Addictions program focussed on youth hits funding stage for Island campus Magnet centre for province

M'CHIGEENG—The United Chiefs and Councils of Mnidoo Mnising (UCCMM) has developed a youth mental health and addictions program and is currently working with provincial and federal branches of government to obtain operating and capital dollars to build the facility on Manitoulin.

"The original concept was born out of a need seen here on Manitoulin and throughout the North three years ago," Sam Gilchrist, Gwecwaadziwin program manager for the developmental phase, explained to The Expositor. "The development steering committee consists of UCCMM CEO Hazel Recollet, (past) UCCMM Tribal Chair Joe Hare, Roger Beaudin of M'Chigeeng Health Services and Kenjgewin Teg Education Institute Executive Director Stephanie Roy."

Mr. Gilchrist said that the com-

mittee explored various youth mental health and addiction programs, eventually discovering the Pine River Institute.

The committee felt that the institute's model was similar to what they wanted to create on Manitoulin and reached out to Pine River Institute founder Karen Minden.

"Karen came to Manitoulin two years ago to speak and the committee developed a relationship with her," continued Mr. Gilchrist. "They then applied for the funding for the development phase and I was hired in June of this year.'

"We knew we wanted a four pillar program, founded on education, therapeutic intervention, culture and wilderness programming," added Mr. Gilchrist. "Something that was missing in outpatient care or sending patients away to off-Island facili-

TORONTO—The impact of the current work-to-rule strike by the **Elementary Teachers' Federation** of Ontario (ETFO) reached onto Manitoulin Island earlier this September, when the Central Manitoulin Public School Fall

Fair was truncated and modified to accommodate the strike action.

"Our fall fair was much smaller and we made a last minute decision to hold it at our school this year instead of the arena," said a staff member on background. "That's because public elementary school teachers across Ontario are taking part in a lawful job action. Teachers have been directed by their provincial union to not plan, organize or participate in any field trips. Under the circumstances, out of respect for our teachers, we modified the format of the fair. We hung students' art in the gym, had some livestock entries and held our annual fall feast."

According to a news release from the union, the ETFO escalated its work-to-rule strike action on Monday because the terms offered by the provincial government and the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPS-

The debate topics will be limited to four and moderator Jim Van Camp will choose this number from the submissions received over the next week.


The popular "questions from the floor" part of the event will, of course, carry on as usual.

There has been no mention of the Conservative Party candidate, André Robichaud, and that is because Mr. Robichaud has declined to attend the Manitoulin Island event, saying instead that he plans on focussing on a door-to-door canvas in this part of the riding.

The Expositor also offered Mr. Robichaud and his campaign team the option of participating via Skype for the candidate's convenience but his organizers also declined this suggestion last week. (There will be a chair set for him in case he decides at the last minute to surprise Manitoulin Island with an appearance).

Expositor publisher Rick McCutcheon, who has helped facilitate these events during federal and provincial elections for nearly 40 years, noted that this it the first time a candidate has declined to attend.

"It is surprising, but we have told his team the door remains open," Mr. McCutcheon noted.

He also observed that Mr. Robichaud is participating in similar events in both Hearst and Kapaskasng in the north end of the riding and this week, in both Blind River and nearby Elliot Lake.

"Apparently he had originally committed to Blind River's event but declined Elliott Lake's invitation," Mr. McCutcheon said, "and then last week changed his mind about Elliot Lake so perhaps he'll also surprise us with a special appearance next Fhursday," Mr. McCutcheon observed.



Parking ticket regime status quo is unacceptable

There is no doubt about it. The fallout from the parking tickets issued to people shopping, dining and sightseeing in downtown Little Current this past summer is not in the best interests of the businesses located there.

This came to a head with the publication, on this page in the September 16 edition, of a letter to the editor ('Welcome to Little Current, now please leave') and the online comments relating to it.

But the accusations of the four retired professionals who came to the community one day to lunch and to shop, all of whom received tickets, were not the first time local retailers had heard these complaints.

They have been having to hear them all summer long from their customers, ever since town council hired an outside security firm (CanCom Security from Wikwemikong) to enforce the two hour parking bylaw that has been in place for some time, but had previously seen more warnings than tickets issued.

The letter to the editor and the public discussion on the topic it unleashed indicates that, under the present circumstances, the downtown merchants have a problem that needs to be solved with the cooperation of the town council.

This is a public relations battle in which those who conduct their business in the downtown, and pay taxes to do so, have no direct say, except through their elected officials in who rests the sole authority to amend the bylaws, suspend it, choose not to enforce it or in any other way come to the aid of the business people who now feel they are directly impacted with each new ticket issued.

Over the past decade, the Little Current Business Improvement Area (BIA) has spent its own money to erect and maintain a series of large and attractive highway signs that invite visitors to come to Manitoulin Island and to visit their "unique downtown waterfront," as the signs say

Two of them are on the TransCanada Highway (one east and one west of the Espanola turnoff) and the other is located at the corner above the Little Current LCBO store, inviting visitors to turn here and come downtown.

For these downtown retailers, their cost of maintaining these welcoming signs must be seen by them with real irony just now in light of the contrary publicity they're being handed.

It is clear there must be a change made in the parking ticketing regimen in downtown Little Current.

At the very least, the two hour parking limit, when it is enforced, puts this particular group of retailers at a disadvantage in comparison with other local Island communities where no such restrictions prevail

But on its face, the two hour time limit that the bylaw is based on really does not make much sense in a downtown waterfront area where marketing dollars encourage tourist visitors to come, enjoy a meal, do some shopping in the considerable variety of shops and to enjoy a stroll along the front street docks, to admire the boats there (perhaps chat with some of the boaters), have an ice cream cone or other seasonal snack and then return to the front street where they've left their vehicle.

For someone on vacation, enjoying a variety of new experiences, the two hour time is an unreasonable one that has led to the ill will associated with these parking tickets.

The situation, as it presently stands, is not going to get any better and this, unfortunately, will be on the backs of the people who, so far, have done a good job of keeping downtown Little Current viable and interesting

The businesspeople and the elected officials must come to an understanding of what is reasonable and do so as quickly as possible. The status quo is clearly unacceptable.

Harper's surplus is built on the backs of Canada's aboriginal communities

More than \$1 billion was left unspent in the Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Budget

To the Expositor:

Harper keeps stepping in "cow-pies." In a recent tele-vised debate he talked about "ordinary" Canadians, "new" Canadians, and "old-stock" Canadians. Let's remind him that anybody who arrived in North America after 1492, 1534, 1763, 1812 or 1867 is "new stock" in Anishinaabe eyes. When the treaties were signed between "Indian" peoples and the British Crown, promises were made that were to be kept "as long as the waters flow, the sun shines, and the grasses grow." Guess Canada doesn't need to adhere to the treaty promises anymore because of the drought in the west-grasses aren't growing; the sun obscured by smoke from out-of-control wildfires-the sun doesn't shine. Will the waters continue to flow? Great Lakes water levels fluctuate and people south of us are eyeing up our fresh water lakes to counter their drought. How are these conditions tracked and monitored? Who knows? Harper muzzled the scientists and cancelled the long form census. Canada did not honour the treaty promises anyway, as demonstrated by the \$1 billion that it did not spend in the Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development department of the federal government. Guess that's where Harper got his "surplus" from.

There are land claims being negotiated here and there in Indian country including one that affects Whitefish River people. There is a big problem with that land claim however, and it has to do with what people are calling it. It's supposed to be a land claim—it's become a money claim. The way I figure it, if Whitefish River's council and the federal government agree to settle the claim by accepting cash money, then it's a money claim. A land claim is a land claim. Land for land is what it should be.

As it is, there are people closeted together on postagestamp sized plots of land called reserves. This makes it all the easier for governments to count, contain, corral, and control the people. Anishinaabe social structure consists of families, nuclear and extended; clans; communities; and nations. When you glom them all together in one or two neighbourhoods, it's easy for things to get out of control, as in drive-by drug dealers making their rounds; as in dogs roaming free despite dog bylaws; as in kids roaring around in ATVs without helmets, and so on. No elbow room-big social tension. On the other hand, if a land claim is settled on a land-for-land basis, this will free up territory so that Anishinaabek can spread the people back out on the land again. When someone has elbow room, it's easier to think about how to make a living in a culturally appropriate and inclusive way.

There was an announcement just recently about 150 people losing their jobs in a Northeastern Ontario hospital. It doesn't take a great leap of imagination to think that some of those folks will be at risk of homelessness. Some of them are in economic or housing situations that are precarious-just think of how the banks get nervous at the prospect of someone possibly missing a mortgage payment.

Then there was the lady who was found in Mindemoyahomeless. This is called provisionally accommodated. Examples are those who are in short-term, temporary accommodations such as hospitals, motels, institutions, prisons, or places without permanent housing arrangements. These are places without security of tenure.

There's another type of homelessness called emergency sheltered. This includes folks staying in homeless shelters or shelters to escape family violence, to escape natural disasters, fires, or floods. Then there's unsheltered which refers to people who are absolutely homeless, who live on the streets, or live in places that are not intended for human living. Unsheltered includes those who live in public places, or private places without permission or contract. Unsheltered are also those who live in places not meant for permanent human living.

How big is the issue? In 2013, the Native Women's Association of Canada stated that more than 1 million people in Canada experience difficulty keeping their housing. CBC News reported in 2014 that 30,000 Canadians are homeless every night. Fifty-five percent of those living on the streets in Thunder Bay are aboriginal. The Homelessness Partnering Secretariat has estimated that between 150,000 and 300,000 persons experience homelessness in Canada in a given year. In 2009, 147,000 people stayed in an emergency shelter at least once, this is a rate of about 1 in 230 Canadians. Women and children at 546 shelters in 2010 constituted a 74 percent occupancy rate. Structural causes include inadequate income, lack of affordable housing, lack of access to health supports, and discrimination. Systems failure happens when care and support systems fall apart, as in not planning well for hospital discharge, or lack of support for immigrants and refugees. Individual and relational causes are traumas from house fires, job loss, family break-up or domestic violence, and extreme poverty. Oh, Canada-your home on Native land.

Harper's unrecognizable Canada

Little did we know it would make the one percent richer

In 2006, Stephen Harper said "You won't recognize Canada when I'm through with it."

What could have been a rallying cry for reforms that would benefit all Canadians turned out to be more threatening to the lives of ordinary citizens than reassuring.

Little did we know that he would start by making the wealthiest one percent even wealthier, at the expense of a vital and thriving middle class.

An analysis of Stephen Harper's economic stewardship

<u>"His government will likely be remembered as Canada's worst economic manager"</u>

To the Expositor:

Sound economic stewardship, Mr. Harper? The Harper School of Management is that of big business, big oil or simply put: that of the corporate élite that is dominated by what is more and more referred to as the one percent. It is an ideology steeped in the marginalization of the public good in favour of self-interest and fear of the other. It rewards self-interest at the expense of the public good.

Here's how it works:

tation of the long negotiated Kelowna Accord unanimously agreed upon by the AFN, the federal government and all of the provinces and territories.

The corporate tax rate of the day was set at 21 percent. By the end of 2011, the Harper Conservatives had lowered that corporate tax rate to 16.5 percent.

In January 2012, the Harper government lowered the corporate tax rate yet again, to 15 percent.

The annual cost of these corporate gifts (aka corporate welfare) is more than \$13 billion. That's \$13 billion less in government's coffers: revenue that is, in principle, intended to provide an improved range of services to Canadians.

The interests of the people and the environment take a backseat to the economic interests of the few.

To make a long story short, under Harper we have seen all our eggs put in the same (tar sands) basket.

The only real growth we have seen in the non-petroleum export sector of our economy is in our export of military related equipment, weaponry and supplies (i.e. over \$14 billion in sales to Saudi Arabia alone in 2014).

It's no coincidence that while Harper openly criticizes Cuba on its human rights, he has nothing to say when it comes to Saudi Arabia's far worse human rights record on both the domestic front or the foreign front (i.e. Yemen). Our military sales see us ranked as the world's sixth greatest merchant of death. Harper's government led us into debt and devoted the rest of its time in power to trying to get us out of debt by more cuts to government programs.

Corporations tell governments, such as Harper's, that increases in corporate taxes, will cause their country problems. That they may simply have to relocate their operations and/or move their investments to other countries with lower corporate tax rates.

They also claim that lower taxes could actually bring growth to the whole national economy and thereby create the possibility for the government to finance and improve the services it offers to its citizens.

They, and their lobbyists, suggest that decreasing the corporate tax revenue a government collects is good because it grows the economy. This in turn provides a base for more taxes, so that government ends up with more revenue, with which it can do more for its citizens, particularly those who are in need.

Sounds like an all round win-win to disciples such as Harper. Definitely the one he has been spinning to Canadians at the behest of deep-pocketed corporate interests who play one country off against the other...right across the world.

Well there's an even stronger argument to be made that it is in fact a lose-lose approach to our country's economic governance. That it is little more than a race to the bottom that really only benefits the rich. That widens the income disparity between the rich and the poor (and brings on the gradual yet steady disappearance of our middle class).

A good example is what has factually happened to Canada under Harper's rule.

When the Harper Conservatives came to power in 2006, they ate up Canada's hard-earned surplus as well as the \$5 billion in reserve that had been set aside for the implemenSo the "win-win" that big business that Harper would have us believe it is actually plays out as the following "lose-lose":

Short of the lost revenue it needed as a result of these corporate tax cuts, the Harper government went on to cut all federal government department budgets by 10 percent. (Since the costs of public services are easier to measure than their benefits, politicians of Harper's ilk can cut those costs with no obvious immediate effect on the benefits; benefits that can often take years to show up, not so much as numbers as in the experiences of people who suffer the consequences; i.e. the ill effects of deregulation, self-regulation, the dismantling of environmental protection laws, the loss of scientific research, the effect on veterans services, etc.)

This renders government departments less able to provide the range and the quality of the services they do/did. What a superb way of rendering our government services as inept as its critics like to claim. What a superb way of justifying the sale and privatization of a number of public services. Harper gets to put the revenue generated from their sale (or give away) into the government's coffers to reduce the size of his year after year deficits. (An often unmentioned but very real side effect of "privatization" is a little something called "kickbacks" be they in brown envelopes or in political party contributions.)

Meanwhile, the cost of it all is borne disproportionately more by the 99 percent while the one percent get exponentially richer.

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Under Harper we have faced a deficit year after another during each of his years in power, and this year will be no different.

Canada has racked up a full 25 percent of its \$633 billion national debt under Harper's tenure yet he continues to maintain his is government led by good economists and good financial managers. Since the proof is not in the pudding that this is so, the best I can say is that he is a so-so bookkeeper (no offence intended to bookkeepers.) His government will likely be remembered as Canada's worst economic manager; a classic example of what can happen when one rules in the belief that might is right. His lack of compassion is evident as is his utilitarian approach to governance. He rules by fiat, cares not about the environment our children will be obliged to contend with and wants us to stay the course. What he is doing is tantamount to the deckhands who busied themselves rearranging the chairs on the Titanic's deck as it was sinking. Think about it. Vote ABC (Anything But Conservative).

Scrapbook project scores goal with Kickstarter campaign

GORE BAY-In the August 19 edition of this paper, we reported on a Kickstarter online campaign that was 'crowdfunding' to produce a limited edition of an illustrated art memoir, entitled "Scrapbook: a story of art" by Gore Bay artist Jack Whyte. Designed by Jack's son Dylon and daughter-in-law Ashley Whyte, who provided technical, editing and promotional expertise, the campaign to raise funds was a risk they felt was worth taking. The fact that 'The Tragedy of the Asia,' a previous book produced by Jack and Dylon Whyte is now on the Great Lakes Marine History curriculum of Bowling Green University in Ohio provided an added impetus.

With a deadline of September 7 to reach their goal of \$14,000 to produce the 456page "Scrapbook" in an edition of 100 copies, the nail-biting had started in earnest by the time they had their 'Scrapbook Party' two days before.

The Whytes' shop in Gore Bay's Harbour Centre was full on Saturday afternoon, September 5, as people came to view a slide show about the making of the book, to browse the gallery of Jack Whyte original paintings and paper collages and to meet the artist. "We got lots of preorders for the book," says Ashley. "It was crowded in here, with the spillover milling in the hallway."

"The Island can be a challenge," continues Ashley, "in terms of promotion and marketing. We did lots of advertising, we promoted the "Scrapbook" campaign to hundreds of people, in person and often by phone, but the major work was done through networking and on social media, on Facebook and on our Kickstarter site. Sharing is a big part of how we get the word out." By the afternoon of the party, the funding goal had been 35 percent met. "We knew it would be difficult to meet our target, but we still felt every potential was possible," adds Ashley. "I was talking to a lot of people, and so was Dylon, showing the book, the original work, and making the presentation, so I didn't even spend any time with a woman who said she was "a big fan" of Jack's." The woman looked at an original Jack Whyte piece hanging on the wall of the shop. Entitled "It's Only a Paper Moon," it is a collage of hundreds of intricate indigo paper cuts illustrating an old cabin illuminated by a high yellow moon. It is also the work that was being offered as a reward for the top level of backer, what the Whytes called their "Cornerstone Contributor," in the Kickstarter campaign.



The number of backers climbed to 43. With only twelve hours to go, another backer stepped up. The pledge took the project above the set goal, for a total of \$14,313. It was the "big fan." Suddenly, they were very successfully 102 percentfunded.

"We're an example for others," enthuses Jack. "We showed people it can be done! We had the proof to show them, the book was real." New to social media and Kickstarter, Jack Whyte is a convert: "This is democracy in action!" he crows. "Crowdfunding allows artists to pursue what they want to do without having to rely on the grant system that has been crippled by misuse." We will publish 100 books and then our job will be to fill the pre-orders and sell the others online and in the shop, and to create other books. The book is \$119 plus shipping, which adds in most cases another \$20. The Kickstarter funds allow us to cover all production costs, and the cost of the Kickstarter campaign itself," says Ashley. Donations to the "Scrapbook" campaign averaged \$125, higher than average for a contribution to Kickstarter. "The project could not have happened without the contributions of each and every one of our 44 backers. We are grateful to each backer, each amount of generosity is equally important to the success of the 'Scrapbook" project."

'I'll hold my nose to vote,' says Grand Chief Madahbee

NIPISSING FI NATION–Anishinabek FIRST Nation Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee says that he'll hold his nose to vote in the October 19 federal election.

"Some of our people say they feel uncomfortable voting to elect candidates for other governments than our own. I respect their choice," says Chief Madahbee. "We all look forward to the day when Canada lives up to the words of its own Constitution and respects a nation-to-nation relationship with us. But, until then, and because the federal government has virtually abandoned First Nations for the past decade, I am personally prepared to 'hold my nose' and cast my ballot."

Chief Madahbee says he would rather not participate in Canada's elections, but is concerned that "not taking advantage of a right won by our warriors who fought under Canadian flags could condemn our communities to more legislative assaults against our treaty and inherent rights."

One of the factors that influenced Chief Madahbee's decision is the lengths to which the Harper government has gone to make it difficult for eligible First Nations citizens to vote on October 19, he states.

Voters are supposed to be able to check online to see if they are registered to vote October 19, but we have heard of situations where the system is not recognizing on-reserve postal codes.

"New election legislation requires voters to have a piece of government-issued ID that has a photo and address," he continues. This excludes Status Cards. Voters without photo ID must present two pieces of identification, one of which includes their address. "But many on-reserve homes don't have street addresses, and lack of adequate housing means some of our citizens don't have a fixed address of their own."

Elections Canada says First Nations governments can issue letters to their citizens which can serve as one of the two pieces of ID required to vote.

"We are concerned that these kind of barriers could discourage our citizens from voting, and urge Anishinabek leaders to be pro-active about ensuring that community members are included on voters' lists and supplied with letters of identification from their band offices," says the Grand Council Chief of 39 First Nations in Ontario.

Before October 19, Chief Madahbee says "it is important for Anishinabek leaders to help community members know the positions taken by local candidates and their parties on issues important to First Nations, such as equity in education funding, our rights of consultation and accommodation for resource projects in our territories, a national inquiry into murdered and missing indigenous women, and measures to reduce the risk of environmental damage to our lands and water-

ways.' This information can be found in local media election coverage, and is available from analysis devel-oped by the Chiefs of Ontario and Assembly of First Nations. It can be distributed by band newsletters and websites, and social media platforms. Some First Nations have arranged for area candidates to hold round-table discussions in their community halls which will be streamed live on the Internet.

"National party leaders have never before paid so much attention to First

Nations issues. Thev believe there will be a larger-than-ever First Nations turnout at the polls, and have seen statistics that indicate our voters could have a major influence in 51 ridings across Canada."

"I encourage all Anishinabek leaders to do what they can to help community members who decide they want to vote to be able to cast informed ballots October19," says Chief Madahbee.

...continued from page 1 ties was the after care, so we wanted to ensure that element was also there. We developed two programs to service youth ages 13 to 30. The Four Directions program was developed for youth 13 to 19, while the Seven Grandfathers program is for 19 to 30-yearolds. We've been working closely with Karen developing the programs to ensure best practices and to address the unique needs of indigenous youth. We have also been working closely with the (UCCMM) communities.

Mr. Gilchrist explained that both programs are designed in three phases centered around the four pillars.

"The first phase of Four Directions is wilderness stabilization, which is eight to 12 weeks in length," said Mr. Gilchrist. "Through wilderness stabilization the individual is removed from triggers and is able to reset and focus on health and wellness while starting to develop a treatment plan. The second phase is residential treatment. This step is six months to a year, but the entire program is client centered, so it will depend a lot on the individual."

The individuals will live in apartment settings on the Gwecwaadziwin campus, which Mr. Gilchrist said they hope to build behind the Kenjgewin Teg Education Institute.

"It would be the perfect location as part of this phase if the individual is working, volunteering or going to school," continued Mr. Gilchrist. "The final phase is outpatient after care. We work with the family and community to reintegrate the patient. It might just be a weekend visit at

first, but once they have successfully transitioned we follow up with another six months. Research shows that the longer patients have a connection to the treatment program, the higher success they have."

"For the first phase of the Seven Grandfathers program, the entirety of the treatment is conducted in the wilderness for three months." said Mr. Gilchrist. "The second phase is resident aftercare.

This phase is similar to the Four Directions program with individuals working, volunteering or going to school while living in an apartment style setting

"It gives patients a level of independence, but also consistency and the support if they have a bad day and need to speak to a councillor," noted Mr. Gilchrist.

"The final phase of the Seven Grandfathers program is community after care," he said. "We help the patient transition back into the community, arrange referrals and work with the family—it is a holistic approach."

The UCCMM has been working with an architect and developed a concept for a facility and is in conversation with various ministries to obtain the funding for the next phase of the program.

Though the facility and program will initially just service UCCMM youths, Mr. Gilchrist said that it has been developed in such a way as to allow for a broader service area in the future.

"We see time and time again a gap in youth services in the North," said Mr. Gilchrist. "We are moving forward on this full force. We have developed a solid program and there is a need and we are exploring a lot of promising avenues for funding."

BA) in earlier September "are inadequate and ignore elementary school issues.'

"On September 7, after insisting ETFO accept terms designed for secondary teachers, the Liberal government and OPSBA abruptly left the bargaining table," said ETFO President Sam Hammond in the release. "ETFO has waited more than a week for the government and OPSBA to return to the bargaining table. We have heard nothing from them.'

A notice from the OPSBA noted that "on September 11, OPSBA and the Crown tabled a comprehensive proposal to ETFO teachers. The settlement offer mirrors the deal reached with OSSTF, the union representing English public secondary school teachers, with whom OPSBA also has a bargaining relationship. We are focused on reaching an agreement and hope that ETFO will seriously consider the offer on the table.

But the union has insisted that the provincial government is attempting to foist a cookie cutter approach to settling labour contracts that is not appropriate to realities in the classroom and the workplace.

"The government is trying to cut corners by offering elementary teachers a deal designed for secondary teachers," noted Mr. Hammond in the release. "Elementary teachers and students have different needs than secondary teachers and students.'

Mr. Hammond challenged the government's position on the negotiations. "Despite what the government is implying, it has not offered our members the same conditions as secondary teachers," he said. "There is a significant disparity in how elementary and secondary schools are funded. That funding gap results in larger class sizes, fewer student supports and poorer working conditions in our elementary schools. The deal the government insists ETFO accept does absolutely nothing to close that gap."

The release indicated that the ETFO will continue its escalated work-to-rule "until a fair agreement can be reached." Until such an agreement, teachers will continue to provide instruction and other supports to students, notes the ETFO, but the union has also indicated it will begin rotating one-day strikes in October "if sufficient progress has not occurred at the central bargaining table.'

The union has assured that "parents and the public will be provided with adequate notice should these one-day rotating strikes proceed.'

"If the Liberal government had stayed at the table and not walked away, it's possible we could have reached a deal by now, and the escalation of ETFO's work-to-rule could have been avoided," said Mr. Hammond. "We need to get back to the bargaining table as soon as possible and negotiate a fair deal for elementary teachers and students. That's the best way of ending the WTR and averting oneday rotating strikes in October.'

...continued from page 1 ence on the impact the operations are having on the water and sediment beneath the fish farm operations but will assist in designing more efficient accurate and testing regimes. That goal has the potential to not only improve knowledge of what is going on beneath the waves, notes Mr. Meeker, but also to introduce better and more efficient and cost-effective testing that will benefit the industry. A win-win situation. "This isn't regulatory," he said. "It is research to try and to do a better job of the work we do and the dollars we spend on monitoring."

Under the direction of Supervisor Cheryl Podemski, known affectionately 'the bug lady," the team has been assisted in their work by Mr. Meeker, who is a trained commercial diver. "I have been working with her for close to 20 years," he said. Mr. Meeker had high praise for Ms. Podemski and the skill of her team. "They are one of the top groups of researchers," said Mr. Meeker. "They are as good as anywhere in the world." Ms. Podemski earned her nickname for her expertise in the realm of phytoplankton and zooplankton (microscopic plants and animals) that live in the sediment on lake bottoms and has been leading a major study at the famed Freshwater Institute in Winnipeg, Manitoba and the Experimental Lakes Area, which holds 58 small lakes in a forested region of northwest Ontario.

The results of the testing at the Blue Goose fish farm sites, posits Mr. Meeker, will add considerably to the science and knowledge involving an agricultural industry that holds great potential for meeting the healthy nutritional needs of a world whose supplies of fish have been in a steady decline in the wild for several decades.

Mr. Meeker said that he held out little hope that the project and the science it discovers will have any impact on critics of the fish farming industry who have already made up their minds, but he said he did hope that it would suit to inform those who wish to learn more through the application of solid science

impacted the food supply of indigenous wild fish.

"Any ecosystem is a complex system and it is not just one issue that is causing the decline (in the wild fisheries)," he noted. He agreed that part of the challenge facing the fisheries may even be linked to the more positive practices in terrestrial farming and nutrient conscious landowners near water bodies. Thirty or 40 years ago fertilizer was cheap. now farmers are applying their fertilizers in a much more targeted manner and landowners beside waterways are not fertilizing their lawns the same way, he noted. "They are being far more conscious of the potential impact they may be having."

"The result is that there are far fewer phosphates going into the water than back in the '60s when the Great Lakes were turning into pea soup," he said. "Now there may not be enough." This has been a consensus of the Great Lakes fisheries industries for some time, noted Mr. Meeker. "But the general public has not been made aware of that." Algae provides the food source for plankton and

plankton form the core food source for fish in the wild. "Plankton is the he said. "Every key," species in the Great Lakes needs that plankton.'

There does not seem to be any quick fix or solution to the phosphate conundrum or the decline of the fisheries, making farmed fish an increasingly important source of global nutritional needs.


Mr. Meeker's project has the potential to help to make the fish farming industry more efficient in tracking and/or rectifying any potentially negative impact it might be having on the Great Lakes ecosystems while at the same time reducing the costs to producers-a win-win situation.

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difference to anyone who has an open mind and will look at the evidence," he said. "Not only those who have the scientific training to analyse the data, there are lots of intelligent people who are not necessarily trained in science, but who can look at the knowledge gained and learn more about the facts unclouded by emotions. Those are the people I want to do this for, they may not understand the technical details, but it (the analysis of the data) can help inform them—not the crap that some people put out there."

Mr. Meeker pointed out that both the commercial and sports fishery on the Great Lakes has been under severe strain in recent years from a near perfect storm of invasive species that have severely

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Three Northeast Town residents look to tribunal for final appeal of Ashley Drain

CURRENT-LITTLE Northeast Town residents Bailey, Michael Mike Lecuyer and Edward Eadie have appealed the Ashley Drain to the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) Appeal Tribunal, with the hearing date set for next Tuesday, September 22 in Little Current.


"In the matter of the Drainage Act, R.S.O. 1990. C.D.17 as amended, and the matter of: appeals to the OMAFRA Appeal Tribunal by Michael Bailey, Little Current, Ontario under sections 48(1) and 54(1) of the Drainage Act from the Report of the Engineer and the decision of the Court of Revision; by Mike Lecuyer, Little Current, Ontario under section 48(1) of the Drainage Act from the Report of the Engineer; and by Edward Eadie, Little Current, Ontario under section 54(1) of the Drainage Act from the decision of the Court of Revision on the Ashley Drain in the Northeast Town," states the Tri-Order from bunal OMAFRA. "The notices of appeal have identified proposed modifications to the drainage works, benefits of the drainage works are not commensurate with the estimated costs and changes to the assessment of costs of the drainage works.

Mr. Bailey, Mr. Lecuyer and Mr. Eadie all appealed the drain at the Court of Revision for the Ashley Drain on Thursday, July 2, however none of the appeals were granted leading the proponents to file appeals with the tribunal (their last opportunity to appeal the project).

Keith Ashley originally petitioned for the drain, which will run from the Boozeneck Road, west to Ted Eadie's property to Keith Ashley's, running parallel to North Channel Drive and coming out at the Catholic Cemetery.

The drain includes a large watershed including properties from the top of Wilson Street out to Highway 540.

The cost of the drain (an

The drainage engineer for K Smart agreed with Mr. Bailey that the Ashley Drain is of no benefit when considering the definition of benefit in the Drainage Act and the fact that Mr. Bailey's property is a distance away from the Ashley Drain.

"However, indirectly the outlet liability assessment is actually a benefit to the Bailey property," stated a report from K Smart filed for the Court of Revision. "Now that the Ashley Drain will create a proper outlet for drainage in the watershed, a ditch connection could be made between the Ashley Drain and the culvert under Highway 540. Mr. Bailey and others in the subwatershed, through their outlet assessment, will have paid for the right to have their drainage flow in the Ashley Drain. If the Ashley Drain is constructed there is a possibility that the conditions shown in the photographs (submitted with Mr. Bailey's appeal) could be resolved. Without the Ashley Drain there is little chance to resolve the drainage problem shown in the photos. In my opinion the assessment of the Bailey parcels should not be

various parcels throughout the upper watershed, stated in his appeal that he felt that the benefit portion of the drain assessment was too high.

The Ashlev Drain will run from the Boozeneck Road, west to Ted Eadie's property to Keith Ashley's,

K Smart addressed Mr. Eadie's appeal, saying, "The Eadie appeal makes references to the benefit portion being too high. For parcel 1-004 there is a \$500 benefit assessment on the West Branch. The West Branch is within the north side of an unopened road allowance. The Eadie parcel is on the south side of the unopened road allowance and therefore reasonably close to have a direct outlet into the West Branch for drainage form the parcel. The \$500 direct benefit is at the low end of the direct benefit assessments on the drain which range from \$500 to \$10,000."

"Parcel 1-063 has a benefit assessment of \$2,000 on the East Branch," the K Smart report continues. "Three hundred metres of the East Branch is located along the west limits of this parcel. Ditch improvement will provide some improved drainage to the adjacent land. The main drain benefit which is a \$10,500 assessment is in two parts; \$2,500 for improved direct outlet, applied to interval 2 in Appendix A (of the engineering report), 436m of ditch improvement across the property, and \$8,000 for benefit for improved drainage along the ditch.


Both these assessments are reasonable and not high when compared to similar assessments on the Ashley property which are higher."

"The vacant or idle land use on the Eadie property is not a basis for a reduced benefit assessment," the report also notes. "The reason the benefit assessment is somewhat lower than for the Ashley property is that the Eadie property has greater slope when compared to the Ashley property, which is very flat. The drain provides slightly greater benefit to the flatter land. In my opinion the benefit assessments to the Eadie parcels are reasonable and should not be changed."

The tribunal hearing for the Ashley Drain will take place on Tuesday, September 22 in Little Current at the Northeast Town Recreation Centre at 9 am. This will be Mr. Bailey, Mr. Lecuyer and Mr. Eadie's final opportunity to appeal their assessment.

The mobile unit's mandate is to only make enough profit in order to run the unit, making the cost \$80 for cat spay or neuters and \$140 for dogs. As well, Wikwemikong chief and council subsidized the cost making it more affordable to community members.

"The mobile clinic has been accredited by the College of Veterinarians of Ontario and is a fully equipped mobile surgical clinic designed to travel where veterinarian services are limited," explained Mr. Greer.

Mr. Greer said that the

Welland and District SPCA saw a need for this type of service and facility and that it was made possible thanks for a grand from the Pet Smart Charities of Canada.

The first of its kind in Ontario, the mobile clinic made its first visit earlier this summer to the Six Nations of Grand River. The Wikwemikong clinic last week was the second visit the clinic has made.

"We have been in talk with 12 other communities," said Mr. Greer. "The demand is there, we are just trying to coordinate the vis-its." "The reception in Wik-

wemikong has been great," he added. "We have had a lot of very positive support and it is great that the community has been involved." SO

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Sheguiandah Fall Fair celebrates community heritage

SHEGUIANDAH—This year's Sheguiandah Fall Fair held Saturday, September 18 at the Centennial Museum of Sheguiandah provided a marvelous celebration of all things agricultural and heritage for residents to peruse.

A battalion of local volunteers gathered to adjudicate and tag the hundreds of submissions made to this year's event. As the first, second and third place ribbons were tacked to the tags, recorders followed along behind writing down the hidden names.

On Saturday the doors opened on the exhibits as well as a number of displays featuring live action demonstrations. Inside the museum members of the Manitoulin Weavers and Spinners were plying their skills, moving wool through the three phases of production into cloth just as our ancestors would have done when settlers first arrived on Manitoulin's shores. Manitoulin Island's only master spinner Linda Noble was spinning the wool combed and carded into readiness for the wheel by Susan Hart while weaver Jane Little turned the resulting yarn into cloth on a small loom, while rancher Richard Lathwell (whose alpacas supplied the raw materials) looked on.

Meanwhile, outside the museum carpenter Detlef Heiser was planing rough boards into finished lumber, utilizing a series of hand tools and clamps that would have been familiar to tradesmen

Assiginack Public School students learn about monarch butterflies

ASSIGINACK—In the fall of 2014, Mrs. Peltier and Mrs. McCarville's Kindergarten class at Assiginack Public school cared for and raised monarch caterpillars and released them as butterflies.

The students became concerned when they learned about the loss of habitat and decline in milkweed (the butterflies' sole food source) available for the monarchs.

In an effort to help the monarch population the Kindergarten class planted a butterfly garden in front of their classroom windows. With the assistance of the VanDenHeuvel family, the students planted butterfly-friendly flowers and milkweed.

Just before school started,

Mrs. Peltier, Mrs. McCarville, Mrs. Bouwmeester, Madison McCarville and Zoe McCarville found 11 monarch caterpillars in the school butterfly garden. The caterpillars were in their fifth instar (a phase between insect development) and ready to make their chrysalises. One of the caterpillars was already contorting into a "J" form, which happens right before the chrysalis is formed.

When the students arrived at school on the first day, there were 11 chrysalises waiting for them. The new students wondered about the 'green things' and what might be inside, while the year two Kindergarteners kept the secret safe. On Tuesday, September 16, the first butterfly emerged, followed by another the next day. On Thursday, nine monarchs had emerged!

While watching the butterflies emerge, Arabella Otosquaiob observed "The wings are getting bigger and bigger," and Dexter Mailloux described the scene as

a "monarch wonderland."

Keenan Duval explained that the monarchs need to go to Mexico. The Kindergarten students decided to release the monarchs in their butterfly garden. Before the release they paraded around the school wearing monarch hats and singing "Goodbye butterfly, goodbye." During the release, students got the opportunity to hold the butterflies. Levi Moggy liked holding the butterfly because they tickled his fingers. As the Kindergartens watched the butterflies fly away they sang "Baa maa pii memengwaa!" They will be planting a second garden this fall to further help the monarch cause.



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
