Spectators rally to rescue heart attack victim at Island men's fastball finals

Rival AOK and Wiky squads unite in prayer

WIKWEMIKONG—Training and quick reactions played a key role in saving the life of a 36-year-old Wikwemikong man who suffered a heart attack while playing for the Island championships with the Wiky Lumberjacks against longtime rivals the AOK Chiefs at Thunderbird Park last Wednesday night.

Following the collapse of Shaun Shawana several people rushed to his aid, including off-duty paramedics and community member Chris Pheasant, providing CPR until a defibrillator could be delivered to the site by the Wikwemikong Tribal Police.

Umpire Delroy Prescott was

Umpire Delroy Prescott was presiding at the game when the player collapsed. "We had a tough night over here during the AOK at Wiky game two finals, top of the fourth the Jacks left fielder collapsed on the diamond," he said. "They were doing CPR and all that for 20 minutes until the ambulance finally showed up."

Mr. Prescott suspended the game, rescheduled to Monday of this week, but the incident had a powerful impact on everyone who was there.

At a moment's notice everything on the field had changed—all rivalry and competition forgotten. "Everyone knew where the priorities lie," said Mr. Prescott. "It was powerful to see these two teams of A type competitors all kneeling in a circle at the mound praying and laying down tobacco."

According to Mr. Shawana's aunt Theresa Trudeau the ball player made it safely through the

Her mother's gift of kidney grants young mom time to raise her child

Kinga Casson encourages 'Gift of Life'

LITTLE CURRENT—It was during her high school years that Little Current's Kinga Casson first discovered that something wasn't right. Her hands and feet were swelling, she had a high fever and numerous other ailments that were hard to explain. It would require many long trips to the doctor and innumerable medical tests (she would spend her 16th birthday at Sick Kids for her first biopsy) before she learned that her kidneys were not functioning normally. Eventually, they would fail her completely, threatening to deprive her child of a mother. "I was in boarding school in Parry Sound half-way through the

"I was in boarding school in Parry Sound half-way through the semester," she recalled. "That's when it began." The bloodwork she had done led to a number of initial diagnoses, rheumatoid arthritis, lupis and lyme disease. "Nobody knew what was wrong."

It was Christmas that year that her adoptive parents, Brynn and Anne Casson of Little Current, decided to take her to the hospital for more bloodwork and urinalysis which revealed high protein levels and then, finally, she had a name to her nemesis—focal segmental glomerulosclerosis (FSGS),

At first Ms. Casson was determined to not let her ailment define her life. "Being 16 at the time, I didn't want to figure out what the diagnosis meant," she said. "I wanted to go on with my life and didn't take any medication, except occasionally." Grade 10 was fairly normal, she experienced few side effects. "I played sports, volunteered in Costa Rica, kept busy to keep my mind off the disease, but it was always there. I wanted to live life to the fullest."

Denial only works so far, however. "By the end of high school I only had 50 to 60 percent kidney function," she said. "That was at the first year of college and at the end of the first year I found out I was pregnent."

It was devastating news for any 19-year-old. "I didn't know what to do," she said. "I was 19 and not ready to be pregnant." But given her situation, she realized that she might not ever be able to have children in the future. In the end, she decided to forge ahead with the pregnancy despite the danger that might present to her own health.

She attempted to return to school in Barrie for her second year, taking aesthetics, and her doctor Michele Hladenewich specialized in high risk pregnancies. It was a very difficult part of her young life. "I

Wiky's Georgian Bay island claim moving on through public consultations

LITTLE CURRENT—Land claim negotiations between Wikwemikong and the Ontario government, known as the Wiikwemkoong Islands Boundary Claim, have proceeded to the public input stage and, to that end, several public information sessions were held including one on September 1 between 3 and 8 pm at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre, a second the following day with the same hours at the Killarney Veteran's Memorial Hall, 58 Highway 637 (Charles St.), Killarney and a third which is to be held on Thursday; September 10, 3-8 pm, Courtyard by Marriott, College Room, 475 Yonge St. Toronto.

The sessions served two main purposes, to help educate the public on the parameters of the land claim and to gather input from the public to ensure that all patented lands (private property) are recorded in the data being used to calculate the cash portion of the settlement.

The land claim is actually a truncated portion of a larger land claim that stretches from the North Channel to the French River Park, explained Ontario Senior Negotiator Richard M. Aniol. "The area covered by these negotiations is that portion that we have been able to document (using historical descriptions and maps)," he explained. "Wikwemikong maintains that their rights and interests to the islands off the eastern shore of Manitoulin under the Treaty of 1836 have nev-

er been ceded or extinguished."

The ultimate goal of the current negotiations is to resolve the long outstanding land claim, a claim that basically began before the ink was dry on the 1862 Treaty which purportedly ceded Manitoulin Island to the Crown, and to conclude those negotiations in "a fair and final settlement that will bring closure to these longstanding issues and foster reconciliation."

Mr. Aniol explained that it is anticipated that a settlement will include both financial compensation and a transfer of lands to Wikwemikong. During the information session in Little Current a number of maps were on display showing the lands being claimed, those lands that are currently patented and the lands being proposed for transfer. "The land component of the proposed settlement includes provincial Crown land within the area of the boundary claim and alternative provincial Crown land on the mainland and Philip Edward Island and surrounding islands, as replacements for patented lands that cannot be returned to Wikwemikong Unceded Territory.

Mr. Aniol explained that patented lands, those that have been sold to private landowners, are never included in land transfers under land claims. "Ontario will not take away private property from third parties to settle land claims," he said. "Any acquisition of private property is on a willing-

Landowner facing wildlife charges chooses fellow farmer as counsel in case headed for pre-trial talks

GORE BAY—A contingent of 10 farmers from across the Island gathered in the Provincial Offences Act (POA) courtroom at the Gore Bay municipal office last Thursday morning to show their support for Paul Skippen, the Green Bay farmer who killed a Canada goose without a permit in what he calls an act of defence for his farm and livelihood.

Mr. Skippen is facing four charges filed against him by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF): unlawfully hunting a migratory bird outside the open season, failing to immediately make every reasonable effort to retrieve a migratory bird, unlawfully discharging a firearm in the travelled portion of a right of way for public vehicular traffic

and knowingly making a false statement to a conservation offi-

Mr. Skippen, in previous interviews published in this newspaper, explained that he shot the protected bird, leaving it as a gruesome reminder for other geese thinking of landing in his fields, after taking a hit of \$10,000 in crop losses because of their appetite. He also believed he had verbal permission to protect his land from nuisance animals from a conversation he had with then-Minister of Natural Resources David Orazietti at an Ontario Roads/Rural Ontario Good Municipal Association conference on the subject of farmers and crop damage due to birds and

New OCF exhibit confronts missing and murdered aboriginal women head on

M'CHIGEENG—The Ojibwe Cultural Foundation will be hosting the exhibit 'Mine is but a tear in a river' by Simcoe artist Tracey-Mae Chambers, opening today, Wednesday, September 9, in M'Chigeeng. The exhibit takes a powerful look at the issue of missing and murdered aboriginal women in Canada.

The exhibit features 1,181 photos of pieces of clothing painted with encaustic paint to replicate the flesh of the 1,181 documented cases of missing or murdered aboriginal women in Canada from the last three decades

"The pieces of clothing have been photographed everywhere from Queen's Park, Ottawa Parliament Buildings, police stations, court houses, churches as well as the streets, malls and meeting places of Canadians," explained Ms. Chambers. "I have also videotaped them in several locations. I chose to photograph the clothing on the steps of the four churches involved in residential schools, Presbyterian, Anglican, Catholic and United. I have photographed them in bodies of water, dumpsters, wooded areas, busy city streets while Canadians passed by and in subway stations."

The exhibit will also include several shopping carts, painted flat black, and clothing from the photographs installed on the gallery floor as though discarded.

"To me they represent how we discard what we consume and it further illustrates aboriginal women as also disposable," continued Ms. Chambers. "When I was taking the photos (of clothing) I kept finding shopping carts in the woods. In the Lynn River in Simcoe I photographed some of the clothing in them.

A week later, a woman was found out west in a shopping cart. I debated for a while if I would still use the photos, I didn't want to upset the family, but in the end I made the decision to leave them in."

Ms. Chambers' subject matter for the exhibit stems from a desire to bring attention to the issue of missing and murdered aboriginal women.

"Other shows regarding aboriginal women I had seen were wonderful, but they were pleasant, positive, I wanted to do something more visceral, more confrontational," shared Ms. Chambers. "I wanted to shock. A lot of people have no concept of how bad things are."

"I was at a feminist art conference on Toronto Island and after spending two weeks with such amazing, strong, self-confident women it really gave me the motivation to create this exhibit," she explained. "I'm not a puppies and kittens kind of girl, but I am pretty soft spoken in my day to day. Through my work, though, I feel that my alter ego can come out and I can confront the issues I want to explore, the issues I'm passionate about. I don't want to talk calmly and quietly anymore. I feel no need to justify my work or my opinion concerning how easily aboriginal women are discarded. It is as though they were never really there in the first place."

Ms. Chambers explained that a lot of research went into creating the pieces. "I have had third degree burns on my left hand, so I used that as some reference point, but to recreate such a variety of wounds I had to do research to make them look realistic. It was really hard."

Candidate for chief Linda Debassige

EDITOR'S NOTE: The three candidates for chief in the September 12 election are Linda Debassige, G'Mewin Migwans and Martin Debassige. Incumbent Chief Joe Hare did not let his name stand, making this election the first in a quarter century that will see a chief that has not held the position before elected.

There are 18 candidates standing for the position of band councillor and they include Andrea Panamick, Marko Debassige, Debbie Corbiere-Debassige, Ray Corbiere, Brenda Roy, Forry Hare, Andrew M. Corbiere, Andrea McGraw, Charlene Recollet, Tiffany Recollet, Thomas Hare, Mark Debassige, Henry Panamick Sr., Brian Bisson, Sam Debassige, Bev Roy-Carter, Basil Panamick and Debbie Ense.

The following article is from an interview with candidate Linda Debassige, candidates Marvin Debassige and G'Mewin Migwans were not available for interview by press time Monday.

Chief Electoral Officer Dan Simon noted that the official poll will take place on September 12, but that there was a special advance poll on September 5 during the annual M'Chigeeng Traditional Powwow and that electors are also able to avail themselves of a mailin ballot. "But the mail-in ballot has to be received before September 12," he said.

In order to vote, electors must be on the list of registered voters and have identification on hand. "I know most of the people on the list," said Mr. Simon, "but there are some people from off reserve that I might not know to see them." The electoral officer noted that the necessary identification includes most of the usual items, band card, driver's licence, birth certificate or passport.

Linda Debassige

Linda Debassige has acquired many skills throughout her scholastic and working careers and through her community work, but she said that she counts "listening" as being foremost

among those attributes. That skill would seem to be a given for any politician, but Ms. Debassige noted that many people seem more interested in talking about their own points of view than engaging in active listening to the concerns and ideas of those around them.

Ms. Debassige, who graduated with honours from Confederation College's Civil Engineering program in Thunder Bay, was born and raised in M'Chigeeng, the daughter of Mike and the late Pam (Winnie) Debassgie and is the mother of a 14-year-old son.

Ms. Debassige said that there are a number of approaches to the job of chief that she has garnered through her job and life experiences. "I have come to believe that it is important to focus on solutions instead of focussing entirely on the problem," she said. "The first thing to do is gain an understanding of the problem and to work together to find a solution that will achieve the greatest success."

She has had plenty of experience in putting that philosophy to work. When Ms. Debassige was first elected to council in 2013 she immediately became deeply "involved and active" in a number of portfolios including the audit and finance, governance and human resources, membership, lands management steering committee, UCCM Police Commission,

CUPE education workers to begin job action September 10

TORONTO—Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) education workers in Ontario served notice that province-wide job action will begin on September 10. "Our members' work is important to student success in our schools," said CUPE's Ontario School Boards Coordinating Committee (OSBCC) chair Terri Preston. "We need all parties to understand how serious our members are about the services we provide and being treated with respect at work."

The OSBCC, negotiating on behalf of the 55,000 workers of the CUPE, filed their intentions with the province and the Council of Trustees Association (CTA) Thursday evening. Under the new School Board Collective Bargaining Act, the Union has to provide five days' notice prior to any job action. On August 29, CUPE locals representing education workers across four school board systems in Ontario, voted on a plan of escalating job action beginning the first week of school.

"We're moving forward with this plan and the first step begins with work-to-rule on September 10," said Ms. Preston. Education workers represented include educational assistants, office administrators, custodians, tradespeople, instructors, library technicians, early childhood educators, IT specialists, speech pathologists and many others. CUPE represents education workers in elementary and secondary schools, in public and Catholic boards and in both the French and English systems.

Swimming advisory issued for Kagawong Beach

KAGAWONG—Signs were posted by the Sudbury and District Health Unit (SDHU) at the Kagawong Village Beach last week advising against swimming at this time.

Routine water samples taken by the SDHU exceeded the acceptable bacteriological water quality standards for bathing beaches.

"We have enhanced our monitoring and will continue taking water samples," said Cindy Peacock-Rocca, a manager in the Health Unit's Environmental Health Division.

Going into the water when bacteria are present in high concentrations puts bathers at risk for infections. Illness can occur if swimmers swallow beach water; if water gets into their ears, eyes, or nose; or if it comes in contact with open wounds.

The public will be notified when the bacterial levels return to acceptable standards for bathing beaches. For information about beach water quality, visit www.sdhu.com.

PM Harper should kickstart Syrian refugee flow

It is unfortunate that the plight of Syrian refugees has become an election issue of some significance as Canadians approach their October 19 date with federal General Election poll clerks and deputy returning officers.

Unfortunate that each of the three parties hoping to form the next government in Ottawa is attempting to score political points, and to gain votes in the process, based on what they would do for Syrians seeking refugee status here should Canadians award them sufficient seats in the House of Commons.

Unfortunate that the government hoping to gain re-election, the Conservatives, doesn't simply go ahead and fast-track their own proposal to accept 10,000 Syrian refugees each year for two years because they are still in the position to do so during the campaign period, rather than holding out this promise as something voters can look forward to as long as the Conservatives form the government.

Unfortunate because, as genuine political refugees from Syria are drowning themselves in the Mediterranean in an effort to get to Europe and beyond, their plight becomes a prominent plank in every political party's platform.

We are a nation capable of taking this on and doing so with expe-

The photo of the dead refugee child, Aylan Kurdi, whose body had washed upon a Turkish beach early last week, and whose aunt in Canada had been hoping the family would be able to join her here, has clearly had a direct impact on the political will in this country.

This has been evidenced by Canadian citizens rallying to the issue and by the reaction from the political camps hoping to woo votes on the topic.

Prime Minister Harper, were he to immediately authorize the fasttracking of the immigration of, for example, Syrian refugee families with some family connection in Canada, and if Canadians could have hard evidence that such an action was actually taking place, this would gain quick political capital for the party he leads and hopes to bring back to form another government.

Justin Trudeau, the Liberal party leader, has at least called for an immediate meeting of the three national party leaders to thrash out a policy on Syrian refugee resettlement to Canada, giving their plight priority over partisan politics. His request for such an undertaking, so far, has gone unheeded, likely because the other parties may think that agreeing to such a meeting could be viewed as a votegetter for the Liberals for initiating the process.

So nothing gets done.

The election is almost six weeks away. There are many other things to discuss on the hustings, but the Syrian refugee issue will now remain a priority among voters, and parties' positions on the topic will certainly sway many votes.

How simple it would be for the prime minister to simply say, right now, "let it be so," speed up the immigration process and claim some political glory in the process.

Chiefs of Ontario holding government to its commitment

Ipperwash Inquiry recommendations a memorial to Dudley George 20 years after his shooting

To the Expositor:

An open letter on the 20th anniversary of the shooting death of Dud-

On September 6 it was 20 years since Anthony "Dudley" George, an unarmed First Nation man, was shot by the Ontario Provincial Police

He and other First Nation men, women and children had been occupying their ancestral territory, which had been expropriated by the federal government for military purposes. The land was later transferred by the federal government to the provincial government to create a provincial park. This was done after the federal government had promised the people of Kettle and Stony Point it would return the land back to the community

After Dudley George's tragic death, his brother, Sam George, called for an immediate public inquiry. Chiefs of Ontario supported his call and staged a public demonstration to call for justice to be served.

This year marks the 8th anniversary of the release of the Final Report of the Ipperwash Inquiry, which was established by the Government of Ontario with a dual mandate to look into and report on events surrounding the death of Dudley George and to make recommendations focused on the avoidance of violence in similar circumstances.

The Final Report of the Ipperwash Inquiry, released on May 31, 2007, contained 100 recommendations focused on improving the relationship between First Nations and the Government of Ontario.

In 2007 the Chiefs of Ontario Political Confederacy supported the establishment of an Inquiry Task Force to conduct research and analysis of the recommendations in the final report. It was also tasked with developing a framework strategy for dealing with the Ontario government on implementing the recommendations

This anniversary presents an opportunity to reflect on the state of our relationship with the province and the justice system. There have been some positive developments since the release of the final report but the bottom line is that the most meaningful recommendations remain unaddressed and, combined with the fact that the province walked away from the joint implementation process, has caused First Nations to question whether this government is committed to address the important policy recommendations contained in the report.

In order to ensure the essence of the Ipperwash recommendations remains a priority, a Political Accord between the First Nations and the province was signed to affirm our commitment to working within a government-to-government relationship that would further frame our joint priorities and actions.

Since the 2014 Ontario election, Premier Kathleen Wynne has committed to making transformative change that would see First Nations leaders as part of the decision-making process and restore the Treaty relationship. Under Resolution, Chiefs of Ontario has been working to keep the Premier to her word and will continue to do so with the Ipperwash Recommendations.

We will remain active and committed to working with the Ontario government in addressing the recommendations outlined in the Final Report of the Ipperwash Inquiry. We will continue to remember Dudley George who was a protector of our ancestral lands and a seeker of justice for First Nation people.

'Bear problems' in cities are, in fact, really 'people problems'

People are encroaching on bears' traditional lands, just as they have done with First Nations

To the Expositor:

was news this week about the release of growth figures for the Canadian economy. Finally, it's out-there were two months of "negative growth" just recently. And Stephen Harper, Conservative leader, when he was prime minister, made sure to include in one of the federal government's omnibus bills an act to have declared a "recession" once two consecutive months of negative growth was recorded. If something is growing, typically that means it's increasing in size or girth or numbers. But if it's not growing then that means it's decaying, or disappearing, or otherwise decreasing. So the term "negative growth" is an oxymoron, sort of like "jumbo shrimp" or "near miss." To use the word growth in describing something that's deteriorating is misleading.

Economics, likewise, is a very strange discipline. It's not a science exactly, more like a study and tracking of human behaviour and its relationship to currency, money and finances. Actually, economics is a study of the 'quantification of greed."

There was a deadline recently for First Nations to publish their financial statements in the public domain. Some 200 First Nations across Canada did not. The way I figure it, if a First Nation receives "Indian money" that was held in trust for them by the federal government, that can get reported. On the other hand, if First Nations earn their own money without the feds' fingers in the pie, the First Nations should not have to report that.

Actually, Canada has never fully paid for the land it them. Surely to goodness there are wildlife biologists The feds and the red-coated Mounties make a big deal over treaty payments that are made to First Nations here and there annually at \$4 per person per year, provided that you're "registered" with the federal government. That \$4 per year is only the interest on the interest for land purchases that were never paid for in full. If Canada is \$600 billion in debt over its own doing, then Canada has not even calculated how much it really owes "Indian" people for the more than 9 million square kilometers that it has not finished paying for.

Then there's news stories like the "bear problem" in towns and cities in Canada. Actually, they're not "bear problems," they're "people problems." They're people problems because people are encroaching upon the bears' traditional territories. Bears are doing what they always do-it just so happens that they're doing it on their traditional territories that have now been covered over with suburbs, dirt bike trails, and commercial and industrial development. I didn't hear anyone ask Anishinaabek what to do about the bears. It seems like the answer to problems is always "shoot it" or "shoot them."

Closer to home there's some disgruntlement about birds nesting and occupying some farmers' fields. Once again, the geese are on their traditional territories and using their ancestral migratory routes to make their way south again. It's a "people problem" not a "bird problem." Same idea-solve the problem by shooting it or birds and other wildlife.

Things that happen on the other side of the globe eventually affect all of us here, too. There was news about refugees trying to get into some European countries and being prevented from doing so, or having to obtain visas before being admitted to a country. I have a hard time accepting that Canada should bring in umpteen thousand more refugees, when Anishinaabe traditional indigenous lands were encroached upon without our sayso; when refugees from England, Portugal, France, Spain, Ireland and other countries in Europe were admitted to our ancestral homelands (Canada) and plunked down upon stolen and otherwise illegally expropriated indigenous territories.

It's very strange to be travelling upon our ancestral indigenous lands on the outside looking in at what used to be ours. It's very strange to be homeless in one's own homeland. It's very strange for a federal government which has a statutory obligation to protect "Indians and lands reserved for Indians" to condone another Indian and an Indian Band Council to eject a female Anishinaabe elder from her traditional Anishinaabe home and

Committee tackling suicide seeks to draw attention to prevention

week's Expositor featured a public service advertisement highlighting the alarming statistics around suicides on Manitoulin Island, pointing out that our little corner of paradise has seen 35 deaths officially as suicides classified between 2005 and 2012, over twice the national suicide rate per year. Tomorrow (Thursday, September 10) is World Suicide Prevention Day and those statistics are very conservative numbers, notes local mental health worker Alison Hall.

The Manitoulin Suicide Prevention committee, a the subcommittee of Island's Addictions and Mental Health committee, one of three subcommittees made made up of local service providers from across Manitoulin, is seeking to take the focus off the numbers and place it on identifying those at risk of taking their own lives and providing the community with the skills to recognize the danger signs and build the skills needed to support prevention efforts in the commu-

Wiky stabbing remains under investigation

WIKWEMIKONG—No charges have been laid in the investigation into a double stabbing in Wikwemikong late last month, according to the Wikwemikong Tribal Police.

"The incident is still under investigation," Wikwemikong Tribal Police Chief Gary Reid told The Expositor on Friday. "I only confirm that there was a physical altercation on the Friday (August 28)/Saturday (August 29) morning."

As The Expositor previously reported, the Wikwemikong Tribal Police responded to an incident on late on August 28/early August 29 in the community resulting in two individuals being stabbed. The Wikwemikong Tribal Police called in the OPP forensic unit to collect evidence at the scene after the incident.

"One individual is still in the hospital and the other was not hospitalized," responded Chief Reid to inquiries regarding the conditions of the individuals.

members," said Ms. Hall. The committee hopes to do this by raising awareness, creating community resilience and education.

To this end, the advertisement this week focussed on knowing the warning signs, pointing out that suicide is preventable.

"There is a simple acronym that can help people remember the warning signs," said Ms. Hall. "That acronym is IS PATH WARM."

The letters stand for "Ideation, or thinking about/talking about wanting to die; Substance abuse—which increases impulsivity, hopelessness and therefore the risk of suicide; Purposelessness—

a sense of having no reason for living; Anxiety—living with high levels of worry and often expressed by not sleeping; Trapped—essentially feeling as though a person has no options or solutions to the problem(s) facing them in their lives; Hopelessness or Helplessness—a feeling as though a situation cannot improve, or that one is powerless to change it; Withdrawal from family, friends and interests; Anger—feeling out of control and or possibly revenge-seeking; Recklessness—exhibiting

increased risk-taking behaviour or a lack of regard for safety; Mood Changes—pervasive feelings of sadness or depression, irritability, and perhaps a sudden sense of resolve.

If you or a loved one, or even a casual acquaintance or neighbour, is exhibiting the above signs, you can take action by calling the crisis helpline. Most families, whether they are aware of it or not, have someone in their family who has contemplated, attempted or succeeded in committing suicide. The crisis in any community is often not readily evident, even to those who regularly follow the media, as most media outlets follow an oftunspoken rule of not reporting on suicides as media reports tend to lead to a type of contagion, where a cascade of suicides take place following the news story. There is also a desire to be respectful of the survivors, those families who have lost a family member to suicide.

"Even people in the system have no way of knowing," said Ms. Hall, as information silos prevent communication of those deaths that are suspected to have been suicides.

Currently there is a project underway to investigate those numbers, thanks to funding for the Northeastern Suicide Prevention Network for a research proposal by two psychiatrists from Sunnybrook Hospital that will help determine the size and scope of the problem.

A number of presentations will be held at local high schools on September 10 and 11 by Canadian Mental Health, taking place at Manitoulin Secondary School, Espanola High School and at wemikong High School. There will also be a launch of a new app—the Be Safe App can be downloaded to a smartphone by simply scanning the QR code, following the simple credo of "Mind Your Mind."

Joseph Maxwell launches into off-season training preparing for 2016 World Junior Championships

Manitoulin athlete sets his sights on 2020 Olympics

EVANSVILLE—Athlete Joseph Maxwell of Evansville has begun his off-season discus and shot put training after taking a much needed break following a busy season.

This summer he brought home gold in the men's discus throw 1.5 kg at the National Youth Track and Field Championship in Quebec and placed sixth in shot put in the under 18 division at the IAAF World Youth Championships in Colombia.

"I've been back training for about a week now," the 17-year-old athlete told The Expositor. "My off season training includes going to the gym, weight lifting and throwing two to three times a week. I'm working towards my indoor season, which starts in January."

Joseph explained that a lot of his indoor season meets will take place at York University in Toronto, but that he also plans to attend a few meets in the United States as well.

Joseph said the Olympics are on his mind, but not for 2016. "I have thought a lot about it, and it is still is a huge goal of mine, but I think realistically 2016 is too soon. I'm looking down the road for 2020 or 2024."

"To qualify for any of the throwing sports in the Olympics you have to be 18 or older, but you also have to meet the qualifying standard and finish in the top three in Canada at the National Track and Field Qualifying meet," said Joseph. "The qualifying throw distance varies each year, but it seems to be going up because it is based off of the world rankings. For 2016 I think it is around 20.50 metres. I have thrown close to that (at the IAAF World Youth Championships in Colombia his best throw in shot put was 20.29 metres). At the Olympics the shot put is also a heavier weight, 7.26 kg, while at the World Youths it was 5 kg."

"Next season, I hope to attend the World Junior Championships in Russia," concluded Joseph. "The World Youth Championships are for under 18, but the World Juniors are for under 20. The qualifying will be in the spring, while the championships in Russia will be mid-July."

LITTLE CURRENT—The Little Current Yacht Club's annual youth sailing school posted an outstanding 2015 season with over 60 children taking part over the seven weeks of the summer and even a number of adults took advantage of the opportunity to learn more about sailing during the evening courses.

"We had about eight to 10 kids in each session," noted sailing school organizer Tracey Chapman

The young sailors had the opportunity to learn the basics of sailing in the club's six small PICO sailboats and, by the end of the summer, some of the youth had advanced to the point that they took out the club's larger 420 sailboat. "We had kids who took their level two in earlier summers reaching level three or four, where they were learning to sail with a spinnaker," she said.

The evening sessions, held on Thursday nights from 6 pm to 8 pm, made it possible for kids who had taken the courses last year to have an opportunity to keep up their skills, particularly those who do not have a sailboat at home

"The feedback from everyone was very positive," noted Ms. Chapman.

Although she said that she could not speak for the yacht club, Ms. Chapman said that if numbers were any indication, the program would likely continue again next year. "We are a notfor-profit club without a large number of members," noted Ms. Chapman. "We are not there to make money." The biggest challenge to putting on the course is

the cost of insurance."

Looking back at past years, the year 2013 saw 30 children enrolled at the three locations, Gore Bay, Kagawong and Little Current. "We got double that this year in Little Current," said Ms. Chapman.

Ms. Chapman said that there were a number of factors that contributed to the sailing school's success this year. "The Expositor was really good to us in promoting the school, that really helped," she said. "Boyle Marine was also very helpful, especially when it came to docking the 420s and the dingy for the sailing instructors."

Ms. Chapman also said that the Town of Northeastern Manitoulin and the Islands was very helpful in supporting the program through the Little Current Yacht Club. "There were so many volunteers from the LCYC who helped throughout the season,"

she said. "Our instructor, Carolyn Quinlan, was amazing." Ms. Quinlan's parents were so taken by the Island that they wound up vacationing at a cottage in Kagawong. "Our student, Bryce Mastelko, he was excellent."

Ms. Chapman said that the program was not without some challenges, but with the assistance of constructive feedback from parents and the students the program is likely to only get better as time goes on.

As for herself, Ms. Chapman did not hesitate in giving her reaction to the experience, "it has been a wonderful experience."

UCCM Land Claims steering committee, the community comprehensive plan steering committee and the She'ndwin Teg Gaming Commission as an alternate

But her involvement in community service and committees has extended well beyond those positions directly related to her work as a M'Chigeeng band councillor at both the local and

'My experience in these areas has helped me to gain a solid understanding of where M'Chigeeng First Nation is today and what needs to be continued to ensure positive movement in the future," she said. But Ms. Debassige noted that does not mean revolutionary change is needed. "I promise not to dismantle everything our past leaders have worked hard to establish," she said, stressing the importance of continuity in community planning. "There is a lot of capac-

ity that has been built over the years that might need to be tweeked, but not changed in the absolute.'

Areas that she feels could stand to see some improvement include: community consultation and participation (a quarterly community meeting would assist with opening better lines of communication); community safety, "it is very important that chief and council continue to address the needs of the community in terms of safety and security; economic development, "it is very important we support new ideas and revenue generation initiatives using the skills and knowledge present in our own community (the proposed grocery store and continued development in the energy sector are key examples she cites); job creation, accessibility and fair opportunity will require support in attaining the training and certifications necessary to access job opportunities (too many of which are beginning to be outsourced to non-band members and outside contractors); housing, which will require not only lobbying efforts aimed at the provincial and federal levels, but also exploration of innovative and and inventive approaches; infrastructure and public works; an open and transparent chief and council, working for the best interests of the community as a whole and with regularly posted minutes; language, which Debassige notes is fundamental to ensuring the Anishinaabe legacy continues without assimilation far into the future; and aboriginal and treaty rights, where education of the next generation of treaty rights will help instill "pride, identity and to have our young people grow to continue the fight for our people."

Ms. Debassige said that she believes that a chief and council must look ahead and make decisions that are in the best interests of the community as

"The exhibit focuses on the flesh and blood of the wounds opposed to the skin because flesh is the common denominator," said Ms. Chambers. "We wear our clothing to clarify our identity and the threads are then used by forensics to identify us. Our skin is protective, a barrier to the elements while intact and alive. Our flesh underneath the skin has no regard for colour or creed. The flesh is the commonality that binds all women together. It is our common denominator and our common commodity. '

"With the installation of the exhibit, the photos, on transparent pieces of paper, will hang from 18, 11 and 8 feet so that no matter where you walk you will always be confronted with them," she continued. "I want the exhibit to be a knock to people's senses.

There is also a video portion of the exhibit with footage of a bloody wedding dress going over falls and drowning in Lake Erie.

Ms. Chambers said that she felt 'assaulted' after listening to the media stories judging, using conjecture, preaching, vilifying and further victimizing aboriginal women. "This is not just the opinion of the media, I have heard words spoken about these women that feel like shards of glass underfoot," she said. "There is no way

to walk safely or softly upon them. There is no way to unsay them once they are uttered. It is not only about educating our young men on how to be kind and respectful as they are not the only culprits in this list of crimes. Every nation on this Mother Earth is culpable. Canada is not the exception, it is the rule. We are all to blame. Subsequent to the crime it is not merely enough to hand out apologies and condolences as though they were coupons that have expired. I feel we must face brutal truths. The work contained within 'Mine is but a tear in a river' makes me feel obliged to note that some may find it uncomfortable to view. Sometimes a little discomfort is required. Flesh is a messy business after all. But I felt compelled to create it."

When asked if working with such a powerful subject matter had worn on her, Ms. Chambers responded that she has an "amazing support system.'

"My husband and two sons are just incredible," she said. "They really get what I am doing and are there for me, whatever I need. My 16-year-old son came with me to even Ottawa and helped take pho-

"The statistics are one thing, but not the only thing. I think the next step is to develop an action plan and I hope this helps bring attention to the issue," said Ms. Chambers. "The completion of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission findings as well as the release of the report from Justice Sinclair illustrates the need for both an inquiry and a viable action plan to address the issue of murdered and missing aboriginal women. But first, we must reach the Canadian public in order to raise awareness about more than just the statistics. I believe that this terribly visceral representation of the realities of the issue will help to do this.

Ms. Chambers told The Expositor that this exhibit is just the first of what she plans to be a three-part

"I want to explore the direct links to CN Rail, CP Rail, the Hudson Bay Company and religious institutions in my next piece and I'm thinking of a more performative art form. I wore a dress I had painted for some of the photos and it was really powerful. For the third, I would like to do something more abstract, about the next step, about

healing. Ms. Chambers describes her work as 'proactive social activism. "I don't care if my paintings match the colour of your walls," she joked. "The more I read (the truth and reconciliation), the more angry I get.

I only care that I have a voice and I hope that people will listen."

Ms. Chambers is Ojibwe by birth, but was adopted at a young age. She said that through her work she has been exploring her culture, roots and the history of her people.

'Mine is but a tear in a river' is divided between the OCF and the Glenhyrst Art Gallery in Brantford. One thousand and thirtyone photos, as well as 300 plus pieces of clothing and eight shopping carts are installed at the OCF, while 150 of the photos and 60 pieces of clothing and four carts are at the Glenhyrst Art Gallery, soon to move to the Ontario College of Art and Design. The exhibit at the OCF will be on display until Monday, November 30.

"We've been at this for a very long time," he said, adding that his community would continue to press for redress of their legitimate claims "as long as it takes. We aren't going away.'



A map of the Wiikwemkoong Island Boundary Claim and proposed alternative land selections.





Crown either makes a financial settlement or transfers other comparable Crown lands to the First Nation to settle the claim.

Mr. Aniol explained that the selections of alternative provincial Crown land on the mainland and Philip Edward Island were influenced by a number of factors, including their proximity to Wikwemikong's Point Grondine territory, proximity to infrastructure for community development and the historical tion the competing interests of other aboriginal and Metis claimants. In the case of the Wikwemikong land claim a competing interest has already been voiced by at least the United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising.

In order to move the negotiations forward, Wikwemikong has agreed to abide by any decision of a "court of competent jurisdiction" that substantiates other aboriginal claimant's interests.

...continued from page 1 night and was sitting up and joking with his family the following morning.

While she was not at the game when the incident occurred, she and her husband Bruce, having stopped in town for a few groceries, wound up arriving at the scene. "We had stopped by Andy's to pick up some milk and cereal for our morning breakfast and decided to drive through town, like we often do," she recalled. As they approached Thunderbird Park they could see that there was a game going on, but then a police car drove past them. "They went by us really fast," she said. The couple followed the cruiser down to the park where a chilling sight greeted them. "We were still on the road but we could see the teams all around in a circle flapping their jer-

Ms. Trudeau spoke to the first individual she saw who told her "Shaun's collapsed, your nephew Shaun." The information struck terror into her heart. "He has suffered a heart attack before," she

said. "By the time we got ber of close encounters there, they had loaded him into a Yukon."

Mr. Shawana was conscious as he was being loaded into the Yukon being driven by fellow Wiky Lumberjack and off-duty EMS worker Tim Ominika. Ms. Trudeau recalled the words of off-duty paramedic Teresa Aiabens-Peltier, "'Oh Shaun, I think I broke a rib.'" "'It's all good',' quipped Mr. Shawana in reply.

According Ms. to Trudeau, the defibrillator delivered by the police was used to deliver five shocks to Mr. Shawana's heart, restarting the organ and helping to stabilize him for the trip to the health centre.

The following day popular local MC and teacher Chris Pheasant could be seen nursing his own arm during a teacher's professional development day. "I was giving CPR," he said, noting he might have taken too long a shift. "It was a pretty heavy experience," he admitted. Mr. Pheasant, a strong advocate for organ donation, particularly amongst the aboriginal community, has had a numwith the spirit path himself, most recently having been the beneficiary of a liver transplant.

Early CPR and defibrillation can make all the difference in survival following a heart attack, noted Ms. Trudeau. She spoke to The Expositor following spending the night at the hospital. "We stayed until we were sure he was alright," she said.

Ms. Trudeau said that she and her family were extremely grateful to the many people who stepped up to help save her nephew's life. Despite his previous heart attack, Mr. Shawana, a husband and father of three, maintains an active lifestyle. "He will have to slow down a little bit, I think," noted Ms. Trudeau.

Mr. Shawana, for his part, said one of his first questions when the doctors have completed their tests will be "can I play sports again."

He currently is up and about in his hospital gown and feeling better, if more than a little bit sore. "I have five cracked ribs," he said. "Three on the left side and two on the right. The right side is pretty much healed up now, but the left is still pretty sore."

The long weekend has delayed finding out what might be causing the issue, but Mr. Shawana said that he understands that he should be able to leave the hospital by the end of the week. "Right now they are monitoring my heart and doing testing," he said. "But hopefully I can be home soon."

...continued from page 1 animals. "I don't understand why you just don't shoot them (referring to the nuisance birds)—you're a farmer, you have a right to protect your property," Mr. Skippen reports the former minister as saying.

At the September 3 court date, Mr. Skippen chose to be represented by friend and fellow Green Bay farmer Ed Ferguson, which brought some confusion to the court.

MNRF lawyer Dan Williams told Justice of the Peace Darlene Hayden that he had received email correspondence from lawyer Brad Allison on behalf of Mr. Skippen in August, but had never heard from him again. He asked the Justice to confirm whether Mr. Skippen still had Mr. Allison for a lawyer.

"He is, at the moment, not Mr. Skippen's counsel at least for the moment," Mr. Ferguson responded. "These counsellors are fairly expensive for farmers," he added.

Mr. Williams told Justice Hayden he would like to have that fact confirmed as he did not foresee a resolution to this matter happening soon, suggesting a judicial pre-trial.

Justice Hayden explained to the court that a judicial pre-trial is done completely differently depending on whether the accused is represented by counsel, or representing themselves. (A judicial pretrial sees the Crown and defense meet before a pretrial judge to discuss the issues of the case where it is evaluated by an experienced judge. The pre-trial judge is not the same judge who will preside over the

"We're not prepared to make that decision now, your worship," Mr. Ferguson replied.

Justice Hayden noted that this was not the first time this matter has been before the courts, expressing her displeasure in the fact that it has failed to gain any movement in the court system.

"In terms of length, we will call three to four witnesses which will take over two hours," Mr. Williams said. "It would be very prudent to have this issue pretrialed—there are a lot of issues that could be resolved before we go to trial," the counsel added, reiterating that he would like to know who is going to be representing Mr. Skippen.

The judicial pre-trial has been set for November 12 in Gore Bay, with Justice Hayden asking Mr. Skippen to report well before that date to Mr. Williams as to who will be representing him in court.

In an email to The Expositor following the court proceedings, Mr. Skippen confirmed that Mr. Ferguson will continue to represent him in court.

...continued from page 1 in the community for some time, trying to get people to spay or neuter their pets and even started a program with the band and local vets offering subsidized service, but people just weren't utilizing the opportunity. There were a lot of reasons, but the major one was transportation.

Manitowabi explained that with the SPCA mobile unit, band members can book their dog or cat in to get spayed or neutered right in Wikwemikong, eliminating the transportation issue. The band is also supporting the cause and the service will be subsidized.

"Pet owners are just asked to book ahead of time with us and to pay a small contribution," continued Ms. Manitowabi. "We have been working on this for some time and in April of 2015 the mobile unit came into service and it was the perfect opportunity for us. We have been doing a lot of pre-registration and just making the community aware of the visit and service. So far we have about 70 animals registered, 50 dogs and 40 "This is a great thing for

the community," said Ms. ...continued on page 13



...continued from page 1 was taking prednisone, steroids to keep the progression of my kidneys from failing," she said.
"There was a lot of swelling, insomnia, lots of issues that went along with that."

Halfway through her first semester her doctor told her that she could not handle it. "I had to withdraw from school," she said. Soon she was travelling back and forth to Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto. "This is all while pregnant," she said. High blood pressure, then low blood pressure and then gestational diabetes due to the high dosages of prednisone that led to her having to inject insulin two to three times a day.

Once her son was born it became clear that she would need a transplant—almost immediately.

"It didn't really kick in until my son was born," she said. "Two weeks before my son was born I was hospitalized." Her kidneys began to fail in earnest. "They did not work anymore," she said. "I went from 60 percent to 15 percent in seven months."

Then came steady rounds of dialysis. Her son was born eight weeks early, the day after her own birthday. "Not long after having Jack I started to get really sick," she recalled. "I had no appetite."

It was six weeks until she started dialysis, from then on her kidneys were unable to handle the job of keeping her system clear.

Ms. Casson said that she was very lucky compared to a lot of people in the hospital.

She was put on a list for a transplant which happens "the day you start dialysis." She was contending with these issues all while tending to a newborn baby, travelling to Sudbury twice a week.

"My mom was a big help," she said. The support of her parents was critical to her being able to manage through these trying times. Ms. Casson would often find herself sitting in the dialysis chair

The road ahead looked very difficult at this point. The waiting list for her kidney was at least three to four years. Then her doctor referred her to Toronto General Hospital. "They have one of the best programs in Canada," she said. But it came with a catch—a six to eight year waiting list.

Her mother decided to get tested as a possible kidney donor. It was a long shot. "She isn't my biological mother," explained Ms. Casson. "There is tons of testing you have to go through and you have to be under a certain age. If you are 60 or 70-years-old, you can't donate." In a most serendipitous turn of events, her mother turned out to be a match. "Because we are not related by blood, it is extremely rare," said Ms. Casson. "I would have been waiting for years.'

It still took a while, there were meetings with doctors and batteries of further testing that had to be done. "It was another three to four months after finding out (that her mother was a match)," said Ms. Casson

In the end, the mother who chose to adopt her into her life wound up giving her the Gift of Life

through the donation of a part of her own body. "I can't express how grateful I am to my parents," said Ms. Casson. "Without my mom I would not be where I am today."

The experience gave her a very intimate connection to the act of organ donation and the impact it has on people's lives. "One organ donor can save up to eight or nine lives," said Ms. Casson. "There are roughly 1,500 people waiting for organs and about a third of those people die while waiting."

"Think about it," she said. "If something were to happen to you, you could do something so very important for so many other people."

Ms. Casson's son Jack is now two-years-old and thanks to her mother's gift, Ms. Casson can hope to see him grow up, but the story is far from over.

"People think you get a transplant and everything is okay," she said. "It isn't like that." The medications needed run to the thousands of dollars a month. "It is about four to five thousand dollars a month," she said. "It is even more expensive in the US."

Getting a transplant is not a cure, she explained. "The organ deteriorates and eventually you have to do it again. You might get 15 to 20 years. I am 22 now, it doesn't last a lifetime. There is no cure."

"People take life for

granted," she said. "But you could lose that all in a blink of an eye."

Ms. Casson said that everyone should sign a donor card and make sure that their family understands their wishes. You never know if it will be you or someone that you love who will need that Gift of Life. Learn more about becoming an organ donor by logging onto www.beadonor.ca/DonorRegistry

The centre was envisioned, in the words of the opening ceremony's emcee and community elder Grace Fox, as a place "where we can speak our language without reprisal."

M'Chigeeng Chief Joe Hare took to the podium to speak about his thoughts on the opening of the centre, noting that the event would likely be his last official act as the election of his successor would be taking place on September 12 (Chief Hare has decided to retire from political life). "It is good to see people here," he said, teasing some in the audience about being "dressed up" for the occasion.

"I have to the best of my ability supported this place, this vision, this building, on behalf of the leadership, the elders of this community and Grace Fox," he said. Chief Hare noted the importance of protecting the language, Anishinaabemowin, and that this initiative, which began so long ago, is hopefully just one of many more events that will support the language as time goes by.

Although Chief Hare noted that the building does not yet have enough people signed up as tenants to fill its 10 apartments (originally there was a waiting list, but the time frame in completing the project took its toll on that list), he admonished the future leadership of the community to stay true to the vision of restricting tenancy to the elderly.

He urged the community to support those people running for council that would maintain that vision, rather than falling to the pressure of opening up the apartments for general rental. "I am getting out of politics," he said, "so I can say what I want to say." He chastised those council members who wanted to open up the rentals to those other than the elderly. "I have nothing against younger people,' he said. "I wish I was younger myself, but I would encourage you to support the elders. There are lots of other places for younger people to stay or build homes.

Chief Hare lauded the work of councillors Henry Panamick, Debassige and Gmewin Migwans (the latter two are running to replace him as chief), who he said were very supportive of the project. He urged the electors of M'Chigeeng to stand behind their elders and to make their feelings known to the new council. "I urge you to stand together and keep this place the way it was intended to be."

The building was designed and constructed without using the band's general funds, although the most recent meeting of council did secure an additional \$250,000 towards making improvements in the building.

The spacious two-bedroom units are envisioned as providing homes for individual elders, with the second bedroom geared towards live-in caretakers

or spouses. The rent, which is set at an affordable \$650 a month all-in, includes a fully-equipped kitchen, living room, two bedrooms, full bathrooms with assistive devices, patio doors leading out to an outstanding view, gardens (landscaped by volunteers led by Gene and Susan Bebamash) and parking in a covered garage.

The building also includes a boardroom, meeting hall, well-equipped kitchen for events and an apartment for visiting lecturers and locums.

The steering committee for the project was fully volunteer, noted Ms. Fox. "There was no meeting honorariums, no mileage claims submitted, no remuneration of any kind for the committee members," she said. She noted that the building was financed through the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Commission. "We still owe a lot," she said, "but we have not put the band in deficit."

The emcee noted that there were a large number of people and businesses in the community who had made significant personal donations to get the project off the ground, including \$1,000 contributions from Patrine and Dr. O'Connor, Roseanne Debassige, Susan Hare, Joe Hare, Justin Roy (all the way from Arizona), Kenjgewin Teg, the

UCCMM and others who wished to remain anonymous that came to \$12,000.

"If anyone else has \$1,000 to spare we would happily accept it," said Ms. Fox to a chorus of laughter.

Ms. Fox recognized the attendance of Elizabeth Roy and Bertha Roy of the UCCM Elder's Group and the hard work of the steering committee members Evelyn Debassige, Pauline Debassige and Christine Migwans. "These are the people who made things rock in this place," she said.

Ms. Fox also recognized the hard work of the four coordinators, starting with Diane Debassige, who worked on the project since its inception, especially the current coordinator Missy Corbiere. "She is not a clock watcher," said Ms. Fox, adding with a laugh that "sometimes we wish she would."

An elder by definition of the Anishinaabemowin Gamig Elders Centre is fairly lenient, beginning at age 50, so it includes some people who might bristle at being labeled as seniors, she noted.

Deacon Joe Fox delivered an opening prayer at the ceremonies, and conducted a blessing with cedar and holy water following the speeches, while an ad hoc drum group garnered from the nearby powwow played an honour song.







It is the condition for understanding, Deut:4:6, Ps.111:10. It is the condition for having confidence in prayer and having prayers answered, I John 3:21+22. God himself came down in fire on the first day of Pentecost on mount Sinai, Ex.19 and spoke these commandments, God himself wrote these ten commandments on two stone tablets. 

Gore Bay's Harbour Centre offers a new cultural hub of fine art and fine vistas

by Isobel Harry GORE BAY—If Manitoulin's vigorous arts and culture scene makes your pulse quicken, you'll want to add Gore Bay's Harbour Centre to your list of Island "musts" this year.

The imposing wood structure sits on the waterfront near the marina on the road to the Janet Head Lighthouse. Construction finished in 1985 when the town's plan was for the building to serve as an incubator for new businesses. That worked for a period but eventually the building was put up for sale in 2010.

"The idea to develop this building as a cultural centre and marine museum came from the museum board," explains Nicole Weppler, the director of the Gore Bay Museum who is an avid arts supporter and mentor to many artists. Ms. Weppler, with the backing of the board, applied for and was awarded three major federal and provincial grants for the project, with a feasibility study funded by LAMBAC. approached artists to gauge their interest in the project, and the response was overwhelmingly positive," says Ms. Weppler. "It gave us the confidence to approach architect Brian Garratt, the designer of the museum's new galleries that opened 10 years

Mr. Garratt designed a plan to refit the Harbour Centre, and did so "with great sensitivity. Brian understands what he's looking at, he's an excellent listener and asks about the use of each space before deciding how to treat it." The Harbour Centre's three floors of shops, galleries, studios and marine museum are expansive and high-ceilinged, the reclaimed hardwood floors gleam and the repurposed heavy timber beams from the old Silverwood Creamery in Toronto are the object of wonder at their commanding presence. There is a meditative and tranquil mood in the building that comes from the harmonious melding of materials with the purpose they serve. Working artists engage with visitors the as they flow in and out, up and down the stairs and onto the verandah wrapped around three sides to gaze onto the beach below, the bluff and the North Shore on the

The Harbour Centre's entrance on Water Street leads into a bright lobby with an ongoing book sale, a fundraiser for the Gore Bay Museum. To the right is Scissors and Silk, Linda Noe's fibre art studio. She cuts fabric into hundreds of tiny pieces, forming leaves on tree branches, waves in water, flower petals or subtle tonalities in a house's exterior, "layering the fabric in a collage," which is then sewn expertly on her sewing machine by the large picture win-

Beyond, the ground floor is home to a public gallery and adjacent kitchen (with art by Michael Robinson currently on view) that doubles as community space for workshops such as knitting, quilting, music, writing and watercolour painting as well as for concerts and exhibitions, all led and supported by creative community members and fellow artists Debbie Colville, Christie Best-Pearson, Margo Little, Sylvia Fletcher, Jane Best and many others.

A wide staircase leads to the second floor, as does a full-access ramp from the parking lot on that level, leading to several studiogalleries and shops.

Lynne Gerard has been a tenant

in the Harbour Centre since 2006, when there was a stained glass studio, a motorcycle repair shop and a fish hatchery here. Today the snow no longer drifts into the studio and I don't need to work wearing scarves and gloves to ward off the cold."

Ms. Gerard is the artist behind Ravenseyrie Studio and Art Gallery, a beautifully appointed space with an eclectic array of antique furniture and shelving separated into a distinct working area and a separate shop where she sells her original paintings, prints, greeting cards and 'painted stones.' The artist produces everything in-house, printing on fine art paper and framing and packaging her work for repeat customers who love her watercolour renditions of horses, ravens, sandhill cranes and other Island fauna and flora accentuated with her soulful calligraphy poems. Her painted stones emanated from her study of ancient cave paintings: "I use natural pigments, referencing old scientific papers to prepare the same mix used in prehistoric times," says the artist.

Ms. Gerard also studied Chi-

nese painting and found a style from 960 AD called "the three perfections" that combined poetry, painting and calligraphy into one art form. "That was exactly what I wanted to do, it was the validation for me to keep going with what I loved."

Across the hall is Whytes, owned by Ashley and Dylon Whyte, featuring the paintings and collages of iconic Gore Bay artist Jack Whyte and a selection of original paintings and collages, prints, postcards and 'pocket art' of his work. Also featured is the work of Anishinaabe artist Mark Seabrook, wooden walking sticks and flutes by local carver Will Smith, jewellery, chainmail and 'bleachwear,' a nod to the psychedelic era of tie-dyed clothing. Says Dvlon: "We display a combination of fine and applied arts. This is our third year in the Harbour Centre; we came here after selling at farmers' markets on the Island because we wanted to reach out to a broader audience. Here we can access a larger world audience through our Internet sites and projects. We enjoy the educational exchanges that happen here between artist and visitor. We're

niture. "I turn found objects into pieces of sculpture," says Roman, showing off works that transform old square-head nails and wood knots into thought-provoking collectibles. Roman is a joiner, or master carpenter, who accepts commissions for kitchens, built-ins, cottages and fireplaces as well as artwork. For the shop he sculpts birds with minutely detailed feathers and little wooden Santas with tiny lifelike features and a touch of humour, rustic birdhouses transformed into patio lanterns and a sculpture inspired by his brother's diving prowess. "All my work revolves around memories of Manitoulin," says the craftsman. "I've been coming to the Island since I was five years old, this has always been

Beside Roman Mann is Oriole Arts Studio and Gallery, a "collaborative" of five women made up of Ann Beam, Lynda James, Nancy McDermid, erin-blythe reddie, and, full disclosure, this writer, working in pottery, photography, paintings, textile art, 'naturescapes' and mixed media. Nancy and erin-blythe began creating together two winters ago in the space that was then Fish Point Studio. "Our dream of having our own studio became real when the space became vacant. Our names were on a list of artists who were in line for a vacancy, and in April this year we were notified that we were at the top of the list. We knew then we would say yes." They started a search for "resonance," says erinblythe, "among the spirits of the artists we thought would be harmonious with ours. We wanted to share our dream.

Oriole Arts is airy, with windows and a door to the long verandah overlooking the East Bluff of Gore Bay and stocked with pots and bowls, photos and paintings, silk and woven scarves and zen constructions with haiku. "This is a first-class studio," says Nancy McDermid, "and the architecture of these spaces helps us be more creative. The camaraderie amongst all the artists is invaluable and we are so grateful for the exchange."

Just across the hall is HY Creates, the working studio and gallery of Heather Young, who, as she explains, works "in all mediums. There's nothing I'm not interested in, from still life to animal, spiritual, surreal, symbolic and traditional themes. I paint out of my mind's eye." Her small and medium-sized canvasses of overcast medieval villages, endearing portraits of sheep, a horse or a donkey are arranged beside a Gothic face or a dozen eggs on the

gallery walls, portraying "what she knows intimately," says Nicole Weppler, "and her paintings are little jewels."

The third floor of the Harbour Centre is dedicated to the William Purvis Marine Centre, anchored by historian G.I. 'Buck' Longhurst's extensive collection of important marine memorabilia. "Wharf rat, that's what people call me," says Mr. Longhurst. "My dad had three charter boats and I took my first trip across Lake Superior at three months." The historian started collecting and taking pictures in the 1960s; one-third of his collection is now owned privately, one-third was donated to Algoma University College and one-third to the Harbour Centre. "There are 20,000 slides here and 12,000 prints in an archive that people can use in their research."

In the bright, climate-controlled loft-like room, there are intricate model boats, shipping company histories, lighthouse lenses, paintings, and working parts of boats such as a steam whistle, steering wheel and running lights. There is a display of the 20 books authored by Mr. Longhurst about Great Lakes marine history, for sale or browsing.

Nicole Weppler has been the director of the Gore Bay Museum since 1987, raising funds and overseeing the expansion of the former jailer's home with an addition of two state-of-the-art galleries, for which the museum won the 2014 Russell K. Cooper Living History Site or Heritage-Based Museum Award given by the Ontario Historical Society. The Gore Bay Harbour Centre is a passion she has worked equally hard to develop. "Artists need to live in a community, to give and receive encouragement. It is very difficult to make a living as an artist, so it is very important to be encouraged to continue and to have affordable space. Artists are necessary for our existence, we cannot live without art, and the town of Gore Bay has made it possible for artists to live with a measure of security. In return, the Harbour Centre has become a place infused with culture that is a showcase for the town."

"This year is the busiest I remember, in terms of numbers of people who have walked through," adds Lynne Gerard, echoing her colleagues. "The Harbour Centre is not just a destination, but an experience."



Silver Birch String Quartet virtuoso performance entertains and educates at Gore Bay Museum

GORE BAY—You don't usually think of Manitoulin as a hotbed of chamber music devotees, but that would be a serious oversight, as last month's standing-roomonly concert by the Silver Birch String Quartet (aka SBSQ) at the Gore Bay Museum amply demonstrated.

Based in Sudbury and String Quartet-in-Residence at Laurentian University since 2012, SBSQ is Christian Robinson and Geoff McCausland on violins, Alexandra Lee on cello and Jane Russell on viola. Together they've performed all over North America and collaborated with many renowned Canadian chamber musicians, garnering a JUNO nomination in 2010 and two Felix awards in Québec for their first album, 'Silverbirch,' also named one of the Top 10 albums of the year by the Montreal Gazette.

Christian Robinson is an accomplished violinist who emceed the evening's proceedings for the 75-plus attendees. He's a little nerdy-looking with his thick dark glasses that he often pushes back onto his nose, recalling clichés of absent-minded professors, except when he's sitting down playing his violin. Then he's a tireless whirling dervish of the strings. A consummate performer, he warms up the audience with jokes and anecdotes whose message is: relax, you're going to enjoy yourselves, no matter how little or how much you know about classical chamber music. He's a bit like the clowns tumbling out of the miniature cars before the circus starts, and looks just as surprised that he's getting laughs.

While SBSQ is a very serious ensemble composed of four virtuosi, they are also educators driven by a passion to communicate their love not only of the chamber music form but of music in its entirety. Mr. Robinson gets the audience onside with his easy-torelate-to descriptions of the music they're about to play: "Bach is so mathematical in his compositions; they are like a series of intellectual puzzles. He'd be a computer programmer today." Or, so we can appreciate Haydn fully, and perhaps for the






...continued from page 4A today." In 2013, the Silver Birch String Quartet recorded an album of the complete music for string quartet by Lemay.


Alexandra Lee sums it

It is best to plant native trees in your garden including: sugar maple, white ash, red mulberry and chokecherry.
