

Norisle group's fundraiser begins **\$18.5 million quest** To refurbish and refit historic steamship for active service

MANITOWANING BAY-It was 40 years ago that the S.S. Norisle sailed into Manitowaning Bay, making the port her permanent berth in retirement and where she has sat ever since, her condition worsening with each passing year.

Eight years ago, the Friends of the Norisle organization was born-a group founded by Manitowaning's Jean McLennan and dedicated to preserving the beloved steamship that provided ferry service from Tobermory to South Baymouth from 1947 to 1974 before the M.S. Chi-Cheemaun took over. (The group has since been renamed the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society.) The group has worked tirelessly, dedicating volunteer hours and funds to doing what they can to keep the Norisle afloat (and from looking shabby), but recently decided to step up their game, entering into a partnership with Compenso Communications, a communications and government relations firm whose expertise is securing funds in various forms. They also happen to be based in Collingwood, home of the shipbuilding yard where the Norisle was built.

The Compenso team recently met with members of Assiginack staff and council, outlining the strategies and the execution behind seeing the Norisle seaworthy and sailing once again.

Dave Ham, chair of the S.S. Norisle Steamship Society, began the meeting, introducing Paul Bonwick, president of Compenso Communications. Mr. Bonwick noted that his father worked on the building of the Norisle in 1946 and that he himself had worked in the Collingwood ...continued on page 11

Green Bay farmer will fight four federal, provincial wildlife charges

Says he had permission from MNRF minister to shoot nuisance birds

GREEN BAY—It may have taken four charges to be levelled against him by a Manitoulin conservation officer (CO), but Green Bay farmer Paul Skippen is happy that the plight of the farmer and the damages they constantly incur from wildlife, with no compensation from any level of government, may finally be heard, even if in a court of law. At every opportunity, Mr. Skippen, also a councillor for the Northeast Town, raises the issue of the lack of compensation for farmers who lose thousands of dollars in crop damages because of wildlife, including conversa-

tions with the ministers of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and Agriculture and Food themselves. It was during one such encounter at the Ontario Goods Roads Association/Rural

Preliminary hearing begins for alleged Little Current arsonist

by Isobel Harry GORE BAY—Witnesses began to be called on Monday, June 15 in the preliminary hearing of Clinton Gordon Haggart, the 32-yearold Little Current man who stands accused of seven counts of arson in a series of suspicious fires that tore through homes and businesses in that town last summer.

A preliminary hearing will determine what evidence the Crown has, providing an opportunity for the defence to evaluate the case against their client. As expected, the court imposed a publication ban to protect the fairness and integrity of the case and the privacy or safety of a victim or witness; in this case, the applicable section of the Criminal Code of Canada is 539(1), specifically related to preliminary hearings. An order under this section bans publication of

evidence taken at a preliminary inquiry until the accused has been discharged or, if ordered to stand trial, the trial has ended.

Before Judge Louise Serré of the Ontario Court of Justice, it

Canada paying taxes to Central on 'proceeds of crime' farmland

MANITOULIN-CENTRAL While the Michael's Bay township site in Tehkummah has been the centre of attention through the past few years following the

seizure of the property as proceeds of crime by the Canadian government on behalf of the Kingdom of Belgium, a number of the properties owned by the Vandroemme family and Eso Agri Canada were farms located in Central Manitoulin. It was announced at the June 11 Central Manitoulin council meeting that the municipality had received good news from the Seized Property Management Directorate in the form of an agreement to pay at least \$56,000 in back taxes owing on the seized properties and that the balance of interest and penalties would be negotiated.

"We received a letter that indicated that they took consideration of our concerns," said CAO Ruth Frawley. "They had sent us a let-

Ontario to begin restricting neonicotinoid-coated corn and soybeans this July 1

TORONTO—Ontario is poised to become the first jurisdiction in North America to reduce the number of acres planted with neonicotinoid-coated corn and soybean seeds starting July 1, 2015. By 2017 the new rules are expected to see a reduction in the number of acres planted with the seeds by as much as 80 percent.

"Farmers are environmental stewards of their land and this regulation will enable our province's farmers to strengthen their approach to protecting their crops," Agriculture Minister Jeff Leal said in a Tuesday, June 9 statement.

"I think it's a step in the right direction," said Big Lake bee producer Dave Kains, who had just looked into the announcement when contacted Monday (June 15). "They are calling for a pretty significant reduction in a couple of years.'

Although the bee kill over this past winter has been severe in some ocalities, Mr. Kains' losses this past winter were relatively light. "We only lost about four precent of our bees, which is pretty good compared to some areas. We have not seen the severe losses they have seen in other regions.'

MANITOULIN-Split Rail Brewing Company began as a dream over five years ago, when longtime friends Andrea Smith and Eleanor Charlton set out to brew a high quality, great tasting craft beer on Manitoulin Island.

This dream is now a reality. Split Rail is licenced to sell beer and its first sales to Island establishments are on the books. This comes after Split Rail moved operations from its home-based garage near Mindemoya in late 2014 to its new location in Gore Bay, adjacent to one of the Island's biggest marinas and close to great local dining and artists' studios. A full public launch and retail hours are planned for July. Thanks to Manitoulin Transport's support, the Split Rail team has renovated the facility to suit on-site brewing and include a retail store. The store's tasting bar features artwork by worldrenowned artist Michael Belmore, and creatively acknowledges the company's KickStarter funders and many supporters. While several recipes have been perfected under the tutelage of brew master Glenn Fobes, Split Rail is launching with its inaugural two beers. "Our first offerings are Split Rail Copper Lager and Split Rail Hawberry Ale. The lager is a balanced, smooth and drinkable beer, with rich body and

Manitoulin Central FHT renos near completion

Both hospital sites to undergo further changes

MANITOULIN—As the Manitoulin Central Family Health Team (FHT) Capital Expansion Project nears completion, further changes at both Manitoulin Health Centre (MHC) sites are on the horizon.

"The (FHT) building is completed both inside and out and in operation, but the parking lot and landscaping are still in progress,' explained MHC CEO Derek Graham, noting that the project should be officially complete later this summer. "Also as part of the plan, once the FHT was in operation the existing offices in the basement of the hospital will undergo a redesign."

The MHC Little Current site could also see a renovation in the near future. Mr. Graham said that the hospital is currently looking at redesigning the emergency department.

"We have been in the planning phase and hope to move into the next phase shortly with the initial costing from engineers," Mr. Graham told The Expositor. "We hope that through the renovations we can create a better flow in the emergency department and create a more patient-centered space. Our target for this year is the planning and costing, which we will then take to the board for review.'

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

Wikwemikong Cup and Saucer effort a great arrangement

It was encouraging to read a story in last week's paper that demonstrates the dual and related spirits of cooperation and community improvement.

The Manitoulin Tourism Association (MTA) has for more then a half century managed the famous Cup and Saucer hiking trails. Over the years, the trails have been improved, even lengthened, and about 25 years ago an optional, somewhat more challenging adventure trail was added.

This endeavour has always been a cooperation effort for when one is hiking the Cup and Saucer trails, one is using property owned by two local construction companies and the parking lot and entrance are in fact located on property owned by one of these, Don Eadie Construction

In addition, the Northeast Town provided new entranceway signage recently and also empties garbage containers in the parking lot so they, too, are part of the cooperative model as is the Niagara Escarpment Biosphere which purchased adjacent property several

years ago, adding further trails to the mix.

The story last week brought in a new player: Wikemikong Tourism staff, when asked to help by the MTA management, set about a spring cleaning of the trail system.

The crew come as volunteers and, by all accounts, did a first rate job of putting the trail system in top form for the busy summer months ahead.

They did so, according to Wikwemikong Tourism manager Luke Wassegijig, because his organization recognizes the regional tourism significance of this feature and they were only too pleased to help out.

This is really a model partnership: municipal, First Nation, private sector and not for profit groups all agreeing that this is a feature that is important to everyone and so must be maintained in good order.

This isn't a unique multi-party arrangement but it is unusual enough to merit positive comment.

Mr. Williamson said that he hoped other Island communities would take up the idea and that it would spread across the Island. "It would be a great idea for South Baymouth where the people are waiting for the ferry," he said. "It would give them something to do."

"This kind of thing works best if it takes shape on its own," said Mr. Williamson, who suggested the sessions will grow organically into a form that suits the venue.

Tonight we are here to celebrate these wonderful young people and their accomplishment," said MSS Principal Laurie Zahnow.



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

"There was a sewing convener," he continued. "She reported on the quantities of sheets, towel and surgical sheets that had been made during the year. In December of 1958 the Sisters of the hospital (then St. Joseph's Hospital) asked if some of the auxiliary members would assist in the mending over several afternoons. In March of 1950 the late Sarah Nickeloff was asked to dress as a clown and sell balloons. Our own Barbara Lawrence dressed up as Miss Hawberry 60 years later when we hosted the North Central Region Conference in 2010. In 1970,

the Nursing Sisters discussed with the auxiliary how to further assist the patients. They helped with letter writing, reading to the patients, setting patients' hair and helping with crafts."

"The Expositor covered Auxiliary's the 35th anniversary tea in 1980, 35 years ago," said Mr. Sylvester. "Twelve of the 58 Sisters of St. Joseph who had been stationed here from 1945-1979 were able to attend the anniversary tea. It was at that time that the Sisters of St Joseph relinquished ownership and the hospital became known as the Manitoulin Health Centre. At that time, the north central region chair, from Blind River, advised in her address that Ontario's auxiliary membership was 66,000 with 224 hospital auxiliaries."

We have built quite a history," Mr. Sylvester concluded. "Laila has kept a record of pictures and articles on events and activities during the past 10-15 years. "There has been a lot of dollars raised and equipment purchased over the years. There has been fun and friendships and the events have also provided an opportunity for the community to come together socially. We are continuing the tradition.'

Manitoulin Arts and Culture Council celebrates first anniversary

KAGAWONG—The Manitoulin Arts and Cultural Council (MACC) has passed a seminal milestone and will be marking its first anniversary with a celebratory meeting at the Kagawong Park Centre.

"This month marks the first anniversary of the MACC," noted organizer author Kate Thompson. "To make our monthly meeting special, we're going to hold it at the Kagawong Park Centre from 1:30 to 3:30 pm."

Spokesperson Alex Baran of Providence Bay noted that MACC grew out of an initiative of LAMBAC two years ago that sought to bring a profitable coherence to the arts and artistic community on Manitoulin.

"Out of that first conference at the Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre we held a day of action at the Kagawong Park Centre," noted Mr. Baran. "About 40 people came out and the decision was made to try and give birth to something," he said. Four committees came from that meeting, dealing with structure, communication, innovations/ideas and programming. "Two committees eventually merged," he said. "One of the things that happened out of that final meeting was that we said 'let's try to have something come out of this that represents the thinking that has gone on to date'," said Mr. Baran. Throughout the intervening months the MACC, made up of a number of local artists and interested people, met either in person at Mr. Baran's home in Providence Bay or, more innovatively, by SKYPE. "It's been great," he said of the technological meeting space. "Instead of having to brave the winter roads in January and February we were able to get together in the warmth and safety of our own homes."

The meeting at the Kagawong Park Centre taking place this Sunday, June 21 will provide an opportunity for those who attended the original meeting to be briefed on what has been accomplished to date, as well as to learn about a couple of important possibilities for Manitoulin.

Artist returns to his roots for Ojibwe Cultural Foundation exhibit

M'CHIGEENG—The Ojibwe Cultural Foundation (OCF) is featuring an art exhibit of the works of Paul Whittam, a Midland-based artist with ties to Manitoulin.

Mark Seabrook of the OCF discoverd Mr. Whittam's art on Facebook and was drawn to his unique style.

"I came across his work and really liked his style," Mr. Seabrook told The Expositor. "It is faintly Ojibwe Woodland, but he had taken it to his own place."

art courses while earning an Indigenous Studies honour degree at Trent University.

Through speaking with Star Otter, Mr. Seabrook also learned that he had a strong connection to Manitoulin.

"He (Star Otter) was adopted at a young age, but learned later in life that his family is from Sheshegwaning First Nation," said Mr. Seabrook. "Through elders and traditional instructions he found his uncle and eventually his mother who he reunited with on Manitoulin Island."

The works of Star Otter will be on display now at the OCF, 15 Highway 551 (the corner of Highways 551 and 540) in M'Chigeeng First Nation until Thursday, July 2.

The OCF is open Mondays to Fridays 9 am to 6 pm, Saturdays 10 am to 4 pm and Sundays 12 to 4 pm.



...continued from page 3 roa mite, he noted. "I think it (bee die-offs) will prove to be the result of a combination of things," he said.

Mr. Kains agreed that it was somewhat surprising that, considering the important role that bees and other pollinators play in ensuring the global food supply, that the question of the cause of the bee die-offs is still so uncertain. "There is a lot of attention on it now," he will continue to be allowed to plant the seeds in up to 50 percent of their corn and soybean fields, although exceptions will be available to those who can provide evidence that they are experiencing pest issues.

Neonicotinoids impact the ability of bees, and some 400 other pollinator species (including birds and butterflies) to navigate, feed or reproduce. The pesticide has also been fingered in weakening the pollinators, opening the doors for other diseases and parasites. ed an unsustainable 58 percent. Since any losses over 15 percent are not believed to be sustainable, many of the province's beekeepers were regarding the issue as an industry threatening crisis.

Despite the lag in global response, Mr. Kains said he commended the Ontario government in taking action on the issue.

Mr. Kains will once again be hosting a workshop for new beekeepers at his Can-

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said, "but it seems to have been slow in coming."

As of July, there will also be new rules in place to track the sale and use of neonicotinoid-treated seeds. During the planting season next year, farmers

Mr. Bonwick, a former MP and municipal councillor, congratulated Assiginack council and the previous councils on seeing the vision of the Steamship Society and lending support over the years. He introduced the team of Abby Stec, now the executive director of the Steamship Society, and Elaine Kelly, executive administrator and an avid marine history buff who hails from England.

Ms. Stec, he explained, has led numerous multimillion dollar fundraising campaigns and will do the same for the Norisle, which needs to raise \$18.5 million in funds with "significant private and public buy-in." The goal set to raise this money is between 18 months and two years which would bring the year to 2017—the same year the municipality is relinquished of its duty to care for the aged steamship. (The province gifted Assiginack with the Norisle once she became decommissioned for service 40 years ago.)

"We are looking for support as well as permission to enable staff to work with us and help in applying for funding," Mr. Bonwick addressed council.

Ms. Stec gave the presentation to council, explaining that the campaign's goal is to: "raise the necessary funds to refit the Norisle and return her to service as a heritage passenger steamship on Great Lakes cruises." In a feasibility study con-

ducted by the firm EPCG, it was found that there is evidence of a "significant market" being available for multi-day, berthed passenger cruises in the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River from mid-May to October with anecdotal evidence showing that specific ports could support a winter restaurant operation aboard the Norisle.

The breakdown of financial requirements is as follows: ship refit, \$13.5 million; contingency allowance, \$2.7 million (20 percent of overall); shore equipment, \$25,000; preopening/start-up costs, \$440,000; and operating deficiencies, \$666,000 for the first two years.

Ms. Stec explained that the Steamship Society and Compenso will work hard to secure major gifts and sponsors, raising the majority of the funds before making the campaign public. Target markets for fundraising include: Ontario residents, specifically from the Golden Horseshoe; Quebec residents, particularly from Montreal; other Canadians; US border states, particularly New York and Chicago (which are priority markets for the Ontario Tourism Marketing Partnership (OTMP)); US longer-haul markets, particularly those markets which are targeted by the Canadian Tourism Commission and OTMP, such as Boston and Los Angeles; and international markets, particularly

Ontario's priority overseas markets with an interest in historic luxury travel including Germany, the UK and France. Other markets include those with a strong interest in heritage, cruising, Northern Ontario and wilderness adventure: incentive travel markets; those travelling with highend tour companies; small corporate groups on meetings/getaways; and steamship and steam-related theme groups.

The five potential sources of funding, explained by Ms. Stec, are government, (federal, provincial and municipal). private sector investment, public-private partnerships, potential partners and fundraising and sponsors (in-kind and financial)

Ms. Stec explained that the Norisle has the fact that it is a steamship in its favour as an attraction, along with the heritage of the Great Lakes, smaller passenger numbers, interesting shore excursions and access to smaller ports.

Compenso expects the initial refit to create 102 jobs in Ontario with a price tag of \$6.1 million in employment income and \$4.5 million in taxes. The Norisle is also expected to create 58 jobs with \$2.3 million in employment income and, over 10 years, operations are anticipated to generate over \$49 million in spending in the economy, 580 person years of employment and \$23 million in employment

income.

A four-year projection presented by Ms. Stec shows 1,355 passengers expected with a gross revenue of \$4,003,000 and an operating profit of \$427,000. "The business model is

strong, it will work, but will take up to two years to get it to stand on its own and be sustainable," Ms. Stec told the group.

John Coulter, a member of the Steamship Society, spoke of his work on the Seguin in Muskoka, which proved to be sustainable after four years and is "very successful."

Mr. Bonwick again spoke of the importance of a municipal partnership in

...continued from page 1 ter that led us to believe that there is some wiggle room."

Interest charged on outstanding taxes tends to run around 15 percent a year, noted the clerk. While the federal government was not prepared to pay the interest and penalties in full, they were sensitive to the fact that the municipality had incurred interest costs in financing the shortfall on the tax levy. "We don't want to make a profit on this,"

noted Ms. Frawley. The total outstanding was roughly \$79,000, and Public Works Canada has indicated that it will pay the principal of \$56,000.

"Does this fall under PIL (payment in lieu)?" asked Councillor Alex Baran.

Ms. Frawley explained that PIL only kicks in once the federal government actually owns the proper-

terms of staff support and the municipal charitable status. He noted the upcoming 150th anniversary of the country and the funding opportunities that will be made available for heritage projects such as this one.

Reeve Paul Moffat asked about the Norisle refit and where it would take place.

It was explained that it depends on the boat's substructure as to where it will be refitted.

The business case shows that a larger port, such as Collingwood, would be a better home port for the Norisle, "but at the end of the day, it's the Friends of the Norisle who make that call, but the business case will really say it."

Should all go to plan, the Norisle would likely see a summer sailing season of Toronto to Montreal with late summer to fall sailings in Georgian Bay and the North Channel.

"And she'll be flying the Northern flag and the Northern story," Ms. Stec said. "She is an ambassador for the North. The Norisle is not stationery—she carries the Northern flag wherever she goes."

Councillor Leslie Fields questioned the 18 months to two years time frame. "So, in that time, the ship just stays here and hopefully continues to float?" she asked.

"Not necessarily," Mr. Coulter replied. "There has to be a sufficient appreciation of funds, but we could have a phased-in refit."

"When I first met with the group they

talked about the ship as if she were alive and seeing her today, stepping aboard, she certainly is—she just needs a little bit of waking up," Ms. Stec said.

Mr. Ham told The Expositor that there have been numerous meetings with Compenso before getting to this stage, ensuring they were a good fit for the Steamship Society.

On the question of whether Manitowaning would be the home port for the Norisle again, "that would probably remain to be seen," Mr. Ham said. "Originally, it was the intention of council to have the Norisle winter here and Assiginack would benefit a bit from that (in its current berth)." Mr. Ham noted that 40 years ago, 60 foot pilings were driven into the bay alongside the ship and could continue to be used during the winter months.

"It's an interesting proposition and I certainly hope they're successful," Reeve Moffat told The Expositor when contacted following the meeting, calling the campaign "pretty ambitious."

He explained that while he wishes the group every success, the ship is becoming a liability to the municipality and council would "welcome any opportunity to see it sail out of here."

"I would love to see it come back as a destination on a cruise," Reeve Moffat added, but said he was doubtful it would ever winter in Manitowaning. "I just don't see the economy of scale. It certainly wouldn't be feasible to run it as an attraction in Manitowaning." ties in question (the federal government is not subject to municipal taxation, but usually provides compensation in the form of the PIL). "We will receive PIL from November 2015 onward (the properties were officially seized that November). But this is the amount from before that. Canada hadn't taken control of the property before that, it was only acting as agent."

"Will that impact on the current year?" asked Councillor Baran. "We don't know," admit-


Hughes said that she was very happy when she heard the news. "My office has been working on this for a long time, it has been an issue since before I was elected," she noted.

Ms. Hughes and her office became very active on the file on April 10. "I had spoken with Kathy Hougan at Municipal Services in Sudbury to get a better understanding of the issue," she said. "We got some information on direction and passed on that information on April 15."

The issue was murky at best, she noted, but the Municipal Act did indicate that taxes owing had to be dealt with before a property could be transferred. "There was some question as to whether one of the entities involved (municipalities owed taxes) had registered a lien on the properties," she recalled. "It was not clear if they could collect all of the back taxes."

Ms. Hughes said that she had advised the municipalities to "consult with a lawyer who specializes with taxes," adding said that she was still waiting for some information to be provided by Public Works Canada. "I am waiting for a response from Danielle Pilon and

Overall, our class is filled with crazy, funny, annoying,



.Wikwemikong widow mourns murdered partner's loss

"I grew up in Toronto, but my family is from Wikwemikong and we moved back when I was older," Ms. Leedham shared. "That's where I met Percy. We lived in Wikwemikong where we started our family of four up until six years ago when we moved to Sudbury. We just wanted more opportunities for our family.'

Mr. Simon worked for a Sudbury construction company and in his spare time loved to spend time with his children.

"We have four children: Joshua, 14, Jayden, 11, Jace, 5, and Emma, one-and-ahalf," said Ms. Leedham. "He was a great dad and partner. He showed so much love for us. He loved to take the kids for walks on the trail behind our house and catch frogs with them. Percy was also really involved in sport with the kids. We went on great family road trips to see my family in Nova Scotia and down south.

Ms. Leedham told The Expositor that although Mr. Simon loved his job driving a rock truck, he had ambitions to work in the mining field and that he had been applying for jobs.

Around the time of Mr. Simon's death, he had returned home to stay with his parents Percy and Nancy Simon and help his father harvest wood.

According to the Ontario Provincial Police, Percy Jr. Simon was killed at a home on Andrew Crescent in Wikwemikong on Sunday, May 17 at approximately 6:45 am after an altercation.

The result of a homicide investigation led to the arrest of 31-year-old Robert Travis Wemigwans, 43-yearold Tammy Trudeau and 56year-old Byron Kagige, who were all charged with second-degree murder.

"While he was home helping his dad, he was still very involved in his kids' lives," said Ms. Leedham. "On that night (May 16) he had decided to go out and have a few drinks with friends. I never could have imagined this would happen. It was awful. He had goals, he had ambitions. What happened to him isn't fair—it shouldn't have happened.'

"I wasn't there, but I guess they had been drinking and there was a misunderstanding," continued Ms. Leedham. "Things got out of control, but for three people to do this to someone is hard to understand. I feel angry. Someone should have stopped it. This never should have happened." Ms. Leedham shared that

one of the hardest things to cope with since the death of her long-term partner is the stigma around his death.

"People think 'it's just another drunken Indian murder'," said Ms. Leedham, "but that isn't the case. I want people to know that Percy was a loving

father, partner, a man with a goal and ambitions. Our kids miss him every day."

"Since this happened, I feel like I'm drowning,' continued Ms. Leedham. "Every day I'm just struggling to stay afloat, to be there for our four kids. We have so much healing to do. It is going to take a long time. The kids talk about him all the time, it's helping us work through this tragedy.

was established that the case will go to trial as there is enough evidence that has been disclosed by the Crown. Glenn Sandberg, counsel for Mr. Haggart, indicated to The Expositor that there is no need for a lawyer to argue against committal to trial in this case. Therefore, the process became one of 'discovery' and the judge left the court; she will return when all the evidence has been presented to rule on the committal to trial. The accused has elected to be tried before a judge and jury in the Ontario Superior Court of Justice.

Mr. Haggart appeared in court, led in handcuffs into the prisoner box by police escort. He wears a goatee, mustache and close-cropped black hair; his v-neck white t-shirt showed tattoos on his neck and arms. He had trouble hearing the proceedings because of an ear infection, court was told, and was given a court hearing device which he wore throughout as he listened intently.

The charges against Mr. Haggart are: intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to personal property owned by Clinton Haggart, 25 Wilson Street East, Northeast Town, Ontario Aboriginal Housing Services, under Section 434.1 of the Criminal Code on June 13, 2014, and intentionally or recklessly causing dam-

age by fire to a dwelling house, property of Ontario Aboriginal Services, 25 Wilson Street East (the home of the Haggart family); intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a dwelling owned by Ontario Aboriginal Housing Services, 35 Blake Street West (the home of Mr. Haggart's mother-in-law, Margaret Bowerman); intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a garage, property of Lorne Alston, on July 23 at 15 Blake Street West; intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a shed, property of Jamie Still, on August 5, 26 Blake Street West; intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a dwelling/recreation centre, property of Michael Maciuk, on August 17, 21 Campbell Street West (the Island Training Centre); and intentionally or recklessly causing damage by fire to a storage facility, property of Floyd James Renton, on August 17, 23 Campbell Street West (the former Little Current curling rink).

The process of discovery is expected to last for a week. Crown Attorney Stacy Haner told The Expositor that the complexity of the case requires that many witnesses will be called to testify. This newspaper will continue to monitor the daily court sessions for a report in next week's issue







...continued from page 1 asked the pair "I don't understand why you just don't shoot them (referring to the nuisance birds) you're a farmer, you have a right to protect you property."


From this point on, Mr. Skippen has not applied for the necessary permit for farmers to shoot Canada geese and sandhill cranes (the permit grants farmers kills of up to five geese and cranes each day), taking that conversation as verbal consent to protect his property.

Two weeks ago, after a flock of between 200 and 250 Canada geese landed in his fields, Mr. Skippen began a daily tirade of trying to scare the geese off: chasing them with a tractor, honking his horn and yelling and firing warning shots overhead. The farmer drove his truck to one of his further fields (the for-

unlawfully hunting a migratory bird outside the open season, failing to immediately make every reasonable effort to retrieve a migratory bird, unlawfully discharging a firearm in the travelled portion of a right of way for public vehicular traffic and knowingly making a false statement to a conservation

mer Gammie farm), parked alongside the road, stepped out of his truck, loaded the gun and, from the roadway's shoulder, shot into his field, killing one goose, he explained. "It was so wet, and the property was already so damaged, that I left it," he said of the goose. "The geese cost me \$10,000 in crop damages."

The next day, he said, he received a knock at the door from CO Kyle Wood and was subsequently charged.

Mr. Skippen was charged with shooting a goose out of season and for leaving it on his property.

Following the charge, he got the necessary permit and has since killed another goose, which has been spotted by motorists travelling the Bidwell Road hanging from a tripod as a gruesome warning to other birds.

The farmer said he has been raising this issue with officer—when he appears in court on July 2 at 9:15 am in Gore Bay. He says he did not shoot from the roadway, but rather the road's shoulder area, and did not mislead the CO, claiming people are allowed to shoot from the roadway's shoulder into the property on which they have permission to hunt (a law specific to Northern Ontario).

In the same conversation with the former minister, Mr. Skippen explained to him that farmers who rent out their land to other farmers to pasture their livestock get paid to do so. If the government owns the animals (the deer or birds) then why don't they pay the farmers compensation for feeding these animals, Mr. Skippen asked the thenminister. The minister replied that the government doesn't actually own the animals. "Then why do you charge to hunt them?" Mr. Skippen persisted. The minister then, according to the farmer, deferred to his secretary who replied "We don't own them, we manage them."

What's with the stupid pill bottle caps that chew holes in your hand when you close them? Twice lately I've had blood everywhere!




Another new business in Tehkummah Saturday, a lemonade stand on Ward's step operated by Taylor and Samantha.
