
 - 4. Top with your favourite sauce.

DOUGLAS (DOUGALL) IRVING HALL June 6, 1922 - August 27, 2017



At the age of 95 and 2 months he left us. It was a life well lived, and lived on his terms. He was a Son, Pilot, Father, Farmer, Teacher, Builder, Sailor and Friend. Born in Timmins, Ontario, he was the only son of Lenold and Grace Hall (nee Jones) and grandson of Douglas and Elizabeth Jones (nee Hutcheon). His early years were spent in Schumacher where his family worked for the McIntyre and Hollinger mines. Douglas left the north to join an uncle in Toronto to finish his schooling at North Toronto and then at Lawrence Park Collegiate. He returned to the North after his schooling and listed his oc-

cupation as miner. Douglas was one of many who flew with the RCAF during the Second World War. He joined in July 1941 at age 19, at Toronto and received his wings at Dunnville, June 19, 1942. During his time with the Air Force he was referred to as "Sammy". He under went flight training (while training others) at No 9 Bombing and Gunnery School, at both Mt. Joli and Bagotville, before going overseas with 400 Squadron on Sept 19, 1943. Douglas was then posted to 414 Squadron from 1944 to 1945 then finished his tour of duty with 411 Squadron. He was a photo-reconnaissance fighter pilot flying high and low altitude sorties, initially in Mustangs and then Spitfires. He received his first Distinguished Flying Cross while with 414 Squadron on March 29, 1945. In May of 1945 he engaged a formation of enemy aircraft at Neuntadt and downed 3 FW and one ME, while damaging two others, and he was awarded his second DFC for his exploits and he became the Squadron Ace After the cessation of hostilities before repatriation from England he was one of the first test pilots for the first Operational Jet Fighter, the Gloster Meteor. (F/L, 1941 to 1946, Photo Reconnaissance Fighter Pilot, DFC and Bar, Knight of the French National Order of the Legion of Honour (awarded 2015), Star of Germany, Star of France, 1939 to 1945 Star; 1939 to 1945 War Medal, Defense Metal, CVSM, RCAF Reserve.) While in England he met, fell in love and married Margaret Flavin, who joined him in Canada after his repatriation in March of 1946 and subsequent release on July 5, 1946. They initially set up home in Millikan, then in Barry's Bay, and finally settled on a farm outside of Uxbridge. He farmed for many years while supplementing income by working as a miner, a long distance truck driver and a lumberjack (during the winter months) in Northern Ontario. By the mid-1950's he obtained employment at GM and continued to farm and take courses in Toronto. After receiving his certification from the Radio College in Toronto, he opened his first store in Uxbridge in 1957 and two years later sold the farm and moved to the new family residence on Toronto Street. It was a busy time, finishing the new house, running his business, and raising their family, he still made time to be an active member of the community. Douglas was a Kiwanis member and was President of the Uxbridge Kiwanis Club (1964), he was on the Management Board Committee of the Uxbridge Music Hall (1966), voted onto the Uxbridge Town Council and was Deputy Reeve of Ontario County (1966 – 1969). He held executive positions with the Royal Canadian Legion, Uxbridge Branch. He was also a ham radio operator and made contacts world-wide. In 1969 he completed the Technology Program at Durham College in Oshawa. He started teaching night school while working during the day in the technology department. He continued taking advanced courses at the University of Toronto towards his degree and moved to the analytical chemistry area as a Laboratory Instructor and then was promoted to Teaching Master at Durham College in the Chemistry Department where he taught until his retirement. He was a man of many interests. He curled at the Uxbridge Curling Club, golfed with a wood, five iron and putter (and still managed to win once in a while!). He played squash at the courts in Uxbridge and then at Durham College, was a competitive duplicate bridge player, and managed to spend nights at the symphony. He was also an avid sailor and runner.. He sailed every summer on the waterways of all the Great Lakes and trained to run marathons. He took summer courses in welding and blacksmithing and applied his various skills to building a steel hull 36 Robert's sail boat on his side yard in Uxbridge. He sailed his boat (Castle Dougall) in and around Georgian Bay before gifting it to Leo. He rigged and sailed a 22 ft. boat with H. Brown on the Mackenzie River to Inuvik (their goal was the Beaufort Sea), explored the Yukon River with his sons, took a kayak trip on the Danube, and biked the hills of Ireland with Ike and Kevin. Then he visited the countrysides of France and Germany en route to visit Leo and Kathleen at Lahr. Many winters were spent at Ike's cabin in Washington State skiing (had a Master Ski pass for Mt. Baker) and in Maple Ridge, BC. between daily skiing (on the black diamond slopes), visits to the local coffee shop, and working with Ike on various projects, he was busy all winter. Road trips were taken to see the sights of Canada. traveling to the coast many times (regardless of weather) to visit with Cathy and the grandchildren, to visit with Aunt Joan in California or just to spend time in the warm sands off the Florida Keys. One of his last major trips was via the Alaska Marine Hwy Ferry from Bellingham to visit Kevin in Whitehorse (with the dog, his two daughters, and son in tow) The Northern Lights danced that night in welcome. Over the past twenty-five years, with periodic visits to Uxbridge, he spent his summers in Little Current on Manitoulin Island, initially living on the Castle Dougall and then in the residence that he built. Yearly he made concrete as one of his projects as well as helping neighbours. At age 87 he commenced, with Ike, designing and building a second steel boat on the side yard of his home. Sam, Leo and Kevin also did "time" on the boat. It was a point of interest for Little Current to monitor the progress of this 39-ft. custom steel boat. Douglas is predeceased by his spouse Margaret Flavin (2002), his youngest son Leo (2009) and his middle son, Sam (2012). His memory will be cherished by all those who knew him. We who are left will tell the stories and remember his life's adventure; his children Peter, Margaret, Cathy Komourdjian (Martin), Kevin, Ike, Theresa Usprech, his daughter-in-law (our sister) Kathleen and our special sister Wendy. Loving grandfather to Maria (Hani), Ali and Amanda. A sincere thank you to all the persons at Sunnybrook Veterans' Centre (George Hees - L Wing - East) for their support, comfort and responsiveness since 2014. Everyone's kindness and attentiveness provided an environment of comfort to Douglas during his time at the residence. 
