

## Little Current Fish and Game Club challenged by spring walleye netting

### Club meets to discuss future of hatchery program

LITTLE CURRENT—The atmosphere in the downstairs meeting hall of the Little Current branch of the Royal Canadian Legion was remarkably subdued considering the frustration felt by members of the Little Current Fish and Game Club (LCFGC) over the future of their Sheguiandah walleye hatchery and the highly successful educational program operated by the club each spring.

The issue centred on the lack of walleye to be found in the club's weir nets during the spring run due to the presence of nets across the bay. Those nets, allegedly set by a member of the Sheguiandah First Nation, inhibited the spring spawning run up Bass Creek.

Discussion during the meeting made it clear that club members recognize the aboriginal and treaty rights of Indigenous harvesters, but the realization that all of the hard work of capturing, milking and fertilizing walleye eggs in the frigid water each spring was in jeopardy due to spring netting of the spawn by one individual without regard to the future of the fishery was clearly demoralizing for those present.

The meeting began with a motion to suspend the hatchery program and the highly acclaimed educational program associated with that work. The hatchery program was established in 1986 and the educational program has been ongoing since 2005 and has been highly successful in educating Grade 4 students from most of the Island's public

and federal schools about the importance of conservation to the future of the fishery and the work being done to support and enhance that fishery. The resurgence of the walleye sports fishery in recent years also speaks volumes as to the success of the hatchery program.



## Wiikwemkoong Post Office installs Anishinaabemowin signage

WIKWEMKOONG—When big changes were coming to the Wiikwemkoong Canada Post office, including a move to a new modern home in the Wiikwemkoong small business centre mall, Postmaster Samantha Recollet decided to make it her goal to have the signage reflect the unceded nature of the Wiikwemkoong territories. She knew it would be an uphill challenge, and that it might mean paying for things out of her own pocket, but she decided the cost would be worthwhile and decided to soldier on.

"It was a pretty hectic time," she recalled of the move. "We had about six weeks to make the move."

Ms. Recollet anticipated some corporate push back on the Anishinaabemowin signage. Mov-

ing a large corporation off of policy established for decades, if not a century and a half, did not sound easy. "English and French are the official languages of Canada," noted Ms. Recollet. "But I felt that this is Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory—in blunt terms it is not owned by Canada."

But in the end there wasn't all that much resistance to the idea, and to Ms. Recollet's immense relief they picked up the signage tab as well. In fact, her immediate supervisor was among her first supporters. "He was very supportive of the idea, but he wasn't at all sure the head office would go for it," she recalled.

As a secondary level post office, the postmaster is expected to source and supply the building in which to locate and that unit must meet stringent specifications.

"They pay for it, but it is up to you to find it," explained Ms. Recollet.

As a Grade 1-Level 2 office, the Wiikwemkoong Post office doesn't have as much merchandise as might be found in larger centres, but the new location is clean and professional—and the signs are bilingual, English and Anishinaabemowin.

"Our language being the first language, it was very important that is recognized," said Ms. Recollet. "Growing up I didn't learn my language at home," she said. "The residential school system made our parents afraid to teach us the language. We took some of it in school, like French, but it isn't the same. We would play bingo, sing songs, but it wasn't like an everyday kind of learning

## 'Providence Bay History and Memoirs' on sale now

*Book includes a collection of stories and pictures of the community's history*

PROVIDENCE BAY—"Providence Bay History and Memoirs," a book written by and for the community of Providence Bay and surrounding area, is now complete and on sale.

"This book was overseen by a steering committee of eight members, including myself," explained Lyle Dewar. "It is a collection of stories, memories and photos that have been gathered over several years and is being published for the citizens of Providence Bay and the surrounding area. It tells the history of Providence Bay and the surrounding areas and how it is connected to the rest of Manitoulin."

The 421 page book starts with information about the first inhabitants of the area, the First Nations people who called the area 'Bebekodawangog,' 'where the beach curves.'


In 1817 Captain Henry Bayfield was the first person to use the name Providence Bay for the small settlement that had developed along the Mindemoya River.

In 1870, the Providence Bay Milling Company was established in the community, as well as the first post office with John W. Mutchmor as the first postmaster.

In 1885, the village had 20 houses, the Episcopal church was erected and there was one large hotel, one grist mill, one sawmill, a blacksmith shop and a shoe shop.

In 1915 the Providence Bay dock was an international port with its own customs office and Elmer Pattison was the first wharfinger and first customs officer.

There is a great deal about the families of Providence Bay over the years and interesting people such as Fanny Ogle.



The new book 'Providence Bay History and Memoirs,' a collection of stories and photos from the community, is on sale now.

You'll have to purchase the book to read the full tale, but Ms. Ogle and her family came from Ireland and after her parents passed away she became the first postmistress of the community. She lived alone with 18 cats and a dog.

It was later revealed that her family was royalty from the Dysart House, Country Meath in Ireland. Being of royal descent, she received a monthly allowance from the Crown until her death. She was also invited to be in the receiving line for King

# Two ministries replace Indigenous Affairs

## Government vows to end Indian Act

OTTAWA—News that the federal government had finally followed a recommendation contained in the now 20-year-old Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples to split Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC), then known as Indian and Northern Affairs, into two ministries has been met with mixed reaction, but the government has also vowed to soon end the tenure of the racist Indian Act.

"There's a sense that we've pushed the creaky old structures at INAC as far as they can go," said Prime Minister Justin Trudeau in announcing the changes to the department, part of a cabinet shuffle that saw other changes around the cabinet table leading into the resumption of Parliament following the summer break.

Former INAC Minister Carolyn Bennett will now be overseeing Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs. Ms. Bennett will be tasked with settling nearly 100 long delayed comprehensive land claims, clearing a backlog of grievances at the Specific Claims Tribunal and ensuring that a new era of self-governance is underway. Minister Bennett will also lead the government's continued push to dismantle the Indian Act.

Minister Bennett is fresh off negotiating the recently ratified Anishinabek Education System deal with the Anishinabek Nation. That devolution to First Nations takes the form the federal government hopes to replicate with other jurisdictions.

"My job is to make sure there's a whole of government approach," said Minister Bennett following the announcement. "The ultimate goal is self-determination."

"We've got a backlog of land claims, we've got treaty rights," said a cautiously optimistic Regional Chiefs of Ontario Chief Isadore Day. "We need to chart a path that looks at more self determination, self government and I think that's the value in setting up another part of the ministry that will deal with Crown relations. Today signals that this is the beginning of dismantling the Indian Act and I hope that's where this continues to go."

Assembly of First Nations National Chief Perry Bellegarde was also

## Anishinabek Nation releases official education vote results

ANISHINABEK NATION—The 23 participating First Nations who successfully ratified the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement celebrated the historic achievement on August 16, 2017, in Chippewas of Rama First Nation.

"This is no longer a dream! Niigaan gdizhaami—we are moving forward!" says Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee. "I can't help but think about our students. The people who made this happen have really done something so important for them. What we did was historical!"

From November 2016 to January 2017, 29 Anishinabek First Nations held a ratification vote on the proposed agreement with Canada. Of the 29 First Nations, the members of 14 Anishinabek First Nations successfully met the ratification threshold of 25 percent plus one and ratified the Agreement.

The First Nations that ratified in the Winter 2016/17 vote include: Aamjiwnaang First Nation with 93 percent of 'yes' votes; Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation with 95 percent of 'yes' votes; Biigtigong Nishnaabeg with 97 percent of 'yes' votes; Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation with 91 percent of 'yes' votes; Henvey Inlet First Nation with 96 percent of 'yes' votes; Long Lake #58 First Nation with 94 percent of 'yes' votes; Magnetawan First Nation with 91 percent of 'yes' votes; Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation with 94 percent of

## Residential school disconnect from culture has long reach

A great number of Indigenous eco-demonstrations have taken place in recent years as First Nations communities rediscover their deep cultural connection to the land, water and air. Water walkers have travelled countless leagues around their communities and lakes Great and small. They bring an important message of conservation and stewardship to the people, not just the Anishinaabek, but to all of the many communities that share the resources of Turtle Island.

It is a far cry from the rapacious approach that remains the legacy of the "progressive" and "modern" Victorian era in which the residential school system and the policies of cultural genocide that still reverberate through Canadian society.

The core cultural values of Anishinaabe traditions look far into the future and dictate the responsibilities that each of us has to future generations. Mother Earth, they remind us, is finite and her bounty depends on the stewardship of mankind if she is to remain vibrant, especially in these days of high tech harvesting methods and ease of access to those resources.

Anishinaabe traditional governance is steeped deeply in the concepts of direct democracy, the grassroots that are so often evoked by First Nations' leadership and which they ignore at their electoral peril. The most oft-heard challenge during each electoral cycle in band elections is the claim that the current leadership does not listen to the grassroots, while each First Nation leader will defer decisions until the community has been consulted on any significant action.

It can be a very slow process and frustrating to those outside who are used to the willy-nilly and often knee-jerk reactions of political actors in the mainstream.

But even in the mainstream it is clearly understood these days that for big decisions to succeed there must be "community buy-in."

In the highly charged atmosphere following the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the determined re-assertion of traditional and treaty rights by both leadership and the grassroots, it can be tremendously challenging for First Nations leaders to exercise self-government and stewardship, even when there is broad community buy-in for a decision. But if the leadership and grassroots are to reassert the sovereignty of the First Nations inherent in the Canadian Constitution and the treaty relationship those challenges must be met.

A number of First Nations are taking that bull by the horns and establishing their own laws and regulations to govern their communities in the modern age. It can be an unpleasant process even when there is extensive consultation and broad community buy-in, but it is a critical path forward to ensure that First Nations communities emerge from the paternalistic shadow of colonialism.

Unfortunately, the disconnect from traditional cultural norms that is largely due to the effectiveness of the residential school system has added a much greater burden to the challenge facing Indigenous lead-

ership and their communities as they try to reaffirm the primacy of their own laws and regulatory processes. There are a small handful of Indigenous individuals who utilize their traditional harvesting rights without respecting their traditional harvesting responsibilities—the stewardship value of protecting the resource for the next seven generations.

Far Northern First Nations elders and hunters have looked on in horror and dismay when youth in their community have slaughtered entire caribou herds, killing animals far in excess of their needs in unfettered youthful exuberance. There are examples closer to home. Small lakes cannot support the burden of extensive netting and spreading nets across the mouth of a bay when the spring run of walleye is in full swing. In short order the resource is depleted and the next seven generations will not know the satisfaction of exercising their treaty rights to harvest fish, because there will be no fish.

There is no question that non-Native commercial fishermen take far more walleye in by-catch than all of the First Nations traditional harvesting in the territory—including First Nations commercial fishermen—but they abide by the simple conservation concept that you must protect future generations of the resource by not interrupting the spawn.

There are compromises that have worked to good effect down through the years. For example, the working relationship between spearfishing harvesters and conservationists whereby the speared fish are brought to the milking station and the eggs removed and fertilized before being returned to the water. It is an elegant example of a working relationship between groups with a common interest in protecting and preserving the resource for future generations.

Education is a fundamental tool in bringing the traditional hunting and fishing rights, enshrined in treaty, into the modern era, but it is only one tool.

First Nations have a responsibility enshrined in their own traditions and cultural norms to practice basic conservation—that isn't colonialism; that is the very essence of self-governance. Non-Natives must respect that it is up to the Anishinaabek to deal with the issue of those who step outside of those traditions and norms, be it for fun or profit, and to find solutions that have broad community support. Some of those solutions may well involve actions that will be unpopular with some of the community, but the future of the community trumps the short term gain of any individual.

Undoubtedly some of those solutions will involve partnerships and collaboration to preserve the shared resource contained within the commons, and that can be done without any threat to traditional and treaty rights.

Let us fervently hope that action on this front comes as soon as possible, because as the Water Walkers' message highlights to all of us, time is fast running out.

# Truxor cutting machine harvests 11 truckloads of phragmites from Michael's Bay

MICHAEL'S BAY—Volunteers from across Manitoulin gathered at Michael's Bay early last week ready to employ the latest weapon in the conservation arsenal to repel the invasive species phragmites (or Asian reed) invading our Island's shores.

A Truxor cutting machine arrived at Michael's Bay Monday and by early Tuesday morning it was hard at work slicing the thick hard reeds off below the water line. Without its above water foliage, the reed flounders and drowns beneath the waves.

"The Manitoulin Phragmites Project brought in the Green Stream crew, with the Truxor cutting machine and two floating mini-barges," noted project coordinator Judith Jones of Winter Spyder Eco-consulting. "The Truxor cuts the phragmites and then the blades are switched out for a rake to pick up the cut material."

What seems an insurmountable challenge when faced with manual control methods becomes just a lot of hard work when the Truxor takes to the water.

"With the help of Tehkummah Township's public works crew, Manitoulin Streams and four dedicated volunteers we removed 11 dump truck loads of phragmites from Michael's Bay," said Ms. Jones. "The phragmites between the Manitou River and Blue Jay Creek are now under control, but it will need more work next year. The area on the far side of the Blue Jay has not yet begun, but is planned for next year with this machine."

The Truxor doesn't come cheap, but with the municipality pitching in and a lot of volunteers throwing their shoulders to the wheel the cost has been kept down. Cost estimates per diem for this kind of operation down south runs to around \$9,000, but Ms. Jones' local crew of four with two brush cutters can do this for around \$1,300 she estimates and the Truxor cut seven dump truck loads of phragmites for its \$5,000 a day—a significant savings.

Although this year's Phragmites Week efforts have proven highly successful, and the Truxor assisted effort in Michael's Bay has established that a concerted effort by a determined team can tackle larger established patches, there are some areas of the Island's shorelines that will require a more concerted (and expensive) effort. But it is important that effort be made, as phragmites' impact on the local ecology goes far beyond pushing out the indigenous bulrushes.

Ms. Jones explained that the reeds are so tough and grow so thick in their stands that aquatic life and marine animals who depend upon access to the shore cannot penetrate the stands.

It does not take long for a stand of phragmites to establish itself on a cottager's beach or shoreline, with a potentially devastating impact on both the enjoyment and value of those shoreline properties. A timely investment could make all the difference.

### Reconciliation—where will it end?

*Rewriting history is not the solution to historical wrongs—writing a better future is*

#### To the Expositor:

The August 23 edition of this paper featured a note from Jan McQuay ('History can be looked at from more viewpoints than the victor's,' August 23, page 4). She makes a case for a history rewrite and since morality is absolute, today's views of what is moral and what is not apply to previous eras. Is morality absolute? Do all cultures agree? Are our present concepts of morality universal and timeless?

I would like to point out that philosophers since Socrates have argued that morality is or could be relative. Looking back at our history, it would seem that in some instances this might be the case. Here are some examples that argue the point.

Morality examines our interactions with other human beings but I wish to start with an incident that occurred in Toronto several years ago involving a man and a group or gaze of raccoons. The animals were ravaging a vegetable garden tended by Dong Nguyen. He proceeded to beat the offenders off with a shovel, an action that caught the attention of a neighbour who called the authorities to intervene. Nguyen was arrested and charged. It is an offence to harm raccoons in Toronto and apparently owning a shovel is also an offence as in this case it was classified as a dangerous weapon. In many parts of the world, a pest in any form that messes with food supply is fair game. This would seem logical as famine and starvation would result since alternate food supply might not be available. Whacking a raccoon with a shovel is

OK and necessary in some cases but not an option in Toronto. A case for a relative approach to the matter of shovels and pests.

Next to the abuse of children, slavery is probably second in line on a list of actions that trigger outrage in most of the modern world. Has it always been so? The answer of course is no! Slavery has been around as long as mankind has. It is only in the last few hundred years that the practice has been condemned. Here is a quote from the late fourth century: "The primary cause of slavery, then, is sin ... and this can only be by a judgment of God, in whom there is no unrighteousness, and who knows how to assign divers punishments according to the deserts of the sinners." That was Augustine, that pillar of Roman Catholic theology. The question of slavery right or wrong would seem to depend on the period of history one is referring to. It is relative when looking back at our history.

In 2004 the CBC conducted a survey to determine who might be the "Greatest Canadian." Tommy Douglas emerged as the choice by the people participating in the survey. In 1933, this same individual wrote a Master's thesis in support of eugenics. He was not alone in his thinking as the idea had surprising support in academic circles and interestingly in the women suffrage movement. Anyone supporting the idea today would immediately be branded as a monster. Not much time has passed since 1933 but we have changed our minds about the morality of eugenics.

Morality in this case seems to be relative.

The first Manitoulin Pride celebration occurred recently. Why just now and not 50 years ago? Why here and not Banda Aceh? Why here and not Riyadh? In May of this year, two young men were caned for gay sex in Banda Aceh. The punishment was carried out in public and witnessed by a large crowd of people in support of the judgement. And what would happen in Riyadh for a similar act. Our moral position on the act of throwing gay people out of the windows of very high buildings is clear, it is shocking and revolting. A whole bunch of people over there don't agree! Morality in this case would appear to be relative.

Jan McQuay is quite correct in her assessment of the treatment that Native people have endured in our history. Is the way forward one of calling out the misdeeds of historical figures and labelling them as racist or bullies etc. Do we all have to wear hair shirts, a remedy that fits with her approach?

An interesting article by Kristy Kirkup appeared in the National Post on Wednesday that was initiated by a teachers' union motion calling for the removal of Sir John A. Macdonald's name from schools. Sen. Murray Sinclair, mentioned at the end of the McQuay article, has said that: "Tearing down tributes to historical figures would be counterproductive to reconciliation efforts between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people." He also said, "The problem I have with the overall approach to tearing down statues and building is that it is counter-

productive to reconciliation because it smacks of revenge or smacks of acts of anger, but in reality, what we are trying to do, is we are trying to create more balance in the relationship."

Reconciliation is not helped by any of us ranting about Macdonald or any other historical figure. Some, perhaps most of these people, are widely admired and respected for what they have accomplished. Many of the same people are rightly criticized for some of their actions. Again, Sinclair makes the point that Macdonald clearly played a significant role in the establishment of Canada, but the establishment of the country also played a significant role in the destruction of Indigenous culture and societies. The point is that attacking Macdonald will result in a backlash from many Canadians who admire the man for the things that he got right. This is not the way forward. We need to expend our energy on productive activities. Again, Sinclair argues that rather than taking names off buildings, we ought to be looking for opportunities to put Indigenous names on buildings. Of course, this is just a symbolic thing and an easy thing. But it might be a start. On my many trips to Algonquin Park, the drive takes a route along the Amable du Fond river. Now there was an admirable individual, the river is well named.

## Northeast Town Council Notes

### Council amends policy

The Northeast Town council carried a motion to approve a recommendation from the administration and finance committee to amend the Benefits and Supports Policy to read: 9) a) 'Shall' to 'May' include the following.

### Fire department report

Council reviewed the Northeast Town Fire Department report. There were five calls for service since the last report, including: July 26, responded to Aundeck Omni Kaning Health Centre to assist with a fire alarm call; July 29, lift assist on Water Street; August 6, fire alarm call to Bay Estates; August 11, report of multiple vehicle accident Highway 540 (incident not found); and August 19, shed fire on Dupont Street.

There were 29 calls for service to date for 2017.

### Community services and public works

The community services and public works report stated that staff are busy cleaning and painting and prepping the recreation centre for upcoming events.

"Repairs and maintenance are being done as required," the report continues. "Staff are prepping for ice in and the ice plant will start on September 5 with the ice ready for rent September 11."

The report also noted that Spider Bay Marina is seeing steady business daily and is busy on weekends and that the downtown docks are still seeing daily boats.

"Parks are being inspected regularly," the report states. "Ball fields and soccer fields are being maintained, as are the public washrooms."

There will be cruise ships on September 4, 10, 21, 22.

The public works report stated that regular maintenance is underway on the roads and that the MSO has completed the requirements for surface treatments.

Mike Varey was the lowest bidder for the winter sand and was awarded the tender.

The public works one-ton was declared surplus by council.

## Law & Order

### Watch out for school children

Every day in Ontario 800,000 children ride a school bus. Staff Sergeant Kevin Webb, Detachment Commander of the Manitoulin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), would like to take a moment to remind the motoring public of some safety issues and rules of the road.

School buses come in all sizes but all are chrome yellow displaying the words 'school bus.' You must stop whenever approaching a stopped school bus with its alternating red lights flashing and stop arm extended. When approaching from the front, leave a safe distance between you and the bus. When coming from behind, stop at least 20 metres away. Do not proceed before the red lights stop flashing and the stop arm is retracted.

You must obey these laws regardless of the number of lanes or speed limit on that road. The only exception is if there is a median (physical barrier) in the center of the road and you are approaching the school bus from the front.

Drivers who fail to stop for a school bus are subject to being charged. A driver may receive a fine ranging from \$400 to \$2,000 and six demerit points.

Remember that these laws are in place to protect our children who are at times easily distracted. Parents should take time to educate their children to be aware of their surroundings when they are on or near school buses.

Staff Sergeant Webb reminds us that "being inattentive can change lives forever." Manitoulin Detachment members will be patrolling the highways making sure our children get to school safely.

He reported that there has been a total of 43 permits issued this year including: four residential; 22 residential additions or renovations; one multi residential; four seasonal dwellings; seven seasonal dwelling additions and renovations; three commercial/industrial additions and renovations; one institutional addition and renovations; and one demolition.

The total value of construction to date is \$4,017,155 with a total building permit revenue of \$49,154.

### New foot bridge

Council received a letter from Little Current resident Nancy Brown asking for a foot bridge to be installed to connect the downtown docks.

Council discussed how they have been looking into this and asked town staff for an update.

Mr. Williamson explained that staff are still waiting on quotes from a company for a steel bridge and on a local architect for a wooden bridge.

Mayor MacNevin reminded council that they haven't budgeted for a bridge for this year.

Staff was directed to inform Ms. Brown that council is looking into the matter.

### Albert Street speed limit change

Council carried motions to reduce the speed limit on Albert Street in Rockville to 40 km and to erect a 'children at play' street traffic sign.

Marlene and Val Nose of Rockville wrote a letter to council requesting that the speed be reduced from 80 km/hr to 30 km/hr due to the number of children, adults and seniors who frequently use the street for biking and walking.

In a recorded vote Councillor Marcel Gauthier, Bill Koehler, Dawn Orr, Paul Skippen, Bruce Wood and Mayor Al MacNevin voted to lower the speed limit to 40 km/hr, while Councillors Laurie Cook, Michael Erskine and Melissa Peters voted against the motion. The motion was carried.

Councillor Peters expressed that she drove the road and saw no reason to reduce it to 40 km.

Councillor Erskine said he felt that other residents on the road should be asked their opinion prior to council making a decision.

Council also carried a motion to erect a 'children at play' sign on the road.

### Green Bay community speed limit

Council reviewed a letter from Amelia Wood requesting that council lower the speed limit at Limekiln Road from the top of the hill at the north end of Green Bay to Bidwell Road and Bidwell Road to the intersection of Green Bay Road and Indian Mountain Road.

"There are several farms, camps, attractions and businesses where motorists encounter slow moving or stopped vehicles and pedestrians," wrote Ms. Wood. "A posted speed limit that reflects the importance of the community safety may help to improve the comfort of both visitors and residents."

Staff was asked their opinion from council. Mr. Williamson replied that the speed limit in those areas is currently 80 km/hr and that it is a straight drive, with no major reason for it to be reduced.

No councillor put a motion on the table to reduce the speed.

positive on the changes, going on to say that doing away with Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada is a truly significant step “toward restoring and revitalizing the nation-to-nation relationship between First Nations and the Crown.”

Close to home, the Anishinaabek chiefs representing the Robinson Huron Treaty and its 30,000 beneficiaries in Northern Ontario commended Prime Minister Trudeau “for announcing structural changes to the outdated colonial Indian Affairs structure” in a release, but they also pointed to a “huge disconnect between what the federal government is saying and what it is doing about treaty rights and reconciliation.”

Chief Day also noted the disconnect. “It has a lot to do with consultation, engagement, recognition of rights, and jurisdiction,” he said. “The federal government is going to have to do a lot more than splitting a ministry to address these issues.” But overall, Chief Day hopes the government moves help set the country on a path towards reconciliation. “I hope this is the beginning of dismantling the Indian Act,” he said. “This process will have to include First Nations participation, our engagement and our endorsement as to how the federal government moves on these major shifts.”

George the VI and the Queen Mother when they came to Sudbury in 1939 and wore royal regalia, which no one in Providence Bay even knew she owned.

“Back when I was a teenager, the cattle sale was in Little Current and farmers in Providence Bay had to walk their cattle to Little Current, no one had big trucks, and pasture them there over the summer, selling them at the cattle sale in the fall,” explained Mr. Dewar, noting how some of the

Former Health Minister Jane Philpott will now lead the new Indigenous Services ministry. That ministry will oversee programs for status Indians, including welfare, education, child and family services, housing, long-term water advisories and health care.

“We’re undoing generations of dysfunctional and discriminatory structures,” said Minister Philpott. “We don’t want to pretend that this is going to be done overnight.”

In an ambitious move, Prime Minister Trudeau has committed to new legislation in the near term to formally begin the process of splitting INAC, a ministry that currently contains more than 4,500 employees spread across the country with a budget in excess of \$9 billion.

Prime Minister Trudeau was faced with the need for a cabinet shuffle following the resignation of long-time Liberal MP Judy Foote. Ms. Foote resigned as minister of Public Services and Procurement. As part of the shuffle the former Minister of Sport and Persons with Disabilities Carla Qualtrough, will now be taking on the Health helm.

Ms. Foote’s resignation carved a Newfoundland and Labrador hole in the Liberal cabinet, which Prime Minister Trudeau plugged by promoting rookie MP (and long-time friend) Seamus O’Regan to the veterans affairs portfolio, replacing MP Kent Hehr who now resides at Sport and Persons with Disabilities.

‘yes’ votes; Nipissing First Nation with 96 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Pic Mobert First Nation with 99 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Sheshegwaning First Nation with 96 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Wahnapitae First Nation with 86 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Wasauksing First Nation with 92 percent of ‘yes’ votes; and Zhiibaahaasing First Nation with 100 percent of ‘yes’ votes

Despite the overwhelmingly positive results in the Winter 2016/17 vote, ratification requirements were not met in 13 communities because not enough voters cast ballots in the initial vote. To satisfy the ratification requirements and affirm their initial “yes” vote, 11 First Nations chose to run a second vote in July 2017. Following the conclusion of the second ratification vote, nine First Nations voted in favour of the Agreement.

The First Nations that ratified in July 2017 vote include: Atikameksheng Anishnawbek with 83 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Beausoleil (Chimnissing) First Nation with 86 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek with 83 percent of ‘yes’

votes; Chippewas of Rama First Nation with 91 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Dokis First Nation with 95 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Michipicoten First Nation with 94 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Moose Deer Point First Nation with 81 percent of ‘yes’ votes; Munsee Delaware Nation with 84 percent of ‘yes’ votes; and Whitefish River First Nation with 75 percent of ‘yes’ votes

The Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement is the largest education self-government agreement in Canada due to the number of First Nations involved.

The Education Agreement with Canada sets out Canada’s recognition of the Participating First Nations’ control over education on-reserve from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12. The Agreement provides for predictable and reliable funding to operate the Anishinabek Education System (AES), a stand-alone education system parallel to its provincial counterparts.

In moving forward with the Education Agreement with Canada, the Participating First Nations chose to be a party to the complementary Master

Education Agreement with Ontario. The provincial agreement creates a new relationship between the Anishinabek First Nations and Ontario that supports Anishinabek student success and well-being in the Anishinabek Education System and the provincially-funded education system. The agreement will also support the implementation of the Anishinabek Education System.

Following the signing of the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement with the Government of Canada, the next steps include introduction of federal legislation into Parliament to meet the target effective date of April 1, 2018.

The Anishinabek Nation established the Union of Ontario Indians as its secretariat in 1949. The UOI is a political advocate for 40 member communities across Ontario, representing approximately 60,000 people. The Union of Ontario Indians is the oldest political organization in Ontario and can trace its roots back to the Confederacy of Three Fires, which existed long before European contact.

where you really understand it to hold a real conversation.”

Anishinaabemowin generally got used more when her parents or other caregivers were frustrated with her behaviour or were trying to get her to do something. “It would be telling us to be quiet, or sit down, or eat your vegetables,” she laughed. “As I grew up and had children of my own I wanted to get back into the language. I got some of it in high school, but my older sisters didn’t get it so much.”

Ms. Recollet was very active in trying to learn her language while at Manitoulin Secondary School. The Rainbow District School Board was finally giving full credits for the Anishinaabemowin classes, just as they did for French. “I was a teaching assistant for Stewart Roy (the Anishinaabemowin teacher hired by the board to teach at MSS).”

Ms. Recollet has always been very active and proactive in her life, although she admits to making some less than perfect choices in her younger years. One thing she does not regret was becoming Miss Manitoulin in 2004.

Now Ms. Recollet is the postmaster at Wiikwemkoong, and thanks to her tireless efforts that is exactly what the

sign on the door reads, along with the traditional informal greeting “aanii,” welcoming community members into the offices in their own language.

"Every year it kept getting better and better," said LCFGC president Bill Strain, who noted that the members of the club's Riverwatch program reported that the run "some nights was incredible."

Mr. Strain noted that there had been issues in the past with Indigenous harvesters from outside the local First Nations territories coming to Bass Creek to spear fish, but that a collaborative effort between elders from local First Nations and the assistance of Anishinabe Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee had alleviated those challenges.

But over the past couple of springs there has been a significant drop in the number of walleye making the journey to Bass Creek. "This year the Riverwatch couldn't see any fish," said Mr. Strain.

The key element that has been different recently is that a local First Nation harvester had spread nets across the mouth of the bay during the spring run. Club members reported having seen that individual selling walleye on the online classified site Kijiji.

In fact, so few fish made their way into the club's weirs at the mouth of Bass Creek that the hatchery program now appears to be becoming unsustainable.

Approaches have been made to local First Nations' chiefs seeking a meeting to discuss the impending calamity and to lobby Indigenous communities for their assistance in finding a solution, but with a number of elections in the immediate offing, those pleas have so far gone unanswered, leaving the club members who spend each spring struggling through freezing cold water in the pre-dawn hours both demoralized and frustrated.

The club's First Nation liaison is Jesse Beaudin of M'Chigeeng.

The meeting heard an impassioned plea from members of Manitoulin Streams to refrain from suspending the educational program, which they credit with bringing awareness of the importance that stew-

ardship plays in the preservation of nature's resources for future generations.

"What everybody does at the LCFGC's education program has had a big impact," said Manitoulin Streams project manager Seija Deschenes. "We have been getting a lot of positive feedback."

The education program sees Grade 4 students from Island federal and public schools gather in the springtime at the club's Bass Creek hatchery to partake in workshops and lectures from club members and officials from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry on conservation, the club's hatchery program, animal and fish identification and a host of other associated themes.

Students are able to see the walleye removed from the weirs, brought to the tanks, milked of sperm and eggs and even help to mix the two together to fertilize the eggs. The students are taken on a tour of the hatchery and follow the progress of the eggs as they develop into fry.

The club later takes those fry to ponds where they are

protected as they develop into fingerlings that can then be planted back into Sheguiandah Bay.

"I think we are making inroads into developing a broad appreciation of conservation efforts," said Ms. Deschenes. "We don't want to see the education program lost." Ms. Deschenes suggested that members of her organization could step up to assist more with the program. "To lose this legacy would be such a waste," she said.

She went on to suggest reaching out to members of the Sheguiandah First Nation to assist with the program as well and opening up the educational program to the broader public, "so that Sheguiandah First Nation members can participate."

Some 1,500 students from local schools have participated in the program and each student in Grade 4 is presented with a rod and reel from the LCFGC in a ceremony at the school each year.

Fuel the Fire television show producer and Manitoulin Streams board member Neil Debassige outlined some of the challenges that

face First Nations leadership in dealing with the question of netting in the spring and overharvesting of the resource and how the process (and effectiveness) of a band council resolution comes about—and the timelines that these process run.

"You have to understand that the chiefs are dealing with some very challenging issues, issues of poverty, economic development and a lack of adequate housing," cautioned Mr. Debassige. "These are things that they can see in their communities every day. The fish are something that they do not see, they are hidden under the water, out of sight and out of mind. There are very pressing matters that are occupying their time."

After some further discussion a motion to close the hatchery and educational program was set aside in favour of a motion creating a three-member liaison committee with a mandate to approach local lands offices to lobby for a solution to the challenge and their support in helping to preserve the fishery for future generations.

In the meantime, the future of the hatchery and educational programs remain hanging in the balance.

had a list of Eritrean refugees that had been languishing in camps in Ethiopia," she recalled. The plan developed by the volunteer group that began meeting in St. Bernard's Roman Catholic Church was to bring five families to Manitoulin, in order to hopefully build a mutually supportive group that could help sustain the families as they settled into Canada.

Ms. Erskine recalled the moment that the Little Current family arrived at the Sudbury airport in the middle of a blustery February morning. "This little girl in a sundress and flip-flops came running across the tarmac calling out 'Linda, Linda,'" she laughed. "The family had been travelling for three days, flying from country to country on their way here. The only thing they knew was that they were coming to Canada and that a lady named 'Linda' would take care of them." Luckily there was a warm bus donated by A.J. Bus Lines waiting to whisk them away to their new Island home.

Of course there were a lot more people than "Linda" who would take up the job of helping the family settle into their new home on Campbell Street. There

icated their evenings to working with the families to help them learn their new language. There were bookkeepers who taught the families the ins and outs of home finance and the art of timely bill paying, the driving instructors who took the older members of the families out on the road and the gardeners who helped the families get their gardens in.

Now, more than a year later, many of the members of the Little Current family have moved to Ottawa where another of the families had already moved. Ottawa has a well-established Cunami speaking diaspora and Romme, the third eldest child in the family, will be undertaking post-secondary studies in kinesiology there. The two elder sons in the family have jobs on Manitoulin and will possibly be joining the family in Ottawa later.

The Expositor sat down with the youngest members of the family, the three girls Hallom, Halima and Matuda, who were moving with their mother to Ottawa.

Asked if they were nervous about the move to a new and much larger city, the eldest Hallom (who is entering Grade 11) admitted "a little," before qualifying

"It was very different," said Halima, who is entering Grade 8 this year. "Yes, here everything is so different," confirmed Hallom. The girls found a warm welcome on Manitoulin, despite the frosty weather, and the girls settled in well. "Everyone wanted to be my best friend," enthused Matuda. Things were a little slower for Hallom. "I am shy," she admitted. "Really shy."

The hardest part of Canada to get used to for the girls took no hesitation. "Winter," they all chimed at once. "There is no winter in Ethiopia." Being one of the hottest, if not the hottest, countries in the world, winter was a novel and frightening experience. "I thought winter would never end," admitted Romme. But winter brought a lot of new and different things that they enjoyed.

"Skating," supplied Hallom. "We liked skating... and hockey. There is no hockey in Ethiopia."

"Sliding," interjected Matuda. "Yes, sliding," admitted Hallom. "We really liked sliding."

“We were all invited, but Mayor McKay and I were the only ones that were able to attend,” continued Mayor MacNevin. “Minister McMahan seemed excited to look at the potential and asked us to set up a meeting with her

deputy minister for this fall. She said she couldn't go looking for funding without knowing the numbers, so Mayor McKay's staff is working on that leading up to the meeting. It will be interesting to see what the potential (for growth) is. Right now we can only handle one cruise ship at a time.”

The Port of Little Current has had numerous cruise ship visits this summer, including two in one

day recently when the ships had to take turns docking and unloading visitors. There have also been ships that have anchored offshore by Strawberry Island with passengers being ferried into port by tender.

“It would be great if there was funding for the study and in turn funding to expand our port,” concluded Mayor MacNevin, who noted a date had not yet been set for the meeting with the MTCS deputy minister.

Mr. Still had been taken to hospital in Little Current, reportedly due to a bad fall, sources close to The Expositor say, where medical staff alerted the family and police to the extent and violent nature of the senior citizen's injuries. A police investigation ensued thereafter. Mr. Still died as a result of his injuries five days later, on Wednesday, August 30.

A post mortem examination was scheduled for yesterday, Tuesday, September 5, at the Office of the Chief Coroner – Ontario Forensic Pathology Service in Sudbury.

The Wikwemikong Tribal Police are continuing the investigation with the assistance of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Crime Unit from Sudbury and Forensic Identification Services under the direction of OPP Criminal Investigation Branch Detective Inspector Mark Zulinski.

Anyone with information regarding the incident should contact the OPP at 1-888-310-1122, the Wikwemikong Tribal Police at 705-859-3141 or by calling Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477. Tipsters may be eligible to receive a cash reward of up to \$2,000.

The following statement was sent out by the Wikwemikong Nursing Home following news of the police investigation: “On behalf of the staff and residents of Wikwemikong Nursing Home, we extend our deepest sympathies and condolences to the family of Mr. Robert (Jim) Still. We have always, and will continue to strive to provide the best quality of care to the residents of the

nursing home. We are fully cooperating with the authorities in the investigation of this incident and further conducting our own internal investigation in order to better understand what happened. The Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care has been notified of the incident.”

Mr. Still, a Korean War veteran, was known for his gentle nature and his love of hockey, having played for Little Current during Manitoulin's famed senior hockey days, even earning himself a spot on the Pittsburgh Pirates farm team.

A funeral service will be held for Mr. Still this Friday, September 8 at the Island Funeral Home with visitation starting at 11 am followed by a memorial service at 2 pm. Donations to the Manitoulin District Cenotaph Fund or the Manitoulin Health Centre Auxiliary are appreciated.

# Catch the Ace progressive lottery craze sweeps Manitoulin Island

**LITTLE CURRENT**—Little Current Lions Club Catch the Ace tickets are in hot demand these days with vendors, including this very office, selling out within minutes each Thursday morning but enthusiasts of the popular progressive lottery, or those who wish they were, can rejoice in learning that with four weeks left to go before the jackpot must be won, an additional 4,000 tickets are now on offer.

Lion President Bruce Burnett learned last week of a new rule in the Catch the Ace rulebook that states the organizer may sell all unused tickets. While the progressive lottery may be selling out in record time now, the first few weeks saw hundreds of tickets out of the 1,000 up for grabs left on the table. In fact, all added up, those unsold tickets numbered 4,000 and so it is those 4,000 that will now be available (an additional 1,000 each week for the next

four weeks).  
 “Our licence allows the maximum sale of 1,000 tickets over the duration of 20 weeks,” explained Catch the Ace committee member Lion Lori Draper, explaining how the \$50,000 prize board is divided. “The prize board consists of a weekly draw prize (20 percent of the current week’s ticket sales),” Lion Lori noted. “Based on 1,000 tickets sold over the period of 20 weeks, this totals \$20,000.”

“In addition, the jackpot is cumulative, meaning 30 percent of weekly ticket sales is added progressively to the jackpot,” Lion Lori continued. “Over the duration of 20 weeks, based on 1,000 tickets sold weekly, this would in fact be \$30,000. When you total these two

sets of numbers, the prize board potentially would be a total of \$50,000 as the weekly draw prizes are not to exceed \$20,000 and the progressive jackpot is not to exceed \$30,000.” “However,” she continued, “in the first 11 weeks we were unable to sell the full

1,000 tickets, therefore the jackpot could never reach the full potential of \$30,000. It was our understanding that we were unable to carry over the unsold tickets from the earlier draws, which were therefore considered void.”

“I would like to be hairdresser or a doctor,” said Hallom. “Nurse,” chimed in Halima. “I don’t know what I want to do yet,” admitted the youngest, Matuda.

There was one thing the girls wanted to see included in their story. “We want to

say thank you so much to all of the kind people who have helped our family,” said Hallom. “Yes, thank you,” chimed in Matuda. “We will always remember you.”

In these days of social media, Facebook and Twitter, the girls plan to keep in touch with the many friends they have made on Manitoulin and plan to come back to visit when they can.

The Coast Guard's inshore rescue boat crew stationed at Britt was tasked to search for three females, one male and their dog.

"We located them at Tar Vat Bay," said Keith Pettinger, coxswain of the Britt Inshore Rescue Boat crew. "It was a challenge to get in there to the shore where they were waiting. It is a very rocky area."

The Coast Guard brought the group aboard their fast rescue craft and transported them back to Killarney. All were in good condition.

The Canadian Coast Guard hires and trains post-secondary students each year to become members of Inshore Rescue Boat crews. The students form part of the Canadian Coast Guard's search and rescue operations during the peak summer months, responding mostly to pleasure craft incidents.

In Ontario, the Coast Guard has six Inshore Rescue Boat stations: on Georgian Bay (Britt on Gereaux Island and Brebeuf Island); at Port Lambton on the St. Clair River; at the Thames River at Lake St. Clair; at Long Point on Lake Erie; and on Hill Island on the St. Lawrence River.

# Lions, dragons and tigers, oh my!

(Ant lions, dragonflies and tiger beetles, that is)

MANITOULIN—Most people are fascinated by at least a few kinds of insects such as butterflies, ants, ladybugs or honeybees and frequently want to learn more about them. As a result, entomologists (scientists who study insects) are frequently asked questions such as 'what kind of bug is this,' 'what good is this bug' or 'how do I get rid of this bug?'

Retired entomologists like myself, who still enjoy talking, photographing and writing about insects, such as those on Manitoulin Island, are no exception and friends, relatives and youngsters at Batman's Campground near Sheguiandah regularly bring me critters to identify or ask questions.

Another common question is 'what is the best hunter of other insects on Manitoulin Island.' After giving this some thought, my three-part answer is 'ant lions, dragonflies, and tiger beetles.' In this article, I explain the reasons for my choices and in doing so celebrate their beauty, remarkable adaptations, quirks and personalities and the fun I have in searching for them and observing their lives.

Each of these three insects is a ferocious predator; that is, they kill and feed on other insects. About one quarter of all the many thousands of different kinds of insects on Manitoulin Island are predacious while the rest eat plants or dead things.

One of the many reasons these insects are so successful is that the immature stages feed in different places and on different foods than do the adults. This is a big advantage in diverse ecosystems because it means that the immatures do not compete with adults for the same food. This will become evident as we examine feeding by antlions, dragonflies and tiger beetles.

## Antlions

There are about five species of antlions in Ontario. The meaning of the name 'antlion' is unknown, but it likely refers to ants forming most of the prey and the suffix 'lion' may merely suggest hunter or destroyer.

Even though antlions are one of the least observed insects on Manitoulin, they are one of the most fascinating because of the fiercely predatory habits of their larvae and their way of catching food. Antlions dig funnel-shaped pits in the ground which they use to ambush passing ants or other small insects.

The larvae of antlions live in dry places along the edges of lakes or streams where they wait for passing prey. Sometimes referred to as 'doodlebugs' they leave meandering trails in sand or powdery soils as they wander around looking for a place to settle. I found the ones in these photographs on the sand dunes of Providence Bay.

Antlion larvae are grotesque-looking with an oversized, flattened head, long mobile necks and a fat body covered with bristles. They have two enormous, sickle-shaped jaws with sharp projections. Full-grown larvae are about 1 cm in length and the death traps they make are about 5 cm wide at the edge and 4 cm deep.

Having chosen a site for its pit, the larva starts to crawl backwards using its abdomen as a

plough to shovel up the sand. It places heaps of sand on its head and then with a quick jerk, shoots each pile outwards. As it moves in a circular manner, a pit slowly forms with sides of the slope forming an angle such that they collapse with the slightest disturbance.

The larva settles at the bottom with only its jaws protruding. Ants that tumble into the pits find little footing and the waiting antlion speeds up the prey's demise by flinging sand at it causing a land slide that brings the ant to the bottom where they are quickly seized.

Antlions do not have mouths,

but instead they have hollow jaws which they use to suck out the body fluids of their prey. Death is instantaneous as the larvae quickly inject venom and digestive juices into the victim then suck out the nutritious goo.

After fluids of the prey are consumed, the dry carcass is flung out of the pit and the antlion readies itself for the next victim. Larvae can survive long periods of famine because of their slow metabolic rate. They commonly spend three years in the larval stage before turning into adults that live about three summer weeks.

Antlion adults are long, slen-

oval, mesh-like wings that are held roof-like over the backs when at rest. They feed on small insects in the vegetation at night and search for mates and sites to lay eggs.

If you come across antlion pits from May to October, try sifting the sand at the bottom of the cones with your fingers, or gently scoop out sand at the base with a spoon. When you have had a look at the ungainly creature, release it back onto the sand and watch it make a new pit.

## Dragonflies

Dragonflies belong to an ancient group of insects that were flying around millions of years ago before dinosaurs walked the earth. Although the origin of the name dragonfly is a mystery, it is an appropriate description for these voracious predators that are outstanding hunters in both the nymph and adult stages. There are about 130 species of dragonflies in Ontario.

The reason we usually see adult dragonflies around streams, lakes or ponds is that the immature stages, called nymphs, are aquatic. They live on the bottom of ponds and lakes where they hang out on vegetation waiting for their prey. When prey such as mosquito larvae and worms get close enough, they unfurl their mouthparts which shoot out past the head and capture the prey in their jaws.

The gills of dragonfly nymphs are inside their anus. That's right—they breathe through their rear ends. In addition, they bring water inside their anus then force it out under high pressure which shoots them forward when capturing prey. Dragonfly nymphs had invented jet propulsion long before humans.

When the nymphs are full

der insects that look like damselflies (antlion adults have clubbed antennae whereas damselflies have inconspicuous antennae). They are weak fliers with soft bodies and two pairs of

grown, they crawl out of the water onto rocks or vegetation. Their body skeleton splits along the top side and the four-winged adult wriggles free.

As everyone who has watched adult dragonflies knows, or tried to catch one, they are masters of flight. They are the most elegant, agile flying machines on Manitoulin Island. Each of their four wings can be moved independently.

Not only do they flap their wings up and down, they can rotate them backwards providing more flexibility than any other insect. They can fly straight up or straight down, hover or make hairpin turns at full speed or in slow motion. They can even fly backwards!

They catch their prey midair by flying at speeds of about 10 km per hour. Large species can accelerate to about 40 km per hour. Their legs face forwards to form a basket which they use to scoop up insects and eat them without landing. Few insects can escape their grabbing limbs that clutch prey before crushing it with powerful jaws and swallowing it.

Dragonflies are not picky eaters as they will eat any insect they can catch including other dragonflies. They prefer mosquitoes, gnats and small flies but will also eat butterflies, moths and bees.

Having legs shaped like baskets prevents dragonflies from walking or running; they can only be used for hanging onto plants or hard objects.

Dragonflies also have extraordinary vision thanks to two huge compound eyes which give them nearly 360° vision and the ability to detect the movement of flying insects some distance away. Each compound eye has about 30,000 individual eyes.

## Tiger beetles

There are about 15 species of tiger beetles in Ontario. All have bulging eyes, long, slender legs and formidably large three-toothed jaws that are conspicuously crisscrossed at their tips. One species of tiger beetle I commonly find on Manitoulin is bright green. Others are black with patterns of light lines running across and up and down their backs. It is the striped patterns on the upper surface and their ferocity that give tiger beetles their name.

Among beetles, tiger beetles are perhaps second only to ladybugs as favourites of nature-loving people. These colourful beetles which are about 12-15 mm in length are found on open ground such as sunny woodland paths, sand dunes and beaches.

The larvae of tiger beetles larva are among the most other-worldly creatures one can imagine. They have long, narrow, hump-backed, grub-like bodies that hang from the head at a 90° angle inside cylindrical, vertical burrows made in firm patches of soil. Their large heads bear two long, sickle-shaped jaws that point upwards and three pairs of eyes giving them the appearance of a face with congenital birth defects.

Tiger beetle larvae rest with the tops of their heads flush with the ground surface. When small insects pass

by, the larva lunge from its burrow and grabs the victim with its jaws, then pulls it into the burrow to be devoured. They are prevented from being yanked out the burrow by larger, struggling prey by a hump on the dorsal side that functions to anchor the larva against the side of the burrow.

Adult tiger beetles display an unusual way of pursuing their prey whereby they alternatively sprint quickly towards their prey, stop, look around then renew their attack. This may be because some beetles have been clocked running at a speed of 8 km/h, or about 100 body lengths per second, which is too fast for their eyes to accurately process images.

Tiger beetles are also fast fliers and their reaction time is the same as houseflies. They quickly run or fly when you approach which makes them hard to sneak up on for a close look, or catch them. They usually fly about 10-20 m, land, then quickly turn around to see if you approach again.

Tiger beetles are active on sunny days in open, barren areas where they can easily see their prey. They never seem to stop moving on warm, sunny days as they are always looking for food and mates, while avoiding enemies that might eat them. On cool days, they raise their body temperatures by basking in the sun and keep their bodies close to the warm ground.

If the ground becomes too hot, they regulate their body temperature by standing on their tiptoes to keep the body as far from the hot ground as possible. This is like you and me running barefoot on a hot beach down to the water.

The three insects highlighted in this article are among the most fascinating on Manitoulin Island and watching and learning about them can be as rewarding for outdoor enthusiasts as is gardening, bird watching or studying plants.

## farm facts and furrows

### Weaning calves

Weaning calves prior to sale has benefits for both the seller and buyer. It is very stressful for calves separated from their mothers and put on a truck for a long ride to a stocker sale. Properly weaned calves adjusted to hay and a small amount of grain will shrink about five percent on an extended truck ride. Stressed out bawling calves lose much more on the same ride. These unweaned calves are then run through the sale ring still bawling. Stress means weight loss. Weight loss means lighter sale weights and reduced income for the seller. For the feedlot buyer excessive stress means increased sickness and even death losses.

Here are two ways to make the weaning experience less stressful. Fence line weaning:

First, place cow-calf pairs in the pasture the calves will be in following weaning so the calves

become familiar with the fences and water sources. Second, after weaning, place the cows in the pasture adjacent to the calves so they cannot nurse the calves, but they can still see, hear and smell each other. This requires a good fence and side by side pastures. Page wire and electric work well when calves are trained to the electric fence. The key is to keep cow and calf separated. Bawling is greatly reduced when there is the opportunity for physical contact through the fence. Two step (nose flap) weaning: Use of a nose flap will minimize the stress associated with weaning. Flexible, lightweight QuietWear nose flaps prevent a calf from nursing, but allows it to graze and maintain physical contact with the cow. This form of weaning is removing the milk first. At 5 to 7 months of age there is limited milk available making the lost nursing less stressful. The cow-calf

bond slowly separates over a few days, with the pair still together. These flaps are lightweight, non-invasive and made from a very flexible plastic. They are easy to apply. QuietWear calf weaners are typically left in calves for 4-7 days before separating the calves from the cows. The flaps can be washed and reused.

The nose flap system requires handling the calves to apply and remove the flap. This requires a chute and headgate for easy application.



amount of storms. I haven't got out of bed yet, but I'd better dig out the rubber boots when I do.


